

Welcome to Leeds United, their supporters, players, directors and management. When Howard Wilkinson took over, he introduced a new line of thinking. They had enough chimney-pots to capitalise on success and they have invested heavily and now they are marching on together and could well win the championship. Today's match will attract extra interest because it is bottom against the top and supporters will be looking to see how great is the divide.

Several years ago, when I first took over as Luton manager, the weather created havoc one cup-tie January weekend with the fixture list. Aldershot, with their excellent playing surface, were one of the survivors and they arranged a friendly against Aberdeen. On that day, I saw two magnificent players, Willie Miller and Gordon Strachan.

Both played that friendly as if it was their last game. Strachan was full of bubble and enthusiasm, brilliant on the ball, quick of mind and showed an excellent touch. It is that dedication and single-mindedness which graces our pitch this afternoon and I will be reminding our many talented young players that he is the role model.

Today's game will also be an important one for Chris Kamara. Howard Wilkinson developed his career after years in the lower

leagues and he has matured like good wine. In transfer negotiations over many months of trying to acquire 'Kammy', Howard has been most considerate and helpful. Our recent stronger form has, not surprisingly, coincided with the development of a stronger spine in the team to support our aspiring youngsters.

The loan signing of Steve Sutton has given me a further option and I am grateful for our relationship with Nottingham Forest. The mixture now is clearly the 'Golden Oldies' and the 'Bright Youngies'. The response of the likes of Des Linton, Richard Harvey, Scott Oakes, Paul Telfer and Mark Pembroke to the experience we have brought in around them has been most encouraging. I will be even more delighted when two of our other youngsters Ceri Hughes and Philip Gray are fit again to challenge for places.

Meanwhile, we face a crucial time with four home games out of the next five. This represents an opportunity to show the pessimists that we are not falling at all the hurdles. I think we have a lot of strong jumping left in our legs. The result at Sheffield United has not dampened our spirits. For the second time this season, we had to defend under pressure and, although it was less refined than at West Ham, we measured up to the task and coped with the bombardment that Dave Bassett's boys caused. In the second period, we came into the game, passed the ball well and were



looking potential winners when Paul Telfer finally scored. To be clawed back again in those last vital minutes was a lesson in the concentration and nerve one needs to cope with First Division standards for 90 minutes. We are due a victory and the emergence of the younger talent has made me feel more relaxed at the long-term future at our club.

The debut of Jamie Campbell at the 11th hour last week at Sheffield merely underlined the fact that we have some strong youth. His was a splendid first league game when Oakes had to withdraw with injury. But my greatest pleasure last week was a superb victory, not widely reported, against Aston Villa in the FA Youth Cup. We are now in the last 16 of this prestigious




Mick Harford leads the way in another attack against Sheffield United last weekend.

competition and the same group of boys last Saturday hammered Tottenham 4-1. That was a sweet victory, coming on top of the reserves win over Spurs, by the same score only 10 days previously. Much of the credit at youth level must go to Terry Westley who has moulded the side that now takes on Norwich on Monday. You will be watching two or three boys who will in two years come and join the first team ranks and that is the pleasure in managing a club like Luton. Youngsters do get a chance and show up sooner rather than later.

This afternoon, we will see if they can cope with the tremendous challenge which Leeds will provide. I have nothing but admiration for the way Howard Wilkinson

has broken the First Division mould. Only Brian Clough in the last six years has been able to do that. Now Liverpool, Arsenal, Tottenham, Everton and Manchester United are looking over their shoulders. I think I have illustrated the task ahead of us well enough. We will need all your support today. Get behind behind the lads. Their endeavours are not in question and they have a tremendous battle between now and the end of the season on their hands. We are determined to survive, and more than grateful for the understanding and support. The kind words, following our last three games, must be translated into points.

Inside view

All ticket matches show safety is the priority

This afternoon we entertain Leeds United in an all-ticket match which, judging from the interest this week, has captured the imagination of the public both in Bedfordshire and Yorkshire. At the time of writing, with Howard Wilkinson's team currently sitting on top of the Barclays League Division One, the demand for tickets has been very encouraging.

Leeds have sold their full allocation for the game, we have sold all the remaining seats and the build-up has only added to the interest in a fixture which I am sure will make all the extra work involved worthwhile. I say this in the knowledge that for many supporters it is frustrating to have to make an extra trip to the ground to collect tickets and, in some cases, come to Kenilworth Road twice for the same match. However, as I have said before in these circumstances, safety must always come first.

In anticipation of a close-to-capacity or capacity crowd, it is always right to make the match all-ticket as it avoids problems with large numbers of disappointed fans and lock-outs. If the attendance is below capacity, of course, we are criticised. This is easy in hindsight – but safety, in which we are guided by our police, must always come first.

In this connection, I must say a special thank you to our local media and their reporters who have done so much to help us get the 'all-ticket' message across. I am particularly grateful to Chiltern Radio for their assistance and cannot leave the subject of today's game without thanking the stewards from Leeds who have travelled down today with the Yorkshire club's fans.

Our last home match, against Manchester City, featured a special visit from representatives of the St John's Ambulance brigade who were collecting in support of the voluntary First Aid service they provide at all the Football League clubs up and down the country. In the end, more than £924 was collected here towards the St John's Ambulance which was a splendid effort from our supporters who contributed towards a very worthwhile cause.

This afternoon, we were due to have one of the Football League's longest-serving referees Les Shapter in charge of this match, but, as you will see from the 'team check' on page 40, he has been replaced by Paul Vanes. The reason for Les's withdrawal is an interesting one – he has been appointed as the Technical Adviser to Referees in Oman and has

already departed to take up his new position on a six-month contract.

Les has become a well-known figure at Kenilworth Road from his many match appearances and we wish him well in a part of the world where he is not entirely unknown as he was involved in 1986 with the Kuwait Cup final. He also officiated in 1987 at the Football League Cup final between Arsenal and Liverpool.

Mention of cup football draws me to the FA Cup and the third round, for which the draw is due to be made tonight. The third round this season will be played on January 4 and we are all looking forward to the outcome of tonight's events to see who our opponents will be on that day.

This season, of course, the FA Cup has already attracted attention by introducing penalties as a means of deciding the outcome of drawn replays.

Rotherham, as many of our fans will know, earned the distinction of becoming the first club to go through on penalties when they beat Scunthorpe 7-6 in a shoot-out after their first round replay was still drawn after extra-time. I can only imagine how disappointed Scunthorpe must have felt after going through three and a half hours of football to lose that way given the traditions of the competition.

Those of you who were at Creasey Park, Dunstable, last Monday night will know already that our young American goalkeeper Jurgen Sommer broke his right arm while playing, ironically, against our own reserves in a Combination fixture.

Jurgen is currently on loan to Brighton and he broke the ulna in his right forearm during the game which resulted in a 2-1 victory for our youngsters. There is never any consolation in these circumstances, but the one crumb of comfort for Jurgen is that he will at least be able to go home to America and spend Christmas with his family while he recovers from the injury.

Tim Alpress, out on loan to Preston North End, has enjoyed better fortune and the manager has decided to extend his loan period to a second month. This will, of course, continue to give him excellent experience both in the league and in cup competitions.

Talking of cups, it was very nice last week to meet up again with Richard Money, who is now the youth team manager for Aston Villa who were beaten by our lads in the FA Youth Cup.

Finally, we were saddened this week to learn of the enforced retirement from the professional game of Frankie Bunn who came through the ranks here before leaving for Hull City. A severe knee injury has ended Frankie's career with Oldham Athletic.


Jamie Campbell made his league debut last Saturday. He is just one of many fine youngsters coming through at the club this season. All credit must go to the backroom staff at

Kenilworth Road for the 'conveyor belt' of talent which can only mean a bright future for the club.



If last season was a settling-in period for Leeds United, then this term landing the First Division title is a distinct possibility for Howard Wilkinson's men.

In 1990-91, the club coped remarkably well with the rigours of First Division life. They reached the semi-finals of both the Rumbelows and the Zenith Data Cups while their F.A. Cup campaign lasted ten hours - although their only scalp was Second Division neighbours Barnsley. A fourth round marathon with eventual champions Arsenal sapped the morale and sparkle which had seen the club climb the table last winter.

Leeds finished in a very creditable fourth position, however, and the events of last term have been learned, making them more experienced to last the distance this time.

The pre-season signings of Chelsea's England full-back Tony Dorigo and Southampton's exciting young winger Rod Wallace have bolstered an already impressive

Leeds squad. The midfield is international class with Gary McAllister, Steve Hodge, Gordon Strachan and David Batty all making valuable contributions to Leeds' success. Add to this the experience of goalkeeper John Lukic and the goalscoring prowess of Lee Chapman, and it can be seen that United have an exciting blend of youthful skill and experience.

This season, Leeds have been vying for the top spot with Manchester United and currently head the table with only one defeat in the league title race. As with United, their ability to pick up valuable points away from home has been a major contributor to their success.

Two weeks ago, the television-viewing public had a chance to witness Leeds' Championship credentials. They took full advantage and moved back to the top of the table with an impressive 4-1 win at title contenders Aston Villa, Lee Chapman (2), Rod Wallace and Mel Sterland scored the goals.

Mr Wilkinson will be one of the first to admit that success is not achieved without a trophy to show for it.

This is true and only time will tell if Leeds

can sustain their challenge and bring the glory days of the 1970's back to Elland Road by winning the First Division championship. But one thing is for sure, Leeds are back in the big time...and with a ground re-development programme planned for a 40,000 capacity, they will soon have a stadium to match.

Formed in 1919 after the disbandment of Leeds City following allegations of illegal payments to players, Leeds United joined the Midland League, playing their first game in November of that year, before being elected into Division Two in the summer of 1920.

Leeds' greatest achievements have been winning the League Championship in 1969 and 1974, lifting the FA Cup in 1972, and the European Fairs Cup (UEFA) in 1968 and 1971.

Howard Wilkinson is the club's 14th post-war manager following such famous footballing names as Don Revie, Jock Stein, Billy Bremner and Allan Clarke.

Last weekend, Leeds retained their position as leaders of the First Division when they overcame Everton 1-0 with an 88th minute goal by Rod Wallace at Elland Road in front of 30,043.

United on Parade

JOHN LUKIC (goalkeeper) - John appeared in all but two of United's 56 games last season, his first back at Leeds after he became the club's first £1 million signing following seven seasons at Arsenal. He won championship and League Cup honours at Highbury, his departure caused by the arrival of David Seaman. He had spent four seasons at Elland Road in his first spell, making his debut in 1979.

MEL STERLAND (defender) - Mel began his career with home-town club Sheffield Wednesday, making his debut in 1979. He made more than 250 League appearances for the Owls before joining Glasgow Rangers for £600,000 in March 1989. His stay at Ibrox was a short one and he returned south to link up again with his former manager Howard Wilkinson. Mel is an England international.

TONY DORIGO (defender) - England international Tony began his career at Villa Park where he won under-21 caps before joining Chelsea in 1987. Two years later, he helped the Stamford Bridge club to win the Second Division championship and the Zenith Data Trophy in 1990. He joined United in a £1 million deal this year.

CHRIS WHYTE (defender) - Signed from West Bromwich Albion at the beginning of last season for a bargain £450,000, Chris started his career at Arsenal in 1981. After four seasons at Highbury, he moved across the Atlantic to play for the Los Angeles Raiders Indoor Soccer side, before returning home to The Hawthorns.

CHRIS FAIRCLOUGH (defender) - Chris learned his trade as an apprentice under Brian Clough at Nottingham Forest and graduated to the first team in 1982. He made more than 100 League appearances for Forest before joining Tottenham in 1987. After two seasons at White Hart Lane he signed for Leeds, initially on loan, for £500,000.

JOHN MCCLELLAND (defender) - John, a Northern Ireland international, is in his third season at Leeds. He has the distinction of having played football in all four home countries - in his native Northern Ireland for Portadown, in Wales with Cardiff and Bangor, in Scotland with Rangers and in England with Mansfield Town and Watford.

DAVID BATTY (midfield) - The only Leeds-born player in the current squad, David joined United as a YTS player and made his debut against Swindon in 1987. Last season David forced his way into the England reckoning, making his full debut against the Soviet Union. He also went on the England summer tour to Australia, New Zealand and Malaysia.

STEVE HODGE (midfield) - Steve was signed from Nottingham Forest for £900,000 last summer. He started his career at the City Ground in 1982 before joining Tottenham in 1986. He returned home in 1988 and played in last season's FA Cup Final. An England international, Steve also has under-21 and B caps.

LEE CHAPMAN (forward) - A prolific scorer for Leeds, Lee made his league debut, not for his first club Stoke, but on loan at Plymouth in 1978. He soon established himself as a regular marksman and Arsenal were persuaded to sign him for £500,000 in 1982. After failing at Highbury, his career was quickly on track again after spells with Sunderland and Sheffield Wednesday. In 1988 he joined Nottingham Forest and won League Cup and Simod Cup honours before joining United for £450,000 in 1990.

GARY MCALLISTER (midfield) - Gary started his career at Motherwell, making his debut in 1981. He joined Leicester City in 1985 in a joint deal which also took Ally Mauchlen to Filbert Street. He joined Leeds in a £1 million deal shortly before the 1990 World Cup Finals and is now an established member of the Scottish side.

GORDON STRACHAN (midfield) - Gordon can now look back on nearly 500 Football League appearances spanning 17 years. He started his career at Dundee before winning domestic and European honours with Aberdeen. In 1984 he signed for Manchester United and established himself as a Scottish international. Many thought his career was drawing to a close when he joined Leeds for £333,000, but his signing sparked Leeds into Division One and last season he was named Football Writers Player of the Year.

GARY SPEED (forward) - Youth product Gary made his Leeds debut in May 1989. The only player to appear in all 56 games last season, he quickly impressed with his attacking wing play. Gary has been a valuable member of Terry Yorath's Welsh squad over the last year in the struggle to reach the European Championship finals in Sweden next summer.

ROD WALLACE (forward) - Rod became United's most expensive signing when he joined the club in a £1.6 million deal in the summer. Like his brothers Danny and Ray, who is also at Leeds, Rod worked his way through the ranks at Southampton, making his debut in 1987. He was a joint signing with Ray, whose valuation was set at £100,000.

CARL SHUTT (forward) - Carl returned from a loan spell with Swedish club Malmö to establish himself as a striking partner to Lee Chapman last autumn. Originally on Sheffield Wednesday's books, he failed to make the grade and played non-league football with Spalding United when he gained a second opportunity with Wednesday. This time he was more successful before joining Bristol City in 1987. Howard Wilkinson signed him for a second time in 1989 and he scored a hat-trick on his Leeds debut.

Meet the Boss



HOWARD WILKINSON


More reknown for his attributes as a manager than a player, Howard Wilkinson is respected as one of the finest coaches in the business. Born in Sheffield in 1943, Mr Wilkinson started his football career as an amateur with his home-town club Sheffield United. In 1963 he made the step-up to professional football, not with United, but with neighbours and rivals Wednesday. He spent one season in the Owls' forward line, but scored only three times in 22 league appearances.

In 1966, he was transferred to Brighton and Hove Albion where his career was more successful. Established as a first team regular, he scored 19 goals in 116 appearances, spanning four years. His career was cut short through injury in 1970 at the age of 27, but football remained his life. After learning the coaching trade at home in Sheffield, he became Wednesday's manager in 1983, following in the footsteps of Jackie Charlton O.B.E.

He led Wednesday from Division Two into the top flight in 1984 and was by now established as one of the game's top tacticians. His high profile in Division One persuaded the Leeds board to lure Howard to Elland Road in the hope that his managerial style could bring the glory days back to Leeds.

The gamble paid off, with Mr Wilkinson succeeding with flying colours. Not only did he lead the club out of the Second Division, but he also turned the Elland Road outfit into one of the strongest in Division One. Leeds are currently flying high at the top, and for Mr Wilkinson, the sky is the limit.

Player profile

Kurt Nogan

A figure in the Luton set-up now for the past two seasons, our Welsh under-21 international Kurt Nogan is hoping that he will finally establish himself as a regular in the First Division this season. Prolific in the Town reserves, Kurt is hoping to continue his goalscoring form in the first team.

"This season is particularly important for me as it is my chance to show that I can perform, with consistency, at the highest level. At Luton, everybody is given a chance, so you just have to take it with both hands. I am lucky enough to be in the first team squad on most occasions, so all I have to do is to continue to work hard in training and hope that I get picked to start the game on a Saturday.

"Many players say that they find it difficult adjusting from playing reserve football one week, then play in the First Division the next. This is not a problem for me as I already have some experience and the motivation necessary to play in the first team. Playing in front of large crowds is just a question of confidence. I made my debut in the cauldron of Anfield. Early touches always help and if you are a striker nothing gives you more confidence than scoring a goal. My first goal of the season in the Rumbelows Cup at Birmingham City gave my whole game a lift."

Kurt, who signed schoolboy forms for Luton after being spotted playing Saturday afternoons as a 16-year-old in Cardiff, is a player from the 'Welsh Connection'. Along with Jason Rees, Ceri Hughes and Mark Pembridge, Kurt has made the grade at Luton and at international level for his country before the age of 20.

"I was honoured to represent Wales at under-21 level. You are not just representing your club, but the whole country. But in reality it was a step back, not a step forward in terms of my football career. Some players who played for the opposition, for example Poland, were very young, therefore they did


not really help me when the next week I could be facing top class defenders in the First Division. The real test is when you play at full level for your country. Hopefully a call-up will come after I have established myself here at Luton. Mark Pembridge proved it can be done, what I must do is follow his example.

With the Town starting to show signs of pulling away from the foot of the table, how does Kurt see the rest of the season going, both on a personal level and for the club as a whole?

"Obviously the club's main aim is to climb the table with a view to competing in the Super League next season, which will be beneficial to everyone at the club. Confidence

is certainly not lacking and although we have a young squad of players, we have shown that we can dominate for long periods of a game. Once the side is settled, I'm sure the supporters will be watching First Division football next season.


"As far as my own form is concerned, all I can do is to work hard and play well enough to earn a first team place. 



The global game

The eyes of the world will turn to New York tomorrow for the qualifying draw for the 1994 World Cup finals to be hosted by the United States. Timothy Collings looks at America's preparations for the biggest sports event in the world....

There are only 951 days to go now before kick-off, probably in the Giants Stadium, New York, at the opening match of the 1994 World Cup finals. But, judging from the Americans' preparations for the finals, it might just as well be 951 weeks, months or years according to their critics who have been astonished at the lethargy shown towards making all the planning and arrangements for hosting the greatest sports show on earth.

Even the International Federation of Football Associations (FIFA) has been moved to take action and prod the U.S. organisers into explaining what they are doing. As a result, a one-time list of 26 potential venues for the 16-team finals has been cut to 19, many of which pose serious problems for football. FIFA, after all, demands that the game be played on grass (though it can still be expected that the Americans' may continue to press for one 'experimental' effort on plastic) and preferably outdoors.

FIFA has also demanded that the tournament includes games in the 'Big Apple' as the vast mixed-race population of New York is sure to give the World Cup huge support and an authentic football feel. The only problem for the United States is that New York's most famous stadium, the Giants Stadium, is not wide enough to accommodate a football pitch.

This has led to much anguish and bickering among the Americans who have already endured one political upheaval which saw Alan Rothenberg replace Werner Fricker as president 15 months ago. So far, nothing has been resolved, although it may be that new plans for the venues and New York in particular will be revealed tomorrow at what is certain to be a well-organised razzamatazz draw, complete with major entertainment and Walt Disney-style marketing, in Madison Square Garden.

The biggest problem in New York is the Giants' Stadium. It will hold 70,000 spectators, but the pitch needs to be rebuilt and widened and the best scheme so far created by the Americans to remedy the situation has been to rebuild the pitch on a sheet of purpose-built scaffolding and raise it three feet off the ground. This would cost more than three million American dollars, however, and also lose

spaces for 5,000 or more spectators.

For Rothenberg and his colleagues, it is a thorny problem. The alternative site in New York, or near to New York, is the Yale Bowl at New Haven, in Connecticut, which is another vast arena, with sufficient surface pitch area for a football pitch, but badly out of condition. Yale, of course, is the home of the famous Yale University and would make a prestigious site for the finals, but it is also a lengthy distance from New York city and would certainly pose problems for traffic and logistics if used for popular matches during the finals. Not only that, but the organisers would have to find some way of raising another large multi-million dollar budget there to have the stadium completely refurbished and brought up to standard.

As if these local east coast difficulties were not enough, the California-based organisers are grappling also with the problems of sifting through the potential host cities to find a formula for keeping the finals as compact and manageable as possible and to ensure that all the players involved will have enough rest in between fixtures. This is not so easy as it sounds since it is possible that Seattle, in the north-west not far from the Canadian border, and Miami, in Florida, are both among the applicants and are 3,500 miles apart. Indeed, they are the most widely-separated potential host cities in the history of the World Cup finals. And we thought the Italians were slow and disorganised in preparing for Italia '90....

One city which seems to have got it all right first time is Dallas where the local airline just happens to be American Airlines. They have recently clinched a deal to sponsor the Dallas Cup and have also agreed a sponsorship with England for the finals. By doing so, American Airlines have become the first, and at the time of writing only, confirmed sponsor for the World Cup finals. "That really bothers me most," said Rothenberg. "We've been waiting months to get this sorted out and we are looking for marketing partners. But I have to admit we have been slower starting on all this than we should have been."

Maybe the Americans should be taking a leaf out of the Japanese book and planning even further ahead. The Japanese, structuring their game in

readiness for the 2002 finals (eight years beyond the American finals) have already signed Gary Lineker to play for Nagoya's Grampus Eight in the J-League which is to be launched in 1993. This shows something of their determination, their long-term planning and their attention to detail. So too does the fact that they have enrolled Franz Beckenbauer to 'front' their marketing operation. The great 'Kaiser' was in Japan only two months ago to launch their bid for 2002 with great success. Ironically, of course, it was Beckenbauer who the Americans tried hard to woo as the front man for their own World Cup marketing operation.....

Africans on the way

The next World Cup finals will feature not two, but three, African nations as a mark of the continent's rapid progress on the world stage in recent years. Who can forget how successful Cameroon were in Italy in 1990, Morocco in Mexico in 1986 and Algeria in Spain in 1982?

In January, Senegal hosts the African Nations Cup finals. This is Africa's equivalent to the European Championship finals which take place in Sweden next June and is certain to produce some thrilling football. The tournament is based in two cities, Dakar and Ziguinchor, and involves eight nations. These are Senegal, Nigeria, Kenya, Cameroon, Morocco, Zaire, Algeria, Ivory Coast, Congo, Egypt, Zambia and Ghana. Nigeria, winners in 1980 and always ranked among the major African nations, will be among the favourites and also provide a link with Luton Town through former star forward Emeka Nwajiobi, who won caps for his country while playing for the Hatters in the mid-1980's.





Blistering start sets up a thrilling and memorable win

After two successive seasons in which relegation had stared the Town in the face, the 1951-52 campaign came as a breath of fresh air with promotion a distinct possibility at one time and a trip to the FA Cup quarter-finals, for only the second time in the club's history, an added bonus.

The Town team had a much more settled look about it and the defence, in particular, looked far stronger with full backs Billy Cooke and Bud Aherne complementing the virtually ever present half-back line of Bob Morton, Syd Owen and Charlie Watkins.

Up front, new signing Bert Mitchell was a revelation, hammering in goals with gay abandon from the wing as well as providing an excellent service for the dangerous Jack Taylor and a young Gordon Turner.

Six goals were scored against Notts County and West Ham and five against future-champions Sheffield Wednesday, but it was in the FA Cup that the name of Luton Town came to the forefront for the first time since the heyday of Joe Payne before the war.

In the third round, First Division Charlton Athletic were seen off comfortably, then it was Brentford's turn, after three games, in round four followed by Swindon Town in round five. Arsenal were the opponents in the quarter-finals and a then-record crowd of 28,443 filed into Kenilworth Road to see the Hatters lose unluckily 2-3 with only nine men after Owen and Roy Davies were injured.

The clamour of the cup having died down, it was now back to the league and, whereas at Christmas the Town were in a strong challenging position, four successive defeats meant that the long-awaited home clash with Leeds was now regarded as little more than an afterthought especially after a 4-0 defeat the previous week at Sheffield Wednesday.

The fixture was still important for Leeds, however, as a defeat at Kenilworth Road could virtually end all their hopes for the season.

Late-comers to the match missed the most thrilling start to any game that season as the Town took a two-goal lead in four minutes and suggested there could be a runaway victory. Bernard Moore scored the first with the game only a minute old after he had intercepted a bad back pass and followed it up soon after with a close-range shot from an accurate centre by Wally Shanks

From then on, it was one-way traffic with Moore leading John Charles a merry dance and it was a mixture of bad luck with finishing and desperate defending by Leeds that prevented a rout.

Dave Sexton, newly-installed in the team, formed a good partnership with winger Bert Mitchell and with the defence, ably led by Syd Owen, utterly in control, it came as a surprise when Leeds pulled a goal back through Ray Iggleton with three minutes to go to bring about a completely unrealistic scoreline.

The final whistle went leaving both the Town and Leeds to play out the remainder of the season, but in Luton's case the corner had been turned and what was the most successful campaign since the war would be progressively bettered before eventual promotion three years later.

The first time we met Leeds United in a Football League game was on Boxing Day, 1947, when we went to Elland Road and came away with both points following a 2-0 win. A crowd of 28,500 saw Joe O'Brien and Hugh Billington score the all-important goals.

The return, the following day, saw a goal riot with the Town running out 6-1 winners before a Kenilworth Road crowd of 16,963. The scorers were O'Brien, Frank Soo, Ted Duggan, Sid Ottewell and Bobby Brennan with two.

It happened five years ago

6-12-86.....After losing 4-2 at Oxford, the Town were pushed back into seventh position in the First Division. Mark Stein and Brian Stein were the Luton scorers.

It happened 10 years ago

5-12-81.....After being 2-1 down at half-time at Shrewsbury, the Town fought back to level the scores. Alan Judge made his first Second Division appearance of the season in the Luton goal.

It happened 15 years ago

4-12-76.....An extremely tedious 0-0 home draw with Blackpool was watched by a bored crowd of 9,163 who expected more from a Second Division fixture.

It happened 20 years ago

4-12-71.....Another 0-0 draw, this time at Bristol City. The game marked the final appearance of Viv Busby prior to his brief loan spell at Newcastle United where he partnered Malcolm Macdonald.

You can usually bank on one of the First Division's smaller clubs to upset the elite few and emerge as a surprise package in the Championship race...a job which Coventry City were doing remarkably well this season until a quite dramatic slump in form last month.

Tipped as relegation candidates, the Sky Blues looked anything but Division Two material as they nestled in with Manchester United and Leeds. One result in particular created quite a stir...

Zimbabwe-born discovery Peter Ndvolu made a sensational start to his English career, scoring the winner on his debut at Highbury which gave Coventry a 2-1 victory over League Champions Arsenal and pushed them into third place in the table.

Unfortunately the run ended all too quickly for the Coventry team. Five defeats in six matches put the Sky Blues back into their customary position, the only consolation being a Rumbelows Cup third round success, again at Arsenal's expense - Kevin Gallacher scoring the only goal of the game.

That piece of opportunism from the Scottish international and a penalty from Micky Gynn in the 2-1 defeat at home to Crystal Palace have been the only four goals that Coventry have been able to muster during the last eight weeks.

Manager Terry Butcher took steps to halt the slide by sacking his assistant and long time England colleague Mick Mills. Almost immediately he appointed the experienced former England coach Don Howe as Chief Coach in the hope that he

can repeat the glories which he achieved at Arsenal, Wimbledon and Q.P.R.

Like The Town, this season is very much a transitional period for the Sky Blues. Gone are the older, more experienced heads of Cyrille Regis, Brian Kilcline, our own Trevor Peake, and David Speedie. In their place have come Ray Woods and Peter Atherton from Wigan, Paul Furlong from Enfield, Ndvolu from Zimbabwe and the most experienced being Robert Rosario, a £600,000 buy from Norwich.

It will be interesting to see how Coventry go over a nine-month season and whether the less experienced players can last the pace. Some of the answer may be given when they come to Kenilworth Road on December 19 to take on a Hatters team keen to grab the points and start on a good Christmas programme.
