

The last third of the season looks fascinating



MANAGER'S VIEWPOINT BY DAVID PLEAT

A very warm welcome this evening to our local rivals Oxford United, a club like ourselves who have had a good recent era against the handicap system. Our supporters, I am sure, will give a typically warm reception to two of our finest players in recent years. Brian Horton was an excellent motivator and leader and David Moss was everything that I would like Scott Oakes to achieve.

In our performance at Portsmouth, I saw some rosy futures, particularly for the club if we retain the services of the players with the aptitude and attitude to go with their virtues. After the first 20 minutes, which we dominated with some fine crisp football, we had probably our worst spell of defending in the last 16 games when McLoughlin, Whittingham and Walsh created chances that were scorned. After half-time and Aspinall's horrendous penalty decision (it was quite clearly a pull, but it

was equally clearly outside the box) we took over the game. Jim Smith's almost left with no hair to scratch as we pummelled Portsmouth, but failed to score. In that period, we showed all the improvement that has been gained lately. It is to our supporters credit that they understand good from bad and although deeply disappointed in defeat gave the players rousing applause at the end. Portsmouth prior to the game had the best defensive record in either the Premier League or the First Division at home having conceded only seven goals.

An hour later, on the return journey, we were therefore most surprised to hear an irate

supporter questioning the abilities of our captain Trevor Peake in the sarcastic fashion so typical now of the freedom of the modern media. Trevor Peake has been a rock in helping both John Dreyer and Alec Chamberlain

to regain the high standards they previously set themselves. He is a top-class professional, who never misses a training session, who leads the side by example and who was not looking to desert when we were relegated. Just as Brian Horton was coach-manager material so is Trevor Peake if he decides to take that direction.

Last week on the field the young players at the club performed with credit. The reserves won 2-1 at Swindon and the youth team thrashed Bristol Rovers 4-1. David Greene, our young centre-half who has just just agreed a new contract, plays in Ireland tonight for the Republic against Germany at

under-21 level. We have not forgotten our other centre-half Darren Salton, who had a further operation last week after an infection, but who is battling on strongly. He is his normal self in his regular weekly phone conversations when he asks about the progress of fellow-youngsters Hughes, Telfer and Rees, who progressed through the ranks with him.

I could not help smiling last week when some of the newspaper reports looked as though they were drifting into the realms of fantasy football. Brian Swain, the local journalist who has a difficult job in reporting on our club, did an 'exclusive' interview with an agent called Eric Hall last week. The piece made a nonsense of the facts, but I am sure Eric Hall, who can exaggerate, did speak with Brian. Equally I am convinced Brian has never met Eric Hall. I have always felt it was my duty to attend press conferences, but unfortunately in a room of a dozen or so, there may often be one or two anonymous faces who twist the words or intentionally misunderstand a joke. Unfortunately, I have been the victim of this

twice recently and it is about time I learned my lesson.

We hope that tonight's game will provide the same tremendous entertainment we saw at Portsmouth and that we may be the beneficiaries of a result that will put us back on the road to climbing the table. The last third of the season looks a fascinating competition with supporters from about eight clubs nervously looking at the fixtures and the permutations. Any person who has watched us playing recently would be convinced that providing we do not reduce our resources, we will not be involved in the equations.

Enjoy the game.

Kerry's enjoying life back home

PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH KERRY DIXON



Kerry Dixon is currently enjoying a month's loan spell at Kenilworth Road. He has settled in with ease, is enjoying his football again and would love the opportunity to extend his time at Luton Town.

Southampton striker Kerry Dixon achieved a life-long ambition recently by joining his home-town club Luton Town on a month's loan. For Kerry, he has returned home to the club who released him some 15 years ago as a schoolboy.

"That was really hard to take as a youngster, but there were 12 of us and the club could only take on ten," he reflected. "Although I scored a lot of goals for the youth team, I ended up being one of the unlucky two."

His talent did not go un-noticed and it was former Town player Brendan McNally who rescued young Dixon and put him in the starting line-up at Chesham United. He later joined Tottenham for a while before his career took off at Dunstable Town.

"I scored more than 50 goals one season, which was a Southern League record," he stated. "Maurice Evans kept tabs on me and brought me to Reading where I finally got my break in league football."

He scored 51 goals in only 116 games for the Royals and his scoring spree soon saw the top-flight club managers descend on Elm Park. He joined Chelsea in 1983 and came to prominence as one of the country's most potent strikers. He formed a prolific partnership with David Speedie and went on to gain England honours, scoring twice on his debut against West Germany in 1985.

"They were great days," recalled Kerry. "My time with David was the most productive time of my career and playing for England was a great honour. I will always hold special memories of my days at Stamford Bridge and the fine players I had the privilege to play alongside."

Last July, 191 goals and 414 appearances after making his debut for the Blues, Kerry joined Southampton. An early season ankle injury halted his progress at The Dell and an upturn in fortunes for the Saints has since kept Kerry out of the team.

"Iain Dowie took my place when I picked up the injury and he has been playing well and getting goals," continued Kerry. "Southampton's results have also improved which has made it all the more difficult for me to push my way back into the team. I was delighted when I heard Luton wanted to take me on loan and I had no hesitation in coming."

The former Challney and Beechwood School pupil still lives in the district and to play for the Hatters has been a dream come true for Kerry.

He said: "I have always lived in the area and I wouldn't want to live anywhere else, therefore it was a wonderful feeling running out for the first time in a white shirt against Charlton and even better scoring my first goal against Barnsley."

"Although I am only here for a month, I would love it to continue. I am now settled in and I think Philip Gray and myself could form a very good partnership up front. The boss thinks we can score goals together and we have got to prove him right."

it is also important to allow the children in the area to actually visit the ground and be involved with Luton Town rather than just being able to follow the well-known big London clubs who they would probably never get to see."



Horton's men continue to battle against the odds



OXFORD UNITED F.C. 1992-93

■ Despite low home gates, resulting in a low income generated, Oxford United F.C. have battled against the odds this season and have exemplified the spirit their manager Brian Horton used to display as a player. Gritty, but with class, United have fought back from last season's threat of bankruptcy, to establish themselves in a safer mid-table position this term.

■ The bulk of the Oxford squad have experience at this level or lower and know how to dig in when the going gets tough. The club also has players who can turn games with a flash of brilliance. Beauchamp and Durnin are names that spring to mind when you recall how the U's disposed of the Hatters earlier in the season.

■ At the time of writing, United's league position is justified by their results. Winning one week, losing the next, but only twice falling into the trap of losing consecutive league games. Their away form is slightly better than their home and they will be looking to build on their 1-0 victory at Wolves, the last time they ventured away in the league.

■ Speaking on their recent form, midfielder David Penney said: "Our away form has definitely been better than our form at the Manor Ground. We haven't done ourselves justice in front of our own fans and have also had some unlucky breaks going against us. Our confidence seems to improve when we travel, and playing Birmingham and Luton away we hope to get the results to climb the table."

■ There had been an Oxford United club around the time of World War I, but it had no connection with the modern club which began as Headington in 1893, adding "United" a year later. Playing first at Quarry Fields and subsequently Wooten's Fields, they owe much to a Dr Hitchings for their early development. They progressed at non-league level and made their Football League debut in August 1962, losing 3-2 at Barrow, a game which saw the appearance of Ron Atkinson in United's colours. The club won the Division Two championship in 1985, and the Third Division title in 1968 and 1984. United's only triumph at Wembley came when they won the League Cup in 1986.

UNITED ON PARADE

PAUL REECE (goalkeeper) - Paul joined Oxford in October 1992 from Grimsby Town, despite being Town's Young Player and Most Improved Player of the Year last season. He started his career as an apprentice at Stoke and later had a spell at Kettering, before joining Grimsby for £10,000 in 1988.

GARRY SMART (defender) - A former teacher, Gary was signed from non-league Wokingham Town in 1988. He has established himself at right-back this season, but is still looking for his first United goal.

MIKE FORD (defender) - Mike joined Oxford United for £150,000 in 1988 from Cardiff City. He was released from Leicester City as a youngster before joining Cardiff in 1985, where he made 162 appearances. Injuries have cut short his appearances at United, but he is currently enjoying his best run in the side.

CERI EVANS (defender) - New Zealand-born, Ceri has won over 60 caps for his country, including two against England in 1991. A qualified doctor, he came to United's attention whilst at Oxford University and impressed enough to be signed full-time. He made his debut in April 1989 at Leicester City.

ANDREW MEVILLE (defender) - Welsh international, Andrew made his debut for Swansea as a 17-year-old in 1985. He joined Oxford for £275,000 in July 1990 and has since established himself enough to be rewarded with the United captaincy. He has also represented Wales at under-21 level.

LES ROBINSON (defender) - Les was signed from Doncaster Rovers for £150,000 in 1990. He started his career at Mansfield Town in 1986 before moving to Stockport County a year later. He joined Doncaster for £10,000 in April 1988.

MICKY LEWIS (midfield) - Mickey started his career with West Bromwich Albion before joining Derby County for £25,000. 49 appearances later he was on the move again to Oxford United, where he made his debut in December 1988. Supporters' Player of the Year last season.

JIM MAGILTON (midfield) - A £125,000 signing from Liverpool in October 1990, Jim is a 23-year-old goalscoring midfielder. He has established himself as an international regular with Northern Ireland since making a goalscoring debut against Poland in 1990. He scored ten goals in 1990/1, 14 last season and is already in double figures this time round.

DAVID PENNEY (midfield) - David is a versatile player who can also operate in defence or in attack. He started his career with Derby County before joining Oxford for £175,000 in 1989. He has since been in and out of the side, but is enjoying his most consistent season to date.


JOEY BEAUCHAMP (midfield/forward) - Oxford born, Joey signed professional forms with his local club in 1989. He did not gain a regular place in the side until last season, following a six-game loan spell at Swansea. Since his return from the Vetch Field he has hardly missed a game and has scored some spectacular goals from all angles.

NICK CUSACK (forward) - Much-travelled Nick joined United in July 1992 from Darlington for a fee of £95,000. He started his career at Leicester in 1987, before moving to Peterborough and then Motherwell the following season. He spent two seasons in Glasgow before joining Darlington in January 1992.

JOHN DURNIN (forward) - John joined Oxford from his home-town club of Liverpool for £250,000 in 1988. He was leading scorer in his first full season at the Manor Ground with 15 goals. In the two seasons since he has scored ten and eight times and is in double figures this season, helped by a four-goal burst against the Town in November.

CHRIS ALLEN (forward) - A former YTS trainee, Chris made his league debut in February 1992. A consistent scorer in the reserve and youth team at the Manor, Chris has been a regular in the first-team this term and has been scoring regularly.

MEET THE BOSS




Brian Horton started his league career at Port Vale in 1970 and he went on to make 258 appearances and scored 36 goals. In 1975 he joined Brighton for £30,000 and helped the side gain promotion from the Third to the First Division. His success continued in 1981 when he joined the Hatters and skippered the club


to the Second Division championship.

Three years later he left Kenilworth Road and took his first step on the managerial ladder at Hull City at player/manager. His first season in charge saw the City rise to Division Two, enabling him to complete a hat-trick of promotions in his first seasons at Brighton, Luton and Hull.

He joined Oxford in 1988 as assistant manager, before taking over the manager's job in October that year.


Oxford United 10 year Record


What has been the highlight of your career so far in football: Making my first team debut at Villa, playing against the likes of David Platt and Tony Daley.

BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH



So said the "Evening Post" following the first League meeting between the Town and Oxford on September 1, 1970. The game marked the Town's coming of age in our first season back in Division Two as the 4-0 win at Kenilworth Road was our first victory and had been threatened since the start of the campaign.

Our promotion at the end of 1969/70 was well deserved and the squad was reinforced with the signings of Jim Ryan and Don Givens from Manchester United, David Court from Arsenal and Roger Hoy from Crystal Palace.

Hoy, Ryan and Givens were included in the side in the first game of the season at Bolton, but rather surprisingly, Terry Branston and Alan Starling were preferred to Chris Nicholl and Tony Read in defence. This choice did rebound on manager

Alec Stock as the Town were well beaten 4-2 by a team that was to end the season in a relegation position.

The defensive frailties were rectified the following week in the home game with Norwich, with the visitors being restricted to only one clear chance in the 90 minutes and the recalled Nicholl and Read were in full control.

A 0-0 scoreline was the final result but Alec Stock was rather more pleased and predicted that once the new signings had fully acclima-

tised to their new surroundings, the team would swiftly climb the table. He also added that more teams would come to Kenilworth Road to play for a draw and it was therefore important to obtain an early goal.

The next game was away at Birmingham City and this was looked on at the start of the season as the first big test against a side that boasted many vastly experienced campaigners. Those of us who travelled to St Andrews that day witnessed a thoroughly professional performance against a team roared on by a partisan crowd of 30,141. A late penalty equaliser from Macdonald secured a point but such was the display and professional competence shown by the team that we all knew that it was only a matter of time before an opposing side was going to come in for a thrashing.

We did not have to wait long. Oxford came to Kenilworth Road the following Tuesday and made the bold decision to attack the Town from the start. Before

they could adjust their plan, Oxford found themselves two goals down courtesy of a header from Matt Tees and a typical effort from Macdonald who latched on to a defensive error and surged through before clipping the ball into an empty net.

Oxford were now committed to attack but could find no way through a confident Luton defence and it was no surprise when Tees added a third Luton goal just before half-time. The fourth Luton goal came from the boot of

Macdonald on the hour and the rest of the game was spent on providing a brand of football that moved Roger Duckworth of the Evening Post to say: "With one of the most entertaining displays of powerful, high-speed football that I have ever seen them give, Luton demolished Oxford. And especially in the first-half, they pounded them into the turf with as good a performance as you are ever likely to see." He also commented on the smallness of the crowd. The attendance? 16,173!

5 It happened 5 years ago:- 5/3/88 - A 2-0 defeat at Wimbledon was lit up by the league debut in Luton colours of Marvin Johnson.

10 It happened 10 years ago:- 5/3/83 - A dismal 0-0 home draw with West Brom left the Town in 18th position in Division One. The debutant this week was Paul Elliott.

15 It happened 15 years ago:- 4/3/78 - Two goals from Phil Boersma and a header from John Faulkner lifted the gloom at Kenilworth Road as Cardiff were seen off 3-1. This victory ended a run of seven games without a win.

20 It happened 20 years ago:- 10/3/73 - A solitary Don Shanks goal was enough to secure a win over Sunderland at Kenilworth Road. This victory set us in good heart for our trip to Roker Park the following Saturday where we were due to play an F.A. Cup quarter final.




