

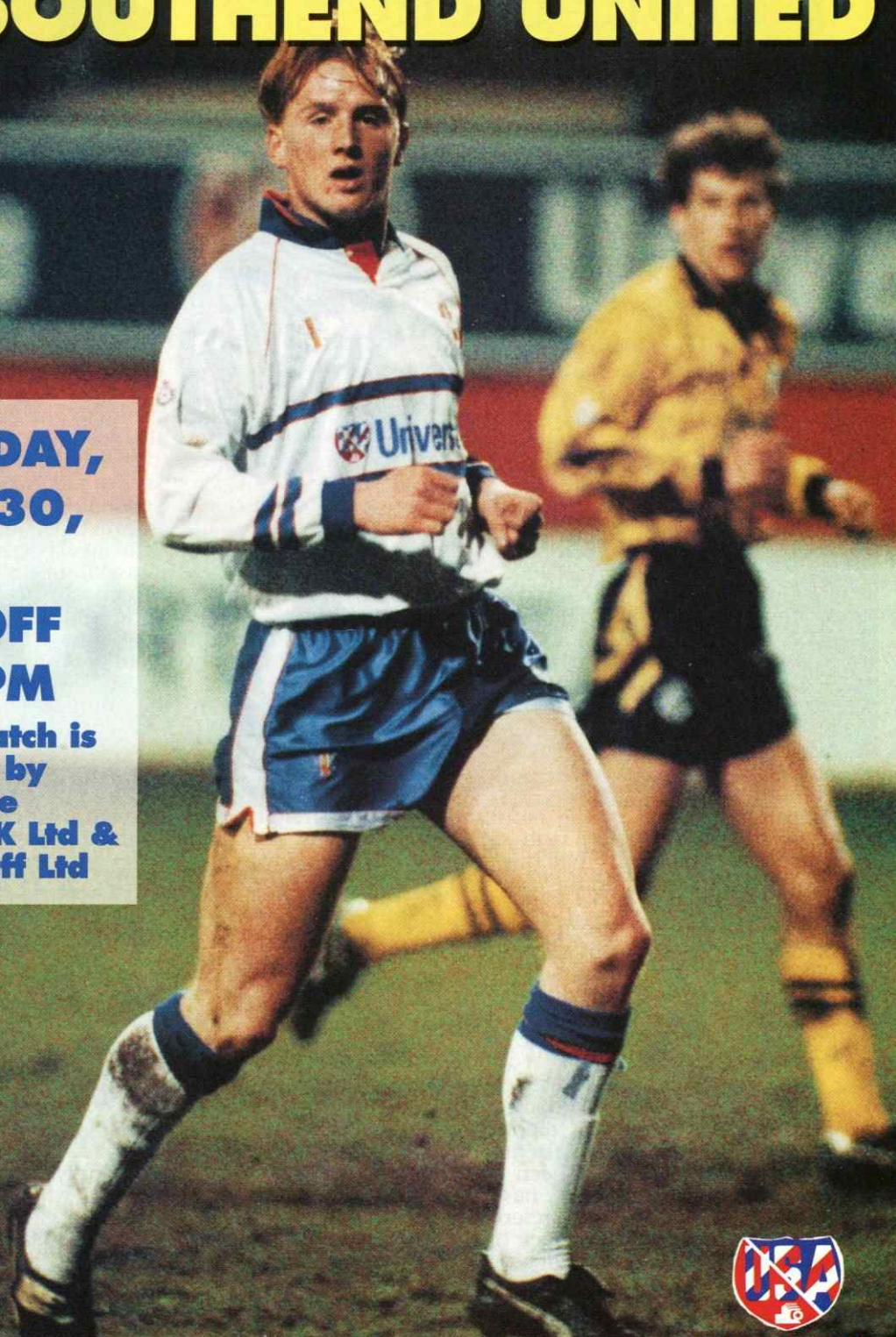

ON THE BALL WITH DAVID PLEAT



This afternoon we welcome our visitors from Southend United to Kenilworth Road. We anticipate a game that represents the very best of the Endsleigh League this season.

Our fortunes have taken a little twist, but I am confident that we have the youth and experience to develop into a strong force next season. All our supporters who saw Tuesday night's game with Millwall must have enjoyed much of the action but would have been disappointed that we are still finding goals so illusive.

I am told the game made quite good TV viewing that evening. From Carlton TV's point of view, they need Millwall to be gunning for a play-off final place at Wembley. At the moment it looks as if Wolves have the only realistic chance of penetrating from outside the play-off group.

We are, of course, more concerned with the other end of the table. We have suffered a little depression, and some poor fortune in front of goal, since our Wembley experience earlier in the month. That is why today's game has such significance. We hope, therefore, that our supporters will get behind the team and act as an extra player.

The reserves have been very busy recently as many teams catch up on fixtures that were postponed to protect their first-teams during the wet winter. Chelsea, with their experienced squad of professionals, have run away with the Football Combination League this season. We have had our own good results and Wayne Turner has reported a positive attitude in their attempts.

Andy Petterson has been particularly unlucky this season. He has performed consistently well for the reserves but has been frustrated with his lack of first-team opportunities. He is one of several players

who have yet to negotiate further contracts.

Many clubs have up to one third of their playing staff in the position of re-negotiation and I fear there will be many players who will sadly have to sacrifice their playing status as the widening gulf and financial constraints mean that clubs have to sacrifice bodies. It is my sincere hope that the players we release on free transfers will find a niche and will not get too disappointed. When one door shuts, another one opens, but players have to realise that you may only get out of the game what you put in.

Tomorrow, the annual Luton Town Supporters Club presentation takes place at Kent Athletic Social Club and I am sure it will be a convivial evening. It is very important that as the club's fortunes are strengthened, the club's various supporters' associations come together and form a

common policy. Not only do we at Luton suffer in competition with many First Division clubs in terms of gates, but we are also inferior recipients of big donations from our supporters' clubs.

Our recent support has been excellent. Hopefully, we will have our third consecutive 8,000+ crowd and no-one can dispute the manner in which our supporters have got behind the team against promotion-chasing Wolves, Crystal Palace and Millwall. Although all three games appeared difficult - and the results suggest that - in no way did we look inferior in overall play.

On the injury front, we have now conceded that both Martin Williams and Richard Harvey will not play again this season. Darren Salton still faces a massive battle, but ever-green Trevor Peake could be back for our remaining games. Scott Oakes, too, will hopefully come under consideration.

The heat is on. We must ensure that our efforts get their just rewards and we can

compete in the end-of-season Evening Standard 5-A-Side tournament knowing that we are still a First Division club who many may look towards next season as promotion hopefuls rather than relegation contenders.

Finally, I would like to welcome today's sponsors Progressive Printing Ltd and John Eastaff Ltd. We hope you enjoy your afternoon with us and we thank you kindly for your support.

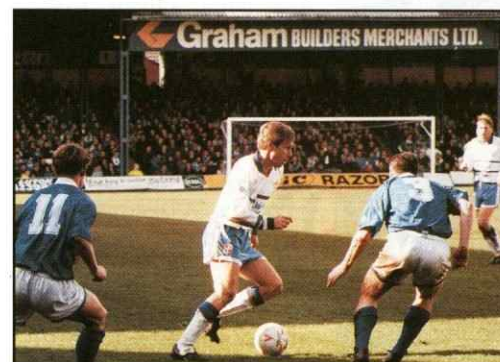
CAPTAIN'S COLUMN BY TREVOR PEAKE

PLAYER INTERVIEW WITH DAVID GREENE

Luton's young stars have been pushed to the forefront of public attention this season and David Greene has come through in recent weeks as a young defender with a big future.

Luton-born Greene had played just once for Town's first-team before the start of the season and he admits that he had hopes of breaking into the starting eleven in the early weeks of the 1993-94 season. "I did hope to break into the first team as soon as possible at the beginning of season, but I thought that was lost when I got injured," he admitted. "John Dreyer was suspended at the time and I would have been playing, but since that early set-back, it has gone better than I had expected."

Republic of Ireland under-21 star Greene has come into the side in recent weeks with the suspensions and injuries picked up by the first choice back pair of Trevor Peake and Dreyer. David admits the jump from reserve team football to the first-team seemed massive when he first broke into the side last season at Grimsby, but with help from reserve manager Wayne Turner, he has found the step-up a lot easier this time around.

"Last year when I played at Grimsby, I found it quite difficult, but this season the more first-team games I play the easier it gets," he explained. "I have done a lot of work with Wayne Turner and he has helped me in the games that I have played this season along with everyone else connected with the first-team."

The experienced players, in particular, have been a big influence in a year that has seen the emergence of the likes of Greene, John Hartson and Tony Thorpe at

Kenilworth Road. David admits those older players have had a big influence on him.

"Players like Trevor Peake, John Dreyer and Alan Harper have been a big help to me and have made playing in the big games like West Ham a lot easier," he claims. "Trevor in particular has been great to me. Before games he helps calm any nerves and on the field he has been a big help, just with his experience. It's great to

have such an experienced player alongside you just to give you advice when you might need it.

"All the youngsters have had a good year at Luton and we are all keen to try and keep hold of our first-team places. I feel that I have done quite well when I have played so I have to be pleased with the way it has gone for me."

Recent form has dropped for the Hatters but David does not believe that the club's FA Cup success has diverted minds away from the league programme.

"I do not think that the big cup games have put our minds off the league programme and we need to have no worries about going down. One more win should put us safe and we are not panicking at all.

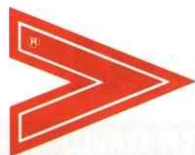
"We still have a few games left and should have no problem picking up the points we need, but we cannot be complacent."

Spotlight on today's visitors



SOUTHEND UNITED F.C. 1993-94

■ The opening weeks of the 1993/94 season were full of promise for Southend and as they climbed to the upper reaches of Division One, the Shrimpers looked all set to launch a push towards the top-flight for the first time in their history. Manager Barry Fry had assembled a side of players, many from the lower divisions, which he believed had the skill and determination to go all the way to the Premiership.

■ Many of Fry's summer buys came from his old club Barnet and his ability to motivate the team had almost immediate results. A 4-1 victory in August against Millwall made many heads turn and inspired a promotion push by the men from Roots Hall. This was deemed remarkable after Fry had saved the team from the drop the previous season when all looked lost.

■ The Shrimpers reached their highest league placing this season after the 0-0 draw with Leicester at Roots Hall at the beginning of December. Speculation began to grow that Fry was wanted as the new manager of Birmingham City and within a week the manager was off to the Midlands, leaving a huge void which has yet to be filled at the club.

■ Without the unique leadership of Fry, the Shrimpers have dramatically slipped down the league and despite the appointment of former Blues favourite Peter Taylor as manager, the early season form has not returned. A recent defeat at

Watford inspired manager Taylor to admit that other sides have more to play for at this stage of the season. "There was only one team wanting to win and it wasn't us," he admitted after the 3-0 defeat. "Perhaps other teams need to win more than us at the moment, but I want us to have a good finish to the season."

■ Southend have already come to Kenilworth Road once this year soon after Taylor had taken charge, with the Town running out 1-0 winners at the start of the Hatters' great FA Cup run. However, Taylor's men can gain some heart from their other away performances this season. On their travels, they have picked up good wins at Millwall, Stoke, Barnsley, Sunderland, Derby and Wolves. They were also denied a trip to Wembley only by a penalty shoot out defeat at the hands of Notts County in the semi-finals of the Anglo Italian Cup.

■ Success has been limited for Southend since their formation with a Fourth Division championship triumph in season 1980-81, along with promotion to the First in season 1991/92 when they finished second in the league as their highlights. The club was founded in 1906, taking the spotlight from leading club Southend Athletic who wanted to remain an amateur concern. League status was eventually achieved in 1920.

VISITORS ON PARADE

PAUL SANSOME (goalkeeper) - Paul started his career with Millwall and went on to make more than 200 appearances for the South London club. He joined Southend in 1987 and last season signed a three year contract.

GARY POOLE (defender) - Gary joined the Blues from Plymouth Argyle last summer and is the club's record signing. He started his career with Barry Fry at Barnet and has established himself as a regular first-team player this season.

ANDY EDWARDS (defender) - Andy is a former trainee at Roots Hall and earned a regular place in the first-team last season after a successful spell in the reserves. A versatile performer he can play at either right-back or centre-half.

MICK BODLEY (defender) - Mick made half-a-dozen first-team appearances for Chelsea before moving on to Northampton in a £50,000 move in 1989. He joined Barry Fry at Barnet and followed the former Southend boss to Roots Hall.

CHRIS POWELL (defender) - Chris had spells with Crystal Palace and Aldershot before moving to Southend in 1990. He has captained the side this season.

DEREK PAYNE (midfield) - Another of the Barnet contingent still at Roots Hall, Derek joined the Shrimpers last summer after establishing himself in the Barnet first-team the previous season.

JONATHAN HUNT (midfield) - Jonathan moved to Southend in the summer from Barnet after two years in the Barnet first-team squad, with many of his appearances coming as a substitute.

PHIL GRIDLET (midfield) - Phil signed from Barnsley in September and is yet another former Barnet player, turning out for them in their non-league days. He signed for Barnsley in 1990 and has spent a loan spell at Rotherham.

STEVE TILSON (midfield) - Steve was discovered playing non-league football at Witham Town and has made over 150 appearances for Southend since signing in 1989.

PETER BEADLE (forward) - Peter, who is on loan from Tottenham, began his league career at Gillingham before joining Spurs in 1992 in a deal that could eventually cost the North London giants £700,000.

RICKY OTTO (forward) - Ricky is the club's top-scorer this season. He was playing non-league football at Dartford until Leyton Orient spotted him in 1991. He joined the Shrimpers last summer.

ANDY ANSAH (forward) - A one-time Crystal Palace junior Andy gained his chance at league football by signing for Brentford in 1988. He moved to Southend in March 1990.

GARY JONES (forward) - Gary made his league debut on the opening day of the season after his summer signing from non-league Boston United. He has played in well over half of Southend's games so far.

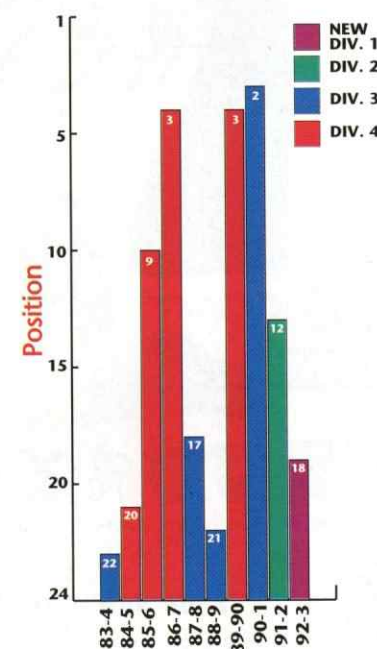


Peter Taylor became Southend manager after the controversial departure of Barry Fry last December. Born in 1953, he started his career at Roots Hall in 1970 and spent three seasons with the Shrimpers before he made a big-money move to Crystal Palace.

Thirty-three goals and 122 appearances later, he was on his way to Tottenham Hotspur, where his continued success in front of goal earned him a place in the full England side. Peter's career wound down at Leyton Orient and he also had spells at a number of non-league clubs around the south-east.

Prior to his appointment by Southend chairman Vic Jobson, Peter has been in charge at Diadora Premier League side Hendon. He admits that the move came as a shock. "The appointment came out of the blue," he said. "But Southend are the only team I would have come into league management for."

Andy Pettersen: the Hatters' loyal supporter!



PLAYER INTERVIEW

Who do you think has been Luton's most loyal supporter this season? Your best pal? A friend at work maybe? Well, one of the front-runners for the accolade must be Town substitute goalkeeper Andy Pettersen. After all, he has sat through nearly every game, both home and away!

Some have called it the most unenviable job in professional football: substitute goalkeeper. For 99.9 per cent of your season, you know that you are unlikely to be called into action, but have to go through the mental and physical rigours for every first-team game.

The whole scenario is probably even harder for Andy to take, when you consider that at the start of the season he was given the Town's number one shirt. A broken toe only a fortnight before the season halted his progress and his replacement, Juergen Sommer, has not looked back since.

"It was obviously a major blow to pick up the injury when I did, but I must give full credit to Juergen, who has come in and done a superb job," reflected Andy. "It has been very frustrating sitting on the bench week in, week out, but I suppose the consolation is that I am still involved with the first-team on a regular basis."

Andy has been brought into action three times this season, twice coming off the bench to replace Juergen. His debut this season came during our opening win against Watford, when Sommer received stitches in a head wound. "That game seems a long while ago now," he added. "But, as always, I was fully prepared. You have to be otherwise it is not worth being on the bench. The same thing happened later on in the season at Nottingham Forest when Juergen was sent off. You just have to go out there and play as if you had been playing all season."

Andy's only full appearance of the season followed the Forest game, during the 1-1 home draw with Birmingham City back in March. For most Town fans, that has been all they have seen of the Australian youth international. But those dedicated supporters who follow the reserve side will have seen him in fine form for Wayne Turner's side this season.

"It's gone very well for me this season in the reserves," he stated. "Mind you, I have had quite a lot to do! Seriously though, it has been good experience having a lot of the ball and it can only help me develop as a goalkeeper. I have been pleased with my form, and it has been nice to hear the manager saying good things about me."

Despite his limited opportunities, Andy has not given up hope of representing his native Australia at full international level, although he admits his task has been made much harder. "Mark Bosnich is the only British-based keeper they really recognise at the moment," he admitted. "and that will only change for me if I can push my way into the first-team. However, that route may not be the only one to the international stage because my father is Welsh and I am currently looking into that avenue at the moment."

Andy's upbeat mood and character does not suggest that he is a man in the doldrums. However, he is realistic enough to admit that his future may, in the end, lie away from Kenilworth Road.

"My contract is up at the end of the season, I am 25 years of age, and I need first-team football," he said. "I would love it to be here at Luton because I owe them a great deal and love living in the area. But at the end of the day, you have to go where you can get league action, so that may be away from Luton Town."

"But I will sit down with the manager to discuss my future during the summer. Until then, I still have a busy fixture list to get through with both the reserve and first-team duty. That is my main concern at the moment."



Never a dull moment when the Hatters and Shrimpers meet

BACK TRACKING BY ROGER WASH



Despite playing against Southend continuously from 1920, until our eventual promotion from Division Three in 1937, our paths did not cross again for over 25 years, when we rejoined the Shrimpers back where we started.

Season 1963/64 saw the Town struggle from almost the opening day of the season and by the time Southend visited Kenilworth Road on October 26, we were sitting in a relegation position having been hammered 4-1 at home three days earlier by Bristol City. Gordon Turner was recalled to lead the attack after a five game absence and in the 11th minute, he took advantage of some hesitancy in the Southend defence to slot the ball into the net. The score remained unchanged until after half-time when Tom McKenchnie was pulled down in the box and Turner calmly netted from the resulting spot kick.

Turner, the Town's record goalscorer, secured his hat-trick soon after with a header, but when David Pacey fired home a fourth from a seemingly offside position, tempers flared and Pacey was sent off together with Benny Friel of Southend after an off-the-ball incident. Southend scored a late consolation with a Terry Bradbury penalty, but the welcome victory was ours in our bid to climb up the table.

Unfortunately, we could not maintain that form. By the time of the return match at Roots Hall in March, relegation still looked a probability for the Town. With only one away win all season, the form book was turned on its head as Luton returned from Roots Hall with both points in the bag thanks to a solitary John O'Rourke strike in the 75th minute. He outpaced the Southend defence after latching on to a long down field ball by Graham Caleb. Fortunate we may have been, but the points proved vital as we managed to avoid the drop.

Our escape from relegation was short lived as we went down the following season after Southend had exacted full revenge from their defeats earlier in the campaign. In the game at Kenilworth Road on November 28, 1964 the Town gave a league debut to Bruce Rioch, but he was powerless to prevent Andy Smillie from scoring in the 18th minute and was unable to shine as Southend resorted to spoiling tactics in a bid to hold onto their lead.

The great escape of 1963/64, when Town won six and drew three of their last nine games, looked likely to be repeated 12 months later when four games on the trot were won in March and April to give a fighting chance. But the visit to Roots Hall and a 5-0 drubbing put paid to all those hopes. Colin Tinsley in the Luton goal was beaten twice in the first 15 minutes, then played a blinder for an hour only to be beaten by three unstoppable shots in the closing period.

It was not long before Southend joined us in Division Four with the two games in 1966/67 ending with honours even. In the home game on April 12, the teams needed points for different reasons with Southend pushing for an immediate return to Division Three and the Town fighting to avoid being sucked into the dreaded re-election positions. The match was a hard, bruising contest played in thick mud, but the Town were fully deserving of the points which were secured thanks to a goal from the new darling of the terraces - Keith Allen - who had been signed from Stockport the previous month. The return was played 12 days later and the Town held out for an hour before a double strike from John McKinven and Andy Smillie pushed the Shrimpers up to third position.

Southend failed to win promotion and the final pair of games for another quarter of a century took place during our own Fourth Division championship season during 1967/68. Both clashes took place early on in the season with Town suffering their first defeat of the campaign in a 3-0 reversal at Roots Hall with injuries, a missed penalty and shots against the woodwork put forward as reasonable excuses.

Revenge was not long in coming, however, as the Town easily swept aside the Shrimpers to the tune of 3-1 in the game marking the debut of Ian Buxton. On a wet night the crowd of 13,332 went home happy having witnessed quality strikes from John Moore, Terry Branston and Graham French.

THE VISITORS' VIEWPOINT

Southend captain Chris Powell has endured the highs and lows this season with the Shrimpers, and although the side are now enduring a low point, he wants to ensure the side give one final push for points before the season ends.

A season that started so brightly for Southend is ending in disappointment, with a run of results that has seen Peter Taylor's side slide down the Division One table. "We need to give one final push because a good finish to the season always makes everyone's summer so much more enjoyable," admitted Powell. "I have heard people say that we are the only team in this division that are not playing for something at the moment, either promotion or relegation, and that may have been our problem in recent weeks."

After the problems the club have faced this season, there has been speculation that the Shrimpers skipper will be on his way out of Roots Hall in the summer, and Chris admits that he is in the dark with regards to his future.

"There has been a lot of speculation in the press about me leaving Southend in the summer with my contract running out, but I haven't decided what I am doing for next season yet," he said. "I have declined the contract that the club offered me at the moment because I want to wait until the summer to see what players will be coming or going. By next August it will be all sorted out and I might be at the club, I might not."

He added: "I would love to play in the Premiership and I would love to have done it with Southend, but it is just not to be

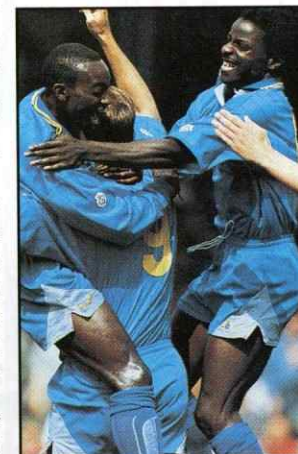
this season. However, we have to try to do well in our last few games because our fans are paying good money to come and watch us and we have just not been performing recently."

Powell admits that the turmoil off the field at Southend has often affected the performances on the pitch and the departure of

Barry Fry in December has clearly had an adverse effect on results this season. "Something seems to happen every year at this club and it does affect performances on the pitch. It happened again here this year when the manager left and the results began to go against us. Most of the time the problems off the pitch have nothing to do with us, but it does filter through to some of the players."

Powell's pleas for an improved finish to the season have been boosted by the arrival of Peter Beadle, on loan from Tottenham until the end of the season. The forward who

has yet to start a first-team game at Spurs since his £300,000 move is enjoying his spell at Roots Hall. "It is obviously a step down from Spurs, but it is a step up from reserve team football," he said. "This is giving me the stage to show what I am capable of doing. I am enjoying it at Southend, but I would like to think that I have still got a future at White Hart Lane and I know that the staff there have not forgotten me."

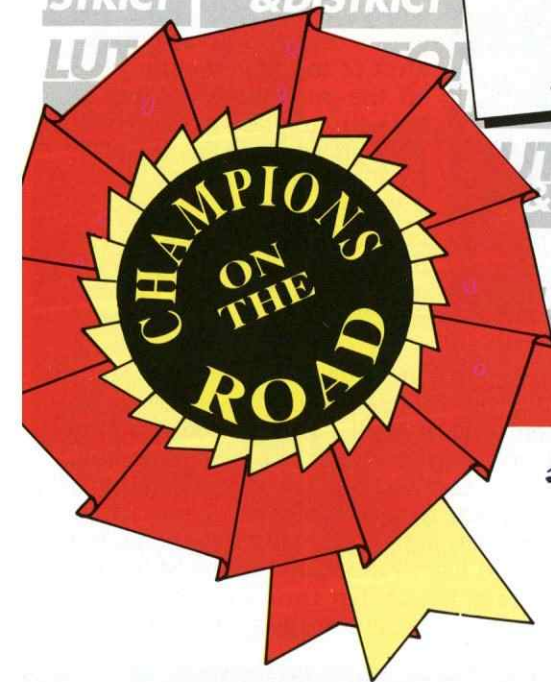

NEWS ON ONE

Peterborough United suffered the indignity of relegation last Saturday, and with only one week to go, who will join them in Division Two next season?

The Hatters' plight has already been documented elsewhere in today's match day magazine, but joining them at the wrong end of the table are seven other teams still mathematically capable of succumbing to the First Division drop.

As the table stands, Birmingham and Oxford look favourites to go down. However, encouraging results last Saturday could give both clubs the incentive to secure last-gasp safety.

Birmingham gained an impressive, if controversial, 2-0 win at Portsmouth through strikes from Roger Willis and Steve Claridge. Referee Keith Cooper sent off Pompey striker Gerry Creaney for double dissent and awarded Barry Fry's men a hotly-disputed penalty in the closing stages of the game. Mr Cooper required a police escort from a fuming Fratton Park crowd, as Portsmouth's slight hopes of promotion were dashed.

Said Creaney: "I said one of his decisions was a disgrace, but there is no way I used foul or abusive language. I will not appeal, but it cost us the game." Blues manager Fry was, surprisingly, tight lipped as his side took their season's tally to 44 points.

Oxford earned a 2-2 draw at home to promotion chasers Leicester City and the result left United manager Denis Smith in defiant mood. "Although three points were important today, we once again proved we can live with the top teams in this division," he said. "It is all there to play for still this season, and I want to be playing the likes of Leicester again next season."

Fighting words indeed, but I wonder if Watford boss Glenn Roeder is feeling as confident. His side have already played 44 games, while those teams around them have played two or three games less. Following their 1-1 draw at Bristol City - via a Paul Furlong equaliser - Roeder admitted: "We can't rely on other teams to decide our future. Now we need a win from our last two matches to feel safe."

Furlong's goal was his 17th in the league this season and Roeder added: "Paul's goals have been vital for us. Who knows what might have happened if he had been injured this season?"

Five defeats from their last six games leave Viv Anderson's Barnsley still in trouble. Their latest defeat came at title-winners-elect Crystal Palace. An Eric Young strike was all that separated the sides at Selhurst Park, and on the lines of Denis Smith, Anderson remains confident in these final, vital days.

"Palace are obviously on a roll at the moment, but to stifle them the way we did was encouraging," he said. "It's been a tough introduction for me this season, but I have learned a hell of a lot. Although we are still not safe, I think another point or so will be enough."

Another team learning all the time are West Bromich Albion, and on Sunday's performance against Nottingham Forest, they look likely to avoid the drop. In most neutrals' eyes they outplayed Forest in every department but came away losing 2-1. The injustice was a point Throstles boss Keith Burkinshaw was quick to pick up on.

"It has been the story of our season that we dominate but end up on the losing side," he said. "I would hate to think that we will go down this season because I know,

and I'm sure those watching today saw, that we are more than capable of mounting a challenge next season."

So as the managers become mathematicians, and the supporters chew what is left of their nails, the destination of this season's final First Division table lies in the players' hands. 'D-Day' arrives next Sunday. There will be tears of joy and sadness but whatever happens, there is no doubt that this season's Division One campaign has been one of the most exciting yet.
