This afternoon's game gives us the opportunity to move up the table. Notts County have different ideas.


Finally, I would like to make a personal apology to the chairman at Notts County, D Pavis who has done so much off his own back to finance the Meadow Lane dream.

Until his call, the feeling of the panel, which includes Arthur Cox, Graham Taylor and Mick Buxton, was that the award was going to Tottenham for their win at Wimbledon. Meeting of managers

□ On Monday 14th October, all Football League managers will be gathering in Birmingham for the annual conference and dinner of the new League Managers' Association. After a full days discussion, which will include a debate on the benefits of the Premier League, the first annual dinner will take place.

Euro spot for cup winners

□ With the news that English clubs have secured a second U.E.F.A. Cup spot for next season, the Football League have confirmed that this will go to the winners of the Rumbelows League Cup.

League refs go international

□ Five Football League referees have been nominated by the F.A. with the recommendation that they be included in the F.I.F.A. list of match officials for 1992. Gerald Ashby, Martin Bodenham, Philip Don, David Elleray and Stephen Lodge will join league colleagues Brian Hill and Joe Worrall who have been on the list since 1985 and 1981 respectively. With the implementation of F.I.F.A.'s new policy relating to retirement age, George Courtney, Allan Gunn, Keith Hackett, Ray Lewis and Neil Midgley will all retire from the international list at the end of the year.

County Welcome

□ Today we extend a warm welcome to the players, directors, staff and supporters of Notts County Football Club. We have not met 'The Magpies' for some seven seasons now, but welcome them back to the top-flight after their play-off success last season.

Football League E.G.M. paves the way for F.A. Premier League.

Good afternoon and welcome to the directors, players and supporters of Notts County who return to Kenilworth Road after an absence of seven seasons.

Clearly the main footballing topic in the last few days has been the successful conclusion to the long, drawn out Super League debate.

The Football League Extra-ordinary General Meeting, which took place in the Connaught Rooms, Queen's Street, London, on Monday finally cleared the way for the new FA Premier League to be established for the start of next season. The clubs voted for the deletion of Regulation 11 which called for teams to give three years notice on resigning from the Football League.

The two areas that now need immediate attention, from both the F.A. and the present First Division, are the commercial aspects of the Premier League and its constitution. However, for all the Football League teams to give their blessing to the Premier League, financial stability for those outside next year's top-flight was essential.

Contrary to press reports, it has always been in the interests of the current 22 First Division clubs to ensure that there was no financial shortfall to the remaining clubs in the Football League.

In my view, this was shown by the decision to have a three-up, three-down system. Remember that three of the current First Division clubs will not be playing in the Premier League next season.

Clearly, no one was breaking away just for money. Second, Third and Fourth Division clubs have been guaranteed a share of £2 million each year for the first five seasons from the F.A., and a further £1.6 million each year over the same period will come from the Premier League clubs. In addition, the F.A. have confirmed that when the initial five-year spell comes to an end, they will continue to look after the financial welfare of clubs outside the Premier League.

On top of the guaranteed financial help, clubs outside of the Premier

Division, stand to further benefit from the new Football League set up. It's quite likely, for example, that they will be able to negotiate their own television deal. The other points that were agreed are that the officers of the League cease their present costly litigation with the F.A. And one that all supporters can take comfort from is that clubs will be given five years to implement any future criteria that may be set by the Premier League clubs, on a one club, one vote basis.

It is essential that all clubs have the opportunity, if successful on the park, to play at the highest level. I don't think people should think the F.A. and the current First Division clubs have won a "battle". I believe what they have done is take the game forward at a time when change was needed.

Finally, I'd like to thank our supporters who have taken the trouble to watch our reserves in action at Dunstable Town - we're averaging 400 fans per game!

The matches are being played at Creasey Park to give our new grass surface time to bed down, though it's our intention to be back at Kenilworth Road by January 31, if not before.

We're certainly not setting a precedent by playing away from our home stadium. We were only too pleased to comply with West Ham's request to play the reserve fixture on Tuesday, October 1st at their Chadwell Heath training ground, not because of a new pitch, but to accommodate their ground sharing agreement with Charlton Athletic.

I'm sure that our new club sponsors, Universal Salvage Auctions, are enjoying the benefits of the media attention being given to our smart new playing kit and sponsors logo. I'm confident that our new association with U.S.A. will be, I hope, as long standing as our previous club sponsor.

Thank you for your continued support.

We must get behind the team during such a testing time. It does not help when you hear supporters booing and jeering the players, particularly the youngsters who need as much encouragement as possible.





This afternoon we welcome the players, officials and supporters of Notts County to Kenilworth Road for this Barclays League Division One match, and congratulate them on their promotion into the top flight.

Currently occupying a position in the top half of the table, after an enterprising start to the season, County have enjoyed a "rollercoaster" ride in fortunes since the appointment of Chairman Derek Pavis in 1987. For it was he who devised a five-year plan which included taking the club back into the Second Division within three years, and then back into the top-flight two years later. The first stage was achieved to perfection, but when County won their Wembley play-off in May, it meant they had arrived a year ahead of schedule.

The final at Wembley was the icing on the cake for the County supporters. After losing to Tottenham in the fifth round of the FA Cup, it seemed their season was about to turn sour. But a fine run-in, which saw County win eight of their

final ten matches, secured a place in the play-offs and they eventually met Brighton & Hove Albion in front of 60,000 fans. A 3-1 victory in County's favour meant that manager Neil Warnock had won league promotion for the second time in his short league career, after initially guiding Scarborough into Division Four.

Mr Warnock had restored self-respect at the club and the feeling among long-standing supporters is that County are better equipped to tackle the challenge of mixing with the elite than when they last arrived in Division One ten years ago, particularly as they have a settled squad. Much will depend on talented youngsters such as Tommy Johnson and Craig Short making the "step-up" after last season's success, and whether former Barnet players Dave Regis and Paul Harding can make the jump from non-league to First Division within such a short space of time.

Signs are that the club is succeeding on the playing front with striker Johnson, who has scored 41 goals in his two seasons at Meadow Lane, being recently named Barclays Young Eagle of the Month after a recent flurry of goals helped push County up to 7th place in the First Division.

Midfielder Short has also been putting in some five-star performances which must have delighted manager Warnock.

Although highly-placed, County's start has been nothing short of inconsistent, winning one week, losing the next. In their opening nine matches they won four and lost four, including a 4-0 home defeat at the hands of rivals Nottingham Forest. There is a long way to go this season, but Mr Warnock must be heartened with the way his side has adapted to Division One, although I'm sure he would be the first to admit that consistency is needed more than ever in the top-flight.

For many years the foundation date of the football league's oldest club was given as 1862 and the club celebrated its centenary in 1962. However, the researchers show that the club was on a very haphazard basis at the time, playing little more than in practice matches. The meeting which put the club on a firm footing was held at the George IV Hotel in December 1864, when they became known as the Notts County Football Club.

Mr Warnock is the club's 20th post-war manager which includes such famous footballing names as Tommy Lawton, Jimmy Sirrel, Leeds boss Howard Wilkinson and Larry Lloyd.

Magpies On Parade



STEVE CHERRY (goalkeeper) - Steve now finds himself back where he began his career - in the First Division, where he made his league debut for Derby County in 1980. After six seasons at the Baseball Ground, Steve spent two years at Walsall and at Plymouth Argyle before returning to his native Nottingham for £70,000 in 1989.

CHARLIE PALMER (defender) - Charlie, a highly-popular figure at Meadow Lane, added another feather to his cap by helping County win promotion for the second successive season, having also figured in his first club Watford's rise to the First Division and Derby County's climb out of the Third Division. His career also included a spell at Hull City before joining the Magpies for £25,000 in 1989.

RICHARD DRYDEN (defender) - Signed from Exeter City during the summer for £250,000, versatile Richard started his career at Bristol Rovers, making his debut in 1986. After failing to establish a regular place, he joined Exeter where he helped to win the Fourth Division title. He made his debut for County in a 2-2 draw at Chelsea in August.

CRAIG SHORT (defender) - Three years ago highly-rated defender Craig was working in a bank and playing on the wing for Scarborough reserves. Since joining County for £100,000 he has played in three divisions, shared in two promotion triumphs at Wembley and has now played in Division One.

DEAN YATES (defender) - Former England Under-21 international, Dean made his debut as an 18-year-old in 1985. Last season Dean was forced to miss seven league matches after becoming the first player to be sent off twice for the professional foul. County's longest serving player, he has made over 334 appearances, scoring 35 goals.

ALAN PARIS (defender) - An £80,000 purchase from Leicester last January, Alan was originally bought as defensive cover, but showed versatility by slotting in at left-back, making the spot his own towards the end of last season. He made his league debut at Peterborough United in 1985. After three full seasons at London Road, he joined Leicester in 1988.


CHRISTIAN SHORT (defender) - Like his older brother Craig, Christian followed the same path to Meadow Lane in September last year from Scarborough for £100,000. He made his County debut on New Year's Day and proved to be a valuable member of the squad in the climax to the promotion campaign.

PAUL HARDING (midfield) - Valued at £60,000 Paul was signed from Barnet last season. A non-league player with Sutton, Calshoton, Dulwich Hamlet and Enfield, he chose the perfect time to score his first goal for County when a late header against Middlesbrough booked a play-off final place at Wembley. Ironically, the former West Ham schoolboy failed to make the starting line-up against Brighton.

DAVE REGIS (forward) - Has proved to be a real bargain after being valued at £25,000 in the double transfer package that also brought Paul Harding from Barnet last year. The younger brother of Cyrille, he scored 17 goals in 31 full appearances last season to crown a fairytale rise from non-league football.


TOMMY JOHNSON (striker) - Barclays Young Eagle of the Month, Tommy made his league debut for County in 1988. A prolific goalscorer, he had scored 45 goals in 86 appearances to the end of last season. This term he has already scored 5 goals earning a call-up to the England Under-21 squad.

KEVIN BARTLETT (forward) - Kevin started league football at Portsmouth in 1980, but after failing to gain a regular first team place, joined non-league Fareham Town in 1982. He returned to league football in 1986 with Cardiff City, before establishing himself as a class striker with West Brom. He joined County last year for £150,000.

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Player profile

Mark Pembridge

1991 has been a fairytale year for Mark Pembridge. Last Christmas he was playing reserve team football in front of fifty people, today he graces the stage of the First Division in front of packed houses. He has become the ideal role model for all "fringe players" at Luton, making the step-up to the top flight with remarkable ease.

"Obviously I was nervous, making my debut at Wimbledon on New Year's Day. Although Plough Lane is not the biggest stage in Division One, the occasion still got to me. But once the game got under way, I just did what I knew best, and that was to play football."

After an initial settling-in period, it was obvious to most Town fans that Mark was one of the brightest young talents to emerge from Kenilworth Road in years.

"It's flattering to read and hear nice comments made about me, but there is much more to come yet. I'm still learning the game, and in my opinion you never stop learning in football. It helps when you have a great bunch of lads around you, all willing to help and hand out advice."

People have said that going into the 'hot bed' atmosphere of the First Division, such as at Old Trafford or Elland Road can affect a youngster learning his trade, but I just take it as another game. When you hear the crowd against you, it just makes you more determined to do well. Highbury this season was a good example."

A change of manager during the summer with the arrival of David Pleat could have affected Mark's chances of progressing in the first team, "I've had no problems on that front. It is common knowledge that Mr Pleat likes to play the passing game, and it has suited me down to the ground. The atmosphere, if



anything at the club, has got even better and I feel the more games we play under David, then the better our performances as a team will become.

My main aim this season for Luton is to settle down in midfield, and to try and play on a consistent basis. Playing well regularly cannot harm my international chances either, but I realise playing for Luton is my 'bread and butter' football. Recognition by Wales is a lovely bonus."

Mark has come a long way since playing for his local side Georgetown in Merthyr Tydfil, culminating in a call-up to the Welsh squad for the friendly against Brazil three weeks ago.


"It was a magnificent feeling making my international debut, especially as the match was played at Cardiff Arms Park. Although we won the match thanks to Dean Saunders'

second-half strike, the Brazilian players were still in a different class to us. Their skill and all-round technique was brilliant.

I must admit, I did not notice a change in footballing standard by joining the Wales squad because they are all First Division players anyway, and I play against them week in, week out. It was an experience I'll never forget and one I'd like to experience on a regular basis."



World Cup '94 ...An update.

Although the dust has only recently settled from Italia '90, preparation for the next World Cup finals in the U.S.A. in 1994 are already in full swing, writes Luke Nicoli.

Independence Day, 1988 was a milestone in American soccer history. On that day the right was earned to host the 1994 World Cup finals, shocking many football pundits who found it hard to believe that a country brought up on 'home runs' and 'touchdowns' could possibly hold the greatest sporting spectacle in the world.

The decision to hold the event in the United States was a simple one for F.I.F.A., the governing body of world football. Not only do the best stadiums and facilities in the world exist in America, but also a marketing association capable of making the finals the single biggest money-spinner in sporting history.

The job of getting ready for 1994 had its formal beginnings at a 10-member meeting last January in the mountains above Santa Barbara, California, with Chairman Alan Rothenberg emphasising, "The success of the World Cup will be reflected in attendance records in the best stadiums available; host cities will offer top-notch restaurants and four-star hotels, international airports and first-rate training sites, volunteers and entertainment and cultural events. As long as we deliver on these commitments, the participants in the XV World Cup will return home satisfied."

June saw the deadline for the applications of cities hoping to host games in 1994. Twenty-six applied, including a whole range of big cities from New York to Honolulu, which constitutes a record number in the World Cup so far. F.I.F.A. will be assessing the applications in the next few months, and will make a final decision early next year.

As a gesture of goodwill for the spectators and media reporters, the Americans have decided that players at the 1994 World Cup will wear their numbers on the front of their jerseys and their name on the back. They have

also requested to F.I.F.A. that eleven substitutes should be named for each match instead of five, and most radically, that the World Cup final be replayed if the game is tied after extra-time. A definite answer is hoped for by Christmas.

The group draw for the preliminary competition will, for the first time, not be held in F.I.F.A. headquarters in Zurich but the ceremony will now be staged in New York on December 8th. The backdrop will be the Madison Square Garden, thus setting the scene for the qualifying competition which will last from March 1 1992 up to December 1993.

If all the Americans do is succeed in holding the best World Cup in history, they will fall short of the opportunity F.I.F.A. has presented them with. The 1994 World Cup must be the catalyst for soccer's continuing growth in the States, transforming one of America's most popular participant sports into the country's favourite spectator sport.

A successful soccer future has already begun in America with the revamping of the U.S. National Team under new coach Bora Milutinovic. Playing 'Bora Ball', the team recently won the CONCACAF Gold Cup with five consecutive victories, and winning the USA's first international tournament. With a recent victory over Hungary, signs are that the U.S. team will not be the 'whipping boys' in 1994, as they were last year.

World Cup 1994 is sure to be a multi-million pound, sporting extravaganza. Even at this early stage, Mr Rothenberg enthuses, "Do I sound naive when I say I don't see any major hurdles to overcome? We've already made the success of World Cup '94 an inherent part of soccer's future in this country, so we are well on the way to fulfilling our mission".

Let's hope so.

Composed of a billowing American flag, a football, and a five-point star in a red, white and blue colour design, the 1994 World Cup USA logo is expected to be seen millions of times between now and the tournament.

"The motion achieved through the use of speed lines and the waving stripes really symbolizes the excitement and vigor of the 1994 World Cup effort," said co-Chairman Charles Cale.

The unity between the soaring soccer ball and the traditional stars and stripes also appeals to Joseph Blatter, secretary of F.I.F.A., "The symbol is an exciting element for the 1994 World Cup," he said.

Buoyant crowds enjoy a winning night full of goals and heroes too

With the Town facing Division Four for the first time in 1965/66, it was expected that crowds would touch rock bottom, but as the season kicked off, expectancy was surprisingly buoyant and attendance stood up well.

This was helped, of course, by a good home record, plenty of goals and the return to form after a long lay-off because of injury, of terrace favourite John O'Rourke.

By the time of the visit of Notts County to Kenilworth Road on the 20th November, the Town had played eight home games, winning seven and scoring twenty-four goals in the process, with O'Rourke on target eight times.

Notts County were not expected to be pushovers, but the rainsoaked crowd of 6,486 - down 1500 on the previous home game - could not have expected the final result, not the unlikely hero that the game produced.

Tony Read had been signed from Peterborough, just before the end of the previous season as a goalkeeper, and typical of the malaise within the club at the time, it transpired that he had a broken foot which meant that he could not even take part in the remaining games leading up to eventual relegation.

The following season Read did not start as a goalkeeper, but as an old-fashioned centre-forward. Obviously manager George Martin recognised some ability in this position in training, starting him off as the perfect foil to O'Rourke. By the time of the Notts County game, he had scored a creditable four goals.

The game got off to a positive start when, in the third minute, winger Ray Whittaker ran on to a quickly taken free-kick, sprinted thirty-yards and shot hard and low into the net.

Derek Shiels then equalised for County five minutes later, before Read restored Luton's lead in the sixteenth minute by driving in a direct free-kick

from just outside the box. O'Rourke then made the score 3-1 in Luton's favour just before the interval after beating two defenders in a race before delicately sliding the ball past the goalkeeper.

The second-half belonged completely to Read who was obviously going through a purple patch and encouraged winger Graham French who sensed that he could do no wrong, and further goals were sure to follow.

The Town supporters did not have to wait long, for in the sixty-ninth minute, Read who was by now giving the County defence the complete run-around controlled a bouncing ball in the area before placing it into an empty net.

The goal of the match was still to come, for three minutes later Read, hovering on the edge of the box, ran onto a high corner from Whittaker and literally rocketed a header into the top corner of the net to make the final score 5-1.

Unfortunately, Read appeared more cumbersome as the season wore on, and the last six games were spent in goal. This was followed by two more seasons where the goalkeeping duties gradually overtook the outfield positions before, after a succession of "pretenders" to the goalkeeping positions, he finally became the acknowledged number one in 1970.
