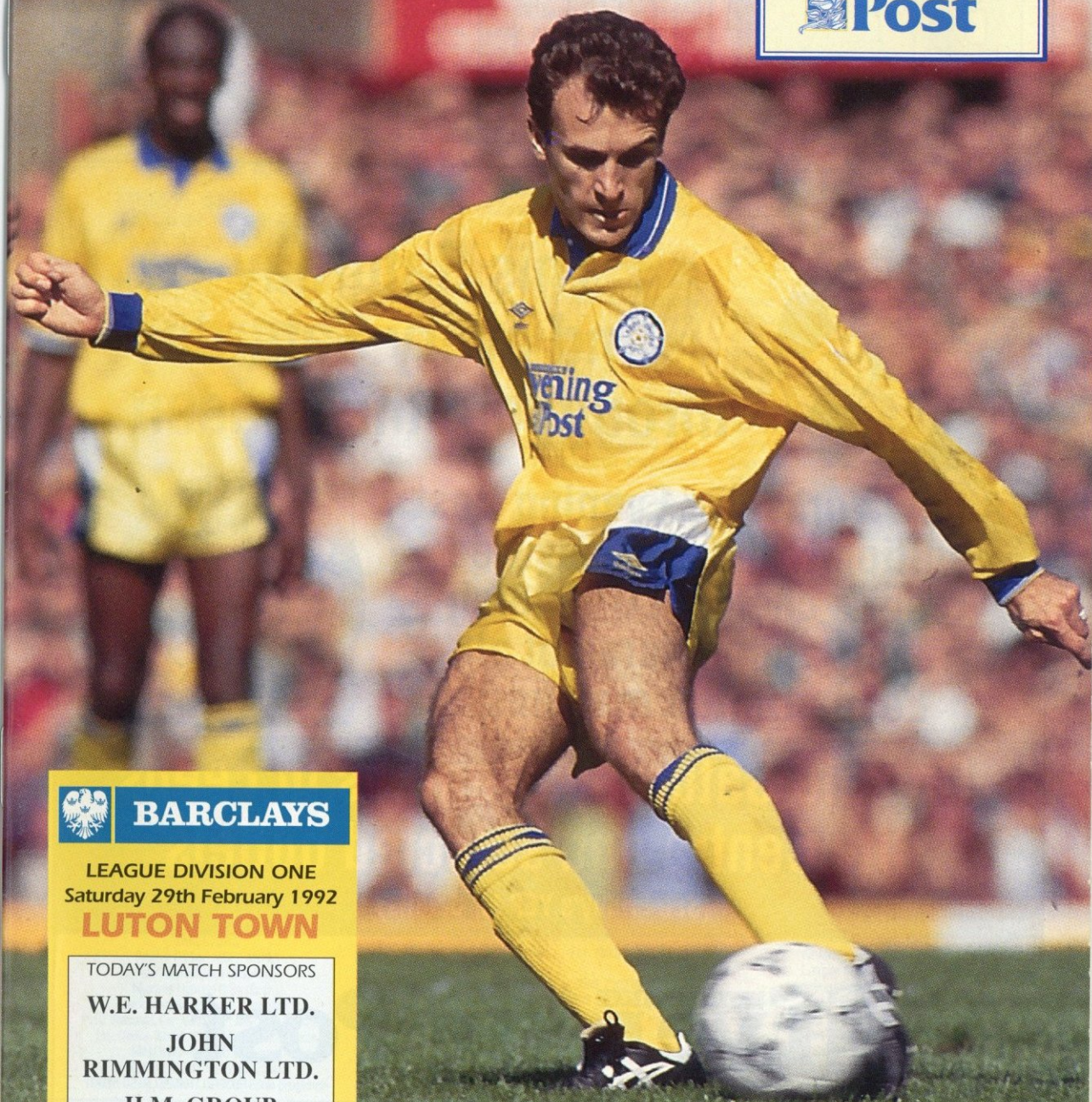

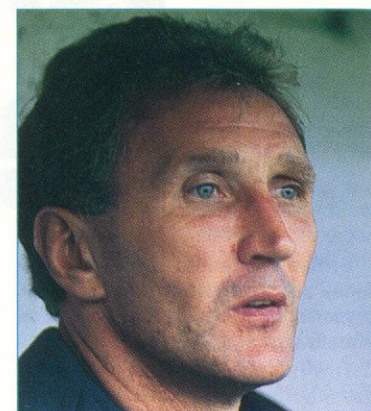
HOWARD'S WAY

Diego Maradona could not have commanded greater press media attention than did Eric Cantona, when he appeared as a substitute at Oldham. It certainly had my lot scratching their heads, a little bewildered by it all. But then perhaps it is indicative of the way we in this country constantly underestimate the ability, quality and professional standing of the lads who perform week in, week out, in the English First Division.

The general level of professional football in this country is extremely high, I think higher than in most others. It's only when you examine contenders for the term 'world class' do we fail to make that overall general superiority play. I personally think that's more to do with how we view football in general than with the talent of those available.

Eric has been well and truly welcomed to the Football League. His 45 minutes at Oldham and the game at Everton will have removed any doubts, if doubts he had, as to the level of competition. Personally I don't think he'll have been too surprised. He's seen enough in the past to become a convert and it was that very passion and intensity of it all that was for him the big attraction. It's strange that those things which so strongly attracted him, should be among his biggest problems now.

Having said that, it is important to remember the tremendous difficulties he is having to overcome virtually every hour of each day. He's learning the language very quickly, but it's still a massive problem especially in the hurly burly of the game. Having lived most of his life in the South of France, around Marseille, the climate, food and culture of northern England are a big change for him. So the challenge is enormous, it's not just the football, it's a way of life he has to deal with. But, he's talented, has the physique and power and says



he relishes and will overcome the challenge. Certainly everybody is trying hard to understand and be as helpful as possible in the meantime.

Coincidentally, David Pleat Manager of Luton Town, has personal experience of a similar situation having signed Raddy Antic from Yugoslavia, during his last spell at Luton. Antic eventually succeeded and in fact went on to work in Spain. In fact he was coach at Real Madrid until they sacked him recently after an excellent run to the season. Unfortunately Luton's start was just the opposite, but recently they've shown signs of promising the sort of revival for which they were once renowned.

Having commenced the last third of the season last Sunday at Everton, we are rapidly approaching the so called run-in. We have a regular run of Saturday games to look forward to and with such a big prize at stake, it's important we click into the smoother sort of performances we were turning out before the cups, postponements and re-arrangement of games, upset the tempo of our season.

Football's best deal

Britain's favourite Bond kicks off today and the United Bond office is prepared for a flood of applications as literally anyone can apply.

The launch of the United Bond gathered momentum last week when Howard Wilkinson became a star of the small screen with the latest 'Bond Movie' - the United Bond TV commercial - and fans at Goodison were given leaflets outlining the benefits of the United Bond.

The TV commercial is being screened again today as Leeds United goes down in history as the first English club to promote a "Bond" scheme on television.

A decision to officially launch the United Bond was made following meetings with the Supporters Club Executive and after the results from market research were made available to the club.

Said Chairman Leslie Silver: "The results were remarkable. Eighty three per cent of those interviewed thought the United Bond scheme was a good idea and once we heard the comments from the Supporters Club we were confident that the United Bond was set to be a success."

Praise has also come from the



press. Whilst other first division clubs have provoked angry reaction, the United Bond scheme has been applauded for its package of benefits and for the careful consultation with supporters.

The Sunday Express commented: "Take a bow Leeds!" "Sit-downs at West Ham, protests at Arsenal.... Step forward Leeds."

But it's the package of benefits that supporters from any part of the ground, whether they hold a season ticket or not at present, can receive in return for purchasing the £500 United Bond, which sets the Leeds scheme apart.

Here are some of them.

*£100 discounts on season tickets for seven years. (Seasons 93/94 to 99/2000.)

*Season ticket prices fixed for seven years based on 92/93 season adjusting for no more than inflation or changes in tax or levies that affect ticket prices.

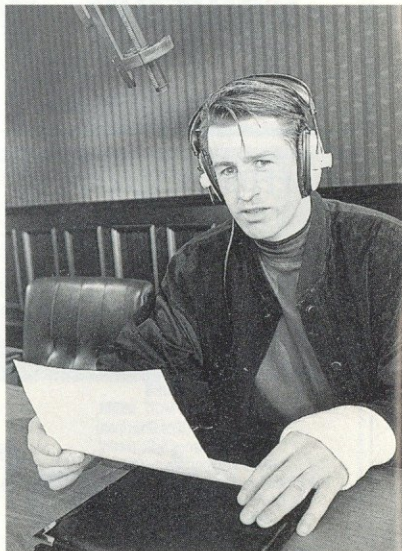
Others, such as easy payment terms, have also been put in place which all in all make up a package of genuine benefits.

By now, most season ticket and premier card holders will have received a letter from Team Manager Howard Wilkinson inviting them to apply for the United Bond.

The letter includes essential information about the United Bond along with answers to some questions raised by supporters on areas such as payment.

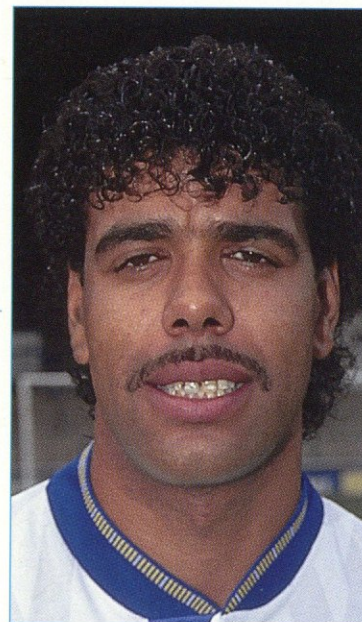

THIRD TIME LUCKY?

Midfielder Chris Kamara returns to Elland Road with Luton today - hoping it will be third time lucky and aiming to saviour the occasion more than the clash with his former team-mates at Kenilworth Road in December.

Kamara, happily back to fitness after his long term ankle problems at Leeds, has never appeared on the winning side as one of the "enemy" at Elland Road.

He said: "I came here with Swindon Town and then Stoke City and we were beaten.

Leeds always had good gates in those days but nothing like the 30,000 they are getting now and today will be my first time here as an opponent in front of a full house.

"I know what the atmosphere can be like from my Leeds days and people will probably be looking to me as one of the experienced players in a game which is vital to both sides.

"But our youngsters are okay. People say losing to late goals as we have done recently is down to inexperience but I think it is more down to concentration.

"The side has been built by David Pleat to play football - you have got to be able to pass the ball to turn out for Luton - and we are capable of staying up.

"I would say the only match we have really deserved to come out with nothing during the past two or three months was the one against Leeds at our place.

ON THE PARK

"We should have beaten Notts Forest, were leading at Liverpool with five minutes to go, gave away two late goals at Sheffield Wednesday when in front and saw West Ham beat us with a fluke."

Kamara, who is operating in his preferred midfield role with the Hatters, admitted: "I just didn't enjoy that first game against Leeds. Maybe it was because it seemed strange playing against the lads only three or four weeks after leaving the club.

"But I'm looking forward to today. The ankle is fine now which is great after things looked so iffy at one stage. I was finding my fitness to begin with - I came back with Leeds at Notts County after only ten days - but the hectic Christmas-New Year period helped in that direction.

"The fans were always great when I was at Leeds and I would like to thank those of them who sent me Christmas cards and get well messages when I was injured. They were fantastic towards me in the game at Luton and I hope it is the same again today.

"I enjoyed every minute of my time with Leeds - and will have to make sure I go in the right dressing room! I hope they win the league - but we need the points today as much as them."

Chris's wife and family are still residing for the time being in Wakefield and his two sons Jack, aged four, and seven-year-old Ben will be the Luton mascots at today's encounter.

CHAPPY IN SPOTLIGHT

Don't be too surprised if side-lined United hotshot Lee Chapman crosses fully to the media side of the football fence when he finally hangs up his boots.

Chapman has carved out a niche as a soccer analyst on Radio Five and as TV summariser on The Match and the latest media involvement has been a series of articles for The Times.

Chapman said: "I've not made a conscious effort to be involved in the media work.

Everything I've undertaken I've been asked to do and one thing has led to another - radio led to television which led to six articles for The Times.

"But it's something I've always wanted to get involved in and I'm enjoying it. The media side is all

experience - the more you do the better you become at it. I'd like to get as much as experience as I can and, who knows, things may develop from there in the future.

"As regards producing the series of Times articles I was a bit apprehensive with the first one as it was the first time I'd ever written a piece for a newspaper.

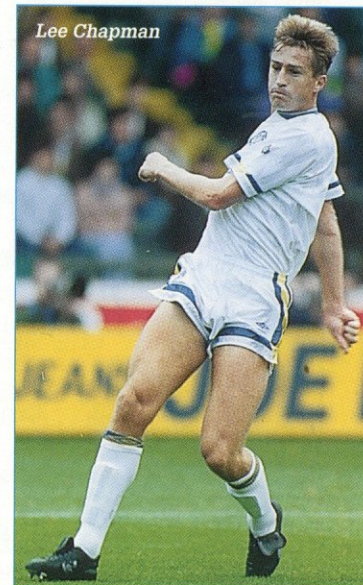
"But once I got into it and started an article I found it was very easy to carry on and finish. I was fortunate in that 95 per cent went in as I wrote it. The changes were just style alterations and I was very pleased.

"They gave me guide-lines about what particular topic they wanted featured. I talked to the sports editor and we thrashed it out between us and then I sat down and wrote it."

As regards his future involvement in football, Chapman admitted: "It would be nice to keep involved in the game but without the pressures of management which can be enormous at times.

"You have got to be lucky to have the right job, the right board of directors, the right club and the right people working around you which doesn't always happen.

"I wouldn't rule it out but it would be nice to keep involved without all the aggravation." We will be featuring Lee in our player profile against Aston Villa on Tuesday.

FORMER England midfield playmaker Glenn Hoddle had little hesitation in recommending to United manager Howard Wilkinson that he snap up talented French international striker Eric Cantona - on loan for the remainder of the season - from Nimes.

Hoddle, now in charge at Second Division Swindon Town, and French national team manager Michel Platini, were among those sought out by Mr Wilkinson for their opinions on Cantona before the deal went through.

The skilful Hoddle had first hand experience of Cantona's ability and temperament from his recent seasons spent playing in France with Monaco.

The former Tottenham Hotspur star said: "I've faced him a few times and as a player he has got immense talent. He has always impressed me on the ball, has got good vision, a good touch and is quite physical.

"He is not an out and out striker and can play off the front two but his record speaks for itself. He has always scored goals and has 15 in around 20 games for France.

"It will be a challenge, and is always a risk on whether a player can settle into the English style of football, but if he does adapt he will be an excellent signing.

"He will have to deal with the fact that in this country the ball generally is a bit more in the air but I've seen him score some good goals with his head."

Regarding Cantona's much-publicised disciplinary record, Hoddle added: "He has done a few silly things in France and has let himself down a bit.

"But things have certainly been exaggerated a little bit and I think being away from the battery of demanding French press will be good for him.

"If someone gets hold of him and calms him down - and if he settles in quickly over here - he could be a very good asset."

Hoddle added: "I was glad to help Howard and, if there was a player I was after myself I didn't know that much about, I would have tracked down people who played with or managed him to see what he was like.

"The Sheffield Wednesday manager Trevor Francis had been on previously when it looked like they were going to make the

signing and I had said the same to him about Cantona as I did to Howard."

Mr Wilkinson said: "This is the first time I've signed a player without seeing him in the flesh but I've watched him on video and spoke to people to make sure he is the right person to come to Leeds.

"I am delighted because at one stage a player I have admired for quite a while looked as if he was bound for Sheffield Wednesday. Because of that I couldn't interfere but the deal fell through and I stepped in and signed him until the end of the season on loan with an option to buy.

"He is one of the best strikers in Europe. He has played 20 times for France and scored 15 goals and I know Platini, who I spoke to about Cantona, rates him very highly.

"People have said there is no problem with the player. He feels his problems have been exaggerated in the media and as far as I am concerned he doesn't have a reputation because I don't believe what I read in the press."

Cantona, who had previously played for Auxerre, Bordeaux, Marseille and Montpellier, said: "I want to prove I have the ability to play in the English First Division.

"I came out of retirement but decided not to move to Sheffield Wednesday because the deal fell through regarding what had been arranged in Paris.

"I am confident I have the talent to produce what Leeds have signed me on loan for. It now depends on how I perform - whether I do the business - on what happens in the future.

"I would like to stay at Elland Road but I must first please and prove myself to the manager and Leeds that I can play in England of whose type of game I have always been an admirer.

"Leeds are a really big club and they first came to my attention as a young lad when I saw them against Bayern Munich in Paris in the 1975 European Cup final.

"I have not played for Nimes for a few weeks but I have been training by myself and of course had a week with Sheffield Wednesday so fitness should not be much of a problem."

Cantona's disciplinary record has been given a wide airing in the media since he first linked up with Wednesday. His lawyer Jean-Jacques Bertrand said he was France's equivalent of Paul Gascoigne.

But Cantona feels his problems were blown out of proportion. He

said through his interpreter: "I'm not a bad boy in the way people might have been led to believe by what they've read.

"Whatever I do in France is front page news but if it was another player it would just take up a few lines. I was hounded by the French press, everything about me was totally exaggerated and over the top and I just hope all that is behind me."

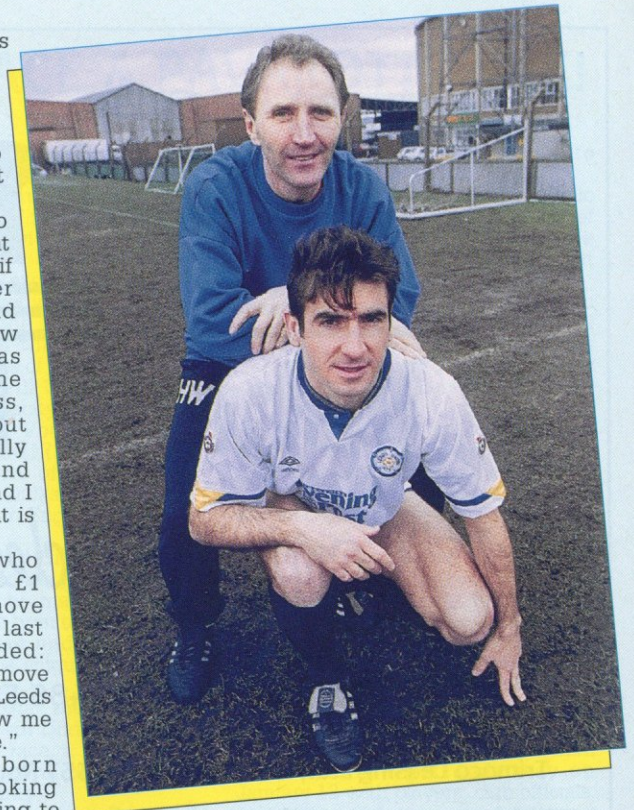
Cantona, who cost Nimes £1 million in a move from Marseille last summer, added: "Hopefully my move to England and Leeds United will allow me to breathe a little."

Marseilles-born Cantona is looking forward to getting to grips with the the English game and said: "The football over here is very different to France and so are the referees.

"Here the officials let the game flow but in France they whistle all the time. That is basically why I was in trouble. I have a big name over there and became a target."

Cantona, who was once sold by Bordeaux to Marseille for £2.2 million, had managed only one goal in 21 starts for Nimes but was clearly not happy at the club.

Mr Wilkinson explained: "Eric

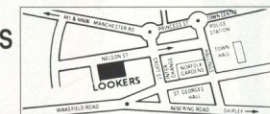


told the Nimes president at Christmas he wasn't doing the business for them and because of the atmosphere and small crowds he didn't want to play there.

"He is a very emotional person and football offers him a lot emotionally. That's why he is attracted to the English game with the big crowds and good atmosphere. That's why he retired - not because of the disciplinary factors."

Bonjour et bienvenue a Rue d'Elland a Eric Cantona.

Well, that's about as far as my (distant) schoolboy French goes to welcome our new signing who has certainly caused plenty of interest in the last few weeks.

Eric's debut as sub at Oldham brought the French media flocking to Boundary Park and I am told that news of Eric's move to Elland Road made front page headlines in the French press.

Not surprisingly there has been a slight language problem to sort out in the dressing room but the manager seems to be coping well and among the rest of the players, Mervyn Day has been able to come up with the occasional burst of French.

Bob Bennett of Renault Leeds has been a tremendous help in arranging a sponsored car for Eric whose English, incidentally is improving all the time.

For our game with Luton this afternoon we welcome a number of companies who are involved with the new Banqueting Suite. The superb new facilities will be available for public hire in April and I know that Banqueting Manager David Whittaker and Marketing Manager Claire Pearson report a tremendous interest in bookings for the new facilities.

Two new fixture dates for the final lap of the season see the away game with Arsenal moving from Saturday, March 21st to Sunday 22nd in front of the live TV cameras. WALLACE & PAVAROTTI LINK!

The somewhat unusual combination of United's record signing Rod Wallace and music superstar Pavarotti could be joining forces at Wembley Stadium at the FA Cup final on May 9.

But opera lovers fear not! Our Elland Road hotshot will not be taking to the microphone in what would surely be one of the most bizarre musical double acts of all time.

Instead Rod will be at the twin towers in his capacity as one of the leading lights in 'Football Against Multiple Sclerosis' (FAMS) at the culmination of two of three nationwide sponsored walks involving the 131 league clubs in England, Scotland and Wales.

And the England Under-21 player revealed it "was in the pipe-line" that Pavarotti would be making a guest appearance at the twin towers for this worthwhile cause and added that "hopefully he'll be singing one of his songs."

It is targeted that the walks and other activities - an Under-14 tournament, a balloon race, a soccer skills competition etc - will bring in £3.5 million for the charity.

Rod and his brothers Ray and Danny have been central figures in fund-raising for FAMS - an offshoot of Action and Research for Multiple Sclerosis (ARMS) - since their days together with Southampton.

Twenty-two-year-old Rod said: "Danny thought of the idea of FAMS initially at Southampton and things went on from there. Ray and I soon joined in and have continued to be

involved since we both moved to Leeds United.

"It is all in aid of such a worthwhile cause and multiple sclerosis is one of the worst and saddest possible illness's in that there is no cure for it at present.

"Hopefully raising this money from the walks will help to find an eventual solution and provide care for sufferers - as well as creating greater public awareness and understanding about the disease.

"When you see someone suffering from multiple sclerosis - and I know a lady in Southampton who does - it certainly helps to put everything in life into its proper perspective.

"Ray and myself will be walking something like the last two or three miles of the one walk which is scheduled to finish at half-time during the FA Cup final.

"Gordon Strachan has also been getting involved and all being well he will be emerging at Hampden Park along with Danny at half-time in the Scottish FA Cup final."

The three walks - western, southern and easterly - got underway on January 12 with players, club officials, celebrities and supporters covering stages between various club grounds to raise money.

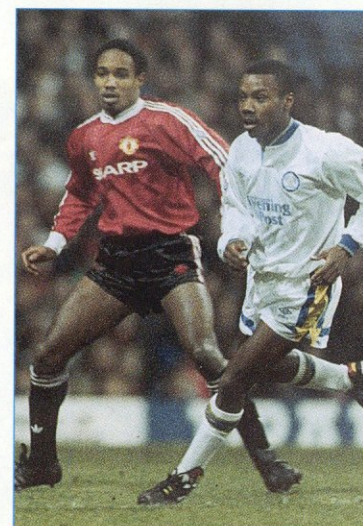
In addition the charity has set up 'The Wallace Wish' a scheme akin to 'Jim'll Fix It' in which, where possible, Rod and Co can help someone fulfil a dream in return for a financial pledge for FAMS.

One early beneficiary was an MS sufferer from Leeds who was driven to Elland Road in a Rolls Royce by Strachan - complete with chauffeurs uniform - to meet the United players and tour the stadium.

ARMS has attracted some illustrious names with Tony Barton, who led Aston Villa to the European Cup in 1982, ending 39 years in the game to become a full-time worker for the charity. Pleasants said: "They had a provisional look at the stadium and future plans and were impressed with what they saw. They were looking at things like car parking and how far the perimeter fence is from the actual pitch.

"If England are selected for the championships they will come back in 1995 and have another detailed look and make sure the work has been carried out. Of course the stadium will look a lot different then with all the schemes scheduled to get underway soon."

"It seems that the 'premier' club system and the travelling Leeds stewards who were efficient, dedicated and helpful, are the reasons that Leeds reputation is beginning to wane.

"I write to congratulate you on your efforts. It may be too early to claim outright success but you appear to be going in the right direction."

TRANSFER DEALS

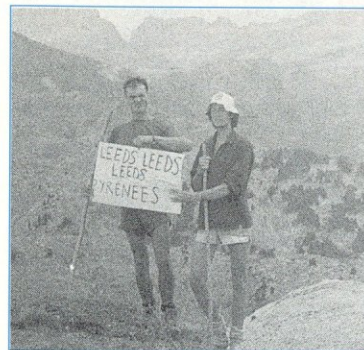
The tenth million pound plus move of the season took place when Marco Gabbiadini joined Derby County from Crystal Palace for £1.2 million.

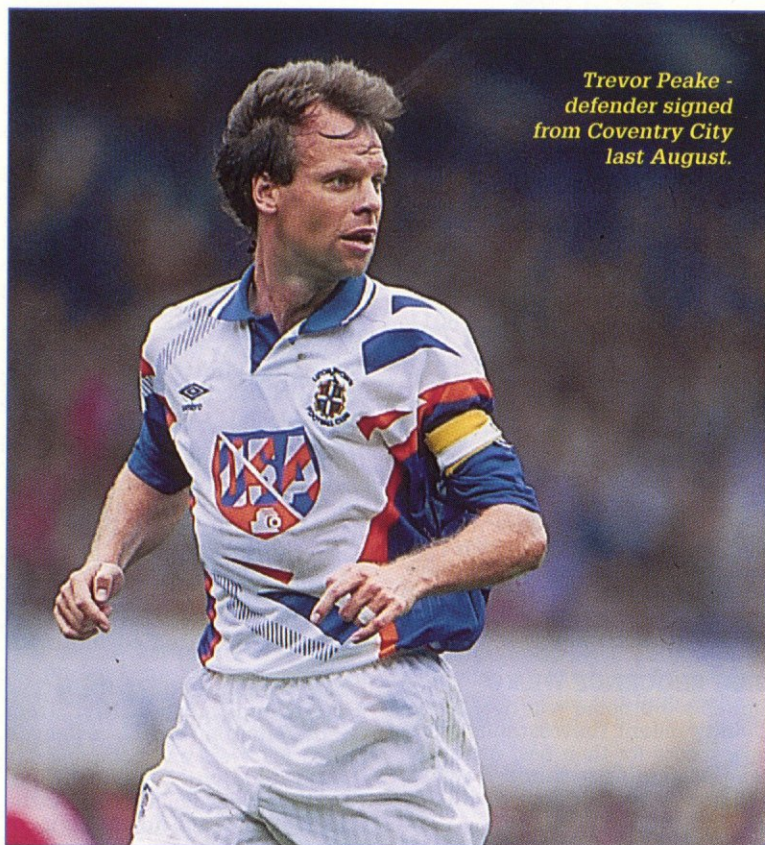

FORM GUIDE

Luton Town's search for an away win entered its 50th week with a 4-0 defeat - and more than 20,000 fans unanimous in voting the opposing goalkeeper as Man of the Match.

Tony Cotton's outstanding performance for Manchester City - coupled with two controversial goals - was reckoned to be the main difference between two teams who were 18 places in the First Division table.

It was Luton's 19th game since their last away win, at Aston Villa on 9th March 1991, and their travelling record this season was then the least successful in the division - three draws, 11 defeats and 39 goals conceded.

Earlier this week, they were due at Crystal Palace, hoping for better luck after a number of disappointments in away matches since New Year's Day. They conceded a last-minute equaliser at Nottingham Forest and went down at Liverpool and Sheffield Wednesday after leading until late in each game.

This is the Hatters' 10th consecutive season in Division One and for the last three years, they survived only by winning their last



fixture. Something similar may well be required in a couple of months' time, but there was encouragement last week when they pulled out of the bottom two by beating Sheffield United.

This season's problems began to show up with a visit to Manchester in September. The Hatters shipped five goals at Old Trafford, then four at Aston Villa. All this mushroomed into a 14-match spell without a win - a period in which they went out of two cup competitions and landed at the bottom of the table.

There was a turn for the better with nine points from home meetings with Coventry, Arsenal and Chelsea at Christmas.

With seven wins at Kenilworth Road, they have done better than a couple of clubs who are in top 10, but the away results remained the pressure point after yielding four goals or more on six occasions.

John Dreyer and Mark Pembridge were the only League ever-presents up to last week-end, but it's probably a good sign that the team has had a much more settled appearance in the last three months.

Last week Brian Stein scored his first goal since returning to the club last summer, while midfielder David Preece, was recently on target for two matches in succession for the

first time in his career. Previously he had netted only six times in more than 200 League outings for the club.

TRANSFERS

Four years ago, Mick Harford was a Littlewoods Cup winner with the Hatters. Last year he was partly responsible for keeping them in the First Division even though he was playing for Derby County!

The Rams were already doomed to relegation when Harford scored an own goal on the last day of the season at Kenilworth Road. While Luton celebrated, the former England centre forward went off to the Second Division... but not for long.

In October he was re-signed for £325,000 - the biggest fee paid in the first half of the season. Harford's former partner, Brian Stein, also made the journey back to Bedfordshire after three years in France.

Spurs' Irish striker, Philip Gray, joined the Hatters in the summer for £275,000 and was top scorer with six goals until sidelined by a cartilage injury.

Coventry defender Trevor Peake made a rapid switch in August. Six days after playing against Luton in their 5-0 defeat at Highfield Road,

he was making his debut for them after a £100,000 transfer.

Bolton midfielder Steve Thompson was at Luton for a matter of weeks before he went to Leicester in exchange for full back Des Linton and forward Scott Oakes, who scored his first goal for his new club on the visit to Hillsborough at the start of February.

Chris Kamara checked in from Elland Road at the end of October and goalkeeper Steve Sutton arrived in November on an extended loan from Nottingham Forest. The maximum period of three months expired last week and negotiations were taking place to make it a permanent transfer.

There was a bigger deal between the clubs in August when Forest signed Kingsley Black. A seven-

figure fee for the Northern Ireland winger took Luton's income from sales well beyond the £2m mark.

Last season's top scorer, Lars Elstrup, returned to Denmark, defender Dave Beaumont joined Hibs for £110,000, and full back Matthew Jackson went to Everton for £600,000 after only nine First Division appearances. Other outgoing deals included: Sean Farrell (£100,000 to Fulham) and Graham Rodger (£135,000 to Grimsby).

MANAGEMENT

David Pleat was the man who put Luton on the road to their longest run in the First Division. Now, in his first season back at Kenilworth Road, he has the task of preserving the status his team secured with the Second Division title in 1982.

The Nottingham-born manager first joined the Hatters during a playing career which began his local club, Forest, and later took him to Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough. He went into management with non-League Nuneaton Borough and then returned to Luton as a coach.

In January 1978, he succeeded Harry Haslam as manager and soon developed a side with a reputation for playing good-quality football. Their first season in Division One resulted in a last-match escape act, but solid foundations were laid by the time he left the club in ninth place at the end of the 1985-86 season.

Mr Pleat took Spurs to the FA Cup in his one full season at White Hart Lane. They were fourth in the League when he departed in October 1987.

After three years in the Second Division with Leicester City, he was re-appointed by Luton last summer.

INTERNATIONALS

Some three months ago Luton alerted Scotland to the potential of two youth-team discoveries at Kenilworth Road.

The call paid off when Paul Telfer, 20, and Darren Salton, 19, were named in the Scottish squad for an Under-21 international against Denmark.

They are the latest in a line of promising players to come through the junior ranks. Mark Pembridge, Kurt Nogan, Jason Rees and Ceri

Hughes were all included in Welsh 'B' or Under-21 parties last season.

Pembridge went on to win his first full cap, against Brazil in September, after making only 25 appearances in League football. Last week he scored the winning goal against the Republic of Ireland.

The 21-year-old midfielder is the club's only current full international, but both Mick Harford and Brian Stein were capped by England in their previous service with the Hatters.

LEEDS UNITED 2 LUTON TOWN 1 at Elland Road, 19 April, 1954. Division 2.

Leeds United began the 1953-54 season in superb fashion beating Notts County 6-0 and Rotherham United 4-2 in their first two home games as John Charles hit 7 out of those 10 goals.

However, by the time Luton Town arrived at Elland Road for the last home game of the season on Easter Monday their Second Division campaign had developed into an all too familiar tale of disappointment.

Former Sunderland and England star Raich Carter had taken over from the legendary Major Frank Buckley during the summer of 1953 and there was a new air of optimism about the place.

The first four home games had produced gates totalling more than 90,000 compared with 50,000 for the last four games of the 1952-53 season – but just 13,930 turned up for this game against Luton.

While the fans appeared to be disillusioned as a result of their lack of success they certainly could not complain about a lack of goals in United's games this season.

Those first two wins were followed by defeats at Swansea and Leicester by 4-3 and 5-0 respectively then at the turn of the year they thrashed Leicester 7-1 in the return game at Elland Road only to lose 4-0 at Stoke in their next League outing.

Luton were one of the top six sides in the division but their 1-1 draw with Leeds at Kenilworth Road on the Good Friday had typified a season that saw them drawing too many games to seriously challenge Leicester City and Everton in the promotion race.

There was no shortage of class in their ranks however with English international goalkeeper Bernard Streten and the man later to mastermind so many Leeds United victories as chief scout – Syd Owen.

This was perhaps one of Owen's most successful seasons for he made three appearances at centre-half for England during the close season Continental tour and the World Cup which followed.

MEMORY MATCH

In John Charles however, Leeds United had the greatest match winner in the county this season for having switched from centre-half to centre forward midway through the previous season he began this term in the front line and ran riot.

After that brilliant seven goal start he went on to beat Tom Jennings' 35 goal club record with the Leeds goal in the draw at Luton and rubbed it in with both goals as Carter's men won 2-1 to send the fans home happy.

One of those goals was from the penalty spot but remarkably only four of his eventual 42 goal haul came that way in this record breaking season.

It was disappointing from the fans view as First Division football was denied them yet again but

Carter was to carefully change the side over the next two seasons with only six players surviving to play in the 1955-56 promotion winning side.

One of the players in the Leeds side who did move on and miss out on the success was right winger Andy McCall the father of Leeds born Scottish international Stuart McCall.

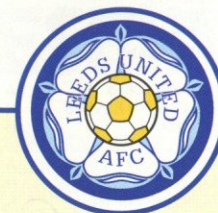
