MANAGER'S VIEWPOINT BY DAVID PLEAT

Welcome to this afternoon's game. I would particularly like to extend a warm welcome to the supporters, officials and players of Bristol City.

City should have no trouble finding the location of our dressing rooms, having been here twice before this season, but they will notice a marked deterioration in our pitch. There are many contributory factors that have caused the problems. We have to hope that we get the correct sequence of weather conditions to enable our groundsmen to do as much repairing as possible.

In connection with this problem, we have switched our reserve fixtures to the home of Leighton Town Football Club and we thank them most sincerely for offering this help. We also thank the Neville Ovenden Football Combination for

accepting this alternative. Our home games will now be played on Tuesday afternoons at 2.00pm. A recent trip there saw a young group win a Bedfordshire Senior Cup tie by 3-1. I was impressed with the turn out and the hospitality accorded to our team.

Since my last programme notes, both Aaron Skelton and John Hartson, two of our Y.T.S. boys, have signed professional forms. Normally I would have refrained from making this arrangement and hopefully agreed their signatures at the end of the season. However, our present resources have pushed the younger players further forward and it could well be that both Aaron and John

receive opportunities this season. Furthermore, unscrupulous clubs can make "behind the back door" noises in their direction and spirit them away for derisory figures as Y.T.S. boys. It is just one of the problems that face clubs and has to be attended to. Only last week, a Premier League suggestion was that there be a bar on transfers during the season. Had they thought of the small play-

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ing squads in the lower leagues? Another idea was an under-21 league. Had they considered that most well run clubs' reserve sides already consist of under-21-year-old players?

Once again I thank the many supporters who have enquired about Darren Salton. He is progressing and all our fingers are crossed.

We would like to welcome Andy McDade from Barnet Football Club who will take over our physiotherapy duties from Brian Owen, who is joining Ian Atkins as assistant coach at Cambridge United. We wish Brian well and we hope that Andy will have a long and happy association with us. It poses another question for the new 'voice' of the Institute of

On the transfer front, Juergen Sommer continues at Torquay and had another clean sheet against Shrewsbury prior to Christmas. Also when these notes were penned, Chris Kamara was into his second month at Sheffield United: a club having problems that are not new to us.

I was fascinated to read that Alex Ferguson of Manchester United was telling the press prior to the game at Chelsea that he had tried to buy Mick Harford last season. Time can warp the memory. It was my suggestion, after making an enquiry for Donaghy towards the transfer deadline last season, that Harford was the type of player to compensate for the diabolical pitch at Old Trafford. He wanted someone who could 'head a goal' when the uneven surface stopped their fluid passing. I, as usual, sung Harford's praises but did not get the plea-

sure of a bid of any sort. Water under the bridge, but it is important that fellow managers do not use the press to embarrass other clubs - or indeed players at times, as Gary Lineker suggested in his little pre-Christmas scuffle with the England manager, Graham Taylor.

Let us hope that today we can progress to the next round of the cup. No one should ever under-estimate the importance of a cup run and it is down to our players to make sure they give their recent 110%. We can ask no more and hope fortune smiles on us.

NEWS ON ONE

Today sees the entrance of the 'bigger' clubs to the F.A. Cup. We focus on the more intriguing clashes involving the clubs in Division One.

The third round of the F.A. Cup frequently produces its fair share of major shocks as well as predictable triumphs. Who could forget Wrexham's dramatic victory against champions Arsenal last season, or non-league Sutton's dismissal of Coventry City in 1988?

It appears that the First Division clubs have avoided what could turn out to be possible shock defeats against lower opposition this season, with no club having to visit or entertain non-league or Third Division teams.

Many supporters could be forgiven for thinking that today is just another Barclays First Division weekend, with no less than 12 clubs facing each other at this early stage of the cup.

Two teams hoping to put their league struggles to one side this afternoon are Notts County and Sunderland. Both are, at the time of writing, in the lower reaches of Division One and need a Cup run to lift their flagging fortunes. There will no doubt be extra pressure placed on Sunderland this season after catching the nation's imagination last term, with a run which took them all the way to Wembley. Without the goalscoring instincts of John Byrne this season though, they could struggle to make an impact.

Byrne is now applying his trade in south London with high-flying Millwall. They face a tricky trip to Roots Hall where Colin Murphy's Southend United await. Byrne is struggling to find the net for the Lions since his £500,000 transfer earlier in the season, but winger Jamie Moralee has provided the ammunition which has fired the club into Premier League contention. The Shrimpers' mini-revival in recent weeks has been a result of Stan Collymore's goalscoring instincts.

However, the on-loan Crystal Palace striker is unlikely to feature this afternoon as Eagles manager Steve Coppell will not want the striker cup tied, especially if Palace's poor form in front of goal continues.

The First Division's representation in the competition will be further depleted in Round Four once the ties between Brentford and Grimsby, and Watford and Wolves are decided. There will be little to choose from both these ties, with only Brentford showing any kind of consistent form in recent weeks.

Leicester City will be hoping to convert their recent league success into cup glory against Barnsley. They have proved to be more than a match for any side at Filbert Street this season - losing just twice - and will look to last season's success at this stage against Crystal Palace, to make the hat for round four.

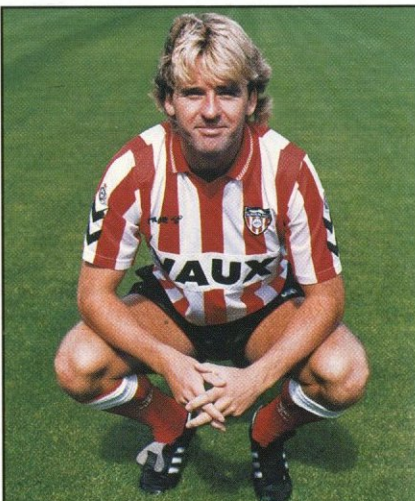
Swindon Town, Charlton Athletic, Cambridge United and Bristol Rovers all have the chance to pit their wits against the elitist Premier League sides. Bristol Rovers have the daunting prospect of facing title contenders Aston Villa at Villa Park. However, a cup upset is not out of the question for the Twerton Park side who, under the expert guidance of Malcolm Allison, have turned in some remarkable scorelines of late. They will be looking for the same inspiration which had eventual winners Liverpool reeling last season.

Charlton face the prospect of a trip to Elland

Road against a Leeds United side, determined to turn their own stuttering season around with a cup run. The odds are against the Addicks, who have not won away since September. United have not lost at Elland Road for nearly two years.

Cambridge face Sheffield Wednesday at the Abbey Stadium, while Swindon have the chance to show the nation their free-flowing football in front of the television cameras at Q.P.R. on Monday evening.

We wish all our First Division clubs in the cup success this season, and hope that they fly the flag in the same style and fashion as Sunderland and Portsmouth did last term.

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This afternoon we extend a warm welcome to the directors, management, players and followers of Bristol City and wish them, once today's cup fixture is played, a very happy and successful New Year. Having visited us twice before, I am sure they will find the surroundings familiar.

The pitch, however, may appear to play very differently from their previous visits earlier in the season — and it is the playing surface to which I wish to draw your attention this afternoon. No-one, I am sure, can fail to have noticed the problems with the mud we have recently encountered.

As everyone is aware, the club reverted to grass for the 1991-92 season. The new pitch was laid by En-Tout-Cas, who had previously laid our synthetic surface. They followed specifications prepared by the Sports Turf Research Institute (STRI).

At the end of the season, like one's own lawn after relaying, certain areas had settled and required maintenance to provide a flat playing surface. In our case the advice given by the STRI was to apply a top dressing to the worst affected areas. This should bring the pitch up to standard.

Original specification for the

new pitch was a 70/30 sand/soil mix, with a particular type of soil being required. The specification for the top dressing was the same.

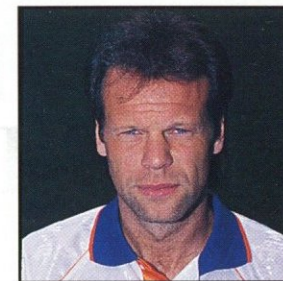
It appears however that the top dressing as delivered to the Club was not the same specification, which resulted in water not being able to infiltrate, resulting in areas of mud. This was shown clearly on inspection by myself, the groundsman and a representative of STRI, when numerous holes were dug all over the pitch. We are currently awaiting a full report from STRI.

In the meantime they have advised us to put sand on the worst affected areas and regularly fork these areas to enable the water to drain away. The effects of this were seen at our game against Sunderland where, on the Friday afternoon, several inches of water covered the pitch and by kick-off the following day the groundsman and all his helpers had performed miracles to enable the game to go ahead and the pitch was in better condition than had been noted recently.

We hope, naturally, that the weather will be kinder this winter than it was in the autumn, when the heavy rain made life difficult for everyone — especially the players.

Finally, may I thank all our loyal supporters for their support in 1992 and wish everyone a very happy and peaceful New Year.

1 992 was not a particularly good year for us Hatters. Let's hope we are set for a better time in '93, starting with today's game against Bristol City.

We have a very good chance of starting the New Year on the right note against Bristol City in the F.A. Cup. Since they visited us last in the Anglo-Italian Cup, they have not had a particularly good time in the league, and our own form has shown an improvement. I am confident we can make it 'third time lucky' against them this season and progress into the fourth round draw.

Cup runs are vitally important to any side, as they keep the long, hard season buzzing and give the supporters something to look forward to. I know how important a good cup run can be both for morale and finances. I remember when I was at Coventry and we reached the final in 1987. The whole town was given a big lift and it put us on the map. I want the same thing to happen with Luton. There was a tradition here in the late eighties of cup success. I want those days to return.

Knowing that you do not get a second chance in cup games usually accounts for 100 miles-per-hour football, with the possible reward of drawing a 'plum tie' in the next

round. If we equip ourselves properly to the task ahead, we can look forward to the next round. Who knows who we might face then? If we can pit ourselves against a Premier League side, I am sure our experience last season will be invaluable.

Looking ahead, January is going to be a tough month for us. We play Birmingham City and Notts County, who like ourselves, are not in the position they would like to be at this stage of the season. It is important that we take points from these clubs to help us close the gap on the clubs who are currently safe in mid table.

We then face Newcastle United here at Kenilworth Road on January 27. When we played up there earlier in the season we lost 2-0, but I remember we applied ourselves very well and came away more successfully than a lot of other teams who have gone to St James' Park this season.

The noise generated by their crowd was amazing and when they scored their first goal, the crowd's reaction certainly gave them confidence. Let's hear you all giving the same vocal support this afternoon. It definitely gives us a lift and in our compact stadium, we can create a similar noise on a smaller scale.

Enjoy the game and keep singing!

Robins hoping to continue recent run at Kenilworth Road

BRISTOL CITY F.C. 1992-93



■ Bristol City visit Kenilworth Road this afternoon, hopeful of progressing to the fourth round of the F.A. Cup after remaining unbeaten at Kenilworth Road, following two visits here already this season. In August, goals from Andrew Cole and Micky Mellon secured a 3-0 victory which lifted the Robins into the top ten of the Division. They followed up that particular success a month later with a 1-1 draw in the Anglo-Italian Cup, a point which secured their passage into the group stage where they faced Italian opposition.

■ Since that visit, their League form has been somewhat inconsistent, winning six games and losing seven. With regards to the cup competitions, the Robins failed to progress in the Anglo-Italian Cup - finishing bottom of their group - and were knocked out of the Coca Cola League Cup in the second round against Sheffield United 5-3 on aggregate, after taking a 2-1 lead in the first leg.

■ They will be visiting Kenilworth Road today hoping that a run in the F.A. Cup will revive their season and that leading goalscorer Andy Cole can continue his goalscoring run which took off after he visited Kenilworth Road in August. He has been quite pleased with his own form, following his £500,000 move from Arsenal in the summer. "I'm quite pleased with the way my game is progressing although I still have so much to learn," he says. "I am happy here at Bristol. We have a good set-up and a good manager and I am sure we will progress in the near future."

■ Bristol City F.C. were formed in 1897 when the Bristol South End club, formed three years earlier, decided to adopt professionalism and apply for admission to the Southern League. They employed Woolwich Arsenal manager Sam Hollis and gave him £40 to employ players. Four years later they progressed to the Football League, winning their Division Two game with Blackpool 2-0.

CITY ON PARADE

ANDY LEANING (goalkeeper) - Andy began his career at York City in 1985 before joining Sheffield United two years later. He joined Bristol City, initially on loan, in September 1988 and the transfer was made permanent for £12,000 two months later.

MARK AIZLEWOOD (defender) - Signed from Bradford City for £110,000 in 1990, Mark has been a regular for City at the heart of the defence. A Welsh international, he began his career at Newport and later played for the Town, Charlton and Leeds United.

ANDY LLEWELLYN (defender) - The longest-serving player at Ashton Gate, Andy is a former England youth international. A tenacious full-back, he has amassed more than 300 appearances for the Robins.

RUSSELL OSMAN (defender) - Russell began his career at Ipswich where he won UEFA Cup and England honours. He joined Leicester for £200,000 in 1985 before joining Southampton three years later. Russell joined City for £60,000 in 1991 and is the club's assistant manager.

MARTIN SCOTT (defender) - City's only ever-present last season, Martin joined the club from Rotherham for £200,000 in 1990. He made his debut for United in 1986 and made more than 100 senior appearances for the Millers before moving to Ashton Gate.

BRIAN MITCHELL (defender) - Brian is an experienced defender who joined the club from Bradford City in June. Previously with Aberdeen, he featured in the Dons successful European exploits of the early eighties before joining Bradford.

RAY ATTEVELD (midfield) - Ray is a Dutch 'B' and under-21 international. He started his career with FC Haarlem before joining Everton in 1989. Ray had loan spells with West Ham and Middlesbrough last season before joining City for £250,000 in 1992.

ROB EDWARDS (midfield) - Rob joined City from Carlisle United for £135,000 in 1991. A Welsh youth and under-21 international, he made his debut last season and went on to make 15 league appearances.

GARY SHELTON (midfield) - Gary joined City in 1989 from Oxford United as part of an exchange deal with Steve McLaren. He has played over 400 league appearances in a career which has also taken in Walsall, Aston Villa and Sheffield Wednesday.

SHAUN ROUSE (midfield) - Shaun moved to Ashton Gate from Glasgow Rangers this summer. He joined Rangers from school but was unable to break into the first team despite captaining the reserves.

WAYNE ALLISON (forward) - Wayne joined City from Watford in 1990 in a deal

which took Mark Gavin to Vicarage Road. A powerful front-runner, he was City's leading goalscorer last season with 11 League and cup goals.

DARIUSZ DZIEKANOWSKI (forward) - A holder of 63 Polish international caps, 'Jacki' joined City from Celtic for £250,000 in 1992. A popular addition to the squad, Jacki scored some vital goals last season.

ANDREW COLE (forward) - Signed from Arsenal for a record £500,000 fee during the summer, Andy spent the final two months of last season on loan at Ashton Gate. His eight goals in 12 games were a major factor in the club avoiding relegation.

THE MAN IN CHARGE



Denis was appointed manager at Ashton Gate on March 9, 1992 in succession to Jimmy Lumsden.

Previously he had been in charge at York and Sunderland after a

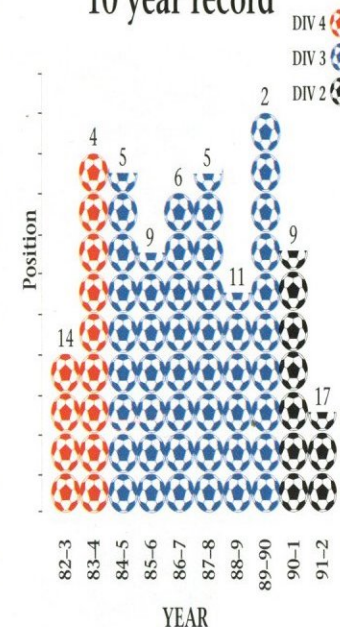
successful playing career at Stoke, where, as a central defender, he made more than 400 appearances.

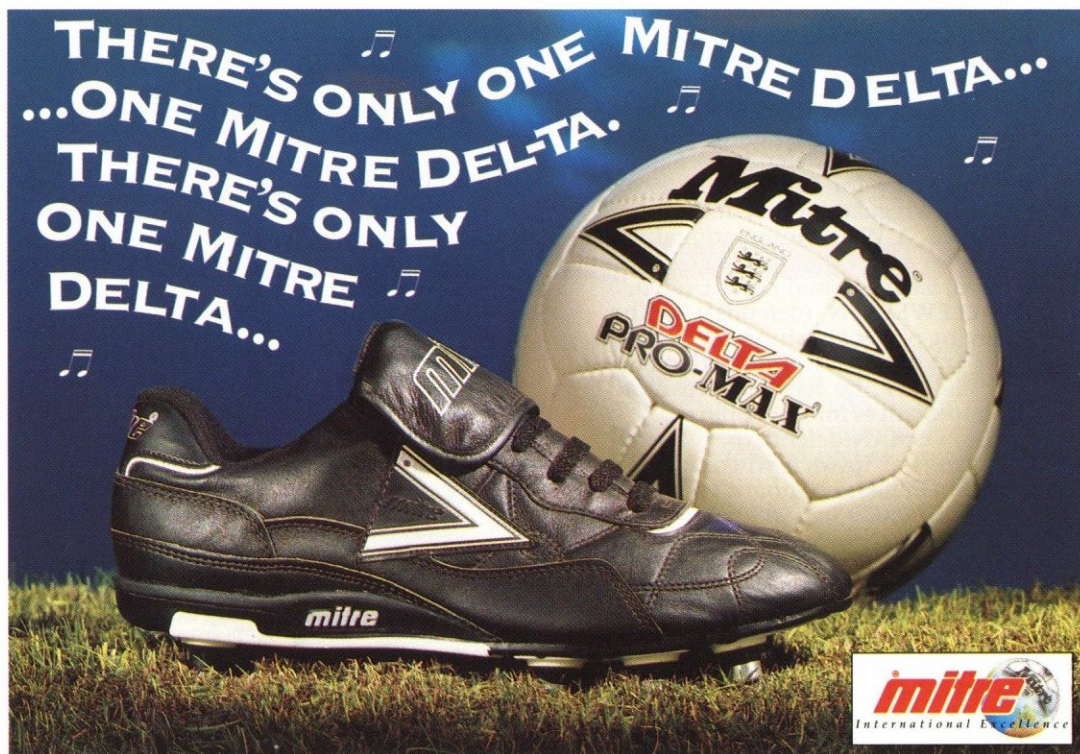
His first managerial post at York was as a player-manager, and within two years of his appointment in 1982, he had led them to the Fourth Division championship.

In 1987 he joined Sunderland and took them from the Third to the First Division in his time at Roker Park, but the club lost their First Division status after just one season.

On joining City, he was immediately faced with the task of pulling them away from the bottom of the table, an objective which was successfully achieved.

Bristol City 10 year record

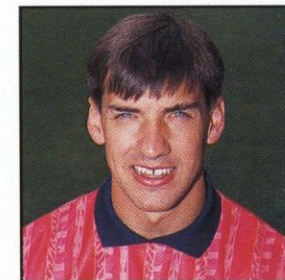

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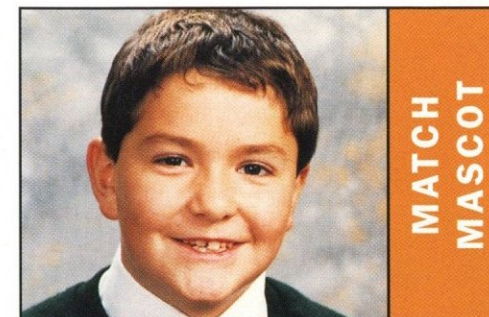

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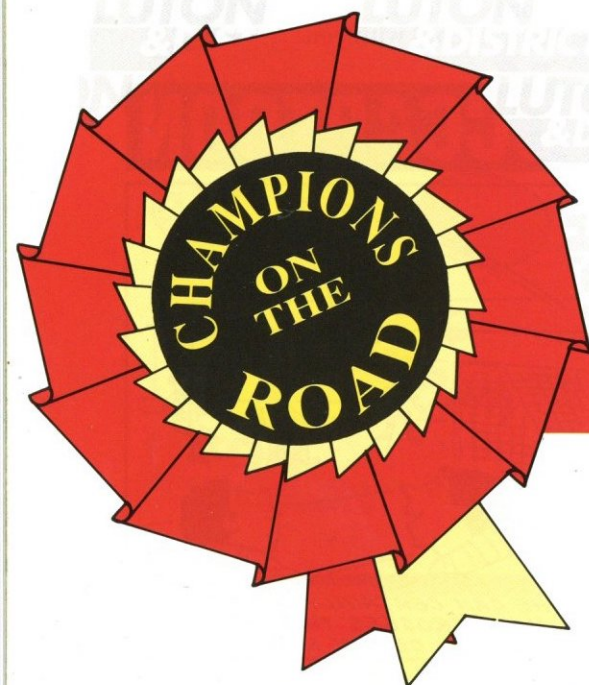

The road to Kennington Oval



BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH

The Town have not previously met Bristol City before in the F.A. Cup competition, but a search through the record books reveals that we have clashed with one of their predecessors, Bedminster, way back in 1891/92, our first season of professionalism.

The 'Road to Kennington Oval' began at Dallow Road on 3rd October, 1891, when Swindon were beaten 4-3 in a hard fought game watched by a crowd of 1000 which was about average for the time. Harry Whitby, George Deacon and Cheshire with two scored the all important goals which set up another home game, this time against Windsor Phoenix, in the 2nd qualifying round.

An easy 3-0 win followed, which put the Town at a stage past which they had never ventured before. Bedminster were seen to be

tough opponents but the Luton players, ably led by Arthur Taylor, returned with a 4-1 win under their belts - only to be told that the next round draw had paired them with Clifton. A further trip to Bristol had to be arranged three weeks later.

This time a hat trick from Harry Whitby secured a 3-0 win and ensured a place in the First Round proper for the first time. As a reward for their globe trotting exploits, the Town were drawn out of the hat first with their opponents named as Middlesbrough, one of the

strongest teams in the land.

Although a record crowd of 4000 turned up at Dallow Road to roar their encouragement, the Town were soundly beaten 3-0 by a far superior side and dreams of Cup glory were over for another year.

Forty five years later Frank Whitby, who was the Town's first professional player, visited the Luton News office and spoke to "Crusader" about his time with the Club. Amongst his recollections was the cup run of 1891/92 of which he said: "There was great rivalry between Bedminster and Clifton, and when Luton visited Clifton the Bedminster crowd went to the match and gave Luton their best support. The reason was that there were several collegians in the Clifton side, whereas the Bedminster team was composed of working men.

"When we played Bedminster, 'Hod' Paul, my brother Harry and I travelled down on the Friday night and stayed until the Sunday. After the match

some of the opposing team members said they would show us the sights of Bristol the following morning, with the result that we ended up at the Clifton Suspension Bridge.

"One of the Bedminster fellows mentioned that no one had ever been able to throw a stone across the river at that point and as I had won prizes for throwing a cricket ball in the past, I decided to give it a go. My first throw cleared the river, the wall and the road beyond sending the missile into some trees.

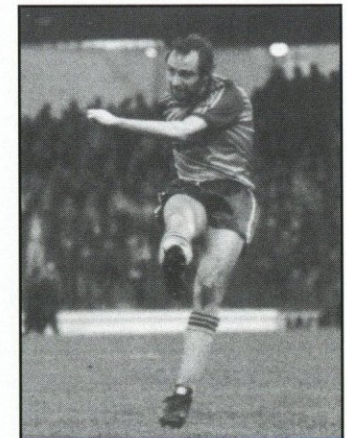
"Our friends stood in astonishment at the feat for a while, and then one of

them remarked that two policemen were coming up the road, and there was a penalty for throwing stones. The locals all disappeared while we stood our ground not knowing what to do.

"Hod' Paul, who had not thrown at all, stood with his back to the wall while one of the policemen took out his notebook and accused him of throwing stones, saying that he had seen him throw.

"During the argument that followed my brother and I slipped away while 'Hod' was arrested."

One wonders what the tabloids would have made of that today - certainly a case

of players with too much time and money on their hands!

A HATTER AND A ROBIN

Born in Dorchester, David Noake joined his local side as a youngster, soon forcing his way into the Western League club's first team just as it was about to embark on a record F.A. Cup run - which ended with Port Vale putting them out.

Luton manager Syd Owen, watched him personally and being impressed by this fast, strong 19-year-old left winger agreed to pay a fee of £2,000 to bring him to Kenilworth Road in November 1959. A friendly game at Dorchester was also arranged as part of the deal.

Although not really ready for it, Noake made his League debut at home to Sheffield Wednesday the following February, going on to make six more appearances as the Town slipped out of Division One. He made a further ten appearances the following season as the club tried to acclimatise to its new environment. It seems certain he would have been more successful in a more stable regime.

David Noake joined Bristol City in the summer of 1961 and enjoyed a rather better time at Ashton Gate, scoring in his first home game.

Troubled times for Rudi and Co



SCENE AROUND EUROPE

As most of the continent continues its mid-winter break, we review the title chasers throughout western Europe.

In France, it appears Marseille's stranglehold of the First Division title is approaching its end. Since the departure of Jean-Pierre Papin, Chris Waddle and Trevor Steven last season, the club have failed to put together anywhere near a consistent run. At the time of writing, they have won only eight of their 17 matches and new signings have failed to impress.

The most notable being German World Cup striker Rudi Voller. He has scored only four goals this season and is currently out of action after dislocating his shoulder in a European Cup match with F.C. Brugge. Croatian Alec Boksic has stepped in in recent weeks, but Rudi is still confident that the club can turn around their current indifferent run. He said: "I know much has been said about the players who have left the club, but I am confident we have a side well-equipped to achieve success. Oman Biyik and Martin Vasquez have also joined the club and it inevitably takes time to settle in to new surroundings. The trouble is, this club is used to instant success...the supporters demand it."

Nantes and Monaco currently lead the Division with 26 and 25 points respectively. Nantes were almost relegated by order of a league commission last season, because of financial problems. But the young team with an average age of 23 has set the league alight this season.

After last season's disappointing mid-table position, German giants Bayern Munich are leading the Bundesliga at the halfway mark. Anchoring the mid-field this season is Lothar Matthaeus, who has hit top form again after a lengthy

knee ligament injury and has scored five goals.

Coaches have been kept particularly busy in Germany. Jurgen Gelsdorf walked out on Borussia Moenchengladbach two weeks ago, to be replaced by former Austrian World Cup defender Bernd Krauss. Troubled Stuttgart coach Christoph Daum - on the brink of dismissal after blundering over the foreigner's rule in the Champion's Cup against Leeds - not only kept his job but signed a two year extension. Koln's faith in Jorg Berger was rewarded when, after an awful start to the season, they pulled away from the relegation zone with four straight wins in November.

Spanish champions Barcelona began the season with six trophies in view. Their form this season suggests that their domination will continue this term. They are currently top of the table on 21 points, one point clear of their arch rivals Real Madrid, who even at this stage of the season, are clearly worried about Barca's form. "As much as I hate to admit it, Barca are playing much more fluently than we are," said Real Madrid star Robert Proszynski. Entering into the spirit of things, Barcelona defender Ronald Koeman had a modest contribution to make. "We are the best team at the moment, better than Real Madrid in every department."

Milan's domination in Italy is such that the leading contenders are already thinking about next season and have given up on title pretence. With the world's most expensive player, £15 million Gianluigi Lentini, providing the ammunition for Papin and Marco Van Basten, the club have now stretched their unbeaten league run to 50 matches. However, Lentini knows that with such a strong squad, nobody has a divine right to play. "You can never relax at a club like this," he said. "Personally, I know I will have to bear the cross of all this money because the press, I can already guess, will talk about how much I cost after every poor performance."

Milan are six points clear of Fiorentina and Torino, who both have 15 points from 13 games.

Changing coaches has made little difference to PSV Eindhoven. For two years under Bobby Robson they won the Dutch League and now, guided by Hans Westerhof, their domination continues. Despite losing first-choice centre-backs Erwin Koeman and Barry Van Earle, they are four points clear of their nearest rivals. They lead the table on 24 points, four points clear of FC Utrecht. Ajax are currently struggling in six place, but have mounted a serious challenge in this season's UEFA Cup.
