PLEAT'S PERSPECTIVE

BRIGHT WORLD CUP CAN INSPIRE US ALL IN A CRUCIAL SEASON

WELCOME to all supporters for today's opening game.

We must all hope that the bright attacking philosophies shown in the majority of World Cup games will transmit throughout the league scene.

This season is particularly crucial as only two clubs will be promoted and four clubs relegated. It is to be hoped caution doesn't take over.

We welcome West Brom, their supporters, players and officials to Kenilworth Road.

Not many weeks ago, we witnessed one of the most exciting matches here, and fortunately that result took the pressure off our club. We were

delighted when Albion themselves won on the last day of the season to retain their status.

Much has changed this summer. In our own gracious way we allowed several players to leave to reduce our costs.

John Dreyer, Jason Rees and Andy Petterson will line-up at Stoke, Portsmouth and Charlton respectively. Alan Harper too is expected to sign for Burnley, another Division One team with hopes of success.

Youngsters Neil Watkins, Justin Gentle and Neil Ryan also left, and big-hearted Darren Salton is no longer contracted.

At the time of going to press we have made no major sale, but have added to our group Dwight Marshall from Plymouth, whose pace will upset a few defenders this season, and Tony Adcock, the experienced forward from Peterborough who has a fine football brain and an excellent scoring record. We wish them both every success.

We now have some competition for Kerry Dixon and John Hartson.

It is unfortunate that at present we have been disturbed by injuries. Tony Adcock (hamstring), Mitchell Thomas (knee) and Des Linton (knee) have all done insufficient rehabilitation work to be considered.

Also Ceri Hughes got a nasty tackle in Scotland and is unlikely to be ready.

Add to this the suspension of John Hartson and it is a case of a little early season shuffling and hoping that the selections will be accurate.

Darren Bradshaw has been training with us. He is at present under the freedom of contract scenario at Peterborough and I am also hopeful of adding goalkeeping competition as soon as possible.

We have been busy in pre-season with three games in Scotland and the home match with Southampton.

We have tried one or two different formations and most players have had an opportunity to show some form and regain fitness after the summer break.

I have noted that West Brom have had a most successful pre-season with fine wins at Cardiff and Swansea.

Next Tuesday we meet Fulham in the Coca Cola Cup, and it is important that we gain some advantage before the second game.

Finally, a welcome to any new sup-

porters who are with us today.

Remember how important it is in the current climate of escalating transfer fees to try and stay with the game. This is why we need all the support commercially and at the gate as possible.

We know the alternative if we don't improve these areas, and that is an equation answer that I have never enjoyed talking about.

Enjoy today's game, get behind the players, and let's hope we can have a thoroughly enjoyable and successful season.

The young Welshman was presented with his award by boxing manager Dai Gardiner, and was a proud winner of a very prestigious award in his home community.

Ceri will this season be aiming to stake a claim for a permanent place in the Welsh side.

TOWN stars Ceri Hughes, Mitchell Thomas, David Preece, Kerry Dixon and Scott Oakes were on auto-graph duty at Swanbourne School, near Milton Keynes, last month, at a special sports exhibition day organised by staff and pupils.

Among the other guests was Olympic gold medallist Seb Coe, now an MP, and champion racehorse Desert Orchid.

MITCHELL Thomas and John Hartson will miss the opening games of the season through suspension.

Thomas has been suspended for three matches following his dismissal against West Brom in the final home match of last season, while Hartson must serve a four-match ban after being sent-off at Bolton in the penultimate match of the 93-94 campaign.

Thomas, who recently signed a two-year contract with the club, misses today's match with West Brom, Tuesday's Coca-Cola Cup visit of Fulham, and next Saturday's league trip to Derby.

Hartson will also miss these games, plus the away leg of the cup tie at Craven Cottage on August 23.

THE Hatters will entertain Southend, here at Kenilworth Road, on Saturday, August 27 as originally scheduled. The match had been shortlisted for live television coverage the following day.

From the start of this season, ITV will be transmitting a football magazine programme, at the present time entitled The Endsleigh

Football League Extra.

The Football League have been pressing for this type of programme for some time, and with the support of league sponsors Endsleigh this has now been made possible.

For the first few weeks it will be transmitted in limited ITV regions, but will be fully networked during September.

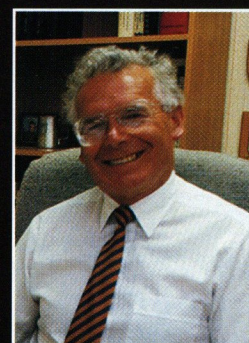

WELCOME back to Kenilworth Road, following a busy summer which has seen a number of changes both on and off the field.

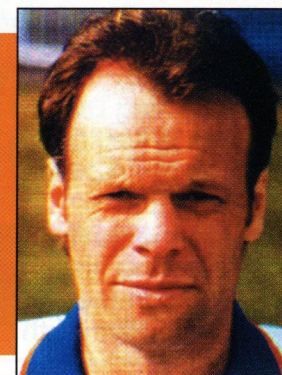
David Pleat has outlined the playing side, and elsewhere in today's programme Geoff Lovell gives you full details of safety in the stadium.

A NEW MARSHALL IN TOWN!

NEW signing Dwight Marshall is cutting down on the mileage and hoping to increase the goals tally following his £150,000 summer move from Plymouth Argyle.

The 28-year-old scored 14 goals for Peter Shilton's side last season, and is looking forward to the challenge of Division One football a little closer to home.

"I am certainly looking forward to playing in a higher division, and with a young family in London the travelling to Plymouth was proving a big burden, so playing closer to home is another good reason to move," he said.

The Jamaican-born striker suffered the agony of defeat in the promotion

play-offs last season, as Plymouth squandered a good 0-0 draw at Burnley by losing 3-1 in their home leg.

Plymouth played Luton

in the 1992-93 season, beating the Hatters 5-4 on aggregate in the second round of the Coca-Cola Cup. Dwight missed both legs through injury, but had played against Luton in a pre-season friendly.

He is set to start this campaign alongside Kerry Dixon, with John Hartson suspended, and will no doubt be keen to impress.

"I like to think I am quick off the mark and can take defenders by surprise," he said. "You have to want to score, to be hungry for goals, and instinct plays a big part."

"Strikers have to be alert in the box, because chances don't come along very often."

Dwight has impressed David Pleat in the pre-season friendlies, and was close to opening his account for the club against Southampton.

THERE will be some familiar faces to greet Luton around the Endsleigh Division One grounds this season, following the summer departures of several Town players.

Goalkeeper Andy Petterson has joined Charlton Athletic, with the fee due to be decided by a tribunal this week. Australian-born Andy spent most of last season on the bench, with Juergen Sommer in fine form, and felt it was time to seek first-team football. He started as first-choice in the 1992-93 campaign, before Alec Chamberlain regained his place, and last season Andy started just two league games.

Also moving on is defender John Dreyer, who was given a free transfer and joined Stoke City. John joined Luton from Oxford, and skippered the side on many occasions, forming a key central-defensive partnership with Trevor Peake.

Jason Rees, also given a free transfer, has joined Portsmouth, while Canadian international Geoff Auger has been released by the club by mutual consent. Best wishes to all these players in their future careers.

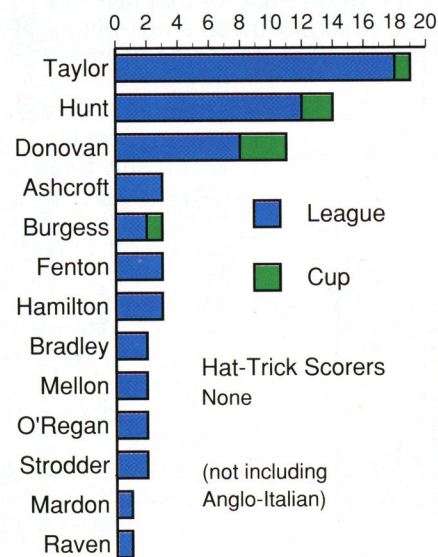

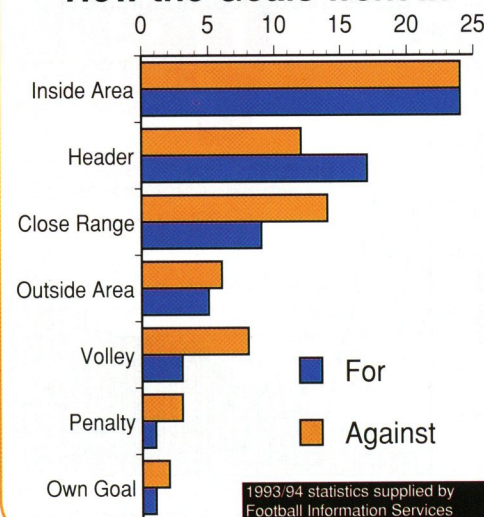

VISITORS ON PARADE

LEE ASHCROFT (forward) - Started his career at Preston, before signing for Albion for £225,000 in August 1993. England Under 21 international, scored the match-winning goal at Portsmouth in May to keep Albion in Division One.

DARREN BRADLEY (defender/midfield) - Over 250 appearances for West Brom, and was made captain in 92/93. Troubled by injury and missed the run-in last season.

DARYL BURGESS (defender) - Progressed through the junior ranks at The Hawthorns, and having overcome a serious back injury he was voted Player of the Year in 1994.

SCOTT DARTON (left-back) - Didn't feature until late-on in the 93/94 season following an injury to Paul Edwards.

KEVIN DONOVAN (midfield) - Has scored 24 goals in 79 appearances for Albion. Started last season very well, lost his place, and then finished with a flurry.

PAUL EDWARDS (defender) - Joined Albion from Wolves in January last season.

IAN HAMILTON (midfielder) - Born in Stevenage, and played for Southampton, Cambridge and Scunthorpe before signing for West Brom for £160,000 in June 1992.

ANDY HUNT (striker) - Joined Newcastle from Kettering for £150,000, and bagged 15 goals in 50 games for the Magpies before joining West Brom. Scored 25 goals last season.

PAUL MARDON (defender) - Signed for West Brom from Birmingham in November 1993 for £400,000, making him Albion's most expensive defender ever.

BERNARD McNALLY (midfield) - Northern Ireland international who has played over 450 league appearances for Shrewsbury and West Brom.

MICKY MELLON (midfield) - tough-tackling Scot who joined the club from Bristol City.

STUART NAYLOR (goalkeeper) - Over 300 appearances for Albion and an England B international.

KIERAN O'REGAN (midfield) - Eire international who was Keith Burkinshaw's first signing for Albion.

MIKE PHELAN (midfield) - Albion's new captain, who joined the club in the summer from Manchester United.

PAUL RAVEN (centre-back) - A key figure alongside Burgess in the Albion defence.

BOB TAYLOR (striker) - Impressive goal-scorer for Leeds, Bristol City and West Brom, with 66 goals in 129 appearances for the Baggies.

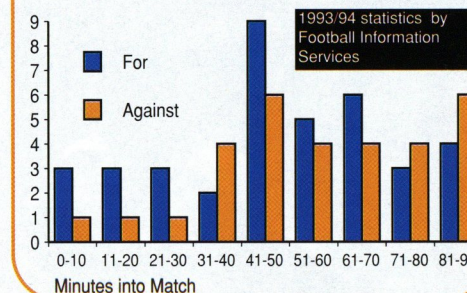
MEET THE BOSS

KEITH Burkinshaw's playing career was limited to one appearance for Liverpool and 108 games for Scunthorpe. He moved into a coaching role at Newcastle, and was appointed manager at Tottenham in July 1976, but the club slipped out of the top flight at the end of his first season.

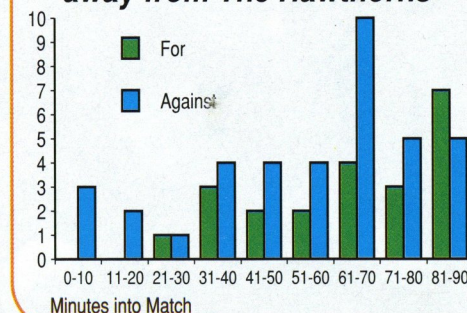
But Tottenham won their place back in Division One at the first attempt, and he later guided them to two successive FA Cup wins, in 1981 and 1982 and success in the 1984 UEFA Cup Final.

He resigned at Spurs after that win, but was appointed Ossie Ardiles' assistant at West Brom in 1992, taking over when Ardiles left last summer.

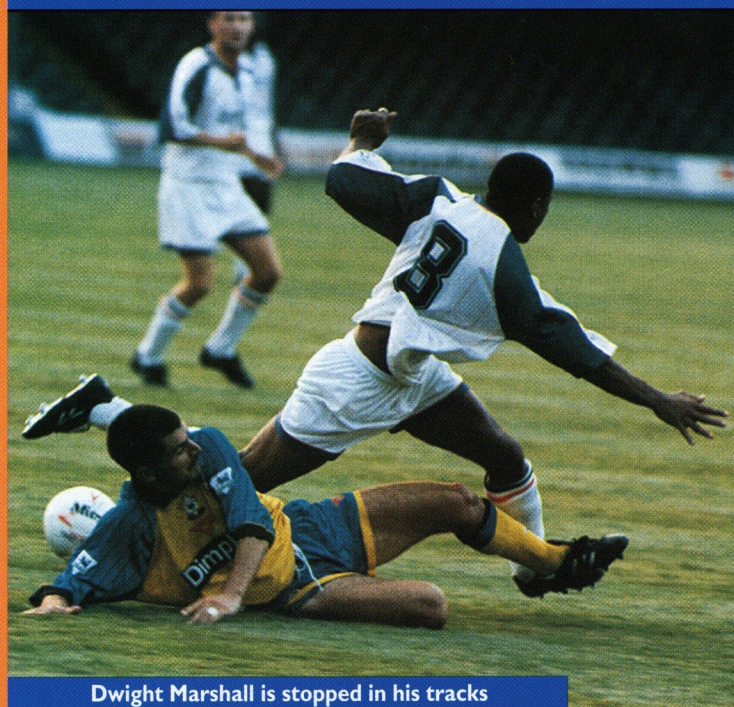
When West Brom Scored and Conceded at Home

Dwight Marshall is stopped in his tracks

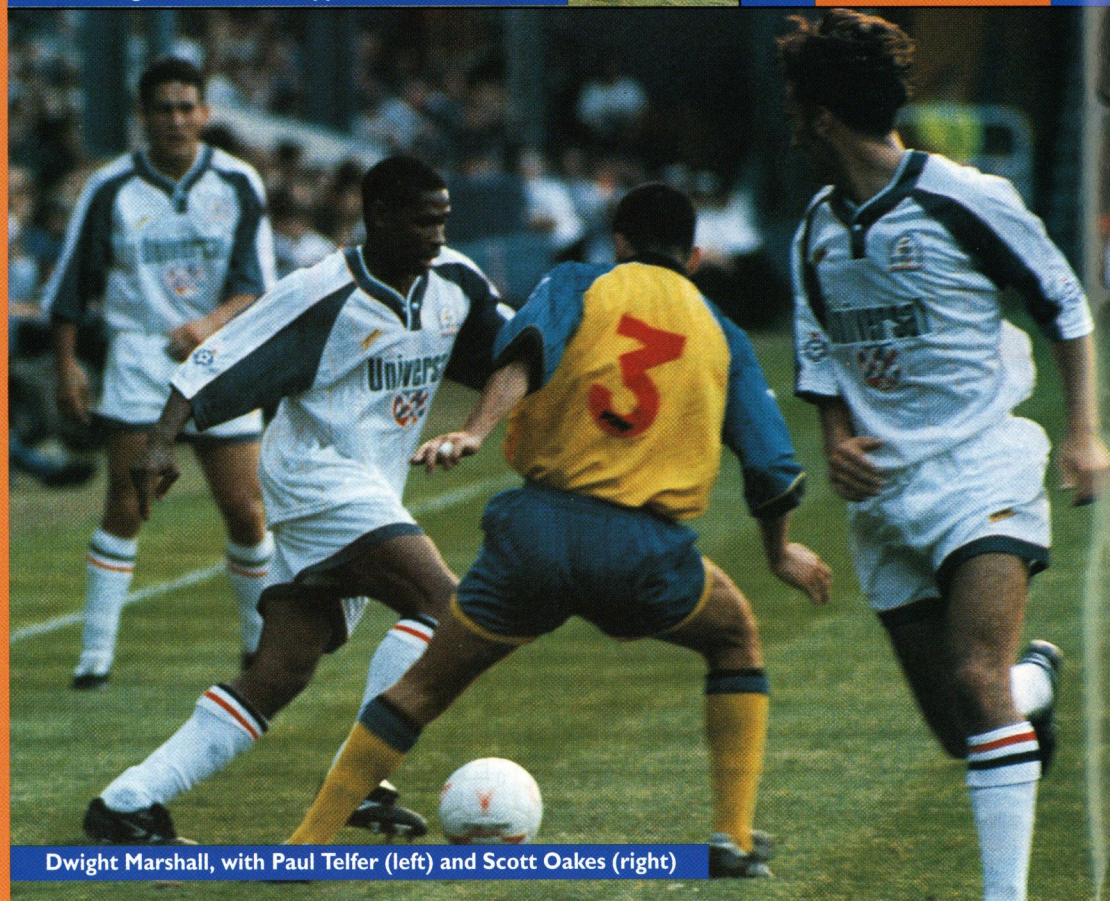

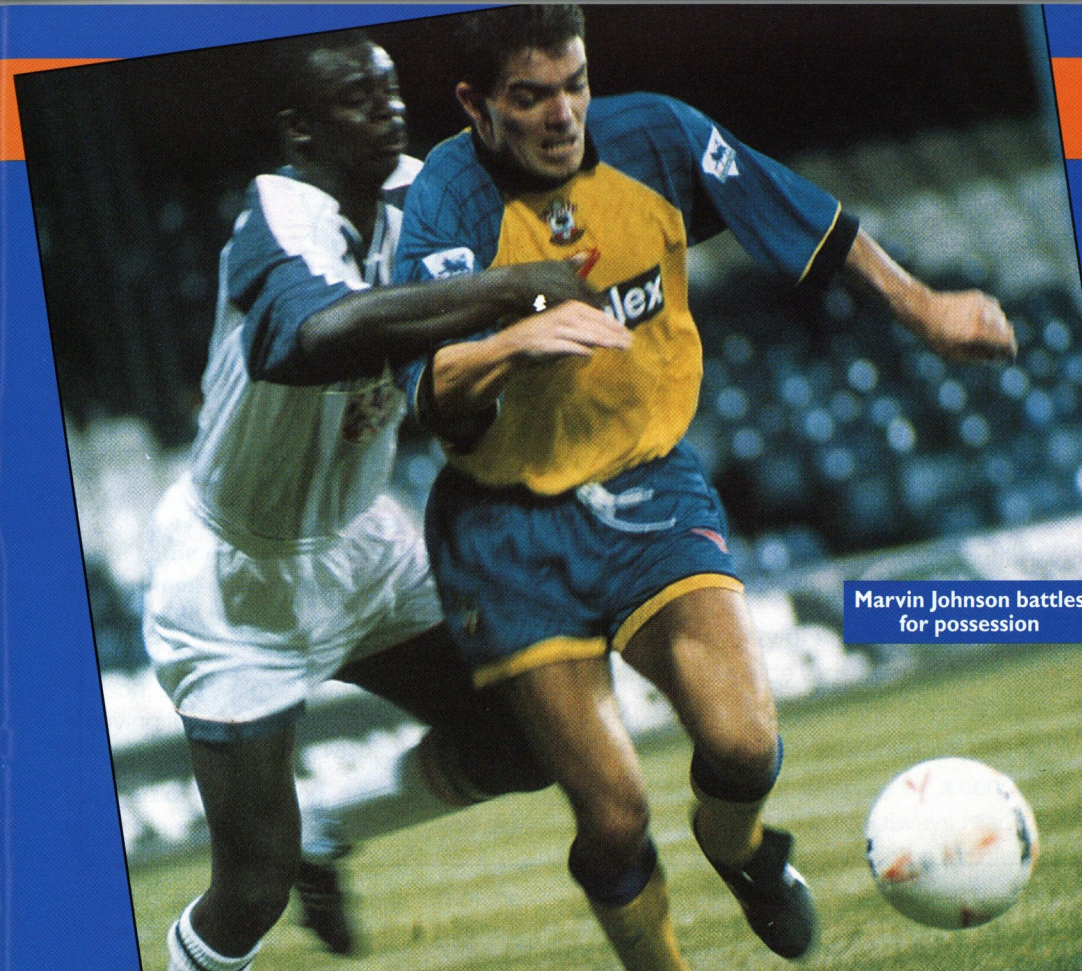

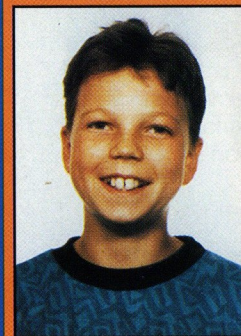

CENTRE SPOT



THIS is the season for some of our players to really take the first division by storm, those that were classed as 'younger players' last term now have a year's more experience and they can now take more responsibility on their shoulders.

If they can do this it will allow some new faces in, both in terms of giving more younger players a chance to settle and in terms of giving the new arrivals a chance to stake their claim.

We have had a mixed pre-season in terms of results, but very good in terms of spirit and team-building. There is plenty of optimism in the changing room, and a very healthy competition for places. Obviously up front, Dwight Marshall and Tony Adcock have come to the club, and John Hartson proved what an outstanding prospect he is last season. But such competition only enhances the strength of the squad, and it's something I've had to contend with all my career - it's part and parcel of football.

Personally I would like to score more goals than I did last year, but I'm enjoying my football as much as ever.

Looking back at last year obviously the cup run was a highlight, but I like to think we could do better in the league. We need

to start with some good wins and get some points in the bag, so that we can go into the Christmas period with something to aim for, rather than trying to climb out of a relegation place.

Coming to Luton, where perhaps I might have, or maybe should have started my career, has been a great period for me, and although I maybe regret one or two moves I made I can't complain at the way my career has gone.

It's a big money game now, and the transfer fees are spiralling as people come into the game with big money and put it behind particular clubs. The money has worked its way down the line, in that the big clubs are buying players and giving the smaller clubs cash to improve their grounds for example. But while that is a good thing, it is looking increasingly likely that the big clubs will dominate the game.

One club who could certainly do with some money at the moment is Dunstable - the club where I started my career. I had some great seasons there in the old Southern League, but it's very sad to see their current plight. They should be one of the premier non-league outfits in the area, so if there are any of these money men I was mentioning earlier around, then there's a club with great potential.

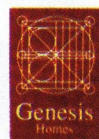

LUTON Town will be wearing new kit this season, marketed under our own 'Hatters' logo, with a new club badge.

As you will see in the photos throughout this programme, the home kit is predominantly white, while the away strip is blue and orange. The change to the home strip is the first for two seasons, and replicas are now available in the restocked club shop.

Explaining the change, Luton chairman David Kohler said producing the kits under the club's own merchandise logo would mean cheaper prices for supporters - and the shirts retail at £28.99 as opposed to £29.99 last season.

"It is an idea pioneered by Leicester City, and although clubs have come under fire for constantly changing their kits, we have to accept that fashions do

change, especially with regard to childrens' clothes," said Mr Kohler.

"We have changed both jerseys this season, but the shirts are cheaper than last year, and we will be one of the few clubs whose replica jerseys have an embroidered badge on rather than a plain iron-on sticker.

"The new badge was designed to give us something which incorporated our nickname, the town shield, the name of the club, and football, and hopefully we have achieved that. The Hatters logo will now feature on many souvenirs and there will be a wide selection of good in the shops."

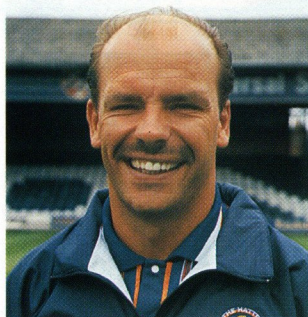

WITH injuries disrupting the senior squad pre-season, the Reserve sides fielded by the Hatters have for the most part been a mix of youth players and triallists.

Westley has been pleased with the progress of the new recruits.

The youth team travelled to one of Terry's former clubs Diss Town, last season's FA Vase winners, and won 1-0 with a goal from Junior Haynes - an 18-year-old released by Tottenham.

They then lost 2-0 to Spurs, but on Saturday beat Arsenal 2-1 at the Gunners' London Colney training ground.

Gary Issot and Robert Keen were the Luton scorers.

The youth team can still include the likes of Kelvin Davis and Paul McLaren, who both made their first team debuts at Stoke on the final day of last season.

"These two give the team some real strength

and power," admitted Terry Westley, "and it shows the newcomers just what can be achieved.

"We always point out to the new boys when they arrive, that Luton is an ideal club to join for a young player. "You only have to look at our current professional group, and how many of them have progressed quickly from the juniors, to see that's you get your chance here.

"The news boys have certainly knuckled down and have worked hard.

"It's a big change from being at school, and they now have a lot of responsibility, and play the game as part of their job."

"There was certainly a lot of hard work to do, but our physio Clive Goodyear has been a great help, and Darren Salton was always around so I wasn't alone.

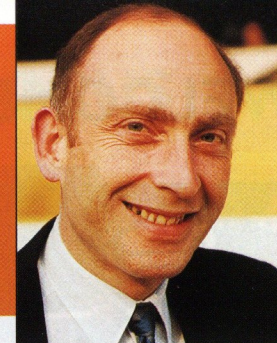
"I was given the go-ahead to resume full training in the summer and, touch wood, I haven't had any problems.

GILES OFF AS HIGH-FLYING BAGGIES FALL TO CASH-STARVED TOWN

5 YEARS AGO

Five years ago: 19/8/89: The Town's first game of the season took them to Tottenham where the home side were made to fight for their 2-1 victory. Roy Wegerle was the Luton scorer in a match that marked a first team debut for Mick Kennedy.

10 YEARS AGO

Ten years ago: 25/8/84: A late start this time, but the wait was worth it as Stoke were beaten rather more easily than the 2-0 scoreline suggests. Frank Bunn and Steve Elliott were on target for the Town.

15 YEARS AGO

Fifteen years ago: 18/8/79: Cambridge came away from Kenilworth Road with a point from a 1-1 draw, with David Moss bagging the Luton goal.

20 YEARS AGO

Twenty years ago: 17/8/74: A big day for Luton followers with Liverpool the visitors for the first Division One game at Kenilworth Road for 14 years. Barry Butlin opened the scoring in front of a 21,000 strong crowd, but the Reds won 2-1.

RELEGATED from Division One at the end of 1974/75, the Town started off the following season fairly brightly and after four games a place in the leading pack promised much, and hopes were high for an immediate return to the top flight.

Injuries to fullback Steve Buckley and striker Ron Futcher then upset the balance of the side, and when Adrian Alston was sold to Cardiff the league position deteriorated, and by the end of November alarm bells had begun to sound.

Then the club's financial situation was revealed, with over £350,000 owed to the bank, and chairman Len Hawkins resigned, along with directors including

the late Eric Morecambe. A player had to be sold, and manager Harry Haslam was left in the situation of having to raise cash when every club knew why!

But the off-the-field problems seemed to spur the players into action, as Orient were beaten 1-0 at Kenilworth Road, followed by an amazing 5-1 win at Charlton with Peter Anderson scoring twice in what was to be his swansong.

Anderson was the jewel in the crown and a bid of £200,000 from Aston Villa had been turned down the previous season.

Now the club were desperate sellers, and Haslam accompanied the player to Antwerp where an £80,000 bid had been tabled. The manager was later to recount tales of messages reaching him from England that the electricity board had cut

off the supply, but he managed to secure a cash deal of £53,000.

But supporters also pledged financial support, and there was a real groundswell of feeling emphasised by a crowd of 9,450 turning out for Alan Slough's testimonial match.

The players were in defiant mood, and the next visitors to Kenilworth Road were high-flying West Brom, who had won five of their previous six games. The Baggies were on their way back to Division One, but suffered an early blow when player-manager John Giles was sent off for a foul on Ron Futcher.

But the 10 men stepped up a gear and it wasn't until shortly before half-time that the Town got the breakthrough when Alan West and John Aston set up Andy King who steered the ball home.

Immediately after the break Mick Martin equalised for the visitors when he ran through the Luton defence, and it was end-to-end stuff after that.

But finally the handicap of being a player short proved too much, and John Osborne was deceived by a long shot from Aston for what proved to be the winner.

The Town never looked back after this and won seven games on the trot.

Albion meanwhile secured promotion in the final game of the season.

"I was delighted to get the chance to stay up after the disappointment of relegation and it was a chance I had to grab."

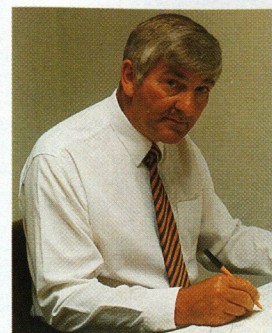

STADIUM FOCUS

DURING the close season, a lot of work goes into ensuring the stadium and match-day operation is as safe as we can make it, and the maintenance staff have worked extremely hard to make sure that the requirements of the Safety Advisory Group are met.

This group carry out an inspection at the start of the close season, and then prior to the start of the league campaign to make sure we have followed their recommendations.

They recommend to the County Council as to whether we should get our safety certificate under the Safety of Sports Grounds Act.

With the conversion of the stadium to all-seater we have had to look at all our emergency plans to deal with emergencies from floodlight failure to pitch invasions.

We must also have a ground evacuation plan, and in the coming months we aim to test various parts of this plan, involving spectators as they leave the ground.

Watch this space for full details.

For the past few seasons we have been using an agency, Special Events, to supply our stewards.

Clubs are now being made responsible for safety, and this has meant a reduction in policing to the benefit of both the community and ourselves.

There has been much liaison between the club, the agency and the police, and I believe the use of an agency is a major benefit as the stewards gain experience from working at such venues as Twickenham and Silverstone.

The majority of our stewards come

from the local area, and anyone interested in becoming a steward can contact me at the club.

Best wishes by the way to two stewards, Jack Allen and Les Parsons, who have retired after over 20 years service.

Stewards are responsible for implementing ground regulations, a job which includes searching spectators as they enter the ground.

I know many supporters were upset last year by the confiscation of golf-type umbrellas, but in the wrong hands these could cause serious injury.

But unlike other prohibited articles we do try and return them, and stewards should tell you where you can collect them. We still have some waiting collection! Again, contact me at the club.

One area of safety still causing a great deal of concern is smoking in the main stand. Despite notices and warnings there is still a small minority who continue to smoke.

If necessary they will be ejected from the ground. It shouldn't need me to tell you how quickly fire can spread in a wooden stand.

Finally, I would encourage supporters to make use of the emergency telephones placed around the stadium. They are the yellow boxes which are in all stands.

They are there for your use, if there is not a steward nearby in the event of an emergency.

The phones give you direct access to the stadium control room.

We will of course keep supporters fully up-to-date with all safety measures, and would welcome your comments.

Have a safe season.

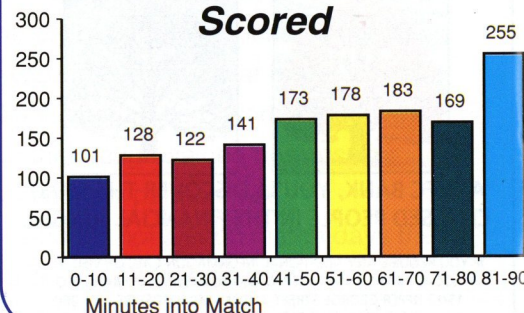

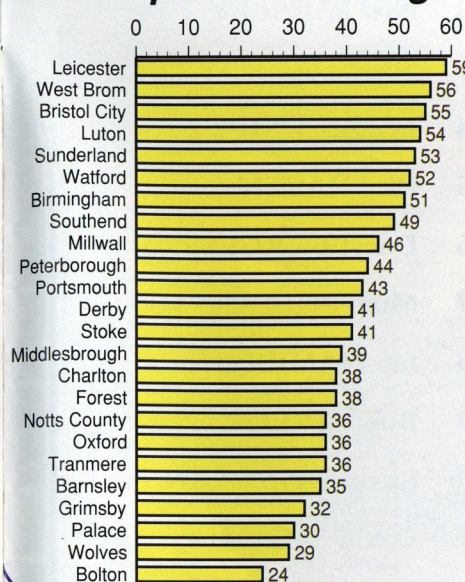
Average League Gates



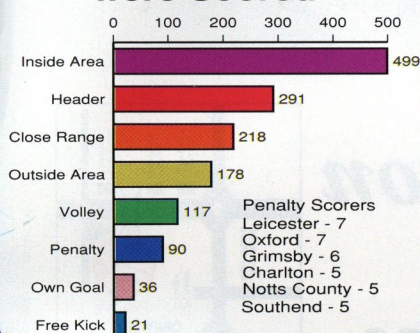
When the Goals were Scored



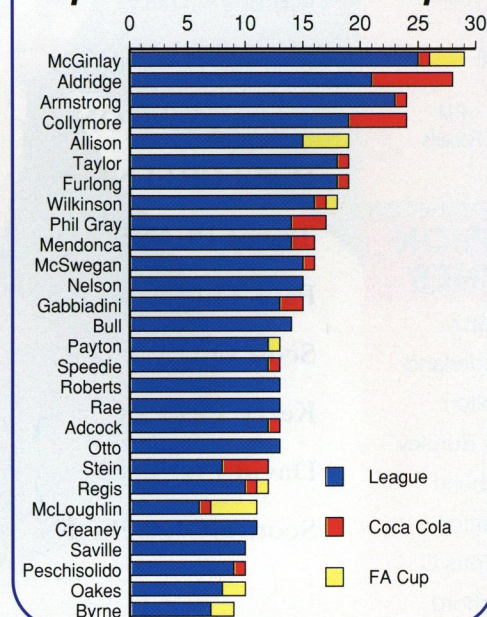

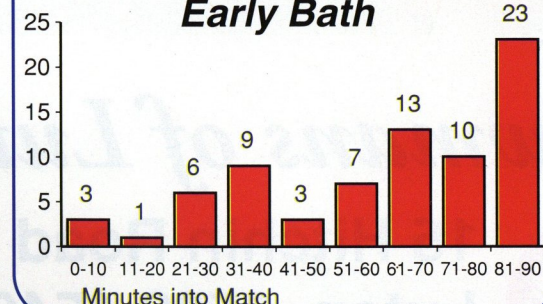
