
injuries. A couple of posers to ponder:

Our fixtures against Norwich City usually have a special atmosphere and I am sure that will be the case this afternoon as we welcome our friends from Norfolk to Kenilworth Road. These days we all tend to look upon this match as a regional derby, if not a local one, and that helps to explain why we are also pleased to see Anglia Television here for the second successive Luton Town home match.

Both the Canaries and ourselves were regular attenders at the League's Group Four regional meetings and I am sure the foundations of friendship and friendly rivalry which our close proximity has developed between all the Group Four clubs has been a good thing for all of us and certainly a good thing for football throughout the region.

That is why it is so nice to see the Anglia cameras here again to film the action for their very enjoyable programme *Goals Galore* which is screened on Sundays. I have become a regular viewer in recent times and I am sure many of our supporters have too.

Commentator Gerry Harrison, that well-known Norwich City supporter (only joking,

Gerry!), is always prepared to speak out and say what he thinks and usually reflects what the fans feel too. Last week, for instance, when he was considering the entertainment provided by some of the recent live televised games, he quite rightly asked when we could expect to see Luton Town or Norwich City scheduled to provide the live action.

It is a good question as I am sure both sets of fans here would like to see a match involving their team on television. The only consolation at the moment is that, with all the goalless draws, we are at least getting an opportunity to have a good satisfying snooze on Sunday afternoons.

On a different note, it is a pleasure to congratulate Mark Pembridge on his recent selection for the Wales 'A' friendly against the Republic of Ireland. This fixture is due to be played at the Royal Dublin Showground on February 19 and gives Mark a chance to confirm his place in the Welsh squad. Kurt Nogan has also been contacted by the Welsh and placed on standby.

Congratulations are also in order for another of our promising youngsters, Paddy

McDonagh, on his selection for the Republic of Ireland's under-16 squad. We wish them all the best of luck.

Many of our supporters, like our manager and the team, were very disappointed last month when our re-arranged fixture at Selhurst Park against Crystal Palace was called off again. This has left us with a problem in trying to find a new date for the game, which was originally scheduled to be played last December 15.

Owing to a series of complications relating to Palace's fixture list and the television schedules, the game will now be played as a midweek fixture later this season. At the time of writing, Palace still have to settle their Rumbelows Cup tie with Nottingham Forest and could then meet Tottenham Hotspur in the semi-finals in what may be televised games.

All this could have an effect on Spurs' schedule too - they also have to fit their European Cup Winners' Cup games - and could result in our scheduled meeting with them on March 11 being under threat. It is difficult to guarantee exactly what the outcome will be until the television decisions are resolved.

On the footballing front, it was a pleasure last Monday when we played Watford to see so many players off the injured list and back in action, especially Mick O'Brien who has been out for 27 months, I think, since breaking his leg in a Friday night Combination fixture at Carrow Road. There was a great sense of pleasure around the club at seeing Mick back in action and we all hope his 60-minutes' return is just the first step in a full recovery of his form and fitness.

Finally, a word about the success and generosity of one of our local fanzines 'Mad as a Hatter', which, contrary to much popular opinion, the club welcome and enjoy. I recently received a call from Mark Irvinson, on behalf of the fanzine, who told me that they had generated a profit of £500 which they wished to donate for the benefit of the players and the club.

As a result, I spoke to our physio Brian Owen and the 'Mad as a Hatter' money will be used to purchase two mountain bikes and a rowing machine which will be of great benefit in helping players recover from injury. And that is an ambition I am sure everyone will applaud.

It is a vital time for us all. We need to collect as many points as possible from now on. Our fans have been very loud at recent home games. Keep cheering. We are all putting in maximum effort. Things will come right - starting this afternoon we hope.



The league season so far has not been a particularly vintage one by Norwich's own high standards and, at the time of writing, they are placed mid-table with 33 points from 26 games, eleven points ahead of the Town. Their main problem in recent weeks has been the inability to win away from home, losing each of their five league matches - at Liverpool (1-2), Manchester City (1-2), Tottenham (0-3), and Sheffield United (0-1) in the league and Tottenham (1-2) in the Rumbelows Cup.

Though this season's inconsistency has been a disappointment to Canaries' fans, it is not entirely unexpected after losing another of their prized assets, namely leading goalscorer Dale Gordon to Glasgow Rangers in a £1.5 million deal. Gordon is yet another big name to leave Carrow Road in the last couple of seasons, following in the footsteps of Andy Townsend and Andy Linighan, who both moved in £1 million deals last season to Chelsea and Arsenal respectively.

Manager Mr Stringer has learned to cope with losing such players adequately enough by making some inspired signings of his own, and still sticking

to the principles of playing neat, attractive football. Players such as captain Mark Bowen, David Phillips and Paul Blades have all been signed for relatively small fees, judging by today's inflated prices, and have settled into the side with ease.

Mr Stringer's latest signing, Darren Beckford, will be hoping to fit in as comfortably as the aforementioned players this season. He joined the club for a record fee of £925,000 after five prolific seasons at Second Division Port Vale, and despite taking time to adjust to his new surroundings, looks set for a much improved second-half to the season. Rob Newman is Mr Stringer's other pre-season signing. Signed from Bristol City, Rob is experiencing Division One football for the first time this season after ten full years at Ashton Gate.

With the mix of inspired signings and the emergence of youngsters such as Robert Ullathorne, Chris Sutton and Daryl Sutch, Mr Stringer will be hoping to consolidate in the league this season and again prove their worth in the FA Cup.

With many footballing sides, success tends to come via cup runs rather than winning league titles. This is particularly true of Norwich who have been to two FA Cup semi-finals in recent years and have also won the League (Milk) Cup. This

season the Canaries are still on course for another semi-final appearance with a fourth round tie against Millwall (played earlier this week), the winners facing Blackburn in round five. The Canaries also reached the fifth round of the Rumbelows Cup before going out at Tottenham Hotspur 2-1 after leading 1-0 through a Robert Fleck goal. Fleck is currently enhancing his international credentials with some spectacular goals this season and is currently leading the Norwich scoring lists with 16 goals.

Norwich City were formed in 1902, largely through the initiative of two local schoolmasters who called a meeting at the Criterion Cafe, they were shocked by an FA Commission which in 1904 declared the club professional and ejected them from the FA Amateur Cup. However, this only served to strengthen their determination. New officials were appointed and a professional club was established at a meeting at the Agricultural Hall in March 1905.

Mr Stringer is the club's 13th post-war manager in a list which includes such names as George Swindin, Ron Saunders and John Bond. The Milk Cup success in 1985 was the club's last major honour, having previously won the League Cup in 1962, the Second Division crown in 1972 and 1986 and the Division Three (south) title in 1934.


BRYAN GUNN (goalkeeper) - Bryan is in his sixth season at Carrow Road. Signed from Aberdeen for £100,000 in 1986, he started his career with Invergordon before the Dons signed him in 1980. He went on to make 13 appearances at Pittodrie but he remained understudy to Jim Leighton, both for club and country.

DAVID PHILLIPS (defender) - Wales international David started his league career at Plymouth Argyle, making his debut as a raw 18-year-old in 1981. After two full seasons at Home Park he was signed by Manchester City and, despite scoring 12 goals from midfield in his first season, he was transferred to Coventry a year later. He joined Norwich for £500,000 in 1989 and has now played over 100 league games for the Canaries.

MARK BOWEN (defender) - Club captain, Mark joined Norwich from Tottenham for £90,000 in 1987 after failing to gain a regular place at White Hart Lane. He has since gone on to become one of the First Division's most competent right-backs and is now an established member of the Welsh national side.

PAUL BLADES (defender) - Signed from Derby County for £500,000 two seasons ago, Paul served his apprenticeship at the Baseball Ground, making his league debut v Leeds United in 1982. He has settled in to the Norwich side well last term and formed a useful partnership with Ian Butterworth earlier in the season.

IAN BUTTERWORTH (defender) - Ian started his career with Coventry, making his debut v Swansea in 1982. He made more than 100 league appearances for the Highfield Road club before joining Nottingham Forest in 1985. The move did not work out for Ian and he was transferred to Norwich the following season for £160,000.

JOHN POLSTEN (defender) - John started his career at Tottenham, making his debut v Coventry in 1986. A former England Youth international, he was limited to 24 league appearances for Spurs and signed for Norwich in 1989.


COLIN WOODTHORPE (defender) - Signed in the summer of 1990 from Chester City, Colin has recently had an extended run in the first team. He made his Football League debut as a 17-year-old v Bury in 1986 and spent four full seasons at Sealand Road.

DARREN BECKFORD (forward) - Darren, like his brother Jason, started his career with his local club Manchester City. He never really established himself at Maine Road and in 1987 he moved to Port Vale. It was at Vale Park that his goalhunting ability really flourished, scoring nearly 60 league goals in four seasons. Norwich signed Darren for a club record fee of £925,000 and his skills have also been used in defence this season, as emergency goalkeeper.

ROBERT FLECK (forward) - Robert has been the Canaries' leading goalscorer for the past three seasons, form which many feel deserves a recall to the Scottish international side. He started his career with Partick Thistle before joining Glasgow giants, Rangers, in 1984. Norwich paid a then club record fee of £580,000 to sign Robert in 1988.

RUEL FOX (forward) - A player who is a vital member of the Canaries' squad, Ruel joined Norwich from apprentice and made his debut in 1986. Although he has never really been able to secure a regular first-team place, Ruel has made valuable contributions from the substitutes' bench.

Meet the Boss



DAVID STRINGER

Born in Great Yarmouth on October 15, 1944, Mr Stringer's footballing career started off rather disappointingly with unsuccessful trials at Arsenal and Crystal Palace.


An England Youth international, David made the grade with Norwich City, establishing himself as a very competent right-back. He eventually moved into the centre of defence where he formed a formidable partnership with current Norwich Chief Scout, Duncan Forbes. David was a member of two Norwich promotion squads from the Second Division to First, and played in two League Cup Final teams.

After 499 senior appearances for the Canaries he moved on to Cambridge United, where he helped them gain promotion from the Fourth Division to the Second Division.

David's successful association with Norwich City continued when, in 1980, he was appointed Youth team coach, guiding his side to victory in the 1983 F.A. Youth Cup. He then became Reserve team coach before succeeding Ken Brown as Manager in November 1987.

Norwich City have since achieved their highest ever league position, 4th in 1988-89 and an F.A. Cup semi-final in the same season.

John Dreyer

A player who has experienced three successful relegation battles with the Town, John Dreyer knows exactly what to expect in the coming months. Now forming a stable partnership with Trevor Peake at centre-back, 'Tumble', as he is known to many fans, has every confidence going into the final third of the season.

"This squad is a lot stronger than Luton sides I've played for in previous seasons. We now have a good blend of experienced professionals and young skilful players who have a big future in the game. Luck has certainly gone against us this season and our lowly position doesn't justify our form of recent weeks."

Reflecting on the team's current position further, John points to the side's frequent inability to hold out for the full 90 minutes of a game.

"It has been very frustrating giving away so many points in the final few minutes of a game. I believe we have thrown away 15 league points this way and should, in effect, be lying about half-way in Division One and pushing for a top ten finish. It has got to the stage where, towards the end of game, we are aware of what has been happening and tend to sit back and defend instead of playing our natural game. The game at Sheffield Wednesday last weekend was a very good example - but it is something we must overcome to reflect our true league position."

Despite the Luton 'goals against' tally being particularly high this season, John has now formed a steady partnership with Trevor Peake, a combination which can only get better with time.

"I can't speak highly enough of Trevor. As an experienced player he gives us all advice, reads the game well and is an influence on the younger players. He is a fine acquisition for the club, likewise, David Pleat's other experienced signings, Chris Kamara and Mick Harford.

"I know my own form is a lot better this season, especially compared to last. I've always said last term was a bit of a 'write-off' as far as my own form was concerned. A stomach injury nagged me throughout, which meant I lost my pace, probably my biggest asset. Now I feel I have re-captured the form of old and feel settled, especially as we now have a settled back four."

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The Africans are on their way

African football is the rising force in the world game, but is struggling for recognition. Timothy Collings recently spent two weeks in Senegal at the African Nations Cup finals, billed as the continent's top international tournament. The football, however was less entertaining than expected.....

The dust and sand from the Sahara had stopped blowing, thankfully, as what threatened to become the most boring and interminable cup final of my football-watching experience drew to a close. It was 0-0, in extra time, and yet another simple chance was missed. The penalty, for the spectators at the humid, hot and sultry Stade de l'Amitié in Dakar, was a penalty shootout between Ivory Coast and Ghana to decide the outcome of the African Nations Cup final.

Unbelievably, it went on and on and on.... One player from each side missed during the opening round. Soon it was 6-6, then 8-8 and in a tournament when few players could hit the target, we faced a scoreline which showed it was 10-10 on penalties after a 0-0 draw following extra time. Even the non-stop drumbeat of the rhythmic Ivorian fans was silenced as, with the score 11-10 in their favour, Ghana captain Anthony Baffoe, an elegant pig-tailed libero who plays in Germany for Fortuna Düsseldorf, stepped up for the 24th spot-kick of what seemed an interminable series.

His shot was low and to the goalkeeper's right and was saved by Alain Gouamene. The 'Elephants' had won their first trophy in their first appearance in the African final and the place exploded with celebrations. In the press box, the long faces were creased with smiles. At least it was over. Even if Ghana, the rightful winners of the tournament, had been beaten in a match which had seen their captain Abedi Pele, the African Footballer of the Year, sitting on the touchlines.

Pele, the Olympique Marseille star who rooms with Chris Waddle, had been cautioned twice during the finals - the first time the African Nations Cup finals had been expanded to include 12 nations - and had been suspended for the big one. This was a tragedy as his skills, his goals and his ability to light up a match had made him the star of the tournament.

His absence, for the Africans, had ultimately devalued the competition. A worldwide television audience had been waiting for spectacular entertainment and confirmation that the African game had reached a new level of achievement in readiness for the qualifying tournament for the 1994 World Cup finals in America, where, for the first time, there will be three African nations taking part.

Unfortunately, the spectacle was not provided even if the level of skill, technique and invention on view was of the highest calibre. The team game, alas, was not on a par with that of the individuals. The coaching was defensive and there were too many low-scoring games filled with dreary football.

For this observer, the lasting memory of Senegal '92 will be of the atmosphere around the teams' hotel - where they all shared lodgings, ate together and played together - was of the 'business' side of the game. There were agents from every country in Europe, bar Britain, and deals done under every palm tree.

The Italians were busy in a big way. Domenico Ricci, who has launched a company specialising in the management and development of African football, talked about Juventus spending millions of dollars in Africa, helping with coaching and management and eventually controlling the game and the transfer market. The French too were there in a big way and so were the Germans, Belgians, Swiss, Spanish and Portuguese.

The best players were the Ghanaians - Pele, Nii Lamptey of Anderlecht and Co - and the Nigerians. They all spoke English too, which made life easier. But it did not explain why there were no British agents, representatives or scouts around to examine the best football talent on offer from the former British colonies.

After all both Ghana and Nigeria are former British colonies and here at Kenilworth Road a former Nigerian striker Emeka Nwajiobi is remembered fondly. Strong, skilful and quick, he typified the Nigerian style. It is easy to see many of their current team making the grade in the English game - where the Fashanus, Reuben Agboola and John Chiedozie, as well as Emeka, have shown the way.

The technical and physical side of their game is good enough, in this observer's view, even if the tactics employed result so often in low-scoring games with little real effort put into organised attacking play with width. The talent is there. That is why Ghana and Nigeria had 26 European-based professionals in their squads for the African finals and why Dakar was filled with scouts and reporters from all over Europe. Even if the finals produced disappointing entertainment in the heat, there was no ignoring the fact that the Africans are on the way.



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
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

'Punch McEwen' – an extra-ordinary character

I quite frequently receive letters passed on to me by the club requesting historical or statistical information, with many asking for details of long-forgotten players of the past.

One such letter was recently sent by the great-grandson of James "Punch" McEwen and research revealed a fascinating story of a player who turned out for the Town almost a century ago and whose name is also interwoven in the history of today's visitors, Norwich City.

Despite being referred to as a Scot throughout his life, James McEwen was born in Liverpool in 1874 and gained a name for himself as a tenacious full-back for Liverpool South End before joining the Town on June 12, 1894, just at the time the club were about to enter the Southern League as founder members.

Standing only 5 feet 5 inches tall, but weighing 11 stone, McEwen made his Luton debut at left-back in a friendly against Mr H Roston-Bourke's XI on September 1, 1894. He soon established himself in the side as the Town finished runners-up to Millwall in the inaugural season.

After four seasons as a virtual ever-present it came as a great surprise when, after the club had finally joined the Football League, crowd favourite McEwen decided to leave Luton and sign for Glossop who he helped into Division One at the first attempt.

After two years at Glossop he moved further up the ladder when he signed for Bury, then one of the football powers of the land. McEwen was virtually ever-present in a side that finished in the top ten in Division One in his three seasons there, culminating in a 6-0 win over Derby County in the 1903 FA Cup Final.

Whether it was due to a difference of opinion or whether he was regarded as too old it is not recorded, but McEwen left Bury shortly after the FA Cup win and re-joined Luton much to the joy of Luton supporters who had not seen him adequately replaced in his five years away.

Luton Town had two further good years out of McEwen before he left the club for the last time in the summer of 1905 to join Norwich City who had just been elected to the Southern League and had newly-adopted professionalism.

McEwen was immediately made captain and after two years, was appointed to the position of player-manager just as Norwich changed their colours from blue and white to the more familiar yellow and green. An injury during the first home game of 1908/09 (the first Southern League fixture to be played at the Nest) effectively ended McEwen's playing career and with it his managerial position, for shortly afterwards he left Norwich in mysterious circumstances to take up the manager's post at Glossop, one of his former clubs.

His spell at Glossop was not altogether successful and as the club eventually sunk further down successive Division Two league tables towards eventual demise, McEwen resigned and joined the coaching staff at Fulham for a short period before accepting a similar position at Arsenal just before the outbreak of World War One.


McEwen was appointed acting manager of Arsenal throughout the war before reverting to the role of coach/trainer as soon as hostilities ceased.

He stayed at Arsenal for the remainder of his career and following his death in Barnes on May 28, 1944, Gunners manager George Allison said at his funeral: "He was a brilliant footballer and had extra-ordinary character as a coach. He had a well-developed sense of humour, and even when coaching his team for something as serious as a Cup Final, was still the humourist, bullying and cajoling his team with humour and a never-ending string of funny stories. Although he refused to take anything seriously he was greatly responsible for the successes of the Arsenal team."

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

Opinion: Should we let the strugglers die?

Earlier this month, Crystal Palace director Simon Hume-Kendall resigned from the First Division club to save Aldershot from almost certain extinction.

The Shots would have gone under in 1990 had it not been for the intervention of a young man who promised so much, but delivered so little.

The question which arises is: should league clubs who experience financial difficulties be bailed out like this? Would it not be better for an ambitious non-league club to take their place?

Traditionalists, believe clubs should be helped over a low period and are quick to point out that the First Division today contains several clubs who would not be around if those who cared so passionately had not fought to save them.

Take Luton Town, for instance. After relegation from the First Division in 1975, the outlook was bleak to say the least. The club would probably have gone out of business had it not been for the

determination of director Denis Mortimer. Mr Mortimer refused to let the club die, and by selling players and re-financing the club, he successfully turned around the situation.

It took time, but in 1982 the club returned to the First Division where they have remained ever since.

Our opponents today, Norwich City, are another club who have been saved from almost certain closure. During the early post-war years, the Canaries were one of the poorest sides in Division Three, both on and off the pitch. When the club were forced to apply for re-election for a third time, many thought they were not worth saving. But a small and loyal band of fans from the Norwich City Supporter's Club refused to concede defeat. They rallied round and collected thousands of pounds to keep the club that they cared about alive.

The other side to the argument is should struggling league clubs be kept afloat when there

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are many ambitious non-league clubs waiting anxiously to take their place?

Wimbledon, Cambridge United, Wigan, and more recently Scarborough and Barnet have all proved that such clubs can succeed in the 'big time' and, more importantly, be successful as well.

There are many clubs in the Vauxhall Conference whose grounds and, more often than not, crowds, are superior to those in the Fourth Division. Wycombe Wanderers, Colchester United, Telford, Yeovil and Kettering are all clubs which fall into this category.

Over the past 70 years we have seen only two clubs – Wigan Borough and Accrington Stanley – lose their league status through financial difficulties.

In the current economic climate are things about to change?
