




"Apparently it's very popular in Jamaica," he says. "But you can imagine the jokes I've had to put up with - mind you, they've all been in the best possible taste!"

Paul Jones on stand-by for Wales

International Recognition

Paul Jones received a major boost this week with news that he has been put on stand-by for international duty with Wales.

The Wolves 'keeper will be third in line to play in the European qualifier against Georgia behind Everton's Neville Southall and QPR's Tony Roberts.

"I haven't heard the news officially yet," said

Paul. "But someone from the local press got a tip off and called me.

"I'll only get to play if either Neville Southall or Tony Roberts are forced to pull out, but even if I don't make the trip, it's a boost to know I've been

selected.

"I wasn't aware that anyone was watching me but apparently Mike Smith has been to see me play a couple of times.

"I qualify for the Welsh team because I was born just over the border of Wales in Chirk. My parents lived in England but that's where the nearest hospital was.

"I'm sure with a name like Jones, there must be some Welsh blood in me somewhere".

Paul has yet to play for Wolves in a League game this season. His only appearances have been in the Anglo Italian Cup ties - the next of which would clash with Wales' trip to Georgia if he were to go.

Being a permanent number two to Mike Stowell is frustrating but Paul never lets it affect his performance for the reserves.

"I have to psych myself up for reserve games the same as I would first team matches," he says. "If I let my standards slip the boss will soon have words to say.

"I suppose I'm getting used to being reserve 'keeper but I have to keep on top of my game just in case there is a chance. It can get frustrating just sitting on the bench week-in-week-out, but this news of being put on international stand-by helps to keep your morale up."

Hat-trick hero

David Kelly's hat-trick against Bristol City has put him into joint fourth place in the Division One scoring stakes.

Ned's fine form means he has now bagged a total of 11 goals in 17 starts - almost double last season's total at this stage.

"I think that's because the team are playing with a lot more confidence this season," says Ned. "Also, this is the first time I've had a prolonged spell playing up-front with Bully. Last season I had half-a-dozen different partners and it

was hard to get settled.

"Things are going very well for the team as a whole and we are creating more scoring chances. I've had plenty of help recently both from our lads and the other team's 'keepers.


"I was obviously delighted with the result at Ashton Gate. I took the ball home and it's being kicked around the living room by my little boy, Zack. There's no chance I'll be able to put it away for safe keeping."

Today's visit of Luton Town will see a reunion between Ned and his former manager at Leicester David Pleat - assuming of course that talk of a move for the Luton boss doesn't prove true.

"I'm looking forward to the game," says David. "I have a lot of time for David Pleat and it will be

nice to see him and have a chat.

"Luton have got a good away record so it should be a good match."



Our last five games have produced something of a roller-coaster ride to say the least.

Two wins, two draws and one defeat have produced 22 goals with 13 of them in our favour.

The two late goals conceded against Millwall not surprisingly produced my biggest postbag!

Some of you like your faxes - you can't get in quick enough!!

Experience has taught me however that to make snap emotional judgements is not the best way to produce a sensible, logical answer.

Everyone wants an explanation these days, and yet there has always been, and always will be, the unexplainable.

Four players could have cleared the ball before Millwall's

equaliser. Not one of them did, and yet not one of them didn't want to.

These things do happen from time-to-time and I can think of a number of goals we have scored this season when our opponents have failed to clear the ball. But that is alright because we have capitalised on their mistakes.

Most of you will have favourite players. I cannot afford to fall into this trap.

Obviously I am as involved as anyone during the course of the match, but after it is over I try to take as dispassionate a view as is possible.

When overviewing a game I deal only in facts and push all emotive considerations to one side.

That means of course that it is impossible for me to please everybody. So I try to follow a simple pattern of trying my best and doing what I think is right.

That is all I ask of the players - and so far they have responded in a manner that is a credit to them.

Calling all Christmas crooners




Start practising the high notes, tickets are now on sale for the **Billy Wright Memorial Carol Concert.**

Corporate hospitality packages will also be available on request by contacting Jo Grainger (0902 655000). Tickets for the concert can be purchased now from the ticket office.





Substitute Neil Emblen steams past Stewart Pearce



The right treatment



Quite often, when travelling home after a game, I'll tune into David Mellor's 'Six-O-Six' programme on Radio 5.

For those of you who have not listened to it, it's a programme that gives supporters the opportunity to phone in to discuss any issue - complimentary or critical - about football in general or their team in particular. No matter what you think of David Mellor as a politician, his 'Six-O-Six' programme is very good radio!

One issue that has been raised by quite a few supporters over the past few weeks is admission charges for visiting fans and the facilities and treatment given to them. Last week, for example, one caller telephoned to say he had travelled 130 miles to watch his team play and having paid £20 for a ticket found

himself sitting in an uncovered area of the stadium with cement and concrete dust on the ground - conditions made worse by heavy rain! He was, however, offered a 'poncho' to keep him dry! His opinion of that club was not complimentary and it was hardly a good advert for Premier League football.

Other callers have complained of being exploited by higher admission charges and generally shabby treatment. This is a subject which has also been raised at my Chairman's forum on several occasions. Indeed, a number of Wolves supporters have argued we should charge visiting fans a higher admission price. My own view

on this matter is that when teams visit Molineux, I expect their supporters to be treated courteously and enjoy the same quality of service we provide our own fans. In return, I expect clubs to reciprocate and welcome Wolves' travelling supporters in a similar way.

The Football League's ruling on this matter is: "No club shall charge higher admission prices for visiting supporters for accommodation comparable with that used by supporters of the home club."

The manner in which we welcome visiting supporters not only reflects the image of Wolverhampton Wanderers, it influences people's impressions of the town.

The only criticism I want visiting supporters to level at Wolves is that their team left

empty handed! A case of great stadium, great game..... shame about the result!

Enjoy the match.



Luton Town

Creeping into contention

Luton's astonishing 5-1 victory over high-flying Middlesbrough three weeks ago suggests that the First Division promotion chase could be more open than was at first envisaged. The Hatters were certainly not flattered by the scoreline and, as manager David Pleat remarked afterwards "I think that the promotion race is now wide open. Other teams can take heart of the fact that all teams in this division are capable of being beaten."

Luton have now crept into the promotion reckoning themselves, largely due to outstanding away performances. Their success over Middlesbrough was their first home win of the season.

The Hatters possess one of the best away records in the First Division, their only away defeat so far being at Tranmere (2-4) in August. They have won at Port Vale (1-0), Watford (4-2), Stoke (2-1) and Sheffield United (3-1) and drawn at Derby (0-0) and Millwall (0-0).

They also drew at Fulham (1-1) in the Coca Cola Cup but took a shock exit from that competition when the Third Division side defeated them 4-2 in the penalty shoot-out.

Pleat, who has been forced to sell so many players in order to keep the club alive, this summer had the rare experience of being given cash for new signings. Having been low on goals for some while now, he invested in two new strikers and also signed an experienced goalkeeper.

He paid Plymouth £150,000 for Dwight Marshall who scored 13 times last season. He then signed Tony Adcock from Peterborough Adcock, a man of many clubs, has been a top scorer with several of them.

Goalkeeper Fred Barber came from Peterborough in a £25,000 deal.

Adcock, in fact, has not made the team but Marshall has been settling in well. He scored two of the goals against Middlesbrough to take his tally to five, making him the club's leading scorer.

Marshall was partnered in attack for early games by Kerry Dixon, the former England striker who has now scored well over 200 League goals for Reading, Chelsea, Southampton and the Hatters. But he scored only once during the early weeks of the season and young John Hartson was brought in for a few games. He scored his first goal of the season against Middlesbrough.

The experienced Dixon was recalled for their game at Sheffield United a fortnight ago.

Scott Oakes, who scored 13 goals last season, has played both in attack and midfield.

Gary Waddock, Paul Telfer, Ceri Hughes and David Preece have been filling the midfield posi-

tions but Des Linton and Scott Oakes have also appeared here.

Following an injury to David Greene, Mitchell Thomas has been partnering Trevor Peake in the centre of defence with Julian James and Marvin Johnson operating at full-back.

Juergen Sommer remains first choice in goal with new man Fred Barber being utilised as substitute goalkeeper.

Luton's situation is looking far brighter than it was a few weeks ago. The Hatters made a poor start to the season, failing to win any of their opening four League matches. They then looked set for another long battle

against relegations as they stood only two points clear of the bottom club.

Largely due to their away performances, the Hatters rose slowly up the table. Following their 3-1 success at Sheffield United - their third successive victory - a fortnight ago, Luton found themselves in seventh position and they now have an excellent chance of at least qualifying for the promotion play-offs.

Last season Luton found themselves in early trouble after winning only one of their opening seven games.

Though they enjoyed a marvellous run in the F.A Cup, ultimately going out to Chelsea (0-2) in the semi-final, they remained in danger of relegation until an uncomfort-

ably late stage of the season.

Now confidence is high again at Kenilworth Road and there are hopes that this season might prove to be third time lucky for them as they go for a place back in the top flight.

Luton were relegated from the First Division in 1992 and only narrowly missed further relegation the following year. They went into their final game at Southend needing at least one point to be sure of staying up.

But they lost 1-2 and it was fortunate for them that the clubs below them


failed. They missed the drop by just two points.

Last season they again finished only two points clear of danger

It looked like yet another relegation battle this time following that poor start but their fine away record has enabled them to transform the situation.

Luton have already won twice as many away games as they did during the whole of last season!

Who's the Boss

David Pleat returned for his second spell as Luton's manager in June 1991. He had previously been in charge from 1978 until 1986 when he was invited to take over as Tottenham's manager.



It was at Luton that Pleat made his name as both player and manager. He had begun his playing days with Nottingham Forest but played only half-a-dozen first-team games before joining Luton in 1964.

In 1967 he was transferred to Shrewsbury and he later played for Exeter and Peterborough before retiring in 1971.

It was in 1974 that he joined Luton as reserve-team coach. He was promoted to first-team duties three

years later and, in 1978, he was appointed manager.

Whilst he was re-organising at Luton, the Hatters were almost relegated to the Third Division at the end of his first full season. But, after that, things began to look up. They finished sixth and fifth before winning the Second Division Championship in 1982.

In addition to success in the League, Luton also enjoyed some good Cup runs.

Pleat's work at Kenilworth Road impressed many top clubs and, in 1986, he was invited to take over as Tottenham's manager.

The highlight of his stay at White Hart Lane came when he led Spurs out for the 1987 F.A. Cup Final. But, though they scored in the opening minute, they were beaten 3-2 by Coventry.

Pleat left Spurs in October of that year and worked abroad until returning to take charge at Leicester in December 1987. He left Leicester in January 1991, returning to Luton later that year.

Highs and Lows

David Preece has seen it all

Luton midfield man David Preece was voted Player of the Year last season by supporters. Now 31-years-old, he has seen the highs and lows of the Hatters recent history.

From relegation to Wembley, Preece has been there with last season's F.A. Cup semi-final appearance the highlight of his recent career in the years since they lost their Premiership status.

Preece was a part of the Luton side that won the 1988 Littlewoods Cup and that memorable 3-2 win over Arsenal ranks highly in the pocket midfield man's list of memories at Kenilworth Road.

"My best memory at Luton would have to be that Littlewoods Cup win at Wembley," admitted the man known as Mini. "Last season's Wembley appearance went fairly close to equalling that, but to lose at the last hurdle was disappointing.

"This season has been a real test for our youngsters and for people like Scott Oakes, who did so well in last year's cup run, the pressure is on them to reproduce that form."

It is consistency that has been lacking from the Hatters this season, and that was highlighted last week as the side that

had pushed their way up the table with sparkling wins over Middlesbrough, Stoke and Sheffield United, came crashing down with a bump at home at Barnsley.

If they could find the consistency and play to their potential every week, there is no doubt that Luton could mount a serious promotion push.

"What we lacked last season was a regular goalscorer," explained Preece. "Our top scorer was Scott Oakes. He got 13 goals, but you need a consistent goalscorer in the side.

"Crystal Palace may have run away with the title last season, but when we played them at Kenilworth Road last April they were nothing special. What they did have were good strikers."

Try telling that to Bryan Robson and Middlesbrough who felt the full force of a five-goal destruction at Kenilworth Road last month.

Preece is not the man Luton will be looking for

to boost their strike-rate and he admits he would like to start chipping in with a few goals to help them out.

"I would like to score a few more goals and that has been my main problem in recent years. It normally works out that the goals I get are spectacular and I would not mind a few tap-ins at this stage," jokes David.

"I am getting the chances, but just missing by a few inches here and there. I have got two so far this season and believe that I should have had at least five by now. We must share the burden of goals around the team if we are going to be a successful side."

So what are the chances of Luton and their veteran midfielder coming good this afternoon?

"I do not think it is out of the question," said an optimistic Preece. "I would expect us to score a few goals and hopefully I could grab one of them. If I do get one, my wish would be for it to be the winner."





1 YEAR AGO:

Leicester went to the top of the First Division with a 3-1 home win over Southend.

Trevor Steven, Kevin Sheedy and Adrian Heath gave Everton a 3-0 home win over Leicester and took them to the top of the First Division.

Arsenal, the previous leaders, had been beaten 4-2 at Manchester United on the Friday.

York City crushed Gillingham 7-1 in a Third Division game, Keith Houchen claiming four of the goals.

John Deehan, now the club's leading scorer, and Lou Donowa were the scorers in Norwich City's 2-1 win at Sheffield Wednesday.

20 YEARS AGO:

We played a goalless draw with Arsenal at Highbury.

Luton's 1-0 defeat at Newcastle left them without a win in six League games and firmly anchored to be bottom of the First Division.

Ipswich, third in the table, defeated leaders Liverpool with a late Brian Talbot goal at Portman Road. Ipswich moved into second place, one point behind the Reds.

Francis Lee scored Derby's winner in their 1-0 success at Leeds.

Stuart Pearce scored a first-half hat-trick for Second Division leaders Manchester United as they crushed Oxford 4-0 at Old Trafford. Lou Macari got the other goal.

Highest Score In European Competition

Wolves have participated in all three of the major European competitions. After the never to be forgotten friendlies against top class continental opposition, they made their debut in the European Cup in November, 1958, when West German Champions, Schalke 04 came over to Molineux. A crowd of over 45,000 saw Peter Broadbent get our first goals in the competition as the teams fought out a two-all draw. It meant a tough task in the second leg, one the Wolves couldn't quite respond to, and an early exit was made from the Cup after Schalke triumphed 4-3 on aggregate.

Winning the Championship again that season, meant a second attempt could be made to bring European glory to the Midlands. This time aggregate victories over Vorwaerts of East Germany, and the crack Yugoslavian team, Red Star Belgrade, saw Wolves through to the quarter-final stage where they were out-classed by the Spanish giants, Barcelona.

A hat-trick of Championships was denied by the

narrowest of margins when Burnley took the League by a single point in 1960. But Wolves' FA Cup Final win over Blackburn Rovers gave them entry to the European Cup Winners Cup which, in 1960/61, was in its inaugural season. Only 10 teams entered in that first year and one of them, FK Austria, was to provide Wolves with their biggest win to date in Europe.

The first leg was played in the Rater Stadium in Vienna and the home team took a two goal advantage over their English counterparts. The scoreline didn't really give a true reflection of the game with the Wolves forwards squandering several chances as well as hitting the woodwork on no less than four occasions. Both the Austrian goals came in the final 20 minutes leaving manager Stan Cullis to ruefully reflect that he felt his team had played well and deserved better luck. He was right, and justice was done in the second leg at Molineux which took place seven weeks after the trip to Vienna.

Wolves completely dominated the proceedings and went ahead with just a minute showing on the clock. Johnny Kirkham, a late replacement for Ron Flowers who had gone down with a cold, fired home from long range following two left wing corners. The Wednesday born youngster levelled the tie in the

26th minute when he headed home a short centre from Cliff Durandt.


The Austrian goalkeeper, Herbert Gartner, was having a nightmare of a game and he was at fault with both of Kirkham's goals, getting his hands to the ball, but not holding it. With his confidence shattered by the continuing onslaught on his goal, he threw the ball straight to the feet of Bobby Mason who promptly dispatched it back into the net to put Wolves 3-2 up on aggregate. That was ten minutes before the break.

Gartner partially redeemed himself with some amazing saves though his work was littered with untidiness and huge slices of luck. After producing one twisting save to deny Broadbent a headed goal, Gartner was unable to repeat the feat against the same player in the 70th minute as Wolves went four up. Within two minutes it was five and again Broadbent was the scorer as he drove home a Bobby Mason pass before a great save from Gartner prevented him from getting a three minute hat-trick. That was the end of the scoring and the Austrian team left the Molineux pitch knowing that the score could easily have been double what it actually was.


In the semi-final, Wolves were drawn to play Glasgow Rangers and, after going down 2-0 at Ibrox, they could only

manage a one all draw at Molineux. Since then, Wolves have qualified for Europe on four occasions, each time the competition being the U.E.F.A. Cup. Though they have twice won ties 7-1 on aggregate, against A c a d e m i c a Coimbra of Portugal and A.D.O. The Hague of the Netherlands, both in 1971, the game against FK Austria still remains as the only one in Europe in which the Molineux men have scored five.

Focus on Division 1

Pleat perplexed by topsy-turvy Hatters

Luton's topsy-turvy form is perplexing manager David Pleat as much as anyone. Though the Hatters come to Molineux with the best away record in the First Division, they have been beaten at home more often than any other club in this division.

Last Saturday's 1-0 defeat by Barnsley was their fourth at Kenilworth Road. "It was chalk and cheese to the way we have been playing recently," shrugged Pleat. "Now we have to find why Barnsley deserved to win and I must give credit where it is due."

Luton, in fact, were destroyed by one of their old favourites, Danny Wilson, the N. Ireland international who is now Barnsley's player-manager. It was Wilson's 72nd minute cross that picked out Andy Rammell who scored the only goal of the game.

Though Luton have failed to score in four of their last five home games, the exception came when they hit five goals past Middlesbrough in a 5-1 win in mid-October.

That set-back for

Middlesbrough came during a wobbly period of six League and Cup games without a win so it was a much relieved manager when Bryan Robson saw that dismal run come to an end with their 3-1 victory over Swindon at Ayresome Park.

The Boro's confidence was boosted by an early goal from Neil Cox, his first since joining the club from Aston Villa for a club record £1-million fee in the summer.

Though Norway international Jan Aage Fjortoft equalised early in the second-half - with his fifth goal in his last three League games - Middlesbrough hit back swiftly through John Hendrie and Paul Wilkinson (penalty) to get their promotion challenge back on course.

The First Division's last 100 per cent home record went when

Tranmere were held 1-1 by Port Vale at Prenton Park. Though John Morrissey struck first for Tranmere, John Jeffers earned Vale a point with his 63rd minute equaliser.

Injury-hit Reading's problems continue to mount and it now looks as if their promotion challenge may fall apart. Without his two top strikers, manager Mark McGhee has seen his side lose two games in a row - at home to Sunderland (0-2) and at W.B.A (0-2).

Now he is having to cope without two of his key midfield players.

N. Ireland internationals Jimmy Quinn and Stuart Lovell scored 64 goals between them as Reading ran away with the Third Division Championship last season. Lovell took a knock last month and has been out for several games whilst last week Quinn, who has been suffering from a back injury, was ordered to take a complete rest.

Paul Holsgrove is out with a broken leg, and to add to their woe, Simon Osborn has a suspected cracked leg bone.

Everton also had just three clear-cut chances but all resulted in goals.


We came out for the second half in a determined frame of mind and seven minutes later had pulled one back. Mills had a header saved but Emblen was there to tap ball home.

Our last two games have seen us score eight goals, keep two clean sheets, and have four individual goal scorers on each occasion.




A cut above


I can't remember what is chat-up line was but I don't think he asked me to do him a trim. I cut his hair now though which always makes me nervous in case I make a mess of it.

Cookery lesson




