"Whatever decisions have to be made, I will make them"

With the events of the past fortnight paramount in the minds of the supporters these are my first programme notes as Manager. First and foremost, I think it right to assure you that I can, and will only look to the future of PORTSMOUTH FOOTBALL CLUB.

I have been appointed as Manager, and I have a job to do. Firstly that is to ensure that Pompey secure their position in the Endsleigh Division 1, and secondly to restore the Club to its former glory.

Of course, I cannot guarantee immediate success, but I can assure you that I will bring my own style of management to the Club. This will be in the interests of stability, continuity, and ultimately the progression of the Club.

Overnight, I have changed from being an old player to a young Manager, and I intend to be one leading from the front. However the team continued the good work with a well earned draw on our long trip to Sunderland although they had to dig deep into their reserves to achieve a result. The commit-

ment, dedication, and application of the players though could not be faulted.

Tonight, we have a golden opportunity to build on our performances at Stoke, and Sunderland with a home match against Luton who we welcome to Fratton Park for our Endsleigh League Division 1 fixture.

I believe we have prepared in the right way, and we are ready for what will be a very hard fixture, although I am sure we can gain something from this game.

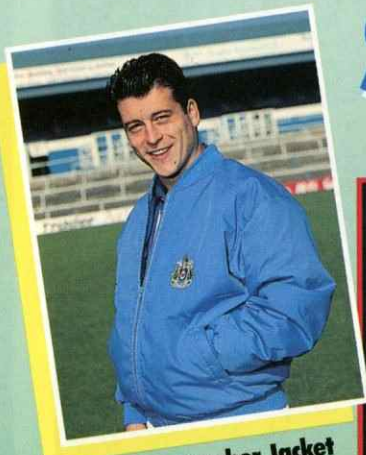

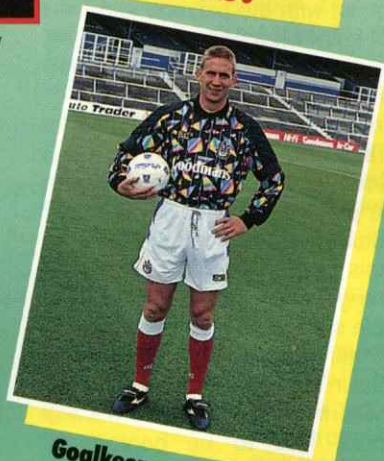

A CAPTAIN'S VIEW

Nowadays everybody has to live with changes in their life, and in their work. We had a hectic couple of days, but we're professionals, and we accept that it's part, and parcel of football. Now the dust has settled we want to look forward. We are getting on with our jobs with the aim of getting the results this club needs in the short term.

I was disappointed not to get back to playing against Millwall, but in the end was happy with the postponement. After our experiences against Leicester on a very boggy pitch we were keen not to be involved in a lottery of a match. Those sort of heavy wet pitches simply don't suit our passing style of game.

In the event, instead of playing Millwall we spent the Saturday afternoon in the rain having a two-hour session of hard running. It was a stiffer work-out than having to play.

The weather has made training so difficult. We had organised outdoor facilities at Southampton University until the end of the season, but often we haven't been able to get out as it's been waterlogged. It's either been a case of staying indoors, and keeping fit, or obtaining the use of the astro-turf at Whale Island.

Obviously the new boss has different ideas, and having been a defender himself he's got lots of things he wants to pass on to the likes of Butts, and myself. Clearly the defensive set-up in the team may differ as we get to reflect his, and Keith's viewpoints.

There's been no major differences in training methods so far, but a change in personnel has stimulated everybody. Naturally we're all trying that much harder to impress.

Mark Stimson has recently had his back operation in London. We're all thinking of him and wish him well, and a speedy recovery.

We were beaten at Luton earlier in the season, and they impressed us as a well-organised, and very sharp



outfit. They are quick-thinking at free-kicks, and throw-ins, and that's something we will have to watch for.

Luton have such a good manager in David Pleat that it came as a surprise to see them concede six against Saints, and five against Grimsby recently. They will have worked hard to put that right.

Scott Oakes is a highly-rated player, and David Preece is always in the thick of things with his organisation, and vital goals. In Jurgen Sommer they have one of the best keepers outside the Premier.

On a good pitch we should see a quality game tonight, and we are looking to capitalise on the two home games this week to climb away from the lower reaches of our division.

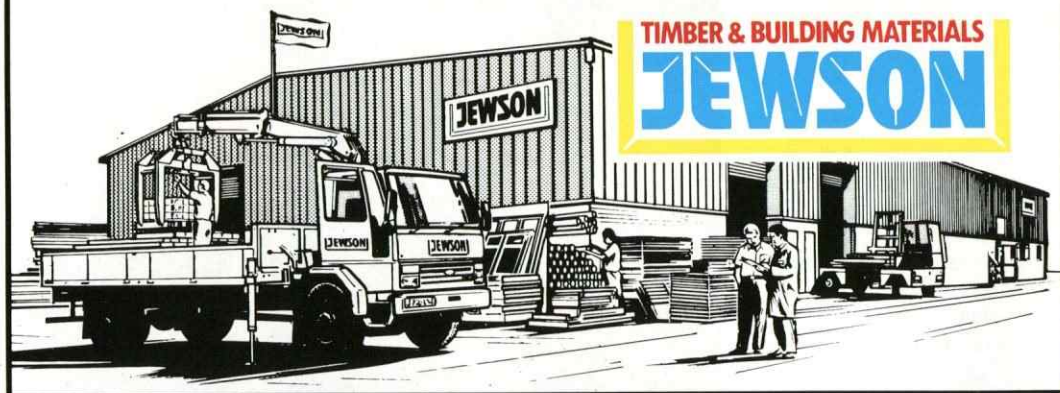

"I teach the correct way to play, and I like to see good football"

Peter Jeffs talks to **LARRY MAY**

Pompey's new Youth Team Manager

How, and where did you start your football career?

I was a 'Brummie' born in Birmingham, and brought up there until I became an apprentice at Leicester at age 16. By the time I was 17 I had been given a debut in the first-team by Manager Jimmy Bloomfield. It was under Manager Jock Wallace that I held a regular place for about seven years, mainly playing in the then First Division with defensive partners such as Jeff Blockley or Steve Sims. I have always been exclusively a centre-half.

At which other clubs have you played in your career?

It was a wrench to leave Leicester at age 24 to move to Barnsley, but I had four enjoyable years there playing for first, Norman Hunter, and then Allan Clarke. Then Howard Wilkinson bought me for Sheffield Wednesday, and I had a couple of years there in the First Division before moving on to Brighton for Barry Lloyd. After a year I damaged my knee, and had to retire three or four years ago.

How did you get into coaching?

I had taken my full badge on a course whilst I was playing, and at the time when I retired Brighton needed a coach. I took over the Reserve Team, working with Barry Lloyd, and Martin Hinshelwood

Who have been the big influences in your career?

When I was playing I admired people like Martin Buchan, and Gordon McQueen as defenders, but I had no real role-models. Jock Wallace as a Manager at Leicester was special to me in that he gave me my first chance as a first-team regular.

He was enthusiastic, and a great motivator, seemed rough and ready on the outside, but I learned a lot from him. I learned things from Norman Hunter, and Howard Wilkinson was an example of a great organiser. You take things from every manager you play under, and then add your own ideas as well.

Who were your most difficult opponents as a player?

I always thought Trevor Francis was a great player, but Joe Jordan was my biggest challenge. I enjoyed my duels with him, and I knew I was in for a right battle.

What are your football philosophies?

I'm not a biff-bang merchant, I like to see players trying to pass the ball. I teach the correct way to play, and I like to see good football. Obviously you have to compete as well, no-one has a divine right to play. Above all players have to show that they're comfortable on the ball.

What do you look for in a young player?

Ability is paramount of course, but other things come into it. A youngster has to listen, and learn, and show a good attitude to everything. Character is important, and how they are away from the club. All that is part, and parcel of what they're like on the pitch. A youngster must be single-minded enough not to be side-tracked, and that means he must knuckle down to his job.

How did you come to be offered this new job at Fratton Park?

I had to leave Brighton due to their budget restrictions, and since September I have been working at a private school for dyslexic children near Brighton organising their sports and other activities. Martin Hinshelwood phoned me on Monday 6th February 1995 to say

that Terry was looking for someone to look after the youth team. I came down on the Tuesday for a chat, and started work the next day.

What are your objectives in the job?

I want the lads to enjoy their football firstly, but I shall be passing on some knowledge, and helping them shape their futures. Along with Dave Hurst, we have to go out and look for other players, and check the Schools of Excellence. Dave has a great record here for discovering youngsters, and we have to keep that going. You can't beat playing, and I miss it still, but I love the coaching side, and hope to pass on that enthusiasm.

Would you encourage your three boys to play football for a living?

My boys are 12, 9 and 7 and the two young ones are very keen. They support Man United, and Arsenal, but hopefully they'll want a Pompey strip soon. I don't push them as far as a football career is concerned.

What are your first impressions of Pompey?

Everybody knows it's a club with a lot of potential, and could be a big club. From what I know of Terry he will prepare thoroughly, and get everything right.

What are your interests away from football?

I like, and listen to a lot of music, I particularly like Michael MacDonald and Sting, and listen to jazz. Sporting-wise I enjoy some tennis, and squash.

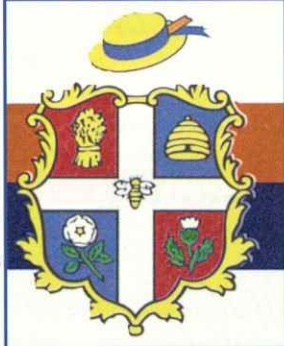

JUERGEN SOMMER (Goalkeeper). Born 27/02/69. USA International who joined the Hatter's in August 1991. Made his debut against Watford at the beginning of the 93 season, and has now established himself as the number one 'goalie'.

FRED BARBER (Goalkeeper). Born 26/08/63. One of the most experienced, and travelled 'goalies' in the League. Signed from Peterborough in July 94 for £15,000, having previously played for Darlington, Everton, Walsall, Chester, Blackpool, Colchester and Chesterfield.

KELVIN DAVIS (Goalkeeper). Born 29/06/76. Highly rated, and talented young keeper who has come up through the ranks at Kenilworth Road. Made his debut in the final game of last season against Stoke City.

JULIAN JAMES (Defender). Born 22/03/70. Versatile England U21

International who joined the Hatter's as a trainee. Was the clubs regular left back last season, but this term has appeared mainly in the right back position.

MARVIN JOHNSON (Defender). Born 29/10/68. Another player to come through Luton's youth policy, this utility defender made his debut in 1988 against Wimbledon. Started career as a full back, but this season has operated as a central defender along side Trevor Peake.

DES LINTON (Defender). Born 05/09/71. Signed in an exchange deal with Scott Oakes from Leicester in Oct1991, as part of the deal which took Steve Thompson to Filbert Street. Regular right back last season he has been sidelined this term with groin injuries.

TREVOR PEAKE (Defender). Born 06/07/57. Club captain, Trevor began his career at Lincoln City in 1979 before a transfer to Coventry

City in 1983. Enjoyed considerable success at Highfield Road including an F.A.Cup Winners Medal in 1987. Joined Luton in Aug 1991 for £100,000.

MITCHELL THOMAS (Defender). Born 02/10/64. England U21 International who is in his second spell at Kenilworth Road. Came through the ranks before a big money transfer to Spurs in 1986. Later moved to West Ham before a free transfer back to the Hatter's last season.

CERI HUGHES (Midfield). Born 26/02/71. Exciting, and gifted Welsh Youth, U21, and Full International who is another product of Luton's youth policy. Made his debut against Aston Villa in 1990, and was prominent in Town's cup run last season which brought him to the attention of several Premier League club's.

DAVID PREECE (Midfield). Born 28/05/63. Tough midfield general who started his career at Walsall in 1981 before a £150,000 transfer to the Hatter's in 1984. An England B International he has made over 300 appearances for the club.

PAUL TELFER (Midfield). Born 21/10/71. Former trainee who is a Scottish U21 and B International. Made his debut against Everton in 1991, and has been a regular on the right side of midfield since. He also

has the ability to get forward, and score goals.

GARY WADDOCK (Midfield). Born 17/03/62. Experienced player who started his career with QPR before a spell in Belgium with Charleroi. Returned to the League with Millwall, and then had spells at QPR again, Swindon, and Bristol Rovers before a free transfer to Luton in Dec 1994.

SCOTT OAKES (Forward). Born 05/08/72. Much sought after striker who began his career with Leicester. Signed from the Foxes in an exchange deal in Oct 1991. His performances last season earned him England U21 recognition, and he ended the campaign Town's top scorer with 13 goals.

KERRY DIXON (Forward). Born 24/07/61. Prolific goalscorer who is an England International. Started his career with Reading before joining Chelsea in 1983 where he became a cult hero. Transferred to Saints for £575,000 in July 1992 he did not settle, and eventually joined the Hatter's on a free in Oct 1993.

DWIGHT MARSHALL (Forward). Born 03/10/65. Signed in the close season from Plymouth for £150,000 this very fast, and tricky winger has quickly become a crowd favourite. Has the ability to score spectacular goals, and last season bagged 14.

MEET THE MANAGER DAVID PLEAT

David began his playing career at Notts Forest, but after only half a dozen first team appearances joined Luton in 1964. He had an injury plagued spell at the Hatter's before joining Shrewsbury, Exeter, and finally Peterborough where he retired in 1971. After a spell in charge of non-league Nuneaton Borough he returned to Kenilworth Road as reserve team coach in 1974. He became first team coach in 1977, and was appointed Manager for the first time in 1978, and guided the Hatter's into Division One in 1982. In 1986 he was persuaded to join Spurs as Manager, and led them to the F.A.Cup Final in 1987 before moving to Leicester City in December 1987. He remained at Filbert Street until January 1991 before joining Luton Town again as Manager for the second time in June 1991. Last season he took the Hatter's to the semi-final's of the F.A.Cup, and the stylish and attacking football they produced persuaded Spurs to approach for his services as their General Manager in November 1994. David declined for several reason's, but one was to remain loyal to the board who have always given him their support when needed, during both his playing, and his managerial career.

This meant with Woody, and Lloyd included we had 6 of the playing staff out with ankle injuries. This is very strange, although you can often put certain injuries down to pitches, or sometimes training methods, and this amazing sequence is purely a coincidence. The only way of preventing ankle problems is by constantly strengthening them, but by doing that

there is still no guarantee that when landing awkwardly you will not damage ligaments around the joint.

Poor 'old' Stimo has also had a hard time during the last week or so. He has been on strict bed rest after a major operation to fuse the lower part of his spine. He has had a small bone grafted from his left hip, and it was inserted between two of his lumbar vertebrae. This should prevent any slipping of his vertebrae which might otherwise have occurred. He has been in a lot of pain since this major operation, and he needs strong doses of pain killing drugs. He has been feeling a lot better in the last couple of days, and all being well will be up, and pottering about by the end of the week. He could be back playing by next pre-season which is what we will aim for.

Finally, I would like to welcome Luton tonight, David Pleat, Wayne Turner and my old mate from my Coventry days, Trevor Peake. Peakey rarely gets flustered, and is a great pro, but hopefully Hally and Co can trouble him, and send him back empty handed from Fratton Park.

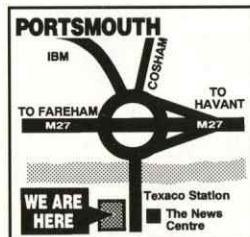

Football hooliganism is now firmly back at the top of the social and political agenda. The optimistic amongst us might have thought that violence was confined to the 'bad old days' before all-seater stadia, or family, and community enterprises. However, this is evidently not the case.

Should we be wringing our hands in desperation, and despair? How serious is this return to our infamous past? Well, obviously very serious, but I believe there are two different situations here which need to be considered separately.

With the recent events at Chelsea, and the Manchester derby still fresh in our minds, the domestic game is once again under scrutiny. This situation is not, I believe, as serious as the press would have us think. Wallowing in the mire of recent scandals, the media are all too keen to find some sort of trend, and hooliganism has sadly become fashionable again.

That is not to condone the actions of the fans at Stamford Bridge, but the reactions of the press to that incident should be entirely different to those which greeted the scuffles seen at the Manchester derby which followed it. The first was shameful violence, the second isolated yet still reprehensible, outbreaks of frustration. Of course you feel for Steve Bruce, and his son in those events, yet I believe the scenes at Maine Road are not part of a pattern, nor are they symptoms of a general malaise.

It is difficult to take hysterical criticism from the same press which paid a reported £20,000 to a Crystal Palace supporter who provoked Cantona. The media's revelling in the depths, smacks of hypocrisy - a fact not lost on Peter Meads, vice-chairman of Millwall. He is hoping to meet sports editors of our national newspapers to appeal for calm, and a sense of perspective in this matter. I wish him luck.

An entirely different situation, and one altogether more serious, is the

violence witnessed last week in Dublin. This was organised thuggery with an extreme, and political bias. It appears to have been planned, and premeditated violence looking for any excuse to happen, led by known troublemakers who have found in football a convenient outlet for their intimidating poison.

Thousands of us watch football matches safely, and sensibly week in, week out. We are confronted with images which disgrace the game we love, and which blacken us by association. These hooligans are not the fans we know, they are not the people we sit or stand next to, or share a pint with in our local pub.

What should be done is now a matter of urgency for the F.A., and more importantly the Police. We must move swiftly, and competently to stop these thugs hijacking our game. Our national game should be the pinnacle of football in this country rather than, the cause for justified shame, and utter despair.

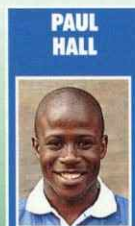

Today Pompey will hope to continue their good run of results against Luton at Fratton Park, and gain another win which will pull us out of trouble at the bottom of the league. Pompey have won three home games on the trot against Luton, and in 19 visits the Hatter's have only won on four occasions.

Luton currently have a better away record than home record, and will be hoping to improve that today. Luton come into today's game with just four victories in visits to Fratton Park, the last of which was in 1975/76. Despite Luton's poor home record Pompey are one of the teams who have fallen victim at Kenilworth Road this season.

We have been drawn against Luton on three occasions in the F.A. Cup, but on each occasion we have lost at Kenilworth Road, these being in 1921/22, 1950/51, and 1987/88, although in 1921/22 we drew the first game 1-1 at Fratton Park before losing 2-1 in the replay.

In 19 league visits to Kenilworth Road we have won only twice, compared to Luton's 4 wins in 18 league trips here.

TOUCHLINE TALK

MILLION-POUND PLAYERS TWO A PENNY NOW!

It's not so long ago that a million-pound transfer was a rare event, and caused a big stir in the football world. Trevor Francis was sold by Jim Smith at Birmingham, to Brian Clough at Nottingham Forest as the first million-pound player, but it's only in recent years that such a transfer became common-place.

The growth in the trade is highlighted by the fact that there were 43 transfer deals valued at £1 million or more in 1994. Of those deals 17 were £2 million or more. The figures show that just over £130 million was spent in 1994, and that's almost £25 million more than in 1993, and about £56 million more than in 1992.

Everton were the biggest spenders, and Mike Walker, and Joe Royle spent £12.3 million on players like Duncan Ferguson, Daniel Amokachi Vinny Samways, and Anders Limpar. Newcastle United spent £11.25 million, Tottenham £8.6 million and Sheffield Wed £7.7 million.

Outside the Premier League Wolves and Birmingham City spent £6.2 million, and £2.3 million respectively. Despite the apparent increase in the number of foreign players in our leagues it is interesting to note that only 9 of the 43 million-pound plus deals in 1994, involved fees being paid to foreign clubs. There is good evidence to suggest that the majority of the £130 million spent, stayed in, and circulated amongst our own English league clubs.

All these fees seem modest in comparison to some of the European deals. Italian striker Lentini was transferred from Torino to AC Milan for £13 million, and he's hardly a household name. Vialli left Sampdoria for Juventus, for £12.5 million, and Papin moved from Marseille to AC Milan for £10 million.

David Platt has been the subject of three massive transfer deals totalling more than £17 million, and may well increase that value before his career is over. Now English football waits to see if the 1995 standard has been set by the £6 million paid for Andy Cole. Worldwide that is the joint 8th top transfer!
