**A**warm welcome to Oxford United: their supporters, management and players. They are making steady progress in the league under Denis Smith and Malcolm Crosby and I am sure they will get the best out of their limited resources.

The afternoon gave me rich satisfaction, particularly as we had to manoeuvre our resources when David Preece went down with illness shortly before the game. Jamie Campbell showed that his recent attachment

to the senior squad is beginning to pay dividends.

After a week without a game, we travelled to Newcastle in good heart, and our pleasure was not to capitulate in front of their marvellous crowd and fine touch play. Once again, the experience will have brought on the younger element, but it was a day when the 'old heads' of Trevor Peake, John Dreyer,

# Donation boosts our community programme

COMMUNITY MATTERS WITH GARY HOOPER



**A**t a presentation held at the club on Friday, January 21, in the presence of Graham Bright MP for Luton South, the Town's 'Football in the Community' scheme received a cheque for £5,000 from Gavin Bisdee of 'Sportsmatch', a government-backed company whose objective is to develop sport at grass roots level.

Football in the Community at Kenilworth Road has grown considerably since its formation last season and has helped bring the community and the football club closer together. A number of projects have proved a resounding success, such as the restructuring of the Junior Hatters supporters club, the Learning Through Football scheme and regular visits to local schools.

As Community Liaison Officer Gary Hooper points out, the money donated by Sportsmatch will be gratefully received. "This very generous gesture will help our community programme develop even further as we start a new year," he said.

"For example, at present we visit about 7,500 children in the local area to teach them the skills of football and associate them with Luton Town FC. With this cash injection, we will be able to expand this operation further afield and visit 15,000 children because we can buy more equipment and employ a greater number of football coaches.

"We will also be able to increase the number of projects we currently have in operation which will ensure that Luton Town and the local community will form an even closer bond."

Sportsmatch achieves its objectives by handing sports clubs up and down the country, the incentive to attract sponsorship. Sportsmatch receives a substantial budget at present from the Department of National Heritage, which means that if a sports club or project attracts a new sponsorship deal, the sum raised will be matched (ranging from £1,000 to £75,000).

The donation to the LTFC Football in

the Community scheme was made in recognition of Kenning Car and Van Rental's continued support of the Hatters' community programme. They supply the project with a van, emblazoned in Luton Town colours, to help Mr Hooper reach the local community. As Mr Hooper points out, their support has been instrumental in attracting the Sportsmatch donation. "Without their backing, the donation could not have happened," he stated. "I would like to take this opportunity to thank Ray Mulford and everyone connected with Kenning Car and Van Rental for continuing their sponsorship into 1994. Their help is a great bonus for the continued success of our community programme."

Since its formation in November 1992, Sportsmatch has donated 500 awards and has generated £8 million in sponsorship. Luton Town are the latest benefactors in a long line of sports clubs. As scheme manager Charles Langhorne explains. "It is the first time we have been associated with Luton Town, however, it is not the first time we have helped the town of Luton. In the past we have also provided much-needed funds to Luton Basketball Club. On the football front, other clubs we have supported include St Neots FC, Crystal Palace FC and the national Football in the Community/Pizza Hut scheme.





# Veteran strikers and Irish World Cup dreams

**V**eteran strikers and vintage wine have more in common than jokes suggesting that they are past their sell-by dates. Both can mature with age to provide increased levels of pleasure and performance. Indeed, sometimes, their best seasons come after their best years are deemed to be passed...

Take Peter Beardsley, for example. Discarded by Liverpool and England, this 32-year-old is proving at Newcastle that he still has much to offer. Or Ian Rush. Also 32, he is still scoring regularly for Liverpool. Or Lee Chapman, nearly 35 now, but doing the business for West Ham.

In our own league, we have some special men too. The best example is John Aldridge. Painfully, he proved that here in December when he poached Tranmere Rovers' winner with a perfect example of the finisher's arts: smooth control, a tidy turn, all-in-one movement and the ball is in the net.

Tranmere's manager John King said Aldridge "took his goal like a surgeon." Aldridge is 35 and probably on his way to the World Cup finals with the Republic of Ireland. In the United States, he could be partnered in attack by almost anyone, if you believe everything you read.

The injury which has taken Niall Quinn out of action has opened up an extraordinary chase for the vacancy and one of the favourites before Christmas was our own Kerry Dixon. And, yes, that was in spite of Kerry playing eight times for England in the mid-1980's when he was banging them in for Chelsea.

Kerry's experience and talent and his exceptional form this season have made him one of the Endsleigh League Division One's top strikers and a leading member of the over-30's club. At 32, he is three years younger than Aldridge and has shown his relative youth in the manner he has led the otherwise inexperienced Luton forward line.

"It came out of the blue," said Kerry, of his chance to join Jack Charlton's army. "I was told

by some friends that there was speculation in the papers and then the lads started latching on to it. There were plenty of 'Paddy' type-jokes and so on."

Kerry's unexpected Irish connection comes from his father Mike who played for the Town in the late 1950's and it delighted him and his family and friends, whose minds drifted towards USA '94. However, his eight-minute appearance as a substitute for England against Poland in the 1986 World Cup finals in Mexico appears to have wrecked his hopes.

He may, however, go to America to support the Irish team anyway, in the process no doubt appreciating the skills and finishing instincts of Aldridge and the rest.

"He doesn't believe in age," said Mr King of the ex-Oxford, Liverpool and Real Madrid striker. "It doesn't mean anything to him at all."


"He just goes on and on. He thinks age is something that is only recorded to go on tombstones. That's the way he thinks and he still trains and plays as a youngster. You know, when the ball comes in the box he reacts.....If he was a shark he would have your legs off!"

Down the years, there have always been golden oldies, strikers whose scoring skills carried them on and on into their mid and late 30's. Remember Bob Hatton and Lawrie Sheffield? And Paul Walsh is still turning on the style for Pompey, isn't he? Like hired guns in the old wild west, they had a boots-and-goals attitude to life and proved, like the vintage strikers of 1994, that age is no barrier to success.





# Spotlight on today's visitors



## OXFORD UNITED F.C. 1993-94

■ Oxford United visit Kenilworth Road this afternoon in upbeat mood after a spell which has mirrored that of the Hatters. At the time of writing, the U's are lying in 22nd place in the First Division table, but have been heartened by an unbeaten run which now stretches to six games. During this period, Denis Smith's men have beaten Southend United at home 2-1, and have taken the very creditable scalp of Tranmere Rovers (2-0) in the FA Cup, third round, along with a 2-2 draw with Leeds United in round four.


■ United continue to battle against the odds and now have a team assembled who are hardened by the experiences of last season, when they fought off relegation in impressive fashion. Winning four of their last seven matches they climbed to mid-table respectability after looking, for long periods, as if they would find themselves in a battle until the final game of the season.

■ This season the Manor Ground faithful were looking for a major improvement and following a 3-2 defeat of Portsmouth on the opening day of the season, they had reason to be optimistic. However, three consecutive defeats followed against West Bromwich Albion (1-3), Watford (2-3) and Bolton Wanderers (0-1) and the side soon found themselves back at the wrong end of the table. The announcement of Brian Horton's resignation in September only disrupted

matters and it has taken until only recently, for the new management duo of Denis Smith and his former assistant at Sunderland, Malcolm Crosby, to stabilise the situation and consolidate.

■ As Mr Smith points out, the reason for the improved results is simple: "We haven't had many changes forced on us and a settled side has helped everyone's confidence. All the players now understand the system we play and I believe that we are heading in the right direction." With such a tight league this season, the teams at the bottom of Division One can compete on an equal footing and catch those at the top. That is Mr Smith's aim as we enter the final third of the season. "A play-off place is a realistic aim for any of the lower placed teams, if they put a run together. There is not much difference between top and bottom this season and our results seem to shock you."

■ Oxford United entered the Football League in 1962, losing their first game 3-2 at Barrow. Since that time the club have won the Division Two championship in 1985, the Third Division title in 1968 and 1984, and the League (Milk) Cup in 1986. They were formed in 1893 as Headington, adding 'United' a year later. Famous players to have learned their trade at the Manor Ground include Ron Atkinson, Ray Houghton, Dean Saunders and John Aldridge.

## VISITORS ON PARADE

PHILIP WHITEHEAD (goalkeeper) - A recent signing from Barnsley, Philip started his career at Halifax, making his debut in 1986. He joined the Tykes for £60,000 in 1990 and has also represented Scunthorpe, Bradford City and Stockport County on loan.

MIKE FORD (defender) - Mike joined Oxford United for £150,000 in 1988 from Cardiff City. He was released from Leicester City as a youngster before joining Cardiff in 1985, where he made over 162 appearances. Injuries have cut short his appearances at United, but last season he enjoyed his best run in the side and was voted Player-of-the-Year.

LES ROBINSON (defender) - Les was signed from Doncaster Rovers for £150,000 in 1990. He started his career at Mansfield Town in 1986 before moving to Stockport County a year later. He joined Doncaster for £10,000 in April 1988.

MATTHEW ELLIOTT (defender) - Matthew came into the game from non-league Epsom and Ewell and joined Charlton Athletic following a successful trial period. He joined Torquay United for a small fee in 1989 and helped the Gulls to promotion in 1990-91. Scunthorpe United signed Matthew last season, before he was on the move again in November, to Oxford.

ANTON ROGAN (defender) - Anton joined Oxford at the start of the season in a deal which took Andrew Melville to Sunderland. He started his career at Celtic and was a regular member of the side for four seasons until his transfer to Roker Park, for £350,000 in 1991. During his time at Celtic, Anton won two Scottish FA Cup winners' medals and a league championship medal in 1988.

MICKEY LEWIS (midfield) - Mickey started his career with West Bromwich Albion before joining Derby County for £25,000. Forty-nine appearances later he was on the move again to Oxford United, where he made his debut in December 1988. Mickey is a former England youth international.

JIM MAGILTON (midfield) - A £125,000 signing from Liverpool in October 1990, Jim is a 23-year-old goalscoring midfielder. He has established himself as an international regular with Northern Ireland since making a goalscoring debut against Poland in 1990. He scored ten goals in 1990/1991, 14 in 1991/1992, and 13 last season to make him top scorer again.

DAVID PENNEY (midfield) - David is a versatile player who can also operate in defence or in attack. He started his career with Derby County before joining Oxford for £175,000 in 1989. He has since been in and out of the side since his arrival at the Manor Ground, and has spent recent weeks on the substitutes' bench.

JOEY BEAUCHAMP (midfield) - Oxford born, Joey signed professional forms with his local club in 1989. He did not gain a regular place in the side until the 1991/1992 season, following a six-game loan spell at Swansea. Since his return from the Vetch Field he has hardly missed a game, scored some spectacular goals and has grabbed the attention of a number of Premiership clubs.

CHRIS ALLEN (midfield) - A former YTS trainee, Chris made his league debut in February 1992. A consistent scorer in the reserve and youth teams at the Manor, he has established himself in the first-team this season and has been a creator of many goals this season.

NICK CUSACK (forward) - Much-travelled Nick joined United in July 1992 from Darlington for a fee of £95,000. He started his career at Leicester in 1987, before moving to Peterborough and then Motherwell the following season. He spent two seasons in Glasgow before joining Darlington in January 1992.

JOHN BYRNE (forward) - John linked up with manager Denis Smith for the third time when he signed for Oxford in November, from Millwall. United are John's seventh club since making his debut for York City in 1979. A Republic of Ireland international, he has twice played in Wembley cup finals, for QPR (Milk Cup v Oxford) in 1986 and Sunderland (FA Cup v Liverpool) in 1990. Unfortunately, John was on the losing side on both occasions.

ALEX DYER (forward) - A free transfer signing from Charlton during the summer, Alex started his career at Watford. Unable to break into the first-team, he joined Blackpool, making his debut in 1983. He was a regular for three seasons until Brian Horton signed him for Hull City, for £40,000. In 1988 he joined Crystal Palace for £250,000 but injury hindered his progress and he found himself on his way to Charlton for £100,000 in 1990.


Denis Smith played more than 450 games, most of them at centre-half, for his home-town club Stoke City. During his time there, he helped them win the League Cup at Wembley in 1972.

Following a brief loan spell at York City in 1982, he was appointed player/manager at Bootham Crescent and the club finished Fourth Division champions in his first full season in management. Such form promoted his name into the spotlight and three years later he joined Sunderland. His

magic worked again, as he lead the Rokerites to the Division Three championship and in 1989/90 led the side to the Second Division play-offs. Although his side lost to Swindon, the Robins' involvement in financial irregularities meant that Sunderland gained promotion to Division One.

Unfortunately, the side were relegated back to Division Two the following season and, ironically, after a 3-0 defeat at Oxford, Mr Smith was sacked. He was soon appointed as Bristol City boss, but could not revive their fortunes, and he found himself out of a job again, until he took over as Oxford manager in September 1993, following Brian Horton's departure to Manchester City.



# Scott's golden goal has Kenilworth Road buzzing



## PLAYER INTERVIEW

**P**icture the scene: Kenilworth Road on a cold and windy January afternoon. An unlikely setting for goal of the season, but that is just what happened on January 22, and everyone inside the stadium will vouch for that.

Scott Oakes scored the goal in question, a strike which had many harping back to the First Division Championship days of Ricky Hill, Brian Stein and beyond. Oakes showed blistering pace, an eye for goal, and swept past eight Derby County players on a mazy 50-yard run. He then proceeded to rifle the ball past Rams' keeper Martin Taylor from outside the box. The headlines in the following morning's papers were testament to how good the goal was.

One man not so surprised was David Pleat. He nurtured the talents of a young Oakes when they were at Leicester together, before bringing him down the M1 two years ago. He has had to wait that long for Oakes to mature into a leading light at Kenilworth Road, but he has no doubting his talent.

"I have seen Scott score goals like that week in, week out for Leicester's youth team," said Mr Pleat after the goal had secured the 10-man Hatters all three points. "He is a very talented boy and a great prospect for Luton Town. It's funny really, but there were supporters behind me who were shouting to drag him off, just before he scored!"

High praise indeed from Pleat, but Oakes submits a more modest view. "I just kept going and going and, luckily, the ball bobbled up and I just hit it. It was one of those things really. Nevertheless, it was the best goal I have ever scored. I just hope I can hit a few more from now on."

Oakes should have more of a chance now that Paul Dickov has returned to Arsenal after his loan period at Kenilworth Road. He has grasped the chance to partner old hand Kerry Dixon up front after playing for much of the season out wide on the wing. "This is the start of a new opportunity for me and I intend to take it," he said. "Mr Pleat has stated that the front places are up for grabs at the moment,

and I have made a good start. Consistency is the key, and it helps when you are part of a winning side."

Following the Hatters' FA Cup visit to Newcastle United, they have gone eight games without defeat. Confidence, says Scott, plays a major part in an improved performance. "From the players to the supporters in the stands, wins bring confidence and give everyone connected with the club a lift. On a personal level, I have been able to enjoy myself, relax and try different things.

"Being involved in the England set-up has also aided my progression this season. I gained valuable experience last summer and came back a much better player."

With his dream goal shown time and again on television, the Premiership wolves are expected to start knocking at the door for his services. Oakes, however, is bound to the cause of helping the Hatters climb up the First Division, to mid-table respectability.

"We have a great team spirit at Luton and have managed to play our way out of trouble," he explained. "We have a bunch of exciting young players, mixed with experienced old pros. We always try and play the right way and that has helped the younger players develop individually.

"I have good feelings about the rest of the season and I am confident we can make big strides. Everyone knows that there is not much difference between teams at the top and bottom of Division One and we believe we can only get better."



# Goals galore after an indifferent start

**T**he Town started season 1987/88 without a win in the first five games and after a couple of seasons of success, this was seen as a major calamity, with some of us already checking the A.A. route to Second Division grounds.

Our third away trip of the campaign took us on the short journey to Oxford and a crowd of 6,804 basked in the September sunshine, blissfully unaware of the story about to unfold. Mike Newell was dropped in favour of Mick Harford but apart from that, manager Ray Harford kept faith with the same side that had failed to pick up a win bonus.

As it turned out, the Town ditched the 4-4-2 system in favour of the cavalier approach we had grown to love, even though it meant that defence was sometimes compromised in the search for goals.

With Ricky Hill turning on a five star display, it was a surprise that we had to wait until the 33rd minute for the opening goal, from the head of Brian Stein, and it was an even bigger shock when Neil Slatter equalised for the home side shortly before the interval. Justice was done, however, when full-back Tim Breacker surged forward leaving Oxford defenders, including a certain John Dreyer, in his wake. He hit a powerful shot past Peter Hucker to give the Town a deserved half-time lead.

From the second-half kick-off, Harford took the ball down the right and centered for the onrushing Emeka Nwajiobi to dive full length to power in a stunning header. Hill then became the fourth Town player to open his account for the season when he hammered home a shot from Nwajiobi. Harford then produced a delicate 25-yard lob to put the Town firmly in the driving seat.

Oxford scored a late consolation through Dean Saunders, but the Hatters' display kick-started their season and by the return in February, we were eighth in the league.

through to the quarter-finals of the FA Cup and the semi-finals of the Littlewoods Cup. The Simod Cup would come later!

The game started as the previous game had ended at the Manor, with the Town streaking into all-out attack and taking the lead in the sixth minute through Harford. Brian Stein increased the lead soon after before Saunders netted from the penalty spot.


The fun was nowhere near over as Darron McDonough volleyed home to make it 3-1, only for Martin Foyle to score a beauty to give the scoreline a rather flattering look about it.

The crowd of 8,063 loved it and if the first-half was breathless, then the second period was even better as Mark Stein scored a hat-trick in 11 minutes to put the result way beyond the reach of Oxford, even though they kept plugging away and eventually became the first visiting team to score four on the Kenilworth Road plastic. That the Town scored seven made it a memorable game and made up for all the odd goal defeats suffered at the hand of Oxford in the past.

As if to rub salt in the wounds, within a month we had beaten Oxford over two legs in the Littlewoods Cup semi-final and were on our way to Wembley. But that is another story.





# "I'd walk a million miles for one of your goals"

WHERE ARE THEY NOW? - BY ROGER WASH

**S**o went a popular song warbled by the Oak Road 'choir' in the late 1960's reserved for a folk hero and a personal favourite of mine, Keith Allen.

Born on the Isle of Wight, Keith had an early trial with Sheffield Wednesday due to the fact that the father of Roy Shiner, a famous Owls player of the early post-war period, lived in the same road in Ryde and recommended him to the Hillsborough side.

"I only played one Central League game for Wednesday before I was sent home and eventually signed for Portsmouth, my nearest League side," he said. Unfortunately, Pompey disbanded their reserve side and he was then transferred to Grimsby without having a say in the matter.

"When the reserve side was disbanded I was called in to see the manager, George Smith, who told me that he had fixed it for me to go to Grimsby in an exchange deal involving Trevor Porteous. Unfortunately, my manager, Tom Johnson was sacked soon after and my face did not seem to fit with the new man in charge, Jim McGuigan."

Despite all this, Keith did make his League debut on March 6, 1965 in a home game against Reading and scored the Mariners' goal in a 1-1 draw. He retained his place for a further five games that season but when he asked to return to Ryde on the death of his mother, permission was granted, but he was told to take his boots with him!

He added: "When I was home that summer Bert Trautmann, the Stockport County manager, sent a representative armed with a contract to take me to Edgeley Park, which turned out to be a good move. My time at Stockport was a fine education as there was a good mix of youth and experience at the club".

Players such as Len Allchurch, Eddie Stuart and ex-Luton centre-half Matt Woods formed the basis of a Stockport side that walked away with the Fourth Division title in 1967 but before Keith was able to collect his medal, he was transferred to

Kenilworth Road in exchange for Derek Kevan.

"The move to Luton was the best thing that could have happened to me as I was made welcome right from the start and I was lucky enough to take part in the revival of fortunes that set the Town buzzing again."


making his debut in the 4-0 home win over Exeter on 11th March 1967, Keith then remained virtually ever present for the next three seasons and saw the team rise from the depths of the Fourth Division to promotion to Division Two.

"I can honestly say that Luton are still my number one club and my memories of my time there will remain for ever," he stated. "The crowds, the big wins and the characters all appear as if it were yesterday. I still have many photographs reflecting the win over Crewe to clinch the Fourth Division Championship, the presentation of our medals and the wonderful nights at Kenilworth Road when crowds in excess of 20,000 used to cram in, making it a brilliant atmosphere. We seemed unbeatable at home in those days."


As Division Two dawned Keith was disappointed to learn that he was surplus to requirements as when the chance came to join Plymouth he took it.

"It was a good move family wise but not on the football side as I did not do myself full justice at Home Park". Now settled in the Plymouth area Keith works for a wholesale paper company, has played cricket for Plymstock for 18 years and has recently received an invitation to turn out for the Devon over-50's cricket side next season, now that he has reached his own personal half-century, on November 9th.

Warm regards are sent to all at Kenilworth Road and I am sure those feelings are reciprocated to a player who always gave 101 per cent and was absolutely amazing on ice!






