Another night – Another game – Another chance



MANAGER'S VIEWPOINT BY DAVID PLEAT

We welcome today's visitors Newcastle United. They have flown the Division One flag with tremendous pride this season and everyone expects them to regain their Premier League status. Let us hope that tonight's game is entertaining and that if we have a fair share of the play, we are able to convert more chances than our visitors.

It is always demoralising when one gets knocked out of a major cup competition. The result on Saturday was a crazy reflection of the amount of play we had, but a fair reflection of the way Derby used their pace and finishing to bury us. Rather than encourage any further comment on the game, I enclose a report of a national tabloid on Sunday, whose writer in a few paragraphs summed up the game, with the practice of what they call merit marks.

MUGGERS GET TOP MARKS

"Mark Pembridge's first hat-trick sent his old club tumbling through the ropes and out of the cup."

Pembridge, sold to Derby for £1.25 million last summer, landed three knock-out blows in a 15 minute spell either side of half-time.

The body shots had come earlier when Derby launched a softening-up exercise with a series of savage fouls in the opening 20 minutes.

Astonishingly, no one was booked - even when Goulooze went in late and left Preece needing three minutes of treatment.

Preece must have felt he had been mugged

as he was floored four times in that opening spell.

He said: "A bit of protection from the referee would have been nice, but I can't say too much."

Referee Paul Harrison knew something had been going on - he played five minutes injury time before the break.

By then, Derby were 3-1 up. And it was not only because of the rough stuff. They were quicker, stronger and sharper but it is a shame their victory left a nasty taste.

Telfer headed Luton ahead - from a free-kick, naturally. But Short levelled and Pembridge scored twice. Gabbiadini then sent Pembridge scorching through for No.4 and bundled in the fifth.





NEW APPOINTMENT AT KENILWORTH ROAD

Andy McDade joined Luton Town as club physiotherapist last month, following Brian Owen's departure to Cambridge United. Although he has only been here four weeks, he is clearly enjoying his new surroundings at Kenilworth Road.

Andy, 44, has always been an avid football fan, playing as a youngster in his native Scotland. Always wanting to remain in the game, he became interested in sports physiotherapy whilst involved in parks football in Scotland. He started to take the profession more seriously once he came south.

"I took numerous courses in the treatment and management of injuries before coming south to the R.A.F. with Warrant Officer John Deary," said Andy. "I was based at Heally Court and was given a firm and thorough introduction to physiotherapy by Flight Sergeant Harry Kerr, who sadly is no longer with us. He gave me the correct base on which to build and became a close friend of mine."

He furthered his training period with Kingstonian F.C. before accepting his first full-time physiotherapy post at Ismthmian League outfit, Harrow Borough.

"After 10 years of learning I felt prepared and ready for a full-time post. At the time, Harrow were one of the leading non-league clubs in the country and we won League and Cup honours during my time there."

and I hold fond memories of the club."



"What I have noticed since I have been here is that I now have a greater workload. At Barnet we only had a small squad, but now I am looking after a first team, reserve and youth teams. However, I am not complaining - I love the job, and long may it continue with Luton!"



it is that consistency which should see them reclaim their place in the top-flight next season.



Mixed Cup fortunes for Division One

NEWS ON ONE

The F.A. Cup fourth round provided a few surprises for First Division clubs. The biggest upset was, perhaps, at Molineux where giantkillers Bolton continued to progress with a 2-0 victory over Wolves.

Goals from Green and McGinlay secured a passage into the next round for Wanderers, and it left Wolves manager Graham Turner fuming after a number of missed chances by his forward line. Former England international Steve Bull was the most guilty, missing several clear-cut chances.

"We had enough opportunities in front of goal to have won two matches," moaned Turner. "At the moment life here is very frustrating, but we must now pick ourselves up and try to push for a promotion spot." Bolton now face Derby County in round five.

Last season's finalists Sunderland also went out of the competition, losing 1-0 to Premier League Sheffield Wednesday. The Wednesday winner was attributed to a mistake by goalkeeper Tony Norman. Roker boss Malcolm Crosby, did however, have some words of comfort for Norman.

"Tony is absolutely gutted in the changing room," said Crosby after the match. "It was one of those crosses that he would have pulled out of the air with no problem at all nine times out of ten. There is just nothing you can do about a mistake like that and there was no way back because it came late into the match. Terry Butcher said the ball moved in the air, but Tony is big enough to concede that it was all down to him."

Barnsley provided one of the best results of the round, with a convincing 4-1 victory over West Ham United at Oakwell. Man-of-the-match was, without question, striker Andy Rammell who hit a hat-trick. Following their midweek penalty success against Leicester and disposal of the Hammers, Barnsley can look forward to a money-spinning tie at Manchester City. Rammell, meanwhile, was understandably delighted. He said: "What a match for me! I am absolutely delighted. I didn't think I would even play because I have been off-form recently. However, the gaffer has kept faith in me and I am pleased about that. I think he must be too."

Southend United lined up a fifth round clash with Sheffield Wednesday at Hillsborough, following their 2-1 success at Huddersfield. United had to again

rely on recent £100,000 signing Stan Collymore who has joined the club from Crystal Palace. He has hit eight goals since joining the Shrimpers last month and will be a great asset for the club as they strive to avoid relegation.

Of the reduced league programme played, Portsmouth moved into a strong position, with a 1-0 home win over Brentford. Star man for Pompey was former Spurs defender Guy Butters, who made his first appearance of the season. Despite his relegation to reserve team football, he wants to remain at Fratton Park. "With Kit Symons and Andy Awford in such great form there was no way I was just going to walk into the side," he said. "I suppose I could have asked for a transfer, but it is my intention to work my way back. My performance today could only have helped."







Magpies destined for top-flight success

■ Newcastle United visit Kenilworth Road this evening, destined to end the season in the top-flight after a whirlwind campaign which has yielded only four defeats. The appointment of Kevin Keegan as first-team manager towards the end of last season clearly heralded a new era at St James' Park after a long period of depression and indifferent results.


■ Keegan, undertaking his first managerial role, rescued United from the jaws of relegation to the old Third Division with a victory on the final day of last season at Leicester City. Only then did the work begin of re-building for the new campaign. The pre-season additions of Barry Venison, Paul Bracewell, Franz Carr and John Beresford all helped to create an exciting blend of experience and raw talent to a team which already boasted the likes of Gavin Peacock and Lee Clark.

■ The Magpies made their intentions clear from the first kick of the 1992/93 campaign, winning their opening match 3-2 against Southend United. They then went an amazing 15 league and cup games without defeat and have remained at the top of the First Division all sea-

son. At the time of writing, Tranmere Rovers are the nearest challengers, some 14 points behind.

■ "The potential we have here is frightening," said Keegan earlier in the season. "If we can win promotion this season I believe we can go on to achieve great things in the game, greater than anything I achieved when I was at Liverpool." No-one doubts that potential, and barring any major catastrophes, Newcastle will regain their place among the elite clubs next season - a reward for their loyal fans who have followed the club through thick and thin during a turbulent four seasons out of the top flight.

■ The foundation of Newcastle United F.C. stemmed from a newly-formed club called Stanley in 1881. A year later they changed their name to Newcastle East End and merged with Rosewood. In 1889 the club moved to St James' Park and at a meeting at Bath Lane Hall four years later, they changed their name to Newcastle United. In their early years the club won the First Division championship four times. They also won the FA Cup in 1910, 1924, 1932, 1951, 1952 and 1955 and the European Fairs Cup in 1969.

MAGPIES ON PARADE

PAVEL SRNICEK (goalkeeper) - Czechoslovakian under-21 international, Pavel joined Newcastle from Banik Ostrava in January 1991 for £350,000. He made his League debut three months later and made the number one shirt his own for the remainder of the season.

BARRY VENISON (defender) - Barry joined Newcastle from Liverpool for a bargain fee of £250,000 last summer. A former Sunderland favourite, he made history as the youngest player to captain a team in a Wembley final when he led the Rokerites against Norwich City in the 1985 Milk Cup final. He joined Liverpool in 1986.

JOHN BERESFORD (defender) - John came to prominence when his outstanding performances helped Portsmouth to the F.A. Cup semi-finals. A subsequent transfer to Liverpool fell through and he signed for Newcastle for £650,000. He started his career at Barnsley, before joining Pompey in 1989.

STEPHEN HOWEY (defender) - Originally a centre-forward, Stephen was converted to centre-half last season with considerable success. A former trainee, he made his debut at Manchester United in 1989, but has only established himself this term.

KEVIN SCOTT (defender) - Club captain last season, Kevin started his career with Middlesbrough as a junior before dropping into non-league soccer. He joined Newcastle in 1985 and has won F.A. Youth Cup honours with the club.

BRIAN KILCLINE (defender) - Inspirational centre-half signed from Oldham Athletic for £300,000 last March, Brian began his career at Notts County. He later enjoyed a long spell at Coventry City, where he led the club to the 1987 FA Cup final.

LIAM O'BRIEN (midfield) - Liam started his career in Ireland with Bohemians and Shamrock Rovers,

before joining Manchester United. Unable to command a regular place at Old Trafford, he joined Newcastle for £300,000 in 1988. Liam is a Republic of Ireland international.

LEE CLARK (midfield) - Former England Schoolboys' captain, Lee made his England under-21 debut during the Toulon International Tournament in 1992. A player with excellent skill and vision, many Geordies rate him as the next Paul Gascoigne.

GAVIN PEACOCK (midfield) - Gavin signed a new two-year contract at the beginning of the season after much speculation involving his future. Top-scorer last season with 22 goals, he is again leading the scoring charts this term. Formerly with QPR and Gillingham.

PAUL BRACEWELL (midfield) - A summer signing from Sunderland, Paul joined Newcastle for a fee set at £250,000. A former England international, he started his career at Stoke and had a spell at Sunderland before joining Everton where he won League Championship and European honours. He returned to Sunderland in 1989.

DAVID KELLY (forward) - David was signed from Leicester City in December 1991 for a fee of £250,000. An Eire international, he scored three goals in an incredible debut against Israel. David has also served Walsall and West Ham United.

ROBERT LEE (forward) - Capped twice at England under-21 level, Robert was signed from Charlton Athletic for £700,000 in 1992. He had played 350 first team matches for Charlton, his only previous club.

KEVIN SHEEDY (forward) - Kevin had spells with Hereford and Liverpool before establishing himself in the First Division with Everton in 1983. He won League, F.A. Cup and European honours while at Goodison Park before moving on to Newcastle last year.

MEET THE BOSS




Kevin Keegan started his footballing career with Scunthorpe United in 1968. He was transferred to Liverpool for a fee of £35,000 in May 1971 where he became one of the most accomplished players of his generation. Domestic and European honours followed before he moved on to SV Hamburg in West Germany for £500,000 in 1977. While in Germany, he won the European Footballer of the Year Award twice and also established himself as England captain.

In July 1980 he returned home and joined Lawrie McMenemy at Southampton for a fee of £420,000. Two years later his love affair with Newcastle began as he helped steer the club into the First Division before his retirement in 1984.

He returned to the game as manager of Newcastle last February, helping the club to retain their First Division status.

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





Best game ever witnessed at Kenilworth Road?

BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH



Which is the best game ever seen on this ground? Most Luton supporters amongst the 25,410 gathered at Kenilworth Road on November 30, 1946 would vote for the game that took place that day.

Newcastle United, the visitors, were top of the Football League and boasted the most talked about forward line of the time, namely Jackie Milburn, Roy Bentley, Charlie Wayman, Len Shackleton and Tom Pearson.

This was the team that had hammered 13 goals into the Newport County net only a few weeks previously and such was their attraction that the gates were closed at the Oak Road and Kenilworth

Road ends long before the start.

Some things never change: the pitch was a mudbath, especially at the Oak Road end which the Town had to defend in the first-half; the Newcastle inside-forwards produced clever play; the Luton defenders' an inability to turn quickly.

The undue respect held for the visitors meant that we were soon up against it.

Goals from Bentley after 12 minutes, Wayman after 26 minutes and an absolute cracker from Shackleton on the half-hour put the Town in a seemingly impossible situation. As the players trudged off at half-time, the spectators must have wondered what the final Newcastle tally would be.

Dally Duncan, then a Luton player, threw some light on the half-time team talk given by manager George Martin when interviewed many years later.

Apparently Martin was beside himself with anger and kicked over a full pail of water on entering the dressing room.

When he calmed down,

Martin pointed out that the Town had not played badly in the first-half, but the reverence afforded the visitors had to stop. Most importantly, however, the players would now be attacking the Oak Road end and there was the chance to put the same amount of pressure on the Newcastle defenders that they had endured in the first-half.

Stung by the manager's words, the Luton players set about their task with purpose and tore into the Newcastle defence, feeling that one goal could start an avalanche. The first goal was not long in coming with Billy Waugh getting on the end of a Duncan cross in the 54th minute. And when Mel Daniel headed in an accurate Duncan corner two minutes later, the crowds suddenly realised that a major upset was on the cards.

The ground was in uproar when Hugh Billington ploughed through the mud to slam home the equaliser on the hour, and apart from a brief flurry from Newcastle when a penalty appeal for handball against Horace


Gager was turned down, there was only going to be one winner.

The final goal was a bit late in coming, after 83 minutes to be precise, but when Allan Driver slammed home the ball into the net following more good play by Duncan, a magnificent comeback had been achieved.

Under a headline "Town's Most Sensational Win", Eric Pugh in the Luton News said: "Not for many years can there have been a match in which such a transformation took place. The second-half rally had to be seen to be

A HATTER AND A MAGPIE

I dare say that many a Newcastle supporter as well as his counterpart at Luton goes misty-eyed at the mention of the name of Malcolm Macdonald, for he was equally revered at St James' Park as well as at Kenilworth Road.

Signed by Alec Stock from Fulham for £175,000 in July 1969, Macdonald was initially regarded as a full-back, but an injury during a pre-season friendly caused him to move to attack and the rest is history.

He scored 25 league goals as the Town fought their way out of the Third Division in 1970 but it was not until the following season, when he scored 24 goals in higher company, that the football world really began to sit up and take notice.

Following the V&G Insurance crash, it was inevitable that he would be sold, but even then it came as a surprise when Newcastle emerged as the top bidder and he eventually left for Tyneside in exchange for £180,000 in the summer of 1971.

Becoming a firm favourite at St James' immediately, he enjoyed five years at Newcastle before joining Arsenal in 1976, followed by management at Fulham after a serious knee injury finished his playing career.



Confidence is the key for Scott



PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH SCOTT OAKES

After starting the season in and out of the starting eleven, Scott Oakes made the number seven shirt his own for a while before Christmas. His appearance coincided with the club's change in fortune and another extended run is what Scott is looking for in 1993.

"When you get a few games under your belt it inevitably gives you self-confidence and that shows in your play," said Scott. "You can fully get to grips with the speed of the game and get the chance to express yourself more. Being a wide player, the more defenders you beat and the more crosses you can get in, the more confident you become."

Scott really shone in the televised game against Watford in November, where he played the full 90 minutes. He capped a fine individual performance with a 20-yard goal. He looks back on that game with fond memories, and it is the highlight of his season so far.

"That goal was the most important goal I have scored for Luton because at that stage of the match, Watford were clawing their way back into contention," recalled Scott. "My goal killed them off and I was delighted for the team and the fans, particularly as it was a derby match."

"I remember receiving a great ball from Phil Gray and pushing it past a large area of

mud. From then on, I only had the goalkeeper to beat, but as he came out to narrow the angle, I had to shoot quite wide of him. The ball sneaked in just inside the post, then all I can remember is being mobbed!"

Scott remained in the team for the matches against Bristol Rovers and away at Wolves, which was without doubt, the Hatters' best league result of the season. However, he found himself on the substitutes' bench after Christmas, but he is determined to win his place back in the starting line-up.

"What I must do is continue to work hard at my game and find the consistency which is needed to stay in the team. There is competition for places in midfield, but I must bide my time.

"From the team's point of view, we must continue to build on our recent good

form, take as many points as possible and make sure that a gap does not open up between ourselves and the group of clubs in the middle of the table. That means playing together as a unit



and working for each other. Confidence is such a big factor for any side, so if we can combine the two, we should be O.K."
