






I wonder how many people in the crowd at Bramall Lane today, can remember the last time Sheffield United won the F.A. Cup — I can probably count them on the fingers of one hand since it was 67 years ago — and its about time that we did something about it. Sheffield United have not appeared at Wembley since 1936 and that's a lamentable record for a club of our stature. It is an ambition of mine to improve that miserable record as soon as possible and this season is as good as any.

I love the cup action and want to be part of it. When I look back at my time here I remember that my very first game in charge was a cup tie at Portsmouth and we lost, 2-1. That caused no great distress because it seems that the record of Sheffield United in the tournament had, to put it politely, been very poor. Dismissal from the event had been accepted, it seemed.

Then in my first full season we went to the last 16 and had that terrific tie at Norwich which is still talked about to this day. We lost 3-2 to an established First Division club and did ourselves proud.

Then the following year we went one better and got through to the last eight losing, you will recall, to a single goal at the hands of Manchester United the eventual winners.

Last year was an anti-climax, a drift back to what had been the norm and a flat, apologetic exit at the hands of today's visitors Luton Town.

In the situation we are in as far as the league is concerned we could all do with a break, a lift and a change and

we are sincerely looking forward to a chance of revenge over Luton.

Everybody wants a home draw in the cup and in that respect we have been particularly fortunate for three seasons running. But Luton will not lack confidence. They will remember their win here 12 months ago and also the fact that they were involved in a tight draw in the league. All this plus their recent revival, something like our own at this time last season, will have put them in good heart.

It should be an eventful cup-tie. We all want to win it with style and make sure we are in the bag when they make the draw on Sunday afternoon.

very special atmosphere amongst supporters, and on cup day, I would like to ask our fans to give us that special backing.

In fact, I would like you to provide a cup-tie environment in all of our matches at Bramall Lane. In short, it would be good if we could make visiting teams tremble a bit when they come out to play us whatever the competition.

I have often spoken about the support of our away fans but it would be a great help to us in the New Year if we could engender a hostile atmosphere here.

I think of the buzz that goes around at West Ham and at Leeds where the followers always put visiting players under great pressure. There is a definite worry factor when teams run out at some grounds and I would like that translated to Bramall Lane.

I am not asking for you to be offensive to visiting fans, players and officials but just to make it crystal clear where your great loyalty lies.

I sometimes get the feeling that clubs actually enjoy coming to Bramall Lane. We have a big stadium with plenty of room and our hospitality is legendary. It would give us an edge I feel if our opponents, by your vociferous support, were made to realize that they would have to battle for anything they got.

With next week free because of the change in cup replay arrangements, I am taking the players to Jersey for a special match. But we shall still be working hard and preparing for the important league game at Southampton in a week's time.

To win the F.A. Cup Final this season United will have to win six games—and seeing as it would be 67 years (1925) since we last held the trophy no one could say it wasn't overdue.

Despite an improvement in reaching the Fifth Round in 1989 and the Sixth a year later, the last 30 years or so have been dismal for the club in this, and most other cup competitions.

You have to go back to 1960-61 when, as a Second Division side who were promoted with Ipswich, we reached the semi-final only to lose 0-2 to Leicester in the third of a series of matches.



TOMMY IN TURMOIL

All-action *Tommy Cowan's* commitment has been a mixed blessing in recent games and left the popular young Scot scratching his head in disbelief.

Successive games against West Ham, Coventry and Palace brought incidents galore with the penalty at Upton Park still uppermost in people's minds.

No-one blames Tom for the crazy handball award and he did well to restrain himself at the award though Paul Beesley did go in the book for confirming Tom's own version of the incident: "I just followed the ball into the box and thought I'd done well to get just in front of Kenny Brown. I felt a little push as I dived to head it back but thought there was no real problem. When the whistle went I thought the referee had given a corner."

Later at a team meeting Dave Bassett absolved Tom of any responsibility and against Coventry saw the full-back put in a display which won him the Sponsor's man-of-the-match award in front of Paul Beesley. "I don't know how" states Tom modestly "I did just about O.K. but it wasn't one of my better performances". Either Tom is too critical or the Sponsors had a tough job picking a 'star' after a 0-3 defeat!

And so to the Palace game. The early signs were good and there was even the prospect of an eagerly-awaited Cowan goal in front of the appreciative Kop but, after beating the

offside trap, "I stumbled as I hit it. I was sick because I really thought it was my big chance."

On the second-half performance Tom is very critical: "I was terrible, and the composure which I'd tried to develop recently deserted me against McGoldrick. I was in two minds whether to go to him but he played very deep and I gave him the initiative. That was disappointing for me because the Boss told me after the Manchester United game that I'd given the best full-back display he'd seen anyone give against Kanchelskis."

The classic headed goal by *Jamie Hoyland* against Palace last week was a huge relief to the player who had gone eleven games without scoring.

After notching three in three games against Leeds, Wigan and Forest in early October the tall midfield player was beginning to feel anxious.

Says Jamie "It had been on my mind that we weren't scoring enough goals from a variety of positions and the onus is more on me than John Gannon to get them from midfield. John usually sits in to hold the middle whilst I'm encouraged to get in the box, particularly when the front players pull wide as Brian Deane did when he supplied the cross."

"Quite frankly I was astonished that the Palace centre-backs failed to pick me up—it wasn't if I'd arrived late, I'd just run straight through the middle!"

The conclusive finish was what many Unitedites anticipated from the ex-Bury man when he came to the Lane: "Yes, I know, and I certainly want to reach double figures this season with five under my belt so far."

Jamie has profited from the sale of Vinnie Jones in that he has been given a clear run in central midfield and has picked up confidence from it. The disappointment of last season when he was not a regular choice and made only 21 league appearances has evaporated and he is now, remarkably, our only ever-present (he came on as substitute against Southampton, and again at Wigan in the Rumbelows Cup).

He needs to keep on the goal trail for United have only lost once (at Leeds) in the five matches that Jamie has found the net.

TODAY'S VISITORS

Luton Town

Luton have found a new lease of life since they came to Bramall Lane for a 1-1 draw in the First Division at the end of November. They lost only one of their next three games — at home to the leaders Leeds (0-2) — and then achieved a 1-0 home victory over the reigning Champions Arsenal on Boxing Day.

Though First Division survival remains the top priority for manager David Pleat, he is nevertheless delighted that his side has run into form in time for the start of the F.A. Cup programme today. For the Hatters have an outstanding recent record in cup football.

Until 1986 Luton had only ever been to Wembley on one occasion — when losing the 1951 F.A. Cup Final to Nottingham Forest — but they then proceeded to enjoy three Wembley Cup Finals during the space of one year!

In 1988 they crashed 1-4 to Reading in the Simod Cup but they returned to Wembley a few weeks later to defeat Arsenal 3-2 in the League Cup.

Luton reached the League Cup Final again in 1989, only to be beaten 1-3 by Nottingham Forest.

Over the past seven seasons Luton have also appeared in two F.A. Cup semi-finals.

One of the reasons why Luton have been enjoying better results is that Mr. Pleat has been able to field a settled team. Though he had used as many as 31 players in his senior side before Christmas, for the past few weeks there have been few changes.

Steve Sutton, signed on loan from Nottingham Forest, made his Luton debut in the 1-1 draw here in November.

He has been playing behind a settled defence of Julian James, Trevor Peake, John Dreyer and Richard Harvey.

The new-look midfield has comprised of Paul Telfer, Chris Kamara, Mark Pembridge and either Scott Oakes or David Preece.

Mick Harford, who has been hitting peak form in recent weeks, partners Brian Stein in the Hatters' attack.


HARFORD GLAD TO BE BACK AT LUTON

Mick Harford has reflected his pleasure at being back at Luton with a regular supply of goals. Luton signed him from Derby for £350,000 in September and the former England forward scored seven times in 12 league games to the end of the Christmas period.

Mick left Kenilworth Road in January 1990 when Derby secured his transfer for £480,000.

He began his career with Lincoln City, making his league debut for the Red Imps against Gillingham in December 1977. In 1979/80 he was the club's top scorer with 16 goals and, after he had netted 15 times the following season, Newcastle paid £200,000 — then the highest fee ever paid for a Fourth Division player — to take him to St. James Park.

His stay at Newcastle was brief, though, and it was not long before he had joined Bristol City for £150,000 in the summer of 1981. Though he led Bristol's scoring list with 11 goals, he moved on again in March 1982 when the club ran into serious financial difficulties and was unable to maintain repayments.

Mick was technically transferred back to Newcastle — then, just minutes later, he was transferred again to Birmingham!

Mick became a consistent scorer for the Blues until Luton signed him in 1984 and it was at Kenilworth Road that he enjoyed the real highlights of his career. He was the Hatters' top scorer with 25 goals in 1985/86 but his best campaign was probably 1987/88. That was when he won the first of his two England caps — he was called on as substitute against Israel — and he was also a member of the Luton side which defeated Arsenal in the League Cup Final at Wembley.

He returned to Wembley a year later when he was in the Luton side beaten by Nottingham Forest in the same final.

Mick was in the England side from the kick-off against Denmark in September 1988.

Following an injury, Mick found it difficult to regain his place in the Luton side in 1989/90 and that was why he agreed to move on to Derby.

20 FACTS YOU MAY NOT KNOW ABOUT LUTON

1. Luton have avoided relegation in each of the past three seasons only by winning their final match of the season. In 1989/90 they had to win their last three games to miss the drop.
2. *When Luton played a goalless draw at West Ham on the opening day of this new season, it was the first time they had kept a clean sheet in 46 away matches dating back to September 1989. The Hatters were unable to equal that feat in their next 11 away games to the end of December.*
3. The only Luton player to hit a hat-trick in the First Division over the past three seasons was Lars Elstrup who scored all the goals in Luton's 3-1 win at Norwich in September 1990.
4. *Elstrup was also the last Luton man to score three in a cup-tie, doing so in their 7-2 home win over Mansfield in the League Cup in October 1989.*
5. We have to trace back to February 1988 to find the Hatters' previous hat-trickster. Mark Stein got three of the goals in their 7-4 win over Oxford in a First Division game.
6. *The Luton record is never likely to be beaten — Joe Payne scored 10 times against Bristol Rovers in a Third Division (South) game in 1936.*
7. Payne cornered another club record when he scored 58 goals in 1936/37 — 55 in the League, plus three in the F.A. Cup.
8. *Luton's record aggregate scorer was Gordon Turner, who scored 265 in all competitions — 243 League, 18 F.A. Cup and four League Cup.*
9. That record is in absolutely no danger at the moment. The highest scorer currently on Luton's books is Brian Stein, who scored 152 goals during his first spell with the club. He returned to Luton last summer but he had not added to his tally by Christmas.
10. *Luton's appearances record is held by Bob Morton who played 495 League games, 48 F.A. Cup ties and seven League Cup ties to make a grand total of 550.*
11. Luton's most-capped player was Mal Donaghy, who won 58 caps for N. Ireland before moving on to Manchester United two seasons ago.
12. *The oldest player to appear in Luton's first-team was Dally Duncan who was 39 years and 11 days of age when he played his final game in 1948.*
13. The Hatters were the first club to drop all the way from the First to the Fourth Division and, later, regain their place at the top.
14. *Kenilworth Road's record attendance was 30,069 for an F.A. Cup tie against Blackpool in 1959.*
15. Luton's largest crowd this season was 12,655 for the Boxing Day visit of Arsenal.
16. *Luton's record League victory was a 12-0 success over Bristol Rovers in the Third Division (South) in April 1936.*
17. But the Hatters had done even better than that when they crushed Great Yarmouth by 15-0 in the F.A. Cup in 1914.
18. *Their record defeat was by 0-9 to Small Heath (now Birmingham) in the Second Division in 1898.*
19. David Pleat, who returned to Kenilworth Road last summer, became the first man ever to manage Luton on a second occasion. He was previously in charge between 1978 and 1986.
20. *After Mr. Pleat left in 1986, Luton employed three managers in five years — John Moore, Ray Harford and Jimmy Ryan.*

DID YOU KNOW

Today we welcome Luton Town, one year to the day since their last visit to Bramall Lane in the F.A. Cup. This is the sixth cup game between the clubs, four in the League Cup and one in the F.A. Cup. Details of these previous five appear elsewhere.

Luton are one of the 18 current Division One clubs to have reached an F.A. Cup Final since the competition restarted in 1945-6, after the war. They lost the 1959 final to Nottingham Forest by 1-2. This despite Forest being reduced to 10 men after half an hour when Roy Dwight, scorer of the first goal, broke his leg. In fact, all those 18 clubs have reached the final since 1957. The four current Division One clubs not to have reached a post-war final sadly includes United. The other three are listed below:

Over the past 10 seasons United's F.A. Cup record is:

The furthest round reached in round 6 (1989-90) when we lost 0-1 to Manchester United. Apart from last season the Blades were knocked out at the first attempt in 1981-2, losing 0-3 at Altrincham in a first round replay, and in 1984-5 — losing 0-5 at Watford in round three. This is United's heaviest defeat in the last 10 years but there have been two 5-1 victories in that time: at home to Boston United (1982-3) and at Wrexham (1983-4) when Keith Edwards scored four times.

Luton's record over the same period is:

They have twice reached the semi-final stage (1984-5 and 1987-8) but three times they have lost at the first hurdle in round three. The biggest victory was in 1985-6, a 4-0 home victory over Bristol Rovers. Their worst defeat was in their last F.A. Cup game — a 0-5 defeat at West Ham in round four last season.

United's last two F.A. Cup ties have been at home and both have been lost. The Blades have played and lost two successive home F.A. Cup games on three previous occasions. The first time was way back in 1908 and 1909, then in 1926 and 1927. The third time will be remembered by some of those present today. In 1954 neighbours Wednesday won here (3-1) in a third round replay and the following season Nottingham Forest also achieved a 3-1 third round victory. Let us hope United do not achieve a record by playing three successive F.A. Cup games at home and losing all three!

The other clubs not to reach a post-war F.A. Cup Final are Oldham Athletic and Norwich City (although they have both reached a Wembley League Cup Final) and Notts County (they have played at Wembley in the League play-offs).

A BLADE AND A HATTER

Antwerp of Belgium for £80,000. This was to ease the club's financial position. In all he made 181 league appearances and scored 34 goals for the club.

As well as playing in Belgium, he played in the North American Soccer League with Tampa Bay and San Diego. It was from the N.A.S.L. that Harry Haslam signed his former player for the Blades at the start of the 1978-79 campaign. It was reported that he cost the Blades £80,000. He made his debut as a substitute at West Ham in September 1978.

In his one season with the Blades he finished top scorer with 12 league goals in 30 appearances. His two goals in the televised home match with Sunderland will always be remembered. At the end of the season he returned to the U.S.A.

He reappeared in the Football League between 1980 and 1982 with Millwall. He was their player-manager for a spell before being sacked in November 1982.



"We had our eyes on four points, at least, from our two Christmas home games. You will know that we managed only one. We are our own sharpest critics and when I was asked how I felt we had played I answered in one word "pathetic".

We looked at the videos of the two games with special attention and then we went through it all. In both games we felt we had chances to put the game beyond the reach of the opposition. Against Palace, particularly, I felt we played for about half an hour better than at any time since I came to the club and scored one of the best goals I have seen Sheffield United score.

But in each game we failed to get the vital second goal which makes opponents think the task is beyond them, Coventry did that against us with a goal out of nothing and that is what we have to do.

Perhaps a draw with Palace was justified but the Coventry setback knocked a bit of the stuffing out of us. However I know that if we allow ourselves to start feeling that our luck is out we shall be in serious difficulties.

We have the players to get out of trouble but ability alone is not enough; we have to roll up our sleeves and get on with it.

The only good thing to come out of Christmas was the collective realisation that we let ourselves down and threw away an opportunity to lift Sheffield United well out of the bottom four clubs. The worst thing was the opening of a gap between the bottom four clubs and the other teams and we cannot allow that to happen.

The more clubs involved in the struggle the better. This afternoon it is Luton in the cup and sadly I shall not be involved.

Soon after the game the team leaves for a match in the Channel Islands before playing the vital game at Southampton next week.

The boys really want a good cup run this year to make up for the dismissal by Luton a year ago before I joined you.

I hope very much that the team books our place in the fourth round although Luton's splendid revival, culminating in wins over Arsenal and Chelsea indicates they are on the move and are not to be underestimated. Not that we will do that after our close match with them in the league a few weeks ago."

WOODWARD DOUBLE SEES OFF THIRD DIVISION LEADERS

In Round Two of the 1969-70 Football League Cup competition, United had a thrilling 2-0 victory at home to First Division Newcastle United. Winger Alan Woodward had played the last 15 minutes in goal owing to an injury to Alan Hodgkinson. Third Division leaders, Luton Town, had progressed to Round three by beating Second Division Millwall. United manager John Harris warned his team not to be complacent:

"Don't think of Third Division Luton, think of First Division Newcastle."

United were doing well in the Second Division at the time and stood in second position at the time of this game.

Both teams were forced to make changes. Tony Currie failed a fitness test and was replaced by Dave Staniforth but the star of the Newcastle game, Dave Powell, was pronounced fit. Luton had to make a change at centre-half as Chris Nicholl had been cup-tied earlier in the season while playing for Halifax Town. His replacement was Terry Branston.

Luton were the best team in the first 20 minutes with Graham French particularly causing

problems. Alan Hodgkinson was forced to save smartly from Malcolm Macdonald and John Collins in this period.

Gradually, United began to take control and John Tudor headed

narrowly over the bar in the 21st minute. Seven minutes later, United took the lead through *Alan Woodward*. Colquhoun passed to Staniforth who beat a defender and knocked the ball to Woodward who beat Sandy Davie in the Luton goal.

In the second half United maintained the dominance they had exerted in the latter half of the first 45 minutes. They increased their lead in the 55th minute when *Woodward* steered Gil Reece's left-wing cross into the net. Woodward almost completed his hat-trick two minutes later but shot just wide. In the 61st minute Staniforth missed a glorious chance to make it 3-0 after being set up by Woodward and Tudor.

The third goal came in the 77th minute when *John Tudor* slammed the ball home following a run and pass from Reece. Luton substitute Lawrie Sheffield almost pulled a goal back for the Hatters near the end. Sheffield came on for Matt Tees who finally lost out in his battle with United's Eddie Colquhoun.

In the next round, United lost 2-0 at Leicester City. They also failed to win promotion and finished sixth in the Second Division. Luton finished the season as runners-up in the Third Division and were promoted.

Because of the New Year these notes had to be completed before the visit to Anfield, so the visit to Upton Park is the only trip on which to report. Only the blades fans at the match could fully appreciate what a farce the final result was. After United had Brian Gayle mysteriously sent off they secured the lead with a tremendous Deane header from a Littlejohn cross and with only six minutes remaining appeared to have secured three vital points. But as we now know it was not to be. The last in a series of baffling refereeing decisions resulted in a penalty to West Ham from which they duly equalized. Why did the referee award a penalty? Most fans were baffled and many even more so after watching it on the T.V. again on Sunday. Some said handball, others said it was a push, Tom Cowan denied either, and the referee who was a long way from the incident, claimed handball. What was certain was the national press by and large were extremely critical of the referee's handling of the match, and the penalty in particular, so no particular United bias is necessary for the criticism.

Dave Bassett refused to comment on the referee. Tony Pritchett in *The Star* said, on hearing the penalty was for handball said — it turned "a bad decision into one bordering on incomprehensibility". Well the decision stood and it cost United

two points which could be vital at the season's end. How much longer will we have to put up with such poor refereeing? Surely the advent of the Premier League should lead to a higher standard of officials?

At the end of the three consecutive trips to London United's record was all square, winning one, drawing one and losing one, but those four points should really have been six.

Next Saturday United make the long trip to Southampton, and what a vital game it now promises to be as Southampton have slipped (when these notes were written) to the bottom of the table. United have an early

season unexpected home defeat to avenge as well as the defeat at The Dell last season when Vinnie Jones debut was unable to immediately inspire United. The long journey to Southampton seems to do little for United's confidence, recent results there being nothing to get excited about. The Blades last seven visits have resulted in four defeats and three draws. It was eight visits ago, in 1966 that the last victory was recorded.

The match hardly promises to be a classic as Southampton have adopted a rugged approach, and as they are now as desperate as United, stylish football may well be at a premium. Let's hope that as many United fans as possible make the trip to roar on the team to earn three crucial points.

"A tragic injury has cut short Norman's career and he is now Physio at Northwich Victoria, but I'm sure he looked after himself financially first. Although he was transferred from United I don't believe he could be any better than he was there in the early days.

"**Mark Bright** was my team-mate at Palace and is, in my opinion, the best player never to play for England.

"**Steve Coppell** did, of course, and it was easy to see why when he joined in training regularly at Palace. I also played with him in Testimonials and he is just out of this world.

"I remember him coming on for the last half-hour of a Testimonial at Spurs and he just tore Mitchell Thomas apart. The Palace chairman actually tried to get Steve to sign a playing contract in order to use him as substitute for the final stages of games but there were too many problems with sorting out the insurance pay-off etc."





THE CUP THAT CHEERS

So the F.A. Cup is here again, and we are faced with Luton Town, who tripped us up almost exactly a year ago.

The F.A. Cup arouses mixed memories in the Rusty Blade household. I remember, as a small boy in the 1940s, being given a photo of the 1925 cup-winning team and sticking it on my bedroom wall. My father would regale me with tales of that side, of the skilful Billy Gillespie and the speedy Freddie Tunstall, though it seemed to me like ancient history, even then.

My first taste of the F.A. Cup was the match against New Brighton in 1949. George Jones scored a hat-trick and Hagan and Warhurst one each in a 5-2 win. "This cup business is easy," I thought, being so new to the game that I didn't realise New Brighton were a non-league side. Reality came three weeks later with a 3-0 defeat by Wolves and I have to confess that, since that day, the F.A. Cup has given me rather more pain than joy.


Still, one can always look on the bright side. With a fair wind, a favourable draw, and the team

hitting top form at the right time, it's not unrealistic to feel that the Blades could go all the way this year. The task is simply to win six games between now and May.

But first, let's take care of Luton...

KNACKERED

I can't say I'm totally convinced by all the talk that we play too much football in this country. The main point of the argument seems to be that, at the end of a busy season, our top players are too knackered to perform at their best for their national side.



Much as fans like to see England (or Scotland, Wales and Ireland) doing well in the World Cup or European Championship I suspect that most of them are much more concerned with the fortunes of their own local side, whether it be in the First or Fourth Division.

England's problem mainly concerns the small number of "glamour" clubs who tend to have the majority of international players. They are the ones in contention for the League Championship, and have extended runs in the F.A. or Rumbelows Cup. They are then victims of their own success by becoming involved with European games.

The bonus side to all this is that these clubs have the chance to make big money from their efforts and can thus afford to keep a much larger squad of quality players.

At the end of the day I wonder which players finish a season the most tired: those from the top teams with their international commitments or their colleagues from the lower divisions, playing around 60 league and cup games in a season as part of a small squad. However, I do have a good idea which ones make the most money...



WHO SCORED?

Now we know. Kevin Gage scored United's goal at Tottenham and that's official. An article in *The Green 'Un* stated that "United have officially given the goal scored at Tottenham to full-back Kevin Gage and the Football League have been informed."

Well it depends what you mean by the word 'official'. In the case of Gage's goal, United have decided that his was the shot that entered the net and any possible deflection, whether by Brian Deane or a Tottenham defender, didn't materially change the flight of the ball.

I feel that United have made the correct decision, and Gage's name appears as the scorer in our match day programme, and with a bit of luck, it will appear in Rothman's Football Yearbook and other similar soccer guides, and be added to all the other soccer statistics. There it is, and its official, but not, I have to add, according to the League.

Neither the Football League nor referees officially record goalscorers. They content themselves with goals and results. Andy Williamson, the League's assistant secretary, was quoted recently in an article in *The Daily Telegraph*.

"We keep out of it", he said "for the reason that there are too many disputed goals... The only people who actually record the scorers are the media, as impartial observers. But there have been cases where the scorers were changed later because the clubs disagreed with the published version."

The Football League only require clubs to inform them of the teams, the score and details of the attendance. In United's case, our club adds the names of the goalscorers and, I understand, the time when the goals were scored.

I hope that's clear, but there is, I have to add, a complication. The Football League do require the name of the scorer in the League Cup competition! Don't ask me why. I didn't have the heart to ask when I discussed the matter with a League spokesman recently.

Who scored? It's all a matter of opinion, and never more so than when we enter the topic of 'own goals'. United have credited one of our two goals against Aston Villa to Dane Whitehouse. Paul McGrath made an attempt to clear the ball but

often, the soccer historian is greeted with: 'the ball was scrimmaged through', or 'rushed through', or 'United scored two further goals'.


The gentlemen of the press inevitably make mistakes and an incorrect name may not be their fault. If a United goal in the mid nineteen forties has been wrongly credited, it may be the fault of our twelfth man.

There were no substitutes in those days, but a twelfth man was picked, and he had to be present before the match in case a chosen player fell ill or failed to turn up. The twelfth man was usually a midfielder and Stan Machent or Ernest Jackson might find themselves chosen. Stan told me recently that he would watch the match from the press box rather than from the bench.

The problem has always been with us. In the early days there was less interest in who had scored the goals. No doubt it was regarded as immodest to claim that one had scored a goal in what is a team game. Victorian newspapers can be decidedly unhelpful. Their reports are frequently long but not necessarily informative. All too

United made six changes to the team rather surprisingly held at home in the previous Pontins fixture. Brian Marwood, back at the Lane following a loan period at Middlesbrough, returned to partner Ian Bryson in his first game since his minor operation.

Glynn Hodges continued in midfield and, surprisingly, Mitch Ward's full-back spot was filled by another forward, Carl Bradshaw, who partnered debutant Matthew Foreman.

Torrential rain and gale-force winds had threatened the game earlier in the day, and conditions were not to improve all evening. United, in their now familiar all-white change strip, were first to press and several times Bryson showed a good touch which had the home side back-pedalling. Liverpool launched their first attack on ten minutes and had the ball in the net, but an infringement had been spotted.

On 14 minutes, Venison's casual defensive duties almost let in Bryson, but Maxwell intervened at the death. Mendonca's excellent flick on to Bryson carried just a little too much weight, and a snap shot was charged down. Bradshaw played a super ball down the right flank to Mendonca, but heavily twisted an ankle in the process and was forced to leave the pitch on 26 minutes. John Reed deputised in a straight swap at right-back. Lake and Reed linked well down the flank, and Marwood forced a corner. Hodges bent the ball away from the 'keeper, but Pemberton's thumping header cleared the crossbar.

Bryson and Marwood became repeatedly frustrated by the home side's insistence at employing a rather tedious and boring off-side trap, and their constant manipulation of the incompetent officials.

Eager work from Bryson failed to bring the leveller, and the Blades trooped off a goal behind at the break.

Hollis replaced Hutchinson during the interval for the Anfield side, but United almost caught the hosts square right from the restart. Mendonca found Marwood with a calculated pass, but the strike was rather hurried. Foreman released Bryson inside the box, but weariness allowed the ball to run through to the 'keeper.

Just on the hour, Hodges was replaced by Nathan Peel, and this proved to be the catalyst United desperately needed. Peel's aerial dominance knocked The Anfielder's







'CONVERTED' BLADES
