Safety is of paramount importance at Kenilworth Road

SAFETY FIRST BY GEOFF LOVELL



With the season now well under way, it is an opportune time to explain to you the steps being taken at the club to ensure your safety on match days.

There is now a requirement on the club to possess two licences before we can admit spectators to the ground. The first of these is issued by the Football Licensing Authority and is new this season. This licences the club to admit spectators. The second document we are required to have is the Ground Safety Certificate, issued by Bedfordshire County Council. This document has many conditions attached and it is my job as safety officer to ensure that these conditions are complied with. Before either body issue the respective certificates, they have to be satisfied that public safety is of the required standard.

One of the requirements of the Safety Certificate is that we must have a written safety policy. The board of directors have now approved such a policy and the first two paragraphs will feature regularly in the match day programme. The club's primary responsibility will be to ensure the reasonable safety of those attending the stadium.

In the past, the police have taken responsibility on match days for all aspects of safety and public order at football grounds. There is now a move throughout the country away from this and clubs' are being encouraged to be responsible for all aspects of safety, leaving the police to maintain responsibility for public order. Our Safety Certificate states that safety and search procedures are the responsibility of the club. This division of responsibility means that there can be less policing at football which has to be of benefit to the community and the club.

This reduction in policing cannot be accom-

plished overnight. It requires an increased standard of stewarding and over the past nine months, with the close involvement of Bedfordshire Police, we have organised specialist training and have improved the general training for stewards. We have taken the first steps in accepting more responsibility by introducing Safety Stewards who replaced ten police officers. This was followed by the introduction of Search Stewards at the Kenilworth end of the ground, to replace a further 12 police officers.

We shall continue to work closely with the police in order to take over our full responsibility in line with our safety document.

I am keen to involve more local people in stewarding on match days. Although we do not employ stewards direct, I will be only too pleased to discuss stewarding with anyone that is interested.


It is important that the police and the club work closely together as good public order means good safety.

The majority of league and premier ship clubs now have dedicated safety officers. An association has recently been formed by these officers, the aim being to work together in the interests of all spectators. All clubs have their own problems and we can all help each other by an exchange of information and ideas.

During this current season, the club is required to hold an evacuation exercise to test evacuation procedures. The last one was held some three years ago and it is now a requirement to hold one per year. We have to be satisfied that in a major emergency the procedures that are in place are adequate to deal with any situation that may arise.



Promoted sides struggle to find their feet in the Premiership



NEWS ON ONE

The star prize in the First Division is a step-up into the Premiership. The new league promises a higher profile and greater financial reward, but does it deliver? Leonard Spall takes a look at last season's First Division successes, and finds out how Newcastle, West Ham and Swindon are fairing in the top-flight.

Unlike most teams, Swindon did not start the season in optimistic mood. The summer at the County Ground was busy to say the least, and three transfers tore the heart from the Wiltshire side. With player-manager Glenn Hoddle leaving for Chelsea, Colin Calderwood moving to Spurs and David Mitchell departing for Turkey, the Robins were left contemplating the Premiership without three key men.

"We will be delighted if we finish sixth from bottom," admitted skipper Ross McLaren. "It is not just a big season for the club but for a lot of the players as well. Someone like Martin Ling was outstanding last year, now he has to prove he can do it against the best in the country."

Unfortunately for Swindon so far, he, and the rest of this team-mates, have only proved the critics right for making them relegation favourites. They leaked 23 goals in their first nine league games, and are the only team not to have won in the Premiership. Swindon's first-ever season in the top-flight looks like it will be very short-lived.

Unlike Swindon, West Ham have seen it all before. The east-London team finished third in the top-flight in 1985 and since then have moved up and down between the top two divisions. Like Swindon, West Ham were tipped for a short stay in the Premiership and until Julian Dicks left for Anfield, the Hammers were doing nothing much to prove them wrong.

In a whirlwind-week in September, Billy Bonds made a decisive move in an attempt to show that West Ham's passing traditions belonged at the highest level. While Bond's prize asset moved north, Mike Marsh and David Burrows were travelling in the opposite direction. Add to this the experience and consistency of striker Lee Chapman, and Bonds had bagged himself three good players for less than the price of one.

New faces may not save the Hammers but four new signings, including the Dutch under-21 international

Jeroen Boere, will add impetus to their team. The 2-0 win over Blackburn at Ewood Park showed what the Hammers can do, and their survival looks slightly less precarious than Swindon's.

Manager Billy Bonds summed up the changes at Upton Park. "The Premier League is much tougher than the First Division, the players are fitter and stronger. Last season we had no trouble in playing our football. This year we have found it that bit harder to impress our style of play on opponents."

Newcastle, however, provide a completely different story. Looking fairly safe in mid-table, the Magpies have justified hopes of going on to better things. Striker Andy Cole has been scoring freely for the Geordie team, and the return of folk-hero Peter Beardsley has added a wealth of experience to their successful side.

The St James' Park atmosphere has been greatly improved by a new stand and Keegan's team have certainly got the support to go with it. With the money and support of Newcastle they look like the only one of the promoted sides who are confident of their place in the top-grade.





Spotlight on tonights visitors

BRISTOL CITY F.C. 1993-94



■ Bristol City visit Kenilworth Road this evening hoping for an improvement in their recent Endsleigh Insurance Division One form. In a similar vein to last season, the Robins are struggling at the wrong end of the table after a patchy start to Russell Osman's first full season at the helm.

■ The Ashton Gate faithful were hoping for an improvement on last season, particularly after the way they secured their First Division status in spring. The Robins lost only one of their final ten league games, which pushed the club from the real dangers of relegation, to the relatively comfortable position of 15th place. The pre-season signings of Dave Martin, Ian Baird, Liam Robinson and Brian Borrows appeared to add strength to the squad, and it was hoped that the experiences of last season would be learned this time around.

■ A 1-3 defeat at Wolves on the opening day of the season, however, has set the tone for the Robins to date. They have since won only two games, but will take heart with the fact that these victories came against high-flyers Crystal Palace (2-0) and Southend United (2-1). At the time of writing, City lie in 21st position in the

league table, three points clear of the Hatters.

■ Bristol fans will be hoping that their side can emulate the form which yielded three points at Kenilworth Road at the start of last season. An Andy Cole-inspired performance led to a 3-0 victory against the Hatters and pushed the side into the top ten in the table. The two sides also met in cup competitions here last season, with the Hatters taking the advantage. A 1-1 draw in the Anglo-Italian Cup was followed up in January with a 2-0 F.A. Cup third round victory.

■ "If we can start playing more football we will be fine this season," said midfielder Mark Gavin last week. "What we must start doing is taking our opportunities in front of goal and be positive. Then we will start winning matches."

■ Bristol City F.C. were formed in 1897 when the Bristol South End club, formed three years earlier, decided to adopt professionalism and apply for admission to the Southern League. They employed Woolwich Arsenal manager Sam Hollis and gave him £40 to employ players. Four years later they progressed to the Football League, winning their Division Two opening game with Blackpool 2-0.

KEITH WELCH (goalkeeper) - Keith was signed from Rochdale for £200,000 during the 1991 close season for a tribunal fee of £200,000. He began his career with Bolton, and spent five seasons at Burden Park. He established himself as number one at Ashton Gate last season.

BRIAN BORROWS (defender) - Full back Brian started his career at Everton and made 27 league appearances before joining Bolton Wanderers. He went on to establish himself as a competent right-back prompting Coventry City to sign him in 1985. He made over 300 league appearances for the Sky Blues, but missed the 1987 FA Cup Final through injury.

STUART MUNRO (defender) - Signed on a free transfer from Blackburn in February, Stuart was drafted into the side last season and helped City avoid relegation. He started his career at Glasgow Rangers and can operate at left-back or in midfield when needed.

MARK SHAIL (defender) - Mark came to the club from Yeovil in March for a £40,000 fee.

An England non-league international, he is a late starter in the professional game, making his debut against Derby County last season at the age of 26.

MATT BRYANT (defender) - A former trainee at Ashton Gate, Matt has progressed through the youth and reserve teams to the first-team. He made his Football League debut on loan at Walsall in 1990, and his City debut in January 1991. He has since established himself as a regular at the heart of the defence.

MARTIN SCOTT (defender) - Martin joined the Robins from Rotherham for £200,000 in 1990. He made his debut for United in 1986 and made more than 100 senior appearances for the Millers before moving to Ashton Gate. Prior to joining City, he spent a loan period at Nottingham Forest.

DAVE MARTIN (midfield) - Formerly with Millwall and Wimbledon, Dave joined City from Southend United on a

free transfer during the close season. A versatile performer, Dave can also operate anywhere along the back line.

BRIAN TINNIION (midfield) - Brian signed from Bradford City in March 1993 for a tribunal fee of £180,000. A former Newcastle trainee, he played for the Magpies at full-back, but made a name for himself in midfield at the Valley Parade.

MARK GAVIN (midfield) - Much-travelled Mark is in his second spell at Ashton Gate. He began his career at Leeds in 1983, before joining Carlisle United two years later. He soon joined Bolton, where he remained until 1987. He spent a short while at Rochdale, before moving to Scotland with Hearts. A year later he joined City for £35,000 but move to Watford two years later. He returned to Ashton Gate in December 1991.

ROB EDWARDS (midfield) - A Welsh youth and under-21 international, Rob was signed from Carlisle United for £135,000 in March 1991. He has proved his versatility since arriving at Ashton Gate, having also played in defence and at full-back.

LIAM ROBINSON (midfield) - Liam joined the Robins during the summer from Third Division Bury where he was a regular scorer. Originally with Nottingham Forest, Liam's league debut came when he joined Huddersfield. Prior to his move to Gigg Lane, he also had a short loan spell at Tranmere.

WAYNE ALLISON (forward) - Wayne joined City from Watford in 1990 in a deal which took City midfielder Mark Gavin for a spell at Vicarage Road. A powerful front-runner, he re-established himself in the City forward line last season, following the departure of Andy Cole to Newcastle United.

IAN BAIRD (forward) - Ian joined City from Hearts during the close season. He started his career with Southampton, but established himself on the south coast with Portsmouth. He has also enjoyed a spell with Leeds United.

Russell Osman was appointed initially on a 'caretaker' basis following the departure of Denis Smith in January 1993, but was confirmed as manager three months later.


Despite his managerial duties, Russell has continued to play in the Robins' side, and his leadership and experience helped stave off relegation last season.

A centre-half who began his career at Ipswich Town, he made 294 appearances for the club as well as winning 11 full England caps and seven at under-21 level.

He moved to Leicester City in 1985 for a £200,000 fee and three years later, joined Southampton for £325,000.

In October 1991 he joined City on loan and completed a £60,000 permanent move two months later. Last season, with Smith at the helm, Russell was assistant manager.



Andy keeps on working for a re-call



PLAYER INTERVIEW

As we looked forward to the start of the 1993-94 season, goalkeeper Andy Petterson was due to take his place in the first-team for the opening game of the season against Watford. However, a freak injury halted his progress and he now finds a battle on his hands to take the number one shirt.

After making 14 league appearances in the Hatters first-team last season, and enjoying a short Premier League spell on loan at Ipswich Town, Andy was confident of making a first-team spot his own this term. However, Petterson's misfortune occurred when he dropped a baby stair-gate of his foot during the summer. A broken toe was the result, but even then, Andy did not realise the injury would prove to be so costly.

"Although I was in pain and knew I could have broken the toe, there was no way I thought I would miss so much of the pre-season," said the former Australian Institute of Sport keeper. "I then lost out on a lot of training and friendly matches which, ultimately, cost me my place for the game against Watford."

Juergen Sommer took Andy's place in goal and despite an early scare, when he required stitches against Watford, he has played exceptionally and earned some rave reviews. Andy, admirably, recognises Sommer's performances and knows that he faces a tough test to regain his place.

"Juergen has performed well since he has

come into the team and I know that I must turn in some great performances in the reserves to get my place back. It is frustrating sitting on the bench, when obviously I would prefer to be out on the pitch, but I must now knuckle down and work my way back into contention.

"You never know what is around the corner in football, so there is always hope."

Petterson has managed just 15 minutes of action this season, when he came on for injured Juergen against the Hornets. As a named substitute he travels to all the Hatters' games at home and away, but all the time he is on the sidelines, he knows that time is running out to make a realistic claim for a place in Australia's national squad.

"The likes of Mark Bosnich and Jason Kearnton are gaining valuable experience all the time at Aston Villa and Everton while I am starting to fall behind. My hopes of playing for my country are slim at the moment, but I know my priority lies with Luton Town. I must concentrate on a first-team place here, then I can think about Australia again."

Ceri Hughes scored against City when the sides last met at Kenilworth Road. Philip Gray netted the other in a 2-0 FA Cup victory in January



Those bad Easter blues

BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH



Throughout the history of Luton Town, the Easter holiday period has been the graveyard of ambition, especially in the days when three games were played over a four-day period.

I suppose we can all point to individual nightmare games played over Easter in more recent times but for sheer disaster, season 1970/71 must take some beating, especially if you had to endure all three games!

On the Saturday before Easter, the Town had forced their way back into the promotion frame with 3-2 home win over Birmingham in front of a crowd of 25,172. The win had brought to an end a 14-game unbeaten run by the 'Blues' and put us up to fourth position in Division Two and only two points off second place.

On the face of it, the Good Friday trip to Bristol City was not seen as over-difficult with City struggling fourth from bottom and the two train loads of Luton supporters who alighted at 'Ashton Gate Halt' were feeling highly-confident despite the terrible weather.

The feeling of confidence was evident in the players as they took the game to Bristol from the start and it was no surprise when Viv Busby volleyed home a Malcolm MacDonald cross after 20 minutes. Perhaps as a foretast of things to come, City went close a couple of times with Galley almost levelling the score when he hit the post with Tony Read beaten.

Slightly against the run of play, the Town went further ahead just before half-time when a 20-yard shot from full back John Ryan was fumbled by Cashley in the Bristol goal, leaving MacDonald with a simple tap-in. As the whistle went for the break, we all genuinely thought that promotion to Division One was on the cards only three years after playing the likes of Bradford Park Avenue and Workington.

We were soon back in the real world as City, desperate for points themselves, scored an incredible three goals in six minutes mid-way through the second period with Chris Garland causing all the damage. Shell-shocked, the Luton players could not raise their game and it was a disconsolate bunch of Luton supporters that trudged back to the station in the pouring rain.

Twenty-four hours is a long time and with the sun shining the following day, optimism returned and off we went down to Millwall thinking that the

second-half at Ashton Gate was just one of those things. Unfortunately, the first-half display at The Den was even worse as the Lions tore into a depleted Town rearguard and went in at the interval three up. In the second-half, Millwall only managed one further goal but by then the damage had been done and promotion could be kissed goodbye for another season.

Just to complete the trilogy of misery, eventual champions Leicester City were the visitors to Kenilworth Road on Easter Monday and a crowd of 24,405 turned up to see John Sjoberg put through his own net in the second minute. From then on, however, Leicester dominated play and deserved their eventual 3-1 victory.

For some reason, never fully explained, we played our mid-week home fixtures at this time on a Thursday night and the game against Doncaster Rovers in early October was no exception. The now customary fleet of managers and scouts, who were looking at ace marksman John O'Rourke, joined the Kenilworth Road faithful to see their man score a hat-trick and miss several more chances.

On a wet night, Alick Jeffrey opened the scoring for Rovers only for O'Rourke to equalise straight after with a shot from 20 yards. Ray Whittaker put the Town in the lead from the restart.

Rovers levelled the score in the 26th minute but from then on it was all Luton, with the Doncaster

goal leading a charmed life as half-time approached, with shots from O'Rourke hitting the post and crossbar.

All came right in the second-half as O'Rourke scored twice early on and a last minute effort from Jeffrey only served to give the scoreline an unrealistic look, based on the balance of play.

Two days later, Barnsley were the visitors to Kenilworth Road and the exploits of O'Rourke, together with the entertainment offered by the Doncaster game, swelled the crowd by almost 1,000 to 5,948.

The crowd was not disappointed as Billy Stark, Tony Read, Whittaker and O'Rourke all flashed the ball past the bewildered Ironside in the Barnsley goal in the first half-hour. Unfortunately, after putting themselves in an apparently impregnable position, the players let Barnsley off the hook by fiddling in midfield with the result that by half-time two goals had been pulled back by Bettany and Ferguson.

Obviously manager George Martin had some strong words to say at half-time because the Town started the second period with more purpose and goalkeeper-turned-striker, Tony Read, scored a glorious fifth to allay the crowds fears of a Barnsley fight back.

But fight back they did with Kerr scoring a third 20 minutes from the end and Ferguson reducing the arrears still further in injury time.

The air was apparently blue in the changing room afterwards due to the lack of concentration at the back with the result that in the next three home games 13 goals were scored by the Town with only two conceded!



Japan's brave new football world



THE DAWNING OF A NEW ERA - THE J-LEAGUE

With the help of our own Gary Lineker, football in Japan is currently booming as the inaugural season of the J-League reaches its climax. Although Lineker is out of action through injury, the indications are that the country is on course to host the World Cup in 2002.

Japan might have seen a professional league in existence much sooner. In the 1968 Olympic Games, the country won the bronze medal in the football tournament. Unfortunately, the potential shown was shunned by the country's sports authorities, who had baseball firmly at the top of their agenda.

Not until 1980 did Japan regain a place of note on the world football map, when the Football Association of Japan (JFA) took the opportunity to host the Europe-South America Club Cup. Since that date, the Japanese have had the opportunity to witness the likes of Liverpool, AC Milan and Flamengo on home soil, and the appeal for a league of their own finally took off.

In 1986, the JFA undertook the first tentative steps towards applying to host the World Cup finals in 2002. The importance of that ongoing work has been enhanced by the successful launch of the J-League. The dream of a national club championship has turned into reality under the leadership of former national team centre-back, Saburo Kawabuchi.

The dawn of the J-League on May 15 this year was accompanied by criticism that, despite the great publicity value of signing foreigners like Lineker, Brazil's Zico and German Pierre Littbarski, the set-up was doomed to the fate of the North American Soccer League.

But unlike the NASL, the J-League restricts each of the ten clubs to a maximum of three foreign players only per match. An organised youth section has also been established this year, thus giving Japanese players the chance to develop and be starts in their own right.

The value of this policy has already been highlighted this season. With long-term injuries to Lineker and Zico, players such as Kitazawa of Yomiuri Verdy have gained 'hero-worship' status. The J-League has also

benefitted from the success of the Japanese national side, who won the 1992 Asian Cup and reached the final qualifying round in the Asia section of the 1994 World Cup.

No-one visiting the training complexes or stadia can fail to be impressed by the facilities or the youth-orientated marketing effort. A majority of the new stadia were constructed with initial capacities for 16,000

spectators. However, such was the success after the opening month that the sign "House Full" was a regular occurrence at most matches. The average attendance after the first phase of matches was 16,876 with a top gate of 62,000 in the National Stadium, Tokyo, for the opening match between Verdy Kawasaki and Yokohama Marinos.

The supporters who turned out to support a busy schedule which saw matches every Wednesday and every weekend were also entertained by an average 2.88 goals a game during that opening half of the season, a statistic which could lead the authorities to drop the ruling of 'correcting' every drawn match with a penalty shoot-out.

Kawabuchi estimates it will take five years before the J-League breaks even.

He talks of projected five-year total losses of \$200 million. But the social and recreational gain for Japan promises to be immeasurable.

As Zico, whose Kashima collected a \$450,000 prize for winning the first half of the championship, says: "This is the football of the 21st century." be on the bench again, but I'm hoping coach Bagnoli will try three strikers - Bergkamp, Sosa and me."

Torino lead the way after four Serie A matches, following their 1-0 victory at Udinese. Milan are place ominously in second after defeating Atalanta 2-0, while European Cup Winners' Cup holders Parma are third.






