A SUPER TEST AGAINST A GREAT INTERNATIONAL AND HIS TEAM

Let us hope that the attitude of *both* sides today is positive.



Every player had either been bought or signed on a free transfer from other clubs.

Our visitors today have over the last few years bought quite wisely. The pairing of Paul Wilkinson and John Hendrie looked the best front partnership last season, while home grown players like Jamie Pollock and Alan Moore have outstanding potential.

With the additions of Clayton Blackmore, Neil Cox, Steve Vickers, and Alan Miller, the goalkeeper signed from Arsenal, they look as though they have a strong squad.





ON THE OTHER SIDE

TOPSY-TURVY BORO NOW ENJOY LIFE OF BRYAN

MIDDLESBROUGH'S is an eventful history, spanning almost 120 years, which has seen them survive relegations and even liquidation, and years in which one of the Football League's oldest clubs have produced some of the most famous names in the game.

Men such as goalkeeper Tim Williamson, George Camsell, Wilf Mannion, George Hardwick and Brian Clough, and more recently Graeme Souness and current England centre-half Gary Pallister!

The club was formed in 1876, playing its first recorded game the following year - some 12 years before the Football League itself was founded in 1888.

In 1903, Boro moved to Ayresome Park, and at the time the ground's North Stand, which still exists, was built for little more than £1,500. The 1913/14 season saw Boro enjoy their best ever league campaign to date, when they finished third in the first division.

The latter part of the 1920s had Boro bobbing back and forth between Divisions One and Two, eventually ending up in the top flight where they were to remain until 1954.

The 20s and 30s belonged to record goalscorer Camsell, with the immediate post war years bringing Mannion and Hardwick to prominence.

By the late 1950s, a certain Brian Clough was on his way to 204 goals in 222 appearances, with Ayresome Park chosen as one of the venues for the 1966 World Cup Finals.

But that season also saw relegation, and it wasn't until 1974, under Jack Charlton, that they were back in Division One.

The 1980s saw things go from bad to worse, with relegation into Division Three in April 1986, followed three months later by liquidation. Rescue came quickly, and under Bruce Rioch Boro stormed back from Division Three to Division One in successive seasons.


But 1988/89 saw relegation back to Division Two, with 89/90 bringing the £2.3 million sale of Pallister to Manchester United, a Zenith Cup Final at Wembley, and victory on the last day of the season to avoid another drop!

Colin Todd replaced Bruce Rioch, with Lennie Lawrence then taking over at the start

of the 91/92 campaign.

He gained promotion to the new premier league at the first attempt, but with Boro back in Division One, Bryan Robson was appointed in May.

The early signs are that Boro will not have to wait long to be back in the top flight.






Goal Scorers

VISITORS ON PARADE

ALAN MILLER - Rated as a potential future international by Boro boss Bryan Robson, he won his first England Under-21 cap before playing in the first team at his first club Arsenal. Joined Boro in the summer for a fee which could rise to £425,000 after appearances.

STEPHEN PEARS - Goalkeeper who began his career at Manchester United and is now in his 10th season with Middlesbrough.

NEIL COX - Joined Boro in a club record £1 million deal during the summer from Aston Villa. Won a Coca-Cola Cup winners medal last season, when he was a substitute in Villa's 3-1 success over Manchester United.

CURTIS FLEMING - Hard-tackling fullback who has played for the Republic of Ireland at under-21 and B levels.

CHRIS MORRIS - Republic of Ireland international right-back who missed the summer World Cup due to injury. Has previously played at Sheffield Wednesday and Celtic.

NIGEL PEARSON - Dominant centre-back who was made club captain on his arrival at Ayresome Park from Sheffield Wednesday in the summer. Joined Boro in a deal which could eventually net the Owls £750,000.

STEVE VICKERS - Highly-rated centre-back who played almost 400 first-team games for Tranmere before a £700,000 switch to Boro midway through last season.

DEREK WHYTE - Scottish international centre-back who won his first cap aged just 19. Won honours with Celtic, before a then club record move to Boro for £900,000 in the summer of 1992.

ANDY TODD - Confident young defender who is tipped to follow in the footsteps of his father Colin.

MICHAEL BARRON - Todd's centre-back partner as the youngsters have progressed through the ranks at Ayresome Park.

JAMIE POLLOCK - Midfielder who turned down Arsenal and Forest to join his hometown club, and has been a regular for three seasons.

ROBBIE MUSTOE - Midfielder who joined Boro from Oxford for £375,000 in July 1990.

CLAYTON BLACKMORE - Midfielder or defender who joined Boro on a free transfer in the summer after a successful career with Manchester United.

CRAIG HIGNETT - Goalscoring midfielder who joined Boro for £500,000 during the 92/93 season. Released by Liverpool as a youngster, but like Platt, Jones and Thomas, used Crewe to resurrect his career.

GRAHAM KAVANAGH - Capped by the Republic of Ireland at U21 level.

JOHN HENDRIE - A regular scorer for the past two seasons, after joining Boro from Leeds where he helped Howard Wilkinson's side win the Second Division Championship.

PAUL WILKINSON - Boro's leading scorer for the past three seasons, following spells at Grimsby, Everton, Forest and Watford.

ALAN MOORE - Talented winger who scored twice on his debut last season at Notts County. Scored 11 goals last term, earning a Republic of Ireland U21 call.

JAIME MORENO - First Bolivian to play in the Football League, and made his international debut at the age of 16. Exciting young striker who joined Boro for £250,000.

TOMMY WRIGHT - Boro career hit by injury after spells at Leeds, Oldham and Leicester.

MEET THE BOSS

Player-manager and midfield general, **BRYAN ROBSON** was one of the game's great players throughout the 1980s, winning 90 England caps.


He took up his first managerial post with Middlesbrough in the summer of 1994 after helping Manchester United to their second successive Premiership title, and is also closely involved in coaching duties with Terry Venables' England squad.

Captained United to League, FA Cup, League Cup and European glories during a memorable career, which also saw him captain the England team 65 times.


Began his career with West Bromwich Albion, before a then record £1.5 million move to Old Trafford in 1981.

Now 37, Bryan Robson is looking to make a quick return to the Premiership as his Middlesbrough side go in search of the one automatic promotion place.

When Boro have Scored and Conceded







"I was obviously disappointed to miss, and it does play on your mind, especially when they come back to equalise, but to be honest I think I made up for it, albeit nearer the goal just a yard out.

"We went to Stoke expecting a hard game, and soaked up a lot of pressure before hitting them on the break with Dwight's pace, and he caused them trou-

ble all afternoon," added David.

"The chance for us was there to take three points though, especially with John Dreyer getting sent off and I felt sorry for him. He's a very good defender and didn't show his true ability, but he's played well for Stoke they say, and they've got a good player."

Now though the Hatters bid, once again, to follow good away form with a winning display at home, although injury to Bryan Robson may rule out the renewal of mid-field confrontations which David remembers from Luton's days in the old Division One.

"Boro have some good players, and they were my tip to win promotion and are rightly up there," he said.

"But in this league at present everyone seems capable of beating everyone else, so it might be our day."

Whether the winner is from one yard out or from 30, Town fans won't mind!





MIDFIELDER Gary Waddock is now in his second month at Luton Town, on loan from Bristol Rovers.

The former Republic of Ireland international played five matches during his first month at Kenilworth Road, and has impressed manager David Pleat.

"Gary has done quite a sound job for us," said Mr Pleat. "We always feel that the way we play we need a midfield anchor, particularly if we ask our fullbacks to push up.

"Gary is a good professional. For someone to cope with playing abroad, playing at international level, and have the setback that he had in terms of injury and cope with that, means he has a reliable mentality.

"At the moment we need reliable mentalities. I'm not prepared to do anything of a permanent nature at this moment, but Gary is going to stay with us for a further month and we will continue to look at the situation."

The 32-year-old has certainly proved reliable thus far, in the role that was occupied so successfully and influentially by Alan Harper last season.

Gary made no secret of his wish to stay with the Hatters, getting the chance of first-

team football and being much closer to his London home.

It was in the capital that he made his name with Queens Park Rangers, making over 200 appearances for the Loftus Road side. The spell abroad came in Belgium with Charleroi as he battled back from serious injury, with spells at Millwall, QPR again and Swindon preceding his arrival at Bristol Rovers.


He hasn't figured in manager John Ward's plans this season, hence his arrival at Luton.

"I want to play first team football and David Pleat has given me that chance," he said.

"Obviously some of the results have been a little disappointing, but our away form has been good, and to go back to Millwall and get a good result was pleasing for me.

"We have played well in patches at home, but haven't taken our chances, and although it will always be difficult - Bristol came here determined to get something out of the game, and ended up with all three points - we have to turn the pressure we are creating into goals."

Delighted to sign on loan for a second month, Gary is now looking to earn something more longer term.





On the previous Sunday we had won 3-0 at Upton Park in the first leg of the Littlewoods Cup semi-final, and the scoreline did not flatter us.

It was difficult to say whether West Ham were poor or we played above ourselves, but the performance was certainly a vast improvement on most of the league games that particular season.

Dave Beaumont, signed from Dundee United, made his debut at West ham to form the sort of defensive partnership with skipper Steve Foster that had been missing since the early season sale of Mal Donaghy to Manchester United, and with Roy Wegerle back to his best alongside the ever dangerous Mick Harford we hoped for that sort of performance to be repeated in the quest for

league points.

Our inconsistent form was reflected in the league games played since Christmas when we had lost 4-0 and 3-0 at Wimbledon and Charlton respectively, yet had thrashed Southampton 6-1 at Kenilworth Road! It was certainly never dull being a Luton supporter at that time, with pre-match predictions going completely out of the window.

Middlesbrough were enjoying their first season back in Division One since 1982 and were paying their first visit to Kenilworth Road for almost 15 years.

Managed by a Luton star of the 1960s, Bruce Rioch, they were comfortably placed in mid-table and were unbeaten in their previous five games.





Ground regulations amended for the benefit of all spectators

THE Football League have recently amended and re-issued notices setting out the ground regulations applicable to all clubs, writes *Safety Officer Geoff Lovell* (pictured right).

These notices are displayed at all entrances to the ground, as well as inside, and the regulations now set out various offences that contravene the Football Spectators Act 1991.

In addition to these regulations, we also display other notices which show what cannot be brought into the stadium, and the type of behaviour that is unacceptable.

The club management reserves the right of admission to the ground. On no account will admission be granted to a person who is the subject of a current exclusion order.


Fireworks, flares, smoke canisters, knives, bottles, glasses, cans, poles and any articles that might be used as a weapon and/or compromise public safety are not permitted within the ground.

The following are offences strictly forbidden under the 1991 act:

- the throwing of any object within the ground.
- the use of foul and abusive language, obscene chanting or racial abuse towards any person.
- unauthorised entry onto the field of play or the surrounding track, except in an emergency.

We hope that these additional notices will help supporters in their understanding of the ground regulations.

The ground regulations are there for the benefit, safety and comfort of all spectators. The club reserve the right to consid-



er withdrawing the membership of anyone who is charged and convicted of any offence inside the stadium, and it is a policy that has been used in the past.

I have also received many comments over the lack of catering facilities at the Maple Road end of the main stand. I am afraid that this is an area that, due to safety restrictions, cannot be provided with a permanent catering unit.

We are however discussing ways of overcoming the problem so we can hopefully provide a facility which meets the approval of both the licensing authority and spectators.

IT is with regret that we inform supporters of the sad death of Douglas Frost, a loyal supporter of the Town for some 66 years. Mr Frost died in St Lukes Hospice, Winsford, in June, and his son David has asked us to publish this notice. Douglas Frost was born in Luton, moving to Bedford, and then to Cheshire in 1979. He still followed the team though in an 80-mile radius, and made many friends on his travels to see the Hatters. All at Luton Town pass on their sincere condolences to Mr Frost's family.






