

early on in the game and defend with pride.



English teams aiming for UEFA points


□ With all four English representatives through to the next round of European competitions, the chase is now on for a third place in the UEFA Cup in the season after next. Points gained in the present campaign (two for a win, one for a draw and bonuses for progress to the quarter-finals and beyond) count towards a qualifying table for season 1992-93.

Quality not quantity

□ As you may have read in our matchday programme for the recent fixture against Notts County, there will be promotion and relegation between the FA Premier League and The Football League on a basis of three up and three down. This applies as long as the Premier League consists of 20 clubs or more.

More than a game...

□ Last weekend saw the start of a new exhibition at Manchester's National Museum of Labour History. 'More Than A Game', which runs for three months, focuses on the history of football and footballers and the development of the Professional Footballers' Association. Organised in conjunction with the PFA, the exhibition features an impressive display of football trophies, including the FA Cup and the League Championship, together with other silverware loaned by the Football League. The exhibition also features a large collection of international memorabilia dating back to the turn of the century.

Busy cup schedule follows a break for the international set

This afternoon we welcome Sheffield Wednesday to Kenilworth Road for the first time since they opened our home season here in 1989-90. After relegation at the end of that season, they bounced straight back by winning promotion in some style and by lifting the Rumbelows Cup as well just for good measure. It certainly showed that they had put the nightmare of that dramatic day in May 1990, when we survived with a memorable win at Derby County, behind them.

Interestingly, one of the scorers when we last met Wednesday was a certain Danny Wilson, with a penalty. It is a pleasure to see him back at Luton today, albeit in an Owls shirt, and we hope he enjoys his return to Kenilworth Road – even if, as I naturally hope, the visitors return pointless to Yorkshire tonight.

Like us, I am sure the Sheffield team and their staff are looking forward to today's match with a little extra relish after our enforced break from First Division action last weekend when there were no top flight fixtures. This was designed to give the home international teams the maximum preparation time for their important European Championship fixtures this week.

For Mark Pembroke, who was with Wales for their critical clash in Germany, it was a

particularly big week. Having made his international debut against Brazil in Cardiff, he could hardly have asked for a more testing possible second cap than a meeting with the World Cup holders on their own soil in a match which could decide the outcome of the Welsh team's qualifying hopes.

Phil Gray was also involved in the big European international week. He was called up by Northern Ireland for their game against the unpredictable Austrians and we all, obviously, hoped both he and Mark would enjoy the best of luck as they took a break from First Division action.

Another younger player to win international recognition was David Green, our promising young central defender, who was picked by the Republic of Ireland youth team to play against Northern Ireland in Dublin on October 22 in a UEFA Youth Championship match. Like the senior lads, we wish David good luck.

It is difficult to remember the last time we experienced such a strange run of fixtures as we have had recently. For, after a busy September, we have had a very light schedule in October until now when we are facing up to another busy period. There will be cup games for all our teams at all levels of the club over the next couple of weeks.

The first team will be off to Suffolk next week to play Ipswich Town in the second round of the Zenith Data Systems Cup at Portman Road and then returning to East Anglia next Saturday, to visit Norwich City at Carrow Road.

The reserves, or a representative team, will be going to Leighton Town on Friday, October 25, for a Bedfordshire Premier Floodlit Cup tie, two days after the youth team have also been in cup action in the competition regarded as the best for youngsters, the Football Association Youth Cup.

In this competition, the youth team are due to meet East Thurrock Town, who compete in the Essex Senior League, here at Kenilworth Road on Wednesday, October 23, kick-off at 7.30pm. This promises to be an entertaining match and all supporters are encouraged to come along and back the youngsters. If the match goes to a replay, this will take place on November 6 at East Thurrock.

The youth team are involved in another cup-tie on Saturday, October 26, when they meet Bristol City in the second round of the South East Counties League Cup. This match will take place at our training ground and kick-off will be 11am.

Mention of the training ground reminds me of the comments made by Brian Horton at Oxford last Saturday when he looked back on his visit to Dunstable for a reserve match and remarked on the condition of the Creasey Park pitch. It must be said that while we have been very pleased with the support our reserves have had at Dunstable, it has also been noticeable that the pitch is not perfect and the ball often bounces unpredictably.

This is no fault of Dunstable's as they do not have the equipment or the finances to maintain their surface to a Football League standard. It was our own decision to go there and we have been pleased with the attendances, but we are now looking at the possibility of returning to Kenilworth Road for reserve team fixtures as soon as possible.

Our new pitch has begun to bed down well and, as a result, we shall be playing our Football Combination fixture against West Ham United on Monday, November 11, here at Kenilworth Road as a test of the durability of the new surface. The new pitch has not cut up too much and after some special 'verti-draining' treatment to help deal with the compacting suffered in the work done to remove the synthetic surface, we are optimistic it will provide an excellent and durable playing surface.

also have some class players on show. We have played all the sides which were promoted last season and are yet to be beaten by any. Let us hope the trend continues this afternoon.

Although we are down at the foot of the table, we still have a lot to look forward to. We are only a quarter of the way through the season and just remember what Sheffield United achieved last season. Those same sentiments are being echoed from all the sides at the wrong end of the table, but we must make sure it is us who carry them out.

Our away form has been particularly disappointing. We play well for the first hour of a match and then just seem to cave in. Again this boils down to the defence and is a problem we must sort out quickly.

The league games up to Christmas are vitally important for us. We must get some points in the bag so that our run-in during the New Year is made easier and this in turn boosts confidence. Obviously the challenge is going to be difficult. We have an inexperienced team and the younger players are still learning.

Give them time. They cannot become seasoned professionals overnight, but the more they play the better they will become.

Welcome to Sheffield Wednesday

Sheffield Wednesday made up for the disappointment of their relegation from the top flight in 1990 by gaining promotion back to Division One at the first attempt last season. Under former manager Ron Atkinson and with the emphasis on playing quality football, Wednesday always had a promotion look. They began the season with a 12-match unbeaten league run. Their travelling form was also a key to their success, claiming 17 victories, the last and most celebrated being a Rumbelows League Cup triumph at Wembley last April.

On a bright, sunny day, Wednesday skipper Nigel Pearson had the honour of lifting the club's first major trophy since 1935. John Sheridan took his season's tally to 11 goals with a superb goal which will assure him of a lasting place in Hillsborough's "hall of fame". The final score remained 1-0.

At times the cup-run gave cause for concern as league form faltered, but five wins in their final six home matches dispelled any fears, and Wednesday were promoted ahead of nearest rivals Notts County.

Since the controversial departure of Ron Atkinson to Aston Villa, Trevor Francis has taken over as player/manager and coped well in the job. Despite losing their "grudge" match to Villa on the opening day of the season, Wednesday have recovered and were recently flying high in fourth place following a 4-1 drubbing of Crystal Palace two weeks ago. It was a fine return from injury for England international David Hurst as he scored two goals in front of 26,230 fans at Hillsborough.

With a strike force which boasts the talent of players such as Hurst, England Under-21 star Paul Williams, recent signing from Nottingham Forest Nigel Jemson and Francis himself, their forward line can be considered as strong as any in the country.

The Wednesday defence has also been strengthened this season by the arrival of Paul

Warhurst from Oldham, and the arrival of England goalkeeper Chris Woods from Glasgow Rangers.

Wednesday clearly have strength in depth in all positions, and although this season is one for finding their feet in Division One, the Wednesday faithful are already looking for success from such a promising side.

As Sheffield was one of the principal centres of early Association Football, Sheffield Wednesday were formed as long ago as 1867 by the Sheffield Wednesday Cricket Club. Their colours from the start were blue and white. The inaugural meeting was held at the Aldephia Hotel and the original committee included Charles Stokes, who was subsequently a founder member of Sheffield United.

The club have won the Division One title on four occasions in 1903, 1904, 1929 and 1930. They also won the Division Two crown in 1900, 1926, 1952, 1956 and 1959; the F.A. Cup in 1896, 1907 and 1935; and the League Cup in 1991.

Owls On Parade



CHRIS WOODS (goalkeeper) - Currently England's number one goalkeeper, Chris joined Nottingham Forest as an apprentice but, as Peter Shilton's understudy, had limited openings in the first team. He moved to Norwich in 1980 where he was the regular keeper for five years. Chris was one of Graeme Souness' first signings when he took over at Glasgow Rangers and remained in Glasgow until his £1.5 million transfer in August.

NIGEL WORTHINGTON (defender) - Nigel began his league career with Notts County for whom he made more than 80 appearances before joining Wednesday for £125,000 in 1984. He has now made more than 200 league appearances for the Owls and his consistent form has seen him add to his tally of Irish caps.

PHIL KING (defender) - Phil began his career at Exeter in 1985 moving via Torquay to Swindon in 1987. He joined the Owls for £400,000 in 1989 and has been almost ever-present, making a big impact and proving popular with supporters.

PETER SHIRLIFF (defender) - Peter joined Wednesday from school and made 223 league and Cup appearances before joining Charlton Athletic in July 1986. After making more than 100 appearances for the London side, he returned to Hillsborough for a £500,000 fee in the summer of 1989.

PAUL WARTHURST (defender) - Paul began his career at Manchester City before being transferred to Oldham in 1988. He was a regular member of Oldham's promotion-winning side last season. A defender who is quick and versatile, Paul joined Wednesday for £750,000 during the summer.

ROLAND NILSSON (defender) - Swedish international, Roland joined Wednesday in December 1989 from Gothenburg for £375,000 and made his debut at home against the Town. A nasty knee injury kept him out of much of last season, but he returned in time to participate in the Rumbelows League Cup final.

NIGEL PEARSON (defender) - Nigel made more than 180 appearances for Shrewsbury Town before joining Wednesday for £250,000 in 1987. Strong in the air with leadership qualities, Nigel has been a very popular club captain for the past three seasons.

JOHN HARKES (midfield) - A member of the American World Cup side, John joined Wednesday in December 1990 after a two-month trial period. A vital member of the first team squad, he can play equally as well in defence. John was the first American to take part in a League Cup final at Wembley last April.

NIGEL JEMSON (forward) - Recently signed from Nottingham Forest, Nigel started his career at Preston North End and spent three seasons at Deepdale before moving to the City Ground in 1987. He spent two loan spells at Bolton and at Preston in 1988 before establishing himself in the first team in 1990. Nigel is an England under-21 and B international.

PAUL WILLIAMS (forward) - Paul was Charlton's leading goalscorer for two seasons having joined them from non-league Woodford Town. He made such an impact following his debut in 1987 that he gained England under-21 recognition. He joined Wednesday in August 1990 for £600,000 and was the only ever-present last season.


Meet the Boss

Trevor Francis

Plymouth-born Trevor made a name for himself at his first club Birmingham City. As a 16-year-old with a raw talent, he scored 15 goals in only 22 appearances in his first season. He went on to become the fans' idol at St Andrews and enjoyed another eight seasons with the Blues before becoming the most expensive player in Britain at the time. Brian Clough spent £1 million on Francis in 1979 and it was during his time at the City Ground that he established himself as an England regular, also winning European Cup, League Cup and Super Cup honours in the club's most successful period.

After spending one season at Manchester City, Francis moved abroad to Italian giants Sampdoria. He spent four fine seasons in Genoa and must be considered one of the few Englishmen to have succeeded playing in Serie A. In 1988, after one season with Atalanta, he moved back to Britain and to Scottish giants Rangers. Later that same season, he moved to Q.P.R. and it was not long before he was given his first managerial role as player/manager. Things did not work out as well as expected for Francis and he moved to Sheffield Wednesday as a player in 1989. This summer he followed in the footsteps of his boss Ron Atkinson as manager.

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Player profile

Mick Harford

The smile on Mick Harford's face told its own story when he returned to Kenilworth Road and revelled in his fairy tale two-goal comeback against Oldham Athletic. The players around him might have been different and the pitch had changed from plastic to grass, but for big Mick it was simply great to have come home again.

"It was a brilliant move for me," he said. "I wanted to be back in the First Division and of course it was even better to be back at a club where I knew the place and the people well. Nothing felt as if it had changed for me and I really felt like I had just come home again.

"The fans were brilliant and I was really lucky I suppose to have such a dream return with those two goals. But it felt fantastic and I am delighted to be back at Luton again. I know we have had a few adverse results this season, but I am sure it is something we can turn around.

"You just have to look at our home record to see what we can do. I am sure it is just a matter of time. We have only let in four goals at home and two of those were penalties. Our real problem lies away from home where I think we need to be keep our heads high and concentrate harder. I am sure we will sort it out."

For Luton fans, of course, Mick is always going to be associated with the magnificent seasons in the mid and late 1980's when the Town succeeded in reaching two Littlewoods Cup finals at Wembley and a Simod Cup final. At that time, he also earned recognition as one of England's best strikers and was selected to represent his country at centre-forward.

"Those were great days," he said. "But we have to concentrate on today now and I believe there are some really talented players in the squad now. I certainly think we have the players around to help us to make goals and score goals. David Preece and Mark Pemberton are great crossers of the ball and I think Matthew Jackson does a terrific job on the right flank. I know we have the players to create the service."



Mention of Pemberton reminded Mick that the young Welsh international was just a young apprentice in his earlier days at Kenilworth Road and that one of his regular tasks was to look after Mick Harford's boots. "He's never been the same since," quipped Mick. "So I always look after him when I can. He is a real talent and a very honest boy."

"I think we have a young team altogether. Physically, I know they can handle it. They are strong boys. But the tough part is coping with it mentally at places like Old Trafford when you play well and still fall behind. But that is something I am sure we will get over."

"In purely footballing terms, I think we are capable of beating anyone on our day. We played some really good stuff against Oldham and Notts County. But we gave silly goals away and that is something we have to sort out."

On a personal note, Mick has been frustrated recently after picking up a hamstring injury. "I had to

miss a couple of games and a lot of training. I didn't like that. I am a player who likes to stay in training all the time. Luckily, I don't put on any weight though. My father and my brother haven't either. It is just one of those things."

Mick is sure to have a special word today for one of his old friends and team-mates - Sheffield Wednesday's Danny Wilson. "He is a good professional and always neat and tidy," said Mick. "We called him 'Peter perfect' here and he will never be forgotten for his Littlewoods final goal for us. He has done well and it will be nice to see him again."

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The 'Man in the know'

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A victory won in the dressing room

Luton Town have achieved some great victories over the years, notably the Littlewoods Cup triumph over Arsenal at Wembley in 1988. Older supporters, however, still remember as the best the day on November 30, 1946, when the Town beat then-mighty Newcastle United. Vic Lea recalls the memorable occasion and the result that no-one expected....

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One of the finest players to don a Luton Town shirt was that famous Anglo-Chinese international wing-half Frank Soo. A great favourite with Luton fans, Soo, who later became the national coach of Sweden, paid an outstanding compliment to his old Luton chief George Martin when he recalled the Newcastle game as one of the outstanding memories of his peerless footballing career. He was, of course, a key player that day.

It was the 1946/47 season. Luton Town were struggling to find a successful side. The board of directors, smartly following manager George Martin's pointer, brought off one of their most astute moves by securing the services of then current England wing-half Soo for £4,000 from Leicester City.

The move began to bring rapid results. The Town began to shake the football world by bringing off shock results, but none more headline-worthy than the defeat at Kenilworth Road of one of the finest teams at the time – Newcastle United.

At half-time on that day eleven dejected Luton players trooped off the field. Seated in the dressing room, they exchanged not so much as a word as they listened to the galling chit-chat of their opponents in the next room. Even the crowd of 25,410 were stunned by the quality of the Magpies.

The Geordies, with the guile of Shackleton and Bentley, and the thrust and speed of Wayman, Pearson and Milburn had moved into a decisive 3-0 lead. Everyone in the Luton dressing room was so deep in depressing thought that no-one noticed the entry of manager George Martin.

In the middle of the room stood a bucket of water. Without a word of warning, George kicked it savagely, sending it flying. The water splashed all over the place, drenching the players and instantly bringing them to their feet in surprised anger.

"I know that they are good," he said quietly. "But get me one goal – just one – and I won't mind if you lose six-one. One goal, d'ye hear? That's all I ask."

Frank Soo recalled the words as "the most unusual pep-talk I have ever heard." Nevertheless, it had astounding results.

In the opening seconds of the second-half the Geordies' keeper was in action, tipping a fierce rising shot from Hugh Billington over the bar. With the shouts of the Town supporters ringing in their ears, Luton mounted attack after attack, and were finally rewarded when Billington smashed the ball home after some smart play involving Billy Waugh.

Only nine minutes after that first shock goal, the Town had netted again. Inside-forward Allan Driver hit the ball from fully thirty yards into the top right-hand corner of the Newcastle net for the finest goal of his career.

Now spurred on by two wonder goals, and the deafening applause of their supporters, Luton swarmed around the rival goal-mouth in menacing fashion. The ever-alert Mel Daniel scored the equaliser and found himself almost able to walk the ball into the net after some dazzling wingplay by Dally Duncan on the left flank.

Amazingly, this did not complete the day's scoring. Clever work by Soo saw the ball through to Billington. Quick as lightning, the centre-forward turned and shot and, almost unbelievably, Newcastle were beaten.

Frank Soo recalled. "It was one of my proudest moments. As we walked off the pitch at the end of the game, one would have thought we had won the FA Cup, so tremendous was the crowds' enthusiasm."

George Martin was waiting for them in the dressing room, grinning broadly. "What a shower you lot are! I said one goal – remember? You lot go and score four!"

THE AFTERMATH

Dally Duncan and George Martin were the key men on the day and their careers were never the same afterwards. Martin's management ability, to bring such a recovery from his team, was duly noted by the Newcastle board and when the opportunity arose, he was offered the job at St James Park. He took it, leaving Duncan, then drawing to the end of his marvellous career, to take over the reins at Kenilworth Road.

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

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Television coverage gave Macdonald the credit he deserved

If ever one game can make a player, then Malcolm Macdonald can look back to Hillsborough, Sheffield, on October 10, 1970, as his 'coming of age'.

Despite finishing as leading goalscorer the previous season as the Town fought their way out of Division Three, Macdonald was not particularly well-known outside Luton and the south-east. Although a few more eyebrows were being raised as he found scoring just as easy in the higher league, it took a televised game to make the country sit up and take notice.

Wednesday had just been relegated from Division One and had not started the season particularly well, struggling in the lower half of the table. The Town on the other hand, were unbeaten for a month and were stringing together a run of wins.

The game opened promisingly with the Town starting off full of commitment and it came as no real surprise when Macdonald picked up a through pass from David Court and, with the Wednesday players conveniently forgetting that he was strong on his left foot, rocketed a shot past Peter Grummitt from the edge of the box.

The Town continued to take the game to Wednesday and effectively killed the game off with two goals in a minute shortly before half-time. Firstly Macdonald picked up another through ball from Court and centred to the unmarked Don Givens who was able to pick his spot with ease.

With the referee just about to blow for the interval, Macdonald, again in acres of space on the left, ran onto

another through ball to smash his shot into the roof of the net.

Wednesday came out in the second half to be greeted by a slow handclap, and it was not long before the Town rubbed salt into the wounds by scoring a fourth when John Ryan pushed yet another through-ball into the path of Givens who drew Grummitt before placing a delicate shot into the net.

There was a brief rally by the "Owls" shortly afterwards, culminating in Jackie Sinclair pulling a goal back, but the final say went to Macdonald. With eight minutes to go he latched on to the inevitable through ball, leaving the defence chasing in his wake before his hat-trick goal flew past the mesmerised Grummitt.

With the game being televised the following day, the national newspapers suddenly wanted to know all about Malcolm Macdonald and the Luton team. Overnight the Town were no longer unknown quantities, which made the promotion fight all the more difficult.

The return of Howard Kendall as manager of Everton last season was welcomed by everyone at Goodison Park. The reinstatement of previous manager Colin Harvey as first-team coach has brought together again the winning management team of the mid-eighties which won the Division One title twice, the FA Cup and the European Cup Winners Cup.

The re-building of such a great club started in earnest last season with the club consolidating a mid-table position after looking like relegation candidates this time last year. Recent signs are that Everton are on the way back although their away results leave a lot to be desired, winning just once in six attempts. Make sure you come to Kenilworth Road on November 2 to see the Town bid to stop the Toffees in their tracks and secure us three league points.

Expanding Your Collection

Part 4 of a series by John Litster, Editor of 'Programme Monthly' magazine.

Buying programmes at matches and exchanging them with friends are fine means of starting a programme collection, but will prove to be frustratingly limited for those who seek to expand their collections and complete their chosen sets.

The hobby has several mechanisms to meet more exacting requirements by collectors. One of the most accessible, and longest established, is the club shop. Run either by the commercial department or the supporters club, the souvenir shop often has a programme section managed by an experienced collector who spends countless hours obtaining a wide variety of programmes for his local clientele.

The best of these shops can be a rich

and enduring source of almost every category of football programme.

Programme Fairs are arranged throughout the country on most Sundays and it is a good idea to watch for press advertisements and notices in your club programme which announce these events in your locality.

In many respects, these are an extension of the club shop, enabling collectors to leaf through thousands of programmes brought along by stall holders, thus enabling them to add to their chosen speciality.

If collectors are searching for an elusive issue, or a number of rare or obscure programmes, finding them at a club shop or programme fair is a little bit

"Hit or miss", although the euphoria at obtaining a sought-after programme at a bargain price at an unlikely source is one of the finest feelings in collecting.

Such searching is most usefully conducted through a selection of mail order catalogues issued periodically by programme dealers located throughout the country. These catalogues are listings of thousands of programmes of all categories and prices and the best of them will contain most programmes required by comparatively recent collectors wishing to complete their first sets.
