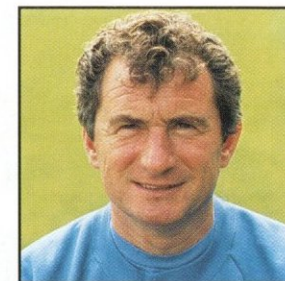

Looking to capitalise on home advantage



MANAGER'S VIEWPOINT BY DAVID PLEAT

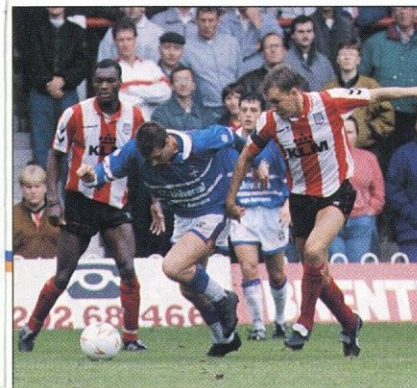
Welcome to our visitors from the West country, their supporters, players and officials. We also extend a particularly warm welcome to Peter Shilton and wish him and his assistant John McGovern every success for the future.

Earlier this season, we finished our pre-season travels with games at Exeter and Plymouth. Honours were shared at Plymouth in a 2-2 draw and Plymouth looked a very solid outfit, but unfortunately a couple of their pre-season signings, who are possibly in contention tonight, were carrying injuries and were unable to play. Their success in the last round against West Bromwich Albion suggests that we must be motivated if we are to be successful. Tonight's game will be a good test for us. I am sure Plymouth will be very difficult to break down defensively. Hopefully, tonight we can capitalise on our home advantage and take a lead back to Home Park. Our last four games have shown that we are playing with more solidity and our concentration has improved, but what we must do is turn our territorial advantage into goals. I am pleased to report that two of

our younger players have been selected for international duty. Tonight, John Hartson should be leading the line for Wales as they take on Israel in a European Youth Championship qualifying match. Aaron Skelton has deservedly been chosen as a standby for the England youth squad who play France in October. Both selections show that there are opportunities at this club for those who work. If he has recovered from a sore knee, Jason Rees will be included tonight. Jason was one of two players who refused the offer of a contract in the summer, but I am hoping to report soon that Jason has re-signed for the club. His contribution to the side has been excellent and he has been partly responsible for the early 'pressing' game that has helped us regain the ball earlier. Over the years, Luton have been regarded as a side who play attractive football, but who are vulnerable once possession has been lost. We are working on this.

This Saturday, we visit Notts County and I am sure that this game will prove to be a difficult test for us, particularly after County's 6-0 defeat at Millwall last Saturday. Our

supporters travelling to the game will not recognise the newly-transformed Meadow Lane. Now nearly all-seater, except for standing room for 2,000, the £3.6 million improvements are a testament to the club's recent success. With £1.6 million of the bill covered by the Football Trust, the club has shown just what can be achieved by a smaller club, not overburdened by debts, working adroitly in the transfer market. So many clubs spend £2 or £3 million in an inflated transfer market, then sell such assets on in a couple of years time. It is my concern that the gulf between clubs is becoming greater with the situation becoming increasingly irreversible. At Luton Town, we are all working, not only to try and stabilise the TEAM, but to ensure that in years to come we have a CLUB to support. We have never wavered in our principles, despite the accent in football today being on a frantic, frenetic, fast, direct and 'get successful quick' philosophy. We will continue to build our base from within and try to make sure the club is strong enough to face the future with confidence.

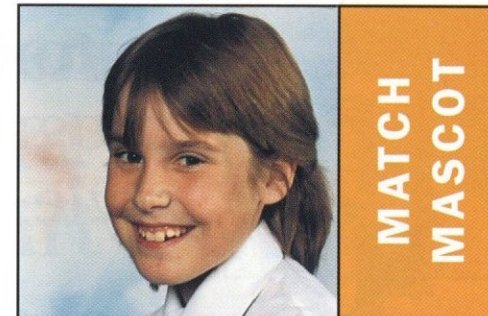

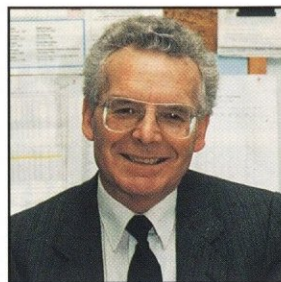

■ This competition replaces the Rumbelows League Cup and our second round match with Plymouth tonight is the first of two legs, the second being played at Home Park, Plymouth on Tuesday, October 6, kick-off 7.45 pm.

■ I have the pleasure in reporting that last weekend, Luton Ladies F.C. progressed through to the second round of the W.F.A. Cup, beating Beccles Ladies 9-1. Tina Lake grabbed a hat-trick, Julie Fensom and Nina Darlow scored two goals each, while Jackie Whittick and Diane Oliver also added their names to the score sheet. The ladies next Premier League game is against local rivals Dunstable, who they have beaten on their last three meetings. All home fixtures are played at Langford F.C. and support by Town followers is most welcome.

■ Last weekend we said goodbye to Kurt Nogan who was given a free transfer after three seasons as a professional at Kenilworth Road. He is yet to find himself another League club, but we all

wish him well for the future.

■ Also on the move in the past week has been goalkeeper Alec Chamberlain. Alec is currently serving a month's loan at Chelsea to help the Blues' current goal-keeping situation. We wish him success during his time at Stamford Bridge.

■ Having drawn their Southern Junior Floodlit Cup match with Chelsea 1-1 on September 10, our youth team will now replay the match at Kenilworth Road on Thursday, October 1st, kick-off 7 pm. Under the present rules of the competition, an admission charge is mandatory and prices will be £1.50 adults and 0.50p OAP's/children. Please come along and support the boys who will hopefully progress to become the next generation of Luton Town first-team players.

■ Finally, next Tuesday (September 29), we entertain Bristol City in an Anglo-Italian Cup preliminary round tie. Having drawn with Watford last week 0-0, we now need a win to progress to the first round proper as Bristol City already have two points from their first game. The winners of each of the eight preliminary groups will be drawn with eight Italian Serie B teams. The 16 teams are then divided into two leagues of eight. The top English side from each group will then play each other, as will the top Italian sides. The final will then have one representative from each country in the final, which is due to take place in March.

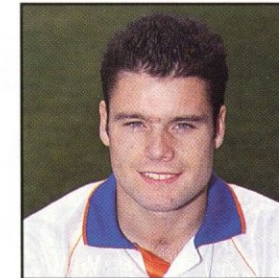

Ankle problems delay Richard's swinging start



PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH RICHARD HARVEY

After getting married in the summer, Richard Harvey was looking forward to the new season — until bad luck struck on the pre-season tour to Sweden...

"It was in the second game," he said. "I injured my left ankle, ligaments and tendons, and it wrecked the rest of my pre-season training and preparations. It didn't do much for my golf game either!"

"Something like that is a serious problem at this time of the year because you still have to build up your level of general fitness as well as match fitness and it is difficult to catch up later. Especially, as happened to me, if you are hit by injury again."

As soon as Richard had recovered from his first ankle injury on his left foot, he was looking forward to a return to training. But in his first training session back, he was struck again by the injury jinx — and this time it was his right ankle.

"I could hardly believe it, but you have to get over these things and get on with the game again. You have to stay positive about it. Fortunately, this time I have managed to return to training without further mishap and I have now played a couple of

reserve games.

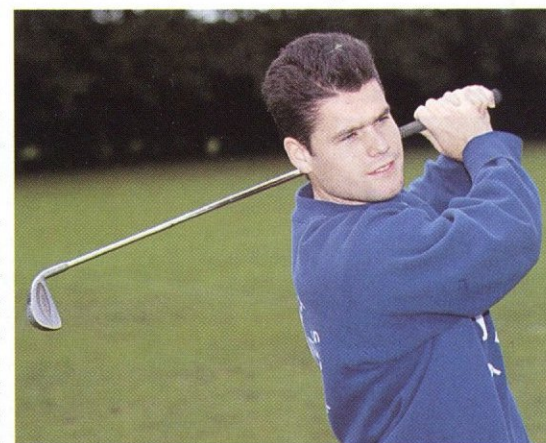
"I just need to get some more games under my belt and build up my match fitness and general sharpness to mount a challenge for a place in the team again. But it is great to see Marvin back in the side and doing well after all the problems he had last year."

Unfortunately, for Richard, it is the first time in five years that he has suffered an injury-hit pre-season and it came only weeks after he had tied the knot with Laraine on June 13. "Since I got married I have picked up a few more responsibilities," he said.

"You have to adjust to a new way of life so I was looking forward to a good start to the season."

Being injured has given Richard a chance to improve his golf a bit and also to enjoy watching several of the early-season games. "The win at Brentford was a big boost and the atmosphere and spirit in the dressing

room afterwards was great. I am sure that result will give all the players a lift."

Looking to impress on competent start



PLYMOUTH ARGYLE F.C. 1992-93

■ The dawn of a new era has arrived at Plymouth Argyle, or that is what the Home Park faithful are hoping for this season under newly-appointed manager Peter Shilton.

■ Shilton took his wealth of knowledge and experience to Argyle in March last season but found it difficult to reverse an ailing league position which eventually led to relegation into the new Division Two. Since then, however, Shilton has made many changes to the team and has bought wisely including Steve McCall from Sheffield Wednesday, Orient pairing of goalscorer Kevin Nugent and midfielder Steve

Castle, and Barnet right-back Gary Poole.

■ Although Cup runs are a bonus for the Pilgrims, Mr Shilton's main aim is to gain promotion back into Division One and tonight's game will provide a good yardstick against which the club can measure themselves. At the time of writing, Argyle have made a competent start to their Second Division campaign, losing just one league game at Hull City (0-2) and winning at home against Bradford (3-0) and Orient (2-0).

■ The club have reached the second round of the Coca Cola Cup by taking the scalp of West Bromwich Albion

who are highly fancied to take the Division Two title this season. After losing 0-1 at the Hawthorns, Mr Shilton took a starring role between the posts on the return leg as Argyle won 2-0 (agg 2-1).

■ Plymouth Argyle F.C. were formed out of the Argyle Athletic club which was formed in 1886 at a meeting at Argyle Terrace, Mutley. Plymouth was a rugby stronghold, but servicemen brought football to the town and it spread quickly. The club originally played both sports in the colours of green and black, but the rugby section was soon disbanded and a professional football club took place.

ARGYLE ON PARADE

RAY NEWLAND (goalkeeper) - Understudy to Peter Shilton, Ray joined Plymouth this summer after experience with Chester and Everton. He recently celebrated his 21st birthday and looks a good prospect for the future.

GARY POOLE (defender) - Gary started his Football League career last season with newcomers Barnet. He was transferred in the close season and judging by reports, Plymouth have signed a competent defender.

STEVE MORGAN (defender) - Steve joined Plymouth from Blackpool last summer and produced some fine displays on his arrival at Home Park. A tall and dominant defender, Steve has been known to score some great goals.

NICKY MARKER (defender) - Nick has performed at centre-back since his arrival from Exeter City and has established himself as a favourite with the Home Park crowd. Commanding in the air, Nicky is known for his 100 per cent work rate.

ANDY MORRISON (defender) - Andy has worked his way up through the apprentice ranks at Argyle and since turning professional, has established himself as a regular first-teamer. Andy is tipped as having a bright future in the game.

STEVE MCCALL (midfield) - A vastly experienced player, Steve joined Argyle from Sheffield Wednesday earlier this year. He started his career with Ipswich in 1979 and spent nine seasons at Portman Road before joining Wednesday in 1987.

WARREN JOYCE (midfield) - Warren signed for Plymouth from Preston North End during the close season. He established himself with Bolton Wanderers during the mid-eighties, making over 200 appearances for the Lancashire club before moving to Preston in 1988.

STEVE CASTLE (midfield) - Steve joined Plymouth along with Kevin Nugent this year from Leyton Orient. He made his debut for Orient in 1984 and made nearly 200 appearances for the Brisbane Road club.

MARK FIORE (midfield) - Mark joined Plymouth from Wimbledon two seasons ago and last season was a first team regular. Mark has also performed well as a defender when needed.

KEVIN NUGENT (forward) - Kevin joined Plymouth from Leyton Orient in March this year and is hoping to repeat the prolific form he showed with Orient last season. He made his debut for the 'O's in 1987 and has played regular League football ever since.

DWIGHT MARSHALL (forward) - Dwight is another Home Park favourite who joined the club from Grays Athletic last summer. He started well last season until injury halted his progress, but is now looking back to his best.

PAUL ADCOCK (forward) - Paul is a former Plymouth youth team player who has broken into the first team this season on a regular basis. He was another player whose progress was halted last term through injury.

MARTIN BARLOW (forward) - Martin signed professional forms for Argyle in 1989 has since made numerous first team appearances. He will be looking to establish a more permanent place this season.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



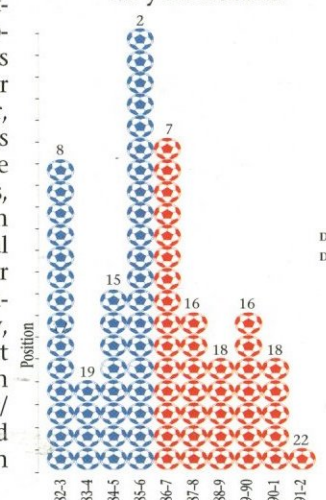
A former England international with a record collection of caps, Peter started his career with Leicester in 1965. He spent ten seasons at Filbert Street before joining Stoke. His most

successful spell in domestic football came after he joined Brian Clough at Nottingham Forest where he won League Championship, League Cup and European Cup honours.

During the eighties, Peter established himself as England's number one goalkeeper, representing his country in three World Cup finals, before retiring from the international scene in 1990. After spells at Southampton and Derby, he took over at Plymouth in March this year as player/manager, but could not keep the club in Division One.

Now with over 1,000 appearances in League football, Peter has already established himself as a favourite at Home Park with his immaculate displays and wealth of experience.

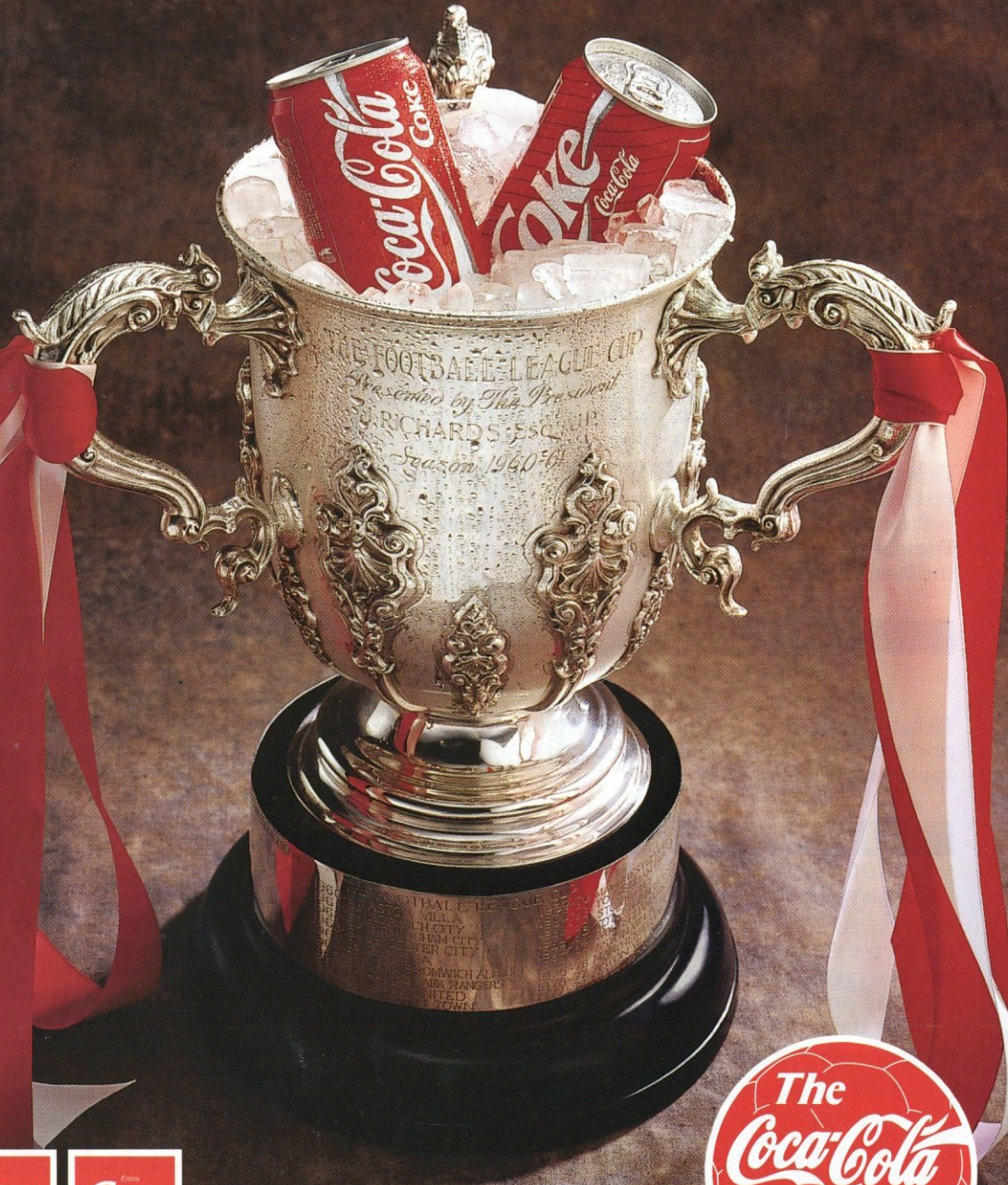

'Brilliant' Luton gain cup success at Home Park

BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH



Despite our long associations, going back to Southern League days, we have only once before been drawn against Plymouth in Cup competitions when in 1948 the two teams were paired together in Round Three of the F.A. Cup at Home Park.

With most of the crowd already in the ground, rain began to fall shortly before kick-off, but this did little to dampen the enthusiasm of the small band of Luton supporters, most of whom had travelled through the night by coach, and they made themselves heard as

Frank Soo led the Town team out.

Soo had been made captain in the "absence" of Horace Gager who, unbeknown to Luton supporters, had already agreed to a transfer to Nottingham Forest. Bernard Streten in the Luton goal was making his last appearance as an amateur as he was due to sign professional forms the following week after his demobilisation.

Luton got off to an excellent start and took the lead after only two minutes when Bobby Brennan fastened on to a through pass from Soo and cracked the ball into the net from 18 yards. Argyle pushed forward after this and caused some danger down the wings, but the crosses were well met by Streten and Les Hall who had taken the place of Gager at centre-half.

As the game wore on, the Town continued to play good football on the greasy surface and always worried the Argyle defence whenever

they broke. It was completely against the run of play when George Dews equalised for the home side.

For a time, the Luton defence looked rocky but with the team down to ten men, when Joe O'Brien had to go off for treatment to a cut head, Hugh Billington restored our advantage with a clever goal.

The second half started with the Town increasing the lead with another goal by Brennan to put us well on top, but Plymouth kept pegging away and scored again through David Thomas mid-way through

the period only for Billington to make the score 4-2 two minutes later.

There was no further scoring and the after match comments from "Chiltern" in the "Luton News" confirmed that the victory was a "brilliant one" and that the team "played grand, go ahead football".

The Town were drawn against Coventry at Kenilworth Road in the next round and duly won through 3-2, but the cup run ended at QPR in Round Five in a 3-1 defeat.

A HATTER AND A PILGRIM

Keith Allen will long be remembered as a member of the fine squad of players that walked away with the Fourth Division championship in 1967/68. For a whole generation of Luton supporters this was the first taste of success after the plummet from Division One and the regular team for that season still trips easily off the tongue.

Although born on the Isle of Wight and joining Portsmouth as a junior, Keith first made his name at Grimsby for whom he made his League debut in 1964/65. Transferring to Stockport the following season, he was the token youngster in a team of old men that took Division Four by storm in 1966/67 but before he was able to pick up his medal he came to Luton in exchange for Derek Kevan in March 1967.

Scoring on his debut for the Town in a 4-0 thrashing of Exeter he never looked back and became a virtual ever-present for the next three seasons scoring 36 League goals and becoming a firm favourite with the Kenilworth Road crowd who nicknamed him "Spider".

He eventually left Luton as the team entered Division Two and went to Plymouth where he enjoyed a further three good seasons before hanging up his boots. He still lives in the Plymouth area.
