

MANAGER'S VIEWPOINT BY DAVID PLEAT

We extend a warm welcome to our friends who recently returned to their home. We hope the game will represent football without fear.

With Charlton's difficulties in their exile from The Valley and our current difficulties caused by the selling of our ground, the politics and finances have overtaken the football. It has been in this scenario that both clubs battled so gamely against the odds, but finally succumbed to relegation. I would like to think that we were also on the base of the graph and a bright new era could be dawning. I am sure our visitors must feel highly confident that they can now go from strength to strength.

Our win at Tranmere was first class and everyone played responsibly and determinedly. The goals and the clean sheet were a bonus for a group of players who understood their roles as we manoeuvred the pack. It was rare for two national team managers to watch from the stands. TRUST FIGURES SHOW STEEP RISE IN HATTERS' POLICE BILLS

Statistics revealed by the Football Trust have shown that Luton Town Football Club experienced a 375 per cent increase in police costs during 1991-92.

The figures show that it was costing the club £1.10 in policing for every spectator through the turnstiles.

A total of 99 clubs experienced a rise in police costs during 1991-92, with Luton's costs providing the steepest increase in the Barclays Football League.

When analysed to show how much individual clubs were paying at a rate per 1,000

spectators, Luton Town came out on top with an average payment of £1,097, followed by today's visitors, Charlton Athletic at £913 and Maidstone United at £911.

Luton Town managing director David Kohler has therefore given full support to Club Safety Officer Geoff Lovell's scheme of development for Safety Stewards at Kenilworth Road. He said: "This is the right thing for us to do and I am pleased that these figures at least show what has been happening."



■ We welcome this afternoon the directors, management, players and supporters of Charlton Athletic Football Club.

■ In 1984 'The Addicks' vacated 'The Valley' ground they had occupied since 1924 and entered into a ground share agreement firstly with Crystal Palace at Selhurst Park and latterly with West Ham United. In December last year they once again returned to their former home.

■ The move was made possible thanks largely to their loyal and active supporters who rallied behind the club and, who through their VIP scheme, raised over one million pounds towards the refurbishment costs that were necessary to welcome football back once again to The Valley ground.

■ Today sees a further reduction in the number of police officers within our ground. Twelve stewards will be taking over the role of 'searching'. As a back-up, a further twelve stewards are currently undergoing training.

■ I have received several comments from spectators regarding the subject of 'searching' supporters prior to their entry into the stadium. In response, I would advise that under the current Ground Regulations and Safety Certificate, it is a condition of entry that searching is carried out.

■ Belated congratulations to our former player and 'local boy' Matthew Jackson upon his selection for the England U21 International match on Tuesday last. It is always nice to welcome back former players and to have a chat with them.

■ To those who attended the game I trust you found it enjoyable. Hopefully the Football Association were pleased with our arrangements and facilities and that in the not too distant future will give us the opportunity to stage another international fixture on their behalf.

■ It is now known that our opponents in the Southern Junior Floodlight Cup will be Millwall. As yet, we do not have a date agreed for the fixture to be played.

■ Sadly I have to report the death of one of our former players WILLIAM CHARLES SEDDON. William died recently at the age of 60. He joined the club in 1932 from Arsenal for a fee of £2,500 and was a centre-wing half. We send our condolences to his family.



Valley return revives a faltering season



CHARLTON ATHLETIC F.C. 1992-93

■ Charlton Athletic arrive at Kenilworth Road this afternoon desperate to put their promotion aspirations back on the right track after a mid-season spell which has yielded seven league draws in their last ten attempts.

■ They started the 1992/93 campaign on a crest of a wave, remaining unbeaten during their opening 12 matches and would have led the table had it not been for Newcastle United's remarkable winning streak. However, as the heavy pitches set in, the goals dried up and the club slipped out of the promotion frame. Consecutive defeats at Bristol City (1-2), Derby County (3-4) and at home to Millwall (0-2) put paid to their early hard work. One win in their next six games dropped the club out of the top six, although the return to their spiritual home of The Valley has put a halt to their inconsistent run.

■ They won their opening match back home, thanks to a solitary strike from Colin

Walsh and the club have lost only one game since. However, most of these games have been drawn affairs, away at Watford (1-1), Peterborough (1-1), Swindon (2-2) and at home against Oxford (1-1), West Ham (1-1), Tranmere (2-2). Recent results suggest a change in fortune with wins against lowly Bristol Rovers and Notts County.

■ Although formed in 1905 by members of such clubs as East Street Mission, Blundell Mission and Charlton Reds, Charlton Athletic did not really make their presence felt until adopting professionalism and joining the Southern League in 1920. Before that, they had played in such competitions as the Lewisham, Southern Suburban and London Leagues. They made their Football League debut in Division Three (S) in 1921, winning 1-0 at home to Exeter City. The club went on to win the Division Three (S) title in 1929 and 1935 and have won the F.A. Cup on one occasion, in 1947.

ADDICKS ON PARADE

BOB BOLDER (goalkeeper) - Now in his sixth season with Charlton, Bob's career has spanned 15 years and over 400 games. He started his career with Sheffield Wednesday and has also seen service with Liverpool and Sunderland, from whom he joined Charlton for just £20,000.

DARREN PITCHER (defender) - A former pupil at the FA School of Excellence, full back Darren made his league debut in 1989 and has since made the number two shirt his own. A versatile player, he has also filled in at centre-half and midfield for the Addicks.

SCOTT MINTO (defender) - An England under-21 international, 20-year-old Scott made his Charlton debut in 1988 and has played over 100 games for the club. A player of considerable potential, he signed a three-year contract with the club in the summer.

STUART BALMER (defender) - A former Celtic reserve player, Stuart has represented Scotland at school boy and youth levels. In the 1990 close season he came south to Charlton for £100,000 but has had to wait until this season for an extended run in the team.

SIMON WEBSTER (defender) - Club captain, Simon joined Charlton from Sheffield United for £120,000 in 1990. An experienced campaigner, he has previously seen service with Tottenham, Exeter, Norwich and Huddersfield.

STEVE GATTING (defender) - Steve joined Charlton at the beginning of last season, having played over 300 matches for the south coast club. He started his career with Arsenal but never established himself as a first team regular. He moved to the Goldstone Ground in 1981.

PETER GARLAND (midfield) - Peter started his career at Tottenham before moving north to

Newcastle United last year. Unable to settle, he returned to his native London with Charlton shortly before Christmas and scored on his full debut on Boxing Day.

JOHN BUMSTEAD (midfield) - John started his career with Chelsea, making his debut in 1978. He joined Charlton in the summer of 1991 and has proved to be one of the club's most important buys after many consistent performances in midfield.

JOHN ROBINSON (midfield) - Rhodesian-born John started his career in England with Brighton in 1990 before transferring to Charlton for £75,000 last year. He has returned to the side in recent weeks after a spell out through injury.

CARL LEABURN (forward) - A cult figure among the Charlton fans, Carl made an immediate impact for the club, scoring on his debut at Newcastle in 1988. However, the goals dried up and Carl went two years without hitting the target. Last season his form returned and has continued this term.

GARY NELSON (forward) - Much-travelled Gary joined Charlton for £50,000 in 1991. He began his career with Southend and also served Plymouth, Swindon, Notts County on loan before joining the Seagulls.

COLIN WALSH (forward) - Former Scottish under-21 international, Colin was signed from Nottingham Forest for £125,000 in September 1986. After breaking a leg in 1987, he had loan spells at Peterborough and Middlesbrough as he worked back to full fitness.

KIM GRANT (forward) - Another youth team product, Kim made his debut last year while still a YTS trainee. He has since found it difficult to claim a regular place in the first team, and often features as substitute.

MEET THE BOSSES





Following the departure of Lennie Lawrence to Middlesbrough during the summer of 1991, management duties were handed jointly to first team coaches Alan Curbishley and Steve Gritt.

Alan re-joined Charlton from Brighton in 1991 and although initially in charge of the reserves, was quickly promoted to first team duties. As a player, he won caps at England under-21 level and played for West Ham, Birmingham City and Aston Villa before joining Charlton for £38,000 in 1984. After helping the club into the First Division in 1986, Alan stayed for one season before joining Brighton.

Steve has been associated with the Addicks since making his debut in a Second Division match against Blackpool in 1977. Although he left to join Walsall in 1989, he returned eight months later to chalk up his 400th appearance for the club. Steve has played in every position on the field, including in goal, and it was fitting that he was a member of the side on their return to The Valley against Portsmouth.



Goals galore in previous meetings

BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH



In welcoming back Charlton to Kenilworth Road after a short absence, we are obviously hoping for a few goals today, more in keeping with previous encounters outside Division One.

Games between the two sides were invariably high scoring and the average is still over three goals per match despite some pretty turgid affairs in the period 1986-1990.

Our first meetings were in 1921/22 following Charlton's entry into the Football League with the Town recording an early 'double'. In the game at Kenilworth Road on April 15, 1922 goals from George Butcher and Allan Mathieson saw off Charlton, while in the return a week later, a deluge reduced the game to a lottery. 3,000 hardy souls saw Harry Higginbottom tap in a simple effort after the Charlton goalkeeper slipped

in the mud while dropping the ball at the same time.

Games then tended to go with the home side until Charlton's promotion season of 1934/35 when the 'Valiants' won both fixtures to return the compliment of our first meetings. In the home game on September 8, 1934 a one-minute silence was observed out of respect for Charlton goalkeeper Alex Wright who had died in a bathing accident off Torbay the previous day. His replacement did well in the 2-1 victory, but by the time of the return, a goalkeeper who features strongly in the history of both clubs by the name of Sam Bartram, had been signed.

By the time of our next meeting, which also marked our debut in Division One, Bartram was still in the Charlton goal albeit in the twilight of his career. He was shortly to commence a new occupation of football club manager in a spell which was also to include a period at Luton.

As mentioned, Charlton were our first opponents in Division One and the sun soaked crowd of 28,460 that

turned up on August 20, 1955 at The Valley were certainly not disappointed with the show put on for them. Both sides fought out a 2-2 draw with Gordon Turner and Peter MacEwan on target for the Town.

In the game at Kenilworth Road the following season, another 'first' for the Town was recorded when floodlights were switched on to save the abandonment of the fixture. It was normal for the kick-off time to be brought forward during the winter period, but by half-time a thick mist had enveloped the ground and the referee ordered the lights to be switched on. This had the desired effect, for the heat generated dispersed the mist, which was just as well as Charlton complained about the unauthorised use of the lights which were then switched off. Charlton were 3-1 down at this stage and eventually lost 4-2!

Charlton were relegated at the end of that season with the Town joining them in Division Two in 1960. We won 4-1 at Kenilworth Road in 1960/61, lost 6-1 the following season and won 4-1

again in 1962/63 in a game that looked to have secured our Second Division future. Unfortunately, we lost our remaining two fixtures while Charlton won theirs with the result that we were relegated rather than the 'Valiants'.

Fixtures resumed throughout the 1970's with a 7-1 home win in 1977/78 standing out as a game where the players could do no wrong with Jim Husband scoring four goals, including a penalty that barely trickled over the line.

Two seasons previously, the Town had won 5-1 at

The Valley at a time when a newly-found fighting spirit had emerged among the players because of the threat of the club folding. Peter Anderson scored twice that evening in his last game for the Town before moving to Antwerp for a fee that guaranteed our immediate future.

In recent seasons, the games have not been endowed with goals, except the 5-2 home win in 1988/89 which came in the middle of a run of three consecutive victories at Kenilworth Road and saw us escape relegation at last.


