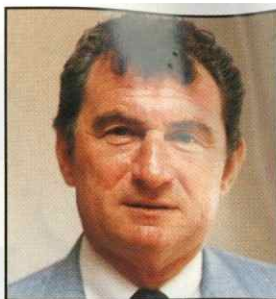

# It is a tough league, but we are not discouraged

ON THE BALL WITH DAVID PLEAT



**A** warm welcome to Notts County's directors, players and supporters. Our home hiccup against Bristol City was a real blow. I felt our application and drive to win was not good enough.

There are reasons why younger players find difficulty giving consistently good performances at this level. For sure, it is a tough league and any youngster that plays well constantly will be whisked away sharply to more prosperous pastures. However, that set back does not daunt our resolve or discourage us. Our application in four of the last five games: away at Middlesbrough, Birmingham and Derby cannot be faulted, nor the approach in the home performance against Barnsley. But, sadly, mistakes were made that cost us at Derby and stunned us against Bristol City. It is never easy and I am reluctant always to publicly criticise players - I believe the dressing room and my office are the right areas for that - Juergen's howler at Derby set them up and Marvin's mistakes gave goals against Bristol and Derby.

The Derby game makes quite clear that, in reasoned comparison, we are not £12 million adrift of them. However, as a club they clearly have the ambition to succeed. They have both quality players and realise they may be able to capitalise on success through the gates.

Speaking with Chris Waddle after the game, whom I admire immensely, it made me realise that although today is tough, tomorrow may get tougher. We have the ability to come through. It was only the physical strength of the home side that forced the points. We have as much natural ability as any side in the league. At present,

three points cover a blanket of ten clubs. We must chase the game more if we need to.

I was very pleased with the contribution of Paul Dickov from Arsenal against County. He has had a proper grounding and he understands the opportunity that he may gain with us to push his claims and help his development. John Hartson, who played alongside him, is learning too. Some of his work was excellent but he tired towards the end. He is still growing and needs to conserve his energy. Three games in seven days is a hard task

for him.

After the game he was called to the Welsh under-21 headquarters for the game against Cyprus. His progress pleases me. Kerry Dixon, who has now signed a contract for the remainder of this season, might have returned in a reserve fixture this week. We desperately need competition for places. The reserve side have started in storming fashion, scoring 25 goals in 8 outings but it only serves to illustrate the cleft stick situation we

are in. Players like Martin Williams and Scott Houghton have to show that they can transmit confidence from this level to consistency with the seniors.

The injury position is a little disappointing. Richard Harvey was due his operation last Monday, David Preece may be training within the month, Julian James' absence will be longer. Des Linton, in his first senior game this season, broke his nose last Saturday but I am hopeful he will be fit this afternoon. Paul Telfer had to withdraw from the Scotland under-21 party that left for Italy with a bruised back joint. Other visitors to Andy McDade's Treatment Room are Scott Oakes (dead leg) and the new 'assistant' Darren Salton, who keeps smiling and reminding us every day that despite our indifferent start to the season we are lucky to be playing and enjoying the game we love.

It is very easy to be destructive in our cur-

rent situation. I have often said I have only room in my book for optimists, those who come rain or shine, win or lose, who can justly call themselves supporters. We understand the frustrations and the elations. The 'could haves' the 'should haves' and the 'may haves', who say they are not coming any more, are perfectly entitled to their stand and to stay away. But I hope they don't use the label 'supporter' on their letter heads. Somehow it doesn't quite ring true.

Enjoy the game.



# Hartson sets himself a greater target

PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH JOHN HARTSON



It was inevitable John would make it into the Hatters first-team at some stage this season, following his prolific scoring rate in the youth team and reserves, but following the departures of forwards Phil Gray and Ian Benjamin, his arrival came quicker than expected. John made his full league debut in the home game against Nottingham Forest, and although the opposition contained the likes of England captain Stuart Pearce, he was not overawed.

"There were big names on the Forest team-sheet when I looked before the game, but it did not affect me," he said. "Once I got on the pitch, I didn't have time to worry about the opposition because I had to concentrate so hard on what I was doing. My mind was on so many different jobs."

Although the Hatters lost, controversially, John made an impressive entrance to league football. He scored one goal and had a goal disallowed. The Town faithful had found themselves a new hero.

"I couldn't have wished for a better start, although I felt really disappointed that I had that goal disallowed," he continued. "I have found that the quality of defender is no stronger than I experienced at reserve level, although I suppose they are a bit quicker. I have been pleased with my start, it has given me the confidence to make a claim for a regular place in the side for the rest of the season."

John's fine start saw him score again during our 5-0 victory over Barnsley earlier in the month. Inevitably, the crowd will look towards John for his fair share of goals, but he is not feeling the pressure at the moment.

"I don't think the crowd will get on my back when things are not going so good, because they know that I am only 18. I have a lot to learn, but I am enjoying every minute of it."

"Some strikers have favourite partners, but it doesn't bother me who I play alongside. Kerry has been great in helping me, but I have also enjoyed playing alongside Martin Williams, and Paul Dickov has now arrived at the club. The game against Barnsley proved that it doesn't matter if

you are young and inexperienced, you can still show the opposing pros that you are capable of doing a good job. Martin, Scott Oakes and myself proved that point."

John states that his best game came in the Anglo Italian match at Watford, a game which saw him create as many opportunities for others as for himself. He knows, now that the Hatters have signed Dickov on loan, that the goals must continue if he is to keep his place in the side. If he can achieve that aim, he has his sights set on an international cap.

"It has always been my dream to play for Wales so, hopefully, I am now on the road to achieving that goal. I did play for the under-18's twice at Ninian Park, and the atmosphere was amazing. I can't begin to imagine what it must feel like to play in front of a packed crowd at the Cardiff Arms Park. I've been there for a rugby game, and the atmosphere was electric."

John has been recognised by national coach Terry Yorath, who included him in the squad for the under-21 game against Cyprus this week. That was the first step up the ladder, but he believes he can follow the likes of Ceri Hughes and former Hatter, Mark Pembroke, into the full squad.

"I am only 18, so I have a lot of time ahead of me to make it into the full side," he said realistically. "But I must do the business for Luton first, because there are many other Welsh players who are in the same position as me."

When John has spare time on his hands, which he admits is not very often, he likes to return home to Wales to see his family and friends. You would expect John's name to be quite well known in his hometown of Swansea, but he will tell you otherwise.

"Where I live, football is not the main sport, so there is not that much interest in me," he admits. "When I visit my family and friends, there is so much catching up to do, that football hardly ever enters the conversation anyway. My friends ask me how I am doing, I tell them 'fine' and that is it. I'm sure if I made it to the full national side, the topic of football would come up more!"

# Lennie makes a harsh judgement

NEWS ON ONE

**W**ith the season no more than 11 games old, Middlesbrough manager Lennie Lawrence has, rather harshly, concluded that the First Division is not a patch on the Premier League, writes Leonard Spall.

Middlesbrough went down 2-0 at Watford and in doing so missed the chance to leapfrog into second spot. Not surprisingly, he did not exclude his players when he said: "Apart from Crystal Palace, there is not a side in the First Division who could make a dent in the Premiership."

His condemnation must seem harsh for high-riding Leicester City and Charlton. Tranmere would also no doubt take exception to Lawrence's assessment, particularly after John King had been awarded Manager of the Month and his side had climbed to the top of the league.

Charlton, who enjoyed a precarious spell in the top-flight under Lawrence, rose to third place and also managed to put a 58-year hoodoo to rest by beating Barnsley, at Oakwell, 1-0. Joint-manager Alan Curbishley was not disputing the claim made by his predecessor. In pinpointing Charlton's financial restraints he highlighted the major hurdles which smaller clubs so often fall at. "The problem is the depth in our squad," he said, "With injuries to our key players we could start to struggle. We have no spare money and everyone at the club knows how important it is to get new players. It is a difficult situation."

At least Charlton have ambition. Stoke's First Division arrival appears to have made the club a shop-window for those with money to spend. The League's leading scorer Mark Stein readily admits his desire for bigger and better things, and manager Lou Macari has been targeted as a potential successor to Liam Brady at Celtic. Stoke have hardly set the First Division alight since last term's play-off success and will need to

improve on their televised 1-0 defeat at Oxford if they are to progress toward the higher-realms of Division One.

Promotion is becoming a far off dream for poor old Pompey. The south coast side have never really clicked this term and their problems seem to stem from away form which is verging on Leeds United 1992-93 proportions. Jim Smith's side have yet to win away from Fratton Park this season and Paul Walsh is a little bit worried. "We are trying not to get a complex about it," he said. "But we have been so close so many times this season."

Pompey threw away a 2-1 lead at Peterborough to come home with only a point, and Walsh's concern was echoed in the frustration of his manager. "Our run without an away win is amazing," said Smith. "In two-thirds of the games we have done enough to take away a win but have come home with a draw, and the longer it goes on the harder it gets."

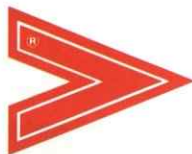

# Fans' Forum



## GROUND REGULATIONS

1. The club management reserve the right of admission to the ground.
  2. All matches will be played in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Football Association and The Football League and the Laws of the Game.
  3. Play cannot be guaranteed to take place on any particular day or at any particular time and the club management reserve the right to change it's advertised fixtures without notice and liability.
  4. No refund of any cash admission charge paid at the turnstile will be made.
  5. At the club management's discretion, refunds may be made in respect of tickets sold and paid for in advance of a match, where such match is postponed. This is subject to a time limitation the details of which can be obtained from the club Ticket Office.
  6. The club management reserves the right to refuse admission to, or eject from, the ground, any person who refuses to be searched by any servant or agent of the Club or any Police Officer.
  7. Fireworks, smoke canisters, knives, bottles, glasses, cans, flags, banners, poles, and other similar articles or containers, which might be used as a weapon, are not permitted within the ground.
  8. The throwing of any object within the ground is strictly forbidden.
  9. The use of foul and abusive language, obscene chanting or racial abuse towards any person is strictly forbidden.
  10. Unauthorised persons are strictly forbidden from entering upon the field of play or the surrounding track, unless advised to do so in an emergency.
  11. The moving from one enclosed pen or area of the ground to another without the permission of a steward, Police Officer or other authorised agent of the club is strictly forbidden.
  12. The obstruction of gangways, access ways, exits and entrances, stairways and like places and the standing in seated areas whilst play is in progress is strictly forbidden. Any person who persistently contravenes this regulation will be ejected from the ground.
  13. The climbing of floodlight pylons, stands or any other structure within the ground is strictly forbidden.
  14. Unnecessary noise such as that from the use of radio sets and behaviour likely to cause confusion or annoyance to any person is not permitted in any part of the ground.
  15. The consumption of intoxicating liquors is permitted only in places authorised in accordance with The Sporting Events (Control of Alcohol, etc.) Act, 1985.
  16. Any person attempting to gain admission to, or being found within, a section of the ground designated for "Members Only" without the appropriate authorisation, may be ejected from the ground.
  17. With the exception of persons authorised by the club management and Press representatives holding official passes, the taking of photographs or cine photography inside the ground is prohibited.
- In addition, no recording for radio, television or for private purposes, whether for transmission or otherwise, is permitted save with a special authorisation in writing by the club management.
18. Only persons specifically authorised in writing to the club management are permitted to distribute either without charge or offer for sale within the ground any newspaper periodicals or any other articles.
  19. Any person found damaging or defacing the property of the club will be prosecuted.
  20. Persons failing to comply with instructions from a steward, Police Officer or other authorised agent of the club will be ejected from the ground.
  21. The club management reserves the right for it's servants, agents and Police to remove from this ground, any person who does not comply with these Ground Regulations, the Rules and Regulations of the Football Association and The Football League or whose presence within the ground is, or could reasonably be construed as, constituting a source of danger, nuisance or annoyance to any other person.

# Spotlight on today's visitors



**NOTTS COUNTY F.C. 1993-94**

■ Notts County visit Kenilworth Road this afternoon, looking to build on an indifferent start to the season which, at the time of writing, has yielded three wins and four defeats from eight league matches. Mick Walker's side will be hoping for an improvement in form following last season's precarious display. The Magpies flirted with the relegation places for much of the season and, like the Hatters, faced a 'final day showdown' and the prospect of a place in Division Two. A 3-1 victory against Sunderland, however, eased their worries and they ended the season on 52 points, one clear of the Town and three clear of relegation.

■ The last time County visited Kenilworth Road, Neil Warnock had been replaced as manager by Mr Walker only 24 hours earlier. The game ended in a goalless draw, but it opened a new chapter in the club's recent turbulent history. In the last ten years, the club has featured in the old Division One, Two and Three, with the latest spell in the top-flight lasting only one season. Mr Walker is also the eighth manager the club has had in 11 years.

■ A major reason for County's inconsistent start to the season has been a weakened defence. First-team regulars Dean Yates, Charlie Palmer and Phil Turner have all suffered this season through injury. Yates - once a target for Premier League Liverpool - has now been out of action for almost two years with a serious knee problem. Such defensive frailties were exposed recently with a 7-1 (11-2) defeat by Newcastle United in the Coca Cola Cup. "That defeat a very low point for this club" said assistant boss Russell Slade last week. "We must pick ourselves up though and concentrate on our league form. After all, the league has to be our main concern."

■ Notts County F.C. is the oldest club in the Football League. The meeting which put the club on a firm footing was held at the George IV Hotel in December 1864. The club made its debut appearance in the Football league in 1888 as a founder member and has since won the Division Two championship in 1897, 1914 and 1923; the Fourth Division title in 1917; the Division Three crown in 1990 and the Division Three (S) championship in 1932 and 1950.

## VISITORS ON PARADE

**STEVE CHERRY** (goalkeeper) - Nottingham-born Steve started his career with Derby County in 1980 and spent six seasons at the Baseball Ground. He spent three years at Walsall and Plymouth before returning to the Midlands with County for £70,000. Steve has the distinction of having won the 'Player of the Year' title at all of his four clubs.

**MICHAEL JOHNSON** (defender) - A product of County's youth set-up, Michael made his debut in 1991 and made the left-back position his own last term. A player who can operate anywhere along the back line, he was voted 'Reserve Player of the Year' before stepping up to the first team.

**CHRIS SHORT** (defender) - Chris joined County from Scarborough for £100,000 in 1990 and has made great strides since. He had a trial period with Manchester United in his Scarborough days and seemed bound for Old Trafford until former County boss Neil Warnock nipped in to secure his signature.

**ROBBIE TURNER** (defender) - A much-travelled player, Robbie started his career at Huddersfield and has since played for eight clubs including County. He moved to Nottingham from Plymouth for £90,000 in December 1992 and initially started out with the club in an attacking role.

**RICHARD WALKER** (defender) - Injuries have severely hampered the progress of Richard, a former Meadow Lane apprentice, but when he finally got a first-team chance, he took it with remarkable fashion. He scored two goals on his league debut against West Ham in March 1993.

**MARK DRAPER** (midfielder) - England under-21 international, Mark emerged from County's Y.T.S. scheme, making his debut as a 17-year-old in 1988. A skilful player with a big match temperament, he has since made over 190 appearances for the Magpies. Last season's top-scorer with 12 goals.

**MEINDERT DIJKSTRA** (midfielder) - Meindert moved to Meadow Lane in July 1991 from Dutch

club Willem II for £155,000. He spent 13 seasons with NAC Breda before joining Willem and can operate equally as well in defence.

**PAUL DEVLIN** (midfielder) - Paul joined County from non-league Stafford Rangers in February 1992, having previously spent a trial period at both Liverpool and Leeds United. He has scored three goals in 31 appearances.

**STEVE SLAWSON** (midfielder) - A product of the Magpies' youth side which won a league and cup double in 1991, Steve found first-team opportunities hard to come by last season and spent a successful loan spell at Burnley. He scored three senior goals last term.

**KEVIN WILSON** (forward) - Kevin was signed towards the end of the 1991-92 season from Chelsea for £225,000 and scored on his debut against Crystal Palace. The experienced Northern Ireland international is no stranger to the East Midlands, having began his career as a free-scoring striker with Derby County.

**GARY MCSWEGAN** (forward) - Gary joined County from Glasgow Rangers for £400,000 during the summer after finding first-team opportunities limited. He scored the goal which clinched the Scottish Premier Division title last season and also scored against Marseille in the Champions' League.

**GARY LUND** (forward) - Former England under-21 international, Gary started his career at Grimsby Town before joining Lincoln City in 1987. He joined County for £40,000 later that year, scoring 21 times in his first season. Gary had a loan spell at Hull City last season before regaining a place in the first team as the season came to a close.

**ANDY LEGG** (forward) - Former Swansea City forward, Andy turned down the chance to join Portsmouth and West Bromwich Albion in August to move to Meadow Lane. He was Swansea's leading scorer last season as they marched to the Second Division play-offs.

## MEET THE BOSS



**M**ick Walker took on the challenge of league management for the first time last season when he succeeded Neil Warnock in January. The 52-year-old former schoolmaster had been on the County payroll since 1980, when Jimmy Sirrell took him to Meadow Lane as youth development officer.

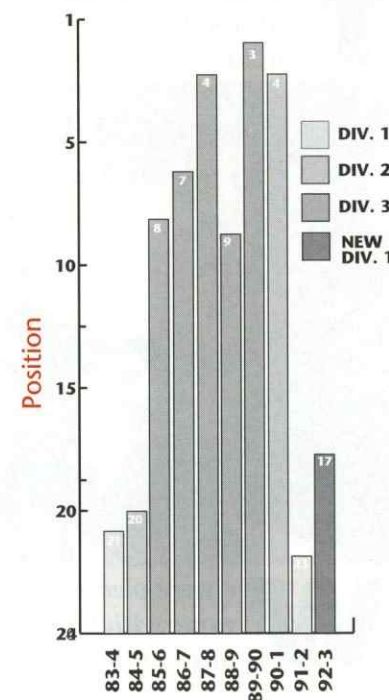
He made such a good impression in his first four matches in charge last season, that chairman Derek Pavis announced that he would stay in charge for the remainder of the season.

When County hauled their way clear of relegation, Walker's reward was a three-year contract.

Derbyshire-born, Walker started his career with Nottingham Forest, but never really developed as a player, although did feature on the non-league circuit, most notably with Loughborough Colleges.

He did taste immediate success, however, as a manager Ilkeston Town, Boston United and as national coach in Singapore.

# Ceri has one eye on the USA



## PLAYER INTERVIEW

**A**fter an injury-plagued 18 months, Ceri Hughes has re-established himself this season in the Hatters line-up and is looking forward to his most consistent season to date, writes Capital Gold reporter Simon Michaelson.

Ceri's return to form and fitness was highlighted in the recent 5-0 drubbing of Barnsley. The performance earned him a place in the imaginary '90 Minutes' First Division team of the week. He set up three goals that day and showed the form which has earned him Wales international honours.

Ceri's memories of playing football go back to the age of seven. He was spotted playing Sunday League football in south Wales and joined Luton as an apprentice in 1987. He made his debut three years later, at the age of 19, away at Villa Park against Aston Villa. "I was quite shocked to get the chance," he recalled. "We had a few injuries at the time and fielded a team with an average age of 21 or 22. I had to mark David Platt! We lost 2-0, Platt scored and so did Tony Daley."

That was Ceri's only appearance that season, but the following season (1990-91), he had an extended run in the first-team until he picked up a knee ligament injury on Boxing Day. The injury, which kept him out until the following autumn, gave fellow Welshman Mark Pembroke the chance to establish himself in the first-team.

Ceri and Mark were the best of friends while at Luton together and after last week's match at the Baseball Ground, Mark told me: "Ceri and I were at Luton since we left school and we shared the same digs. I enjoyed my time with Luton and have some good memories of the club. We had a good team spirit and it helped having other people from my area, like Ceri and Jason Rees around."

Ceri and Mark were in opposition last Saturday and, although they are best

friends off the pitch, it was a different story once the referee had blown his whistle. "You have a tussle with anybody because you want to get the better of them - he wanted to get the better of me today which made for a good battle. Ceri played in the middle, and he put in a good cross to set-up Luton's goal," said Mark.

Ceri's assists have helped the Hatters' creativity in the midfield and he has taken the reins in the absence of David Preece. With the 1994 World Cup finals approaching, Ceri has an ambition to represent his country again.

"If we qualify, I would dearly love to be a squad member," he continued. "That has to be my ambition this season, but it will only happen if I can keep my form going with Luton."

"I have made only one appearance for Wales, against Holland, and I played alongside the likes of Saunders, Speed and Southall in a 4-0 away defeat. The occasion was overpowering and the supporters were crazy."

Still only 22, Ceri realises that he has plenty more to learn in the game. He cites people like Jim Ryan, Ron Howard, John Moore, David Pleat and Wayne Turner as influences on his career and he is ready to receive advice from the older heads in the Luton side, like skipper Trevor Peake.

"Trevor is ancient in the game!" he laughed. "He's played in cup finals and everything. You have to listen to the older players on and off the field and try to do what they do. After the game they can help you by pointing out mistakes."

"It is good to have players like Trevor around."





# Days of sun and goals



BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH

**W**hen the Town re-entered Division One, in 1982, we were all fired up. We had walked away with the Second Division championship, were playing attacking, attractive football and had enticed one of the brightest young talents in the country, Paul Walsh, to Kenilworth Road.

After 20 minutes of our opening game against Tottenham at White Hart Lane, however, you would not have given tuppence for our chances of surviving. Overrun, 2-0 down and jeered by a sun-soaked crowd of 39,180, things looked a touch uncomfortable and memories of our last, disappointing campaign in the top-flight came flooding back.

After this baptism of fire, the Town, bullied by the excellent Brian Horton, came out of their shell and pulled a goal back before half-time and then equalised on the hour. A few more scares at either end followed, but both defences held firm. A draw was the eventual result.

The first home game quickly followed and, fired by the opening day result, we thought West Ham would not be difficult opposition. But the final result of 2-0 to the Hammers brought us back to earth. In truth, the Town had plenty of the play, but were punished by slack defending and lethal finishing on a night when nothing seemed to go right.

In those days, we worried if we went two games without a win and a slightly nervous crowd of only 9,071 turned up at Kenilworth Road the following Saturday to see if the Town could overcome Notts County, who had drawn their opening two games.

County, managed by the wily Jimmy Sirrell, were a side that had played together for a while and had caused a few upsets in their

first season back in Division One the previous year. They also possessed the fastest player around at the time, in winger John Chiedoie, although he often hit the by-line on his own with no other player in sight!

Paul Walsh missed an early chance for the Town but made up for it in the 16th minute by heading home a tantalising cross from Ricky Hill. Stung by this, County surged forward and equalised when Brian Kilcline headed a corner through a static Luton defence.

On the half hour, Chiedoie scampered through a stretched back four to put the visitors ahead and, soon after, Luton defender Richard Money had to go off with a broken nose. Before substitute Mike Small could come on, however, Ricky Hill had equalised,

latching on to a loose ball from a corner.

The second-half began with more cavalier attacking (and cavalier defending) and David Moss put the Town ahead from a well rehearsed free-kick routine before Walsh took over the game.

Collecting a ball from Kirk Stephens, he set off on a run for goal. He was fouled twice by Pedro Richards, but was allowed to play on before waltzing round Kilcline and Raddy Avramovic, the County keeper, to score a goal of quality.

Not content with that strike, he followed up with his hat-trick goal two minutes later, getting on to the end of a Moss cross.

County were not finished though and they scored a third through Mark Goodwin and then battered the Luton defence for the last quarter.

The game could have finished 10-10. The supporters were happy. The television people were ecstatic, but County manager Sirrell was spitting blood, looking on a 5-3 defeat as just as bad as a 3-0 failure.

# An invasion from abroad

A GOALKEEPING PHENOMENON BY TIM COLLINGS

So where are they now? Those British goalkeepers we celebrated in our youth? Gordon Banks, Pat Jennings, Ron Springett, Ron Baynham., Peter Shilton, Ray Clemence, and the rest. You know who I mean. We all have our favourites. Even Bob Wilson, the Arsenal and BBC man who turned out for Scotland, now a respected commentator and coach.

Today, our leagues are packed with imported custodians (we are in a unique position here, ourselves, with a genial New Yorker and a West Australian fighting for the number one jersey). In the top division, the Premiership, the list of funny names from all over Europe is a long one. And most of them are goalkeepers too.

Step forward Eric Thorstvedt, Peter Schmeichel, Jan Stejskal, Ludo Miklosko, Dmitri Kharin, Craig Forrest, Hans Segers, Mark Bosnich and Pavel Srnicek. And there are others. No longer does Britain, or more specifically England, have a monopoly on the production of international-class goalkeepers.

Thanks to Bryon Butler, who contributed an interesting feature to The Daily Telegraph, I am able to offer the following startling statistics: 20 years ago, in the English First Division, there were 14 English, five Scottish and three Irish goalkeepers.

Ten years ago, there remained 19 British goalkeepers, but three from "overseas" had arrived - Bruce Grobbelaar, of Zimbabwe, at Liverpool; Hans van Breukelen, of The Netherlands, at Nottingham Forest; and Raddy Avramovic, of Yugoslavia, at Coventry.

The invasion has continued ever since and without the emergence of a new Banks or Shilton to even hint at halting the tide. And it is a difficult phenomenon to explain.

Wilson has suggested it is a change which has been caused by two reasons: the introduction of modern laminated footballs, which are lighter and dip and swerve; and the unscrupulous tactics of the modern game which encourage blocking, crowding, pushing and physical obstruction of goalkeepers.

Where the ball is concerned, Wilson has a noted

supporter in his views in the Coventry City manager Bobby Gould. He has blamed the modern football on several occasions for fixtures which have produced a poor game with little entertainment value. He could be right. The modern ball is best played on a modern pitch ie one that is perfect condition, flat, dry and green.

What about our own goalkeepers down the years? At one stage in the mid-1950's, Luton Town could boast two England goalkeepers in Ron Baynham (three caps in 1956 versus Northern Ireland, Denmark and Spain) and Bernard Streten (one cap in 1950 v Northern Ireland).

Since then, we have enjoyed the services of an interesting series of men including Jim Standen (who played for West Ham in the 1964 cup final and also county cricket for Worcestershire), Colin Tinsley, Tony Read, Sandy Davie, Alan Starling, Keith Barber, Graham Horn, Milija Aleksic (from Stafford), Jake Findlay, Alan Judge, Les Sealey, Andy Dibble and Alec Chamberlain.

Of that group, Tony Read deserves an extra-special mention today. This is because 28 years ago next month (on November 20, 1965), he hit a hat-trick against this afternoon's visitors in a memorable 5-1 win for the Town in a

Fourth Division fixture here at Kenilworth Road.

Partnering John O'Rourke in attack and wearing the number eight jersey, Read helped the Town establish themselves as one of the hottest home teams in the country at the time. And, for the record, the squad that season included John Moore (43 appearances), a teenage Bruce Rioch (who was here only weeks ago as manager of Bolton Wanderers), a certain Barry Fry and an injury-hit David Pleat.

Those were the days of a wet leather and deep mud, of course, when Tinsley, in goal, would pull his cap down hard and bear the elements. Matt Woods played number five, Graham French number seven and little, scuttling Ray Whittaker number 11. Yes, they must be right. The past is another country.

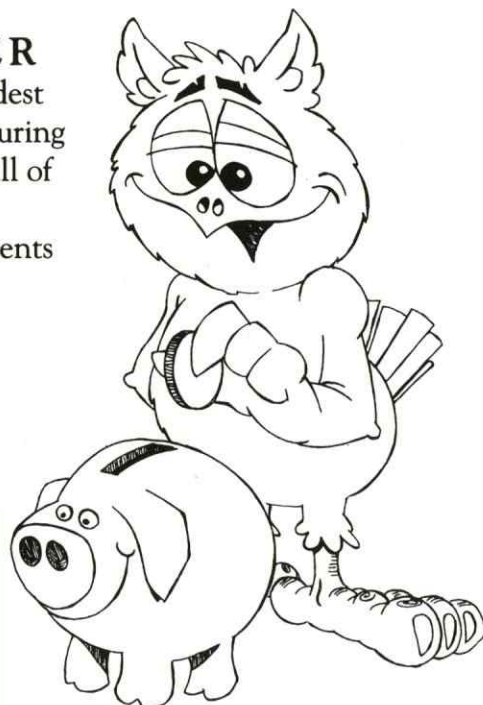
