A message from David Kohler

LUTON TOWN F.C.



I write this piece, with deadlines pressing, having agreed in principle to sell my controlling interest in our club, Luton Town FC, to Messrs Mitchell and Ellingham. That, on the face of it, is the position. However, pen has not been put to paper yet and, as the old saying goes, "nowt's done until it is signed."

In the unlikely event, however, that our club is not welcoming new owners this afternoon, I shall still be here. It has been a strange scenario and it seems an odd one to me as I write these notes. It feels a little like trying to write an obituary before death has been recorded.

My three and a half years at Luton Town have certainly not been dull. I am sure when the issues are discussed, in the pubs and clubs after today's game, there will be plenty of opinions. Like the game itself, everyone will have a different view. That is human nature, particularly where football is concerned.

There have been many downs and a few ups in the last few years and, although Luton Town may not be in the Premiership, I believe the neutrals will understand and see that the club is in a far better position now than it has been for a long time.

Over the past three and a half years, the business has undergone a metamorphosis to enable it to compete and survive in the very tough world of football.

So far, so good for Juergen

PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH JUERGEN SOMMER



Juergen Sommer has firmly established himself as the Town's number one goalkeeper this season. He is coming to terms with the English game after an extended run in the side and he assesses his own form so far.

Juergen's form of recent weeks has elevated him into contention for a World Cup place with the United States next year. His safe handling and growing confidence have been reflected in the Town's improving results. As we approach the busy Christmas period, it is definitely a case of so far, so good for the 24-year-old.

"I am very happy that David Pleat had enough confidence to stick with me at the beginning of the season, so let's hope I can continue to play well and re-pay that confidence he showed," said Juergen. "Everyone here knows that I want to play for the USA next summer, but I know that I must keep a level of consistency throughout the season to have a chance."

Consistency was a problem for the New Yorker at the start of the season, but as time has gone on, he has grown in confidence. He tries to use his size as an advantage, but he knows that even at 6' 5", he has a battle on his hands.

"I try to use my size to my advantage in the air, particularly in a crowded penalty box at corners," he continued. "The coaching staff here have been very good and have tried to help me manipulate this side of my game more than I have done in the past, but I must admit, I find the Football League very physical."



"Players come flying in with tackles, even the smaller guys. If you don't have the heart to go in there with them, you could find yourself hurt. I think that is why a lot of Americans enjoy the British game. They love the bravery, the physical aspect and the end-to-end football."

Brought up playing university football in the States, Juergen was used to a slower pace of football. He has now also got to grips with the speed of our game, which has been a major factor in his development this season.

"I was used to a slower, flowing game in the States so it has taken a while to get used to the frantic pace over here. The games in our league are end-to-end stuff and you have to concentrate all the time. I must admit, I found the speed of the game difficult at first, but it is all part of the learning process."

So how does Juergen rate his overall performance so far?

"For the most part, I have been pleased with the way I have performed," he stated. "But I know there is always room for improvement. I have set myself very high standards in training and matches and every goal that goes in reflects my own personal performance."



Last Saturday's postponement gave us a chance to re-charge our batteries in preparation for another difficult encounter with high-flying Stoke City this afternoon.

I can understand the fans' frustration when matches have to be postponed. You wait all week and look forward to an afternoon's football. It is exactly the same for the players. We were charged up for the game against Wolves, a game which we knew would be very difficult, so to learn that it was off was a big blow.

An area of the pitch near to the Main Stand at Kenilworth Road never manages to get much sun so, in very cold weather, it remains frozen. To play on a

pitch which is partly frozen and partly thawed is particularly hazardous because players have to keep adapting to the conditions and do not know which studs to wear. One slip could cause serious injury, it could also result in an error which might in turn cost the side three points.

A free Saturday did, however, give us a chance to take things easy and re-charge after a busy opening four months to the season. We started training on Monday very refreshed and began our preparation for this afternoon's game.

Stoke are similar to Wolves in that they will be aiming for a play-off place come the end of the season, attract big crowds, and have money to spend on players. They seem to be full of confidence after the arrival of Joe Jordan, so we will anticipate another tough game. With Mark Stein gone, Martin Curruthers and Dave Regis will be keen to impress in the Potters' attack so I am sure our defence will have to be at its sharpest.

Talking of defence, I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Mitchell Thomas back to the club. He slotted in very well against Southend United in Marvin's absence. With John Dreyer now suspended for three games and Julian James still injured, he will provide some much-needed experience to the back four.

NEWS ON ONE

England may not have qualified for the World Cup finals and as the F.A. face transition, two foreign imports, namely Millwall's Australian forward Dave Mitchell and Watford's Canadian trialist Mark Watson, show the way in the First Division, writes Leonard Spall.

Mitchell scored his, and the Lion's first, in their 3-1 victory over high-flying Tranmere at the New Den. Millwall threatened to run riot against their second-placed opponents and the Aussie's performance in front of goal was an added bonus for the south Londoners.

Last season Mitchell was plying his trade at the County Ground for Glenn Hoddle's Swindon, his contract ran out and he winged his way to Turkish club Izmir for £200,000. But far from feeling Turkish delight, Mitchell returned to England less than three months after he left -- for half the fee!

months after he left -- for half the fee!

A bargain for Millwall and a holiday for Mitchell, but things have not been all plain sailing. Mitchell has only played four games for the Lions this season and has developed an aversion to foreign travel, refusing to go Down Under for his country's recent World Cup qualifier against Argentina. Mysteriously, he prefers New Cross - perhaps it is that cockney charm! "That is by far the best we have played this season," said Millwall boss Mick McCarthy after Saturday's game. "We should have scored five or six goals."

Watford's Mark Watson prefers the climes of the London periphery. After a good performance in Watford's 1-1 draw with Bristol City, the 23-year-old admitted. "I hope the manager was pleased. I want to sign for an English club as soon as possible." In fact, Watson is so keen to sign for the Hornets he even indulged in some name dropping. "I have played against Marco Van Basten and I think that experience will help me," he said.

Stayng in the capital is Charlton's new signing Mark Robson. Robson made his debut for the Addicks as a substitute in their 1-0 away win at Peterborough, A result which left the club four points clear at the top. The wiry winger though had to face nothing of the long-haul travels contemplated by Mitchell and Watson, dealing instead with the Blackwall Tunnel!

"Being told that West Ham did not want me was a disappointment," said Robson after his arrival at The Valley. "However, I am now looking forward to playing regularly and hopefully helping Charlton to get promotion. I was in a similar position with West Ham last year and I think Charlton can do the same as them this season."

Crystal Palace manager Alan Smith is also hoping

to emulate the Hammers in gaining promotion, and he thinks he knows how. "I have got it clear in my own mind exactly what we should do," insisted Smith

"If the players do what I say and stick to the things I have told them, they will win - it is as simple as that. But if players suddenly become free spirits and do exactly what they want to do, we will be in trouble again."

Smith's somewhat dictatorial style looks like it might pay off. Palace put another nail in the Barnsley coffin as the Eagles soared to a 3-1 win at Oakwell. Chris Armstrong scored the fastest goal in the league this season after just 10 seconds and the south Londoners cruised to victory. Barnsley manager Viv Anderson, on the other hand, contemplated another defeat, but refuses to press the panic button.

"It would be easier to tell my players to hump the ball 60 yards to try and score goals," he said. "But I want us to play the right way. We must be patient."

One boss running out of patience is Middlesbrough's Lennie Lawrence. He has seen his side fall away dramatically after heading the division in its early weeks. "The reason why we are not in the Premiership is because we conceded 75 goals last season and things have not changed this season. I would not mind if we succumbed to a few bits of quality but when we give games away it kills me. It makes me speechless. It makes me sick."





Spotlight on today's visitors



STOKE CITY F.C. 1993-94

■ Stoke City bring a side to Kenilworth Road this afternoon with renewed impetus, after the appointment of Joe Jordan as manager earlier in the month. Jordan, who had resigned from his post as assistant manager at Celtic, came south to take over from his old pal Lou Macari who, incidentally, had taken the manager's seat at Celtic Park.


■ Macari has built solid foundations for Jordan, after leading the side to the Division Two title last season. A major bonus for Macari in his successful spell at the Victoria Ground was the free-scoring form of Mark Stein. The former Hatter netted with impressive consistency during the championship winning season, and continued in the same vein this term. A £1.5 million offer from Chelsea was too hard to resist for the Stoke board, and he moved to Stamford Bridge last month.

■ A new era has therefore dawned at the Victoria Ground. With two of their favourite sons now gone, the fans are hoping Jordan can build on that base laid by Macari. The

early signs are good: Jordan got off to the best possible start with a 1-0 victory against Leicester City a fortnight ago, a result which lifted the Potters into sixth place in the league table.

■ "We deserved the victory," said Jordan after the match. "I couldn't have asked more from the players. Leicester are a good team, but we more than matched them. I just hope that we can show the same commitment week-in, week-out. That would make my job much easier."

■ The date of formation of Stoke City has long been in doubt. The year 1863 was claimed, but more recent research by Wade Martin has uncovered nothing earlier than 1868 when a couple of Old Carthusians, who were apprentices at the local works of the old North Staffordshire Railway Company, formed Stoke Ramblers. Major honours in the club's history include the Division Two championship in 1933, 1963 and 1993, the Third Division (north) crown in 1927 and League Cup honours in 1972.

VISITORS ON PARADE

MARK PRUDHOE (goalkeeper) - A north-easterner who started his career with Sunderland, Mark also played for Birmingham and Walsall, before moving back to home territory with Darlington in 1989. Last season he was voted top Division Three goalkeeper in the PFA awards and joined Stoke for £120,000 in the summer.

IAN CRANSON (defender) - An England under-21 international in his early days at the top level with Ipswich Town, Ian moved to Sheffield Wednesday for £450,000 in 1988. He was dogged by injuries at Hillsborough and made a £480,000 switch to the Potters in 1989, which made him Stoke's record signing.

LEE SANDFORD (defender) - Former England Youth International, Lee broke into Portsmouth's senior team during their one-year First Division comeback in 1987/88. Manager Alan Ball later moved to Stoke and Sandford joined him at the Victoria Ground after a £140,000 transfer in December 1989.

JOHN BUTLER (defender) - John started his career with Wigan Athletic in 1982 and made over 300 appearances for the club before joining Stoke for £100,000 five years later. He has since gone on to establish himself at the Victoria ground and has made over 200 times for the club.

VINCE OVERTON (defender) - An experienced former Burnley defender, Vince became a popular figure in the Midlands after a free transfer to Birmingham City in 1986. He made two Wembley appearances in succession, starring in the Leyland Daf final for the Blues in 1991 and in the 1992 Autoglass Trophy final following his £55,000 move to Stoke.

TOM COWAN (defender) - A loan signing from Sheffield United, Tom has been at the Victoria Ground for six weeks. He started his career with Clyde before joining Glasgow Rangers but was never able to break into the first-team at Ibrox. He joined United for £350,000 in 1991.

STEVE FOLEY (midfield) - Steve spent four seasons as a professional with Liverpool, but found a first-team place after a move to Grimsby in 1984. He spent one season at Blundell Park and two at Sheffield United before a £40,000 transfer to Swindon brought a Wembley appearance in the

Division Two play-off final. He joined Stoke for £50,000 in January 1992.

TODDY ORLYGSSON (midfield) - Danish by birth but a regular international player for Iceland, Toddy was training to be a lawyer before Nottingham Forest signed him from K A Akureyri in December 1989. He made 37 league appearances with Forest before being released at the end of last season. He joined Stoke during the summer.

NIGEL GLEGHORN (midfield) - Another member of Macari's Leyland-DAF Cup-winning squad at Birmingham, the left-sided midfielder was signed from the Blues for £100,000 in October last year. A former non-League player in the Sunderland area, he broke into the top rank with spells at Ipswich and Manchester City before Birmingham signed him for £175,000 in 1989.


DAVE REGIS (forward) - A Barnet player in the London club's non-League days, Dave made a memorable start to his full-time career, scoring at Wembley for Notts County when the Magpies won the Division Two play-off final in 1991. He played a handful of First Division games at Meadow Lane before joining Plymouth for £200,000. Last season he had a loan spell at Bournemouth and then joined Stoke for £100,000 in October.

MICKY GYNN (midfield) - Micky started his career at Peterborough United, where he scored 33 goals in 156 league games. He was snapped up by Coventry City and enjoyed 10 years at Highfield Road, which included an FA Cup winners medal in 1987. Troubled by injury last season, he was given a free transfer and joined Stoke during the close season.

MARTIN CURRUTHERS (forward) - 21-year-old Martin started his career with Aston Villa, but made only a handful of appearances. With a forward pairing of Dean Saunders and Dalian Atkinson, he found his openings limited and joined Stoke, where he has formed an exciting partnership with Regis in recent weeks.

SIMON STURRIDGE (forward) - Lou Macari's last signing, Simon joined Stoke from Birmingham for £75,000. He joined the Blues from school and was a member of the autoglass trophy-winning side of 1991.




Joe Jordan started his career at Morton, before joining Leeds United for £15,000 in 1970. After a slow start at Elland Road, Jordan blossomed into a robust centre-forward and remained at the club until 1978 when Manchester United paid £350,000 for his services.

Three years later he joined A.C. Milan and had spells at Verona and Southampton before hanging up his boots.

The Scottish international started his managerial career at Bristol City, a club he led to the Third Division championship before taking the reins at Hearts. Last season was spent as Liam Brady's assistant at Celtic and he became Stoke's boss early this month. Joe will be assisted at the Victoria Ground by Asa Hartford who joined the club this week.





Hungry to score for the Hatters

PLAYER INTERVIEW



Geoff Aunger made a dream start to his Luton Town career by scoring on his first-team debut against Crystal Palace earlier in the month. The Canadian international is happy to be given a chance in the side and hopes that his form can continue.

Geoff's name first came to prominence with Town fans after he netted four goals in two games while on loan in the reserves. His goalscoring exploits then continued on a regular basis in Wayne Turner's side and he impressed sufficiently enough to be rewarded with a two-year contract with the club in September.

His career now appears to have taken off after an insecure period when he thought his chance of playing English League football had passed him by.

"I came over from Canada last season and had a spell with Premier League side Ipswich Town," said Geoff, who has played 12 times for his country. "I was linked to their club via goalkeeper Craig Forrest, and it helped having him around during those early days. Their management saw me as an attacking midfielder, playing behind the front two, but in the end it just did not work out. I was disappointed, but I did not give up hope of playing in England."

Geoff, who came to England from the Vancouver 86ers, remained in the Anglia region and came to Luton to prove to himself that he was good enough to stay in this country. He believes his loan spell with the Hatters justified that fact and he is hoping the goals will keep coming.

"I had a successful period in the reserves and I was pleased that David Pleat gave me the chance to show what I can do in the first-team," continued the 25-year-old. "My confidence is sky high at the moment after scoring seven goals for the reserves and to continue that form against Crystal Palace was wonderful."

"If you are a striker, it doesn't matter if the goals are scored in training, reserve games or in the first-team, they all give you confidence. The early goal against Palace settled me down and it

helped me have a good match."

Geoff kept his place in the side for the televised victory over Charlton Athletic three weeks ago. He felt the pace more in that game, but was still pleased with his contribution. "The main factor for me in that game was that chances were being created for the strikers: The odds are that I will score if I get a few chances."

"I must admit, the contrasting styles threw me a little. Crystal Palace played a physical game, while Charlton played the ball along the floor, but the main aspect of the game I have got to get to grips with is the speed. This is a quick league and games are end-to-end. It is much quicker than the Premiership."

Now that he has established himself in the first-team squad, Geoff has had a chance to reflect on the team's performances while he has been involved. He is confident for the remainder of the season - for the team and on a personal level.

"I'm hungry to score goals and I want to do my best for the team and help the side into a comfortable league position," he said.

"We have shown a lot of passion recently, knocked the ball around and have proved that we are a good team in this league. We are getting out of the blocks early and taking the game to the opposition. The chances being created have given everyone in the side more confidence. I just hope it is me getting on the end of those chances!"

Although Football League meetings between the Town and Stoke City did not start until 1953, the two teams did actually meet in the Southern League in the years leading up to World War One.


Stoke, founder members of the Football League in 1888, fell on hard times shortly after the turn of the century and were bankrupted, leaving a newly-formed club, Stoke (1908) Ltd, to find a league that would accept them.

Quite how they came to re-join the Football League in 1915 after finishing top of Southern League Division Two is anybody's guess. Strange things happened around that time. Just ask Arsenal!

Our first league visit to Stoke took place on September 26, 1953 when we returned with a point after forcing a 1-1 draw. According to reports, we could have been three up at half-time but in the end, only 'magnificent' defending saved a point following a second-half Stoke onslaught. The return saw the Town go down 1-0 in front of a crowd of 17,055.

In our promotion season of 1954/55, Stoke were seen off fairly easily at Kenilworth Road by 3-1 with the game at the Victoria Ground finishing scoreless to maintain our promotion at the top of the table.

After our stay in Division One, meetings re-commenced in 1960 with the 3-0 defeat suffered at Stoke on October 1. That game created history as the Town's youngest ever player, Mike O'Hara, turned out in goal. Regular keeper Ron Baynham had suffered a fractured skull in the previous week's game against Sheffield United and his deputy, Alan Collier, was still not fit after breaking an arm in pre-season. This left manager Sam Bartram with the only option of blooding O'Hara, then only 16 years and 32 days-old. The game was also significant in that Albert McCann also made his debut and Billy Bingham was playing his final game in Town colours.

Stanley Matthews. Although the crowd at Kenilworth Road was up to 15,163 (an increase of 5,000 on the previous home gate), Matthews failed to appear with it being rumoured that he did not rate the Luton floodlight!

Matthews did appear in the final game of the 1962/63 season, however, and scored a goal in the 2-0 win over the Town which saw the Potters promoted and ourselves relegated. The crowd at the Victoria Ground that day of 33,644 remains the biggest in clashes between the two sides.

We next met during our brief stay in Division One in 1974-75 with Peter Spiring making his debut in the 4-2 defeat at Stoke. The return finished 0-0 but how the Town managed to prevent the Potters scoring I will never know.

On to more recent times, and with the Town eventually following Stoke back into Division One at the end of 1981-82, the Victoria Ground suddenly became a place we all liked to visit with four goals being scored in three consecutive seasons.

In 1982-83, an amazing 4-4 draw was the result to a game which saw Stoke goalkeeper Peter Fox sent off and David Moss missing a last-minute penalty. We finally gained our first win at the Victoria Ground the following season when Paul Walsh scored a hat-trick in the 4-2 victory and in our final visit in 1984-85, we ran out 4-0 winners in a game that was also vital in our attempt to avoid the drop.

The home games in this period were tame by comparison, with Kirk Stephens making his final Luton appearance in the 1-0 defeat in 1983-84 and Andy Dibble, Ashley Grimes and Steve Elliott making their debuts in the 2-0 win in 1984-85



Branston led the way to championship glory

WHERE ARE THEY NOW? - BY ROGER WASH

If one player was instrumental in winning the Fourth Division Championship in 1968 it was captain Terry Branston. Signed on a free transfer from Northampton by manager Allan Brown, he was brought to Luton for his leadership qualities but he ended up giving a whole lot more.

Terry started off playing local youth football in his home town of Rugby and was recommended to Northampton Town by scout Jack Hastings. However, his career at the County Ground stuttered in its early stages.

"Jack, who used to walk to all games from his home mid-way between Coventry and Rugby, arranged a trial for me in the Northampton 'A' team but nothing seemed to come of it," said Terry. "So I agreed to a trial at Notts County who were managed by Tommy Lawton at the time. When I got back from Meadow Lane, Jack was waiting for me and called me all the names under the sun with the upshot that I signed for the Cobblers in October 1958!"

Joining Northampton at this time was the best thing that could have happened to Terry as the team embarked on a roll that was to take it from the Fourth Division to the First by 1965, the most successful period in the club's history.

"Dave Bowen, the manager, brought in some good players and we all grew up together," he added. "Although our stay in Division One only lasted a single season, basically because we were not good enough, I had a tremendous time at the County Ground and I cried my eyes out when the Board, in its wisdom, decided to give me a free transfer in the summer of 1967."

Help was on hand in the shape of Luton manager Allan Brown who saw Terry as the ideal captain to lead his new look side out of Division Four and back to the top. What could be done once.....

"From the moment I set foot in Kenilworth Road I was struck by the homeliness of the place with everyone being so friendly.

"My job was to get the best out of the players on the pitch and I like to think I was a success in that respect. We walked away with the Fourth Division title in my first season, almost went up again in my second and achieved further promotion in my third."

He continued: "They were a great set of lads and the team spirit was tremendous. Bruce Rioch used to come in for most of the leg-pulling as he was the youngest and also the star, while the antics of Graham French, my roommate, could be turned into a best-selling book."

In 1969 Chris Nicholl was bought from Halifax Town to replace Terry and for a time did, but by the end of the season when promotion hopes were slipping away, the 'skipper' was recalled, on his say so, and the rise in status

was achieved.

Unfortunately, Terry's Division Two career only lasted one game before he was transferred to Lincoln for £5,000 in September 1970 where he was a team-mate of a young Graham Taylor. When the Imps came to choose a new manager, the Board was split and the casting vote eventually went to Taylor in preference to Terry who did not even apply for the job. Who knows what might have been!

Terry still lives in Rugby and has been running a driving school for the last 25 years. He comes to Kenilworth Road fairly regularly, the scene of his goal from an overhead kick against Rochdale, the blocking of many a full-blooded free-kick with his nose and the fist shaking as he exerted every ounce of effort from his team-mates. A true leader by example.




