A good start is vital against the 'auld enemy'

Welcome to the Watford players, staff and supporters and a particular welcome to Glenn Roeder in his first competitive game as manager of our 'auld friendly enemy'. Today is an almost unique occasion, having our nearest competitors as opening opponents.

Like ourselves, Watford have brought in no new faces at the time of going to press. However, I am sure that once Glenn Roeder and Kenny Jackett have surveyed the picture thoroughly they will look to stamp their mark on the club.

During the last few days I have been seeking to introduce a fresh face in order to stimulate some challenge in our front line. Last weekend, we looked at four different players who we may be able to sign without paying an initial deposit. We are talking daily in an effort to find someone to support the promising, but inexperienced, youth that we have on our books. With injuries to forward players, we could be left in a difficult situation particularly with nine games in the first six weeks.

During the summer break, our pitch has been re-seeded in some areas. We hope this will solve the drainage problems that we had with our playing surface last winter.

We have already had five games, three in Scotland, a friendly at Leyton Orient and a home match with Ipswich. In these games, various players have had a chance to show that they are ready to take their place in the team.

Our training programme has been varied and the opposition we have played has been fairly strong. In Scotland, we could have won all three games. At times we did not show enough punch, but there were more good signs than negative ones.

The season ahead is crowded and many observers have suggested our

league will be stronger than ever. A tremendous challenge is anticipated from the likes of promoted West Bromwich Albion, Stoke City, relegated Nottingham Forest, Wolves, Notts County, Leicester City and Derby County. In the south, Portsmouth and Millwall could go well again and in the north-east Middlesbrough and Sunderland will be expected to mount a bid for elevation.

Altogether, it suggests a fascinating season and I hope all our supporters will join in continuing to show faith in



Community programme goes from strength to strength



As Luton Town's successful Community Programme enters its second season, Community Liaison Officer Gary Hooper details a series of exciting events planned for the coming months.

Our Community Programme was set up last season to show the caring face of football, placing the Hatters at the focal point of community sport and activity. A variety of training sessions, tours and courses have since helped to bond the relationship between the club and the local community.

This close integration will be further improved this season with the club's latest initiative: 'Learning Through Football'.

"Towards the end of last season, we launched a pilot run for the Learning Through Football Scheme," said Gary. "School children from the area were invited to the club where they were taught a wide range of topics, including Maths, History, English, Science and Geography.

"However, each topic revolved around the football. This gave the children a chance to learn about the sport as well as develop their learning in the topics mentioned. It proved to be a great success. Therefore we plan to launch the scheme on a regular basis once the new school term commences."

Coaching programmes devised by Gary also proved to be a resounding success last season. Visits to local schools were made on a regular basis to give youngsters a chance to enhance their football skills. This season, the training sessions are being extended to reach children in the more rural areas of Bedfordshire.

"In conjunction with Beds Rural Services, we will be visiting a whole host of small villages in Bedfordshire," continued Gary. "We will be visiting villages, such as Sandy, Shefford and

Biggleswade, to put on courses spread over four weeks. Two or three local communities will join together at a time, so we get a higher number of boys and girls attending."

Luton Town's very successful schools programme will continue this season. The Hatters will once again be visiting local schools and inviting them back to watch a first-team game at Kenilworth Road.

"This season we will be looking to expand the schools programme to include areas of Herts and Bucks," stated Gary.

"The success of the entire community programme has been reflected by the number of new Junior Hatters that have enrolled this season. We will not be resting on our laurels though, and will hopefully continue to grow as this season progresses."






Confidence is very important to a professional footballer, so your help will be needed. Let's hope we can put last season behind us and get off to a flying start.

Midland sides mount three pronged challenge

NEWS ON ONE

With the Town about to enter a new season, Leonard Spall reviews the summer transfer merry-go-round involving some of our First Division rivals.

After 18 years of Brian Clough's flamboyant management, Nottingham Forest look to be an interesting prospect this season. Having lost Nigel Clough to Liverpool and Roy Keane to Manchester United, both for large fees, new manager Frank Clark has bought well. Centre-back Colin Cooper has arrived from Millwall, and high-scoring Stan Collymore from Southend.

Clark, once a Forest player himself in the heyday of the early eighties, is well aware of the task ahead of him: "Obviously, the First Division this year will be very difficult," he said.

"Every club plays to the strength of its players and I've inherited a side who've been brought up to be a passing team and we'll be carrying that on."

Wolves look likely to be another tough nut to crack - having transformed their team and ground. Manager Graham Turner has spent over £2 million in acquiring Geoff Thomas, David Kelly and Kevin Keen, and £14 million has been spent refurbishing Molineux. Turner admitted: "I am delighted with the business done so far."

"We have signed three players who can play a major part in what we want to achieve. It is our intention to go for promotion right from the start and I want to cover every eventuality."

Promotion 'also-rans' from last season, Leicester and Portsmouth, are sure to be in the thick of things. Leicester have managed to hold-on to teenage star Julian Joachim and have signed David Speedie on a free-transfer from Southampton, whilst Portsmouth will look to the striking prowess of Paul Walsh and new boy John Durnin for goals. The loss of Whittingham will weaken their forward line, but the arrival of Mark Blake, who was part of the £1.2 million deal which took Whittingham to Villa Park, will be an asset.

At the bottom, it is harder to tip those most likely for relegation. Terry Butcher's Sunderland have gone for change rather than improvement. He has brought in ex-Hatters Alec Chamberlain and Phil Gray and ousted Peter Davenport, Gary Owers, Gordon

Armstrong and most of his backroom staff.

"I had to be brutal," said Butcher. "It was time for a fresh start. The team that goes out at the start of next season has to be good enough for promotion."

Southend United, now without Stan Collymore and defender Spencer Prior, may also find it tough. Fellow strugglers last season, Birmingham, however, may have turned the tide against relegation battles. Manager Terry Cooper has been given the go-ahead to spend.

Cooper bought six new players towards the end of last season and said: "The aim is to bring quality players to the club. Our new owners have been positive and I intend to realise our potential."

Ossie Ardiles may have left West Brom, but replacement Keith Burkinshaw is experienced enough to maintain their high playing standard. Similarly, Stoke and Bolton are not automatic bets for relegation. Another relegation candidate is Bristol City.

The Bristol side, under the inexperienced managerial control of Russell Osman, are now without the services of Andrew Cole, and after finishing in 15th place last season, Osman certainly has a job on his hands. The former Portman Road player admits: "It is a big challenge, but I have confidence in the club. We will be working on all aspects of team play."



Jason Rees in action against Ipswich





The former Welwyn Garden City pupil ruptured a thigh muscle during a training session on the Town's pre-season tour of Scotland. However, manager David Pleat believes he will battle back to be a regular squad member.

"It was devastating to lose Aaron," said Pleat. "He looked really impressive when he came on against St Johnstone, but will now be out of action for three months. I'm sure he will bounce back to be a Luton Town regular of the future."

DIXON RE-JOINS FOR THE NEW SEASON

Southampton striker Kerry Dixon, who played on loan for the Hatters for three months last season, is expected to play in Town colours again this afternoon. He has started another one-month loan spell and is looking forward to renewing his acquaintance.

WATFORD F.C. 1993-94

■ Like ourselves, Watford will be hoping for a change of fortune, when they visit Kenilworth Road this afternoon. Last season was a massive anti-climax for our neighbours as they plummeted down the First Division table during the second-half of the season.

■ The Hornets won only three of their final 14 league matches, scoring only eight goals. The statement from then-manager Steve Perryman at the beginning of the season that: "We have a side here capable of at least making the play-off places," was far from realised.

■ One glimmer of hope from last season was the emergence of striker Paul Furlong. Signed from Coventry City for £250,000 last summer, Paul spared the blushes at Vicarage Road by netting 19 league goals, which helped the side climb to 16th place by the end of the season.

■ The Vicarage Road faithful will be hop-

ing that the summer changes will bring fresh optimism and hope. Glenn Roeder, a former Hornets favourite, has been brought in from Gillingham to replace Perryman and, knowing Watford personally as a player, he is sure to inject new life into the side.

■ Following his impressive season, Furlong is hoping to continue in the same vein under his new boss. Speaking recently he said: "The new campaign will bring new opportunities. I am looking to continue my partnership with Ken Charlery and given the right service, we will get stronger and stronger."

■ Roeder will be desperate to get the new campaign off to a flying start and a derby win will give him the confidence he needs. However, he will be aware of the result of the corresponding fixture last season when goals from Scott Oakes and Ian Benjamin ensured a 2-0 reverse on a mud-bath of a pitch.

VISITORS ON PARADE

PERRY SUCKLING (goalkeeper) - A contractual agreement with his former club Crystal Palace meant that Watford were able to obtain the services of Perry on a free transfer in July '92. An England under-21 international, he has also served Coventry and Manchester City.

BARRY ASHBY (defender) - A product of Watford's youth team, Barry was a member of the side which won the FA Youth Cup in 1988. Since then he has been elevated to professional status and although only 21, he has been a regular squad member for the past three seasons.

JASON DRYSDALE (defender) - Jason has made the number three shirt his own since breaking into the first-team three years ago. A graduate of the FA School of Excellence, he has also been used as a winger on occasions. Jason is a former England youth international.

KEITH DUBLIN (defender) - Keith has played in every position across the backline since his arrival at Vicarage Road from Brighton for £275,000 in 1990. A former England youth international, he started his career with Chelsea but had, ironically, trained with Watford as a schoolboy.

DAVID HOLDSWORTH (defender) - Another former England youth player who has progressed through the junior ranks at Watford, David signed as a professional with his twin brother Dean, who is now at Wimbledon. David has made over 150 appearances for the Hornets.

ANDY HESSENTHALER (midfield) - Andy has made a smooth transition into the professional game since signing for Watford from non-league Redbridge Forest for £65,000 in 1991. He capped his first season at Vicarage Road with the runner-up spot in the Player-of-the-Year awards and continued his form throughout last season.

GERARD LAVIN (midfield) - A second-year professional, Gerard made his debut as a youth trainee in 1991-92, coming on as substitute in the 1-0 home win over FA Cup finalists Sunderland. He is used on the right side of midfield and has also been employed as a winger.

GARY PORTER (midfield) - Regular appearances last season took Gary past the 300 appearance mark for Watford. A former England youth and under-21 international, he was signed as a schoolboy, making his debut for the Hornets in 1985. This season is Gary's testimonial season.

JASON SOLOMAN (midfield) - Jason started his career as a defender, but midway through last season he was switched to midfield. A former Watford youth player, he is a graduate of the FA School of Excellence.


LEE NOGAN (forward) - Lee joined Watford from Oxford midway through the 1991-92 season for £250,000. He was injured on his debut, but returned to the side to play a part in the side's climb up the table to tenth place. Last season he played a deep role behind Charlery and Furlong.

ROGER WILLIS (forward) - 'Harry' joined Watford from neighbours Barnet for £175,000 in October '92 in the first-ever transfer between Hertfordshire's only professional clubs. He joined Barnet from Grimsby in 1989.

KEN CHARLERY (forward) - Ken came to Vicarage Road from Peterborough for £350,000 in October 1992. He started his career with non-league Becton, before joining Basildon and Fisher en route to Maidstone United. He joined Posh in 1991 for £20,000 where he scored 38 goals in 94 appearances.

PAUL FURLONG (forward) - Watford's leading goalscorer last season, Paul was signed from Coventry City for £250,000 in 1992. He previously played for non-league Enfield Town when Watford assistant boss Peter Taylor was manager. He joined the Sky Blues for £130,000.


Glenn Roeder took over as Watford manager during the close season, when his predecessor Steve Perryman resigned in early July to return to Tottenham Hotspur as assistant manager.

Glenn had previously played for Watford, having signed in June 1989 on a free transfer from Newcastle United. He subsequently captained the Hornets and at the start of the 1990-91 season, was appointed as the club's first-team coach while retaining his playing contract.

His career started at Leyton Orient, from where he moved on to Queens Park Rangers and then Newcastle United. In addition to nearly 650 senior appearances, Glenn earned six international caps with the England B side.

In 1991 he took his first managerial appointment at Gillingham, whom he guided to Third Division safety last season.

Oakes' busy summer capped with England honours



PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH SCOTT OAKES

It has been a busy summer for Town forward Scott Oakes. Once the domestic season had ended, Scott was called up for England under-21 duty which culminated in his first international cap against Brazil in the Toulon under-21 tournament in June.

Scott enjoyed a consistent second-half to last season for the Hatters, providing an abundance of chances for goalpoacher Philip Gray and also netting some spectacular goals himself. His form prompted inclusion to the England squad by Lawrie McMenemy for not only the Toulon tournament, but also for the important European under-21 Championship games against Norway and Poland. Scott admits that his selection was a pleasant surprise:

"There are so many other good players around, so being called-up was a shock," he said. "But it was an honour to be selected, and being part of the England set-up provided me with great experience. To actually play against Brazil in the Toulon Tournament was the icing on the cake."

The England youngsters showed their potential in France and put the full squad to shame, roaring to victory with wins against Portugal (2-0), Scotland (1-0) and France (1-0). But the 0-0 draw against Brazil stands out for Scott, who had the chance to measure his own skills against his South American counterparts.

"It was red-hot out there and terrific experience for me," he continued. "I knew that because of my shin splint problem, I was unlikely to play the full 90 minutes, but I was happy for the chance I was given. The pitches out there were not too clever and that probably would not have helped my injury if I had played more."

Oakes did well in his second-half run-out against the Samba men and held on to his substitutes place for the semi-final win

against Scotland and the victory over hosts France in the final. He hopes his cap will be the first of many in an England jersey.

"It has always been my ambition to play for my country, so hopefully this is just the start. I think I will still be eligible to play for the under-21's again next season, so I can further my international knowledge."

Scott's England experience will inevitably help him progress his Hatters career and he believes the Town can hit greater heights next season. The Hatters will be hoping to build on their nail-biting first campaign in Division One and Scott believes the Luton system will help them this term.

He continued: "It was enjoyable at Luton last season because we had a good team spirit and managed to play ourselves out of trouble. We always try and play good football which can only help develop us individually.

"Having played well enough to retain a regular place in the Luton side has helped my overall game and that has given me the confidence to enjoy myself and try different things.

"I have good feelings about the new season and hopefully the team and myself can make big strides. We have a great mixture of young players and more experienced pros, and we believe that we have the capability of making a play-off place."

BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH

The Town were followed into Division One by Watford at the end of 1981-82 and although the Luton brand of cavalier football was taken to the hearts of the media in the new season, it was our rivals from down the motorway who took the League by storm.

By the time of our first clash, at Kenilworth Road on Boxing Day 1982, we were dropping closer to the relegation zone while the Hornets, after holding the top spot briefly, were still in fourth position.

The biggest home crowd for seven years, 21,145, gathered to witness the contrast in styles and it was the Town who had the best of the first-half, missing several good chances but taking a deserved lead in the 37th minute when



Raddy Antic was unfortunate to be sent off against the Hornets.

The Town fought back and 20 minutes later were ahead following

centre-half Clive Goodyear mis-hit a shot through a crowded penalty area.

Watford came out for the second-half with a vengeance and for 15 minutes were all over the Town rearguard and only a series of unbelievable misses by England new boy Luther Blissett prevented a goal avalanche. Gradually, Luton skipper Brian Horton mustered his troops and the storm was weathered with the final whistle being greeted by a much-relieved cheer from the Hatters faithful.

The return was played at Vicarage Road on Easter Monday with the two teams even further apart in the league table as we had dropped into the relegation zone in the intervening period. Despite this, the Town opened brightly and took the game to the Hornets and it was against the run of play when Blissett found himself at the end of a John Barnes cross to score in the 6th minute.

a first Hatters goal from Trevor Aylott and a long-range cracker from Horton. Watford equalised before half-time and then scored two quick goals straight after the break, utilising the pace and power for which they were famous.

The game was killed off on the hour when Raddy Antic was sent off for a gentle challenge on Les Taylor and it came as no surprise when Nigel Callaghan scored the fifth for Watford just before the end, to give the Hornets their first victory over the Town in eight meetings, sending us to the bottom of the table.

Incredibly, having read his reports over the years, Oliver Phillips in the 'Watford Observer' hoped that Luton would survive, but in case anyone thought he was going soft, added: "I hope it takes them until the last seconds of the 89th minute in their very last match for them to make it safe."

He was four minutes out as Antic scored the last-gasp winner at Maine Road in that never-to-be-forgotten game against Manchester City to preserve our First Division status.





Andy looks forward to a fresh challenge

PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH ANDY PETTERSON



With Alec Chamberlain, last season's first-choice goalkeeper now at fellow-First Division outfit Sunderland, Andy Petterson has the chance to re-establish himself in the Town's starting eleven. He is looking forward to the challenge and is eager to build on the 18 appearances he made last season.

Despite breaking a toe during the summer, Andy remains strong in the belief that he can make an impact this season. "I am confident of making the team sheet for our first game against Watford and I can hopefully build from there," said the former Australian youth international. "I have the belief in myself to do well and having an extended run can only help."

"I think I performed reasonably enough during my spell in the first-team last season, but the side was not performing too well and the goals were leaking through, so the manager took me out of the firing line to protect my confidence. Looking back, it was the correct thing to do. I now have another chance and I am determined to grab it."

Last season, Andy's experience was further boosted with a loan spell at Premier League Ipswich Town, and he impressed sufficiently enough to earn a first-team place in the Suffolk club's 2-1 home victory over Nottingham Forest. Although the standard was higher, Andy did not notice that much of a difference.

"Both Ipswich and Forest like to play football the way it should be played, so I didn't notice much of a change to that which I had experienced at Luton," he continued. "The greatest step-up so far has been from Luton's reserves to the first team. When I came into the side last year I found everything to be so much faster and the number of quality crosses and shots I had to deal with greatly increased."

Andy, who hails from Fremantle in Western Australia, has represented his native 'Socceroos' at youth team level. Although Aston Villa goalkeeper Mark Bosnich currently occupies the number one jersey for the national side, Andy believes a consistent season with Luton can put him into World Cup contention.




"Playing for my country has to be a realistic target," he continued. "If I play well for Luton this season, I must have a greater chance of pushing for the squad. However, it will not be easy with Mark and Jason (Kearton) both ahead of me. "Football is booming in Australia at the moment. We have just won the Oceanic group in our bid to reach the World Cup in 1994, by beating New Zealand, and we now face Canada in the next round of qualifying games. It would be wonderful to experience the World Cup finals, but I must keep my feet firmly on the ground and concentrate on Luton Town first."

With their initial campaign well and truly behind them, Andy feels that the Hatters can build on last season's struggle to avoid relegation and push for

greater heights.

"I don't think we are going to be title contenders," he admitted. "But we now have a year's experience behind us in this league and our younger players are now a year older, so I see no reason why we cannot aim for a play-off place."




