This afternoon we see the final game at Kenilworth Road in 1991. It has been a traumatic year and we must all hope that 1992 brings the required changes in our fortunes, our organisation and our results. It is not easy as we are in a nasty financial situation and it is the role of the board to make sure that we can be supportive of a top club. The problems are clear to us but with clever management we can cope with the difficulties they present. After all, we have handled it through various means now for more than 10 years. The problems we have now are no different from those problems that Harry Haslam made me aware of when he invited me to join him at Luton Town so many years ago.

Today it is our pleasure to welcome Chelsea, one of the most charismatic clubs in the First Division. They have quality in all positions and one of the finest midfield players in the country. They are particularly well off in some areas and have at this moment four international quality centre-backs competing for two positions: David Lee, Erland Johnsen, Kenneth Monkou and "our own" Paul Elliott.

Some years ago, I helped Paul on his way when I signed him and a short-haired bright spark from Charlton, Paul Walsh. If my memory serves me correctly, we bought the

pair of them for about £400,000 and then did a Luton by moving them on later for considerably more. It is to their credit that they have retained their positions as players at the highest level despite all the ups and downs of a professional career.

I enjoyed meeting the supporters for the first time in the Joe Payne lounge on Thursday, December 12. I felt that the majority of our hard-core loyal supporters had a good understanding of the peculiarities and problems of Luton Town Football Club. However, like me, our supporters have ambitions for the club and do not want to see our credibility damaged in any way. I am determined our credibility as a top club will get better and I believe it will. Everyone must play their part in working to retain and improve on this.

The reserves have now completed their early-season spell of life at Dunstable. It was not the easiest surface to play on and the players have done well to cope. I would like to express my own appreciation and thanks to the Dunstable chairman and board who stepped in to help us in July and gave our own pitch the time it has needed to bed itself down.

After the recent wet night when we played Norwich City in the FA Youth Cup, it would seem the pitch has won our approval in its first year. It will be interesting to see if it stands up to its use in the New Year.

The other day, I brought a young relative to watch a game with me. He had not seen very much football before. Whilst he was impressed with the colour, the excitement and the movement of the game, he was puzzled afterwards. My nephew asked me why the crowd had booed a certain player and I said it was because the spectators had paid to see the game and had the right to do what they wanted. But, he said, the player was on our side? Would it not be better if the fans

cheered him? I replied that, yes, it would be, but the supporters had paid for the right to cheer or jeer and could do as they pleased....

I hope it will not be necessary to hear any jeering in 1992. You supporters have been the backbone of the club during the difficulties of 1991. I am determined to provide you with the highest quality of football and if it should happen that we are unable to retain our status, we shall make sure we have a strong side and bounce back quickly with quality players. That may give a hint of pessimism with half a season to go, but it is not that at all. It is only a look at the very worst scenario. The custodians of our club must do everything to avoid that situation.

In reality, we know there is a long way to go and we shall be doing all we can with a positive frame of mind to produce the results we need. We want everyone, from the smiling tea-lady, to the board of directors, who will have to do their utmost with great enthusiasm, to help pull us out of our present predicament.

Enjoy the game. Let us hope it is as entertaining as so many of our previous meetings with Chelsea. Happy New Year to all.

The result was a 1-1 draw, Paddy McDonagh cracking our equaliser with six minutes of play remaining. The replay will be held at Norwich City's Carrow Road stadium on Wednesday, January 8, 1992. McDonough back in action

□ After three months with a knee injury, Darron McDonough returned to active duty on Monday, December 16, when he played 70 minutes for the reserves in their Neville Ovenden Football Combination clash with Fulham. The Londoners, fielding their full Third Division side, won the game 2-0. Graham Rodger, who was also hoping to return to action, was not selected. Both Ceri Hughes and Phil Gray, who have been on the injury list for several weeks, are not expected to be considered for a return until mid-January at the earliest.

Video made to help safety



Value of the Bobbers contribution is not forgotten

A warm welcome this afternoon to Chelsea for our final home match of 1991. May I take this opportunity to wish all supporters a very happy and healthy New Year.

This will be the first official opportunity our visitors and friends from Chelsea have had to come and see a game at Kenilworth Road for five since the introduction of our Home Only Membership Scheme. In that time public behaviour at football has improved a great deal and we are very glad to have our visitors back with us.

Our local community may have been nervous initially at the reintroduction of visitors to Kenilworth Road on match days, but I think the excellent behaviours of all supporters this season has proved we were right. It was a decision taken only after much thought and deliberation and I am glad to report that we have had no problems.

The introduction of the Membership Scheme in its original form was a big move for the club at the time and it is clear that we were right to make the necessary adjustments for the return of visiting supporters, particularly, as I have said before, when you consider that the

unlimited ban on British clubs' participation in European competitions has already been lifted.

The return of visitors, however, has not been without its own difficulties and in particular for our Bobbers Club members. Since their club is housed in the Oak Road end of the ground it has been impossible to permit it to be open on match days when that end of the stadium is reserved exclusively for the use of visiting fans.

We are obviously well aware of the problems this causes particularly as the Bobbers Club is a vitally important part of our club, but the use of the club on match days was something not approved by the safety committee.

The club knew that there were going to be difficulties with the return of visiting supporters, but it was felt that we did not want to be left out of step with the rest of football or to risk damaging any of our valuable relationships with our colleagues and friends throughout the football world.

It has, as we are aware, prevented the Bobbers Club from making full use on match days of the facilities they normally have open



for seven days a week. But it is felt to have been necessary – and I am, of course, well aware of the marvellous contribution made to the club by the Bobbers over the years.

Formed by a group of supporters in 1933, the Bobbers Club has made probably the single most consistent contribution to the club in the years since. They began under the direction of Philip Wright and have since poured their efforts and money into the club.

To begin with a project was started to build a new, covered stand opposite what was then known as the grandstand and, as a result, the old Bobbers Stand was created with the Bobbers Club underneath it. After this, they turned their attention to the Oak Road end of the ground and began their plans to cover it over behind the goal.

All together, their ambitious schemes were to cost more than £28,000, including the provision of a dozen tea-bars all around different points of the ground. In today's currency this would certainly translate as something in the region of £600,000 which is a very substantial and impressive sum by anyone's reckoning.

How was this done? Well, it was done with a great deal of will and affection for the club. Many people helped to move handfulls of soil themselves in the construction process and all this effort was continuing as late as 1951 when it was still possible to join the Bobbers on an annual basis by sending in a postal order for 1/2d or by taking a life membership for 21 shillings, more commonly known as a guinea.

It was a very happy era and clearly shone through as that with the philosophy of the club being 'the more members we have, the better we work.' Now, with 1992 fast approaching, we are pleased to be associated with all the past works of the Bobbers members', many of who are no longer with us, as we plan ahead for a new era.

We have to plan for 1992 and 1993 in relation to the Membership Scheme and give serious thought, finances permitting, to the relocation of the Bobbers Club from the Oak Road end to a new home, always bearing in mind that there is a probability that we shall be relocating to a new stadium in the future.

That said, the Bobbers Club and their contribution cannot be forgotten now that we have completed the experiment with our Membership Scheme which achieved its objectives.

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



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

Welcome to Chelsea

Chelsea came into the new season aiming to live up to the expectations placed upon them as potential First Division Champions.

The influential signing of Vinny Jones, a £525,000 signing from Sheffield United, along with Paul Elliott from Celtic, Tom Boyd from Motherwell and Joe Allon from Hartlepool United, were seen to be the missing parts to the jigsaw which came into place the season before. With million pound signings Andy Townsend and Dennis Wise now firmly settled in at Stamford Bridge, this season, under new Boss Ian Porterfield, was seen to be the springboard from which to launch a serious Championship challenge.

Early season form seemed to justify these claims. The Blues were flying high in third spot in September, after an impressive 3-1 win at Tottenham, a 4-1 victory over the Town and another away success, this time at Sheffield United. To add to this the aforementioned players were all performing well with Allon, Wise and Townsend all scoring goals along with top-scorer Kerry Dixon.

As the Blues went into October and November however, it was clear that the 'Champions' tag was far from becoming realised. Defeats against Arsenal (3-2), Leeds (1-0), Norwich (3-0), Southampton (1-0)

and draws against Everton (2-2), Liverpool (2-2) and Crystal Palace (0-0), have meant that, at the time of writing, Chelsea have only won two League games since the end of September.

One reason for the drop in form over the past couple of months has been the injury to influential skipper Andy Townsend. A hernia operation has meant that the heart of Chelsea's midfield has been left exposed until very recently. With a fit Townsend in the team, the Chelsea faithful will be looking for an improved performance from the team in 1992.

Another is the lack of goals from the usually prolific Kerry Dixon. Now with a new striking partner in Clive Allen, a £250,000 signing from Manchester City, Kerry will be looking to cement a good relationship with Allen and break the all-time Chelsea scoring record.

The positive side to Chelsea's season has been the continued introduction of youth team players into the first team. There are not many clubs in the First Division who can boast the young talents of the likes of Jason Cundy, Andy Myers, Frank Sinclair and Damien Matthew. When called upon, all have performed well, with Myers scoring on his full First Division debut and causing opponents Liverpool many problems.

Renowned for their success in the Zenith Data Cup, Chelsea have their sights set on

reaching Wembley at least once this season. They have reached the Southern Area final after beating Crystal Palace 1-0 earlier this month.

Only time will tell whether Mr Porterfield can succeed in his aim of winning matches with good attractive football, but with such a fine blend of skilful experience and raw, young talent, many football pundits believe that success is a distinct possibility for the Blues over the next couple of seasons.

Chelsea F.C. were formed in 1905 by local entrepreneur Gus Mears. He set up his own team after Fulham rejected the chance to play at the newly developed Stamford Bridge. Although they had no players during their first months of existence, they had a very determined board of directors. After making some impressive signings, the new club played their first match v Hull City in Division Two, in September 1905.

Chelsea's colourful history has seen them lift the First Division title only once, in 1954/55. They also won the FA Cup in 1970, the League Cup in 1965, the European Cup Winners' Cup in 1971 and the Full Members/ZDS Cup in 1986 and 1990.

Manager Ian Porterfield is the club's 13th post-war boss following such men as Ted Drake, who won the Blues the Championship, Tommy Docherty and John Hollins.

Blues On Parade

KEVIN HITCHCOCK (goalkeeper) - Kevin started his career playing non-league for Barking, but made the grade in league football for Mansfield Town after a short spell at Nottingham Forest. He joined Chelsea for £250,000 in March 1988 and has been made first-choice keeper this season, taking over from Dave Beasant.

STEVE CLARKE (defender) - Now approaching 200 senior appearances for Chelsea, Steve was signed from St Mirren in 1987 for £422,000. Established as one of the game's more solid right-backs, he has represented his country, Scotland, on five occasions to date. Steve also had the honour of representing the Football League v Rest of the World in 1987.

DAVID LEE (defender) - David is a product of Chelsea's successful youth policy, making his League debut for the Blues, and scoring, v Leicester City in 1988. An England under-21 international, David is now looking to establish himself in a more permanent role at the heart of Chelsea's defence.

PAUL ELLIOTT (defender) - Paul started his career at Charlton Athletic before establishing himself as a very competent central-defender here at Kenilworth Road. Now a greatly experienced player after spells with Aston Villa, in Italy with Pisa and at Glasgow Celtic, Paul is pushing for a place in the England's European Championship squad for Sweden next summer.

KEN MONKOU (defender) - Dutch under-21 international, Ken was signed from Feyenoord for £100,000 in March 1989. He played a major part in the run-in to Chelsea's Division Two Championship win in 1989 and was last season voted Player of the Year. Like Paul Elliott, Ken will be pushing for an international place this term.

JASON CUNDY (defender) - An uncompromising centre-half, Jason is a former captain of Chelsea's youth team and was made Young Player of the Year in 1987. An England under-21 regular, he made his Chelsea debut last season and had the honour of becoming the 500th player to play for the club.

TOM BOYD (defender) - Signed from Motherwell for £800,000 last summer, Tom captained the Scottish club to FA Cup glory last season. A Scotland international, he was signed to replace Tony Dorigo at left-back after his decision to join Leeds United.

VINNY JONES (midfield) - Charismatic Vinny won FA Cup honours with Wimbledon before joining Leeds United for £450,000 in 1988. He then led Leeds to the Second Division title that season, before becoming surplus to requirements, and joined Sheffield United. He was the main inspiration behind United's relegation escape last season before joining Chelsea for £575,000 in August.

GRAEME LE SAUX (midfield) - Channel Islander Graham made his big breakthrough last season at Stamford Bridge and quickly earned England under-21, then 'B' honours. Signed from St Paul's in Jersey in December 1987, Graeme has established himself as one of the pacesetters in Division One.

ALAN DICKENS (midfield) - Alan started his career at West Ham United and made over 200 appearances for the Hammers before joining Chelsea for £600,000 in July 1989. An England under-21 international, Alan has found it difficult sustaining a regular first-team place at Stamford Bridge, although he has been a more regular member of the side over recent weeks.


DENNIS WISE (midfield) - A favourite with the Chelsea crowd, Dennis was signed from Wimbledon for a club record £1,600,000 in July 1990. Locally born in Kensington, Dennis scored five of his ten goals from the penalty spot last season and his form earned him a call-up to the England squad to face Turkey last season and scored the only goal of the game.

CLIVE ALLEN (forward) - Signed from Manchester City at the beginning of the month in a £250,000 deal, Clive started his career at Q.P.R. before joining Arsenal for £1.25 million in 1989. Incredibly he moved on to Crystal Palace for a similar fee only two months later. In 1981 he returned to Loftus Road before joining Tottenham in 1984. He smashed Spurs' scoring record before joining Bordeaux for £1 million two years later. He joined City two years ago, again in a £1 million deal.

10 year record



JOE ALLON (forward) - After starting his career at Newcastle United, Joe was limited to nine appearances in three seasons. He then moved to Swansea where he scored 11 goals in 33 games. His reputation as a prolific goalscorer really took off at Hartlepool, where he scored 35 times last season, helping the 'pool to promotion into Division Three. He joined Chelsea for £200,000 in August.

KERRY DIXON (forward) - Kerry has been with Chelsea since signing from Reading for £175,000 in 1983. Luton born, he scored two goals on his Chelsea debut and has since gone on to make over 300 appearances for the Blues, clocking-up nearly 200 goals. At the start of the season he was only 13 goals short of Bobby Tambling's all-time Chelsea goalscoring record.

KEVIN WILSON (forward) - Kevin passed the 150 appearance mark last season and continued his consistent goalscoring form. He started his career at Derby County where he won the first of his 25 Northern Ireland caps. After a spell at Ipswich, he joined Chelsea for £335,000 in 1987 and helped the Blues to the Second Division title.

Meet the Boss



IAN PORTERFIELD

Born in Dunfermline in 1946, Mr Porterfield started his career as an apprentice at Raith Rovers. In 1967 he signed for north-east giants Sunderland and it was while he was at Roker Park that he established himself as a gritty, hard-working midfielder.

During his eight-year period at Sunderland, he made 217 appearances and scored 17 goals, the most famous being the strike which won Second Division Sunderland the FA Cup final against giants Leeds in 1973. In 1976 he had an unsuccessful spell at Reading, where he played just five times.

A year later his career was rejuvenated at Third Division Sheffield Wednesday, where he enjoyed two full seasons. In 1981 Mr Porterfield decided to hang up his boots after a couple of months at Rotherham United, aged 35.

Having climbed the managerial ladder, first with Reading and in Scotland with Aberdeen, Mr Porterfield has returned to Chelsea after an absence of 17 months. In his first spell at Stamford Bridge he helped manager Bobby Campbell win the Second Division Championship before returning for a second spell at Reading.

After his appointment during the summer, Ian made his targets very clear, "My aim is to win matches. Number two is to win by playing good, attractive football - but it is very important that we win." Only time will tell if Mr Porterfield can fulfill those sentiments.





Player profile

Paul Telfer

The nephew of former Scottish international midfielder Eamonn Bannon, 20-year-old Paul Telfer has broken through to the first team this season with such effect that he is promising to follow in his uncle's footsteps. Like Eamonn, Paul is a midfielder, although he prefers to play on the right side unlike his uncle who was better-known for his work on the left.

Born in Edinburgh, on October 21, 1971, Paul came to Kenilworth Road as a trialist after being spotted playing in his native Scotland. He quickly showed his talent and was signed by the club on his 17th birthday and has since worked his way up through the ranks.

"I prefer to play in midfield and to play on the right or in the centre," said Paul. "But I am happy to play anywhere if I can get into the team - even at left-back. Really, I like to get forward a bit if I can. But the truth is that the first team is the place to be and the best place to play your football."

In Edinburgh, Paul made his name playing with Salvesen Boys Club, the same source from which the club obtained the equally-promising Darren Salton. Together they have helped create a strong 'junior' branch of the 'white heather' club at Luton.

Paul's progress this season has been nothing short of startling and he admitted that he has surprised himself with the speed at which he has worked his way into the first team, but acknowledges that other people's bad luck with injuries has played a part.

He made his full league debut in the away match with Manchester United at Old Trafford at the end of September and has not been out of the team since, wearing three different shirts as he has become accustomed to the pace required at the top level.

"I was nervous for the first couple of

minutes," said Paul. "But once the game got going, I really settled down okay. I was surprised to be in the team. But I was lucky because I came in and players like Darron McDonough and Ceri Hughes were out injured."

"At first, I felt it was a big difference, but now I feel stronger altogether and I am enjoying it more and more. I feel I am getting better and better. It is great to play in the First Division."

Paul has not yet won any international honours, but hopes those may be lying ahead in the future. His most pleasurable game so far was the 1-1 draw at Sheffield

United when he scored his first league goal.

"I remember David Preece slid on his back to recover the ball and pull it back into the middle. It broke for a shot by Jamie Campbell which was saved and it fell to me and I was able to score with a shot into the corner. It made up for missing one earlier on in the game!"

Away from the game, Paul, like most Scots, likes nothing better than a round of golf, but admits he has been frustrated by the weather recently. "I've got a handicap of about four or five, it fluctuates a bit. But I enjoy playing two or three times a week, if I have the time and the chance."

The Premier League debate

Mention of the Football Association's Premier League often stirs up feelings and sometimes controversy. In this feature, our managing director David Kohler gives some of his own thoughts on the project and reveals what can go on at major meetings to decide the future of our national game.....

The Premier League, or 'super league' as it has been dubbed, has been born out of the ambition of clubs to make progress in the 1990's and it is a reaction by the leading clubs to several main points.

Basically, it is an effort by these leading clubs to increase their own revenue through television, sponsorship and advertising and express their dissatisfaction with the current leadership and structure of the Football League.

To date, there has been much sabre-rattling by various associations attached to the game and this sabre-rattling has come about because, as yet, the premier clubs have not decided what is, in their opinion, the correct way forward.

Over recent weeks, the press has been full of comments from the Gordon Taylors and Howard Wilkinsons, all stating that they have to be consulted with respect to the super league. As yet, they have not.

The truth is that while the leading Premier League clubs and the Football Association have been discussing this plan for months, at the time you read this, only four decisions have been taken and acted upon:

- ☐ 1. All the Division One clubs have resigned from the Football League
- ☐ 2. The super league will use promotion and relegation on a three-up and three-down basis with the remaining league clubs
- ☐ 3. The size of the super league will start at 22 and will later be reduced to 20 when the financial picture is a little clearer

- ☐ 4. The league will be run on a one club one vote basis.

In addition, there have been two appointments: Rick Parry as the chief executive and Sir John Quinton as chairman.

Looking at the Premier League from Luton Town's point of view, we initially resigned from the Football League along with the other clubs on the original proposals for one club one vote and 22 clubs in the Premier League.

The decision was taken only after a lot of thought and with a feeling from the directors that if Luton Town did not go along with the other clubs then we were in danger of being left behind. However, I do feel we have been slightly misled by some of the clubs because as you will have read in the press, we have all agreed to reduce the size of the league from 22 to 20.

During the meeting at which this was decided, I spoke strongly against a 20-team Premier League as in my opinion it could restrict our opportunities of being a part of it.

Before the meeting I spoke to many club chairmen who all held similar views. However at the meeting there were only four clubs who were against the proposal. For the record, they were ourselves, Wimbledon, West Ham United and....Arsenal.

Arsenal is the one which I am sure will raise some eyebrows. But, please do not be mistaken. Arsenal did not vote against the motion because they wanted to retain a 22-club league. No, they voted against it because their alternative motion to propose an 18-club league had been rejected!

TAYLOR RELIEVED

England boss Graham Taylor is one man keen to see the proposed Premier League trimmed to 20 clubs as soon as humanly possible. He wants to see his players relieved of the strain of long tough seasons filled with competitive club matches.

And for that reason he was mighty relieved when England were drawn in a six-nation and not a seven-nation qualifying group at the World Cup draw in New York on December 8. England came out in European group two along with the Netherlands, Poland, Norway, Turkey and San Marino.

That still means 10 important England World Cup qualifying games have to be fitted into the domestic calendar during 1992 and 1993, squashed in among a likely 42 league games and, for the most successful clubs, at least half-a-dozen cup-ties or more – not to mention European club fixtures.

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

The Last Time We Met...

Changing fashions bring a new-look to our programme in the post-war years

In complete contrast to the sumptuous issues of the immediate pre-War period, the Luton Town programme took a turn for the worse as peacetime football resumed in 1946.

With paper shortage still a problem, the first issue of 1946/47 against Sheffield Wednesday was a skimpy affair of only eight pages, compared to the only League programme issued in 1939/40 against the same side (the same fixture list was used), which consisted of 16 pages of solid reading matter.

The same cover was retained, minus the coloured edging, with only a page of "Club News" to lighten the gloom. During that first season back, single sheets were known to be issued for first team games and one fixture (Nottingham Forest) did not see anything produced due to the game being played at short notice.

Apart from slight changes to the "Flaghead" on the front of the programme, the format did not change for six years until, at the start of the 1952/53 season, a full length photograph of a player was featured on the front cover. Unfortunately, the inside pages did not alter apart from the Club Notes, which became notably wordier and rather more interesting.

This design continued for three seasons and then, when we were expecting something better following the club's promotion to Division One in 1955, back we went again to a staid front cover featuring a drawing of the turnstiles and gates at the rear of the Kenilworth Road terrace.

Clubs were now beginning to produce readable, colourful programmes with some using photographs of match action to liven-up their issues, but we retained our tired format until the end of the 1960/61 season, although whoever wrote Club Notes continued to do a good job and has provided me with many an extract for this column in the past.

For the visit of Preston on August 19, 1961, a new style programme was on sale. "We hope the new style Official Programme meets with general approval", it was stated in the Club Notes. "We have been thinking for some little time to print one such as this but the cost of doing so has rather dampened the thought. However, as the great majority of clubs now have a 4d programme, we decided to fall into line and so have the bigger and more informative publication."

So what did we get for 4d? Much the same in a smaller format, but increased to twelve pages! The only additions were a "Pen Portrait of our visitors" page plus an acrostic results section for the whole of Division Two plus Luton Town appearances and goalscorers for the season. This being the first game of the campaign, the latter two features were, of course, row after row of dots!

This style of programme followed the Town through the Divisions, to the basement and by

1967/68 it was such an embarrassment that whereas most clubs included "Football League review" magazine as an insert, we did it the other way round with the programme stapled inside, hidden from view.

The 1968/69 programme saw a slight improvement with a couple more pages and a supporters club column, but the birth of the modern programme that we know and love came about on July 28, 1969 for the visit of an Italian under-21 side for a friendly.

Glossy, packed with varied reading and containing many photographs, the programme transformed from one of the worst in the Football League, to one of the best overnight, setting the trend for Luton Town issues in the season to come.

The following season was similar, but in 1971/72 for one season, only a "long" programme was issued. Not without its merits, the shape was, however, awkward and, for collectors, difficult to keep in mint condition.

Arguably the best programme of the 1970's was produced in 1972/73 which featured a series of articles on past players, which has been plagiarised since, both in the "Luton Town Story" and in this column. That issue featured a near perfect blend of features and photographs together with a striking front cover rarely bettered since, especially when compared to our promotion season programme of 1973/74 which had to put up with changes of printer, four page issues and single sheets as a legacy of the three day week.

1974/75 saw an attractive, albeit lightweight, issue followed by a smaller version which became progressively full of adverts as the season wore on and the club's financial plight became more obvious. 1975/76 therefore saw what was the poorest issue in recent times.


The following season was not without its problems, for a change of printer, as the campaign began, necessitated three emergency issues before the first colour cover appeared for the visit of Hereford United on October 9, 1976. This was an odd shaped programme (7.5" x 7.5") which was to see us through the next three seasons, attracting such features as "All our Yesterdays" by Brian Swain, along the way.

Change of format again in 1979/80 with a conventional size programme being introduced (similar to today's), which improved gradually during its six seasons of issue. Historical articles were becoming more commonplace with "Down Memory Lane" in 1979/80, "Flashback" in 1981/82 and the excellent "Hatters A-Z" the following season.

Since 1985, the programme has been edited by Tim Collings, firstly in "pocket size" format and latterly in the large style you hold in your hands. Is it the best yet? What do you think?

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Did you know?

Our first League meetings against Chelsea were in the 1955/56 season. Both games ended in draws, 2-2 at Kenilworth Road and 0-0 at Stamford Bridge.

It happened five years ago

28/12/86 - The first appearance of the season of Mick Harford inspired the Town to a 2-2 draw at Nottingham Forest. Brian Stein and Mike Newell were on target before a crowd of 20,273.

It happened ten years ago

28/12/81 - In a devastating opening period, the Town went 3-0 up at Norwich with every one of the goals absolute screamers. Luton went on to win 3-1 to consolidate their position as leaders of Division Two.

It happened 15 years ago

29/12/76 - On a rock-hard Kenilworth Road pitch, the Town skated to an easy victory over today's visitors Chelsea. Lil Fuccillo, Brian Chambers, Jim Husband and Steve Buckley were the Luton scorers, watched by a crowd of 17,102.

It happened 20 years ago

1/1/72 - High flying Millwall were seen off 2-1 at Kenilworth Road with Chris Nicholl and Peter Anderson on the scoresheet. The game was recently featured as one of the quiz questions on Anglia TV's "Goals Galore." Did you spot it?

When West Ham United dismissed Swindon Town 2-0 at Upton Park on Saturday, 20 April, it confirmed their return to the top flight. It was no more than the "Hammers" deserved, as over the marathon season of 1990-1991 they had led all the way.

Despite losing the Second Division crown on the final day of the season to Oldham Athletic, Billy Bonds' side had much to savour from a season which included an FA Cup semi-final appearance against Nottingham Forest (after dismissing the Town and Everton along the way) and the fact that Mr Bonds had restored the old values upon which the club's reputation had been built.

This season, West Ham, like their promoted rivals Oldham and Notts

County, have found life tough in the First Division. With only 19 points from 19 games, the Hammers won only two of their opening twelve matches. They have never quite recovered from this poor start and are currently perilously close to the relegation zone in 18th place.

Like many other clubs at the wrong end of the table, West Ham's plight has not been helped by the fact that there is no money available to strengthen the side. Manager Bonds is lucky that he still has a side who, on their day, are more than a match for any side in the top flight. Consecutive wins at Tottenham and Arsenal have proved that with the likes of skipper Ian Bishop, Czech goalkeeper Ludek Miklosko defender Tony Gale and forwards Frank MacAvennie and former Hatter Mike Small in the side, they do have enough

experience to fall back on when needed.

Small has been a revelation since his £500,000 transfer from Second Division Brighton. He has made the step-up with remarkable ease and, at the time of writing, is the third highest goalscorer in the First Division with 10 league goals.

There are other players at West Ham who started off on the road to fame and fortune at Kenilworth Road. Full-back Tim Breacker, who was a firm favourite at Luton, has established himself at Upton Park continuing the promise he showed during his six years at Luton. Mitchell Thomas is another player who made his league debut at Kenilworth Road before making a big money move to Tottenham Hotspur. During the summer he moved to West Ham for £500,000 where he is now a firm favourite with the Hammers fans.





Interesting links with the Blues

Over the years, Chelsea and the Town have often been linked in football and particularly by the transfers of players...and mostly from Bedfordshire to SW6 rather than the other way. One of the first players linked with such a move was Fred Hawkes, an outstanding right-half for the Hatters, who made 509 league appearances in a career which spanned from 1899 to 1920. Financial difficulties forced the possibility, but he turned it down and it was to be Joe Payne who truly blazed the trail.

Payne, the famous scorer of 10 goals in one match against Bristol Rovers in 1936, moved to Chelsea two years later with a reputation as one of

the most fearsome centre-forwards in England. Between 1934 and 1938, he had made 72 league appearances for Luton and scored 83 goals. Alas, after what was considered a controversial move at the time, Payne's Chelsea career ill-starred and curtailed, of course, by the second world war.

The next great man to make the capital move was to be another of the Town's greatest goal-scorers, Hugh Billington. He switched to Stamford Bridge in 1948, three years after the war had ended. His Luton days had run from 1938 to 1948 and produced 86 league appearances and 63 goals. Had it not been for the war, it was said, Billington would have been one of the finest strikers of his era.

In later years, there was the Billy Hughes mini-saga. Signed for a club record £11,000 from Birmingham City in July 1947, Hughes was described as 'Britain's best full-back', but his Town career lasted only a short time and he was another to take the Chelsea route less than 12 months later. At about the same time, if not slightly earlier, Wally Shanks, who still lives in the town, moved in the other direction.

Shanks was one of 75 professionals at Stamford Bridge (along with Payne and a certain Tommy Lawton) after his de-mob and he took his chance when manager George Martin offered him a fresh chance at Kenilworth Road. It led to 264 league appearances and six goals. Another to reach Luton from Chelsea's ranks was John O'Rourke who came on a free transfer in 1963. Eighty-four league appearances and 64 goals followed before he left for Middlesbrough and higher recognition. Football unites to fight Multiple Sclerosis

The biggest charity fundraising initiative in the history of football, the ARMS Football against MS campaign, is currently underway with a host of activities planned between now and FA Cup Final day, May 9, 1992.

Originally the idea of footballing brothers Danny, Rod and Ray Wallace, the scheme aims to raise £3.5 million for Action and Research for Multiple Sclerosis (ARMS). The charity will use the money to further its research and therapy programmes for people with MS and their families.
