>Welcome, to Crystal Palace. The game at Selhurst Park 10 days ago was a hard-fought affair with honours even. Today, we will have to do ourselves justice if we are to get a result. I will not be unhappy if we address this game in the same manner as we did last Saturday's contest at Leeds. The goal efforts we had at Elland Road caused the potential champions-elect some difficulties and they were never able to enjoy an air of composure. Indeed, until Cantona's second, after a defensive mix-up, Leeds were never in the driving seat.

Once again, we were given a good press and a fair summary. That we never adopted any hit-and-run tactics, but tried consistently to play our own type of game will eventually produce winning results.

This season has been more than difficult for the younger element. There has hardly been a game when we have enjoyed a two-goal cushion. On those occasions when we have been in front, there has always been some strain and nervousness and we have never been able to stroke the ball about and move with the freedom that a two-goal cushion brings.

All these battles bring experience for the younger players and there will come a time

when all the hard work and self-sacrifice will be looked back on as a benefit. If the likes of Pembridge, Telfer, Campbell, Linton, Oakes and Hughes, who have borne the brunt of being the youth of the club propelled into the team can learn and gain from their experiences, then we know we shall have a fine nucleus for the future, whatever our platform.

We were all unhappy when Steve Sutton got off the bus on the way home from last week's game at Leeds. He has been a first-class influence on everyone here during his three months with the club and it is a source of great regret that the board were unable to cope with an acquisition that would have been beneficial.

We should look at the record to see his contribution to our progress. After 19 games, we had 12 points; in the last 12 games, we have won 17 points. If these more recent results can be maintained now, then we can collect enough points to keep our heads above water. And if we do this, it will be due, in no small measure, to the influence of the experienced players on the younger element.

For short-term first-class experience, there is no substitute. Sutton brought this to our team and so too have Trevor Peake, Chris Kamara and Mick Harford. I have not forgotten the contributions of David Preece. In our last

two games he has dominated the left side of midfield.

One experienced journalist noted his display at Leeds and suggested he had counter-acted Strachan. If David Preece continues to exert his influence on the team in the coming weeks from the wider position, and not the central role he prefers, he will have made a valuable contribution.

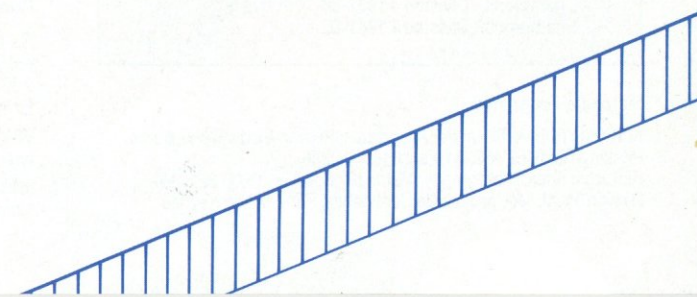
After today's game we have a fascinating meeting in prospect against Tottenham here on Wednesday. Whatever progress we have made as a group, I always look back on our return from Tunisia - where another player we wanted to sign, Niklas Nylen from Malmo, looked such a good player - as a mini turning-point.

Even though the lights went out on us at Tottenham when we had a 1-0 lead we did not lose our way after that experience.

Can we keep up the fight? Can we stick to the task? Will the young players crack? Can we get any players in to boost our chances? Will our loyal supporters stick with us? Will the directors come up with some formula to arrange for the strengthening of the club?

These are all the questions to be asked in the next few weeks when we all, as part of the club, have to keep our ambition. If we do not, then we might as well go and watch the cricket in Australia.

Only a 110 per cent effort will be enough by every one.  
Enjoy the game.

## News Update

### Welcome Palace

□ This afternoon we welcome the players, officials and supporters of Crystal Palace to Kenilworth Road. We hope you enjoy your stay here and have a safe journey back to south London.

### Nationwide Football Against M.S.

□ Players from Luton Town F.C. will be making a special appearance as part of the Nationwide Football Against M.S. project, on Sunday, March 8. The event, a Festival of Football, is being held at Letchworth Football Club. A number of short matches involving local teams will take place from 4 pm, and the evening will be rounded off by a friendly game between Letchworth F.C. and the RAF, and a disco.

### Gray on the way back

□ Unlucky striker Phillip Gray begins light training next week after an achilles tendon operation. Gray, a £275,000 signing from Tottenham, has only made nine league appearances this season due to injury.

### Nottingham Forest fixture postponed

□ Our Barclays League Division One fixture against Nottingham Forest, scheduled for March 28, has been postponed.

### Zenith Data finalists confirmed

□ Nottingham Forest will meet Southampton in the first of this year's domestic finals when the First Division rivals contest the Zenith Data Systems Cup final at Wembley on Sunday, March 29. Forest settled the outstanding area final last Wednesday, beating Leicester City 2-0 on the night, and 3-1 on aggregate.

The two finalists will compete for a winner's cheque of £100,000 with the runners-up taking £40,000. Last year's final generated gate receipts of over £800,000 with Crystal Palace and Everton each banking over £205,000.

### Curle sprints to Wembley

□ Manchester City's Keith Curle has won the fifth of the regional heats of the Rumbelows Sprint Challenge and collects £500 for his efforts. Curle will now appear in the Wembley decider to be staged before the Rumbelows League Cup final on April 12.

Curle, running in full kit and boots, clocked 12.10 seconds for the 100 metres, ahead of Stuart Storer of Bolton who recorded 12.17.

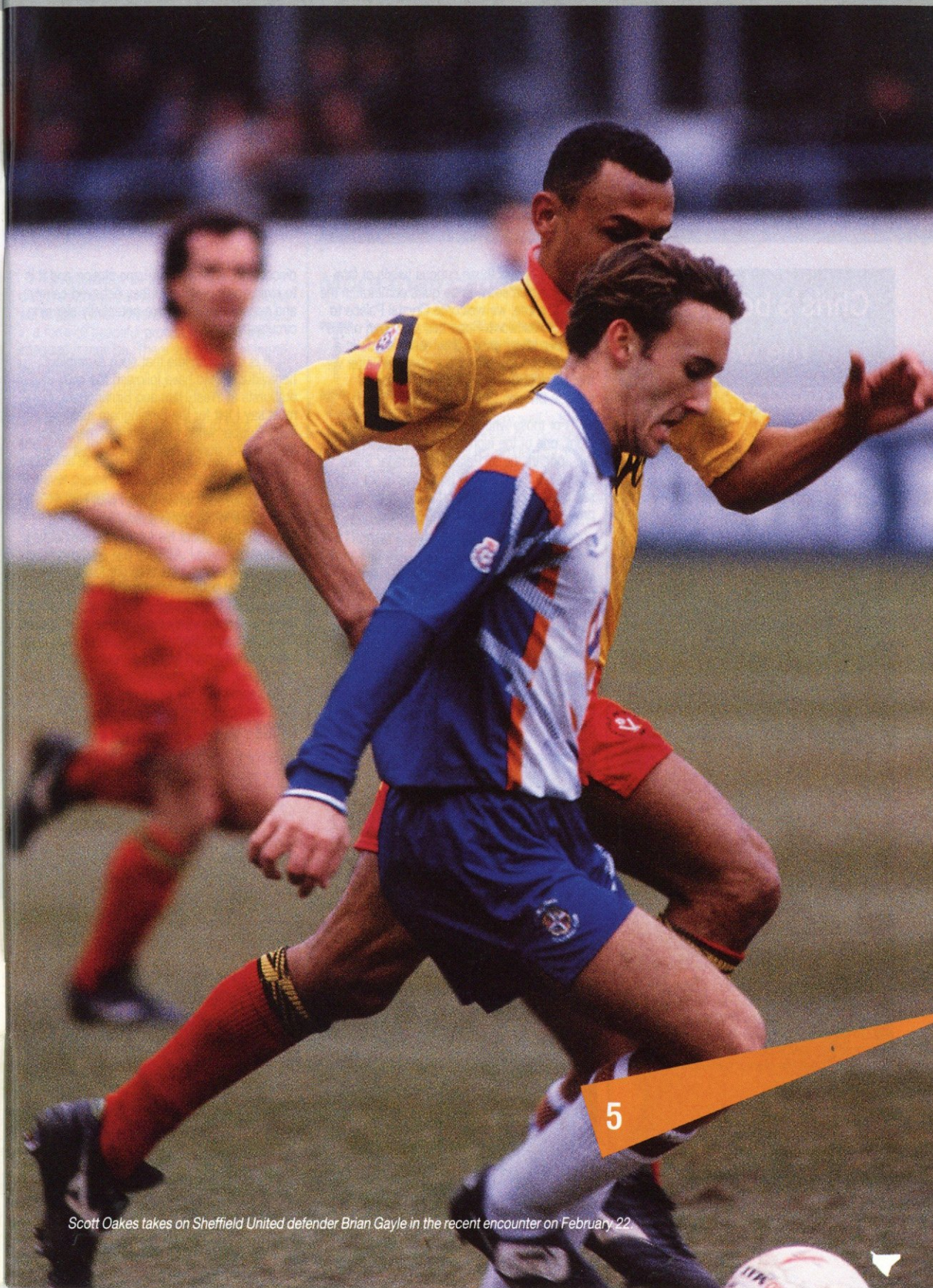
### Transfer deadline approaches

□ The deadline for the Football League clubs to register new players for the current campaign is 5.00 pm on Thursday, March 26. Players registered after this date will only be eligible to play in league matches which do not have a bearing on promotion or relegation issues. Transferred players will not be permitted to feature in any one of the league's three knock-out competitions.

### Rovers Return

□ Second Division Tranmere Rovers have been confirmed as hosts for this year's Women's Football Association Cup Final, which kicks-off at 2.30 pm on Saturday, April 25. The Birkenhead club are staging the final for the second successive year, following the success of last season's game, which was watched by a record crowd of more than 4,000.

Women's football continues to be one of the growth areas of the game nationwide with more than twenty-four Barclays League clubs now running teams affiliated to the Women's FA.

# Inside view

## Responsible supporters have been a credit to the game

### Chris's boys lead the way

By one of those curious twists of fate which seem to be quite common in the game, we welcome Crystal Palace to Kenilworth Road this afternoon only a few days after hosting their reserve side in a Combination game and not very long after we met them at Selhurst Park in a Barclays League Division One rearranged fixture.

For those who came along on Monday night, one of the highlights of the game was the appearance by Palace's manager Steve Coppell in their reserve team. His talent was still there for all to see and enjoy in what proved to be an interesting 0-0 draw.

It sometimes needs a contest like Monday's to restore your faith after all the incidents which disfigured last weekend's football programme. I am referring, of course, to the happenings at West Ham, Birmingham and, most seriously of all, Tottenham Hotspur.

All the supporters and the police who were magnificent at Tottenham last Sunday deserve our heartiest congratulations. There were more than 28,000 fans kept waiting outside the ground after an explosive device was

discovered at White Hart Lane station and it is to everyone's credit that they behaved calmly and sensibly in what were potentially alarming circumstances.

It is only a shame that such exemplary behaviour should have followed the two outbursts at West Ham and Birmingham. I must say I felt for the Birmingham manager Terry Cooper when I read his comment after the outburst during their game against Stoke City.

It says much when a man with his experience in the game admits he is going home to think about his future after something like that.

I cannot help wondering if it was wise of the Football Supporters' Association to call for the sort of action they did last weekend, given these outbursts. Sometimes, it only needs one indisciplined action to cause trouble and, regrettably, as last weekend's events showed, it still seems that the problems we all hoped were eradicated are only hiding under the surface.



Unfortunately, as the FSA have now discovered, you cannot guarantee how people will behave when they are asked to participate in a form of peaceful protest, however well-intended it may be. There are always going to be certain people who will take advantage of any chance to protest and this appears to be what happened at Upton Park.

In my view, one always has to take into account all the necessary safety and security measures at every game. Organising a protest, however peaceful, in a stadium where there is a cross-section of people and an excited atmosphere does not necessarily comply with this thinking.

Personally, like the FSA, I have always argued against the all-seater recommendations of the Taylor report. I believe there is a place for the standing supporter, but I also believe there is a right and proper way of drawing ones views to the attention of the people in power, though I can understand the FSA's desire to attract media attention.

A football stadium is a confined place and when it is filled for a match on a Saturday it is a volatile place too. Given the chance - as they were last weekend when the FSA called for seated fans to stand and for standing fans to sit in a peaceful protest against the Taylor report - certain types of people will always go 'over the top.'

The right thing to do, surely, is to lobby local MPs and sign petitions, as many of us involved in the game have done already. It seems that this particular protest was a misguided one and the FSA, which has given such a good image for the responsible fans, made an error on this occasion.

Finally, as a result of Nottingham Forest's victory at White Hart Lane last Sunday, our home league fixture against Forest, who are through to another Wembley final, on March 28 has been postponed, but the Spurs visit here on March 11 has been confirmed.

Forest have a heavy fixture list and it is difficult to see when we can find a new date. March 18 and April 15 are both possibilities, depending on FA Cup replays and Liverpool's progress in Europe, but it could be that the Football League will intervene and make it a Monday night game. We shall have to wait and see.

## Touchline monitor a good idea

Dear Sir,

I read with interest David Pleat's suggestion of having a touchline monitor. I think this would be an excellent idea. It would certainly cut down the abuse aimed at our officials - 'the camera never lies' - but if it is phased in, it should certainly not be abused, (i.e. every offside or foul provoking a protest from players).

Providing cameras are placed in both goals, we should never again experience such incidents as the France B 'goal' that no-one actually saw. The professional foul would be looked at before such a crucial decision is made regarding the offender, and obvious 'cheats' could be dealt with there and then.

There could be a problem with matches over-running because of referees continually running to the touchline for consultation, but this could be overcome if the monitor official was (e.g.) a retired referee, who could make a signal to the ref on the field to indicate his decision. But as long as it is only consulted for major borderline decisions, the game itself should not suffer from hold-ups.

The offside decision is all too often a rash one by a linesman who 'panics' at seeing a forward dart through an offside trap towards a lone keeper and instinctively raises his flag. With a touchline monitor, when the linesman is unsure of his decision, he could drop his flag, which would allow play to continue subject to the final decision of the official behind the monitor, who would signal after watching the re-run.

A season which promised so much has, in recent months, faltered for Steve Coppell's Crystal Palace.

Last term the spirited Eagles came to the forefront of English football after securing third spot in the league, and winning the Zenith Data Systems Cup, 4-1 against Everton. Ian Wright, Geoff Thomas and John Salako became household names and all worked their way into the England squad. A real push for honours was therefore expected from the south London club in 1992.

As always in football, however, events rarely go to plan with Palace, at the time of writing, placed 11th in Division One with 39 points, 22 points adrift of leaders Manchester United. Last weekend inconsistencies were again highlighted in a 4-3 home defeat against Norwich.

Salako, an England regular after impressive performances on the summer tour of Australia and New Zealand, has not kicked a ball since September. A cruciate knee ligament injury, sustained against Leeds United, has meant that

his valuable supply of pin-point crosses have been missing all season and he is unlikely to play again until August.

Wright is another player who has been missing from the Palace front line this term, but for a very different reason. In September, Arsenal came in with a £2.5 million package for the England striker, an offer the Palace board could not refuse. Wright went on to become an instant success at Highbury, leaving a void behind him at Selhurst Park.

£1.8 million of Wright's fee was almost immediately spent on Sunderland's Marco Gabbiadini. But finding it hard to settle - during a period in which Palace were knocked out of the FA Cup at Leicester 1-0 and the Zenith Cup against Chelsea - he was transferred to Derby County for £1.2 million after four months.

A positive side has arisen from the Eagles' season, however, and that has been the continued progress of captain Geoff Thomas, and the emergence of a string of youth team players in the first team set-up.

Thomas is now a regular in the England midfield alongside David Platt and will now be looking forward to a successful European Championships in Sweden this summer. David

Whyte - Mark Bright's new striking partner - Gareth Southgate and Simon Osborn are just three names in a long line of talented young players at Selhurst Park hoping to make the grade in the First Division before the season's out. All three are tipped to have a successful career with the Eagles and prove that there is no substitute for home-grown talent.

There was a Crystal Palace club as early as 1861 but the present organisation was formed in 1905 after the formation of a club by the company that controlled the Crystal Palace (the building), had been rejected by the FA who did not like the idea of the Cup Final hosts running their own club. A separate company had to be formed and they had their home on the old Cup Final ground until 1915.

The club has had 18 managers since the war, with Mr Coppell the longest serving. Other famous names who have managed Palace include Malcolm Allison, Dario Gradi and Terry Venables.

During their 87-year history, success for the club has been limited. They won the Second Division title in 1979, the Division Three (south) crown in 1921 and the Zenith Data Cup last season.

## Eagles on Parade

**NIGEL MARTYN** (goalkeeper) - Nigel enjoyed a highly successful 1990/91 season which saw him become firmly established in Graham Taylor's England international plans. Although he is yet to appear for the full side, he has made a number of appearances at both B and under-21 levels. Nigel, Britain's first £1 million keeper, kept 22 clean sheets last season.

**CHRIS COLEMAN** (defender) - 21-year-old Chris joined the Eagles from Swansea City during the summer of 1991 for £275,000. He made his league debut for the Welsh club in 1987 and totalled 160 league games for the Swans. He has gained European Cup Winners' Cup experience and is a Welsh under-21 international.

**LEE SINNOTT** (defender) - Lee has fitted in well at Selhurst Park since signing from Bradford City just prior to the start of the 1991/92 season. Lee formerly at Walsall and Watford, is equally at home in the role of central defender or full-back.

**JOHN HUMPHREY** (defender) - John must go down in history as the only Football League player to have changed clubs without changing dressing rooms. This happened when he was signed from tenants Charlton in 1990 for £450,000. An ever-present last season, John plays at right-back.

**GARETH SOUTHGATE** (defender) - Although only 21, Gareth has been at Palace for many years, working his way through the ranks to the first team. He made his debut away to Southend in the Rumbelows Cup last season, coming on to the field as substitute.

**ANDY THORN** (defender) - Central defender Andy was signed from Newcastle United for £650,000 in 1989. The six foot Carlshalton-born player started his career with Wimbledon and played a major part in the Dons rise to the First Division. Andy, who linked up with former Wimbledon partner Eric Young again last season, is an England under-21 international.

**ERIC YOUNG** (defender) - Singapore-born Welsh international, Eric joined Palace from Wimbledon at the start of the season for £850,000. Well respected for his power and commitment, he broke into the full Wales side last term and has since established himself on the international scene.

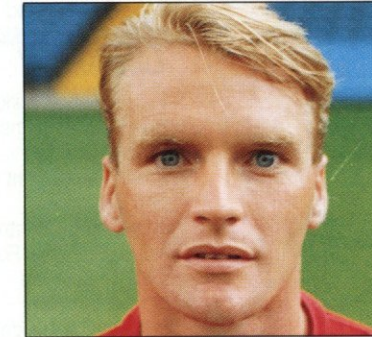
**SIMON OSBORN** (midfield) - "Ossie", who made his first-team debut at Brighton in the Zenith Data Systems Cup, became an instant hit with supporters after showing a great deal of maturity in his play. Tipped as having a great future in football, Simon is just one of many youngsters showing promise at Selhurst Park.

**PAUL MORTIMER** (midfield) - A surprise signing, Paul had only played a dozen games for Aston Villa since signing from Charlton for £750,000 last summer. A left-sided midfielder, Steve Coppell brought back the England under-21 international in a £400,000 deal.

**SIMON RODGER** (midfield) - A dogged midfielder, Simon has made a rapid rise to First Division football this season. After playing junior football, Simon had an impressive season in the Palace reserve side last year, forcing himself into first team recognition this term.

**EDDIE MCGOLDRICK** (midfield) - Signed from Northampton Town for £200,000 in 1989, versatile Eddie has the natural ability to perform with a great deal of assurance either as a winger, midfielder or a sweeper, where he operated towards the end of last season with a great deal of success. This term he has reverted to his more accustomed wide position.

**GEOFF THOMAS** (midfield) - Now firmly established in the full England squad, Geoff made his debut for his country in Turkey last May. He joined Palace from Crewe in 1987, having had a short spell with Rochdale. This is Geoff's fourth season as captain of Crystal Palace.

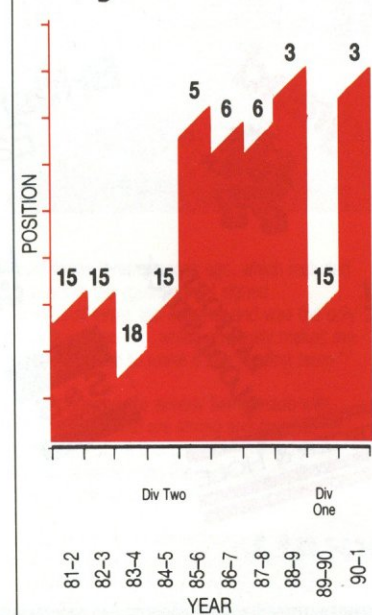

**STAN COLLYMORE** (forward) - Stan is a popular striker who signed from non-league Stafford Rangers for £100,000 in December 1990. His prolific Combination scoring rate led to Steve Coppell giving him a taste of first team action, making his debut in February 1990 at home to QPR.

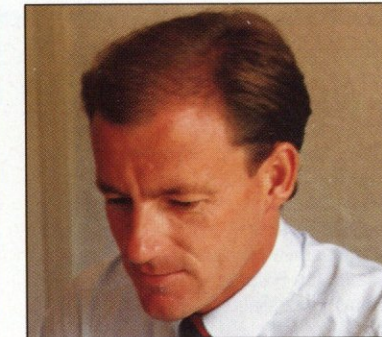

## Meet the Boss



### STEVE COPPELL

Steve Coppell started his career at Tranmere Rovers in 1973, for whom he signed whilst studying Economics at Liverpool University.

35 appearances and ten goals later, this highly talented right winger was signed by Manchester United manager Tommy Docherty for £60,000 where he began a long and successful career at Old Trafford.

During eight full seasons with the club, Steve's wizardry on the wing earned him 42 England caps, scoring seven goals. He also played in three FA Cup finals, unfortunately winning only one winner's medal in 1977 v Liverpool.

At the age of 28, his career was tragically cut short following a severe knee injury at Sunderland in 1983. He had played a total of 320 games for United, scoring 53 goals.

A year later Steve, who had the qualifications to walk into most jobs outside football, returned to the game he loved. He took the Manager's job at Crystal Palace in June 1984 and following a year of battling against relegation, he sparked off a magnificent revival in Palace's lagging fortunes.

He took the side into the First Division in 1988/89 and guided the Eagles to the FA Cup final in 1990 against Manchester United. Unfortunately for Steve, his side lost the match after a replay, but he was by now regarded as one of the top managers in British football and hunted by the top European clubs for his services.

Last season was Steve's most successful yet. He guided Palace to their highest league placing in Division One (third) and led the side to Wembley again, this time in the Z.D.S. Cup against Wembley. Having gained experience on their last visit, Palace went on to lift the trophy after an emphatic 4-1 win in front of over 60,000 mainly Palace fans.

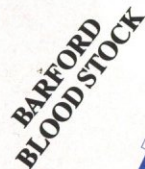

# Player profile

## Jamie Campbell

It has been a meteoric rise into the First Division for 19-year-old striker Jamie Campbell. Last season, the former Bedfordshire County player was completing his second year apprenticeship in the South East Counties League, this term he has already competed against the likes of Arsenal, Chelsea and Crystal Palace.

A six foot powerhouse who is good in the air and equally at home with the ball at his feet, Jamie had only played 12 reserve and one Z.D.S. game this season before being thrown into the deep end at Sheffield United. This surprise call-up came when Mick Harford was injured for the league clash with the Blades back in November.

"I never expected to get my chance in the first team so quickly. I had set myself a realistic target of playing a year in the reserves, scoring a few goals and then pushing for a place in the first team squad next season.

"I can remember being pretty nervous when I first walked out at Bramall Lane, but once the game got under way there was no time to worry about nerves. I think that I have settled in well, and having the more experienced players around like Chris Kamara and Trevor Peake also helps. They always encourage me when I am on the ball and often pull me to one side after a game to tell me what I've been doing right and wrong. That is a great help, and all part of the learning process."

Jamie, like so many other young Luton players who have made the break into league football over recent seasons, started out with the club attending the School of Excellence here at Kenilworth Road.

"I was spotted playing for my local club side Brammington Spittfires in the Chiltern League. After attending the weekly coaching sessions here, I was asked to play for the junior sides. I

signed forms three seasons ago, which included two years in the youth team. I signed professional forms last summer and was the only apprentice taken on, which obviously makes me more determined to make it into the first team."

Comparisons are already being made with Mick Harford - both are strong and good in the air - but in football it is unusual to have two big forwards spearheading the same attack. Does Jamie see this as a problem?

"No, not at all. I believe Mick and myself could do quite a good job together. Although we are both tall, we both have enough technique to use the ball at our feet, so one of us could complement the other.

"I hope to get an extended run in the team before the season's out, but I expect the manager to use the more experienced players as we enter the final two months of the season.

"Obviously we have a hard battle on our hands, but I think we will stay up. You often need a lot of luck in football, something we've had very little of this season, but hopefully it will come our way now when we need it most."

For Jamie then, it has been a season to remember. Hopefully he can play his part in the team over the next few weeks, and that we can see the young striker showing off his talents again next season...in the First Division.

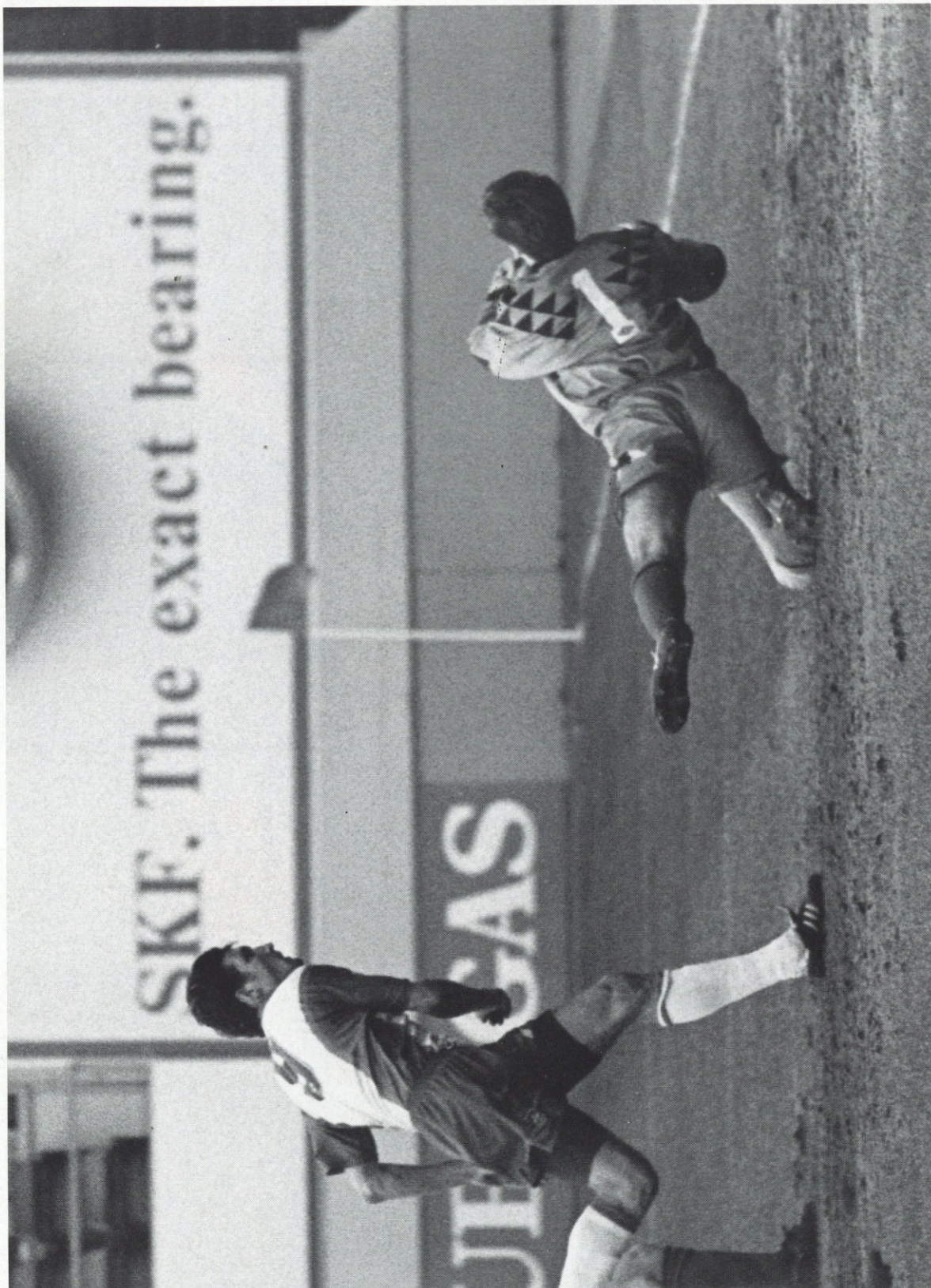

## A TRIP AROUND EUROPE

*With Tottenham and Liverpool looking for European glory this week, we take a look at the latest happenings around the major leagues of Europe*

### ITALY

A.C. Milan, undefeated all season, are running away with the Serie A title. They look to be heading for their 12th league title and a return to the European Cup scene after a one year ban.

There is also life in the other half of the city where ailing Inter Milan have taken heart from the appointment of new coach Luis Suarez.

Suarez, a much-travelled Spaniard, won numerous honours with Internazionale as a player and has now returned for a second spell as coach.

Former coach Corrado Orrico looked doomed from the start of his nine month spell in charge. Coaching Second Division Lucchese is no real preparation for handling a club of Inter's status, and defeats against Boavista in the UEFA Cup and a 1-0 defeat by lowly Atalanta confirmed that Orrico's time was up.

Another club to lose their coach has been bottom club Ascoli. A 4-0 home defeat by Torino was enough to slam the door on Giancarlo de Sisti.

Milan remain four points clear of nearest rivals Juventus on 36 points, following a 0-0 draw at Genoa. Juve failed to take advantage, with a 0-0 draw at lowly Bari. Last season's champions Sampdoria have moved up to seventh place and have extended their unbeaten run to 14 matches following a 1-0 win at Ascoli.

### FRANCE

Apparently, there will be no Briton's in Olympique Marseille's line-up for next season.

Chris Waddle is set to return home for a 'bargain' million at the end of the season, while Trevor Steven, who cost more than Waddle at over £5 million, will probably be available for three.

Jean-Pierre Papin is also set to leave the financially troubled club. He is likely to move to Italy, but not to AC Milan who have recently paid a reported £11.5 million for Dejan Savicevic of Red Star Belgrade.

F.C. Brest have folded recently and their star player, David Ginola, was signed by Paris St Germain almost immediately. Ginola, who overshadowed Paul Gascoigne in the Toulon under-21 tournament three years ago, is hoping the move to one of France's biggest clubs will enhance his international openings and a regular place in Michel Platini's side.

Marseille currently lead the First Division with 41 points, following a 2-0 victory over Toulouse. Monaco remain in second place on 40 points after drawing 1-1 with Toulon.

### SPAIN

Flamboyant Atletico Madrid owner Jesus Gil is still in the news in Spain. His latest outburst came last month when he threatened to ban television cameras from the derby game with Real Madrid unless Atletico received the same rake-off as Real and Barcelona in the annual share-out of T.V. fees.

The Disciplinary Council announced a six-month 'Suspension from all presidential functions' following this latest uproar, which has also had an adverse effect on the team.

Leading the table in September, Atletico are currently in third place with 30 points following a 5-1 thrashing of Real Sociedad. Real, who lead the table on 34 points, did not play last week. Their nearest rivals, Barcelona, trail the leaders by one point after drawing 1-1 with Sporting Gijon.

### GERMANY

German football has been shaken by the biggest betting scandal in its history, and the eight men who organised the ring, have been arrested.

No players or managers were among them, but footballers and coaches have been betting on matches, though it is not suspected that results have been manipulated.

Privately organised betting on football is illegal in Germany. According to law it can be undertaken only through the, licensed State-run pool (called Toto), or lotteries (known as Lotto). All other forms of gambling for gain are forbidden.

Investigations are continuing and some criminal proceedings seem certain against those running illegal betting shops.

On the football front, Borussia Dortmund head the table with 34 points, despite drawing 0-0 with lowly Dresden. VfB Stuttgart close the gap at the top to just two points after their 1-0 win at Schalke. Bayern Munich are currently occupying ninth spot after their dreadful start to the season.

### NETHERLANDS

Johan Cruyff has agreed to manage the Dutch team if they qualify for the 1994 World Cup in the United States.

He will only take charge at the tournament, after another coach, probably Dick Advocaat, has managed Holland in the qualifying matches.

Cruyff has claimed he can combine the job with his task as club manager of Barcelona, but Barca president Josep Nunez reacted furiously when he heard about the deal with the Dutch FA... especially as he learned the news from the press.

Cruyff's contract with Barcelona runs until the summer of 1993, and he was expected to start negotiations soon to stay at the club. But Nunez said in the local press: "I'm not going to negotiate with people who already have their future planned out."

The saga continues...

PSV Eindhoven continue to dominate the Dutch League. Last weekend they won 2-1 at Dordecht to stay two points clear of Feyenoord on 43 points. Feye also won away at FC Vloendam, 1-0.

### PORTUGAL

Since their brilliant 3-1 victory over Arsenal in the second round of the European Cup, the Eagles of Benfica have not produced anything consistent with their ambitions and the demands of their supporters.

Having lost in Kiev and drawn at home against Barcelona, the Portuguese champions now look unlikely to progress any further in Europe's premier cup competition.

Domestic results have also been very poor. Draws against bottom clubs Penafiel and Salgueiros, and against Setubal (a Second Division club) in the Cup, have meant that arch rivals Porto have taken the lead in the championship race. Last weekend though, the lead was cut to just one point after Porto could only manage a 0-0 draw at Torriense, while Benfica won 3-1 at Guimares.

### BELGIUM

Anderlecht, on course for yet another championship, have signed a player who should improve their hopes even further.

They have signed midfielder Bruno Versavel, Mechelen's star player, for £1 million over five years. The champions have also persuaded coach Aad de Mos to sign a two-year contract extension.

Mechelen's Belgian international goalkeeper, Michel Preud'homme has also been in the news in Belgium. He has recently set a league record of 121 consecutive appearances for his club. He has not missed a match since May 1988.

Anderlecht's commanding lead was cut to three points this week after a 0-0 draw with Lierse. Nearest rival Bruges, who have 29 points, won 3-0 away to Courtral.

### GREECE

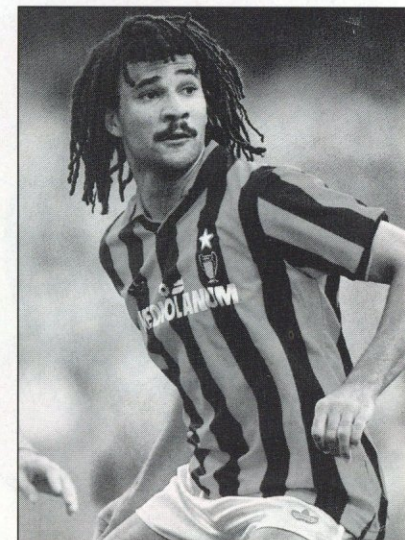
Apollon, so often among the strugglers in Greece, are top of the table at present and look capable of staying there.

Not before time - the club, formed in 1891, have not won a single major honour.

Their biggest success of this surprising season was the 2-1 defeat of Panathinaikos in the Olympic Stadium, their first away win over the current champions for 33 years.

Apollon's top scorer, Imre Katsembach, is also the league's leading scorer with 10 goals so far. Ironically, Katsembach had been rejected by Panathinaikos after a trial after he left MTK in his native Bularia.

Apollon head the table on 20 points following a 2-0 win against Athinaikos - Manchester United's opponents in this year's Cup Winners' Cup - while Panathinaikos remain in second place on 19 points beating rivals Olympiakos 1-0.

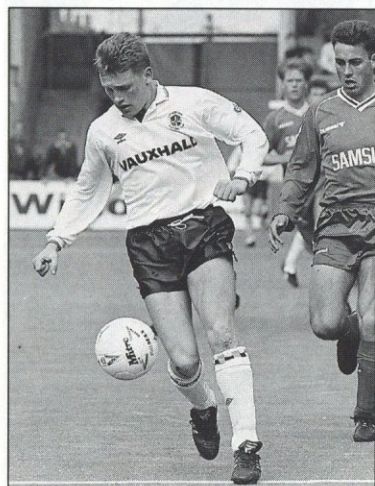

# Handbooks provided a wealth of knowledge down the years

*In this, the first of a two-part series, Roger Wash looks at the history of the Luton Town Handbook from the earliest times, until its final issue in 1963*

Some twenty-five years ago, my late grandfather gave me a virtually complete run of Luton News Football Handbooks, dating back to 1898, and it is probably these items more than anything else that set me off on the never-ending quest for historical and statistical information on the club.

The earliest handbook in my possession is for the 1898/99 season, but no mention is made as to whether this is the first edition, although I have not heard of any earlier - certainly the club's archive collection starts at the same time.

'The Luton News Football Annual', as it was then called, was priced at 1d and was printed by Gibbs & Bamforth on blue paper in a pink cover. What is fascinating for the historian is the head and shoulders photograph of each first team player, together with a brief biography which proved invaluable during the production of 'The Luton Town Story'.

From this first edition we learn that the Town's new goalkeeper, William Perkins, was born in Kettering on January 26, 1876 and started his playing career with Burton Latimer Temperance, and that Jack Durrant was the only local lad on the books that season.

A review of the previous season, a fixture list and series of wonderful adverts make the handbook indispensable, not only for students of the club's history, but also as a social record of the time. Where else would you learn that you could furnish your house with a £2-10-0 (£2.50) worth of furniture for only 2s (10p) a week? - no mention of interest rates either!

Although changing its name to 'Luton News Football Handbook' the following season, the format remained unaltered until 1903 when a smaller edition was published. It was to remain virtually unchanged for the next sixty years.

Although smaller, more pages were introduced, as were features, such as a

list of club officials, clubs affiliated to the Beds FA and sections on the Luton Junior League and the Beds and District League. Also, and of perhaps more importance to myself, was a season-by-season list of players making first team appearances since professionalism was adopted in 1891.

By the time of the outbreak of World War I, the handbook was now established and had expanded considerably. The 1914/15 edition included a preface by 'Crusader' (J.J. Hunt), congratulating the players on promotion back to Division One of the Southern League, and pointing out that the sojourn in Division Two had not cost the club financially as a subsidy was payable for the many trips to Wales.

A marvellous 'team' group of 21 middle-aged men dressed in suits appeared at this time - not the Luton players, but the first photograph of the Supporters' Club committee, which featured the local M.P. as a vice president.

Between the Wars, the handbook increased in price to 2d then 3d before surprisingly dropping back to 2d. Looking at one of the more expensive issues (1929/30), a team photograph is included for your money, as are player appearances and goalscorers, the ever-expanding section on 'Men who have played for Luton', as well as large sections on the local leagues and a list of FA Cup winners.

Unfortunately, the 1939/40 edition, which included the boast of being the biggest ever, was to be the last for seven years due to the War, but what a way to go out. 130 pages packed with information, photographs galore (including one of the club's janitor Arthur Bacon), full results in the FA Cup, Cup Final attendances and league tables. The player profiles were even more comprehensive and, in all, the publication would not look out of place today.

The speedy outside left, has had an eventful career. He was born at New Drompton on September 27th, 1871. Showing promising form as a junior, he was asked to play for Chatham, and there attracted so much notice that Derby County were glad to secure his services. This was in 1891. He remained with the County two seasons, and then went over to Burton Swifts. After one season with them, he was induced to sign on for Luton, for whom he played his first match on September 2nd, 1895. He is very fast and has a wonderfully taking style. His height is 5ft. 9in. and weight 12 st.

### Did you know?

The first time the Town and Crystal Palace met in the league was in 1920/21, following the formation of Division Three.

In those days, games against the same opposition were played on alternate Saturdays, the first match taking place at Kenilworth Road on November 6, 1920, with return on the 13th.

The game at Selhurst Park finished in a 2-1 defeat for the Town, with the first clash finishing level at 2-2.

### It happened five years ago

7/3/87 - In losing 2-0 at Liverpool, the Town suffered their first league defeat since Boxing Day. An injury suffered by skipper Steve Foster in this match kept him out for the rest of the season.

### It happened ten years ago

6/3/82 - A dull 0-0 draw at Grimsby consolidated the Town's position at the top of Division Two.

### It happened 15 years ago

8/3/77 - A late goal from on-loan striker David Geddis secured the points in a 1-0 home win over Oldham. This was the Town's ninth straight win, pushing the team up to fourth position in Division Two.

### It happened 20 years ago

4/3/72 - In the tamest local derby for years, a crowd of 10,816 watched an inept display by the Town and Watford who drew 0-0.

### TOTTENHAM HOTSPUR

League-wise, the season so far has been very disappointing for Tottenham Hotspur. Currently placed 13th in Division One with 35 points, their poor home form is largely responsible for their lowly position.

Surprisingly, Spurs have lost eight league games at White Hart Lane this season, the latest being a 1-0 defeat by today's opponents Crystal Palace last month. Other defeats have come against Chelsea (1-3), Manchester United (1-2), Manchester City (0-1), Sheffield United (0-1), Liverpool (1-2), Nottingham Forest (1-2), Southampton (1-2).

But like many sides who tend to have individual flair players and who like to play good football, Tottenham's cup form has again been very good this term.

Last season Tottenham won the F.A. Cup for a record eighth time against Nottingham Forest. Goals from Paul Stewart and Des Walker (o.g.) secured a Tottenham victory which put them on an equal footing

with rivals Arsenal who, only weeks earlier, had won the league championship.

Although they were knocked out of the FA Cup in round three against Aston Villa this year, Tottenham, under the guidance of former boss Peter Shreeves this season, have reached the semi-final of the Rumbelows League Cup. Disposing of Swansea City, Grimsby Town, Coventry and Norwich City along the way, they again came up against Nottingham Forest in the semi-final. The first leg ended 1-1 at Nottingham, and the game was set for a pulsating second leg. Tottenham's home performance went to form as Forest won a thrilling game 2-1, with goals from former on-loan Town striker Lee Glover and Roy Keane.

The 'glory, glory' nights have also returned to White Hart Lane this season, with Spurs having a very good chance of following in Manchester United's footsteps and reaching the European Cup Winners' Cup final.

After disposing of Sparkasse Stockerau (2-0 on agg), Hadjuk Split (2-1 on agg) and Portuguese giants

F.C. Porto (3-1 on agg), they were due to face Dutch side Feyenoord in the third round, first leg earlier in the week.

With possibly another UEFA Cup place available next season if both Tottenham and Liverpool reach their respective finals, the whole country will be routing for the 'cup specialists' to reach their final in May.

Much of Tottenham's excellent cup form this season can be put down to the fine performances of their England trio Gary Mabbutt, Paul Stewart and Gary Lineker. All three form the backbone to the side and arguably have had their best season for Tottenham. Lineker is currently the First Division's leading scorer while Mabbutt and Stewart have recently made appearances for the full England team.

With Tottenham's minds firmly fixed on their cup exploits, the emphasis will be firmly on the Town to collect all three points. Come to Kenilworth Road on March 11 to see good football and hopefully the Town revenge the 4-1 defeat at White Hart Lane earlier in the season.
