



A Happy New Year to you all . . . and be good.





Happiness is . . . beating Arsenal, by the look on Teddy Sheringham's face.


Teddy was among the scorers when we gunned down the men from Highbury in front of the TV cameras recently — our first win over Arsenal at the City Ground in five attempts.



We have an outstanding record of success in the League Cup and, thanks to that battling performance at Southampton a couple of weeks ago, we are now in the quarter-finals of the Rumbelows yet again.

As you are all aware by now, we are planning major constructional work at the ground with both the Trent End and Bridgford Road ends undergoing major changes.

As you know, we had hoped to start work at the Trent End by now but we failed to reach agreement with our landlords Nottingham City Council over the rent for a small stretch of land.


We've now re-arranged our plans to start at the Bridgford End and it is hoped we can commence work sometime in April and have that particular phase of the development completed fairly early next season.

FOREST'S CALENDAR OF EVENTS - 1991

For once, no major trophy arrived at the City Ground in 1991 — but how close we came to landing the F.A. Cup at Wembley in May.

Sadly, having got to the final after a succession of away draws, it wasn't to be our year — despite the fact that we took the lead with Stuart Pearce's spectacular free-kick.

Apart from the disappointment of Wembley, however, there was never any shortage of news to report from the City Ground as we look back on another memorable year . . .

JANUARY

2 — What a start to the New Year as Roy Keane strikes two of the goals in our 6-2 victory over Norwich City at Carrow Road.

6 — We hit what turned out to be a long and winding road to Wembley in the F.A. Cup with a goalless draw in the third round tie at Crystal Palace in front of a live television audience. Little did we know then of the epic saga that was about to follow.

9 — A torrential downpour just two hours before the scheduled kick-off left our pitch waterlogged, forcing referee Roger Milford into a late postponement of the replay with Palace.

11 — Hans Van Breukelen is linked with a possible return to the club and the manager refuses to rule out the possibility.

17 — After the rain came the frost . . . and with it a second postponement of the ill-fated first replay.

20 — Hans Van Breukelen decides to stay with PSV Eindhoven, killing off any hopes of a return to the City Ground.

21 — The Palace drama continues as a stunning injury time goal from John Salako locks the first replay up at 2-2.

24 — Just as the heavy rain had forced a late postponement of the first replay, a blanket of fog leaves both sets of players and supporters frustrated when they try to resolve the tie again.

28 — At long last . . . after 22 days and six attempts to settle the issue . . . two Gary Parker goals and a third from Gary Crosby in an 11-minute spell early in the second half give us a 3-0 victory and book us a fourth round trip to Newcastle, by which time we also knew who our fifth round opponents could be.

30 — Another Dutchman, defender Addeck Koot, has talks with us, but that deal hits a snag and falls through.

FEBRUARY

1 — Our out-of-favour goalkeeper Steve Sutton joins Coventry City on a month's loan to deputise for the injured Steve Ogrizovic, but heavy snow restricts him to just one game.

6 — Des Walker, Stuart Pearce and Steve Hodge are all on England duty as they beat the Cameroon 2-0 in a friendly.

13 — The great escape. Two goals down after 12 minutes in the fourth round tie at Newcastle, we hit back through Stuart Pearce, before Nigel Clough equalises in the 88th minute.

16 — With the F.A. Cup run grab-

most of the attention, it overshadows our disappointing League form and our position is not helped by a 1-0 defeat at struggling Sunderland.

18 — The F.A. Cup takes centre stage again and goals from Nigel Clough, Steve Hodge and Garry Parker brushes aside Newcastle United and earns us a trip to Southampton.

21 — After Roy Keane's dramatic emergence, we turn to Ireland again to sign Raymond Byrne from Newry Town.

25 — We leave it late once again as Steve Hodge rescues us with an equaliser at Southampton in the fifth round.

MARCH

2 — We begin to look uneasily at what is going on below us in the First Division after another defeat at lowly Luton Town.

4 — Nigel Jemson puts all his injury troubles behind him with a splendidly-taken hat-trick as we once again come from behind to beat Southampton in the fifth round replay.

9 — F.A. Cup quarter-final day, and yet another long trip for us to negotiate, this time to Norwich. For once though, we overcame this particular hurdle at the first attempt as Roy Keane's goal moves us to within one step of the Twin Towers. Incidentally this was the first time we had played on a Saturday in this year's F.A. Cup.

10 — Franz Carr joins West Ham on a month's loan . . . our opponents in the F.A. Cup semi-final.

16 — Concern about our League position grows as a 1-1 draw at home to Manchester United stretches our run without a win to six League matches and we slip to 13th place.

20 — Nigel Jemson's opportunist goal earns us another point at title favourites Arsenal on a day when the manager underlines the need to bring in new faces.

24 — Franz Carr turns down a move to Wimbledon, while efforts are stepped up to try and make a signing before the transfer deadline.

26 — Gary Charles is in the England Under-21 side which beats the Republic of Ireland 3-0.

27 — Stuart Pearce and Des Walker are in the England side which draws 1-1 with the Republic of Ireland in the European Championship qualifier at Wembley.

28 — Alan Mahood is the new face who joins us on deadline day, agreeing to a £300,000 move from Morton, where his manager had hailed him as the "new Kenny Dalglish".

30 — Tony Loughran marks an unexpected first team debut with a goal after only 36 seconds, but can't stop us crashing to a 3-1 defeat at Wimbledon to extend our run to nine League games without a win.

JANUARY . . . FEBRUARY . . . MARCH

FOREST'S CALENDAR OF EVENTS - 1991

APRIL

1 — April's Fool's day . . . but we have the last laugh, chalking up our first League win since mid-January with a 2-0 success over Sheffield United thanks to the efforts of Tommy Gaynor.

6 — Scot Gemmill makes a pleasing full debut but cannot prevent us from slipping to a 3-1 defeat at Manchester City.

10 — Roy Keane's sixth goal of the season gives us a 1-0 victory over Derby County and puts us in good spirits as the countdown to the F.A. Cup semi-final at Villa Park begins.

14 — Semi-final day . . . and the sending-off of West Ham's central defender Tony Gale for a professional foul on Gary Crosby has a strong bearing on the outcome. Crosby rubs salt in West Ham's wounds by setting us on the way to a 4-0 win, with Roy Keane, Stuart Pearce and Gary Charles getting the others. It was Charles' first goal for the club against the team he supported as a kid.

20 — Seven-up! The euphoria of reaching the F.A. Cup Final rubs off on our League form as we hammer Chelsea 7-0 . . . Roy Keane and Stuart Pearce both scoring twice, while Ian Woan collects his first senior goal for the club.

24 — Norwich are on the receiving end again, as our 5-0 victory makes it 11 goals in two League encounters with the Canaries. Lee Glover celebrates his 21st birthday by opening the scoring . . . his first goal since returning from a broken leg.

27 — Nigel Clough enhances his international claims by scoring the winner for the England B side against Iceland at Vicarage Road. Steve Hodge confirms his return to fitness after a lengthy absence with a twisted knee by playing in the same game.

30 — The manager confirms we will play a testimonial match for Notts County coach Mick Walker . . . even though the game will be played five days before the F.A. Cup Final.


MAY

1 — Stuart Pearce and Des Walker help to push England a step nearer to the European Championship finals with a 1-0 victory over Turkey in Izmir. Steve Hodge also appears as a second half substitute.

4 — In a dress rehearsal for the F.A. Cup Final, we draw 1-1 with Tottenham at White Hart Lane as Nayim cancels out a goal from Nigel Clough.

6 — Merseysider Ian Woan strikes the winner that hammers the final nail in Liverpool's title coffin as we overcome Graeme Souness's side 2-1 in front of the television cameras, leaving Arsenal to celebrate becoming Champions before their evening game against Manchester United at Highbury.

11 — Our League campaign draws to a thrilling climax with a 4-3 victory over Leeds United at the City Ground.

APRIL . . . MAY . . . JUNE

FOREST'S CALENDAR OF EVENTS - 1991

25 — The transfer activity hots up as Carl Tiler becomes the first of our three seven-figure signings, completing a £1.4 million move from Barnsley before jetting off on tour with the England Under-21 squad.

28 — Steve Hodge is linked with a move to Leeds United, while Norwich City show an interest in Darren Wassall.

JUNE

1 — Stuart Pearce, Des Walker and Nigel Clough are on international duty as England kick-off their summer tour Down Under with a 1-0 victory over Australia.

2 — Many of our fans return to Wembley to lend their support to our neighbours Notts County as they beat Brighton 3-1 in the promotion play-off final to return to the First Division.

3 — Stuart Pearce and Des Walker both collect another international cap each in a 1-0 win over New Zealand.

8 — Our skipper Stuart Pearce is given the honour of leading his country for the first time against New Zealand in Wellington and responds by scoring the first goal in a 2-0 success. Gary Charles makes a confident international debut.

12 — Four players, Stuart Pearce, Des Walker, Gary Charles and Nigel Clough help England to round off their tour with a 4-2 win over Malaysia. We confirm our interest in Dean Saunders as the race begins to secure the Welsh international's signature.

13 — Talks are held with Steve Hodge in a bid to persuade him to stay as Leeds close in on their transfer target.

14 — Derby County boss Arthur Cox informs our manager that the club's bid for Dean Saunders has been rejected.

15 — Our manager is awarded the OBE for his services to football in the Queen's birthday honours list.

19 — Paul Hart returns to the club in a coaching capacity, while Kilmarnock express an interest in Brian Rice.

20 — Like Hans Van Breukelen, another former goalkeeper Chris Woods is linked with a return to the club, but that is quickly ruled out.

28 — The arrival of Carl Tiler prompts fresh speculation that Des Walker will be leaving, this time to Real Madrid, but this is dismissed.

JULY

2 — Neil Lyne moves to Shrewsbury Town after a successful loan spell there, while we confirm Everton and Blackburn's interest in Brian Laws.

11 — Having improved our offer, Dean Saunders appears to be set for a move to the City Ground after holding talks with the club, but Liverpool nip in to sign him.

16 — The attention switches to Teddy Sheringham after our failure to sign Dean Saunders and we hold talks with the Millwall striker.

19 — After thinking over a £2 million move, Teddy Sheringham agrees to sign and becomes our record signing.

26 — Pre-season preparations are stepped up with a visit to Roy Keane's former club Cobh Ramblers where we run out comfortable winners. Keane marks his return to his old club with two goals and Teddy Sheringham scores twice on his debut.

27 — Nigel Jemson and Teddy Sheringham are on target in a 2-0 victory over Shelbourne in Ireland.

30 — Speculation is rife about Neil Webb returning to the club and Kingsley Black joining us, but hopes of signing the pair are knocked on the head, for the time being anyway.

AUGUST





"Sutty", on loan at Kenilworth Road, will be doing his utmost to keep Teddy Sheringham, Nigel Clough and Co. at Bay — and bolster Luton's hopes of avoiding relegation.

But the long-serving goalkeeper says : "I'm not quite sure how I'll feel when it's time to run out on the field — apart from being very nervous.

He added : "It's strange really because I never thought I'd ever end up playing against Forest in a League game.


"It happened to me once before when I was on loan at Mansfield but that was only in a County Cup game. This is totally different !

"Hopefully I'll get a good reception from both sets of fans but once the game starts it won't be a case of divided loyalties. I'm there to do a job for Luton."

Steve, who has lost his No. 1 spot at the City Ground to Mark Crossley, hasn't figured in our first-team since the end of the 1989-90 season.

He had a spell on loan with Coventry last season — making one appearance, against Wimbledon — and jumped at the chance of a move to Luton.

"I've really enjoyed it," he says. "Although they are struggling near the foot of the table and people



have already written them off, there's a great spirit among the lads at Luton.

"They firmly believe they can avoid relegation and that's the important thing. It doesn't matter what other people say, it's up to the lads themselves and I hope I can help them stay up.

"I'm sure the change of scenery will do me good. I haven't given up all hope of getting my place back at Forest but thanks to Luton, I've at least been able to show I can still perform at the highest level.

"What I've really enjoyed is playing in front of a crowd again on a Saturday afternoon. I had almost forgotten what it was like."

HOUDINI-STYLE escape acts were Charlton Athletic's speciality not so long ago... but Luton Town appear to have cornered that particular market more recently.

The Hatters have walked a First Division tightrope over the past three years, and they 'have developed the nerve-racking habit of leaving it to the very last minute before clawing their way to safety in the mad scramble to avoid relegation.

To survive against the odds demands immense character and resilience, but those admirable qualities face an even tougher examination over the next five months.

David Pleat's side begin the New Year knowing that only a dramatic turnaround in fortunes will give them a fighting chance of figuring in the Premier League's launch.

The taste of success has been a scarce commodity in Luton's camp during the first half of the season. Indeed, they entered the crucial holiday period with just two wins in 22 games, leaving them well adrift at the bottom of the table.

One important factor weighing in their favour though, is that they are battle-hardened to the sort of struggle which lies in front of them in the early stages of 1992.

In 1989, it took a run of three wins in the last four games and a 1-0 victory over Norwich City on the final day of the season to preserve their First Division status.

Even more dramatic, however, was their great escape 12 months later, when the battle seemed well and truly lost going into the final

three matches of the season.

Luton managed to win all of them though, and as they were beating Derby County 3-2 at the Baseball Ground, our 3-0 victory at Hillsborough meant that it was Sheffield Wednesday who were relegated on goal difference.

Ironically, the Hatters were up against the same opponents in Derby on the final day of last season, when they needed a similar outcome to be absolutely sure of staying up and sending Sunderland back down to the Second Division.

What is more, a former favourite, who would later return to Kenilworth Road, had a hand in the 2-0 victory over Derby which secured escape number three... Mick Harford's own goal helping to ease the tension on that day.

All this, and their current struggle for survival, contrasts vividly with the air of great optimism at the club when they enjoyed the proudest moment in their 107-year history by beating Arsenal in the 1988 Littlewoods Cup Final.

On top of that thrilling 3-2 victory over the Gunners, Luton finished a creditable ninth in the First Division, but by the time they returned to Wembley for the same showpiece a year later, worrying cracks were starting to appear.

Despite the fact that Harford, who was in his first spell with the club at the time, headed them in front, our 3-1 victory over the Hatters on that occasion came at the end of a spell of seven League defeats in eight games. In some ways though, the disappointment of losing their grip on the trophy sparked a late revival which enabled them to climb clear of relegation.

As for the current campaign, that couldn't have started on a more ominous note as they failed to score in their first four games and suffered a 5-0 hammering at Coventry City in the process. When their first goal finally came, it was a consolation effort at Chelsea where the home side ran out 4-1 winners.

Unfortunately, that dismal start to the season was a taste of things to come as they crashed out of the Rumbelows League Cup to Third Division Birmingham City and suffered a five-goal drubbing at title-chasers Manchester United.

Even the return of some familiar faces has failed to lift the gloom, with Pleat back where he spent eight years in charge from 1978-86, while Harford has linked up again with his old strike partner Brian Stein at Kenilworth Road.

Luton could certainly do with the Harford-Stein partnership recapturing some of its old magic, for a shortage of goals has been one of their biggest stumbling blocks.

Of course, the fact that Northern Ireland international winger Kingsley Black could very easily be up against his old team-mates this afternoon hasn't helped.


The Hatters have missed his creative skills and steady output of goals since making a £1.5 move up the M1 to the City Ground in the early stages of this season.

It is also significant to note that Danish international Lars Elstrup and Northern Ireland striker Iain Dowie, who along with Black were Luton's most productive players in terms of goals last season, are no longer with the club either.

As well as recruiting old boys Harford and Stein, Pleat turned to his old club Tottenham Hotspur to sign striker Phillip Gray at a cost of £275,000 in the summer.

A couple of experienced heads have also been acquired to bolster both Luton's defence and midfield in the shape of former Coventry City defender Trevor Peake and the much-travelled Chris Kamara from Leeds United.

And more recently, of course, Steve Sutton has moved to Kenilworth Road on a temporary basis as Pleat tries desperately to plot another dramatic revival.



MAN TO WATCH



DAVID PLEAT returned to the club where he first made his name as both a player and manager when he was appointed as Luton Town's successor to Jim Ryan during the summer.

After beginning his playing days here at the City Ground, where he made only a handful of appearances, Pleat enjoyed a successful time at Kenilworth Road, before having spells with Shrewsbury Town, Exeter City and Peterborough.

In 1974, he was appointed Luton's reserve team coach and eventually became manager in 1978, masterminding their promotion as champions to the First Division four years later.

Pleat joined Tottenham in 1986 and guided them to an F.A. Cup Final appearance a year later before moving on to Leicester in December, 1987, where he had three years in charge.

MICK HARFORD couldn't have picked a better way to cap his return to Luton Town earlier this season... but that glorious homecoming has been a rare moment for the club to savour in an otherwise grim struggle in the First Division's relegation zone.


The 32-year-old striker, having completed a £325,000 move from Derby County, fired in two late goals on his debut against Oldham Athletic to give the Hatters only their second victory of the campaign.

Harford began his career at Lincoln City in 1977, but it was after relatively short spells at Newcastle United and Bristol City that he began to emerge as a top class striker with Birmingham City.

A highly successful first spell with Luton prompted Derby County to spend £480,000 on linking him up with Dean Saunders in 1988, and that led to him being capped twice by England, coming on as a substitute against Israel and playing in a 1-1 draw with Denmark.







Luton finally moved well clear of relegation prior to the Cup Final and the Forest form continued on it's erratic way as they recorded just three wins in thirteen outings between semi-final and final.





DAVID WILSON (Forward)

Born : Wolverhampton, 4.10.44.
Debut v. Fulham (h) 3-1, 6.10.62.
FL 9 (1), FAC 1.

Promising schoolboy signing, joined the Reds, signing professional in October, 1961.

He was a replacement for Frank Wignall on tour of USA and Canada in 1965, he has the distinction of being the first Forest sub to score, when replacing Alan Hinton v. West Ham (5-0) on 9.10.65.

Moving to Carlisle shortly afterwards for a small fee, he later appeared with Grimsby, Walsall, Burnley and Chesterfield with moderate success.

JOE WILSON (Full back)

Born : Workington, 6.7.37.
Debut v. W.B.A. (a) 2-2, 17.3.62.
FL 84 (1) FAC 7, CC 1.


Joe began his playing days with home club Workington after working his way through the junior sides.

While with Workington appeared at times at centre forward where his tireless drive produced results. A tough uncompromising full back with the Reds he was fearless sight with his short cropped crew cut hair.

A tremendously popular player while with Forest he scored his only goal at Stoke, winning the Reds a point in October, 1964.

Joined Wolves from the City Ground in March 1965, he had a short time with Newport before returning home to Workington for his final spell in league football.

In two spells at Borough Park he made almost 350 senior appearances.



TOMMY WILSON

TERRY WILSON (Midfield)

Born : Broxburn, 8.2.69.
Debut v. Southampton (h) 3-3, 2.9.87.
FL 99 (9), FAC 18 (2), FLC 13, FM 7, CC 2.

Exceptionally talented Scottish Under-21 international who progressed quickly after joining us as an apprentice.

First introduced into the left side of midfield as a replacement for David Campbell, he soon established himself during the 1988/89 campaign.

He underlined his value when he deputised for Colin Foster in central defence where his performances put him in contention for the PFA Young Player of the Year as he won league and Full Members cup medals.

Terry has struggled with injuries for long periods since but when fit will be regarded as an important member of the first team squad.

TOMMY WILSON (Centre forward)

Born : Bedlington, 15.9.30.
Debut v. Luton Town (h) 2-0, 6.10.51.
FL 191 (75), FAC 25 (13) C/S 1 (1).

Although a native of the North East, Tommy Wilson was spotted playing with Cinderhill Colliery from whom he joined the staff in 1951.

His first three seasons were spent leading the reserves in the Midland League as he honed his skills to perfection.

Established himself during the 1954-55 season, but the following year was a frustrating one as injury restricted him greatly.

The side was rebuilt and as Forest prepared for their final push back to the First Division, Tommy was back to his best as the Reds chased Leicester into Division One.

Missed only three games in the next two seasons, Tommy peaked during 1958-59 with 27 goals in 50 outings and the winning goal at Wembley.

The early sixties saw the arrival of Addison, Booth and Julians and with opportunities restricted, he moved on to Walsall where he spent two seasons. Tommy, a much feared and respected leader of the line, rates as one of the Reds finest home produced players.

JOHN WINFIELD (Full back)

Born : Draycott, 28.2.43.
Debut v. Blackpool (h) 3-4, 3.2.62.
FL 354 (4), FAC 32 (1), FLC 16, CC 12, Eu 4.

John Winfield represented Derbyshire schools prior to joining the Reds in 1958. Made fine progress and signed pro. in May 1960. Initially he began as a wing half where he made his early first team appearances, his first being a goalscoring one.

During Forest's then best ever season in Division One of 1966-67 John cemented his place in the side, forming one of the finest full back pairings for many seasons, alongside Peter Hindley.

Over the following five seasons he missed only four senior games. Solid and dependable, his trade mark was plain consistency during his days with Forest.

Played on to the end of the 1973-74 season when he was offered either a new contract or a free transfer.

Electing for the free, he joined Peterborough where he spent only one season before returning to Nottingham to enter business. Took a well earned testimonial against Leicester City.



PETER WITHE

PETER WITHE (Centre forward)

Born : Liverpool, 30.8.51.
Debut v. Carlisle United (h) 5-1, 23.9.76.
FL 75 (28), FAC 11 (3), FLC 8 (5), AS 4 (2), CC 2 (1), CS 1 (1).

Peter Withe began in the backwoods of the Football League with Southport and Barrow where his

impact was equal to the two clubs later progress in the Football League.

Deciding to try his luck in South Africa he joined Arcadia Shepherds and during a close season tour was spotted by Derek Dougan who recommended him to Wolves.

Peter made little impression at Molineux and moved on to Birmingham where Peter Taylor first took note of the robust frontman. Joining Forest his powerful foraging up front was a magnificent foil for Tony Woodcock and over two seasons the two players found the net 75 times.

He made his final appearance in the Garabaldi against Spurs at the City Ground in a game which saw Ardiles and Villa make their football League debuts.

It was a sad sad day for Forest when Withe joined Newcastle where he spent a short period before joining Aston Villa. In five seasons at Villa Park, he won a second Division One Championship medal and a European Cup winners medal, scoring the winning goal against Bayern Munich in Rotterdam and was capped 11 times for England.

From Villa he joined Sheffield United before moving on to the management scene at Huddersfield Town.




