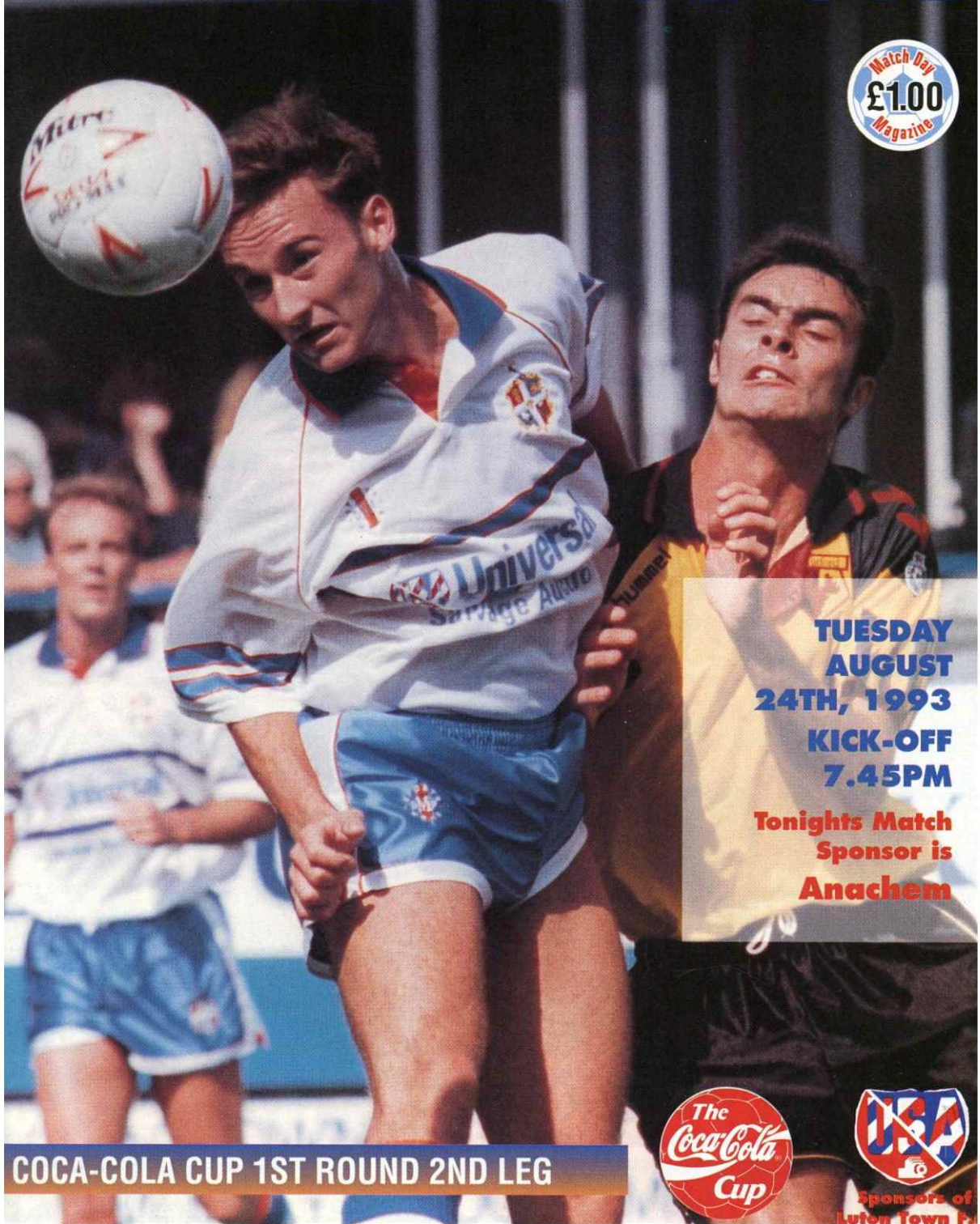

ON THE BALL WITH DAVID PLEAT

Welcome to Cambridge United and all their supporters. Last week's game was exciting with the home team holding sway in the first-half where we performed lamely. The second period was a different story and we should have received at least a draw.

The situation is clear. We need to be positive throughout tonight's game and we hope to gain the needed win.

Our opening game this season made a little bit of history, marking the first time that Luton have worn names on their shirts and the first time where we have used a substitute goalkeeper. Our recent record against Watford was preserved with another win. Despite the sending off incidents, I felt comfortable that we clicked into a smooth pattern early on in the game. During that time we were tidy but failed to hit the net. The win was just reward, but we needed to take a higher percentage of our goal chances.

Unfortunately Kerry Dixon, who scored a splendid goal, was unavailable to play in the first leg at Cambridge. Southampton manager Ian Branfoot has been first class in his co-operation and understanding of our situation and we were quite happy to accept their expected decision.

After the pre-season games against St Johnstone, Raith, Hibs, Leyton Orient and Ipswich, which were all played in the evening, the remarkable

change in temperature at 3.00 pm on the first Saturday of the season nearly caught us out. Towards the end of the Watford game we looked rather shattered. At present, there are three players sidelined with injury: Richard Harvey, Tony Thorpe and Aaron Skelton. The need for back-up players is essential. With that in mind, we are spending the first few weeks of the season watch-

ing as many games as possible in the hope that we can bring another player to our club to make more competition for places.

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Scott Houghton to the club. As a 21-year-old

he has a whole career ahead of him if he stays clear of injury. Any disappointments he may have suffered at Tottenham should merely serve to strengthen his resolve to be a top player. His signing gives us the flexibility of forward manoeuvring because he has played down the middle and in either flank position.

Finally, I would like to thank those supporters who sent good luck messages at the start of the season and all the season-ticket holders who have renewed their tickets. If we continue to play the football of which we are capable, we will be at the beginning of a new era of producing a good footballing team.

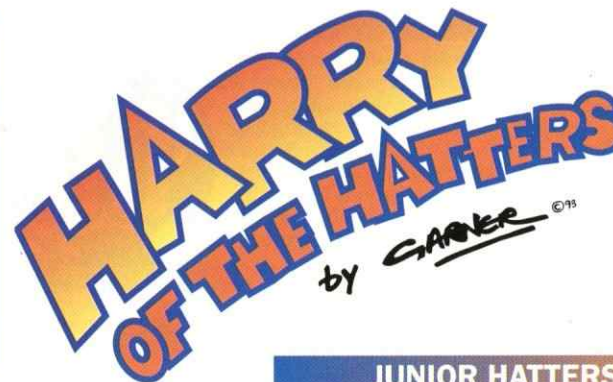

Spotlight on tonight's visitors



CAMBRIDGE UNITED F.C. 1993-94

■ After hitting the heights in the old Second Division two seasons ago, events have gone rapidly downhill for Cambridge. After finishing fifth in the then Second Division in 1991-92, and knocking on the door of the top flight, Cambridge were relegated last term.

■ In an exciting finale to the season, United were relegated to Division Two on the last day, losing 2-0 at West Ham whilst other results went against them. Any two of eight teams, mathematically, could have joined Bristol Rovers in the relegation bracket and it was unfortunate for United to have to travel to Upton Park, where West Ham had to outdo Portsmouth by one goal to gain promotion to the Premier League.

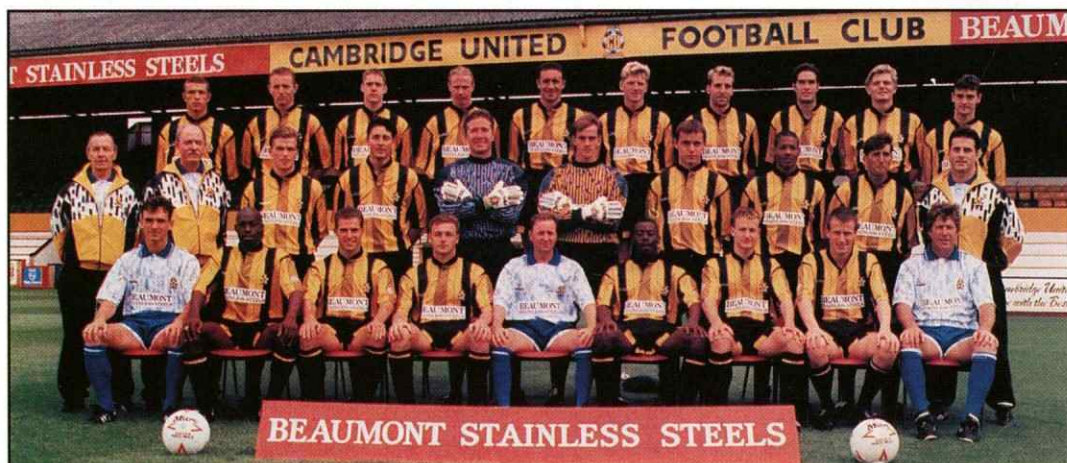
■ Last season, Cambridge recovered from a 3-0 deficit in the League match at home to Luton, finishing up with a point. In the corresponding fixture at Kenilworth Road in March, the Hatters ran-out 2-0 winners, a result which sunk United into the bottom three.

■ Following relegation, and after new manager Gary Johnson had replaced Ian

Atkins, much has changed. During the close season Dean Barrick, Andrew Jeffrey, and Craig Middleton have all been added to the squad. The signing of Australian goalkeeper John Filan has also been completed, while John Vaughan, Phil Chapple (both to Charlton) and Chris Leadbetter have all departed.

■ The new regime appear to have started with the intention of re-gaining their place in the First Division at the first attempt. They opened their league account with an encouraging 3-2 victory over Blackpool at the Abbey Stadium. They will be looking to beat their close rivals this evening to prove that they still have the quality and determination to rival their former colleagues in Division One.

■ Cambridge United were formed in 1919 as Abbey United and decided to turn professional in 1949, changing their name to Cambridge United. They competed in the United Counties League, before graduating to the Eastern Counties League in 1951 and the Southern League in 1958.

VISITORS ON PARADE

JOHN FILAN (goalkeeper) - John, who came to England from Australia last season, made his debut against Newcastle United last season and went on to appear in the final five league games of the season. He is a former member of Australia's Olympic team.

MICK HEATHCOTE (defender) - Mick began his career at Middlesbrough but made his Football League debut after joining neighbours Sunderland. However, he established himself at Shrewsbury Town before joining United for £150,000 in 1991. Mick operates at centre-half or right-back.

DANNY O'SHEA (defender) - Danny began his career as an apprentice at Highbury, but joined Exeter City after making six first-team appearances. He joined Southend United for £5,000 in 1985 and spent four seasons at Roots Hall. Two years later he joined United on a free transfer and played an integral part in the club's rise from the Fourth Division.

LIAM DAISH (defender) - Liam was an apprentice at Portsmouth, but made only one league appearance before joining Cambridge. He spent a loan spell at Barnet before establishing himself at the Abbey Stadium. Liam is a full Republic of Ireland international.

ANDREW JEFFREY (defender) - Andrew joined United from non-league neighbours Cambridge City for £5,000 in July 1993. A former apprentice with Leicester City, he will be aiming for a regular first-team place this season.

ANDY FENSOME (defender) - Andy started his career at Norwich City but failed to make the breakthrough into the first team. He joined United in December 1989 and became a regular fixture at right-back as the club climbed the leagues.

GARY CLAYTON (midfield) - Gary was bought from Doncaster Rovers in 1987 for £10,000, having previously played for Rotherham, Gainsborough and

Burton Albion. During his non-league days, Gary represented England at semi-professional level.

CRAIG MIDDLETON (midfield) - Signed on a free transfer from Coventry City in July 1993, Craig made one appearance for the Sky Blues before his summer transfer. An attacking midfielder, he will be aiming to secure a regular place in the first-team this season.

MICHAEL DANZEY (midfield) - Michael was bought from St Albans City in October 1992 for £17,500 and was John Beck's last signing for Cambridge. A former apprentice at Nottingham Forest, Michael was leading goalscorer for the reserves last season.

JOHN FOWLER (midfield) - 18-year-old John signed professional forms in April 1991 after impressing in the reserve and youth teams at the Abbey. He made two league appearances last season, and will be looking to establish himself regularly this term.

STEVE CLARIDGE (forward) - Steve began his career at Portsmouth, but dropped into non-league football with Weymouth. He resurrected his league career with Aldershot and made 62 appearances, before joining Cambridge for £75,000 in 1990. He joined the Hatters in July 1992, but 15 appearances later he found himself back at the Abbey Stadium.

STEVE BUTLER (forward) - Steve made a name for himself as a prolific goalscorer with Maidstone United before joining Watford in 1991. Following the signings of Furlong and Charlery, Steve found himself surplus to requirements at Vicarage Road and joined Cambridge for an undisclosed fee in December 1992.

NEIL LYNE (forward) - A £75,000 signing from Shrewsbury in January 1993, Neil started his career at Nottingham Forest but failed to break into the first team. He had spells at Walsall and Shrewsbury before joining the Shrews on a permanent basis.

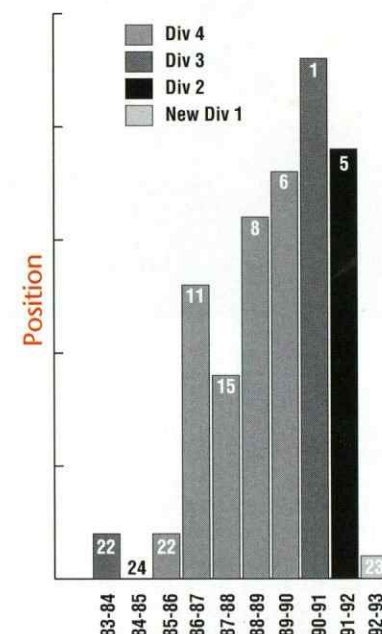


Gary Johnson joined Cambridge United in the summer of 1988 as reserve team manager under Chris Turner and John Beck. In 1990 he became Beck's assistant and together they embarked on a highly successful couple of seasons, winning two consecutive promotions.

Following Beck's departure in October 1992, Gary was handed the reins of caretaker manager, a spell which lasted six weeks. Despite leading the club to the quarter-finals of the Coca Cola Cup, the manager's post was given to Ian Atkins.

Gary has always been the fans' choice and after Atkins was sacked at the end of last season, Gary was installed as manager.

Home-boy Houghton rejuvenated by Town move

PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH SCOTT HOUGHTON



This graduate of the F.A. School of Excellence has gained international honours for England at schoolboy, youth and under-19 levels. The blonde winger featured in the Spurs youth league and cup winning side, and made his professional debut for Tottenham against his boyhood heroes Manchester United in September 1991.

Only 5ft 5", but well-built and very strong our latest signing has played for the Hatters before as a junior prior to his seven-year spell at White Hart Lane. Ironically, he scored twice in November 1991 for Spurs against his new club in a 4-1 win at White Hart Lane, earning himself the tag of 'super-sub'.

the number 26 shirt in the squad.

"I feel like I am on cloud nine at the moment," he admitted. "I hope I can break into the first team at Luton and get 30-40 games under my belt."

"I was very pleased to leave. I had become disillusioned at Tottenham, not only with the club but with football in general. I have been playing my football in the reserves for the last three years and think I should have had a proper chance in the first team. I was never one of the favourites with the management at Spurs, they never really pushed me and I felt I was not progressing."

When he signed for Spurs, Houghton said he was drawn to them because they were 'a big club' and seven years later he has made the change. Houghton thought that after his 'super sub' appearance against the Hatters he had earned himself a chance.

"I thought I did well in that game and thought I might make it into the first eleven for the next game," he commented. "But the management thought differently. I was disappointed."

He made only 14 appearances for Spurs that season (1991-92) and was loaned out to Gillingham and Charlton last season. In three years as a professional he made just 27 League appearances, and only 10 were at Tottenham.

He is now looking for first-team status, and the deal David Pleat has negotiated has given him the perfect opportunity. The money Spurs will receive is performance related. If Houghton has his way they will have to dig deep!

"It's do or die really. I want to take this chance for myself and everybody at Luton. Things may not work out, but I've got an extra step in my stride at the moment."

A fitting end to the frustration



BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH

Due to a number of postponements the Town's lead at the head of Division Two in the Spring of 1982 was in danger of being whittled away by teams who had played up to five games more.

Two consecutive home games, against promotion rivals Oldham and mid-table Cambridge, followed and with it the chance to consolidate the position at the top. Oldham were seen off easily 2-0 with goals from the inform David Moss, one from the penalty spot and the other direct from a corner.

United set out their stall when they announced three centre halves in their side and lined-up with eight men at the back. Manager John Docherty admitted that it was his priority to stop the Town scoring and then hope to pinch a goal at the other end. "It is not our job to come here and let Luton turn us over. We are coming to prevent that happening."

During the first 45 minutes Cambridge managed to stifle the Town and were booed from the pitch at half-time. The fans had rather more to cheer in the second period, however, as the Town managed to open the game up and start creating meaningful chances.

Richard Key in the Cambridge goal then earned star billing with a series of saves with all parts of his anatomy. He saved from Moss with his legs and stopped a rocket shot from full-back Kirk Stephens with his chest and was then fortunate to see strikes from Stephens and Ricky Hill hit the woodwork.

The loss of the injured Lil Fuccillo on the hour did not upset the Town's rhythm and it was a pass from substitute Raddy Antic that allowed Hill to net, only for the effort to be disallowed for a foul on the goalkeeper.

With the minutes ticking away we were all resigned to a frustrating 0-0 draw and moaning about the fact that football was certainly not going to be the victor that evening when skipper Brian Horton picked up the ball 30 yards from goal, side-stepped two defenders and let fly with a shot that was too good even for the admirable Key.

As they had only broken out of defence twice up to that point it was not likely that Cambridge would snatch an equaliser, and so it proved. The Town had gained another vital victory and managed to force a bit of daylight between themselves and the chasing pack.

In the after match conference Docherty was slated for his approach to the game but when it was pointed out that his team had only managed an average of half a goal a match in their previous ten fixtures, perhaps the tactics were understandable.


