PLEAT'S PERSPECTIVE

SPIRIT OF TOGETHERNESS IS SERVING US WELL

WELCOME to all the supporters, officials, and staff of Sheffield United Football Club, who provide attractive opposition for today's home fixture.

Sheffield are strong contenders for a play-off place having won four out of their last five games, and having a large squad from which to select their team. It seems only yesterday that we enjoyed a very good result at Bramall Lane, when an early set-back did not deter us.

Last Sunday I was more than pleased with the performance of one of our junior sides at Electrolux against Spurs. The following Under 13 squad represented Luton: Binder, Moran, Kirby, Coleman, Tyler, Hunt, Nolan, Lewis, Lyons, Pringle, Pitt, Fisher, Rowe, Burt, Abraham and Minton.

Whilst this game was taking place our Under 14s and Under 15s were playing at

Mill Hill. All three gave good accounts of themselves in training games, the honours being shared overall with a win for either side and a draw. It is so important that we maintain the interest, the expense and the work that is required to bring youngsters through this club.

In five years time the boys that I saw last Sunday could well be knocking on the door of the first team. We will have to work hard, coach well and monitor progress. There are so many helpers involved in the midweek Centres of Excellence and the Sunday morning training games, that I feel it is worth giving them a thank-you as we run up to Christmas, and with nearly half the season gone.

Our Under-13 coach is Aaron Tighe, who played here as a junior; Colwyn Rowe, our new Community Officer, looks after our Under 14s; Colin Cardines takes our Under 15s side; and Paul Lowe looks after the Under 16s. Terry Westley oversees the whole programme.

We are also indebted to the many scouts who recommend and bring the players; parents who are so supportive and travel miles to take the boys to games; Janet who washes all the kit with a smile on her face come Mondays; Chris Ellis our bus driver; the Bedfordshire Referees Association, through Ian Campbell, who supply the officials; and Ken Hoffman, who has been working for this club solidly for many, many years, and has been a most wonderful help to all the youth side of the club.

I mention this pointedly because the one thing that Luton has done over the years is, unlike many other clubs, built stability and continuity. Four of our staff at the moment, myself, John Moore, Wayne Turner and Clive Goodyear, all played for the club.

John Moore came to Luton in 1965, and apart from two spells away has given con-

stant loyal service to this club. Clive Goodyear, our physio, came to the club in 1978 and left in 1984, going on to win a cup winner's medal with Wimbledon, and then rejoined the club last summer. Wayne Turner also joined this club from school, in 1976, and made 135 appearances before leaving for Coventry in 1985. In 1992/93 he returned as Reserve Team coach.

But it is to George Rogers that I would like to give a special word of thanks. George Rogers joined Luton Town Football Club in 1944. He has worked as a coach, a scout, a kit-man and a general helper throughout, and has been a prominent member of the Beds FA for many seasons. He has now given 50 years assistance to this club, and in saying thank-you we are hoping to make a presentation to George shortly for this tremendous achievement.

It is this spirit of togetherness that is serving us well at this time. There is a good feeling among the staff and players. Remember, only four of the group that played at Swindon cost a fee - Trevor Peake, Des Linton, Scott Oakes and David Preece - whilst two of the players - Mitchell Thomas and Kerry Dixon - were ex-Luton schoolboys.

It is a remarkable record and it suggests

that although we aren't able to get sizeable crowds, what we do have here is possibly a much bigger heart than many clubs of a similar standing. It is because of this bond between people that I would like us to maintain our current form and hopefully be in a position to give our supporters something to bite on this season.

Our away form recently, and we thank all the supporters for their tremendous vocal encouragement at Swindon, has been excellent and we now stand proudly with the best away record in the country.

This afternoon we have a chance to improve our home record and with the attractive game against Derby next Sunday, which will be televised, it is important that we build on our recent run with a good performance today.

Enjoy the game.

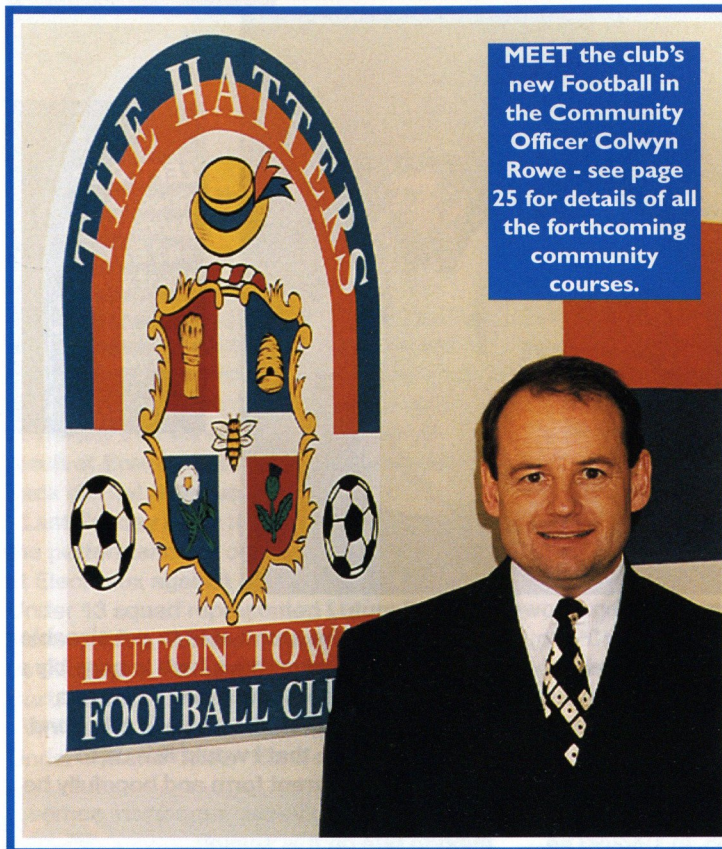

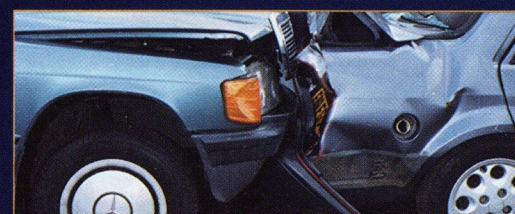

First though league points are a priority to keep us in touch at the top of Division One.

ON THE OTHER SIDE

BASSETT'S BLADES BID TO CUT THROUGH THE PACK

RELEGATED from the Premiership on the final Saturday, indeed in the final minutes, of last season, Sheffield United have made a steady start in their bid to bounce straight back into the top flight.

As ever, Bramall Lane is proving a tough ground to visit as United have won six of their 10 home games, beating Bolton 3-1, Bristol City 3-0, Derby 2-1, Oldham 2-0, Southend 2-0 and Watford 3-0.

Victory over Southend came last Saturday, with a Dane Whitehouse penalty and a second-half strike from Australian striker Carl Veart, but the off-the-field distraction of a campaign by fans to oust chairman Reg Brealey prompted manager Dave Bassett to comment: "The atmosphere is so bad here we might as well play all our games away."

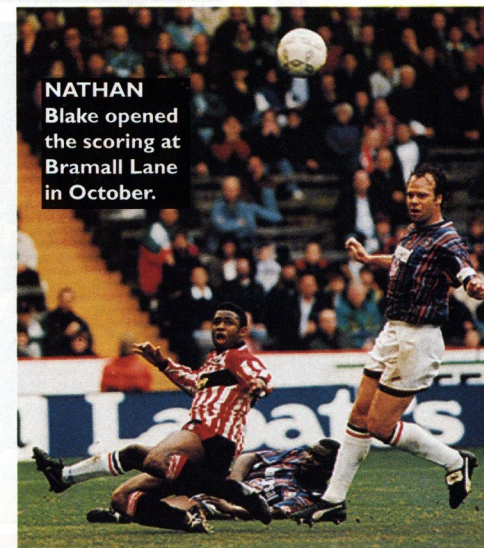
The Blades boss has never been one to mince his words during a managerial career which has also taken him to Wimbledon, Watford and Crystal Palace.

After the previous week's 4-2 defeat at Burnley, Bassett stormed: "What a pantomime! We were wishy-washy in defence and all that was missing was Widow Twanky."

"We created as many chances as Burnley, and could easily have won the match by half-time. The lads know they haven't worked hard enough and they know they will feel the punishment on the training ground."

The extra training clearly paid off as United dispatched Southend, but they have struggled away from home with their only league success being a 2-0 win at Port Vale.

They have lost at Burnley, Millwall (2-1),

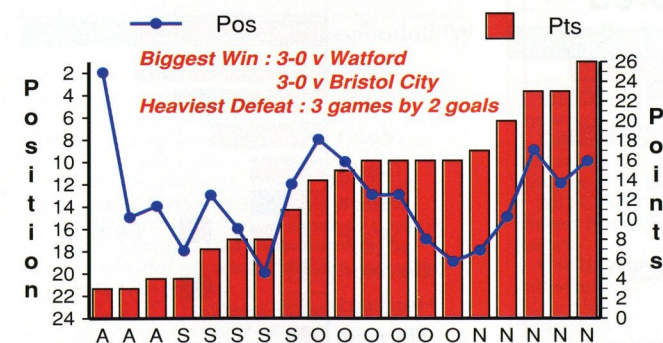

Reading (1-0), Tranmere (2-1) and West Brom (1-0). In the Coca-Cola Cup, the Blades won 5-1 at Stockport, and 6-1 on aggregate, but then went out 2-1 at home to Bolton in round three.

United's last visit to Kenilworth Road was in the 'old' Division One, in February 1992, when goals from Brian Stein and Mick Harford gave the Hatters a 2-0 win.

Of course the sides met at Bramall Lane just six weeks ago, with Luton winning 3-1. Nathan Blake put the home side in front, but an own goal from Brian Gayle levelled the scores, with Julian James and Kerry Dixon sealing victory for the visitors.

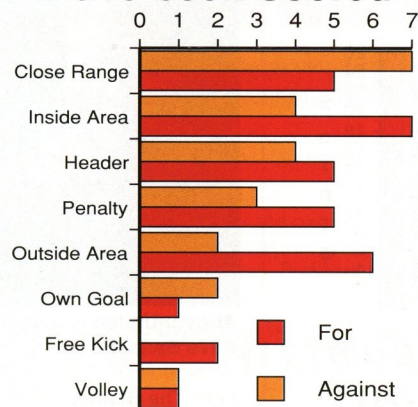

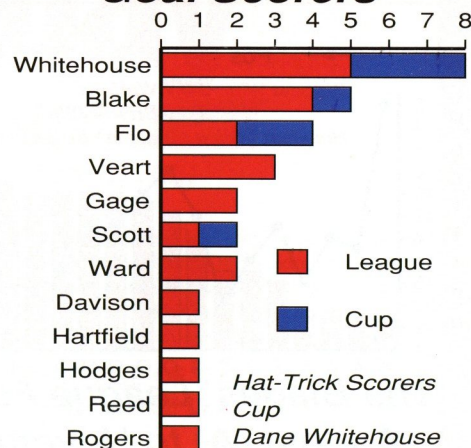

VISITORS ON PARADE

PAUL BEESLEY - This dependable centre-back has proved to be one of Dave Bassett's most astute signings, after joining the Blades from Leyton Orient for £365,000 in 1990. He was voted the Supporters Club Player of the Year in 1993.

NATHAN BLAKE - Joined United in February 1994 from Cardiff for £300,000, just days before the Welsh side entertained Luton in the FA Cup fifth round. Scored his first goal for the club against Tottenham within minutes of coming on as a substitute, and has made his full international debut for Wales.

JOSTEIN FLO - At 6'4", Jostein is one of the giants of the game, and was United's top scorer in the Premiership last season with nine. Played for Norway in the 1994 World Cup Finals.

KEVIN GAGE - One of a number of players to work under Dave Bassett at Wimbledon and United. Had seven seasons at Plough Lane before a move to Aston Villa, and then Bramall Lane in early 1992 for £150,000.

JOHN GANNON - A good servant of the club in central midfield, who had a short spell on loan at Middlesbrough last season.

BRIAN GAYLE - Club captain and the central pillar of United's defence since joining them from Ipswich in 1991, for £700,000. Was previously with Wimbledon and Manchester City.

CHARLIE HARTFIELD - Strong-tackling England youth international who has been in the first-team squad since his arrival from Arsenal three years ago. Can play in defence or midfield.

GLYN HODGES - Has almost 20 full international caps for Wales, after a league career that has taken in Wimbledon, Newcastle, Watford and Crystal Palace, before joining up with Dave Bassett again in 1991 for £410,000.

DOUG HODGSON - One of the club's two recent signings from Australia, who impressed Dave Bassett in a tour match.

ALAN KELLY - Regular member of the Republic of Ireland squad who travelled to the 1994 World Cup. Highly-rated goalkeeper who produced a memorable display in the 1993 FA Cup semi-final, when United lost to neighbours Wednesday.

ADRIAN LITTLEJOHN - Speedy front player, who was signed on a free transfer from Walsall.

ROGER NILSON - Norwegian international, and a member of their World Cup squad. Joined United for £400,000 in November last year, from Viking Stavanger, and can play at left-back or in the centre of defence.

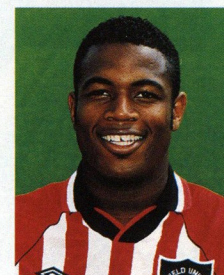
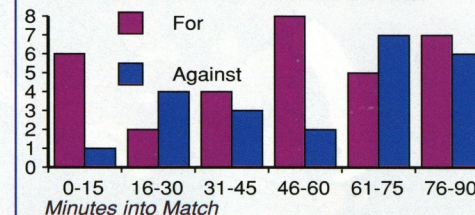
JOHN REED - Made his league debut for United against Bolton earlier this season.

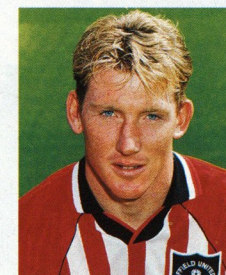
ANDY SCOTT - Followed Rogers from Sutton, although his early progress was hampered by illness.

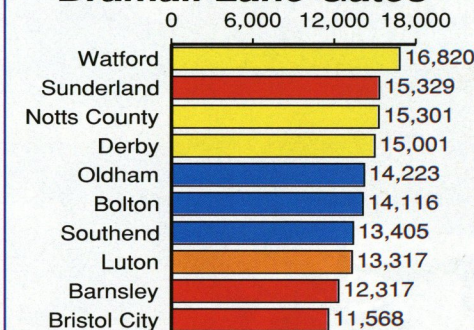

SIMON TRACEY - Highly-rated goalkeeper now in his sixth season at Bramall Lane.

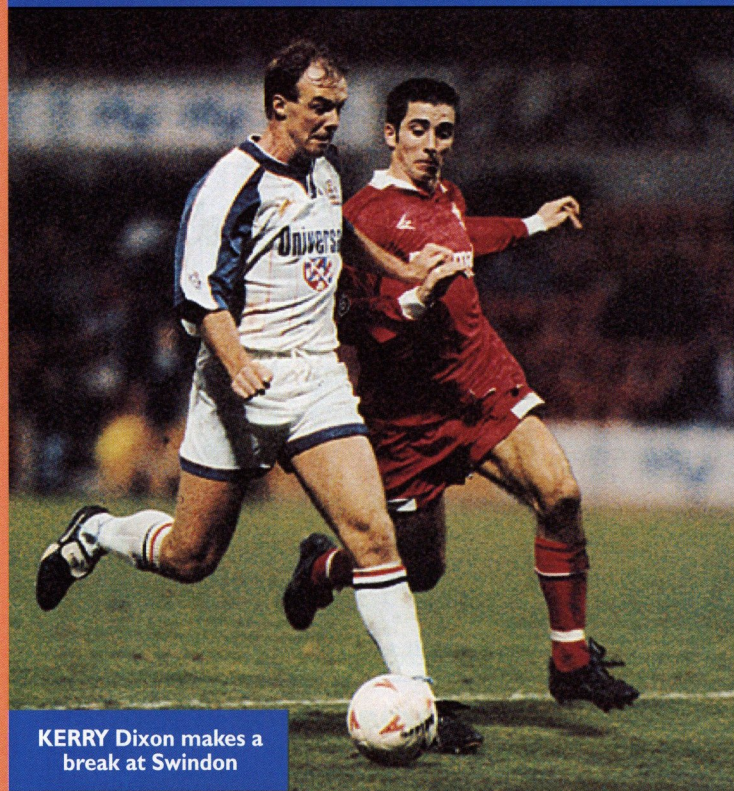
DAVE TUTTLE - Joined United from Tottenham in the summer of 1993 for an initial fee of £350,000.

The day's programme covered detailed technical consideration of the increasingly specialised role of the referee, together with advice on communication skills and man magement.

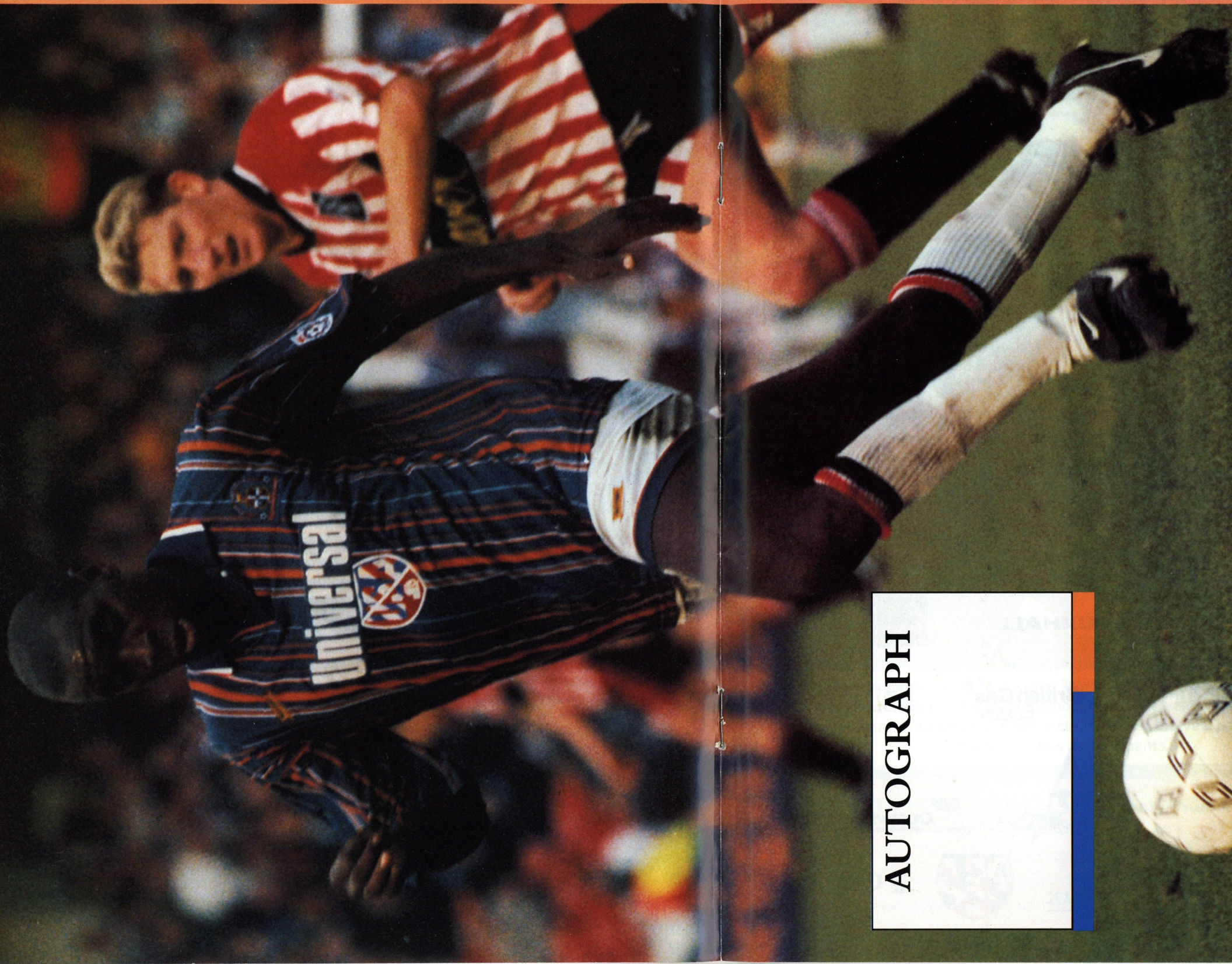
The session concluded with group discussions and an open forum on the issues highlighted earlier in the day.

"The aim of all people responsible for refereeing standards must be consistency in the correct application of the Laws of the Game and any effort being put into that area must be of long term benefit."

Terry said the team's disappointment reminded him of the dressing room at Wembley last April, but pointed out: "Out of this may come some good.

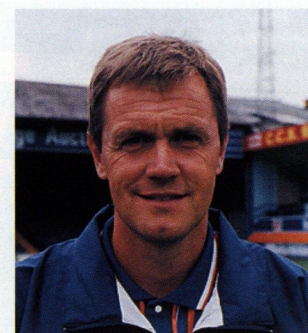
"The players may realise that they don't want this disappointment again, and train a little bit harder on the defects in their game."

SEASON'S BEST AT SWINDON?

Luton striker **KERRY DIXON** reflects on last Saturday's 2-1 win at the County Ground, Swindon..... as told to CLUBCALL 0891 121 123



Q: An excellent away win at Swindon, and possibly the best performance of the season?

A: I wouldn't argue with that. Some of the football after the first 20 minutes was quite outstanding and even the Swindon supporters were clapping.

We kept the ball well, but we needed to cap that off with goals, because it's no good just keeping the ball and not being progressive, and we could have scored at least three more and were well worth the win.

Q: Swindon had plenty of early pressure, and were you glad just to concede the one goal?

A: That's probably true. Our defence has been outstanding in this particular run, and they were due a mistake. So to have it in a performance where we actually won the game was satisfying.

Of course some of the forwards, myself included, should have done better.

Q: How important was the goal just before half-time?

A: Obviously that's a good time to score, especially away from home, and it puts the home team on the rack a little bit.

We had certainly taken the initiative and were well worth that goal, and going in at half-time we had only one thought in our minds

and that was to go on and get at least a winner.

Q: Scott Oakes of course supplied that, and seemed to revel in the forward position made vacant by Dwight Marshall's injury.

A: Scott is a good player, and that role really suited him where he could use his pace and his trickery, and his shooting ability, just behind the front man or front two.

He scored plenty of goals in that position in the cup run last year, and it just goes to show there is competition for places and different people can play in different positions. Des Linton came back and did a good job as well.

Q: Two home games now, against Sheffield United and Derby, teams we've already played this season.

A: I'm not going to make any predictions, but obviously we will be going out to get the three points in each game, as we always aim to do.

Our home form has been a bit sketchy, apart from Portsmouth, of late, but we hope to bring that at least some way near the away form.

Q: And finally, you must be personally very pleased with your run at present.

A: Goalscorers, which I do still consider myself, thrive on actually scoring and my little run has come at a good time for me and I do intend to keep that going... with a bit of luck!

Supermac gives Hatters head start

WHEN the Town were promoted from Division Three in 1970 the new season was looked on as a period of consolidation as far as most Luton supporters were concerned.

We all thought it would be difficult to mount a meaningful promotion challenge again as our Fourth Division days were only two years before.

Manager Alec Stock had other ideas however, and could see he had the basis of a squad every bit as good as the one at Q.P.R. he had taken from Division Three to Division One in successive seasons.

To boost the side he had signed Jim Ryan and Don Givens from Manchester United, Roger Hoy from Crystal Palace and David Court from Arsenal, all men of experience and in the case of Givens a full international for Eire.

The season got off to a disastrous start with a 4-2 defeat at Burnden Park against a Bolton side who were to suffer relegation at the end of the campaign. This was followed by a sterile 0-0 home draw with Norwich, who had settled for a point before leaving Norfolk, as the team struggled to come to grips with Second Division defences.

The first sign of better things to come arrived in the next game, away to Birmingham, where we

battled for a point gaining an equaliser in the closing minutes. Those of us who were at St Andrews that day could sense that promising times were ahead and we were proved right when Oxford were hammered 4-0 at Kenilworth Road the following Tuesday evening. We had arrived!

As the Town pushed up the table the crowds increased and the media became aware that something was stirring at Kenilworth Road and turned up in ever increasing numbers to see what was a very good side, playing with confidence and, in the case of star striker Malcolm Macdonald, a certain amount of arrogance.

As autumn turned into winter the league table began to take shape and the leading pack was made up of Leicester, Sheffield United, Cardiff, Hull and the Town, and these five clubs gradually nosed ahead of the rest to set up one of the most exciting promotion races in years.

During the first part of the season we had lost 1-0 at Leicester in a game where we deserved a share of the spoils, won 2-0 at Hull in front of the 'Match of the Day' cameras, and battled out a 0-0 draw at Cardiff in front of a crowd of 26,689.

It was about time we took on one of the promotion challengers at Kenilworth Road, and the first was Sheffield United who were our guests on December 5, 1970. At that stage in the season we

stood in second place with 26 points while United were one point and two places behind us after an unbeaten run of 16 matches.

The Town were missing the injured John Moore who was due to play his 200th league game in Luton colours, while United were luckier with Colin Addison passing a late fitness test on a twisted knee.

A best of the season crowd, at that point, of 19,665 had turned up which was regarded as disappointing by manager Stock in view of the importance of the clash!

Luton were the first to show with Macdonald going close with a header, but Tony Currie was giving the Town defence problems and shot over following a good pass from Len Badger, and then forced goalkeeper Tony Read to tip over a header which looked destined to open the scoring.

It was in fact Luton who scored first when, in the 28th minute, fullback John Ryan charged down the wing and whipped in a hard cross from the byline which caught the United defence on the wrong foot. Macdonald met the centre with a bullet header which was half-stopped by ex-England international goalkeeper Alan Hodgkinson but still trickled over the line.

At the start of the second half United brought on Gil Reece for Addison who had aggravated his knee injury, but almost from the restart the Town went two-up with a clever effort from winger Jim Ryan. A long throw from Macdonald was hit into the air by a United defender and Ryan waited patiently for the ball to drop before sending a looping header over Hodgkinson.

United understandably threw caution to the wind and attacked with a purpose, but were unable to break down the strong Luton defence. Read saved well from Alan Woodward and John Tudor, while at the other end Macdonald nearly made it three, going close with an overhead kick.

A goal was pulled back with 13 minutes left, when Moore's replacement Jack Bannister was harshly adjudged to have fouled Billy Dearden in the area, and Currie reduced the deficit from the spot. 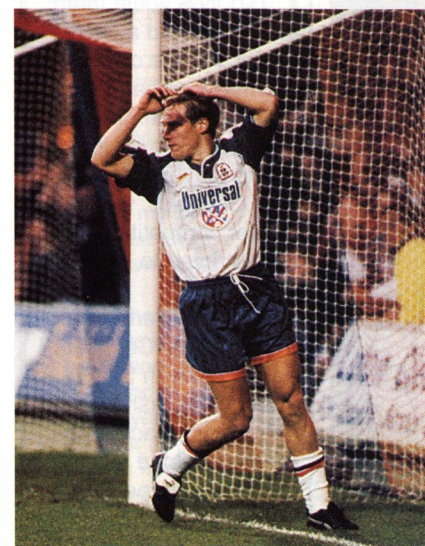

RIGHT: Kerry Dixon holds off the challenge of Portsmouth defender Jon Gittens

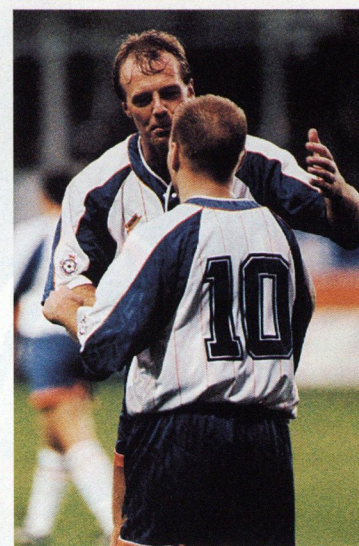

No support for Premier expansion

NEITHER the Football Association nor the Premier League would support the formation of a Second Division of the Premier League, Football League President Gordon McKeag has said.

In a letter to all club chairmen, Mr McKeag detailed the facts of the situation to dispel recent rumours circulating in the game.

Mr McKeag explained that in a recent meeting, the League's board of directors were assured by senior representatives of the Football Association that no discussions

whatsoever had taken place concerning the possible extension of the Premier League.

Following these discussions, the FA subsequently met with the directors of the Premier League who confirmed that no moves had been made towards any such expansion as their own clubs remained firmly opposed to such a development.

Mr McKeag concluded: "I can assure you that the League's board of directors will continue to pursue the interests of member clubs vigorously and strive for a better future for the league as a whole."

LUTON'S youth team entertained a USA Under 19 side on Saturday, as part of the Americans' European tour preparing their young players for the next Olympics, when the soccer competition will be restricted to Under 21s.

The Town were without a South East Counties game, but with the FA Youth Cup clash just two days later, coach Terry Westley fielded a side including prospective players for next season as well as some of the current trainees.

Robert Kean scored Luton's goal in a 1-1 draw, and Matthew Upson, from Diss, also impressed.

"The Irish lads were pleased, and then the senior team's 4-0 win over Northern Ireland made it quite a week."

To be in that Republic of Ireland team is David's ultimate aim. More immediate is the desire to get back into the first team at Kenilworth Road after some sound displays for the reserves.

"But that's certainly easier said than done at the moment," he admitted. "You can't fault the back four at the moment, and it's not going to be easy!"
