

Great satisfaction felt by our unbeaten run



MANAGER'S VIEWPOINT BY DAVID PLEAT

I shall look anxiously to see what size of crowd we attract today. It is so important in these difficult times that if we show some achievement on the field, that progress is reflected in our gates.

We warmly welcome Barnsley FC this afternoon. Being part of the panel that has just deservedly voted them team of the week, I know that after that marvellous result at Millwall they will be more than confident of breaking our little spell today. Maybe the spell is not so 'little'.

To record seven consecutive clean sheets is a reward for meeting a challenge that all professionals find great satisfaction in achieving. Teams attack from the back and defend from the front. No results can be achieved unless all the players are committed to the cause. In our run, the goalkeeper, Alec Chamberlain, and the back four players have been ever-present and it is to their credit that we were able to equal a 70-year record last Saturday against Charlton Athletic.

Many years ago, Huddersfield Town had a fabulous season for not conceding goals. It was no coincidence that their goalkeeper, full-backs and wing-halves were ever-present. Maybe some supporters can recall the year and the formation, but I remember Jack Wheeler, Ron Staniforth, Bill McGarry and Len Qusted. In more recent times, Arsenal won a championship conceding the magnificently mean total of 18 goals.

We have been scoring. Last Saturday morning, our South East Counties League team denied Wimbledon the early championship by racing into a 3-0 lead and holding on to win 3-2. Seeing the game in swirling windy conditions, we knew how difficult it would be that afternoon against Charlton. Of course, the pitch did not help, but we must

The next four weeks will be vital as all the teams in the lower regions of the First Division are picking up points while some in the middle are showing signs of stress. A win today would increase the optimistic speculation that we are on the way.

Last week's deadlines did not give me an opportunity to welcome Kerry Dixon 'back home'. I was pleased with his all-round con-

I'll fight my way back vows Darren



PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH DARREN SALTON

Luton Town's Scottish under-21 defender Darren Salton was seriously injured in a car accident in November. Speaking from his hospital bed in Edinburgh, said he plans to fight his way back to the top and resume his career with the Hatters.

Darren suffered serious leg and head injuries and remained in a coma for three weeks at Addenbrookes Hospital, Cambridge, following the accident on November 26. Thankfully, he pulled through and returned to Scotland to re-habilitate last month.

"I remember absolutely nothing about the accident," said Darren. "When I woke up weeks later, I didn't know where I was. When I was told about the accident, I immediately said 'How's Paul?'"

"I was so relieved to hear he was alright, but my heart goes out to the family of the woman who died in the crash. It's just tragic."

Two weeks ago, Darren had six pins removed from his injured leg and on February 11, doctors carried out a bone graft from his hip to his leg. The Town defender now faces a long battle back to fitness, but he is determined to prove that he will return to the first-team at Kenilworth Road.

He said: "Playing again is my number one target. People said after the crash that I wouldn't kick a ball again, but I've never believed that. I have never been told by a doctor that my career is over and that's good enough for me."

And he vowed: "If I can't make it back to the top, I won't play football at all. I want to make the grade at the highest level again."

Darren has the support of his family, his girlfriend Sarah Barnes, who has given up her job in Luton to be with him, and all his friends within football. He has received visits from Rangers goalkeeper Andy Goram and former Hatter Dave Beaumont, now with Hibernian, and has received phone calls from all his team-mates and Scotland star Ally McCoist. Darren has also been offered an extension to his Luton Town contract by the club, which he is delighted with.

"Luton have been fabulous," he remarked.

"They have extended my contract and have sent me all my bonuses even though I am not playing. I can't thank them enough."

Darren's parents Eleanor and John are currently raising money for Addenbrookes Hospital's neuro-surgery unit after saving Darren's life. Mr Salton commented: "The staff at Addenbrookes saved Darren's life and we owe them so much."

Town manager David Pleat has nothing but admiration for Darren, a player who had established himself as a first-team regular before the accident. "Darren was a valuable young member of our squad until the accident and we have decided to renew his contract. It is the least we can do for a lad who has shown tremendous courage," remarked Mr Pleat.



■ A very good afternoon everyone and an especially warm welcome to the directors, management, players and supporters of Barnsley Football Club.

■ Together with Brentford, Barnet, Charlton, Chelsea, Crystal Palace, Fulham, Leyton Orient, Millwall, Q.P.R., Tottenham, Watford, West Ham and Wimbledon, the club have accepted an invitation to appear in the Evening Standard 5-a-side Soccer Tournament, to be held at Wembley Arena on the evening of Tuesday, May 11, 1993. The draw for the first round has been made and we will face Q.P.R. Nearer to the date, tickets for the evening will be on sale at our ticket office and details will be announced shortly.

■ Supporters will, I am sure, have heard or read about the tremendous costs of policing Football League matches last season (1991/92). Based on information released by the Football Trust, they contributed towards 24 per cent of the total policing bill of £9.07 million for season 1990/91, an

increase of 13.8 per cent over the previous season. The statistics show that the cost of policing league matches in Great Britain last season rose by 17 per cent to reach the £9.07 million mark. This is a major source of concern to our national game, particularly in light of the governments determination that full economic changes should be levied.

■ So far as Luton Town are concerned, as you may have read in our last match day magazine, the figures are horrendous. Of the 99 clubs surveyed, we came top of the league with an increase of 375 per cent (£176,624).

■ The highest police charge in England was Manchester United's £284,090 - an average cost of £13,528 per match - £301 per 1,000 spectators. Ours was £223,741 - an average cost per match of £10,654 - £1,097 per 1,000 spectators.

■ We incurred the highest police charges per spectator of any club in the Football League during season 1991/92. Ours was 110 pence per spectator with Charlton the next highest at 91 pence. The lowest being Doncaster Rovers at four pence.

■ Our Southern Junior Floodlit Cup semi-final with Millwall has now been fixed and it will be played at Kenilworth Road on Monday, March 22, kick-off 7.00 pm. In the event of a replay, the game will be played at The Den on Tuesday, March 30, kick-off 7 pm.



Tykes still aiming for a play-off place



BARNSELY F.C. 1992-93

■ After a poor start to the season which yielded just two victories in their opening 11 matches, Barnsley have since turned their season around and now look more comfortable in a mid-table position. In recent weeks, they have proved that they can live with the high-flyers in the division, by gaining creditable 1-1 draws with West Ham United and Portsmouth, and beating Millwall by four goals to nil at the Den last Saturday. In the F.A. Cup they have shown similar form, beating Leicester City in round three and the Hammers 4-1 in round four. Unfortunately, their run came to end at Manchester City two weeks ago, so now they can concentrate on their league ambitions.

■ Tykes manager Mel Machin still believes his side are capable of a play-off place at the end of the season, although he admits that at this stage of the season it is vital for the club to start picking up more points. He has set himself the target of taking four points from the club's two away

games this month (Luton and Millwall), if the club are to enter the final third of the season in the right footing.

■ If they are to achieve the four-point target this month, they will need to improve on their away form. This season, the Tykes have recorded just three victories on their travels, at Notts County (3-1) and at Cambridge (2-1) and at Millwall. At Oakwell, their form has been quite the reverse, beating Wolves (1-0), The Town (3-0), Brentford (3-2), Birmingham (1-0), Charlton (1-0), Newcastle (1-0), Tranmere (3-1) and Bristol City (2-1).

■ Barnsley F.C. were formed in 1887 and owe their inception to Rev T.T. Preedy, curate of Barnsley St Peter's church. They kept the church's name until a year after being admitted to the Second Division of the Football League in 1898. The club's honours are limited, having won the Division Three (N) championship in 1934, 1939 and 1955, and the FA Cup in 1912.

TYKES ON PARADE

LEE BUTLER (goalkeeper) - Lee started his career with Harworth Colliery before joining Lincoln City where he made 30 first team appearances. After a spell at Aston Villa, he joined Barnsley for £215,000 in July 1991.

JAMIE ROBINSON (defender) - Jamie is a former Liverpool trainee who arrived at Oakwell during July 1992 on a free transfer. He can play anywhere along the back-line but has featured recently at right-back.

GARY FLEMING (defender) - A Northern Ireland international, Gary moved to Oakwell from Manchester City for £65,000 in 1990. He started his career with Nottingham Forest, making 70 appearances for Brian Clough before moving on to Maine Road.

CHARLES BISHOP (defender) - Charles was an apprentice with Stoke City before moving on to Watford. However, he made his Football League debut after moving to Bury, where he made 130 appearances for the Gigg Lane club. He was recruited by Barnsley for £90,000 in July 1991.

GERRY TAGGART (defender) - Signed from Manchester City for £70,000 during January 1990, Gerry made nine appearances for the Maine Road club before joining the Tykes. A Northern Ireland international, he is approaching his 20th cap for his country and holds the record as Barnsley's most capped player.

BRENDAN O'CONNELL (midfield) - Brendan made his Football League debut with Exeter City in 1987. He scored 19 goals in 81 appearances at Exeter, prompting a move to Burnley where he was top-scorer in his first season. He moved on to Oakwell in March 1990 for £45,000 and was named Player of the Year in his first season at the club.

NEIL REDFEARN (midfield) - Neil started his career with Nottingham Forest before moving on a free transfer to Bolton Wanderers in 1982. Spells at Lincoln and Doncaster followed before he joined Crystal Palace for

£100,000 in 1987. He was on the move again a year later to Watford, then Oldham, before joining Barnsley for £180,000 in 1991.

OWEN ARCHDEACON (midfield) - Former Scottish youth and under-21 international, Owen started his career with Celtic. He won two Premier Championship medals at Parkhead before coming south to Barnsley in 1989 for £80,000. Virtually ever-present last season, missing only the final game of the season through injury.

GARETH WILLIAMS (midfield) - Gareth started his career playing non-league football for Gosport Borough before joining Aston Villa. He made 12 appearances for the Villa Park club before joining Barnsley for £150,000 in August 1991, making his debut on the opening day of that season.


DAVID CURRIE (forward) - David started his career with Middlesbrough, making his debut in 1982. He joined Darlington in 1986 and scored 13 goals in his first season, prompting Barnsley to sign him for £150,000 in 1988. Two years later he joined Nottm Forest for £750,000 and also had a spell at Oldham before returning to Oakwell in September 1991.

JOHN PEARSON (forward) - John started his career with his home-town club Sheffield Wednesday, before joining Charlton Athletic in 1985. He later enjoyed a spell with Leeds United before joining the Tykes for £135,000 in July 1991.

ANDY RAMMELL (forward) - Andy started his career with non-league Nuneaton Borough, before joining Manchester United in 1989 for £60,000. He scored 16 goals in the reserves in his first season, but was off-loaded to Barnsley in September 1990 for £150,000.

WAYNE BIGGINS (forward) - A £200,000 signing from Stoke City in October 1992, Wayne has teamed up with Mel Machin for the third time in his career after playing under him at Norwich and Manchester City.


MEET THE BOSS




Mel Machin made his Football League debut as a player with Port Vale in 1963. After a couple of seasons there he moved to Gillingham, where he was a first-team regular for four seasons. From Gillingham he moved to Bournemouth and then to Norwich City, playing for the Canaries for five years.

When his playing days were over, he joined the coaching staff at Norwich City and then moved to Manchester City as team manager in May 1987. After missing promotion from the Second Division at his first attempt, he clinched it next time around in May 1989. He left City in December 1989 and joined the Oakwell staff a month later.



Although we have not met very often in recent years, Barnsley can be regarded as one of our oldest opponents with fixtures going back to the end of the century.

Our first meeting in the Football League took place at Oakwell on September 10, 1898 in what was the Tykes home debut at this level. A "capital contest" was scoreless at half-time, but McInnes gave the Town the lead, before Barnsley stormed back to win the match 2-1.

In the return on January 7, only 1500 spectators witnessed Kemplay opening the scoring for the Town in the second minute, Barnsley equalised via McCulloch, but Kemplay restored the

lead before half-time. Kemplay notched his hat-trick in the second-half and after McCartney, the Barnsley captain, was sent off, Birch completed the scoring for the Town.

The scorelines were similar the following season with the Town taking an early lead through Williams in the game at Oakwell, only for Davis to net twice in the second-half to secure the points. The return saw the Town score three goals without reply courtesy of Brown, Brock and Draper.

After a brief encounters between the two sides in 1937/38, season 1946/47 saw the start of seven consecutive seasons of meetings with the Town winning six and drawing one at Kenilworth Road in this period, as well as securing three victories at Oakwell.

Highlights during this spell included the only league game for goalkeeper Murdo

Morrison in the 4-0 defeat at Oakwell in 1946/47 and the final game in Luton colours of Frank Soo in the 2-1 home win the following season.

Although the Town were thrashed 6-1 at Oakwell in 1950/51, with Cec McCormack creating a Barnsley record with five goals, we returned the compliment in the Tykes' relegation season of 1952/53 by scoring six without reply at Kenilworth Road.

Another spell of meetings commenced in 1963/64 after the Town were relegated to Division Three and during that initial season, Barnsley achieved something they had not done before or since, in winning at Kenilworth Road. This second seven-year spell saw the Town lose all but one game at Oakwell, with the exception being a 2-2 draw in the championship season of 1967/68.

I was lucky enough to pay my one and only visit to Barnsley that day to see a game that would not have

looked out of place in Division One. I am not the only Luton supporter here today who would rate the Bruce Rioch volley for the Town's first equaliser as the best goal seen away from Kenilworth Road over the years.

Both teams were promoted in 1967/68 and the following season, the Town could do no wrong as they dished out a 5-1 hammering to the Tykes. A crowd of 15,899 turned out on a mis-

erable night to see Brian Lewis score twice.

After our promotion in 1970, paths did not cross again until 1981/82 when Barnsley became one of only two sides to beat us on our travels that season, winning 4-3. They almost spoilt our promotion party at Kenilworth Road when, after the trophy and medals had been handed out at the final home game, only a late equaliser from Brian Stein saved a point.



"The fans are not calling for the removal of Mr Pleat as it is felt he is excused because he does not have a buying fund. Who emptied the buying fund?"


A 'buying fund' can only come from one of three sources: profits from business trading, existing player sales, or a 'sugar daddy' approach.

The current business trading is running at a loss of around £500,000, this being at least the tenth consecutive year of trading losses. Not much chance of buying players from this source. Player sales, particularly recently, have generated cash to pay off long-standing debts. So, has Luton Town ever had a buying fund?

If the club can continue to cut unnecessary costs and generate adequate income, it may start to run at a profit, therefore establishing a buying fund.


