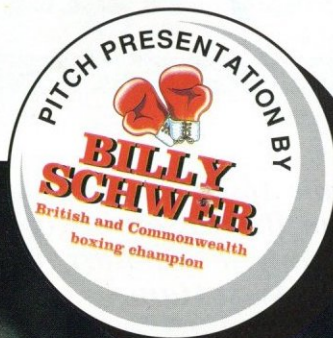

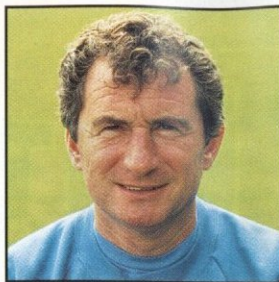

MANAGER'S VIEWPOINT BY DAVID PLEAT

Welcome to this afternoon's game with Millwall who have begun the season in good form. Last Sunday I enjoyed the company of Mr Burr, the Millwall Chairman, as his club deservedly beat West Ham.

It is a tribute to the hard work behind the scenes at Millwall that they can now face the future with optimism. Next season they will be playing in a new stadium.

Last Saturday's result at Oxford was most disappointing but I do believe that the effort was there. John Durnin's fourth effort was borne out of

supreme confidence.

We should also give credit to the fine skill of Beauchamp that led to Durnin's crucial first goal. At times we defended naively and our goal attempts did not reflect the territorial supremacy we had. For sure, 4-0 was a cruel reflection, but that is the only fact that

counts. It is now that one looks for confidence, support and motivation.

I could not have asked for a better reference than the old warrior Brian Horton, who wrote in his programme column, "It was a super club with a good set of players and a manager for whom we both (David Moss) have a great deal of regard and respect. David and I both learned an awful lot under him. We played in a very good side which always played good football and I still believe that they try and play today. I think his ideals and

his knowledge of the game are second to none." Much appreciated. He was referring to our club.

Luton can become a force again and it is down to the ambition of the people working for the club in whatever capacity. But it is vitally important that the majority of our

honest supporters try and lift our players, particularly the younger ones in these difficult times. We know the extent of the challenge – it is far greater than many understand. In football there is no place for pessimism and I was hugely encouraged last week by the efforts of the younger elements in the club.

The reserve side completed three games in a five-day spell in solid fashion and the youth team had a victory against Tottenham which few would have witnessed. The 2-1 win

Neil Ryan made a decision not to accept a shadow squad place with England Youth for future consideration with Scotland.

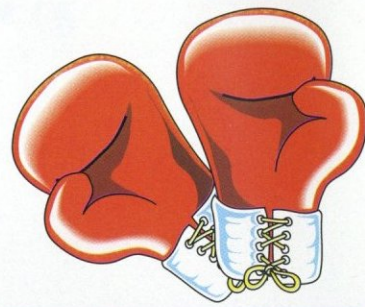
I would like to be writing about the first team performances. Changes have to be

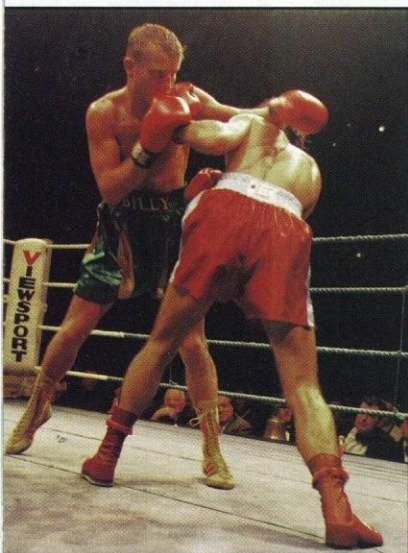
Get behind the players today and let's hope for a return of some good fortune.

Drug taking not for champions

EUROPEAN DRUG PREVENTION WEEK

As you may be aware, this week has been European Drug Prevention Week and to promote this worthy event and show local children the dangers of taking drugs, L.T.F.C. and the Luton Borough Council Leisure and Amenities Department joined forces on Thursday night to present a unique 5-a-side tournament.

Sixteen teams aged 11-14 and 16 teams aged 9-11 gathered at the Lea Manor Recreation Centre in Luton to participate in the tournament, which not only provided

teams with exciting games to play in, but it also promoted drug awareness via talks and posters which were displayed in the Recreation Centre.

The winners and runners-up will be our guests for the afternoon, as will Luton lad Billy, who is also keen to spread the anti-drugs message. "It is very important that the dangers of drugs are made aware particularly to children, some who are easily influenced," he said. "If you are ever going to be successful in life, you are only going to do it by living a clean lifestyle. It is very encouraging to see our town taking a leading role in Drug Prevention Week and the football tour-

namment was an excellent idea by Luton Town and the Council."

Luton Town Community Liaison Officer Gary Hooper was one of the brainchilds behind the event, and speaking before the tournament he was confident it would be a success. "Hopefully we will see some good football being played, but the main reason we have organised the tournament is to promote drug awareness. If the children return home on Thursday night knowing of the dangers of drugs, then the whole event would have been a success."

Billy joins us today fresh from his success at the Royal Albert Hall last month when he defeated title-holder Carl Crook with millions watching on BBC Television to claim the British and Commonwealth title. Supported ringside by over 1,000 fans from the Luton area, Billy floored Crook three times in the ninth round to take the crown.

"At the moment I feel on top of the world," beamed Billy. "I have had hundreds of cards saying well done and the calls have been flooding in. Although I am now the champ, I still have a lot to learn and the fight against Carl was part of that process. The fans who came to support me were brilliant, and if there are any in the crowd today, I would just like to say thank-you."

The scheme has been a terrific success so far not only for the schools and young visitors, but also for many other community groups linked with the club.

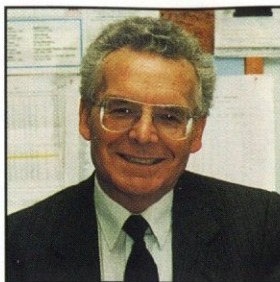

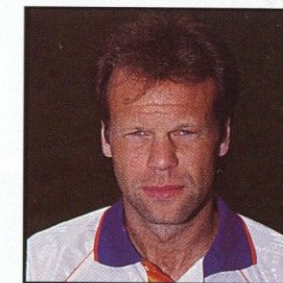

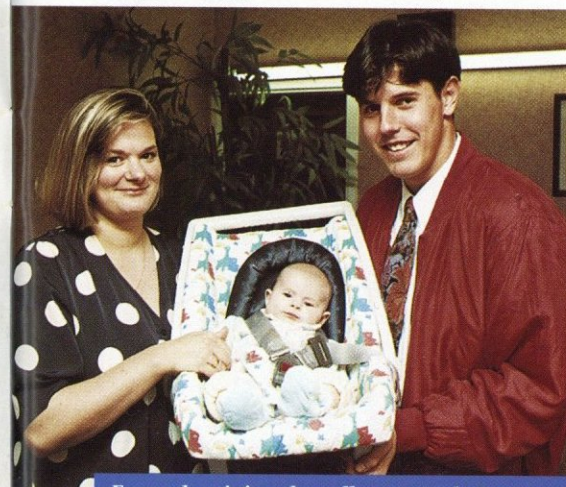
Whittingham for Portsmouth.

Charlton's last game overshadowed by Magpie rollercoaster

NEWS ON ONE

Charlton Athletic return to The Valley on December 5 for their first league game at their south-east London home for seven years. Their last match as tenants at Upton Park was anything but a party as Kevin Keegan's Newcastle United marched on to the First Division title.

Two goals from England candidate Gavin Peacock and one from teenager Gary Howey secured all three points as the Magpies won 3-1 - their seventh league win away from home already this season. Charlton co-manager Steve Gritt could only admire the way the men from the north-east took the game to Charlton, who have now lost five of their last seven matches.

"Their work-rate was tremendous," said Gritt. "Every time the ball went loose they had three players trying to win it back. You can see why they are top of the table." Newcastle boss Keegan was also full of praise for the way his side played. He said: "We played too much football for them; I thought 3-1 was the least we deserved."

A 2-1 defeat for Sunderland at home to Leicester City last Sunday left manager Malcolm Crosby clinging to his job. Since leading the Rokermen to the FA Cup Final against Liverpool last May, the side have struggled to come to terms with the new First Division this season and are currently fourth from bottom in the table. They have now lost nine league games this season, although goalkeeper Tony Norman believes that the

crowd's bitter chanting towards the end against Leicester did not help. "If we had a new manager at the helm for today's game, the crowd would have gone away saying that we were unlucky. But at the moment, they seem to be on the bandwagon, putting pressure on us all. We need the crowd on our side if we are to reverse the situation."

Tranmere Rovers continued their quiet climb up the table with a 3-2 home victory against Brentford, who themselves have been going well of late. Trailing by two goals with 32 minutes remaining, two Pat Nevin strikes secured the points for Rovers which left manager Johnny King obviously delighted. "We showed

tremendous character to turn the situation around against a very determined side," he said.

Malcolm Allison returned to the English football scene last Saturday, to take temporary charge of a Bristol Rovers side who are reeling at the foot of the table with just nine points. Allison stepped in after the dismissal of Denis Rofe and although Rovers lost to an improving Derby County side 2-1, there were signs of a revival. "If they go on playing like that they will stay up," said Allison. "The officials here have asked me to continue to look after things while they think about appointing a new manager. Whether they want me to stay or not I have no idea."

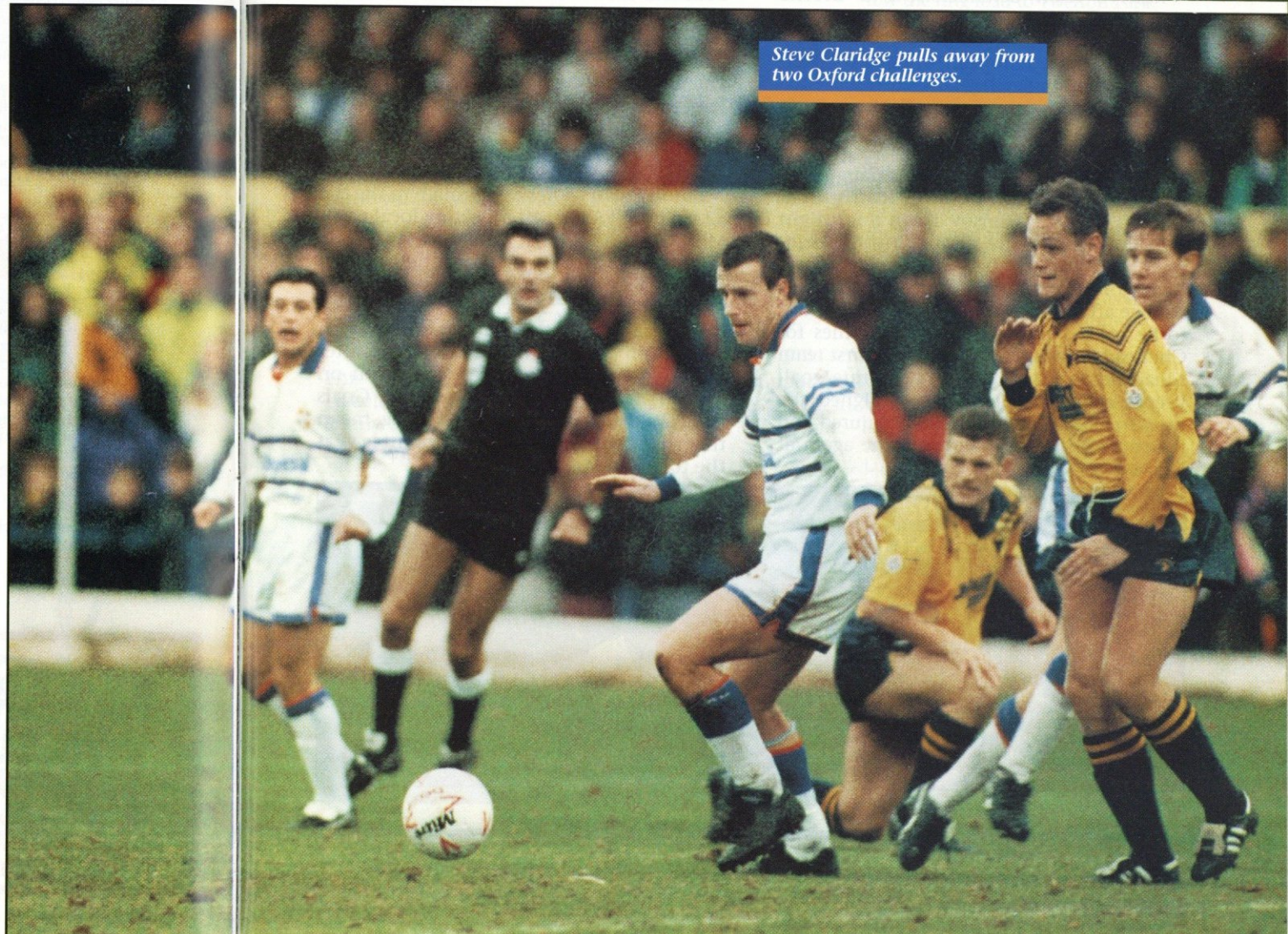

Promotion a distinct possibility for McCarthy's men

MILLWALL F.C. 1992-93



■ Millwall visit Kenilworth Road this afternoon pushing for a play-off place after an impressive run of results which has seen the south London club win five of their last six matches. It is a sequence which has delighted manager Mick McCarthy, although he has urged his players to keep their feet firmly on the ground. "Obviously I am pleased with our results, particularly with the style of football we are playing," he stated. "However, I have been in football long enough now to know that things turn against you just as quick."

■ Victory this afternoon would be the Lions' ninth, following home wins against Oxford (3-1), Swindon (2-1), Notts County (6-0), Wolves (2-0) Bristol City (4-1), West Ham (2-1), and away at Charlton (2-0) and at Derby County (2-1). It could elevate the side into an automatic promotion spot and back into the Premier League after a three-year absence. Then under manager John Docherty, the Lions were one of the most feared sides in the then First Division, peaking at the top for a period of time with names such as Sheringham, Cascarino and Carter grabbing the headlines for the first time.

■ The Millwall faithful believe those glory days are on the way back, but with the names Cooper,

Allen and Rae now taking the applause. Another important factor in the Millwall revival is the support the fans have been giving, both home and away and Mr McCarthy is quick to point out their part in the club's success. "We want to keep the fans on our side, and that mean extending our winning run," he continued. "It is lovely to have such partizan following and I wouldn't have it any other way."

■ Millwall F.C. were formed in 1885 as Millwall Rovers by employees of Morton and Co, a jam and marmalade factory in West Ferry Road. The founders, predominantly Scotsmen, set up headquarters in The Islanders pub in Tooke Street, Millwall and played their first game in an East End Cup match in 1887. Founders members of Division Three, they played their first league match in 1920, defeating Bristol Rovers 2-0. A member of the side that day was Jack Fort who also became the first Third Division player to be capped for England.

■ Despite their long existence, success for the Lions has been fairly limited. They won the Division Two championship in 1988 and the Division Three (S) crown in 1928 and 1938. The Club also won the Football League Trophy in 1983.

LIONS ON PARADE

KASEY KELLER (goalkeeper) – Born in Washington, USA, Kasey is a highly-rated American goalkeeper who joined Millwall in January 1992. Understudy to Tony Meola in the 1990 World Cup finals, he is favourite to claim the jersey for the 1994 tournament.

KENNY CUNNINGHAM (defender) – Signed from Irish side Tolka Rovers, Kenny is a promising young full-back who claimed a regular first team spot towards the end of last season. He has represented the Republic of Ireland at under-21 and B levels.

IAN DAWES (defender) – Now in his fourth season at The Den, Ian started his career at Queens Park Rangers before joining Millwall in a £150,000 deal. He has made nearly 400 league appearances in a career which started in 1982.

COLIN COOPER (defender) – Successfully converted by Mick McCarthy from full-back to central defence towards the end of last season, Colin was last season's Junior Lions Player of the Year. He was signed from Middlesbrough for £300,000 in July 1991 and made his debut against his former Club.

ANDY ROBERTS (defender) – A versatile youngster, 18-year-old Andy broke into the Millwall side in April 1992. A product of the Club's youth scheme, he was a member of the F.A. Youth Cup winning side in 1991.

ANDY MAY (midfield) – A former team-mate of Mick McCarthy at Manchester City, the Lions boss brought him to The Den from Bristol City in June 1992 in exchange for David Thompson. He has also served Huddersfield and Bolton and is a former England under-21 international.

ALEX RAE (midfield) – Scottish under-21 international, Alex cost £100,000 from Falkirk in August 1990. Top-scorer last season with 11 goals, he attracted attention from Premier League clubs and would command a

sizeable fee if allowed to leave The Den.

JAMIE MORALEE (midfield) – Jamie joined Millwall as part of the exchange deal which took Chris Armstrong to Crystal Palace. He made his Football League debut for the Eagles at Southampton last season and has made a first team spot his own this term with Millwall.

PHIL BARBER (midfield) – An experienced left-sided midfielder, Phil also joined Millwall from neighbours Crystal Palace. He made two F.A. Cup Final appearances in 1990 and has been a consistent performer since his arrival at The Den in August 1991.

TONY DOLBY (forward) – 18-year-old Tony has been included as a substitute this season after impressing in the reserve team at Millwall last term. He is another product of the Club's successful youth team policy.

MALCOLM ALLEN (forward) – Welsh international, Malcolm started his career with Watford before joining Norwich City in 1988. It was at Carrow Road that he won the first of his twelve international caps. He joined Millwall in 1990, but missed much of last season through injury.

JON GOODMAN (forward) – John was signed from non-league Bromley in 1990 for £30,000 and has been a regular first team squad member since his arrival. A pacey forward, he reached the final of the Rumbelows Sprint Challenge last season.

JOHN BYRNE (forward) – A prolific goalscorer for Sunderland in the FA Cup last season, John arrived at the Den from Roker Park just over a month ago. He started his career at York City, before joining Queens Park Rangers. He has also played for Le Havre in France and at Brighton and is a Republic of Ireland international.

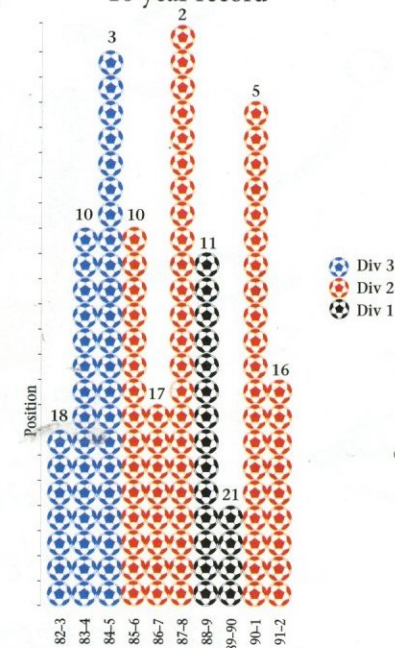
Mick McCarthy started his footballing career as a raw 18-year-old with Barnsley in 1977. Performing at centre-back, he went on to play 46 times in his first season at Oakwell and became a firm crowd favourite. He went on to make nearly 300 appearances for Barnsley before joining Manchester City

in 1983.

He helped the Blues into the First Division and became club captain before moving north of the border with Celtic in 1987 and later joining Lyon. He was officially appointed player/manager of Millwall F.C. in April 1992 after a period as a player, then as caretaker boss.

He skippered the Republic of Ireland in the 1990 World Cup Finals and has made over 50 appearances for his country, the latest caps coming during the Republic's tour of the U.S.A. in May/June 1992.

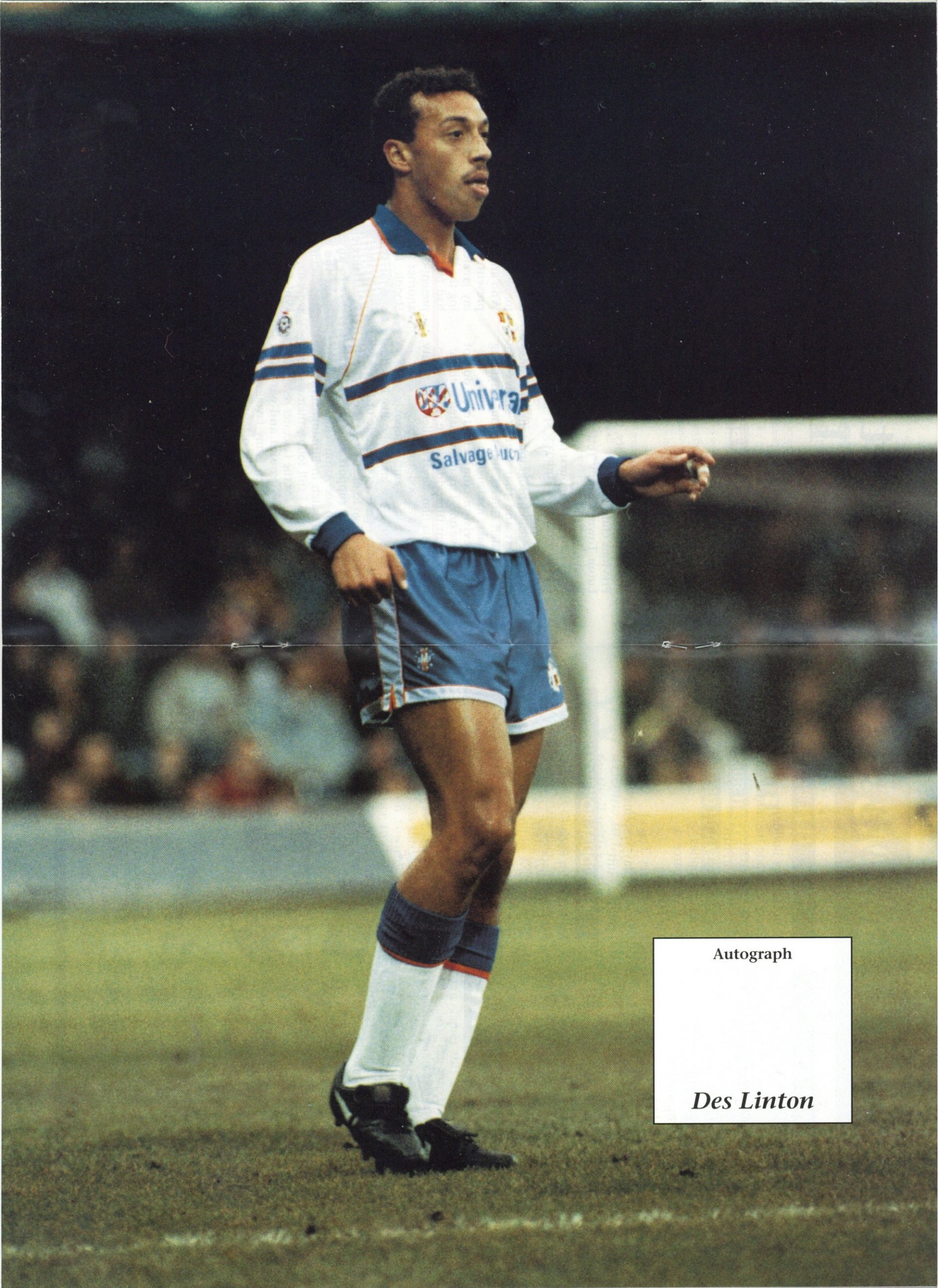
What single piece of advice would you give to any young footballer hoping to make the grade: Listen to all the advice and coaching you receive, take it in and work hard.

Double delight helps the Hatters clinch promotion



BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH

During the Town's promotion season from Division Three (South) in 1936/37, two of the most exciting and important games were played against today's opposition, Millwall.

Although early season home form was superb, the away record was nothing to shout about. By the time of the visit to The Den on 21st November, three defeats in succession on their travels had prevented the Town from making a real push for the top.

Millwall on the other hand were having their best season for years and a massive crowd of 32,504 turned up to see if the Lions could go clear at the top. But the Luton players had other ideas by winning the game 2-0.

"Chiltern" reporting in the Luton News confirmed that the Town played "with a relentlessness and determination hitherto unknown in their away games this season and ran the home side to a standstill." The Town defence soaked up a fair amount of pressure but kept the Millwall forwards at arms length with Luton skipper Jack Nelson following the dangerous Dave Mangnall everywhere.

With swift counter-attacking causing endless problems to Millwall it came as no real

surprise when Fred Roberts put the Town into the lead with an unstoppable shot a minute from the interval.

The second half mirrored the first with the Town emphasising their superiority and doing more of the attacking. The game was eventually settled ten minutes from the end when Joe Payne hit a centre from Jack Ball on the volley past stationary Duncan Yuill in the Millwall goal.

The home crowd were finally given something to get excited about when Mangnall, presumably out of frustration, engaged "in a bout of fisticuffs" with Nelson. The referee did not have a clear view of the incident and decided to book both players rather than send them off, but a large crowd gathered outside the ground afterwards to have a word with Nelson as he made his way to the coach.

Mangnall defused the situation, however, by escorting Nelson up the steps and shaking his hand. Unfortunately, the matter did not end there because Stanley Rous, then Secretary of the F.A., was attending the match and sub-

sequently arranged for both players to attend a hearing where they received lengthy suspensions.

The ramifications of this "underhand" punishment reverberated around Fleet Street for weeks afterwards.

By the time of the return fixture, on 27th March, both teams were still in the promotion frame but Millwall were the talk of the country as they had become the first Third Division side to reach the F.A. Cup semi-final.

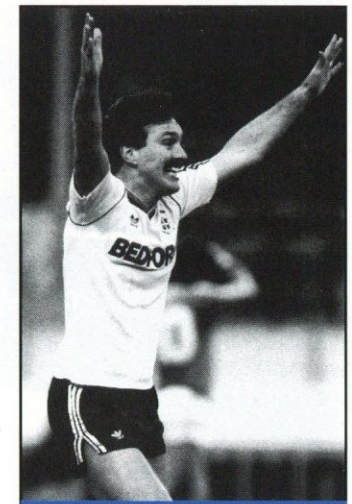
Whether Millwall had one eye on their forthcoming semi-final or were missing the injured Mangnall we can never tell. But the Town certainly did their promotion hopes no harm at all in winning 5-0 with a sparkling display against a previously unrelenting mean defence.

Although only 1-0 up at half-time, the Town had only been prevented from running up a cricketscore by the excellent play of Millwall goalkeeper Burke. Even he was powerless to prevent Roberts, Payne, George Stephenson and Jock Finlayson from running riot and adding further goals to send the crowd of 18,262 wild.

With eight games to go, six of them at home, the Town never lost their grip and went on to eventual promotion while Millwall lost their semi-final to Sunderland, but made up for it by winning the championship the following season.

A HATTER AND A LION

Lambeth-born Alan Garner joined his local side Millwall from school and signed apprentice terms in 1967. He patiently waited for his first team chance which eventually came in October 1970 in a home game against Blackburn which the Lions won 2-0.

He was dropped after that and made only one other appearance before being given a free transfer in the summer of 1971. Luton chief scout Harry Haslam persuaded Alec Stock to sign him for the Town where initially he was seen as understudy to Chris Nicholl.

When Nicholl was transferred to Aston Villa in March 1972 Garner made the centre-back position his own and was ever present as the Town won promotion to Division One in 1973/74.

Mid-way through the following season, he was surprisingly transferred to Watford where he enjoyed considerable success as the Hornets moved up through the Divisions before finishing off his career at Portsmouth ten years ago.

Deportivo continue to impress in Spain



SCENE AROUND EUROPE

With the European leagues now in full swing, we take our latest look at the big stories and big names grabbing the headlines across the continent.

It is not only the English Premier League that has seen unfancied teams vie for league leadership in the opening four months of the season. In Spain, Deportivo De La Coruña – who finished last season fourth from bottom – have led the table since the third week of the season and show no sign of surrendering their charge. “They have brought a breath of fresh air to Spanish football in general,” said Johann Cruyff, manager of rivals Barcelona, “However, I still believe the resources and team strength of the bigger clubs will show through in time.”

Last weekend, Deportivo maintained a two-point lead over ‘bigger clubs’ Barca and Real Madrid following a 2-1 victory against Sporting Gijon. Barcelona beat bottom-placed Logrones while Real won 1-0 at Real Zaragoza.

Nantes, who finished mid-table in the French first division last season have been impressing across the Channel and are currently leading the table after losing only one of their opening 12 matches. They are proving that youth is the best policy, having seven players aged 23 or under in the side which beat champions Olympique Marseille 1-0 and sent the side to the top of the league. Paris St Germain lost the top spot, losing 3-2 at lowly Nimes. Marseille are having an indifferent season by their own standards and are currently fourth.

With no matches in the Italian League last week, Paul Gascoigne’s Lazio travelled to Spain for a prestige friendly with Diego Maradona’s Seville. However, only 2,000 fans turned up to watch a game which saw Gazza score a fine individual goal in a 1-1 draw.

“I was very impressed with Paul,” said Maradona after the match. “I believe he can go on to achieve great things in Italy and do for Lazio what I was able to do for Napoli.”

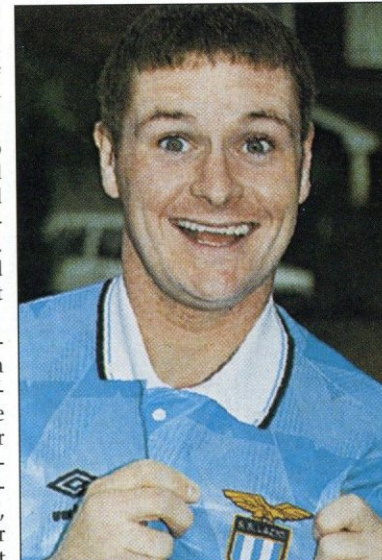
In Holland, PSV Eindhoven predictably look in control after 10 weeks of the season and are four points clear of Feyernoord after winning 2-1 at F.C. Twente. Ajax, so often PSV’s main rivals look decidedly out of sorts this season and are currently in fifth position. Their inconsistent form could have much to do with the increasing speculation that their star player Denis Bergkamp could be on his way to A.C. Milan.

The Dutch striker has scored 86 league goals in 165 league games in Holland, and Milan have reputedly put in an offer of £20 million!

In Portugal, Porto maintained their two-point lead at the top of the Portuguese First Division after defeating Forense 3-0. Arch-rivals Benfica could only manage a 1-1 draw at Gil Vicente and responded promptly by sacking their coach, the Croatian Tomislav Ivic, after less than three months in the job and with the side still remaining in third place!

German captain Lothar Matthaeus has led a revival at

German giants Bayern Munich. After the disappointments of last season when the side finished 10th, the arrival of the former European Player of the Year from Inter Milan has lifted the side, and they currently lead the Bundesliga by two points from Bayer Leverkusen. However his return to the national team after seven months out injured was not nearly as promising. He gifted Mexico a late equaliser in a friendly match last month.

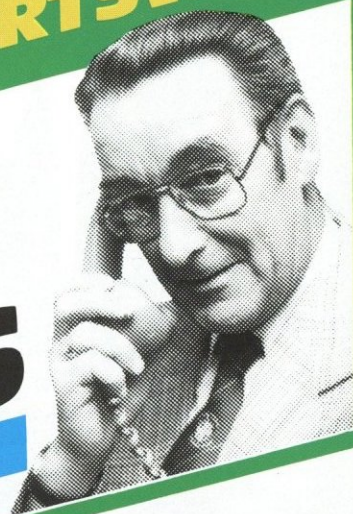

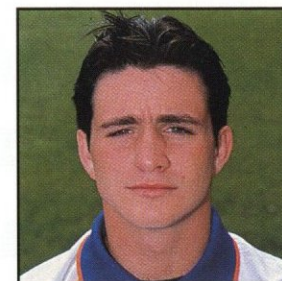

Ceri puts injury nightmares behind him



PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH CERI HUGHES

It has been a year to forget for talented midfielder Ceri Hughes. After missing much of last season with a knee ligament injury, Ceri was looking forward to the 1992-93 campaign with fresh optimism — that was until disaster struck again.

As planned, Ceri featured in the Town's opening three fixtures and was looking well on the way to regaining full match fitness, playing a leading role in midfield. However, as the Town prepared for a midweek trip to league leaders Newcastle, he found himself back on the physio's couch, looking ahead at more weeks of rehabilitation.

"We were having a friendly game in training when I was tackled by one of our younger players and I felt my ankle go straight away," said Ceri. "It was obvious that I had done some serious damage and when I found out that the ligaments were damaged, I was devastated. It was a real kick in the teeth after what I had been through the previous season."

Once put in plaster and after a couple of weeks rest, the lonely road to regaining match fitness began again. "During the early stages while I was in plaster, all I could do was work on the muscles in the top half of my body," he said. "As the damage began to heal, I was able to use the mountain bike at

the training ground to build my legs up again although I was still in the cast. It was about eight weeks in total before I could play again."

The game which saw the return of Ceri to action in a Town shirt came at Stotfold in the Beds Premier Cup at the end of October. Ceri played the first 45 minutes, but was brought off as a precautionary measure as the Town coasted to a 4-0 victory.

"I was a little weary at first of playing, but it was important

that I came through without any problems. I followed up that game with a reserve team outing against Portsmouth and managed a whole game.

"With each run-out I am feeling fitter and stronger and now feel I am well on the way to making a return to first team action."

With the Town's current

lowly position in Division One, the return of Ceri to the squad is sure to give fans and players alike a big lift, but Ceri is playing down his return to the first team.

"I am not guaranteed a place in the team as I believe we have a solid midfield unit at the Club. However, when my chance does come along again, I will be desperate to make an impression and help the Club back on the winning track. Afterall, I have a lot of time to make up."

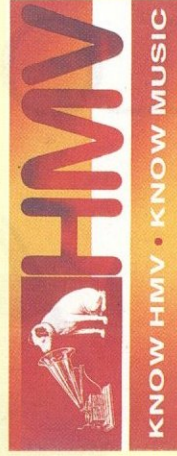
