MY SON will be happy! He's safe and we're safe. I'm sure David Pleat will be a happy man too judging by the telephone calls I received during the course of the last week or so urging me to get one or two good results, particularly against Birmingham, which we achieved.

Actually I'm absolutely delighted for Luton, not only because it is the club where I started my career but also for David's sake and for my son Gregory who plays there, that their victory over West Brom on Tuesday secured their status in the First Division.

It appears that all the clubs from the First Division who had a successful run in the FA Cup—Charlton, Luton and ourselves—all suffered poor results in one way or another following our elimination. Seriously though, I'm sure he will be glad to be back in his familiar position in the backline tonight. Well done, Alan.

David made his League debut for Walsall in 1981, winning a regular place two years later. Luton invested £150,000 on his signature in 1984 and he later played in two League Cup finals for the Hatters. He has been capped three times at England 'B' level.

It's a pleasure to welcome the Chairman, Directors, players and supporters of Luton Town for this Thursday night re-arranged Endsleigh Insurance League Division One encounter.

The Hatters did our League proud when they reached the semi-finals of the FA Cup only to go down 2-0 to Chelsea but unfortunately like ourselves their League form has dipped in recent weeks and they still need points to make certain of avoiding relegation.

Manager David Pleat has put together a talented young squad that if he can keep together will certainly be a team to watch out for in the next couple of seasons.

Back in September the Whites won 2-0 at Kenilworth Road and so tonight's return fixture gives us the chance to complete the double over Luton Town.

Dangermen to watch out for this evening includes ever-green midfielder David Preece who is a superb organiser while Paul Telfer and Scott Oakes have had outstanding seasons for Luton.

Just two away victories all season in the League have not helped Luton climb away from the relegation zone and no doubt Mr. Pleat will be looking for a positive response from his side in this the final week of the League programme.

A LOOK AT TODAY'S OPPONENTS

JUERGEN SOMMER (Goalkeeper)

Juergen joined the Hatters in August 1991 from Indiana University, U.S.A. He made his Town debut on the opening day of this season against Watford, but was substituted in the second half after sustaining eight stitches in a head wound. He has enjoyed extended first team experience on loan at Brighton and Hove Albion and Torquay United. JULIAN JAMES (Defender) Julian joined Luton Town as a trainee and was introduced to First Division football five seasons ago. A former England under 21 international, he was the Town's first-choice right-back last season and captained the side in Trevor Peake's absence. He missed much of the opening half of this season with a broken hand. TREVOR PEAKE (Defender) Club Captain, Trevor started his career at Lincoln City in 1979 before moving on to Coventry City in 1983. He enjoyed eight full seasons at Highfield Road, winning a FA Cup winners' medal in 1987. He joined Luton for £100,000 in August 1991 and was immediately installed as club captain. Trevor was also voted last season's joint Player of the Year by Town supporters.

JOHN DREYER (Defender) The other recipient of the Player of the Year award, John started his career as an apprentice with Oxford United. He spent loan spells at Torquay and Fulham before making his debut for the Manor Ground club in 1985/86. He joined the Hatters in 1988 for £140,000 and he has been a regular member of the side for the past four seasons.

MARVIN JOHNSON (Defender) Fans' favourite, Marvin made his Football League debut against Wimbledon in 1988 and quickly established himself as a regular in the Town defence. A player who can play anywhere along the back line, he operated mainly at left-back last season after a lengthy spell out through injury.

DES LINTON (Defender) Des signed for Luton from Leicester City in October 1991—along with Scott Oakes—as part of the deal which took midfielder Steve Thompson to Filbert Street. He was a regular member of the Town defence for the early part of last season and has been a regular this season.

GREG RIOCH (Defender) A young Hatter with Town family connections, Greg's father Bruce played for Luton in the early seventies before moving on to greater heights with Aston Villa and Scotland. Greg started his career with his father at Millwall and has, this season, made his league debut on loan at Second Division Barnet.

CERI HUGHES (Midfield) Another Luton Town Welshman, Ceri re-established himself in the Hatters' midfield during the second half of last season after a prolonged spell out through injury. He made his debut v Aston Villa in 1990 and is a Wales youth, under 21 and full

international.

SCOTT OAKES (Forward) Scott joined Luton in October 1991, along with Des Linton, and made his debut for the Hatters later that month. He developed in the junior teams at Filbert Street and made his League debut in 1990. Scott made his international debut during England's successful Toulon under-21 tournament in June 1993.

JAMIE CAMPBELL (Forward) Jamie is a former Luton Town trainee who turned professional in July 1990. He made his debut in a Zenith Cup tie at Ipswich two seasons ago and scored his first senior goal for the club on the opening day of last season at Leicester City.

MARTIN WILLIAMS (Forward) Martin established himself regularly in the Town's 13 towards the end of last season. He made his first team debut at Southampton in March 1992 and has also spent a loan spell in Finland. He joined the club from the youth ranks at Leicester City.

JOHN HARTSON (Forward) A prolific scorer in both the youth and reserve teams at Kenilworth Road last season, John signed professional forms in December 1992. His prolific scoring rate has continued this term and he scored (and had a goal disallowed) on his Town League debut against Nottingham Forest in August.

SCOTT HOUGHTON (Forward) Scott joined the Hatters in August 1993 on a performance-related transfer from Tottenham Hotspur. He started his career with the Town as a schoolboy but joined Tottenham as a trainee in July 1988. A former pupil of the FA's Centre of Excellence, he made 14 appearances for Spurs, and also served Ipswich, Gillingham and Charlton during his time at White Hart Lane.

KERRY DIXON (Forward) Kerry joined Luton in October 1993 after a five-month loan spell from Southampton. He started his career with Reading and scored 51 goals in 116 appearances, before joining Chelsea in 1983 for £175,000. At Stamford Bridge he enjoyed the most prolific spell of his career, which also yielded eight England international caps. He joined the Saints for £575,000 in July 1992.

PAUL TELFER (Midfield) Paul is a former Luton trainee who made his debut at Everton, as substitute, towards the end of season 1990-91. Last season he established himself on the right side of midfield, but has also operated, when needed, at right-back. Paul is a Scottish under 21 international.

TONY THORPE (Forward) Tony joined the Hatters at the start of season 1992-93 following a spell at Leicester City. Initially at Kenilworth Road on trial, he was a consistent scorer in the Town's reserve side last season. Tony made his Town debut, as substitute, during a 6-2 drubbing of Stoke City in November.

A Look back at Previous Meetings.

WANDERERS v LUTON TOWN in the Football League

■ The Wanderers will tonight be looking to record their first double over Luton Town since season 1975/76 when they followed up a 2-0 win at Kenilworth Road by defeating the Hatters 3-0 at Burnden in January 1976. Hugh Curran and an own goal from Paul Fitcher earned the Wanderers the points at Luton whilst the goalscorers at Burnden were Garry Jones, John Byrom and Sam Allardyce. At the end of that season Bolton just missed out on promotion by finishing fourth in the Second Division.

■ Luton's last two League visits to Burnden in May 1981 and September of the same year saw them register two of their three League successes on the ground. In the final game of the 1980/81 season they recorded a 3-1 win with goals from Brian Stein, Steve White and Kirk Stephens. Luton were the first League visitors to Burnden at the start of the 1981/82 season and they kept up their 100% start to the new term by winning 2-1

with the goals from Brian Stein and Mark Aizlewood. The Wanderers on the other hand only had a goal from Alan Gowling to show for their efforts which was the only one scored by the side in the opening four League games.

■ The clubs first met in the Football League at Second Division level in November 1899. The Wanderers completed the double by winning 2-0 at Luton thanks to two Tom Barlow goals, and 3-0 at Burnden with goals from Bob Jack, Hugh Morgan and an opponents own goal, the points helping the club to win promotion as runners up to Sheffield Wednesday.

■ It wasn't until season 1955/56 that the clubs once again met in the Football League, this time at First Division level. Two goals each from Nat Lofthouse and Doug Holden earned Bolton a 4-0 win that still stands as the club's highest winning margin over Luton. Bolton's visit to Luton that season ended goalless.

■ The last time the sides met in the old First Division

was at Burnden in March 1960 the points being shared in a 2-2 draw. Freddie Hill and Brian Birch scored for the Wanderers with Gordon Turner and Joe McBride being on target for Luton.

■ During the 1970's the Wanderers registered five consecutive home League wins over Luton with this sequence beginning on the opening day of the 1970/71 season. A crowd of 11,664 saw Bolton win 4-2 against a Luton side that had been promoted from the Third Division the previous term. Terry Wharton put Bolton ahead in the 18th minute from the penalty spot after Alan Slough had handled but Mike Keen equalised with a long range shot for the Hatters eight minutes later. Further goals from Roy Greaves and Terry Wharton gave the Wanderers a cushion before Wharton completed a hat trick with his second penalty after John Byrom had been brought down 13 minutes from time.

In the final minute Malcolm MacDonald struck Luton's second goal when he converted the third penalty kick of the game.

■ Earlier this season the Wanderers registered their first away win and scored their first away goals in the League at Luton. John McGinlay broke the duck when he headed home David Lee's cross in the 37th minute and half an hour later he clinically despatched a chance after he had raced on to Tony Kelly's defence splitting pass. This was the Wanderers first win at Kenilworth Road since September 1975 and only the second since the War.

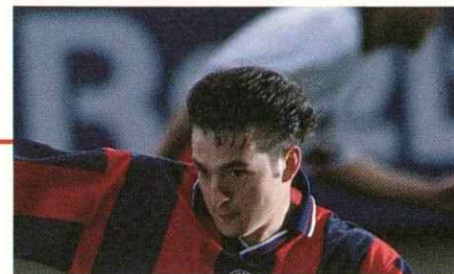


BOB HATTON

Bob Hatton began his career with Wolverhampton Wanderers, signing professional in November 1964 and making his debut in 1966. He scored 7 goals in 10 League appearances at Molineux and in March 1967 joined Bolton for a £35,000 fee. He made his debut in the number 9 shirt in a 1-1 draw at Coventry City but managed to score only twice that term, both coming in a 3-1 home win over Bury. In 1967/68 he failed to find the net in his 14 appearances and in October 1968 moved to Northampton Town. He spent nine months at the County Ground before moving to Carlisle United where he scored 38 League goals in two years. In October 1971 he moved to the Midlands with Birmingham City, helping them to two FA Cup semi final appearances and promotion to Division One, scoring 58 goals in 175 League appearances. He returned to the North West to join Blackpool in July 1976, spending two years on the coast before joining Luton Town. Whilst at Luton he scored 29 League goals in 82 League appearances before joining Sheffield United and ending his League career with Cardiff City. His overall Bolton record is as follows:

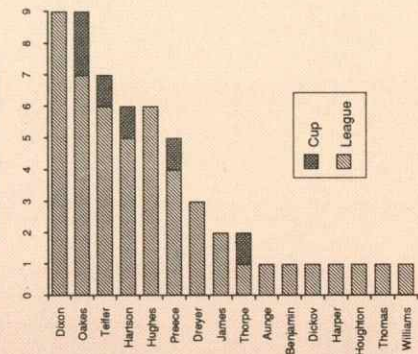

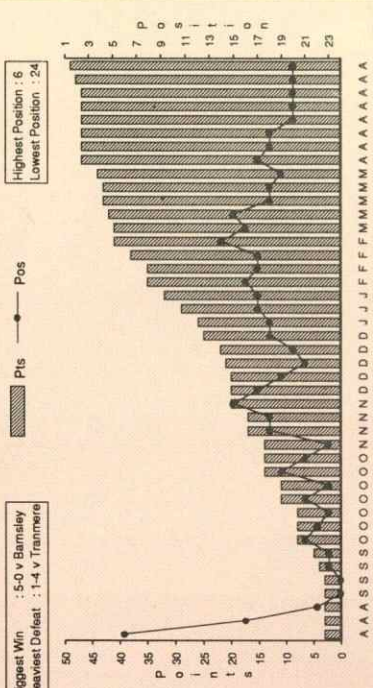

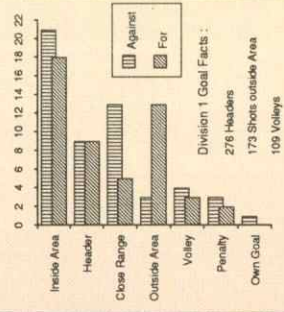
Who's scored the Goals



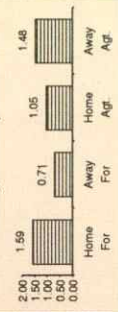
The Hatters' League progress from August (A) to April (A)



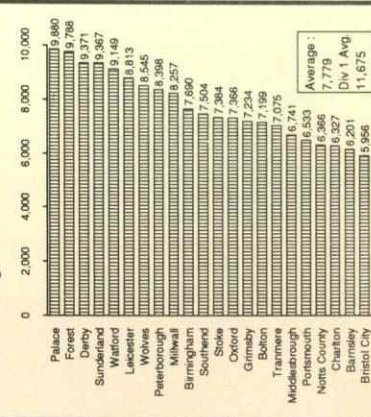
How the Goals have gone in



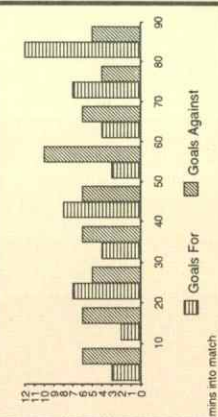
Average Goals per Match



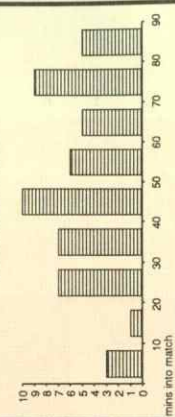
League Gates at Kenilworth Road

The Latest News and Info...

Down last season—up this! Yes, Crystal Palace (champions) and Nottingham Forest (runners-up) will both be back in the Premiership next term after spending just one campaign in Division One.

Forest clinched promotion last Saturday with a 3-2 win at relegated Peterborough while 24 hours later Palace took the championship with a similar scoreline at Middlesbrough.

A day after this defeat at Ayresome Park, 'Boro boss Lennie Lawrence quit his position.

Owing to printing deadlines it was still uncertain as to which four clubs would be competing in the play-offs. Tranmere, Derby, Leicester and Millwall were in the key places after last weekend's fixtures but Notts County and Wolves were also hoping to make the top six.

Tuesday evening's matches, though, should have sorted things out, although it will go right down to the wire for some.

With Peterborough already relegated, West Bromwich Albion pulled out of the bottom three with a crucial 1-0 home win over Grimsby Town at The Hawthorns where almost 17,000 fans turned out to say 'goodbye' to the Birmingham Road End terracing, which has been part of the Baggies' ground for 94 years.

Birmingham City are still in trouble despite a recent 4-2 win at Albion and that point here last Saturday.

Blues now have to pull out all the stops at Tranmere next Sunday to have any chance of avoid-

ing the drop.

Oxford, too, are facing demotion after losing 2-1 at Derby and they will need to beat Notts County at The Manor in their final game and hope that teams around them drop points, to have hopes of playing First Division football in 1994-95.

MORE EARLY BATHS THAN EVER!

One unwanted record was completed by the time the whistle had been blown of the football programme last Saturday, the sendings-off record was broken when five more red cards took the total of Premiership and Football League players dismissed to 281, beating the previous record of 278 in 1991-92, followed by 277 last season.

Our division of the Endsleigh Insurance League has produced the largest single contributor with 71 red cards whilst there have been 64 in Division Two and 62 in Division Three. The Premiership has the best record with 28. This league total of 225 added with the various sending-offs in the Cup competitions gives the Football Authorities an unwanted record but probably points to the increasing demands on players to achieve results that as we know only too often turns to frustration and invariably the flashing of the

red card.

Hopefully we won't see any action on that front from the referee this evening as we entertain Luton Town still in need of points for First Division survival. David Pleat's boys have tasted glory in the FA Cup reaching the semi-final but now need to battle their way out of the relegation trap door that seemed out of the question just a matter of weeks ago when they were playing Chelsea on the hallowed Wembley turf.

So, after tonight's encounter with The Hatters we bring down the curtain on the season with the Tykes of Barnsley visiting Burnden on Sunday. Viv Anderson has had to fight all the way in his first season in football management to secure his club's status in the First Division but the signs are good for the Yorkshire outfit and they could be a side to watch out for in the next couple of seasons.

MEMORABLE MOMENTS

A Look back into the Past....

Tonight we look back to Luton Town's last visit to Burnden for an FA Cup tie which came in February 1973 at the fifth round stage.

A crowd of 39,556, the largest for any fixture between the two clubs, saw Third Division Bolton, with an undefeated home run of 26 games, meet Second Division Luton the away specialists of the Football League, the result being a narrow triumph for the Hatters.

This was an all action match proving that there was still no chance of the FA Cup ever losing its magic.

Both clubs had produced some giant killing on their way to this stage of the competition, Luton having disposed of First Division Newcastle at St. James' Park whilst the Wanderers had defeated Second Division Cardiff City at the third attempt and had already played eight games in that season's competition.

The Wanderers threw everything except Jimmy Armfield's pipe at Luton with great thrusts of attacking football but their more experienced rivals had just that extra bit of composure.

Inside five minutes, Luton had the ball in the net but John Aston, who was to prove a tremendous inspiration to his side, was offside.

Luton had a fruitless penalty appeal before the Wanderers turned on the pressure with full back Don McAllister hitting a 30 yard drive that beat goalkeeper Willie Carrick but shave the wrong side of the post.

A header by Paul Jones

was just tipped over the bar whilst a deflected Roy Greaves drive was headed off the line by Don Shanks and Garry Jones flicked a shot just wide.

Luton however took all the pressure and then scored what turned out to be the winner three minutes before half time.

The goal came from an Aston corner that eluded keeper Charlie Wright and Alan Garner dived in to head home.

Bolton battled and fought to win the match back but the only real second half heart stopper for Luton came in the 75th minute when Carrick scrambled low to cut out a lethal John Ritson cross.

Talk of the defeat was superseded by the buzz about the Wanderers being on top of the Third Division again after both rivals Bournemouth and Oldham had been beaten in the League on the same day.

The Wanderers had at least proved that if promotion could be won they would not be out of place in the Second Division whilst for Luton their Cup exit came in the next round at the hands of eventual winners Sunderland.

The balance on the non league scene for clubs in the Bolton area has definitely tipped in our favour over the course of this season. Yet again more than a fair percentage of the silverware on offer will reside in Bolton trophy cabinets for the next

twelve months, only one of our sides faced a serious relegation battle and all of our teams did the region proud by keeping up the fine tradition of fair but competitive football and never-say-die attitude.

HORWICH RMI was the club that faced a season-long struggle after manager Mick Holgate took charge on the eve of the Big NPL Premier Division Kick-Off. The former St. Helens Town boss has done a sterling job bringing in some excellent experienced players but never afraid to throw in some of Grundy Hill's home-grown young talent. Two away games still remain should Rovers unexpectedly stumble. NPL football looks a certainty for next season as the ground has now been upgraded to the required standard.

ATHERTON COLLS stumbled towards the end and fell away

from the NWCL Division 2 promotion chase but the new floodlights are now up at Alder House and the ground is looking a real treat. WESTHOUGHTON TOWN came good at the death with a string of creditable results but I doubt that the ambition of club officials matches that of experienced manager, Dave Thornley.

In the Manchester League Division 1 LITTLE HULTON UTD, who won the Gylchrist Cup, and ATHERTON TOWN, who took the Westhoughton Charity Cup, have both failed to add league honours to these cup triumphs but both will finish in the top half and look well set for the next campaign. At final whistle the entry onto the pitch by an estimated eight thousand supporters was in celebration of our team's achievement and truly a moment to savour. Sadly, five of our supporters sustained leg bone injuries in their attempts to get onto the pitch and there were many other unreported cases of minor crush related injuries. One lady supporter suffered a fit and because of the crush it took the emergency services about ten minutes to get to her. If that were not bad enough, because of the incursion onto the pitch the Club received severe criticism from the Football Licensing Authority. The Club cannot afford the likely consequence of further criticism of that nature.

Our last match this season is on Sunday the 8th of May against Barnsley. Whilst this match may not have the same significance as the Preston game I feel I have a duty to our Club to ask our supporters to stay on the terraces at the final whistle. Whatever the outcome, please do not come onto the pitch. We have had a season to remember, don't let's spoil the Wanderers good name. Thank you."

Bolton Reserves' unbeaten run of eight games came to an end when Nottingham Forest ran out 2-1 winners at Burnden to ease their relegation worries.

The Wanderers made a great start when they went ahead after only five minutes play.

A cross from Neil Fisher found Gary Martindale at the far post and he headed the ball back into the path of Steve Fulton for the midfielder to register his third League goal of the season.

Bolton continued to have the better of the proceedings during the first half, Forest keeper Mark Statham saving well from an Andy Roscoe shot whilst Jason Lydiate was only inches wide after he had stuck a foot out to a loose ball.

Just before the interval Roscoe had a strong penalty appeal turned down after he had been brought down by Vance Warner.

Forest came back into the game early in the second half, Lee Glover shooting over from a good position before Steven Howe equalised six minutes after the restart with a shot from ten yards after the Wanderers defence had failed to clear their lines.

Bolton full back Nicky Spooner had to block a shot from Forest centre half Raymond Byrne on the line whilst at the other end Alan Thompson twice went close to restoring the Wanderers' advantage.

Forest grabbed what turned out to be the winner eleven minutes from time when substitute Dale Wright got away to slip the ball past oncoming keeper Mark Walton before finding the net off the inside of the post.

Bolton went all out for an equaliser with the best chances coming in the final two minutes.

Scott Green's long throw caused confusion in the visitors defence, Neil Fisher seeing his goalbound shot deflected wide of the target. Forest keeper Statham then produced a spectacular save to deny Steve Fulton a second goal with a shot from 20 yards.

Looking Back

On this day in history...

5th May . . .

- 1923 • Exactly a week after winning the first Wembley FA Cup final against West Ham United the Wanderers visited Chorley for a friendly fixture. A crowd of 8,000 saw two trophies on view that day, along with the FA Cup was Chorley's Lancashire Combination trophy. The Wanderers fielded ten members of the Wembley side, Walter Rowley replacing Jimmy Seddon, running out 8-0 winners, John Smith netting three goals, David Jack and Joe Smith two a piece with the other coming from Billy Butler.

- 1927 • A Bolton side took on an international eleven at Burnden, going down 7-4 in a game to raise funds for the Bolton Sportsmen's War Fund.

- 1928 • Sheffield United visited Burnden in the final game of the season, both sides finishing with ten men after Seddon and Gillespie were sent off for fighting. Bolton fought back from a half time deficit to earn a point thanks to a Jim McClelland goal.

- 1934 • Already relegated Lincoln City took a two goal advantage against the Wanderers on home territory but goals from Ernie Jones and Alec Finney were enough to earn a point. Despite this, the Wanderers missed out on winning promotion to the First Division when Preston won 1-0

at Southampton to pip Bolton by a single point.

- 1945 • Bolton twice held the lead in the North War Cup semi final against Wolves at Molineux but had to settle for a 2-2 draw in the first leg tie.



Bolton were without Danny Winter who was representing Wales against England, the goals being scored by Malcolm Barrass and Stan Butler.

- 1979 • Aston Villa visited Burnden Park for a First Division fixture that ended scoreless before

17,394 spectators. The result extended the Wanderers' run to seven games without a win although they were clear of the relegation zone.

- 1984 • Millwall inflicted the Wanderers fourth consecutive defeat when they ran out 3-0 winners at The Den before only 2,346. Centre forward Dean Neal helped himself to all of the Londoners goals.

- 1990 • A goalless draw at Swansea City put Bolton into the final play off spot, ousting other contenders Reading and Birmingham. The point was also enough for Swansea to avoid relegation to the Fourth Division.

Talking Point

A personal look into football...

Most weeks these columns cover the view of the supporter, chosen at random. In this issue our roving reporter met up with out of town fan COLIN FAIRCLOUGH.

Colin was born in the once busy mining town of Leigh and it's perhaps a little unusual for him to be such a fanatical fan because Rugby League is renowned as the prominent sport in the area.

"My dad first took me along in 1966 after the World Cup" explained Colin, "and I have been a faithful supporter since."

He's a Burnden Stand season ticket holder and claims to have missed only five home games since his first introduction.

"I've watched Bolton in all divisions" he continued, "and am happy with the League position this season."

Like most of us Colin was hoping Bolton would be at Wembley next Saturday but thought that Oldham's style of play led to the Cup exit. "I didn't think it would suit Bolton" he admitted.

Already he is thinking positively to next term when promotion to the Premiership is not beyond reality and is expecting some more new faces to be brought into the fold.

Colin indicates that the way forward might have to be at the expense of departures. "I believe if we get £2 million for a player and buy three good players for the same price it must be better because all three aren't going to be out at once. It must be a stronger situation" he said.

If there is enough cash in the coffers to buy without selling then that situation is idea.

Looking back over the season Colin has been impressed by Notts Forest and Derby. "They both looked good" he added.

Amid speculation of Wanderers taking up a new 'home' Colin's home town could also inherit a team of their own in the near future. There is talk of non league Horwich RMI sharing Leigh RL Hilton Park ground.

Colin said, "I think they would get a few fans out of interest because they've not seen football in Leigh. They would probably attract more spectators by moving." he also concedes that Bolton's Directors are making the right move in exploring a probable site to build a new stadium. "If we do make it into the Premiership, Burnden would have to become all seated anyway and that would reduce capacity to 20,000. It doesn't want to be less than that if we are looking to the future and its about the same travelling distance for me" he concluded.

So whilst Colin Fairclough is sitting back happy with the Wanderers League position many clubs are still fighting to avoid relegation and gain promotion play-off spots. All will be revealed come Saturday on the final day of the season.

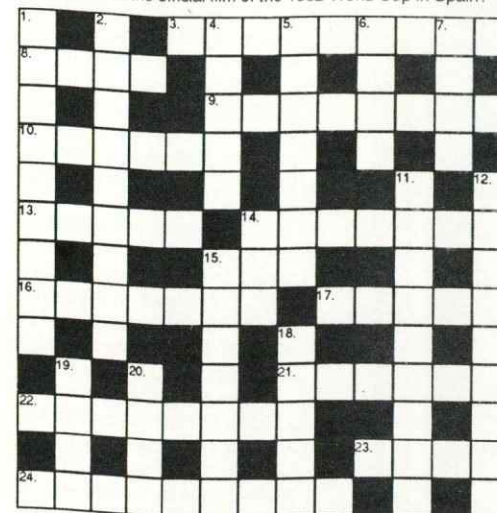

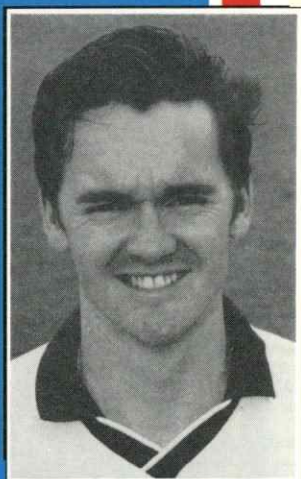
