LUTON TOWN

The last few seasons have not been easy ones for Luton Town. Relegated from the old First Division at the end of the 1991-92 season, the following campaign saw another year of struggle when David Pleat's young side finished twentieth as they came to terms with their new surroundings.

There were hopes that this term would see the team reach greater heights - and to a certain extent, those hopes have been realised. While there is still some work required in ensuring First Division football at Kenilworth Road next season, Luton can point to a successful run in the FA Cup. That run took them to a Wembley semi-final with Chelsea ten days ago, a tie they lost 2-0.

That Cup run and, at times, promising League form is, perhaps, testimony to the increasing maturity of the young players at the Club. It did take time to forge relationships and team understanding but manager Pleat had little option but to 'blood' his promising youngsters last season following an exodus of experienced players. They had to be sold to raise capital as financial pressures mounted.

With any young side, it is important to have a degree of experience and that is supplied by defender Trevor Peake, midfielder David Preece and forward Kerry Dixon.

Dixon, who came to the Club for the last three months

of the 1992-93 season on loan from Southampton, helped save the Club from relegation. He not only linked up with Northern Ireland striker Phil Gray, who moved to Sunderland in the close season, but also supplied valuable knowledge of the game to all around him.


The Cup run has left the Hatters with a busy end to the season and whilst they have a 'cushion' on the bottom three or four, they will want to ensure that there is no repeat of the nail-biting end to the season they experienced last term. Then safety was not secured until the last day of the season.

Certainly this time, they are better off with their home form and results so far this season, suggesting that there are enough games at Kenilworth Road left to ensure safety. On their travels, Luton have not fared well with only two wins from nineteen League games to date.

They are likely to select from the following players this evening:

Goalkeeper **Juergen Sommer** has been first choice this season and is staking a claim for a place in the USA's World Cup squad. The New York born custodian joined Luton in August 1991 from Indiana University and has also had loan spells at Brighton and Torquay. He has kept Australian born **Andy Petterson** on the bench.

Andy originally came to the club on trial from the Australian Institute of Sport and was offered a contract four years ago. He, too, has been out on loan - at Swindon and Ipswich.



Trevor Peake

In front of them, Club captain **Trevor Peake** is the mainstay of the defence. Trevor began his career at Lincoln City in 1979 before moving to Coventry City four years later. He enjoyed eight seasons at Highfield Road winning an FA Cup Winners medal in 1987. He joined Luton in August 1991 for a £100,000 fee and has been an inspirational captain.

At the heart of the defence, he has

been partnered by another experienced campaigner in **John Dreyer**. The former Oxford defender came to Kenilworth Road in 1988 and has been a regular member of the side since. Waiting in the wings is young **David Greene**. A Republic of Ireland Under 21 international, the 20 year old has made rapid strides and has featured in the side this season after making his League bow in March 1993.

At full-back, former Leicester man **Des Linton** has been a regular along with former trainee **Julian James**. A former England Under 21 international, Julian was introduced to First Division football five years ago when only nineteen.

Injury has limited the appearances of **Richard Harvey** while fans favourite **Marvin Johnson**, who can play anywhere in the back line could well come into contention.

In midfield, **David Preece** imparts a great deal of influence. David started out at Walsall in 1981 and was signed by the Hatters three years later for £150,000. He has won three England 'B' caps while **Ceri Hughes**, another regular in the engine room is a full Welsh international. He could miss this evening's game after being taken to hospital last week after collapsing in the dressing room at half-time.

If he is missing then ex-trainee **Jason Rees** could come back into contention. Another Welshman, he is an important squad member and is himself an Under 21 international. To complete a truly 'British' midfield, Scotsman **Paul Telfer**, another former trainee, has established himself on the right side and has also operated at full-back.


Up front, **Scott Oakes** is the likely partner for the experienced **Kerry Dixon**. Scott is an English Under 21 international who started as a trainee at Leicester. He moved from Filbert Street in 1991 as part of the deal that took Steve Thompson to Leicester.

Dixon, in addition to his three month's on loan at the end of last season, had a further two months on a temporary basis before signing permanently in October 1993 on a free transfer. His career began at Reading, before joining Chelsea in 1983 for £175,000. It was a fee three times that that took him to Southampton in July 1992.

Nineteen year old **John Hartson** has proved to be a prolific scorer at young and reserve team levels and scored on his League debut against Nottingham Forest in August. Of late he has been on the substitutes' bench as has **Scott Houghton**.

Scott was a schoolboy player at Kenilworth Road but joined Tottenham as a trainee. First team opportunities at White Hart Lane were limited and loan spells at Ipswich, Gillingham and Charlton followed. He came to Luton on a 'performance related' transfer in August 1993 while **Tony Thorpe** has tasted first team football this term following a spell at Leicester.

Manager's Profile



DAVID PLEAT

Now in his third spell with the club, it was at Kenilworth Road that David made a name for himself as a player and a manager.

He began his playing career at Nottingham Forest, but played only six games before joining The Hatters in 1964. In 1967, he was transferred to Shrewsbury Town and later played for Exeter and Peterborough before retiring in 1971.

Three years later, he returned to Luton as reserve team coach after a spell in charge at non-league Nuneaton Borough. In 1970, David was promoted to first team coaching duties, finally being appointed manager in 1978 in succession to Harry Haslam.

He guided Luton into the First Division in 1982 before joining Tottenham Hotspur and leading them to an FA Cup Final appearance. From there, it was on to the manager's job at Leicester City where he remained for almost four years, until leaving in January 1991.

Six months later, he was back at Luton and in the time since, he has brought on a number of promising youngsters on whom the Club's future depends. Progress has been made, and this season, of course, he has guided his side to the semi-finals of the FA Cup.

Our thanks to the Junior Reds who turned up to play football against these guests and despite the poor ground conditions and torrential rain, stayed around in an attempt to play our visitors. In fact two teams of Under 8s did complete a match and matches at Under 16 and 10 levels were started before torrential rain, which threatened the City v Grimsby match, caused the abandonment at half-time of these two games. We cannot praise highly enough the behaviour of our Juniors who uncomplainingly accepted the inevitable!

At our next home game with Watford on Saturday, we once

more have guests, but mainly at the younger age levels. Hopefully, weather conditions will be more acceptable and we will be able to provide those Juniors who missed out on the previous occasion with a final game of the season.

The last Junior Reds trip for this season was last Saturday when we travelled to Birmingham, and once more this trip was a sell out. Next season, because of the increasing demand for the Junior Red trips, a booking system will be implemented and details of this will be included in the newsletter which will be sent to members in the close season.

Our last away mascots were Andy Ward (Charlton), Craig Millett (Southend), Matthew Sims (Bolton), Daniel Braddick (Nottingham Forest) and Jamie Taylor (Birmingham).





Profile on.... **SCOTT PARTRIDGE**

When Scott Partridge was released by Bradford City just before Christmas, he had thoughts of giving up the game but his father Malcolm, a former professional with Leicester, Mansfield, Grimsby and Scunthorpe persuaded him to have faith in himself.


"I probably would have given up had it not been for my Dad. he had believed in my ability from my schoolboy days and told me to keep my head up. As he kept telling me football is all about a matter of opinions and while Bradford were prepared to let me go, there would be other clubs who might be interested in me."

And so it turned out, Scott came to Ashton Gate, initially on a week's trial and ended up with a professional contract, and ten days ago, after two substitute appearances, made his full League debut against Grimsby.

"The game went by very quickly. The pace of the game was not a lot different to what I've been used to but I found that I had to concentrate more on the simple things. At first team level, you come across better players, of course, and your touch needs to be better. I thought I had scored near the end with a shot on the turn and that would have rounded things off nicely but when Martin Scott scored the penalty that made my week."

Sadly, his Dad was unable to make it to Ashton Gate for the game owing to work commitments but hopes to take in a game before the end of the season.

"I'm sure Dad would have loved to have been here for the Grimsby game - after all they were one of his former clubs but although he has given me advice along the way, he's not really got involved and although sometimes you feel that you have been living in the shadows, it really has hampered my progress. I just hope that I can build on my first full game and become a regular - and a few goals would be nice, too."

BRISTOL CITY FOOTBALL SUPPORTERS CLUB

A BRIEF HISTORY

The first real foundations of the Supporters Club as it is today were laid way back in the 1949 season.

In this year some City supporters decided to run coaches to away games, and it was on the way home from one such trip that the possibility of forming a Supporters Club was discussed.

A public meeting was called on 9th October 1949 at a public house in central Bristol

Membership forms were handed out, and meetings were held over the next few months at the Bathurst Hotel, Prince Street; The Ship, Redcliffe Hill, and later The Rising Sun, Ashton.

During the war, the wooden grandstand then at Ashton Gate was destroyed. The Board at that time wanted to replace it. But it couldn't be completed because the Club had used their allocation of steel, which was rationed at the time.

It was suggested that the Supporters Club applied for an allocation, which they did, and the stand was duly finished. The Football Club then handed over a room for the Supporters to use. This opened for the first time in 1955.

In 1965 the Clubroom was made twice the original size, as it was such a success.

Since the Supporters Club formation around £330,000 had been made in donations to the Football Club. £120,000 of this has been given since 1984.

THE PRESENT

The Club does not concentrate all its fund raising to benefit the football Club however. The Hospital Broadcasts and Marie Curie Cancer Care Charity are just two of the organisations to benefit from donations.

Recently some members from the Club have taken part in the Premier League Challenge, visiting all the Premier League grounds in twenty-four hours, collecting a souvenir from each club on the way.

Following this recent Driving Challenge, there are a number of items for auction at the Player of the Year presentation evening on Sunday, 8th May.

At the present time the Club has over 700 members. These are spread far and wide, for example; The Ohio University, Colorado; Australia and a newly formed branch in Norway. As far as this country goes, there are branches in London, Bridgwater, Cheltenham and Gloucester.

THE FUTURE




Together with a now growing membership, the future does indeed look bright.





A MAN WITH A MISSION

Geoff Clements has spent much of his first six weeks as City's general manager buried under a mountain of paperwork.

But the man charged by the Board with responsibility for revamping the entire administration and commercial operation at Ashton Gate plans to emerge as a high-profile figure, well known to supporters and trusted to ensure they have a major say in all matters of club policy.

Geoff was appointed back in December, but only started work on March 1st. While his first brief is to report on ways of improving day-to-day efficiency, he has already taken on the extra task of dealing with all letters of praise or complaint from the fans.

"I want our customers to know that I am the person to contact. Hopefully, in time they will get to know me better and I shall have more time to deal with the supporters on a personal basis," he says.

"Already, I can assure them that every letter will receive an answer. That is basic courtesy as far as the Board is concerned and I spend a lot of my day on correspondence. A big part of my job is to make Bristol City more supporter-friendly."

That aspect of Geoff's work will increase further as time goes on. For the moment, he is chiefly concerned with giving City an administrative and commercial structure capable of dealing with the volume of business generated by Premiership clubs.

"That was the point made most forcibly by the Board at my interview and the fact that I was given the job back in December enabled me to view operations during January and February when the club was really working at Premier capacity due to the FA Cup success.

"It was manifestly clear to me by the time I started work in March that the systems needed overhauling. I have been given a very wide mandate to change anything that can be done more quickly or cost effectively.

"That part of my work is underway. I am

interviewing every member of the administration and ground maintenance staff to find out what they do and why they do it. I am making copious notes and once that task is completed I shall try to re-create the structure to make it more efficient.

"It may mean taking on extra members of staff. But the most important thing is that the system is right and in place for when the club moves into the Premiership. When I have finished investigating the work of each individual department, I shall report my findings and recommendations to the Board."

Not all Geoff's work is long-term. On his first day at Ashton Gate he made a point of altering the manner in which the telephones were answered when dealing with outside enquiries. "I had a lot of feedback on that. People immediately recognised that Bristol City had put on a new face," he says.

"I'm not knocking what went on before, but it's fair to say that the public perception of the club was that it was not as caring as it should have been."

Improving public relations is very much part of Geoff's job and he is very conscious of the need to build close ties with the media to boost City's profile and improve communication with supporters.

"It was mentioned to me that we were short of a press room which the media could use on matchdays. I passed the criticism on to one of the Directors and within 48 hours that facility was provided," he said.

"I think that shows the Board's commitment to fostering a good relationship with press, radio and television. We need their help and they need ours, so the closer ties that can be forged the better."

Stadium development was another aspect of the job handed to Geoff when he became the successful applicant of the general manager's role. But little did he realise at the time that within a month of starting work, he would be watching terracing being torn down for the construction of a new £1.5 million stand.

"That's another thing that has caused a bit of delay in the structure changes I was called upon to treat as top priority. But it's such an exciting prospect because the stand is going to be magnificent, with top class facilities for our supporters."

"We are talking about seats with backs, uninterrupted viewing, high quality toilet facilities at two levels and two tea bars with covered standing area where people can enjoy a drink and something to eat."


Having been a staunch City supporter for most of his life, Geoff believes he is well equipped to understand the feelings of fans. He appreciates that what may appear minor problems can be extremely aggravating and is prepared to investigate even the smallest complaints first hand.

One example is recent criticism he has received about the quality of the public address system at Ashton Gate. Having received several letters about it, Geoff spent the home game with West Bromwich Albion sitting in seven different positions around the ground to gauge how clearly it could be heard.

"I confess that there were some parts of the ground where I couldn't understand what was being said," he admits. "The Board were aware of a problem, but now I have reaffirmed it and I am sure some action will be taken to remedy the situation in the near future."

One visit to Geoff's office is sufficient to convince anyone of his enthusiasm and dedication to the job. His desk is usually piled high with papers. He works long hours and admits there is a long way to go before the work he has undertaken reaps its full reward.

But his commitment derives from the firm belief he shares with the Directors who appointed him. "This club will be going into the Premiership," he says. "And when it does, I intend to ensure the administration and commercial set-up is functioning in a manner that gives us every chance of staying there."


