ON THE LINE

I WAS not too disappointed by our defeat against Aston Villa in the third round of the FA Cup last Saturday. We were beaten by a better side on the day. They were too strong for us, physically and mentally. But I don't think we disgraced ourselves, and it was certainly valuable experience for us.

Brian Little had obviously done his homework on us, very well. They never allowed us to play our usual game. And the pitch didn't help. It was like a sand-pit and made it very difficult for us to pass the ball around as we like to do.

But I don't want to make excuses. Villa thoroughly deserved their win because they were so much better than us.

I said before the game that I thought they were in a false position in the Premier League and I'm sure they will soon be charging up the table. When you think they had players like Ray Houghton, Kevin Richardson and Mark Bosnich on the sub's bench, and they have just signed Tommy Johnson and Gary Charles from Derby County, you begin to realise the depth and quality of their squad.

We, on the other hand, had to bring in a 19-year-old for his home debut. And what a daunting task that was for defender Adrian Moses to have to come in for a third round FA Cup tie against a Premiership side whose attack comprised John Fashanu and Dean Saunders. To his credit, the young man did well and Fash will give other defenders a harder time. Adie certainly did not let either himself or the team down. Now it's up to him. He's tasted first team football and, if he's like I was at his age, he'll want more of it.

However, with due respect to him, there is no doubt that we missed Gerry Taggart. You'll always miss a player like that. He has the physical stature and demeanour that can be intimidating to the opposition and he would have given Fash a rougher ride. But you don't moan on about the fact that he's missing, you just get on with it.


I have to say that I thought Paul McGrath was magnificent for Villa. His reading of the game, his cleaning up, his overall play, was very professional. He's a hell of a player, and I can't imagine how good he would be if he didn't have two dodgy knees!

Then there was Dean Saunders up front. He's the type of player any manager loves to have in his side. He's very unselfish, makes space for others, works hard, and is always likely to score goals.

So there was no disgrace in going out to Villa. It would have been different had it been Enfield or Crewe - with due respect to those clubs. And I don't think the defeat has affected the enthusiasm or the confidence of the players.

The fact remains that we have lost our last three games and it is up to us to get our minds back on the job in hand which is to win a place in the play-offs. It is therefore a big game for us today against Luton, who are also up there challenging. And it will be tough. They have a marvellous away record and it is easy to see why. They play good possession football which frustrates the home team. So we will have to be patient.

Hopefully we can escape from the scenario of playing well, winning friends, but losing matches. We have to get back on the



winning trail, even if it means grinding out results. And I think we are capable of that. The spirit and character of the side has changed over the last 12 months and I have every confidence that we can return to that winning habit we had in the very successful run-up to a disappointing Christmas and New Year period.

We all appreciated your support against Villa, but one thing disappointed me, and that was the fact that once again there was some racist chanting from a certain area in the lower tier of the East Stand.

I cannot state too strongly how I abhor such a thing. It is totally pointless, as well as ignorant, and all it succeeds in doing is give the club a bad name.

Could I ask the people responsible to either put a stop to it immediately - or stay away from the club altogether.



I DIDN'T see much of the cup-tie last Saturday. To be honest I'm the world's worst spectator. And I just couldn't bear to watch.

Most of the time I was either watching the telly in the changing room, or in the players' lounge - with the curtains drawn - or having treatment.

But I could hear with the reaction of the crowd the way things were going, and it was a disappointing afternoon all round. Villa are a strong team and they played well on the day, but from what little I saw and from what I've been told, I don't really think we did ourselves justice.

Some of the football was quite nice but we didn't have that final punch, and we didn't really play to our strengths.

I must say I fancied playing against John Fashanu. I was really gutted to miss this one because I would have loved to have been in a tussle with him. He would certainly know he had been in a game, and I'd have enjoyed it immensely.

Having said that, however, young Adrian Moses did well. He certainly did not let himself or his colleagues down and he can be proud of himself.

After two recent league defeats against Portsmouth and Wolves and the F.A. Cup knock-out we badly need to get back on the tracks against Luton this afternoon. They are close to us in the table and we need to make home advantage tell, although they have one of the best away records in the country, winning twice as many games on their travels as they have done at home.

So it will be a tough game for us.

I'll miss it because of my suspension, of course, and I'm not yet fully fit anyway. In fact, it looks as though it will be another three weeks before I'm back in first team action, because after next week's trip to Stoke we have a blank Saturday on the day set aside for the fourth round of the F.A. Cup.

I would hope, meanwhile, to be able to get in a couple of reserve team matches. It is virtually impossible to go straight back into the first team after a month or more on the sidelines and give of your best.


I'm still having treatment - physio Steve Stafford's certainly putting me through it - and I'm also doing a bit of bike work in the gym, but I hope to get back to light training next week.

I can't wait to get back. Being out injured is the worst time for any player. You watch everyone else training, and playing matches, and you're there getting bored stiff.

It's even worse when you can't even bear to watch games, like me.

Roll on February 4 - even if it does mean a long, long trip to Bristol City.

Must try not to get sent off there this time!



STILL NO JOY FOR REDS AGAINST VILLA

BARNSELEY versus Aston Villa was the kind of tie which suggested an F.A. Cup upset - a team in form and gunning for promotion from Division One at home to a side from the Premiership struggling to escape from the relegation zone.

Unfortunately for the Reds it never looked like working out that way. On a very heavy pitch and against a physical Villa side now with added resolve under new manager Brian Little they could not produce the fluency and rhythm of their usual passing game.

The result was that they never created the kind of clear-cut openings that would give them a chance of a breakthrough and the long-range shots they did manage were not of the quality which would seriously test Nigel Spink in the Villa goal.

Villa, on the other hand, not only scored twice - through Dwight Yorke four minutes after the break and Dean Saunders six minutes from the end - they also twice hit the woodwork, had three other goals disallowed for offside and forced the recalled David Watson into two excellent saves.

While the Reds by no means disgraced themselves, they were never really in contention against a Villa side who produced a very professional performance to ease through what had threatened for them to be a very tricky tie.

So now that's 15 times the two teams have met. And the Reds are still seeking their first win!




Average Goals per Match



Goal Scorers





How the Goals have been Scored





DAUNTING DEBUT

BECAUSE the half-time abandonment of the First Division game against Middlesbrough at Ayresome Park resulted in appearances for that fixture being erased from the record books, last Saturday's third round F.A. Cup-tie at home to Aston Villa will now officially count as Adrian Moses' first team debut for the Reds.

And it could hardly have been a more daunting task for the 19-year-old from Doncaster.

Not only had he to deputise for inspirational skipper Gerry Taggart in defence he had to do so against a Premier League side whose attack comprised the gladiatorial 'Fash-the-Bash' Fashanu and quicksilver Welsh international striker Dean Saunders.

In the circumstances the teenager acquitted himself commendably and can take a good deal of satisfaction from his baptism of fire. He will certainly have learned a good deal from the experience. (See 'On The Ball' page 24).

NOW IT'S SUSPENSION

Skipper Gerry Taggart has missed the last two games against Wolves and Aston Villa because of a knee injury. Now he has to sit out the next two against Luton Town this afternoon and Stoke City next Saturday because of a two-match suspension.

That means it will be February 4 before he can return to first team action because the Reds now have a clear Saturday on January 28, which is F.A. Cup fourth round day.

His first game back will be away to Bristol City.

Owen Archdeacon could also have that Bristol City game pencilled in as a possible come-back target as he continues his battle to return to fitness following the injury at Derby County just before Christmas which interrupted a season which has never really got off the ground.

He missed the start of the campaign and had played only five full games before being sidelined again.

Naturally he is very disappointed at the way things are going at the moment, but says he cannot really complain as he has never had any serious injuries before. Now he has had two in the space of six months and he will be hoping that he will soon have seen the back of his unlucky spell.

Meanwhile, he was pleased to join Keith Lodge as summariser for the Reds' F.A. Cup game with Aston Villa on the New Hallam FM, although it goes without saying that he would much rather have been out there on the pitch.

IT WOULD seem that **Derby County** manager Roy McFarland was none too pleased at the £2.9 million deal that took Tommy Johnson and Gary Charles to Aston Villa just 24 hours before the Rams' cup-tie with Everton.

McFarland insisted that he had not been consulted and he did not think that it was right to sell players on the eve of an F.A. Cup-tie.

He did, however, admit: "I'm not questioning the deal itself, because £3 million would have been my valuation of the players, and we've got £2.9 million. I'm just against the timing of it."

It means that McFarland has now sold ten players for nearly £6 million to cut Derby's mounting debts since taking over from Arthur Cox and he was clearly unhappy that the latest deal was done by multi-millionaire owner Lionel Pickering behind his back.

Pickering apparently sanctioned the transfers while on holiday in Paris after new director Stuart Webb had warned days earlier that players would have to be sold to cut an estimated £2m debt this season.

It puts McFarland, whose contract expires at the end of the current campaign, in an almost impossible position. He has been warned that his job would be under threat if he did not get promotion to the Premiership, yet is being asked to do so while selling his best players.

Gordon Cowans and Martin Kuhl preceded Johnson and Charles in the last few weeks and three months ago Paul Kitson was sold to Newcastle United for £2.25 million.

At the same time McFarland sees rivals such as Wolves and Middlesbrough continuing to spend big money in a bid to clinch that Premiership place.

He said: "Both Johnson and Charles have worked extremely hard for this club over the last three or four months and we're indebted to Johnson for his goals during December. Now I have to try and find those goals from somewhere else."

He did not manage it in the F.A. Cup clash with Premiership strugglers Everton at Goodison Park, the home team going through courtesy of a 77th minute strike from defender Andy Hinchliffe.

Tranmere Rovers had failed to reach the fourth round of the competition 21 times in 22 years prior to last Saturday's third round tie at Bury.

It took two goals in the last nine minutes from substitute Ian Muir, their record-breaking marksman, to prevent them from making another early exit.

Third Division promotion-chasers Bury had led 2-0 from the 24th minute and were looking poised to produce one of the upsets of the round until Muir intervened.

Relieved manager John King said: "If a defence gives him the slightest chance, Ian will cut their throats, and that's what he did just when it looked as though they were going to hang on."

It's not over yet, of course. Bury still believe they have a fighting chance in the replay at Prenton Park.

Not that either team will be relishing the prospect of entertaining Wimbledon in round four!

Portsmouth's Serbian winger Predrag Radosavljevic - better known as Preki - scored his first Cup goals and then promised Fratton Park fans that the best was yet to come.


The former Everton man ended hopes of another **Bolton Wanderers** giant-killing adventure with two superb strikes in Pompey's 3-1 home victory as the team who sent Premiership clubs Liverpool, Everton and Arsenal to defeat in the last two seasons of cup competition were themselves on the receiving end, beaten by a team 15 places below them in the First Division.

Former Barnsley coach Mick Wadsworth led pace-setting Carlisle United to a 1-1 draw against a **Sunderland** side also managed by an ex-Oakwell coach, Mick Buxton.

It was 24-years-old Simon Davey who silenced the Sunderland fans with a late angled drive that cancelled out Craig Russell's 47th minute strike for the home team and enhanced the growing reputation of the Third Division leaders.

After coming up with the hugely deserved equaliser Davey prophesied: "I believe we will win the replay. Apart from the fact that we haven't lost a league game at home this season our team spirit is so good we don't think anyone can beat us at the moment."

A plum fourth round tie at home to Spurs awaits the winners.



A GOOD pal of mine in the newspaper business makes part of his living from tracking down football's former heroes (we can't all cover Barnsley, otherwise they'd run out of tea at half-time).

Dick Barton's weekly column in The Sun has featured the likes of George Eastham, the former England and Newcastle star, who now runs a sports shop in South Africa, and Bobby Ferguson (no relation), who we remember as West Ham's goalkeeper but Adelaide's good citizens know as the bloke who flogs them carpets.

He also discovered that Manchester United's Carlo Sartori is a professional knife sharpener in Rochdale, and Francis Burns, another Old Trafford old boy, runs an outfit cleaning offices and restaurants in Perth, Australia.

But it was me who found Jim Iley.

For those fans too young to recall punk and a Labour government, Jim was the poker-faced manager at Oakwell from 1973 to 1978.

Back then there was a Fourth Division, and Barnsley tended to be in it. Joking Jim finally made way for Allan Clarke's first stint in charge of Tommy Tyke's heroes.

Clarke isn't hard to find these days - he was at the Yorkshire football writers' Christmas do (as was Danny Wilson among a squad of other famous faces) and is now a sales executive. You'll find another ex-Barnsley boss, Norman Hunter, kicking lumps out of the

radio commentary box at Leeds United.

But I discovered where Jim Iley had landed last year when, visiting friends in Lancashire, we decided on a quiet Italian meal in Chorley. The man who once dictated Barnsley's fortunes dished up my pizza.

He hadn't changed a bit, and when he'd recovered from the shock of being unmasked by your correspondent - whom he vaguely recalled as a young reporter on the good old Sheffield Morning Telegraph - we chatted amiably until I mentioned The Match.

That's when I knew Jim hadn't changed. A light-hearted reference to that nightmare - 3-0 up at half-time against Exeter, 4-3 losers at 90 minutes and Barnsley's promotion bid down the deep pan - brought back dark memories and the old poker face.

Mr. and Mrs. Jim Iley no longer run Caesar's restaurant in downtown Chorley. When I rang to wish him a happy new year, I was told the premises are now the Balti Express, and their spicy Indian specials are going down nicely.

Jim has hung up his apron and disappeared again. Over to you, Dick.

STEWARDS ARE THERE TO HELP

Barnsley Football Club's stewards have an important job to do. It's to help make sure that your visit to Oakwell to watch a game is an enjoyable experience - and a safe one. They are there:-

1. To welcome all spectators, especially away fans and people who don't come regularly to the ground, to help them find the right seats, and sort out any ticketing problems.
2. To keep an eye open, during the game, for people in any kind of difficulty, or people whose behaviour is causing annoyance or distress to others, and to deal with the problem tactfully but firmly.
3. To make sure stairs, aisles and exits don't become blocked; to report any defects to the stadium that could become a danger to spectators.
4. In an emergency to direct and guide people to safe exits.

Stewards work as a team. Each steward is allocated to one sector of the ground, has a specific job to do and a specific location. Every sector is in direct radio and telephone contact with the Ground Control Room. All stewards are trained to look after spectators in an emergency and to deal firmly and tactfully with bad behaviour. Some have received extra training as first aiders and fire fighters.

It's an essential part of the stewarding operation to see that ground regulations are observed. Stewards are required to deal with racial and abusive chanting and the throwing of objects. They can prevent people entering the ground if their behaviour looks likely to cause annoyance to others. When appropriate they can search supporters for prohibited objects (e.g. knives and bottles). Also they can ask anyone who is causing a persistent nuisance to leave the ground.

But primarily, they're there to help make your visit to the ground enjoyable and free from hassle.

TALKING SOCCER

BARNSELY fans are always telling me that 'you don't sell your best players if you want to be successful.'

It is hard to disagree with such a sentiment. So what, then, can we make of Kevin Keegan's decision to sell Andy Cole to Manchester United? Even if it is for a record £7 million fee?

Despite a recent barren spell following an injury lay-off, Cole has a remarkable scoring record of 95 goals in 138 first team games since making his debut for Arsenal against Sheffield United on December 19, 1990.

He became the goalscoring sensation of English football last season as his electric pace and powerful finishing brought him an amazing 41 goals which broke a Newcastle club record that had stood for four decades.

Clubs throughout the world were alerted to his astonishing scoring feats, but he signed a contract designed to keep him at Newcastle for four years.

Manager Kevin Keegan said he regarded him as 'priceless' after paying £1.7 million to sign him from Bristol City in March 1993.

But now, it seems, Cole has his price after all. And Newcastle fans are in uproar. They cannot believe that he has been sold to one of the club's biggest rivals for Premiership honours.

It seems that Keegan's honeymoon period with the St. James's Park faithful is over. Team fortunes have been on the slide recently after a marvellous start to the season when they could do no wrong. Their title hopes have virtually vanished; their F.A. Cup chances are hanging by a slender thread, with a third round replay at Ewood Park to come; they are already out of the Coca Cola Cup. And now the fans' hero has gone.


Keegan insists that what he has done is for the long-term good of Newcastle United, and former Manchester United boss Dave Sexton may well have hit the nail on the head when he said recently that Cole was not a good team player. It may well be that King Kevin will eventually create a better TEAM at St. James's Park with the help of the money he has banked from the sale of his star striker.

Or is there, perhaps, something else that Keegan knows about the Cole he took to Newcastle, that Alex Ferguson doesn't?

The Cole sale is, of course, another indication of the trend towards the domination of English football by a very small elite group of super-duper Premiership clubs who will continue to cream off all the top players and the dogs-under-the-table rest will continue to pick up the scraps, quite tasty though some of them may be.

The rich will continue to get richer and the poor will become poorer. The smallest clubs will struggle gallantly on until they can struggle no more and the Gillinghams of the soccer world will continue to go the way of the Aldershots and Newport.

And we'll all sit back and let it happen until it's too late.

It was a win which maintained our record of never having failed to score against them in 20 league matches played at Oakwell. In fact it was the first time since the '51/52 season that we had scored only once.

In their previous two visits they had conceded seven goals. For in the '92/93 season the Reds were again at the foot of the table with only five points from nine games and were still without a home win in five attempts.


Town had collected seven points from the same number of games. The Reds had **Wayne Biggins** making his home debut and it was he who opened the scoring in the third minute. By the 32nd minute it was three with **John Pearson** and **Biggins**, again, netting the others. That was the end of the scoring and the start of our climb up the table.

Eleven seasons earlier the teams were in completely different positions when they met in mid-March. Town were taking all before them in their march to the First Division. They had been beaten only three times in 27 outings and had accrued 58 points. Although the Reds were 16 points worse off and had played two games more promotion was still an outside possibility.

The game was a classic. **Brian Stein** and **Colin Walker** shared four goals before the Reds took a grip when first **Ian Banks** and then **Ian Evans** scored. Town still wouldn't lie down and after **Nicky Law** headed into his own goal they produced a stirring finish but couldn't find an equaliser.

LOL CHAPPELL: 1949-59

LARRATT (Lol) Chappell was leading scorer in Barnsley's 1955 Division Three (North) championship season and his 21 goals included three hat-tricks. Indeed, in six completed Oakwell seasons he did the hat-trick on six occasions - more times than anyone else in club history - and his total of 94 League goals is the highest of any Barnsley player.

Joining Barnsley as an amateur from Birdwell Rovers in 1947, he became a professional two years later, a matter of weeks before being conscripted into the army for National Service.

Stationed at Catterick Camp, weekend leave enabled him to play regularly for the 'A' team, but on the first occasion that such leave was not granted he absented himself in order to play against Sheffield Wednesday Reserves. Monday morning punishment included a posting to Egypt, where he remained for a year before returning to the UK!

In March 1953 he succeeded Tommy Taylor at centre forward on the latter's transfer to Manchester United in a season which saw Barnsley relegated from the Second Division.

In the following campaign they were runners-up in the Northern Section, Lol recording his first League hat-trick on March 6, 1954, in a 4-1 success at Carlisle United. A week later, in a 5-0 beating of Accrington Stanley, he helped in the scoring of two goals and then lit up the final few minutes with two of his own - the first following a 40-yard dash before planting the ball firmly past the 'keeper, and the second was a header which the *Sheffield Telegraph* described as being reminiscent of Tommy Taylor at his best.

A year later Barnsley were champions, and Lol's contribution was 21 goals. In the run-in he scored twice in a 3-0 defeat of Bradford City before a crowd in excess of 18,000 and a fortnight later he had two more in a 3-1 defeat of Carlisle United.

OAKWELL CENTURIONS

The opening season in Division Two was, in the main, a long struggle, in part due to Lol's injury-absence throughout the autumn. In the end they finished six points clear of relegation, an enormous help being his two goals - including the winner - against Swansea Town in April after the team had trailed 2-0 at the interval.

The 1957/58 season ended with him again top scorer, and in the opening week he must have delighted manager and former Derby County captain Tim Ward with a hat-trick in a 4-1 win at the Baseball Ground.

The following season brought an end to his time at Oakwell, again he led the scorers but, just as his first appearances had been closely followed by relegation, so were his last. In the summer of 1959 a fee of £4,000 took him to Doncaster Rovers. However, a knee injury limited him to 34 appearances and at the season's end he wasn't retained.

Lol and his family then moved to the West Country, and until he reached 47 his skills and experience were used in non-league football with Bath City, Bideford, Barnstaple Town and Appledore, and with two of them he was player-manager.

Initially he combined part-time football with working for the Wesleyan and General Assurance Society. He quickly found that being a popular figure on the local soccer scene was greatly to his advantage; people invited him into their homes to talk about football and before they knew what was happening he'd sold them a policy!

He was soon a district manager, and in 1986 changed careers to become proprietor of the Barley Grove Service Station in Torrington. Sadly, the venture was short-lived. Within six months he became unwell, and after several months in hospital he died at home at Little Torrington, aged 57.

While Lol was at Oakwell, chairman Joe Richards publicly expressed a view that he was the greatest trier the club had ever had; certainly he was a non-stop worker who chased every chance that carried the merest hint of a goal. His being leading scorer is therefore an honour well earned, as indeed were six hat-tricks.

Actually, there was another - in a pre-season friendly at Falkirk in August 1953, but the scoring day which should have given him most pleasure but, instead, ended in utter frustration was the occasion of Bristol City's visit on 27th August 1958. Then he scored four times - and rarely can a player have had such a personally successful afternoon yet been in a losing side!

ON THE BALL

... with **ADRIAN MOSES**

BARNESLEY's latest graduate from the junior and reserve team ranks is already making a habit of making his debuts against top teams.

When 19-years-old Adrian Moses first won his way into the Pontin's League side his first appearance was in a 1-0 victory over Newcastle United at St. James's Park. And as if that was not enough, the next three games at the end of the 1992-93 season were against Blackburn Rovers, Nottingham Forest and a Manchester United side that included Bryan Robson!

Then, when he was drafted into the first team because of an injury to Gerry Taggart and the suspension of Charlie Bishop, he recently found himself making his Football League debut in front of a crowd of 21,000-plus against the First Division leaders Middlesbrough at Ayresome Park.

Although disappointed that a half-time abandonment caused that appearance to be scrubbed from the record books, Adie followed up five days later by being given his first taste of the F.A. Cup in a third round tie at home to Premiership Aston Villa watched by a near-capacity Oakwell crowd - and facing the formidable strike-force duo of John Fashanu and Dean Saunders.

Said the Campsall teenager: "I couldn't have had a bigger game than Villa to make my home debut, could I? And I have to admit I was a lot more nervous than I had been at Ayresome Park. However, once it got underway I was o.k. I made a couple of decent passes early on and they settled me down.

"The big thing was having Gary Fleming and Steve Davis around me, two very experienced players making sure that I did the right things, talking to me, encouraging me. They helped me through.

"The boss had told me to keep it tight and not try anything fancy. It was a matter of winning the ball and then passing it. Get and give were the instructions and that's what I tried to do. He also stressed the importance of keeping our shape at the back. And overall I was quite pleased with my performance, although disappointed at the result.

"Villa deserved to win, there's no doubt about that. They were the stronger side on the day, although the pitch certainly didn't help our passing game. It was very sandy in places.

"John Fashanu proved a real handful. Arms and legs all over the place. He's

so difficult to compete with in the air. Dean Saunders is a totally different type of player, small and nippy, so they make a very good combination, much the same as Paul Wilkinson and John Hendrie at Boro'."

Adie has been travelling with the first team quite a lot this season and had already been made to feel part of the squad. When 'Tags' was injured and 'Bish' suspended Danny Wilson had already told him that he had a chance of playing at Middlesbrough.

"The boss said going into the Christmas games that it would be a hard time and we would need all our squad members. There was always the possibility that any one of us would get a call-up because of injuries and suspensions. So I hoped I might be in the team for the visit to Ayresome Park. But it was still a fantastic feeling when the boss told me I was playing.

"I enjoyed the game, despite the conditions. It should never really have been started. The referee said at half-time that conditions were deteriorating but they couldn't have got any worse than they were at the start. It was like an ice-rink out there. But it was still a great experience to play in front of 21,000 against the leaders - even if it was only half a game and it doesn't count!

Now Adie is hoping that he can keep his place at least until 'Tags' is fit again.

"There's no doubt the team misses him when he's not in the side. He's so strong and he has such a physical presence that it can be intimidating for opposing teams. He's also got a lot of skill and although he's still quite young himself he has such a lot of experience."

Adie will also be looking for something better than the yearly contract which he has been on under two previous managers, Mel Machin and Viv Anderson. But he admits: "It's up to me. I know I have to keep in contention for the first team by playing well in the Reserves. There is so much competition for places here. Not so long ago I was out with a thigh injury and found it very difficult to get back into the Reserves. Now I'm in the first team. It only needs an injury or suspension and you're out again. And you don't know when you're going to be able to get back.

"It's healthy for the club, of course, when there are always players capable of coming in and doing a good job, and that's the kind of squad that is being

built here. The Juniors are well up there in the Northern Intermediate League, the Reserves are challenging for promotion to Division One of the Pontin's League, and the first team are chasing a play-off spot.

"So it really is a good time to be involved and to get a taste of first team football.

"Mal Shotton is doing a tremendous job with the Reserves. He's a winner. He wants to do well. But he wants to do it the right way, by playing good football. Like the gaffer he preaches passing and moving. But if it's necessary for us to grind out a result he wants us to be able to do that as well."

It was a friend of first team coach Eric Winstanley who recommended Adie for a trial at Oakwell and the miner's son made such an impression that he quickly graduated through the Under 18 Sunday side to the Northern Intermediate League team, which Eric was then coaching.

Mel Machin offered him a year's contract just before he parted company with the club, and last season he played nearly all season in the Reserves, while also making several appearances with the Juniors on Saturdays.

He was in the youth team that clinched the Northern Intermediate League Cup with a victory over Sunderland in the final at Oakwell in May and after it he was given another year's contract.


An all-round sportsman - he represented Doncaster Schools at cricket and cross-country as well as football - he had unsuccessful trials with Leeds United and Rotherham United, who both rejected him as being 'too small.'

He smiles at the recollection: "I have to admit I wasn't very big then. I shot up and filled out after reaching the age of 16 and was playing for Askern Welfare in the Central Midlands League when I got the invitation to go to Oakwell."

Adie, incidentally, was also quite an accomplished scholar, having collected eight 'O' level GCSE results in English language, English literature, French, History, Maths, Biology, PE and Craft Design and Technology.

And with a name like Moses there would seem to be no limits to what he could achieve.

Especially with an Archdeacon, a Bishop and a Canon amongst his colleagues!



THE MOST recent addition to the Luton Town playing staff is **Gary Waddock**, who completed a free transfer move from Bristol Rovers last month after a three-month loan spell at Kenilworth Road. Alpertown-born, the 32-year-old midfielder started his career with QPR, making more than 200 appearances for them. Then followed a spell in Belgium with Charleroi as he recovered from a serious knee injury. He also had spells with Millwall, QPR again and Swindon before a move to Luton.

Forwards **Dwight Marshall** and **Tony Adcock** are also new to Kenilworth Road this season, having signed for the Hatters in the summer.

Jamaica-born Marshall arrived at a cost of £150,000 from Plymouth Argyle. The 28-year-old scored 14 goals for Peter Shilton's side last season, his third campaign at Home Park. He started well for Luton, with two goals in the 5-1 win over Middlesbrough, and he also found the net in impressive away wins at Stoke and Wolves.

STAR SPOT

SCOTT OAKES joined Luton in October 1991, along with Des Linton, and made his debut for the Hatters at Norwich later that month. The performances of the 22-year-old from Leicester in last season's F.A. Cup attracted much interest from Premiership clubs, but he has since signed a new contract for the Hatters.

The England Under 21 international was Luton's leading scorer last season with 13 goals, including a hat-trick in the F.A. Cup sixth round win over West Ham.



Adcock signed for the club for a nominal fee from Peterborough, having been the leading scorer for Posh in each of the last two seasons in Division One. He scored 16 goals in the 1992-93 season and 13 last term. London-born, the 31-year-old has also played for Colchester, Manchester City, Northampton (two spells) and Bradford. The start of his Luton career has been hit by injury.

The last line of defence is provided by American Juergen Sommer, who joined the Town in August 1991, but then had to wait two years to make his debut against Watford at the start of last season. He went on to establish himself as the number one 'keeper at Kenilworth Road and capped the season off with a call-up to the United States World Cup squad. He made his USA debut when he went on as substitute against England at Wembley in September.

Competition for places in the back four is provided by **David Greene, Richard Harvey, Julian James, Marvin Johnson, Des Linton, Trevor Peake** and **Mitchell Thomas**.

Luton-born Greene (21) joined the Hatters straight from school in August 1991 and made his first team debut at Grimsby Town in March 1993. A Republic of Ireland international at Under 21 level, he started this season in the centre of defence. He captained Eire Under 21s against England at Newcastle in November.

Harvey is looking to resurrect his Town career after two years plagued by injury. His latest operation, for a cruciate knee ligament, kept him out for the entire 1993-94 season. Letchworth-born, he is a former England youth international who made his Town debut as a 17-year-old in 1986. He is now 25.

A former England Under 21 international, James joined Luton as a trainee and was introduced to First Division football five seasons ago. The 24-year-old from Tring was a regular at left-back last season, but he has played at right-back so far this term.

Johnson made his Football League debut against Wimbledon in 1988 and quickly established himself as a versatile defender. He started the season at left-back, but has since played at centre-half. Born in Wembley, he is 26 years old.

A regular at right-back last season, Linton has suffered with injury at the start of the current campaign. Birmingham-born, the 23-year-old signed for Luton from Leicester City in October 1991, along with Scott Oakes, as part of the deal which took midfielder Steve Thompson to Filbert Street.

Club captain Peake started his career at Lincoln City in 1979 before moving to Coventry City in 1983. He enjoyed eight full seasons at Highfield Road, winning an FA Cup winners' medal in 1987. He joined Luton for £100,000 in August 1991 and signed a new one-year contract last summer. Nuneaton-born, he is 37.

England Under 21 international Thomas made more than 100 appearances for home-town Luton before moving to Spurs, shortly after David Pleat, in 1986. He played in the 1987 FA Cup Final, and later moved to West Ham. He was on loan at Luton last season before completing a permanent transfer move. He is 30.

Joining newcomer Waddock in midfield are **Ceri Hughes, David Preece, Aaron Skelton, Paul Telfer** and **Tony Thorpe**.

Hughes was a regular last season and his recall earned the 23-year-old from the Rhonda Valley a call to the full Welsh side. He made his Town debut at Aston Villa in 1990 and also represented his country at youth and under 21 levels. He scored seven goals last season, but damaged knee ligaments in November and looks like being out of action until next month at the earliest.

Preece made his league debut for Walsall in 1981 before Luton invested £150,000 for his signature in 1984. He has played in two League Cup finals for the Hatters and has been capped three times at England B level. The 31-year-old from Bridgnorth has topped 300 league appearances for the club this season.

Welwyn-born Skelton (20) signed professional forms in December 1992 and was drafted into the first team squad

on a number of occasions in 1992-93, but last season his progress was halted by a serious thigh injury. He made his full league debut on the opening day of the current campaign at home to West Brom.

A former Luton trainee, 23-years-old Telfer made his debut at Everton towards the end of the 1990-91 season. He has been a regular on the right-hand side of the Town midfield for the past two seasons and has represented Scotland - he was born in Edinburgh - at under 21 and B levels. He scored eight goals last season and bagged two in the 4-2 win at Watford in September.

Twenty-years-old Thorpe, who was born in Leicester, made an immediate impact in the Town side when he scored for the Hatters on his full debut at Newcastle United in last season's FA Cup fourth round. He joined the club at the start of the 1992-93 season following a spell with Leicester.

Marshall's and Adcock's rivals for the places up front are **John Hartson, Scott Oakes** and **Kerry Dixon**.

A prolific scorer in both the youth and reserve teams at Kenilworth Road, Hartson's form continued in the first team when he scored on his full debut against Nottingham Forest last season. Swansea born, the 19-year-old has represented Wales at youth and under 21 level. He scored seven goals last season, but the start of the current campaign was disrupted by suspension and injury.

Dixon joined home-town club Luton in October 1993 after a five-month loan spell from Southampton, and bagged 10 goals last term. The 33-year-old started his career with Reading before joining Chelsea in 1983. It was at Stamford Bridge that he enjoyed the most prolific spell of his career, winning eight full England caps. He joined Southampton for £575,000 in July 1992. He held off the challenge of Hartson to become the first-choice centre-forward in the opening months of the current campaign.

Substitute goalkeeper is Ferryhill-born **Fred Barber**, a 31-year-old who joined the Hatters from Peterborough at the start of the season for £15,000, having previously enjoyed spells at Darlington, Everton, Walsall, Peterborough, Chester, Blackpool, Colchester and Chesterfield.

IN CHARGE

IT WAS at Kenilworth Road that David Pleat made a name for himself, both as a player and manager. He began his playing career at Nottingham Forest, but made only half-a-dozen first team appearances before joining Luton in 1964. After an injury-plagued spell he was transferred to Shrewsbury in 1967 and later played for Exeter and Peterborough before retiring in 1971.

In 1974 he returned to Luton as reserve team coach after a spell in charge at non-league Nuneaton Borough and was appointed first team coach three years later. He became manager in 1978, in succession to Harry Haslam, and led Luton into Division One four years later.

He joined Spurs in 1986 and led them to an FA Cup Final appearance prior to his appointment as Leicester City boss in December 1987. He returned to Luton in June of 1991 for his third spell at the club and took the Hatters into the semi-finals of the FA Cup last season.



LUTON TOWN

LUTON TOWN manager David Pleat has been delighted with his team's away form this season, but realises that there must be a big improvement to results at Kenilworth Road if the Hatters are to maintain their promotion challenge.

He says: "Maybe we are beginning to gain that self-belief that one needs when travelling to either intimidating grounds or good teams away from home. We set the standards in the resilient early games, and our attacking play has been precise and accurate."

"It is bound to be difficult to maintain the percentage success rate so far achieved whilst travelling, but it is vital that we better the home tally, which has been so disappointing."

In fact, the 1-0 defeat by Charlton at Kenilworth Road on January 2nd meant that Luton had lost seven of their 13 home fixtures, with only three wins and three draws.

Compare that with their away record of seven wins, four draws and only two defeats and you can see what Pleat means.

He is under no illusions, however, about the task facing his side at Oakwell. "Barnsley will present a real test for us today. They play good football, as we saw when they beat us at Kenilworth Road in October, and they will be looking to complete a double over us."

"Danny Wilson served our club well and it is good to see him having such a splendid first season in club management. Both he and I know how important the result of today's game will be. But then, every game is tough."

Pleat, now in his third spell at Kenilworth Road - he returned in June 1991 for a second stint as manager after an earlier stint as player - has already enjoyed a run of success in the F.A. Cup last season, when he led the Hatters to the semi-finals.

A 1-0 third round win at home to Southend United sparked things off. Then followed a 1-1 draw away to Newcastle United, and the Hatters scored two goals without reply in the replay at Kenilworth Road.

A fortuitous 2-1 win at Cardiff brought a fifth round trip to West Ham United. There were no goals at Upton Park, but a hat-trick by Scott Oakes proved too much for the Hammers in the replay.

In the semi-final at Wembley Chelsea were just too good and the dream disappeared, but it had been a brave effort based on some superb counter-attacking football and Pleat must have found it difficult to reconcile that kind of form with

LUTON have drawn all three cup games they have played this season.

In the Coca Cola competition an 81st minute goal by Scott Oakes seemed to have given them a first-leg advantage, albeit only a slight one, at home to Third Division Fulham, but the visitors snatched a last-minute equaliser to take the teams to Craven Cottage on level terms.

This time it was Fulham who scored first, after 15 minutes, only for the Hatters to level matters 16 minutes from the end of normal time through Dwight Marshall. When extra-time failed to separate the teams it went to penalties, and it was Fulham who went through 4-3.

Now the Hatters face a replay in the third round of the F.A. Cup, having been held to a 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road by Second Division Bristol Rovers last Saturday. John Hartson's 37th minute goal gave his side a second chance on Wednesday after Rovers had taken the lead after 20 minutes.

The winners are at home to Southampton.

that of the league, which saw the Hatters finish just one place clear of the relegation zone.

This season the Luton boss has managed to turn things around on their travels, but must again have been tempted to call in a psychiatrist to explain the failure of his team in front of their own supporters at Kenilworth Road.

There was a great deal of speculation in November about a move by Pleat back to White Hart Lane following the dismissal of Ossie Ardiles, and the Luton board went so far as to allow him to discuss a possible return to Spurs.

However, when he discovered that what was on offer for him at the time was a general manager's role, he decided to stay put, preferring to keep day-to-day involvement with the team at Kenilworth Road.


And no doubt all the Hatters' fans heaved a huge sigh of relief, for he is very popular at the club, having made a name for himself there as both player and manager.

Who will ever forget, for example, that crazy jig of delight when an unlikely victory on the last day of the season saved Luton from relegation from the top flight a few years ago?

It was Pleat who led the club into the old Division One in 1982 and he performed wonders to keep them there before leaving for Spurs in 1986.

As well as guiding the Hatters to the Second Division Championship he also took them to an F.A. Cup semi-final in 1986-87 before repeating that achievement last season.

Now his ambition is to take the club back into the Premiership. And if only he can sort out that home form he could yet do so this season.



THE SEASON could hardly have begun in a less promising way for Luton, won only one of their first nine matches, which included a penalty shoot-out dismissal from the Coca Cola Cup at the hands of Third Division Fulham.

But the optimists could see signs of hope. For five of those games were drawn, leaving only three defeats at the hands of Tranmere Rovers, Burnley and Bolton Wanderers.

The latter two were at home and the results in front of their own fans have been disappointing to say the least, with only three league wins in 11 attempts. Remarkably, one of those was a 5-1 demolition of leaders Middlesbrough in mid-October when Dwight Marshall (2), David Preece, John Hartson and an own goal sent Bryan Robson's high-flyers crashing.

That remains the Hatters' biggest win of the season. Their biggest defeat came early in December when they went down 6-3 at home to Sheffield United in an extraordinary game which saw Town pull back from 3-0 down to 4-3, despite having Gary Waddock sent off, only to concede two more goals in the last eight minutes.

Another of their home defeats came against Barnsley in October, when a goal from Andy Rammell gave the Reds a 1-0 victory.
