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WOLVES

MOLINEUX — PRIDE

Good afternoon and welcome to Molineux for the visit of Luton Town. With only four league games left of the season, it's going right to the wire this season. Some excellent recent results have given us every chance of reaching the play-offs come the last day of the season. Please note at the last game of the season, here Molineux against Leicester City, has been put back 24 hours to Sunday 8th May, kicking off at 3pm.

ONLY TREBLE

Our one hat-trick in a league game against Luton was scored by Kenny Hibbitt in our 5-2 win in March 1975, in Division One. No Luton player has yet scored a hat-trick against us.

Going right to the wire



LONG OVERDUE

We may feel that we are long overdue a win today as we have lost each of our last three games here against Luton by a 2-1 margin. This season's welcome win at Kenilworth Road was our first since October 1959 when we won 5-1 there. We had lost by exactly the same score line on our first Football League visit there in November 1955 when Roy Swinbourne, who had scored 17 goals in 14 games up to that point that season, suffered the injury that was to end his highly promising career.

The Odds

Guy Whittingham's goals have put us right back on the play-off trail, and he's 7/2 to open the scoring today. Steve Bull is 7/2 to add to his tally for the season, and Tom Bennett is 33/1 to follow his return to the side after a lengthy absence with a goal. Mark Burke will know today's opponents better than anyone in the Wolves' squad after a loan spell at Kenilworth Road, as he proved with the opening goal in our victory at Kenilworth Road two weeks ago. He is 10/1 to score first.

Scott Oakes attracted some rave reviews during Luton's Cup run, and he is 8/1 to find the net first. David Preece has enjoyed another fine season in the Hatter's midfield, and the former Walsall man, born in Bridgnorth, is 22/1 to score first today.

A repeat of the scoreline from Bedfordshire, 2-0 to Wolves, is 6/1, but a 2-1 win for Luton, repeating their success here of last year, is 16/1. A 2-2 draw is 16/1.

THE MATCH

IN ATTENDANCE

The highest gate here for a game against Luton Town was the 46,781 in March 1957 that saw us win a cracking game 5-4, while the smallest was 11,594 in January 1984 as we slipped towards relegation from the old Division One. The biggest ever attendance for this fixture at Kenilworth Road was the 27,911 for our first Football League visit there in November 1955 and the lowest was the 7,948 that saw Steve Bull earn us a 1-1 draw last April.

CUP DUELS

Despite our unhappy League record at Luton we have won both our FA Cup ties there, 2-1 in the third round in 1931/2 and 4-1 in the fifth round in 1959/60. The Hatters, however, won 3-2 here in the second round of the League Cup in 1977/8.

Thrust into the national spotlight thanks to an inspired run in the FA Cup this season, Luton Town are once again benefitting from the experience of manager David Pleat. A team that mixes youth, such as Scott Oakes and Paul Telfer, with experience, such as Trevor Peake and Kerry Dixon, made the headlines with victories over Newcastle and West Ham in the Cup, although Chelsea put an end to their Cup aspirations in the semi-final at Wembley, as they did ours in the previous round. But Pleat knows that First Division survival is a more vital priority than another visit to the Empire Stadium, and our 2-0 victory at Kenilworth Town will not have helped the Hatter's cause. Last weekend they also succumbed to Crystal Palace, 1-0, and on Tuesday they lost by the same score at Bristol City.



BORROWING WILL

We played Luton in the Midland Regional League a total of four times in 1939/40, during the first season of wartime football. We beat them 4-1 and 6-1 here, drew 2-2 and lost 3-0 at Luton. Remarkably Luton were a player short when they arrived for the game here on December 30, 1939 and borrowed 15 year old William Burgwin, one of our groundstaff lads.



NO MERCY

The Hatters were shown no mercy in the 1959-60 season. We won 4-1 at Luton in the FA Cup in February 1960 just four months after winning 5-1 in a League game there. That year, of course, we went on to win the trophy beating Blackburn Rovers 3-0 at Wembley. In February of that season we triumphed 3-2 at Molineux, therefore scoring 12 against The Hatters that term. The goals were scored by Deeley (2), Booth, Murray (3), Broadbent (2), Clamp, Mason (2) and Horne.



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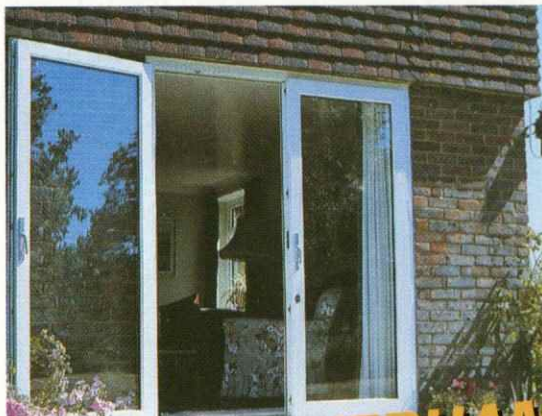
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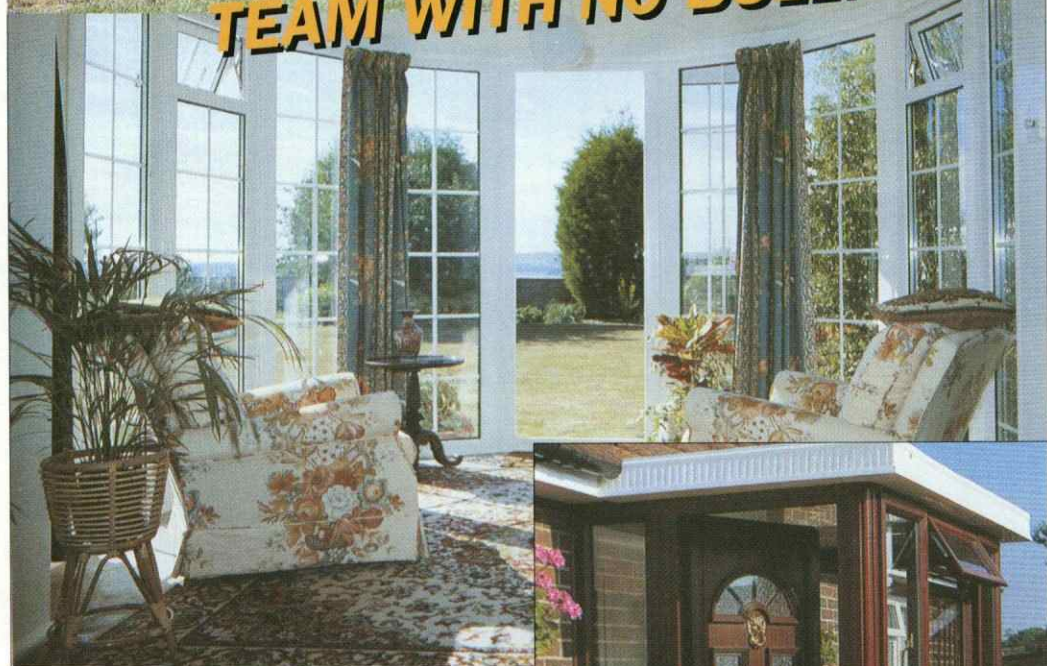
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I'm sure our supporters' disappointment matched that of the players and myself on Wednesday night, losing as we did 1-0 away to Millwall. Overall I thought we performed well but we needed to score in the first half when we were in charge of the game. To go in at the half-time interval a goal up could have made all the difference. But we didn't, and that is now history.

With four games to go it is vital that the players keep their nerve and remember that what counts is our position after 46 games not 42. We still have a chance of reaching the play-offs and with three of our last four games being played at Molineux, your support could be decisive. When you talk to players about the effect the crowd can have on their individual and team performance, you understand just how important a part supporters can play. So please, I would ask you to get behind the team, and give them every encouragement — we really are in this together.

With everything still to play for we must not let our defeat at Millwall play on our minds. To have come away from the New Den on Wednesday night with three

points would have put us in a play-off position, and people may have felt that we'd "cracked-it". That could have been a danger in itself so we'd better all get used to it going right through to the last game of the season on May 8.

In the dressing room we've got a good atmosphere and self belief and it's so important to build on this. Games may be running out but our confidence and commitment is not. Mentally, the players are in the right frame of mind: they know it's not going to be easy but they are determined to give it their best shot. Perhaps it might

be different if we were mid table and out of contention, but there is still everything to play for — and my sights are set firmly on that sixth placed spot.

There is absolutely nothing we can do to influence the results of those teams currently above us in the league, so my approach at this stage is very straightforward: forget about what other teams are doing — let them worry about us. There are 12 points to play for and that's the target the players and myself are aiming at — now that's something we can influence!

Enjoy the match!

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Ending Up

The statistics show that Wolves much prefer to attack the Stan Cullis Stand — the end of Molineux that has become known as the 'home end' — in the second half of home matches. But is it necessarily a lucky policy?

Up to the visit of Peterborough two weeks ago, the side had kicked towards the Jack Harris Stand first in 19 home games out of 24, with results that have obviously been too mixed for our liking.

But the other five matches, with us playing supposedly the wrong way first, reveal some interesting facts. We have won three of them, drawn one and lost only one. And those victories include our two biggest home wins of the season — 3-0 against both Notts County and Birmingham City.

So, perhaps attacking the 'lucky' end is not so lucky after all.

Lee Mills' sweetly-struck winner in the game against Tranmere at the start of the month brought back some happy memories.

It was swept into Eric Nixon's net in a manner which reminded him of his special in the televised FA Cup victory at Ipswich a month earlier.

Bad Manor

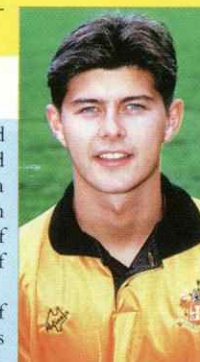
It's strange how certain grounds seem to emerge as jinx venues for clubs.

In Wolves' case, Brighton's Goldstone Ground used to be a place to dread and, in the recent past, Bristol City, Middlesbrough and Tranmere have proved difficult destinations to glean points from.

Now, perhaps we can add Oxford to the list of 'places to miss' after our Easter Monday crash of a few weeks ago.

Last season's 0-0 draw at the Manor Ground was preceded in the previous term by a 1-0 defeat, with none of the performances anything to write home about.

It seems hard to believe that we have never won there but at least one man — Tom Bennett — left Oxford earlier this month in better heart than after one of his previous visits. It was exactly two years earlier to the day, on April 4 in 1992, that Tom was caught by a poor tackle and consigned to a lengthy absence from the game with knee problems.



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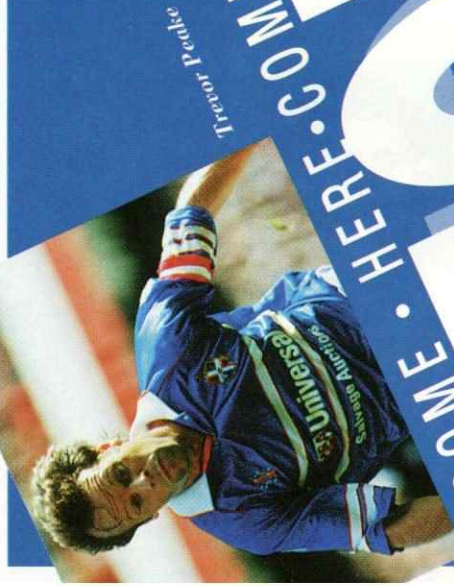
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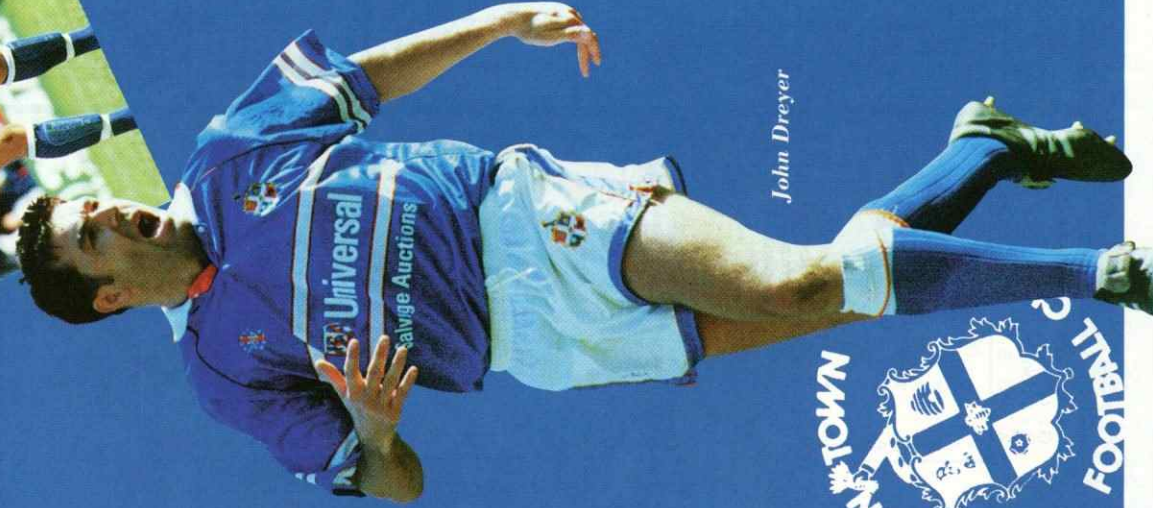
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England, and in fact at every level. Everything he tells you has got to be good advice, coming from a man of that kind of calibre."

Hartson is aware that Luton's Cup run has thrust the team's young stars into the spotlight and that there is a danger bigger clubs will dismantle the side by making big bids. "That's the way it's been in the past here but David Pleat is telling us he'd really like to keep the team together. He's got a blend of youth and experience now, with Peake, Dixon and Harper, then Scott Oakes and the rest. But obviously if a big club comes in with a massive amount of money then it's sometimes hard to keep hold of players. That must be tough for a manager."

After the thrills and spills of their brilliant FA Cup run, Luton went into Tuesday night's First Division match at Bristol City with games in hand but only two places above the relegation zone and without a goal in a run of four consecutive defeats. The poor run continued at Ashton Gate with a single goal reversal.

David Pleat's side led the march of the Endleigh League troops knocking out the big guns from the Premiership right up until the semi-final defeat by

Chelsea. That disappointment was swiftly followed of course by an excellent game with Wolves 11 days ago which we won 2-0 on the squeakiest of Bedfordshire pitches.

The ever-ebullient Pleat, who made his name in management in his first spell at Kenilworth Road between 1978 and 1986, was anything but disheartened afterwards and vowed to give the youngsters their head in the final games of the season. Pleat also took Spurs to the '87 Cup Final but it has been as a manager obliged to unearth and nurture young talent that he has proven outstandingly capable. He took Luton up into the First Division in 1982, and produced and sold players such as Kingsley Black, Mark Pembridge, Matt Jackson and Mitchell Thomas. Last summer he sold Northern Ireland striker Phil Gray to Sunderland for £750,000. But the current batch of youngsters takes some beating. Around the experienced backbone of 37-year-old skipper Trevor Peake at the back, former Evertonian Alan Harper and ex-Walsall favourite David Preece in midfield and Kerry Dixon up front, Pleat has fleshed out the side with some exciting players.

In attack today, we're likely to see the bounding enthusiasm of Wales under-21 cap John Hartson, just 19 and in his first season as a professional. "It's gone really well for me. I've been involved in 35 games, scored in a Cup and that really helped my confidence," said Hartson, who described the live televised fourth-round replay against Newcastle as "the best night of my life in football."

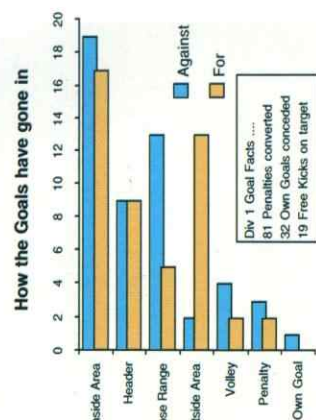
Swansea-born Hartson has benefited from studying, and occasionally playing alongside, nine-goal Kerry Dixon this season. "He's played at the top level, for

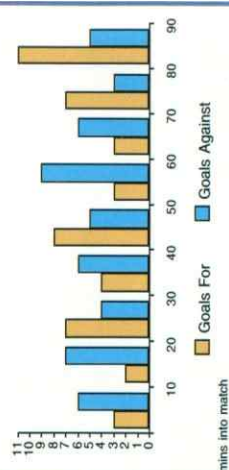
Cyrille Beach, Luton's scout in Wales, is evidently a valued member of Pleat's backroom team. Winger Ceri Hughes, 23, collected his second cap for Wales recently, and he looked in keen form against us last week, while Jason Rees has also won a Welsh cap.

Scott Oakes, 21, reared by Pleat at Leicester and then bought cheaply for Luton, has finally realised his potential during the Cup run, catching fire and bagging a hat-trick against West Ham. He looked exhausted against us, and was substituted in last Saturday's 1-0 defeat by Crystal Palace. Oakes is probably the pick of the bunch, scoring possibly the best goal Luton fans will ever see against Derby in January. Pleat described that as one of his most rewarding moments in football management.

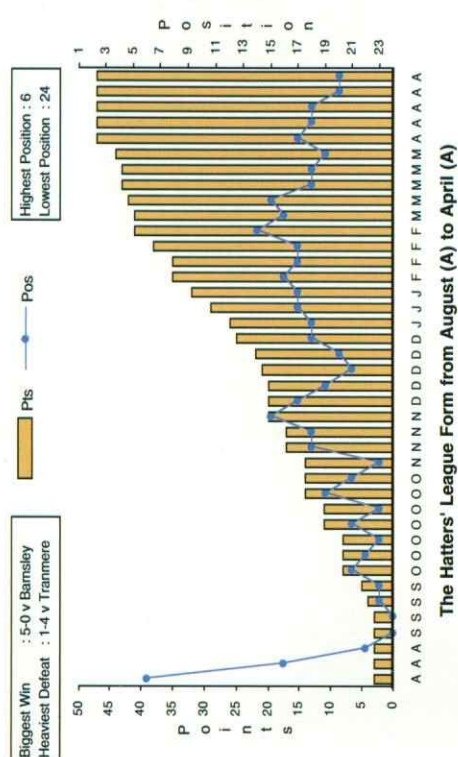
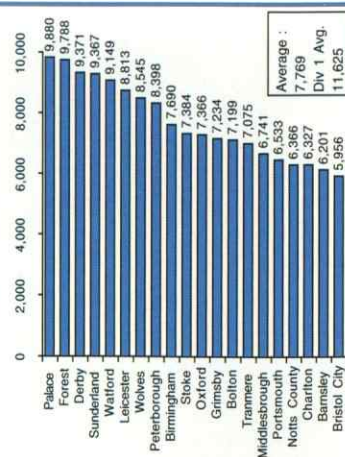

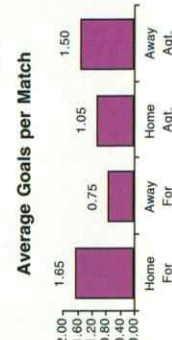
Gates at Kenilworth Road



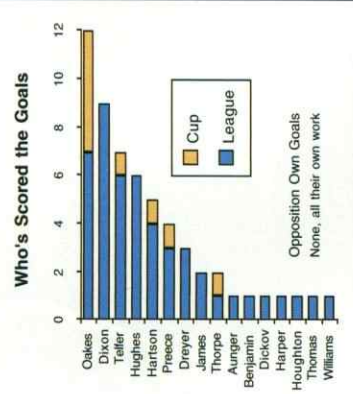
The Hatters' League Form from August (A) to April (A)



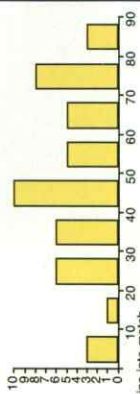

GUY WHITTINGHAM

Striker Guy Whittingham has re-discovered his goal touch with a vengeance since joining Wolves on loan from Aston Villa. Last season's top scorer in England (he hit 47 goals for Portsmouth), Guy joined Villa in a £1.2 million deal last August but had scored just three times in 18 appearances before his temporary switch to Molineux six weeks ago.

Though he failed to find the net in his first three Wolves outings, he then hit a rich goal seam with seven in seven matches before Wednesday's trip to Millwall. The former army PE instructor is still ambitious to make the grade with Villa in the Premiership — but in the meanwhile he is doing everything he can to help Wolves join Villa in the top flight.

Born in Evesham but brought up in Cheltenham, the 29 year old striker spent seven years in the army before stepping into professional soccer with Portsmouth in 1989. His scoring record with Pompey was of Bully-like proportions — Guy bagged 104 goals in 188 matches (including 16 substitute appearances).

contribution to the team, but if you don't score you are never completely satisfied with your performance. Putting the ball in the net gets you going again though, and that's exactly what's happened to me at Wolves.

Q So your lack of goals at Villa presumably meant you were very disappointed with the way things were going for you in your first Premiership season?

A In the end, yes. But earlier on I was doing OK — until just after Christmas I was involved in every single game, either in the starting line-up or on the sub's bench. But then I was left out and after a while it did get to me. I just needed a break and I got one — my loan move to Wolves.

Q Would you welcome a permanent move to Molineux, as speculation has suggested might be on the cards?

A I said when I arrived that my long term aim was to go back and establish myself at Villa, and that's still in my mind. If I was thinking about a move to Wolves it would take my mind off the matches and that would be silly. But I'm enjoying myself at the club and as long as I'm here, I'll be looking for goals to help us reach the play-offs.

appreciate but sometimes the supporters don't. Lee Mills is very keen and also full of running — perhaps a bit too enthusiastic at times, but he's learning the game quickly and he's going to be a good striker. Cyrille — what can you say? He's done it all yet he still loves playing and he's still so strong — you've only got to think back to how he came on as sub against Tranmere and set up the winner for Lee. Q Your own goals-to-games ratio compares to Bully's, yet it took you until you were 24 to make the break into pro football — why did clubs miss out on you for so long?

A I can't really explain that. I wrote to several clubs as a

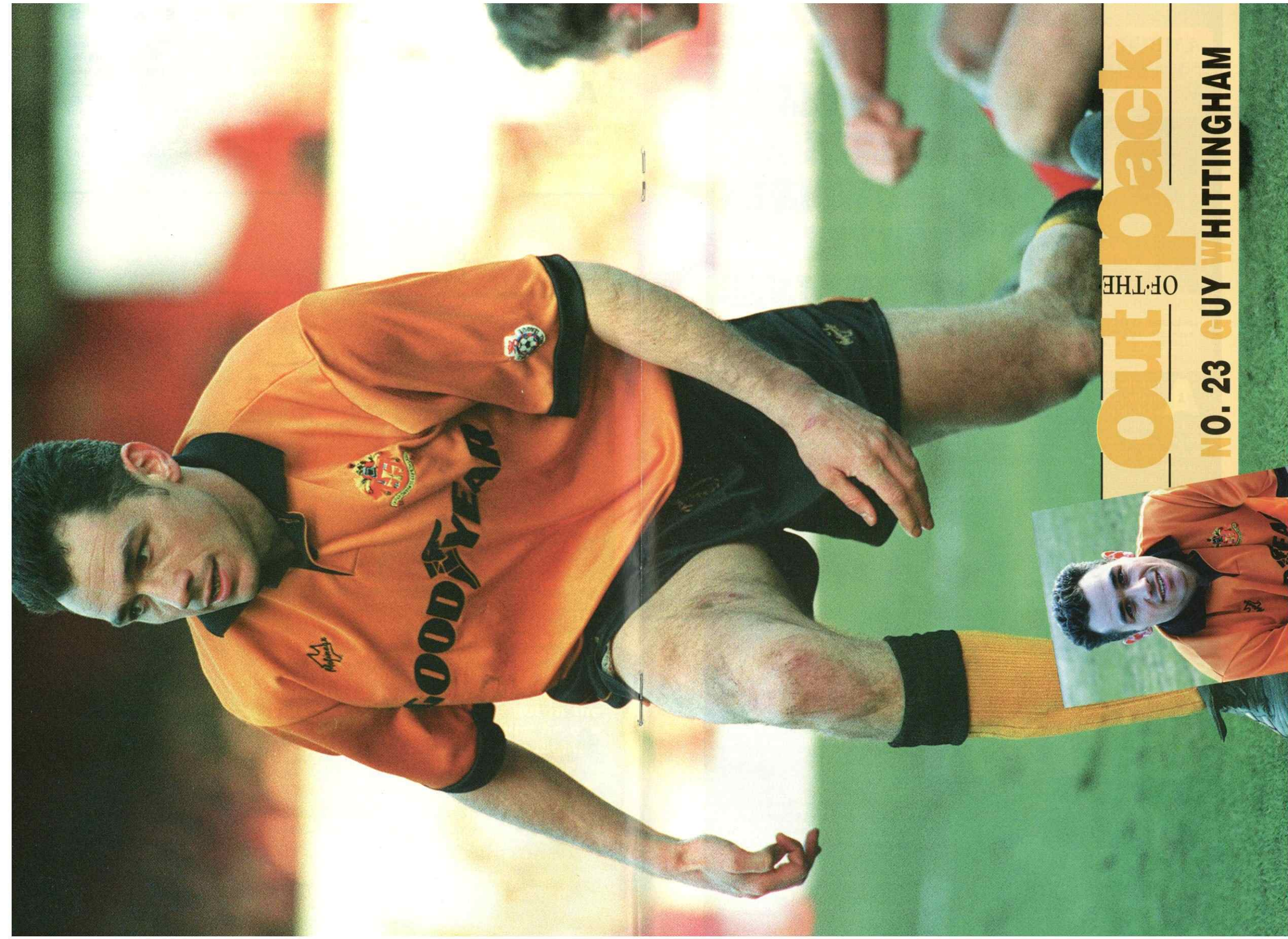

Q You missed out in the play-offs with Portsmouth last season — could that experience help you if you were there with Wolves this year?

A That was the biggest disappointment of my career — we missed automatic promotion by one goal, then went out in the play-off semi-final. But after being in the frame for automatic promotion for so long, we were disappointed to only be in the play-offs and I think that had a big psychological effect on us. Psychologically for Wolves it would have the opposite effect — we would have sneaked into the play-offs with a tremendous late run and everybody would be buzzing. And if we do get there, we'll have a great chance of going all the way.

After the disappointment of missing out on promotion by losing to Aldershot in the play-off final in May 1987, Wolves made sure of clinching the first step of their return to the big time the following season.

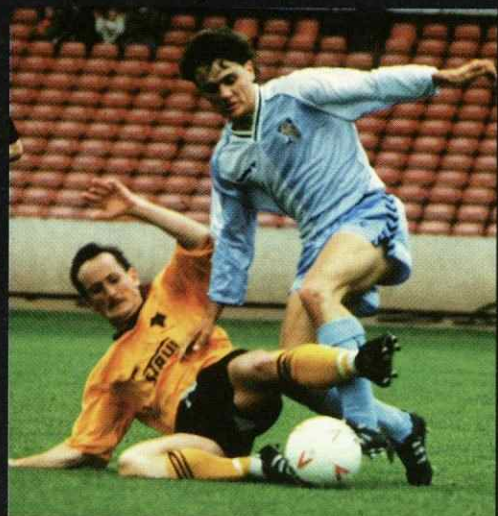
The campaign began with a game at Scarborough against the new boys of the league, and it ended in a two all draw. Crowd disturbances at the game resulted in a temporary ban on travelling support. The opening home game saw a shock 1-0 defeat at the hands of Halifax Town though the team bounced back with wins at Hereford and at home to Scunthorpe. Two goals in the last fifteen minutes at Ninian Park gave Cardiff the three points in a five goal thriller, and two draws against Crewe at home, and Peterborough away gave Wolves a midtable position after a lukewarm opening to the season.

Phil Robinson and Andy Mutch were on the mark in a 2-0 win at Stockport but the erratic form continued and a 2-0 home win over Rochdale was sandwiched between a home defeat by Torquay and an

away set-back at Bolton.

Then, at last, things clicked into gear and an eight match unbeaten run, which included seven wins, took Wolves to a position at the top, three points clear of the nearest opposition. The strike force of Steve Bull and Andy Mutch contributed 23 of the 35 goals scored in just 19 games played at that stage.

But a barren two game spell ensued with a disappointing 2-0 home reversal at the hands of Wrexham and a goalless game on a bleak afternoon in Hartlepool. The position at the top was lost to Leyton Orient who, coincidentally, turned out to be the next opposition for Wolves. A crowd of over 12,000 packed into the two sides of Molineux that were

open for the game which took place a week before Christmas, and it was the home supporters who travelled home happy thanks to a brace from Steve Bull.

Over the holiday three games ended in three wins with no goals conceded, the victims being Exeter and Hereford at Molineux, and Crewe at Gresty Road. Stockport County then took a point from Molineux in a game played in farcical conditions — thick fog enveloping the ground. Andy Mutch got the only goal of the game at Scunthorpe a week later before Cardiff City arrived at Molineux and produced a shock 4-1 win in a game where little went right for Wolves.

On a bitterly cold day at Exeter, Steve Bull lightened the depression from that Cardiff defeat as he helped himself to a hat-trick in Wolves' 4-2 victory over The Grecians. Then came a shock defeat at little Halifax Town, this despite Gary Bellamy having given Wolves the lead. Two consecutive goalless draws at the hands of Scarborough and Torquay meant that the lead at the top of the table was narrowed although there was still the comfort of a five point advantage.

Bolton were thumped 4-0 at Molineux, all the goals coming in the first period, and maximum points came from a midweek trip to Rochdale who battled all the way before suc-

cumbing to a Micky Holmes goal. A poor performance at Tranmere in a Friday evening game ended with a 3-0 defeat and though the team bounced back with a home win over Carlisle, their form at the time was none too convincing.

This fact was borne out in the next home game against Peterborough who triumphed 1-0. Still the advantage at the top was five points and the lead was stretched when Bull helped himself to his second league hat-trick of the season as Darlington went down 5-3 at Molineux. A tough trip to Turf Moor ended in a 3-0 win with Steve Bull scoring a quite superb goal, probably the best of the 52 league and cup ones he got in that season. Two nil home wins over Colchester and Swansea at home came either side of a draw at Cambridge, but promotion was finally confirmed at Somerton Park where lowly Newport, already confirmed as relegated from

the league at the end of the term, went down 3-1.

Andy Mutch scored one of the goals and Steve Bull the other two in the win which left Wolves needing just one win to virtually assure themselves of the Championship. The win didn't come at Wrexham who completed the double over the Molineux men thanks to a 4-2 win.

But, on May Day Bank Holiday, Wolves were confirmed as the Champions of Division Four. There were almost 18,000 people at Molineux to see Wolves overcome Hartlepool United thanks to two efforts from Steve Bull. The final game of the season was at Leyton Orient and Wolves' 2-0 win was to cost the Londoner's a place in the promotion play-offs. The Championship was won with ninety points, five more than nearest rivals Cardiff, and the long haul back to the top division had begun.

We have played twice since my last notes and I'm pleased to say that our recent form has seen us win four and draw one of our last five games. Last Saturday saw us travel to Mansfield to take on a Town side enjoying one of their best seasons in the Purity League. I'm pleased to report a 1-0 victory over a very strong and competitive team. Jay Hanbury scored his third goal in four outings with an acrobatic volley from a Richard Phillips' cross just before the interval.

Technically I felt that we were always better than our opponents though I believe that had we not competed in the right manner, then the result might have been in the balance. But, the team were very positive and very committed and Michael Innes had only two saves to make throughout the game. Barnett and Hanbury in particular, proved a handful for their defence whilst Westwood and Quentin Townsend were commanding in our back four.

Our recent results and performances see the side in a very confident mood and I feel that we are nurturing some quality performers for the future.

The Mansfield game was slightly marred by an injury to Andrew MacBeth who had to have stitches inserted in both legs after colliding with an unprotected floodlight pylon only yards from the pitch edge. He is obviously bruised and sore at the moment but I'm hopeful that he will be available again shortly.

Barnsley, in so many ways the epitome of South Yorkshire, is one of the last places any side would want to go when points are of such paramount importance. Although Oakwell has shed some of its cigarette card image with the building of a plush new stand the word "grit" still runs through the club. Never a well supported club (under 4,500 saw their match with Watford 10 days ago) the Tykes have battled to preserve this level of football since 1981 and again this season they pulled away from the danger area at just the right time. This despite losing 10 home games since the opening day (when they drew 1-1 there with the Baggies).

All in all it's been a reasonable first season in charge for the management team of Viv Anderson and Danny Wilson and with a year's experience under their red and white belts Barnsley may well prove to be a good outside bet for a play-off position in 1995. Whether Anderson and Wilson continue to make first team appearances is another matter, although this is not a club able to splash out large sums on replacements. Apart from these two veterans, the Tykes' squad contains a number of experienced men, such as Ian Bryson (an Anderson signing from Sheffield United), Glyn Snodin (a free from Hearts), Owen Archdeacon (once of Celtic) and Neil Redfearn, the former Watford and Oldham midfielder. It's unlikely that Barnsley will better last season's finishing position of 13th but they are nevertheless liable to pose us a very tough test next weekend.

In midweek we entertain Sunderland, another side who have spent the season below the halfway mark. At one stage they seemed set to repeat their relegation of 1987 but the arrival of Mick Buxton (another 'gritty' Yorkshireman) as manager has rescued them from turbulent waters. Had the season gone on for a couple more weeks the Roker side may even have found themselves in the play-offs and that will surely be their ambition next time around. It will be interesting to see whether Buxton will be allowed to repeat the £2.5 million spending spree that previous boss Terry Butcher enjoyed last summer. The most expensive arrivals were £800,000 Andy Melville (from Oxford) and £775,000 Phil Gray (who left Luton) but sadly they were unable to keep Butcher in his job.

We will be happy to repeat last season's 2-1 victory here, when Robbie Dennison and an Ian Sampson own goal gave us all three points. Such a result would of course complete a 'double' for us as we won 2-0 at Roker Park in September, a match Geoff Thomas will wish to forget despite his fine goal. This is a re-arranged match so make sure it's pencilled in to your diaries.

This is certainly the most exciting end of seasons we have had at Molineux for a number of years, and with three of our last four matches at home the drama should continue until the last kick of our final game against Leicester City. However, this afternoon we look forward to the encounters with Barnsley (next Saturday) and Sunderland (Tuesday May 3rd).

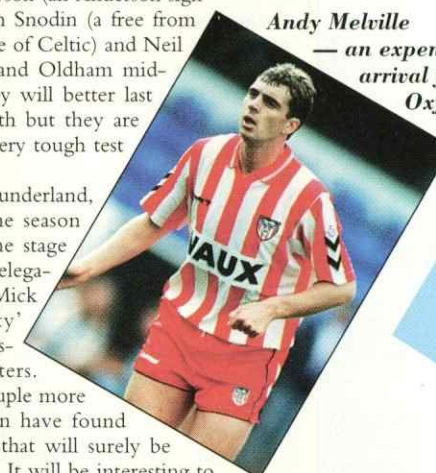
