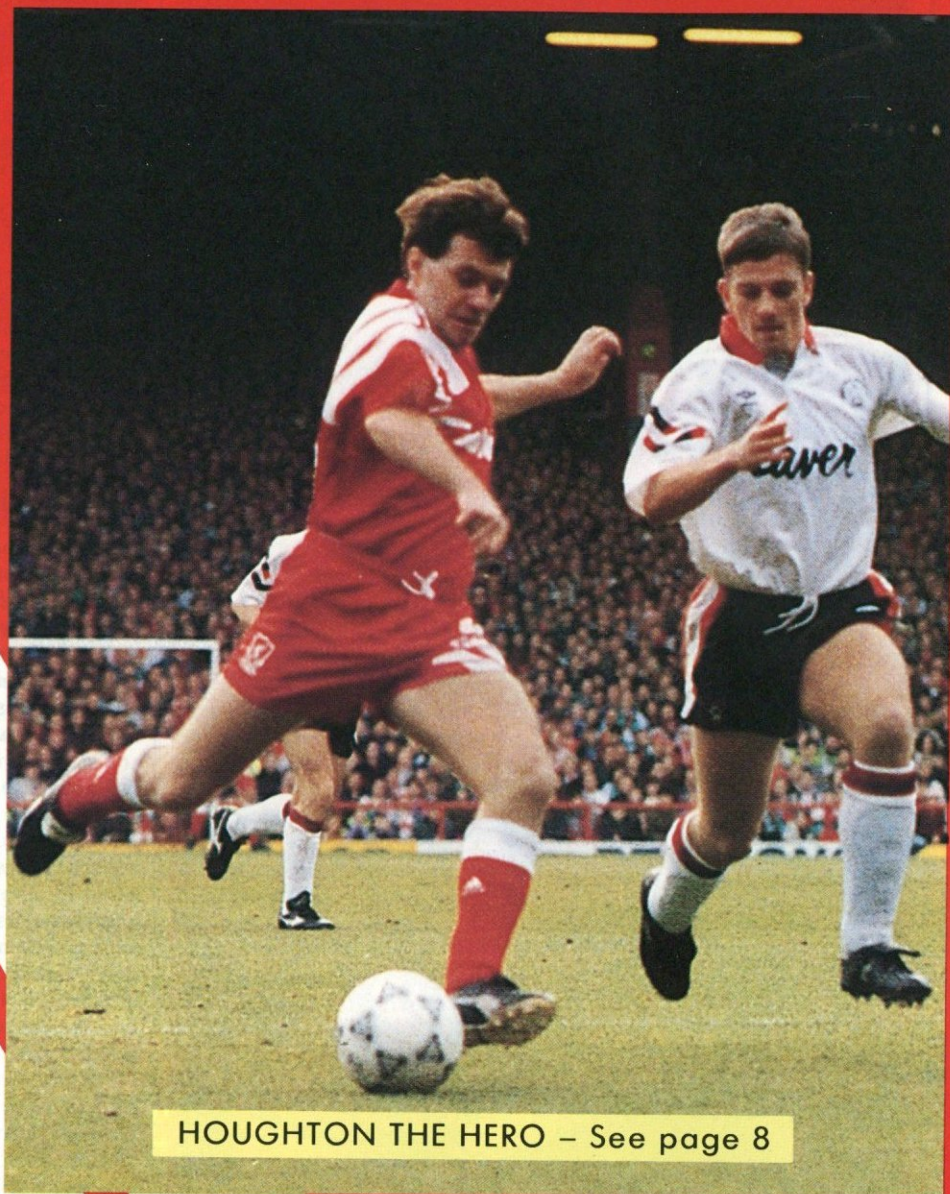

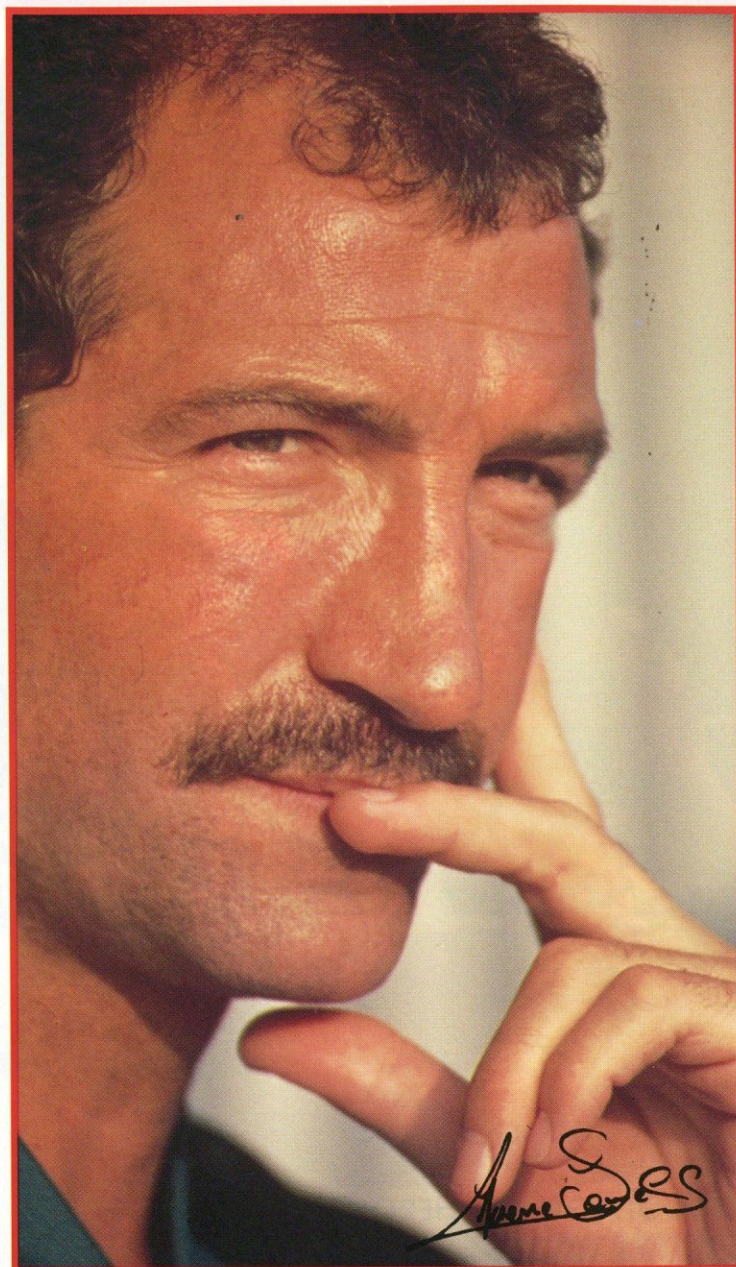

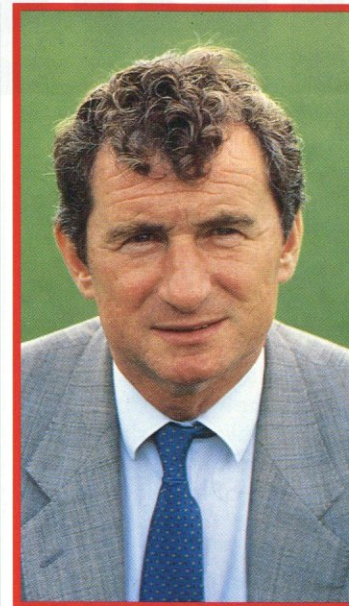
It is also of vital importance that we look closely at ourselves today and strive to retain our interest in the League until the end of the season. There is only one way of achieving that aim, too.

Our supporters have played a major role in helping us over the hurdles. Every player in the land thrives on encouragement but the younger ones have needed it particularly.



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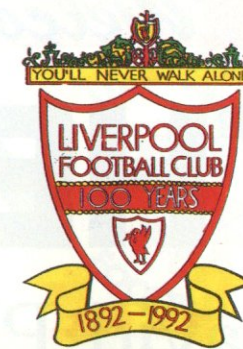

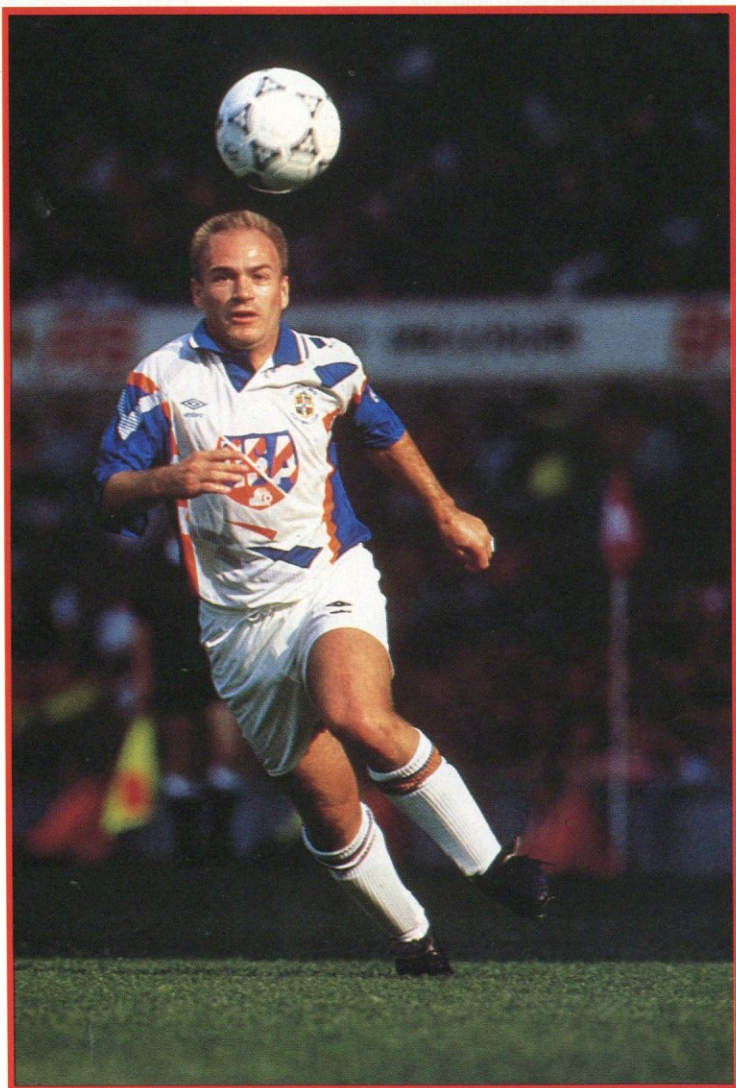

David Pleat's survival squad are capable of shock results

DAVID Pleat was a natural choice when Luton breathed a sigh of relief after their narrow escape from relegation at the end of last season and decided on changes at the top.

Who better to turn to than the manager who had guided them into the First Division in 1982, four years after being placed in charge?

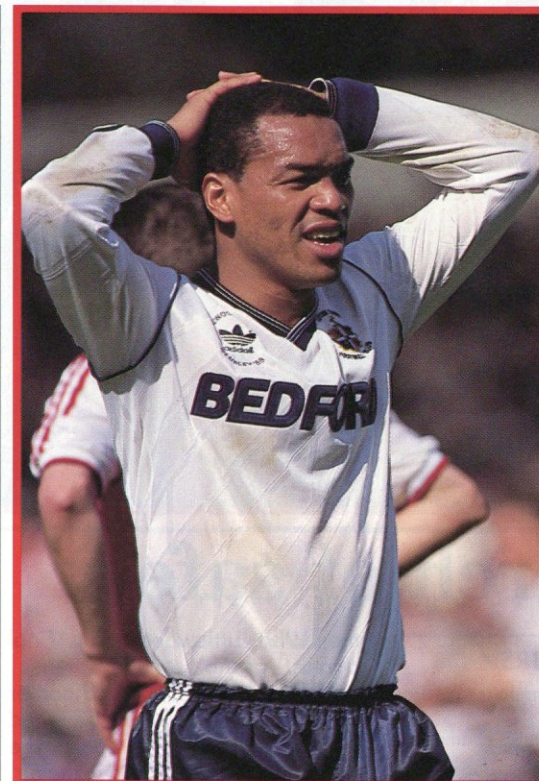
It was at Luton that Pleat made a name for himself both as a player and a manager. His playing career began at Nottingham Forest, but after only half a dozen games he joined Luton in 1964, eventually taking the field with Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough before retiring from active service in 1971.

Three years later he returned as reserve-team coach. By 1978 he had been promoted to first-team coach and then manager, producing first-class teams with limited resources.

Not only did Pleat earn Luton a place in Division One, his reputation rose with them and so did the demand for his services. Spurs wooed him away in 1986 and he achieved one FA Cup Final appearance with them before taking over at Leicester at the end of 1987.

Last June he took on the Luton challenge again, with the highly experienced Colin Murphy, a personal friend, as his assistant. They are finding it tough going, but

GOALKEEPERS

ALEC CHAMBERLAIN: No stranger to Merseyside, where he joined Everton for £75,000 in 1987 and doubled their money a year later by selling him to Luton after a loan spell with Tranmere Rovers.

ANDREW PETTERSON: Australian-born Andy was signed after trials in 1988, giving up his job as a clerk to become a professional.

DEFENDERS

JOHN DREYER: Club captain last

season. Signed from Oxford in 1988 for £140,000 after spells with Torquay and Fulham.

TREVOR PEAKE: Took over the captaincy immediately he signed from Coventry City last August for a bargain £100,000. Won an FA Cup medal with Coventry in 1987.

RICHARD HARVEY: This former England youth international made his debut as a 17-year-old in 1986. Now established as a regular member of the first-team pool.

GRAHAM RODGER: Another of the Coventry Cup-winners. He joined Luton in the summer of 1989. Now he is forming a part-

nership in the middle of the defence with his old teammate Peake. Has four England Under-21 caps.

PAUL HOLSGROVE: A £25,000 signing from Wokingham 12 months ago who is on the fringes of the first-team.

DES LINTON: A promising young right-back who moved to Luton in an exchange deal and made his debut in a 1-0 defeat at Norwich on October 26.

MIDFIELD

DARRON McDONOUGH: Has been a regular in the Luton midfield for five years since an £85,000

transfer from Oldham Athletic, for whom he played more than 200 first-team games.

MARK PEMBRIDGE: A trainee who has really progressed since making his debut on New Year's Day, 1991. He is now a first-team regular in the centre of midfield and won his first full cap for Wales against Brazil last September.

PAUL TELFER: Another YTS success. At 19 he has won an extended run in the senior team.

DAVID PREECE: Has held first team status since his £150,000 recruitment from Walsall in 1984. He has three England B caps and has played in two Littlewoods Cup Finals.

CERI HUGHES: A Welsh international who returned this season after a long lay-off and made 17 appearances before his luck ran out again and he picked up a serious ligament injury.

HONOURS

Second Division champions: season 1981-82.

Third Division (South) champions: season 1936-37.

Fourth Division champions: season 1987-88.

CHRIS KAMARA: Joined Luton at the end of October after experiencing First Division football with Leeds last season. Since his career began in 1975 he has been with Portsmouth (twice), Swindon (twice), Brentford and Stoke.

FORWARDS

BRIAN STEIN: Returned to Kenilworth Road last summer on a free transfer after spending three years in France with first Caen, then Second Division Annecy. Had previously had a great career with the Hatters, starting in 1977, earning England recognition with his scoring feats, and signing off with two goals in his last game...

the 1988 Littlewoods Cup Final against Arsenal.

MICK HARFORD: Another ex-England man who has rejoined Luton for a second spell. The powerful striker is feared in the air. It cost Pleat £325,000 to bring him back from Derby County.

SEAN FARRELL: Started the season in attack, but has only recently returned from a loan spell with Northampton Town.

PHILIP GRAY: Former Tottenham junior who found chances limited at White Hart Lane and was happy to move in a £275,000 deal just before the start of the season.

KURT HOGAN: Former trainee who has scored goals regularly for the Reserves and makes valuable contributions from the first-team subs' bench.

SCOTT OAKES: Scott joined Luton from Leicester in the same deal as Des Linton. Has shown he can also play in defence if needed.

The Football Trust is helping the game at all levels.

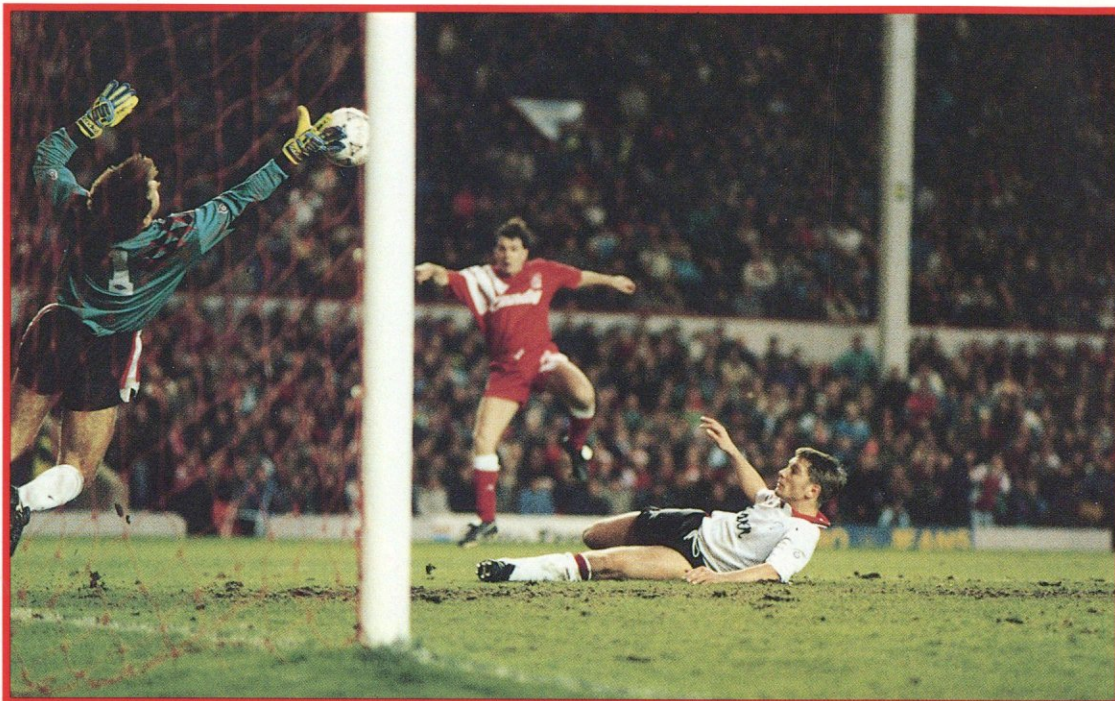
The joy is there for all to see (below). As is the consternation in the Sheffield United defence.

Dean Saunders, (opposite page) clinched it. He and the grounded Steve McManaman watch anxiously as the shot heads for goal – then their faces say the rest.

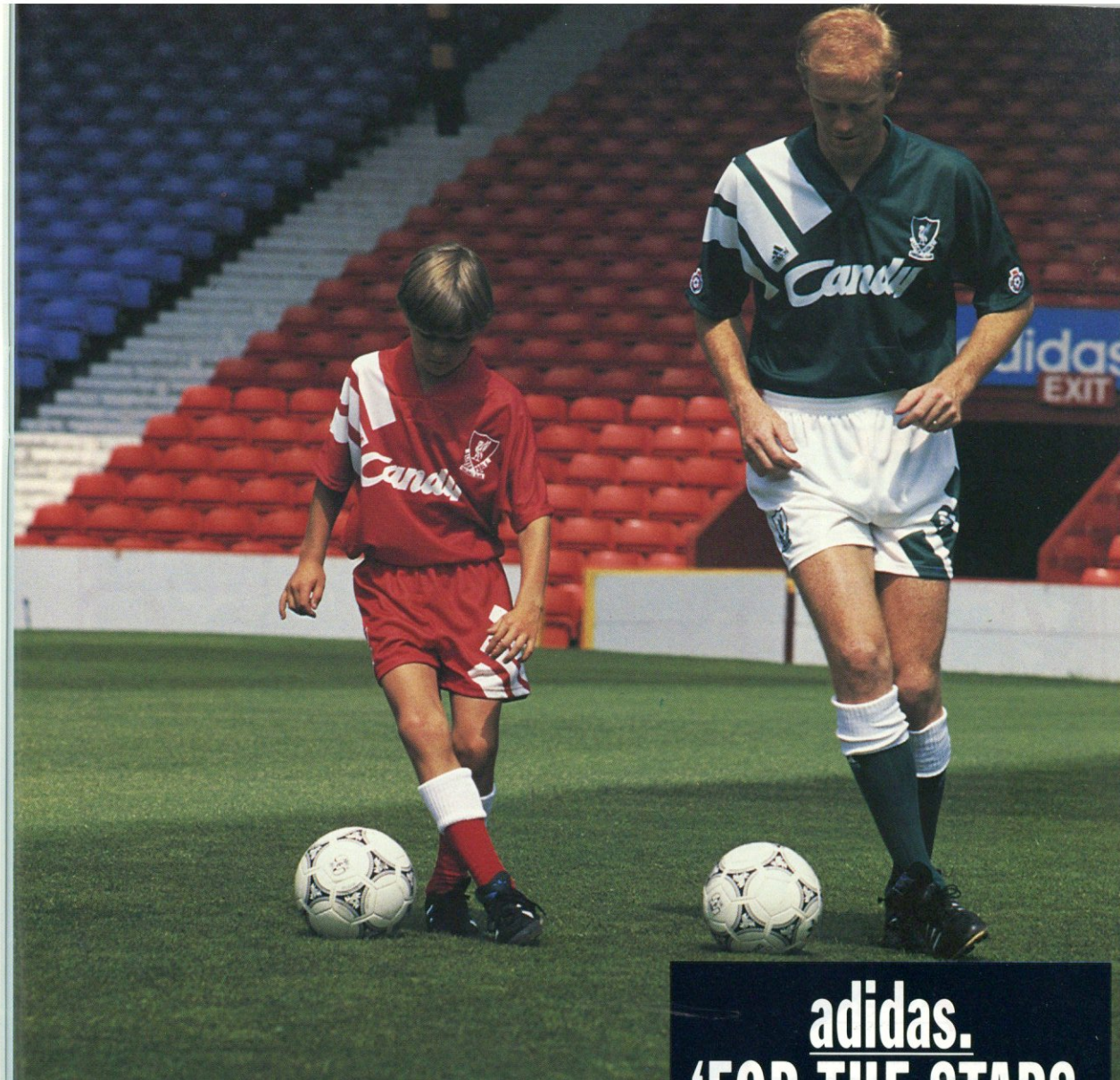

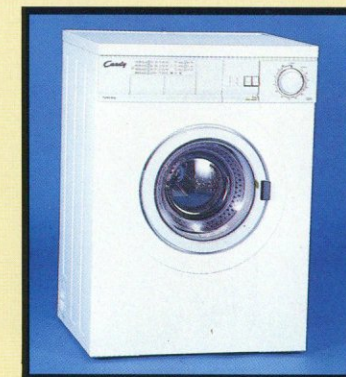



Bricklayer Bob's house of treasure

MODEST Bob Paisley has spent more than 50 years at Liverpool as player, trainer, physiotherapist, coach, manager and director. It is highly unlikely that his distinguished service and fascinating life-story will ever be repeated in the history of football. In his book *Liverpool: The Official Centenary History*, author Stan Liversedge recalls Paisley's arrival at Anfield and the glorious chapters which later unfolded.

This is an extract . . .

Bob Paisley's career at Anfield spotlights the way that Liverpool keep a hold on people. There was a time when his playing days were over when it seemed he might well be on his way back to the North-East and turning his hand to bricklaying again. Thankfully for him and the club, that was not to be.

Paisley arrived at Liverpool on May 8, 1939 as a player. He stayed for more than 50 years and finished up becoming a director of the club.

In the years between his arrival and his elevation to the boardroom, he became arguably the most successful manager British football has ever known as he steered Liverpool to success in almost every competition at home and in Europe.

Only the FA Cup eluded him at home and only the Cup winners Cup failed to arrive at Anfield during Liverpool's European Safari.

When Bob Paisley got off the train at Liverpool's Lime Street station that May day in 1939, he had already made his mark as a footballer with the famed North-Eastern amateur club, Bishop Auckland.

Indeed, Liverpool allowed Bob

to play for Bishops in the Amateur Cup Final so that he could and did collect a winner's medal.

It was a former Liverpool player, Andy McGuigan (he played in the early 1900's) who met Bob at Lime Street and whisked him off to Anfield where, for a £10 signing-on fee and a wage of a fiver a week, Bob put pen to paper.

Terms

Liverpool's manager at the time was George Kay and he had already talked terms to Bob two weeks previously when it was agreed that he could stay on to play for Bishops in the Amateur Final.

Shades of things to come at Liverpool because Bishops had such a fixture jam that they were required to play 13 games in 14 days!

When Bob joined Liverpool he

was in good company because among the players at the club were Matt Busby, the noted South African Berry "Nivvy" Nieuwenhuys, Phil Taylor (a future Liverpool manager) and Billy Liddell, who was in Bob's own age group.

Bob was a mere stripling of 19 when he signed the forms that made him a Liverpool player, but because the war began a few months later, he was to lose to the Army a considerable number of years from his soccer career.

Indeed, his first derby game against Everton came early in the war, when he was released to play in the Liverpool Senior Cup Final against the Blues.

Bob was stationed at a camp in Cheshire which meant that he had to get to the game under his own steam. So he got on his bike and cycled the 30 miles to the ground.

The crowd was estimated at 30,000 – double the official limit –

In addition, Bob Paisley was named Manager of the Year in 1975-76, 1976-77, 1978-79, 1979-80, 1981-82 and 1982-83.

and, at the end of it all, Bob Paisley pondered on whether his journey had really been necessary because Everton won 4-2.

From the Army camp in Cheshire Bob was on the move – by boat, not bike – to Egypt and he spent four years in the desert.

When Rome was liberated by the Allies, Bob rode through the Eternal City on a tank . . . then it was back to England and playing football again as Liverpool competed in regional matches.

He became a first-team regular, seldom missing a match because of injury, and in season 1949-50 helped Liverpool make it to Wembley for the final of the FA Cup.

Before that, though, he had savoured the sweet taste of success. In season 1946-47 Bob had been a member of a team which – after a very poor start – had stormed through to capture the

League Championship.

It was a season in which the club also reached the semi-finals of the FA Cup and won the Liverpool Senior Cup, the Lancashire Senior Cup and the Lancashire County Combination Championship Cup.

By the start of season 1949-50, Bob Paisley had made a century of appearances in a Liverpool jersey and, when the club reached the semi-finals, he scored one of the goals that despatched Everton from the Wembley trail.

However he also collected an injury, so he missed a League game to make sure he would be fit for the FA Cup Final.

It was from the evening paper that he learned he would not be playing. He wouldn't even be on the bench because in those days there were no substitutes.

And from what he could gather, the directors who had chosen the Cup Final side had been divided when it came to deciding between Bob Paisley and Bill Jones.

Four wanted Paisley but five votes went to Jones. Bob sat and watched as Jimmy Logie – the man he would have been detailed to mark – laid on a couple of goals for Reg Lewis as Arsenal won the game and went up to collect the Cup.

Injured Mike lost his chance

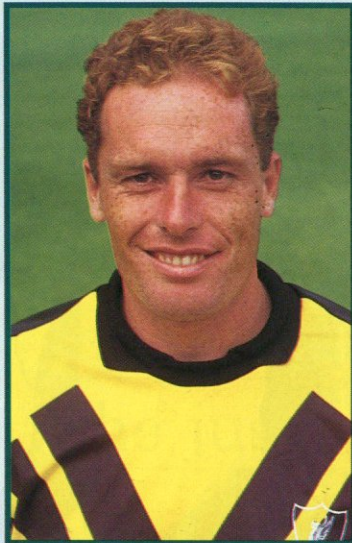
GOALKEEPER Mike Hooper is suffering the longest lay-off of his career because of a split achilles tendon.

His troubles began at Stoke in a Rumbelows Cup-tie three months ago. Intensive treatment has now put him well on the road to recovery.

"It came at an unfortunate time," he says. "Just as I was putting a good run together in the first team."

Fans will remember his excellent performances against Kuusysi Lahti, Manchester United and Stoke City.

He is far from despondent, however, despite the hold-up in his plans. I consider Bruce Grobbelaar and myself to be among the six

Mike is back in training and running under the direction of coach physiotherapist Phil Boersma. He feels that full fitness is not far away and is full of praise for Lillleshall's Rehabilitation Centre, where he had a one-week crash course of treatment.

A sackful of Christmas cards and good wishes from supporters also helped. "The spirit in the place is good. It is still the premier club in the country."

Mike began his career at Bristol City as a part-time professional while he was studying English at Swansea University.

He recalls: "They did not think I was ready for first-team football and let Wrexham have me on loan. After 20 games I became a full-timer at the Racecourse Ground and two months later I was signed by Liverpool."

While some people might have hesitated about the prospect of competing with Bruce Grobbelaar, Mike jumped at the chance. "It was a great opportunity to learn about football at the highest level and I am still learning and improving."

"There is not a better club than Liverpool for maturing you both as player and a person."

best keepers in the land," he says confidently. "All I want to do is to pick up where I left off."

Mike was appointed reserve-team captain at the start of the season and regarded his selection as an honour.

"Other clubs may have taken that lightly, but not this one. I would not have been approached unless I was capable of motivating players and setting a good all-round example."



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RONNIE Whelan is hoping that his season of torment is coming to an end.

Four months of watching and waiting have not gone down well with the long-serving action man.

"This has been the worst chapter of my career," he declares. "The frustrations have gone on and on."

Ronnie's problems began against Everton on the last day of August. His injury was diagnosed as cartilage trouble, but he still suffered some pain after an operation.

A further examination revealed some fatty tissue and a specialist in Cambridge was consulted.

Ronnie is jogging back to fitness

"Now I am back and jogging," Ronnie reports happily. "I am also building up my knee muscles and the soreness is easing."

He refuses point-blank to put a date on his return. He has set targets before and they have led to bitter disappointments.

"Hopefully it will not be too long before I am back in action, but that

is all I will say at the moment."

Ronnie, like Mike Hooper, has had a week of intensive treatment at Lillleshall and was due another visit earlier this month.

"All I want is the all-clear . . . to be back and playing again."

A whole army of well-wishers share that hope.

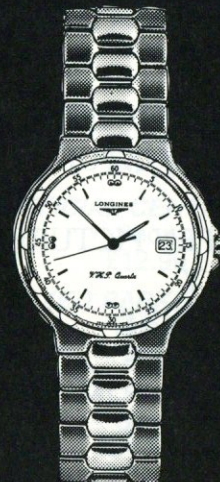
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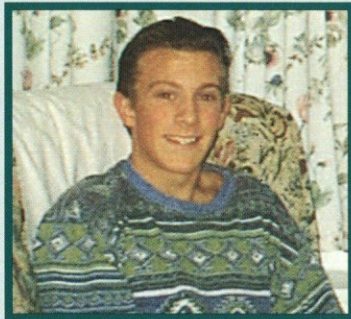
Hall of fame?

"It was important that he made his own choice," says Brian. "Ex-players' sons have to suffer direct comparisons all their lives and he may have felt that a start at Deepdale would be better for him."

"He loves the life and I do offer him advice from the experiences I had."

Andrew, like any former player's son, treasures old Liverpool team pictures and Dad's medals.

"It is a matter of so far, so good," says a cautious Brian. "He is aware of the pitfalls and percentages of success and failure in football. He has a long way to go."

THERE would have been no more popular choice as man of the match than Ray Houghton, who scored another invaluable League goal against Sheffield United.

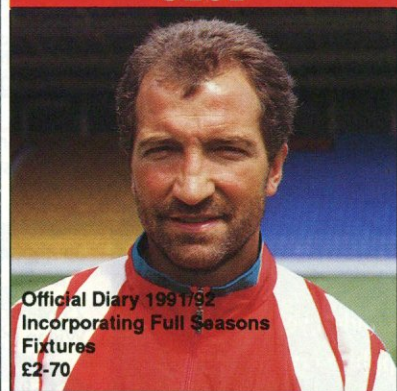
The Republic of Ireland international's excellent form this season has been a key factor in the team's battle against unprecedented injury problems.

The model student is taking a tough route to the top

THE excellent progress of 16-year-old Phil Charnock has been carefully monitored by our coaching staff.

He could be presented as a model student after topping 30 games this season between the Youth team, the A team and the Reserves. Proof, indeed, that age is no drawback at Anfield.

He has also been made aware of the long and hazardous road ahead of him . . . he needs more stamina and his mental reaction has still to be examined at top level.

Can he cope with criticism when unveiled before 40,000 fans? Can he recover quickly when he is responsible for a breakdown in play?

There are a dozen obstacles he has still to encounter. The early signs are encouraging.

Phil came through our Centre of Excellence as a 12-year-old, signed schoolboy forms two years later and is now on the YTS scheme. He is moving in the right direction and scored his first two goals for the Reserves recently against Newcastle United.

He is a left-sided midfielder player and his attitude has pleased us. We also realise that he rises at seven o' clock each morning in order to reach Anfield for other duties like cleaning the corridors, the dressing-rooms, the baths and the boots.

But he handles the jobs well and the fact that he has 30 games under his belt – half in the Reserves – speaks volumes for his ambition.

Boys cannot appreciate the shock which full-time training delivers to the system, but Phil is learning quickly. He can take pleasure from his progress so far, but must also realise that the last stop on the line is hard to reach.

We suffer a close-down for about three weeks in the Pontins League and that is not good news for anybody. Continuity is lost.

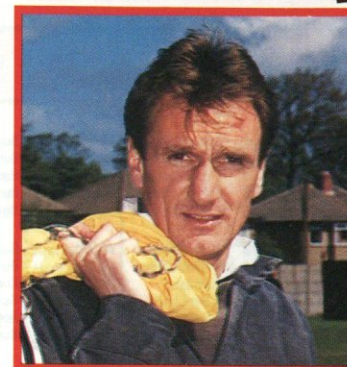
We play few games on Saturdays, too, and that presents problems on another scale... I happen to believe that every footballer has the right to play on that particular day of the week.
