





FRANKLY SPEAKING

After the game on Wednesday there were a lot more smiles about the place — especially in the dressing room — and we will face Luton this afternoon with renewed confidence.

We know we're in for a tough test, though, because Luton are one of the First Division's 'form' teams — rather like Notts County.

They've lost just one of their last 14 League and Cup games and, in the process, have moved away from the relegation battle at the foot of the table.

And what's more, they've done so by playing attractive, entertaining football . . . although rest assured, David Pleat wouldn't have it any other way.

David and I go back a few years and I've always admired the way his sides play the game. He's also one of the hardest working managers I know and he has got an encyclopaedic knowledge of the game and players.


That doesn't stop him turning to managerial colleagues for advice now and again, though.

ONE FAMILY — ONE CLUB — 100 YEARS

It is probably unique in the history of football that one family has had continuous membership of a club for 100 years.

But the Forman family are celebrating just that achievement when they are guests of the club at today's game.

In February, 1894, Fred Forman joined Forest from Derby County to be followed a year later by his brother Frank from the same club.



They played together for nine years, reaching the pinnacle in 1899 when they became the first brothers to play for England in the Home internationals against Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland — a record only equalled by the Charlton brothers.

In 1898 Frank won a cup winners medal against his old club Derby — Fred was unable to play because of injury. In 1905, Frank retired from playing and became the only member of the playing staff to join the Forest Committee.

He served the club for 51 years ending as vice-chairman. During his latter years, his son Ralph assisted him as a member and vice president, becoming one of the first shareholders when the club became a limited company.

When Ralph passed away his son Michael continued the association with the club having been a regular supporter for many years, taking over his father's place as a shareholder to this day.

The fourth generation is Christopher, Mike's son, who has been a season ticket holder for 13 years.

ENGLAND EXPECTS

England will be looking to preserve their unbeaten record when they take on Belgium, at the City Ground, on Sunday, 13th March in a women's international.

The match is part of the qualifying process for the European Championships and England have won two and drawn two of their four games to date.

In three away games they have beaten Slovenia 10-0, Belgium 3-0 and drawn with Spain 0-0. Now they are playing the return legs and have again drawn with Spain 0-0 at Bradford. After the game at the City Ground, England complete their programme against Slovenia, at Brentford, on 17th April.

Tickets are available at the City Ground for the match. It will cost £3 for adults but



It gave me enormous delight to see the name of Stuart Pearce included in the England squad for Wednesday's game against the European Champions Denmark at Wembley.

There had been a lot of speculation — all of it, I must point out, in the media — that Terry Venables would leave Stuart out of his first England squad.

But knowing Terry as I do, it would have really surprised me if he had actually done so.

Stuart is, of course, renowned for his fierce commitment and whole-hearted approach to the game and it's those sort of qualities Terry needs I think at this stage of his reign as international coach.

I applaud Terry for bringing in some fresh faces in the likes of Darren Anderton, Matthew Le Tissier and Graeme Le Saux.

But it's important he strikes a balance between youth and experience... and that's where our very own skipper comes into his own.

Whether he plays against Denmark or not, Stuart is going to be a very useful man for Terry to have around over the next few days.

He has now won 55 caps — I think I'm right in saying that only 20 or so players have ever passed the 50-cap mark for England — and will be able to pass on a few words of advice to Messrs. Le Tissier, Le Saux and Anderton.

It's nice to see that Terry, like his predecessor Graham Taylor, is prepared to pick players who aren't necessarily playing in the Premiership — although in Stuart's case that's hopefully only a temporary arrangement!

And it makes me proud to think that we are the only non-Premiership club — apart from Lazio and Sampdoria — to have a player in the squad to face the Danes.

Incidentally, don't bet against Stuart not being in the England set-up when the European Championships come around in 1996.



He's the epitome of a model professional and I'm sure he will still be playing well enough in two years time to be considered for the international team.

And I'd like to think that there may be one or two other Forest players in Terry Venables plans by then.

- It gives me great pleasure to welcome members of the Forman family to today's game.

As you will read elsewhere in today's programme (see City Ground News Desk), the Forman family have been linked with Nottingham Forest for 100 years.

They are celebrating that fact today by coming along to this afternoon's game as guests of the club and I hope they have a wonderful time with us.

The Forman family's commitment to our cause is second to none and I would like to thank them for their wonderful support over the years.

Long may it continue.

The F.A. Cup has many, many magical qualities... one of which has given Luton Town's young generation great impetus in fulfilling some of its rich potential just lately.

A glorious charge to the cup quarter-finals has been instrumental in transforming a season that was developing a familiar look for the Hatters not so long ago.

Luton are well-versed with grim battles for survival after their recent struggles, and another one beckoned as a run of two wins in nine games leading up to Christmas left them languishing in the First Division's bottom four.

But even then, David Pleat was convinced that the club's fortunes were about to change, and that is exactly what has happened over the past couple of months.

There were already some signs of an upturn before the F.A. Cup's arrival on the scene,

but there is nothing like success in that competition to breed some confidence.

So much so in fact, that Luton now have realistic ambitions of making a late surge for the promotion play-offs, if they can indeed sustain their current form.

Not only has Pleat's young side lost on only one occasion in the last 14 games, they have won five of the last six matches to really set their season alight.

One of those successes was the replay win over Premiership high-fliers Newcastle United in a fourth round replay at Kenilworth Road, after gaining a creditable 1-1 draw at St. James' Park in the first encounter.

That triumph over Newcastle was sandwiched in between wins over Southend United and Cardiff City in progressing to the final eight, where they will travel to West Ham United.

Luton have reserved all their best performances for the cup though, and their rising stature has been underlined by the way in which they overcame promotion contenders Derby County and Portsmouth in home matches.

England Under-21 star Scott Oakes scored a spectacular winner in the victory over Derby, and he was also on target to crown a 4-1 win over Pompey.

Indeed, Luton have won their last six home matches to build upon the solid away form which really set the wheels in motion just before Christmas.

The Hatters gained commendable draws on their trips to Watford, Peterborough and West Bromwich Albion before two late goals from Kerry Dixon gave them their first away win of the season at Notts County.

Former England striker Dixon has had to take a backseat though, with youngsters like Oakes, Scottish Under-21 midfielder Paul Telfer and Welsh pair Ceri Hughes and John Hartson capturing the attention.

And Pleat firmly believes that if Luton can hold onto all their emerging stars, they will have an "exceptionally good side" in a couple of years time.

But players like Oakes and Telfer are attracting a growing band of admirers, and a club of Luton's limited cash resources may find it difficult to resist big-money offers, as their manager is fully aware.

Dixon helps to provide an experienced backbone to the side along with long-serving midfielder David Preece and central defender Trevor Peake.

Former England B international Preece has been with the club for 10 years now and played in their two Littlewoods Cup Finals at Wembley, the second of which was, of course, when they lost 3-1 to us in 1989.

Peake, a member of Coventry's 1987 F.A. Cup winning side, when they beat

MANAGER



DAVID PLEAT has enjoyed some memorable moments with Luton Town over the years... and it appears there may be more just around the corner now.

Nottingham-born Pleat, who began his playing career here at the City Ground as a youngster, is now in his third spell at Kenilworth Road after taking over as manager from Jim Ryan in the summer of 1991.

He made a name for himself as both a player and in his initial spell as manager at Luton, lifting them up into the old First Division in 1982. Prior to his more recent return, he managed Spurs and Leicester City for a time.

LUTON TOWN

PEN PICS

JUERGEN SOMMER

Has high hopes of representing the host nation in this summer's World Cup finals in the United States. Joined Luton from Indiana State University in 1991 and after a patient wait has finally established himself as Town's first choice goalkeeper.

ANDY PETTERSON

Originally joined Luton on trial from the Australian Institute of Sport but was offered a contract at the start of the 1988-89 season. Had loan spells with Swindon and Ipswich before finally making his Luton debut at the start of last term.

DES LINTON

Followed David Pleat from Leicester in October 1991, moving to Kenilworth Road — along with Scott Oakes — as part of the deal that took midfielder Steve Thompson to Filbert Street. The 22-year-old defender was a team-mate of our Des Lyttle in the youth team at Leicester.

TREVOR PEAKE

An F.A. Cup winner with Coventry in 1987, he had eight successful seasons at Highfield Road before joining Luton in 1991. The Hatters club captain, he was voted joint 'Player of the Year' by Town supporters last season. Incidentally, is a close friend of our own skipper, Stuart Pearce.

JOHN DREYER

The other 'joint winner' of last season's 'Player of the Year' award, he has been a regular member of the Town side for the past four seasons. Started his career with Oxford but

moved to Kenilworth Road in a £140,000 transfer five years ago.

JULIAN JAMES

A former Luton apprentice and England Under-21 international, he was introduced to first team football as a teenager and has been in the picture ever since. The talented 23-year-old even captained the side in Trevor Peake's absence last season.

PAUL TELFER

Another product of the Kenilworth Road youth system, last season he established himself on the right hand side of midfield but can also operate at right back. Already a Scottish Under-21 international, he played for his country's B team against Wales earlier this year.

ALAN HARPER

The 33-year-old Scouser has enjoyed a distinguished playing career having had two spells with Everton, where he won numerous honours, Sheffield Wednesday and Manchester City. Known as a 'utility player', he joined Luton on a free transfer.

DAVID PREECE

Luton paid Walsall £150,000 for his services in 1984 and it has proved to be money well spent. The small midfielder has since made more than 300 appearances for the Hatters — including two League Cup final appearances. Has also been capped three times by England at B international level.

JAMIE CAMPBELL

Another former apprentice who signed professional forms in the summer of 1990. Although the 21-year-old Brummie hasn't made that

many first team appearances since then, he is a regular member of David Pleat's squads.

SCOTT HOUGHTON

A graduate of the F.A.'s School of Excellence at Lilleshall, he was on Town's schoolboy books but joined Spurs as an apprentice. The 22-year-old forward only made 14 League appearances for the North London club before linking up again with Luton last summer in a performance-related transfer.

SCOTT OAKES

Only made three League appearances for Leicester after serving his apprenticeship at Filbert Street but David Pleat recognised his potential and took him with him when he went to Luton. Now looks to be an outstanding prospect — a fact underlined when he won his first England Under-21 cap in the annual Toulon tournament last summer.

KERRY DIXON

Now 32, he joined Luton from Southampton in October after five-months on loan at Kenilworth Road. One of the most prolific goalscorers of recent times, he scored almost 200 League goals for Reading and Chelsea in little more than 450 appearances.

JOHN HARTSON

The Welsh Under-21 striker made his debut against us in August and although we won 2-1, he got on the scoresheet and had a goal disallowed as well. Only 19, he was a prolific marksman for Luton's reserve and youth teams last season.

CERI HUGHES

Talented Welsh international winger who has played a big part in the upsurge in Luton's fortunes recently. Made his debut back in 1990 for the Hatters, but his progress was hampered by injury problems for a time last season.

REDS SPOTLIGHT

SCOT GEMMILL

Scot Gemmill rarely airs his views on football. Instead he's quite happy to let his on-field performances do the talking for him.

And in that respect, one particular display this season did more to confirm Scot's growing reputation as one of the brightest young midfielders outside the Premiership.

His two goal blast in our televised City Ground clash with promotion rivals Leicester last month not only earned him a 'Man of the Match' trophy for his sideboard but a whole host of plaudits.

Central T.V.'s star pundit Jimmy Greaves was certainly impressed. The former Tottenham and England star nominated Scot for the award ahead of the likes of Lee Glover and Lars Bohinen, two other key figures in our 4-0 win over Brian Little's men.

Manager Frank Clark was delighted with his contribution as well and admitted: "His goals and his performance against Leicester underlined his pedigree. And he has answered my wishes in recent weeks by looking our most likely player to score from midfield and producing some quality finishes."

There should be no doubting his pedigree. He is, after all, the son of Archie Gemmill, our former midfielder who is now in charge of our Pontins League team.

Of course, Gemmill senior enjoyed a distinguished playing career with not only ourselves but Derby, Birmingham and Scotland, for whom he won 43 caps.

And there is a growing feeling North of the Border that Gemmill Mark II may make a similar impression at international level in years to come.

He has won four Under-21 caps since he made his first senior appearance for us almost three years ago as a substitute in a 3-1 defeat at Wimbledon.

And earlier this season he inched closer to the full international side. In February he made his debut for Scotland's 'B' team in a friendly against Wales at Wrexham.

Although he was a late addition to the squad, the fact that he had a 45-minute run out as a substitute

against the Welsh is an indication that he figures in Craig Brown's plans for the 1996 European Championships.

Brown has made little secret of his appreciation of the 23-year-old's midfield talents since he took over as Scotland coach from Andy Roxburgh earlier this season.

Brown saw him score the winner in our 2-1 success at Watford in January and said soon afterwards: "He is certainly very much in my thoughts because I like him as a player."

He added: "Scot is a good footballer. He is a great passer of the ball and has the vision to set other players free."

The man himself, however, refuses to be drawn on his own prospects of forcing his way into the full international team in the not too distant future.

In fact Scot, who was born North of the Border in his father's home town of Paisley, likes to keep himself to himself and very rarely accepts invitations from quote-hungry reporters looking for an interview.

It's inevitable that those same journalists have in recent years made comparisons between Scot and his father.

But Gemmill senior will have none of that. "Other than the fact that he has played in midfield for both Forest and his country, the similarities end there," he has said.

"My game was based around work-rate and my pace, whereas Scot's biggest asset is his passing and his ability to run at opponents with the ball."

Archie continued: "Of course I am proud of what he has achieved so far but he's a member of the team and no more than that."

And it seems that he is a well-established member of the team at that because on Wednesday against Peterborough he made his 100th League appearance for us... and, of course, he celebrated that in style with both our goals in a 2-0 victory.

Not bad for a player who, in the eyes of assistant manager Alan Hill, looked far too frail in his early teens to ever make the grade at the highest level.

But Director Dr. George Waterhouse and Club Chairman Fred Reacher have already offered their congratulations to the foot-weary pair.



LARS OFF THE MARK BUT IT'S ONLY A POINT AGAINST PALACE



Lars Bohinen finally got into his goalscoring stride when he fired us into the lead against Crystal Palace (above).

But his hopes of being credited with the winner were dashed when Damian Matthew, Palace's recent £125,000 recruit from Chelsea, equalised with his first goal in senior football.

It was frustrating for us because after a tepid first half showing we had plenty of chances to clinch the points.



Luton, under manager David Pleat, were in sixth place in the table, enjoying their most successful spell in Division One since attaining top flight status for the first time in 1955.

Forest were in fifth spot, one point ahead of their hosts — both teams, from their lofty perch, eyed UEFA Cup qualification.

On a mudheap of a surface Forest quickly returned to winning ways, following defeat at the hands of champions Liverpool, although not before playing second fiddle to the Hatters for the first half-hour, as Luton dominated to take the lead through Paul Walsh, who was soon to be on his way to Anfield.


Without a direct strike on the Town goal, Forest's attack erupted into life with a three goal salvo, in seven minutes, shortly before half-time.

The Reds first on 37 minutes had luck written all over it, as a Garry Birtles free-kick deflected wickedly off the Luton defensive wall to leave Les Sealey stranded — more good fortune followed.

Luton, denied a free-kick on the half-way line, were penalised themselves a few seconds later when a free-kick was awarded to Forest. With Luton protesting at the decision, Steve Hodge took advantage to fire home from the edge of the area.

Town, in total disarray, conceded a third, two minutes from the break, as Peter Davenport diverted a Steve Wigley drive beyond Les Sealey, the Hatters had moved from dominance to despair in seven short minutes.

Pleat rallied Luton at half-time — Hans Van Breukelen twice came to the Reds rescue with fine saves, to deny Brian Stein and Paul Elliott, before Luton added their second in the 63rd minute, as ex-Dulwich Hamlet striker, Nigerian born Chukwuemeka Nwajobi, making his league debut, raised Hatters hopes of a revival.



The revival was not to be as Forest applied themselves with a resolute defensive display to earn victory — the three goals took the Reds tally to 41 in 22 outings — leading goalscorers in the division.

Luton might well have been aggrieved at their loss. In a thrilling encounter fortune had, more than once, played its agonising part !







RED REFLECTIONS

- A season by season look at Forest's post war years

The departure of Johnny Metgod had to a great extent not been unexpected by manager Clough. Chris Fairclough's decision, however, not to accept new terms offered by Clough was certainly unexpected — like Colin Walsh and Steve Hodge before him the defender chose to opt for pastures new.

Brian Clough sought replacements not, as expected, in the transfer market, but by again calling upon the clubs youth production line — within weeks of the new season getting underway 18-year-old Steve Chettle and Terry Wilson had won first team selection.

Forest's first eleven could almost qualify for a youth team competition.

Clough held Chettle in particularly high regard. The youngster was offered a contract, the duration of which, by Clough's own admission, he had never previously been prepared to offer to another player.

Pre-season preparation, in Scandinavia, had been low key. Forest's only opposition of any quality being their 1979 European Cup final opponents, Malmo, who beat the Reds 2-0.

The sides opening fixtures brought a haul of ten points from four games, with young striker Lee Glover, alongside Nigel Clough, marking the Reds opening day victory against Charlton with his first senior goal, on his Football League debut, although Forest owed their victory mainly to a dazzling display from Franz Carr.

Forest's impressive start could have been even better because in their next two encounters when, despite twice scoring three times to take comfortable leads, the Reds

reward was just a single point, from a home draw with Southampton, and defeat in a seven goal thriller at Stamford Bridge.

Along with club captain Stuart Pearce, who had made his initial full England appearance at the end of the previous season, Neil Webb had been included in the England squad for the forthcoming international in Germany.

Webb, replacing Glenn Hoddle, was to carve out his own 'niche' in international football by becoming the 1,000th player to be capped at full level by England.

The next game was a home defeat by Arsenal. Despite long periods of domination by the Reds a single goal from the Gunners caused Forests downfall.


Cup draws very often bring together clubs with recent links — Forests second round tie with Hereford was to be no exception, as United arrived at the City Ground under the charge of the inspirational Ian Bowyer.

"Bomber", installed at Edgar Street as player manager, left smarting from a 5-0 defeat, despite leading his side in typical Bowyer style.

The Reds returned to winning ways in the league with victories over Coventry (where Terry Wilson marked his first full appearance with the opening goal), and Norwich.

Forest then gained passage into the next round of the League Cup, following a 1-1 draw in the second leg at Hereford.

Wilson's emergence led to the departure of Irish international David Campbell — like Colin Walsh, whom Campbell had replaced in the number eleven shirt, the young Irishman joined Charlton Athletic.

Forest's form continued to produce impressive victories — three home games resulting in an eleven goal haul — with the defence keeping a clean sheet in all three matches.

Undoubtedly the Reds were producing quality football with a capital 'Q', although they suffered League Cup exit at Maine Road, where they played badly — the defeat being totally inexplicable after such fine performances.

Forest stood fourth in the table, within striking distance of leaders Liverpool, at a time when two milestones were reached.

The clubs 5,000th league goal both for and against were imminent.

The first to be reached was the 5,000th conceded, as Tony Cottee set West Ham on the road to a 3-2 victory at Upton Park, where the

Reds introduced a new face to the first team scene, Tommy Gaynor, a recent purchase from Doncaster Rovers.

The Reds 5,000th goal in their favour was scored in much more pleasant circumstances, as the side disposed of City Ground visitors Queen's Park Rangers.

Forest led Rangers until the 81st minute, by a single goal.

Enter Nigel Clough — within the space of four minutes the scoreline read 4-0 as Clough collected the first league hat-trick of his career, with his third goal being the historic 5,000th.

The number nine's treble was also the fastest scored in Division One, being bettered by only two others — both under three minutes — Jimmy Scarth, for Gillingham, and Ian Scanlon, across the river at Meadow Lane for Notts County.

Forest had now rattled home 15 goals without reply in four home games.

The impressive form continued, with wins at Oxford, and the fortress of Highbury, where the Reds had last emerged triumphant in 1964.

15 visits over a span of 23 years finally brought Forest victory by 2-0, although not all gentlemen of the media were suitably impressed by Forest's audacity in beating the Gunners.

The year ended on a high with the club second in the table, a 'mere' ten points in arrears of unbeaten leaders Liverpool — however the New Year held a series of setbacks in store for Clough's young pretenders!
