

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
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# VIV'S VIEW



WE HAVE played three of the promotion-chasing teams in our last three games and have acquitted ourselves very well, with two wins we thoroughly deserved and a defeat that we certainly did not deserve.

I was pleased with our win over Tranmere in our last home game. We did not play well in the first half, but we dominated the second and the 1-0 scoreline flattered the visitors.

Unfortunately, bad habits recurred in the match against Nottingham Forest at the City Ground and defensive mistakes cost us at least a point. Ironically, the guilty players were two who have been our most consistent in recent matches.

Even allowing for those lapses in concentration I thought we had enough chances to have won the game and we were all devastated that we didn't get anything out of it.

The 1-0 win at Leicester last Saturday was another good result for us. City were third in the League, yet we thoroughly deserved our win. It proved that we have players with big enough hearts. The back four had been sloppy against Forest so it was vital that they bounced back straight away with a good performance, and they were excellent against a very physical Leicester side.

I must say I was disappointed with the way Leicester played. They relied on the long ball for most of the time and put a lot of emphasis on free-kicks and corners. Yet they could go up. They are strong enough and physical enough to do it.

Today's Oakwell visitors, Luton Town, are totally different. They are a side to suit us, because they like to play the passing game the same as us.

I would, of course, dearly love to get my own back for that early-season 5-0 defeat at Kenilworth Road when we had Gerry Taggart controversially sent off after only three minutes, and the way we are playing there is no reason why we cannot do that.

We are a much better side now. We are more consistent, as our record of five wins in the last seven games suggests, and we are more fluid.

People say it augurs well for next season. But I have not given up on this season yet. If we keep on winning ways we could yet cause a surprise by how high we finish up that table.

There are still 12 games to go - and a lot of football to be played.

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AS WITH any team managed by David Pleat, Luton Town can be guaranteed to try to play good football, whatever the circumstances, and purists will be delighted to note their surge up the table after a poor start to the current campaign.

The potential of the Kenilworth Road youngsters under Pleat's astute guidance was spotted by Southampton striker **Kerry Dixon** when he served three months on loan towards the end of last season, and this term he was delighted to join the Hatters on a more permanent basis after a further month's loan period.

He helped save Town from relegation last season by providing former leading goalscorer Philip Gray with an experienced target man and on signing for the club he said: "I made it clear that nothing would please me more than to sign for the Hatters on a permanent basis. It is a dream come true for a local lad. I want to see good football at Luton and if I can help them achieve that I'll be well pleased."

Dixon started his career with Reading and scored 51 goals in 116 appearances before joining Chelsea in 1983 for £175,000. At Stamford Bridge he enjoyed the most productive spell of his career, which also yielded eight England caps. He joined Saints for £575,000 in July 1992.

He links up in attack with **John Hartson** and **Scott Oakes**.

A prolific scorer in both the youth and reserve teams at Kenilworth Road last season, 18-years-old Hartson signed professional forms in December 1992. His marksmanship has been in evidence again this term. He scored (and had a goal disallowed) on his Town debut against Nottingham Forest in August, and he scored one of the goals in Town's 5-0 victory over Barnsley early in October.

Oakes, who joined Luton in October 1991, scored twice in that latter game. Born in Leicester, he developed through the

Club captain **TREVOR PEAKE** started his career at Lincoln City in 1979 before moving on to Coventry City in 1983. He enjoyed eight full seasons at Highfield Road, winning an F.A. Cup winners' medal in 1987. When he joined Luton for £100,000 in August 1991 he was immediately installed as club captain. He was also voted last season's joint Player of the Year, along with John Dreyer, by the Town supporters. Born in Nuneaton, he is now 36 years old.

junior teams with his home club and made his league debut in 1990. He made his international debut during England's successful Toulon Under-21 tournament in June last year and has earned a regular place in the Luton side this season.

The midfield trio comprises **Alan Harper**, **Ceri Hughes** and **Paul Telfer**.

Harper arrived this season from Everton for whom he had just completed his second spell. Born in Liverpool the 33-year-old began his career at Anfield where he spent six seasons without ever appearing in the first team. It was after his move to Goodison Park in 1983 that he made his football league debut and he has since also played with Sheffield Wednesday and Manchester City. He is a former England Youth International.

Born in the Rhondda Valley 23 years ago, Hughes re-established himself in the Hatters' midfield during the second half of last season after a prolonged spell out through injury. He made his debut against Aston Villa in 1990 and is a Wales Youth, Under 21 and full international.

Telfer is a former Luton trainee who made his debut at Everton, as substitute, towards the end of the 1990-91 season. Last term he established himself on the right side of midfield, but has also operated, when needed, at right-back. Now 22, he is a former Scottish Under 21 international.

The back four comprises skipper **Trevor Peake** (see picture special), **John Dreyer**, **Marvin Johnson** and **Des Linton**.

Peake and Dreyer were voted joint winners of the Player of the Year Award by Town supporters last season. Dreyer started his career as an apprentice with Oxford United. He spent loan spells at Torquay and Fulham before making his debut for the Manor Ground club in 1985-86. He joined the Hatters in 1988 for £140,000 and he has been a regular member of the side for the past four seasons.

Fans' favourite Johnson made his Football League debut against Wimbledon in 1988 and quickly established himself as a regular in the Town defence. A player who can play anywhere along the back line, he operated mainly at left-back last season after a lengthy spell through injury.

Linton signed for Luton from Leicester in October 1991 - along with Scott Oakes - as part of the deal which took midfielder Steve Thompson to Filbert Street. Birmingham-born, he was a regular member of the Town defence for the early part of last season and has been a regular this time round.

Goalkeeper **Juergen Sommer** is an American who joined the Hatters in August 1991 for Indiana University. He made his Town debut on the opening day of this season against Watford, but was substituted in the second half after sustaining eight stitches in a head wound. He has also enjoyed extended first team experience on loan at Brighton and Hove Albion and Torquay United.

His understudy this season has been an Australian, **Andy Petterson**, who originally came to Luton on trial from the Australian Institute of Sport and was offered a contract at the beginning of the 1988-89 season. He had spent time on loan at Swindon Town and Ipswich Town before making his Football League debut on the opening day of last season at Leicester City. He also spent a second loan spell at Portman Road last term when he played Premier League football.

Other members of the first team pool who have made appearances this season are defender **Julian James**, midfielder **David Preece** and forwards **Scott Houghton** and **Martin Williams**.

James joined Luton as a trainee and was introduced to First Division football five seasons ago. A former England Under 21 international, he was Town's first-choice right-back last season and captained the side in Trevor Peake's absence. He missed much of the opening half of the season with a broken hand but is now back in contention.

It was in 1981 that Preece made his debut for Walsall and he won a regular place in the side two years later. Luton invested £150,000 in his signature in 1984 and he later played in two League Cup finals for the Hatters. He has been capped three times at England 'B' level.

Hitchin-born Houghton joined the Hatters in August last year on a performance-related transfer from Tottenham Hotspur. He started his career with the Town as a schoolboy, but joined Spurs as a trainee in July 1988. A former pupil of the F.A.'s Centre of Excellence, he made 14 appearances for Spurs, and also served Ipswich, Gillingham and Charlton on loan during his time at White Hart Lane.

Local youngster Williams established himself regularly in the Town 13 towards the end of last season. He made his first team debut at Southampton in March 1992 and has also spent a loan spell in Finland. He joined the club from the youth ranks at Leicester City.

• **Jamie Campbell**  
(Forward): A former Luton trainee who turned professional in July 1990 and made his debut in a Zenith Cup tie at Ipswich two seasons ago.

• **Greg Rioch**  
(Defender): A young Hatter with Town family connections, his father Bruce having played for Luton in the early 70s before moving on to greater heights with Aston Villa and Scotland.

• **Neil Ryan**  
(Midfield): Son of former Hatters player and manager Jim Ryan. Established himself in Town's reserve team after injury towards the end of last season and now looking to follow in his father's footsteps.

## THE BOSS



IT WAS at Kenilworth Road that David Pleat made a name for himself both as a player and a manager. He began his playing days at Nottingham Forest, but made only half-a-dozen first team appearances before joining Luton in 1964. In 1967 he was transferred to Shrewsbury Town and later played for Exeter City and Peterborough before retiring in 1971.

In 1974 he returned to Luton as reserve team coach, after a spell in charge at non-league Nuneaton Borough, and was promoted to first-team coaching duties three years later. He was finally appointed manager in 1978, in succession to Harry Haslam, and guided Luton into Division One four years later.

He joined Tottenham Hotspur in 1986, leading them to an FA Cup Final appearance before moving on to manage Leicester City in December 1987. He remained at Filbert Street until January 1991, returning to Luton for a third spell in June of that year.

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# THE HATTERS

FORMED in 1885 as a fusion of local sides Wanderers and Excelsior, Luton Town's first significant success in the Football League was in winning the Division Three South Championship in the 1936-37 campaign, when Joe Payne created a record with 55 League goals.

The previous season, when Town narrowly missed promotion, Payne had scored ten goals in his first game as a centre-forward as The Hatters trounced Bristol Rovers 12-0 – a record never likely to be broken.

After a break for the war, Town eventually won promotion to Division One on goal average in 1955 and the next landmark in 1958-59 with their first visit to Wembley in the F.A. Cup Final. An attendance record of 30,069 had been set at the 6th round replay against Blackpool, but the final against Nottingham Forest was a disappointment, with Town losing 2-1.

Six years later, a dramatic slide saw them back in the Fourth Division and facing the fear of an application for re-election.

The fight-back began with the winning of the Division Four Championship with a record points total the following season and a Malcolm MacDonald inspired team gained further promotion as runners-up to Orient in 1970.

Promotion to the top sphere eventually came in 1974, but an abysmal start could not be cancelled out by a storming finish and the team was relegated the following season.

After narrowly avoiding further relegation in 1978-79, during manager David Pleat's first season in charge, concerted efforts were made to bring top football back to Kenilworth Road and after two near misses the Division Two Championship was secured in 1981-82, setting another points record with only four defeats suffered throughout the season.

The Hatters struggled in their first year back in the top flight and relegation was still a worry two years later, but money was made available for Pleat to make some brave purchases which not only

preserved Division One status, but also enabled them to reach the F.A. Cup semi-final for only the second time before losing out to Everton in extra-time.

In 1987-88 the Hatters achieved their highest ever league placing of seventh in the First Division and the following year they carried off the Littlewoods Cup, a last minute goal giving them victory over Arsenal.

They reached the Littlewoods Cup Final again in 1988-89, but this time they lost 3-1 to Nottingham Forest.

When Pleat re-joined the club during the summer of 1992 there was hope of further success, but the Hatters struggled all season and were finally relegated to the new First Division on the final day of the season at Notts County.

Last season proved a struggle for Pleat's young side, and they just avoided relegation, finishing 20th.

It looked at the start of the current campaign as though another relegation fight was on the cards, with only one win and four defeats in their first seven games, but a 5-0 home victory over Barnsley gave them encouragement – although it must be said that the Reds played with only ten men for 87 minutes after the sending-off of Gerry Taggart – and a recent run of good results, including a seven-match unbeaten spell, has led them to a position of comparative security.

They have also had a marvellous run in the F.A. Cup, the highlight of which was a 2-0 home replay win over Premiership Newcastle United in round four after they had accounted for Southend in the third round. A 2-1 away victory at Cardiff took them into the quarter-finals where they held West Ham United to a draw at Upton Park.

GOALS ARE usually the name of the game in matches between the Reds and Luton. In 39 League meetings there has never been a goalless draw! To go even further, Barnsley have never failed to score in any league matches here at Oakwell while Town have the same record in matches at Kenilworth Road.

Barnsley will, however, have it all to do to equal Town's score in the match at Luton earlier this season. They suffered the blow of having **Gerry Taggart** sent off inside the first five minutes; then fell behind to a 28th minute goal from **John Harston**, and just before the interval the 'Hatters' added a second through **Scott Oakes**.

After the break Town went nap thanks to further goals from **Scott Houghton**, **Julian James** and a second from **Oakes**.

Only once have Town recorded a bigger win over us. It came during the '52/53 season when, with Barnsley struggling to stay in the Second Division, the Hatters ran out 6-0 winners. At the season's end we lost our battle for survival and were relegated after gaining only 18 points during the entire campaign.

Last season here at Oakwell it was Barnsley's turn to record an emphatic victory and it turned out to be a superb home debut for **Wayne Biggins**. He opened the scoring in the third minute with a strike from the edge of the area and after **John Pearson** had added a second he completed the scoring with a cheeky back heel as we ran out 3-0 winners.

When the return took place at the end of February we had 39 points from 30 games while Town were

five points worse off having played the same number of games.

It was Town who took the lead after only 10 minutes through on loan striker **Kerry Dixon**. After the break the Reds hit back and two headed goals from **Brendan O'Connell** and **David Currie** looked likely to give Barnsley the points. However, with eight minutes remaining Luton got the equaliser when **Phil Gray** hit home a penalty after **Neil Redfearn** had handled.

Our biggest win over them came during the '50/51 season. The game here at Oakwell saw the legendary 'Cec' McCormack go nap as we ran out victors by six goals to one.

We have also scored four against them on three occasions. Here at Oakwell we beat them 4-0 during the '46/47 season. **Peter Cunningham, Beaumont, Asquith, Gavin Smith and George Robledo** being the marksmen.

Then, during the '81/82 campaign the teams fought out a

thrilling encounter with Barnsley running out 4-3 victors. **Colin Walker** got a couple and **Ian Banks** along with **Ian Evans** got the others. **Brian Stein** also bagged a brace with the other Town strike coming courtesy of a **Nicky Law** own goal.

We also hit four at Kenilworth Road during the '65/66 season but still came away empty handed as Luton won 5-4.

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# FIRST GLANCE

## Graham Turner becomes latest manager to quit

GRAHAM TURNER became the latest First Division managerial casualty when he resigned last week as manager of Wolves after seven-and-a-half years in charge.

With Turner's No. 2 Gary Pendry also quitting, club captain Peter Shirtliff was left to take charge for the game against Grimsby Town last Saturday.

Turner, under pressure from the fans, bowed out after defeats at Chelsea in the F.A. Cup quarter-finals and Portsmouth in the League, leaving the club with a lot of ground to make up if they are to snatch a promotion play-off spot.

He joined Wolves in October 1986 and in his first season the club just missed promotion to the Third Division, losing in the play-offs to Aldershot. He made up for that disappointment the following season by leading his side to the Fourth Division championship.

They went on to record another championship success in the Third Division and also carried off the Sherpa Van Trophy.

Turner has, however, been unable to make any real impression on the new First Division, despite spending a large amount of Sir Jack Hayward's cash, and now he has paid the penalty for his failure to lead the club back into the top flight which its magnificent new stadium deserves.

Amongst the early front-runners for the job were former England manager Graham Taylor, ex-England captain Bryan Robson and former Everton manager Howard Kendall.

Bolton Wanderers' F.A. Cup hero Jason McAteer has found himself a wanted man in more ways than one since the Trotters' televised run plunged him into the national spotlight.

His asking price has soared to £2 million as the top clubs cast envious eyes in his direction - and four international teams have been

battling each other to secure his services!

The lure of a possible World Cup Finals appearance with The Republic of Ireland in America this summer finally held sway, leaving Jack Charlton delighted, and England, Northern Ireland and Wales, for all of whom McAteer was eligible, desperately disappointed.

Charlton was possibly rewarded for being quickest off the mark. His USA invitation was delivered in person to the 22-year-old immediately after Wanderers' unlucky F.A. Cup quarter-final defeat by Oldham and Burnden Park.

Oxford United have submitted an outline planning application to their local City Council for a new 15,000 seat stadium in the Blackbird Leys area. The development would also include a conference centre, extensive car parking and a number of leisure facilities to meet the needs and suggestions of Oxfordshire residents.

Managing director Keith Cox commented: "We have to meet the deadline set by the Taylor Report to produce a workable solution to the needs of the club and time is running out for that decision to be made.

"The scheme has caught the imagination of many thousands of people in the City and County. They are asking us to get on with the plans and build a new stadium with additional facilities for the use of future generations."

Oxford are currently celebrating the centenary of the club with a special exhibition at the Museum of Oxford which will run until May 14.

Using photographs, video and sound archive footage and memorabilia collected from supporters themselves, the exhibition captures a very important part of the area's local culture and history. A programme of talks on the First Division Club has been arranged, with the first in the series featuring former manager Maurice Evans and player Jeremy Charles, recalling their 1986 Milk Cup Final experiences.

It would be ironic, would it not, if all this coincided with the U's relegation to the Second Division.....?



## TODAY'S REFEREE



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
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# TALKING SOCCER

AN APPEARANCE at Wembley Stadium used to be the pinnacle of a player's career. To play there in an F.A. Cup Final or an international used to have a special magic of its own.

But not any more.

We've had the Leyland Daf Trophy Final, the Sherpa Van, the Autoglass, the Milk-Littlewood-Rumbelows-Coca-Cola-League Cup Final, the promotion play-off finals - and now, semi-finals of the world's most compelling domestic knock-out cup competition are to be a regular item on the increasingly busy Wembley agenda.

There is some logic in it when such a fixture involves two London teams, although even then I do not hold with the idea. But why should Manchester United and Oldham fans have to make the long trip south when the game could be staged perfectly well here in the north?

But even that argument misses the point. Wembley should be the goal; the end of the journey, the glorious light at the end of the tunnel, the thrilling climax.

An F.A. Cup Final has a special aura of its own. But it is being cheapened and undermined by the lust for money.

Sadly it is typical of the way football as a whole is going, even down to the thousands of youngsters playing in the local parks throughout the country every weekend.

It seems that every player in every team earns a man-of-the-match award at some stage in the season. At the presentation evenings it takes hours to hand out all the trophies because each member of the team receives the obligatory piece of silverware.

Some may see this as a good thing. They may feel it encourages those who would not otherwise win anything in their lives. And there is nothing wrong with the sentiment.

Unfortunately what such all-encompassing rewards do is take away the desire to improve; the satisfaction of real achievement at the highest level. It is too easy to win something. And therefore ambition is stifled.

The same argument could be used with regard to players' wages. Some players of no outstanding merit find themselves on such lucrative contracts that their hunger, their appetite for the game itself diminishes. The pickings are too easy. Why over-exert yourself?

Little wonder, then, that a Wembley appearance, in an F.A. Cup Final or in an England shirt, is not regarded with the same wonder as in the past.

It is no longer an honour reserved for the best.

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# OAKWELL CENTURIONS

## BRIAN ARBLASTER:

### 1968 - 1974

IMMEDIATELY after Brian Arblaster's second game in goal for Barnsley he had the distressing experience of being told by manager John Steele that it had been a mistake to sign him. This followed a match against Luton Town in which he was beaten five times. Yet after a period of apparent disgrace he redeemed himself, and in the 1970/71 season was one of only two men to play in all 51 league and cup games.

Previously with Sheffield United, Chesterfield and Scunthorpe, Brian's Luton debacle was in August 1968. In every respect it was a miserable evening and at the end of the game Brian was cold, wet and thoroughly dejected. But worse was to come. No longer was he to train with the first team and the one consolation was that coach Norman Rimmington - himself a former goalkeeper - hadn't lost faith in him.

During that anxious time, while playing in a reserve game at Oakwell, he threw the ball from the edge of the penalty-area to a young triallist standing in the centre-circle. The other promptly volleyed it back over Brian's head and into the empty net - an action unlikely to help restore a goalkeeper's sagging self-esteem!

Nevertheless, come November he was back in the first team when in a game at Bristol Rovers a finger of his left hand was almost severed in a complicated dislocation. Yet he played in the following match with the injury protected by a heavily padded glove simply because no-one else was available.

In fact he played so well that in reporting the game in the *Barnsley Chronicle*, Keith Lodge said the second half was mainly a case of Southport *versus* Arblaster, and Brian had given one of the most magnificent displays of goalkeeping he had ever seen.

The same sentiment was echoed by the Plymouth Argyle chairman after the Reds played there in the following season, and soon afterwards Fulham tried to sign him. The club's refusal instilled in him a belief that "When you're doing well they won't let you go, and if you play badly no-one wants to know you!"

Injury brought about his eventual departure. In a practice match he was exercising goalkeepers' usual liking for outfield roles when a tackle from a groundstaff boy fractured his ankle, and at the season's end his

contract was not renewed.

Later he became a part-timer with Boston United, and in 1975 he moved to Matlock Town. In the following season the FA Cup took them onto a Football League ground for the first time in their history when they were drawn at Mansfield Town, and an historic occasion developed into a delightful event as they beat the home side quite decisively 5-2.

He remained at Matlock for six years until retiring from the game in 1981 when he was 38 years old.


Of Brian's 17 seasons in professional football, those spent at Barnsley were by far the happiest. Yet he retains an element of bitterness that his years of total commitment, during which he received some serious injuries and returned to the side on occasions when not fully fit simply because there wasn't anyone else available, were not acknowledged by way of a benefit.

An instance of such hasty return was a goalless draw at Reading in 1973. It was within days of plaster being removed from a damaged ankle, and afterwards the Reading manager said, "If he plays as well as that with a half-healed ankle I should hate him to face us when he's fit!"

John Steele replied, "He may not be the best goalkeeper in the Football League but he's certainly the bravest."

Those comments perhaps summed-up Brian's career, for while he never collected any trophies he won praise and admiration all along the way.

# ON THE BALL

... with GREG MORGAN

AT THE END of last season Greg Morgan and Nicky Eaden found themselves in the devastating situation of being told that they were going to be released.

Now Eaden is a first-team regular and Morgan is on the fringe, having been a member of the senior squad for numerous away fixtures this season.

Fortunes changed dramatically for the two of them with the departure of former manager Mel Machin after the penultimate game of last season. When he left, Eric Winstanley, Mick Wadsworth and John Benson were left to review the situation, and they decided to give the two youngsters a reprieve.

Says Greg: "I was resigned to looking around in the summer for another club. I was determined to stay in football, because it was all I had ever wanted to do. But obviously I was feeling pretty down.

"You can imagine how I felt when I was told I was being kept on."

He had joined the club as an associate schoolboy after being watched by Eric Winstanley playing against Barnsley Schools' Under 15s and on leaving school he signed on the YTS Scheme.

Now 20, he is now in his second year as a full-time professional.

His dad wanted him to stay on at school and continue with his studies, but Greg was adamant that football was going to come first.

"I wanted nowt to do with staying on at school. I'd had enough of it. And I didn't fancy going part-time as a footballer. I wanted to give myself the best chance of making a career in the game."

Had he wanted to find employment elsewhere he had good qualifications, with eight GCSEs in English language, English literature, maths, history, geography, German, chemistry and physics - and he has also picked up an A level equivalent in Sports and Leisure as a result of a B-Tec course while he was serving on the YTS.

As well as playing for Batley High School he also had representative honours with Spen Valley and West Yorkshire Boys and played for a Sunday League team, Ossett Trinitarians.

At the same time as he was picked up by Eric Winstanley, a team-mate, Jeremy Wright, was taken on associate schoolboy forms by Sheffield Wednesday. Sadly, he was released last season.

"I can fully appreciate how he felt. I'm just relieved still to be at Oakwell. And I must admit I've been really happy here this season.

"Viv and Danny have made a big difference generally. I feel a lot more at ease now. The atmosphere is so much more relaxed. You couldn't really have a laugh and a joke under the previous manager. Now it's really fun to be here and as a result the team spirit is great.

"Hopefully results are coming right as well now, and I'm sure we'll get out of trouble. I'm happy to be where I am; to be involved; and I wouldn't want to go anywhere else."

Greg has been involved this season playing mainly with the Reserves, but also travelling to away matches with the first team squad.

"I've really enjoyed the experience. I was even sub on one occasion! But even when I haven't been in the 14 on duty at the actual game I've been made to feel very much part of the first team set-up.

"I was disheartened last season because I didn't think I was given a fair chance. Now I have. And I'm determined to take it. Initially I want to get in the team and then earn a regular place, just like Nicky has done; so I can prove certain people wrong. And repay Viv, Danny and Eric for the faith they've shown in me."

Greg owes a particular debt of gratitude to Winstanley, who, he says "has been a great influence on my career so far. He's always been there for encouragement and advice."

Having grown up in the Batley area Greg was, coincidentally, born in the same hospital as colleague Neil Redfearn - Stancliffe, at Dewsbury.

His father, David, played Rugby League with Dewsbury Moor and once had a trial with Huddersfield.

Outside football Greg also enjoys a game of snooker, and he has a girlfriend, Paula, who also comes from Batley.

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



FORMER Barnsley coach Mick Buxton, whose home is still in the Barnsley area, returns to Oakwell on Tuesday night as manager of a Sunderland team which, like the Reds, is still fighting to gain a position of First Division safety.

While the Rokerites problems are not as acute as those of Viv Anderson's side they cannot afford to relax, otherwise all the good work done by Buxton since taking over the reins from Terry Butcher at the end of November will be nullified.
