It will not have lifted us off the bottom but it will keep us all on our toes and give us the encouragement to shout ourselves hoarse tonight in the hope that we can string together two successes in a row - not done since Shrewsbury and Sheffield United caught us in form in mid November.



If all went well at Ashton Gate we will now need seven wins from 11. And just about the only thing really going in our favour is that we have seven of those games here at Turf Moor.


If we can get anything like a run going, playing in front of our own fans could sweep us to safety - even though we have some very difficult games to play.

Mrs Gwen Wells of Barrowford Near Nelson, wrote to me recently concerning the young Swedish player, Mattias Flodstrom.





Burnley 2, Oldham 1

"That rarest of commodities came Burnley's way on Saturday.

A win was safely banked - the first in the league since New Year's Eve. And it was a win the Clarets richly deserved.

They may have suffered from some sort of stage fright - especially in front of goal - and they may have almost let things slip at the end. But when they really had to face the music, they earned a rich ovation.

The win repaired some of the damage of recent weeks. It was the sort of game we all hoped for this season - and the sort of result.

Now we have to hope we'll still be around for more of the same next time around."

"Former England midfielder Paul Stewart saw his fierce shot hit a post - and his career hit the buffers. Stewart, brought to Liverpool by Graeme Souness for £2.3m, ended his loan spell at Burnley with only the prospect of suspension.

The out of favour Anfield man has now had loan spells at Crystal Palace, Wolves and Turf Moor - and all have ended with the thumbs down.

Defender Chris Vinnicombe gave Burnley some hope with his first goal in four and a half years after Kurt Nogan's early strike was wiped out by Oldham's top scorer Sean McCarthy."

The last time MOLINEUX

The switching of the Wolves' game this weekend to Friday has sparked off a great deal of controversy with our fans.

Our switchboard has been jammed with calls complaining about the switch but at the end of the day there was nothing we could do about it.

The attraction of the game had meant that many supporters were travelling on organised trips from their local pub, club or place of work and in most cases these have had to be cancelled. We can only apologise as the circumstances of the switch are completely beyond our control.

Their three international call-ups meant they could postpone if they so wished. The alternative to the previous night was to find a suitable date in a crowded programme at the end of the season which we felt was a non-starter.

Those travelling to Molineux on Friday will see a stadium that would certainly grace the Premier Division.

In the last two decades, perhaps only the development undertaken by Rangers at Ibrox Stadium matches the transformation at Molineux. Before Wolves brought professional football to Molineux the site was known locally for its pleasure gardens, boating lake and a cycle and athletics track. Indeed, the first professional sport at Molineux was cycling. The whole area was watched over from the Molineux Hotel, where the League held many committed meetings in the 1890's. With the help of the Northampton Brewery Company, Wolves built dressing rooms, an office, a small stand



which could accommodate 300 and developed some cinder banking and shelter for a further 4,000. Molineux opened its doors for football for the first time in 1889 - Aston Villa were the visitors.

In 1923 the club formed a new limited company which bought the site from the brewery and two years later built their first major stand, with the Waterloo Road Side providing seats for 2,600 and standing room for 4,000. As the club continued its rise back up the League (they returned to the First Division in 1932) so work continued around the ground. After an old cover had blown down in a gale, a new Molineux Street Stand went up in its place, accommodating 3,400 seats and

4,500 standing places. This stand is perhaps one of the longest-lived memories of Molineux, for its multi-span roof, tapering towards one end to follow the street, was as distinctive a site as the Spion Kop was at Anfield.

The introduction of the Safety of Sports Grounds Act caused many clubs to re-evaluate their grounds and Wolves, realising that the now all-seater Molineux Street Stand would not pass, decided in 1978 to erect a modern stand in its place. It was revolutionary and extremely impressive then: a curved cantilever stand with two tiers of seating separated only by a tier of private executive boxes. The stand, which contained 9,500 seats and 42 boxes cost Wolves £2.8 million but the building of the stand almost finished the club off for good. Four years later the club was still in debt to the tune of £1.8 million and languishing in the Fourth Division; had the club wanted to develop the three other sides of the ground they were in no position to do so. And so the Waterloo Road Stand and North Bank were closed, with only

the offices in the former stand remaining open.

In 1986 the South Bank was closed and only the new stand remained open.

Now, thanks to wealthy benefactor Sir Jack Hayward and £25 million, Molineux has four stands any supporter can be proud of, creating an atmosphere that once again strikes fear into visiting players. The Wolves logo is picked out in black seats among a forest of old gold ones, giving a striking appearance when the ground is empty. With a Premier-standard ground Hayward and Wolves are now aiming for a return to the top flight.

Paul Smith had a chance minutes later but shot over from the edge of the area. Andrew Bannister, back from Irish side Bangor City, had a chance to open the scoring when he broke into the area, but took one touch too many and the keeper saved well. On twenty-three minutes the stalemate was broken, Preston striker Shaw picked up the ball on the edge of the area and with Russell off his line, the former Stoke player picked his spot with a delightful lob to put the Whites in front.

Burnley pushed for an equaliser and John Pender headed over from a McMinn cross then Bannister forced a save out of Lucas in the Preston goal. With two minutes to go before the break the deserved equaliser finally arrived. McMinn sent a right wing cross into the area and Bannister rose at the near post to send his header past Lucas.

The Clarets came out in the second period eager for the win and Peel, McMinn and Bannister all went close for the Clarets. The Joker of the pack, Ted McMinn, entertained the Turf

Moor faithful this time on the left wing showing his neat skills and trickery. On seventy-eight minutes the Clarets got the winner they richly deserved. Paul Smith pulled the ball back from the bye-line for Chris Brass to send in a far post cross for the impressive Paul Weller to head home his first reserve goal of the season. Preston almost grabbed a late equaliser when a free-kick from Sully was glanced just wide of the post by McKenna but the Clarets held on to take their unbeaten Pontins League run to five games.



Clarets Past

Alan West

Born Hyde, December 18th 1951.

Midfield man Alan West burst onto the Turf Moor scene during the Claret's triumphant FA Youth Cup campaign of 1967/68. Although the wingmen Steve Kindon and David Thomas got the rave reviews it was the midfield engine room that was the real key to the success of the side with West alongside the combative Eric Probert and Mick Docherty providing the non-stop service to the front men.

The son of a school caretaker, he was spotted by the ubiquitous Manchester United scouting system while playing for Cheshire Schoolboys. United were too late however, West was already on Associate Schoolboy forms with Burnley, signing as an apprentice in 1967 and as a professional on his 17th birthday in 1968.

Burnley chose not to rush him into league football, but he was still only 18 when he made his First Division debut against Stoke at Turf Moor in March 1970. It was his only appearance of the season and by the time he was given an extended run in the side, the Clarets were struggling against relegation, eventually succumbing to the drop in 1971.

He was a regular during the following campaign and was playing so well that he was selected for the England

Under-23 team against Wales at Swindon in January 1972. He slotted in comfortably alongside household names of the future that included Colin Todd, Mick Channon, Malcolm McDonald and Tony Currie as England won 2-0 against a Welsh side containing West's Burnley team-mates Leighton James and goalkeeper Jeff Parton, who was also making his international debut.

Later, during the season's low point, West lost his place in the Clarets' midfield to Probert, his team-mate in the FA Youth Cup triumph, and suddenly his Turf Moor career was effectively over.

He only made the briefest of contributions to the Second Division Championship campaign of 1972/73 and, as the Clarets prepared for life back in the top flight, West decided that his future lay elsewhere.

He was transferred to Sunderland at the end of August 1973 for £70,000 and was training with his new team-mates when the deal was suddenly called off. A medical had revealed a slight back injury. Sunderland were not prepared to continue with the transfer and in no time Alan West was back at Turf Moor.

Two months later he was on the move again, to Second Division Luton for £100,000 and this time there were no hitches. He immediately became a regular and played a significant part in the Hatters' promotion to the First

Division in 1974 as runners-up to runaway champions Middlesbrough. Luton were relegated again in 1975 and West spent the rest of his Kenilworth Road career in the Second Division, including a long spell as club captain. In the summer of 1976 he played in America for Minnesota Kicks, helping the club to reach the final of the USA Knock-out Tournament. He moved to Millwall in the summer of 1981 and, after a season as a regular was released early in 1983, joining Hitchin Town of the Isthmian League, Premier Division. He later played for Baldock Town, while working as a sales representative.

West perhaps never quite fulfilled his early promise during his time at Turf Moor, but Luton fans certainly saw him at his best.

Peter McKay

Born Newburgh, February 23rd 1925.

Centre forward Peter McKay's only Football League club was Burnley and when he took over from Bill Holden in the Clarets' first team in 1955 he immediately impressed with his unusual style, his unlikely appearance — and his deadly finishing.

Dundee United had something of a reputation for producing goalscoring centre forwards when McKay joined them in 1947. He certainly continued the tradition, scoring over 200 first team goals at just under a goal a game in seven years at Tannadice Park and is till United's record scorer.

In 1954 the Burnley scouts were recommended to have a look at him and, like numerous other clubs previously, they were not immediately taken by the slightly built player who lacked pace and was one-footed. His goals tally spoke for itself however, and eventually Peter McKay arrived at Turf Moor in May 1954 at the age of 29.

He started the following season in the Reserves, scoring a hat-trick on his debut and netting eight goals altogether in his first three games. He was immediately promoted to the first team, but only played occasionally during that first season without getting on the scoresheet. It was a different matter in the Central League however, McKay netting 36 goals, easily the Reserve team top scorer.

In September 1955 he was again given a chance in the First Division and this time he grasped the opportunity firmly. He scored a hat-trick in his first game of the season and hit 25 altogether, the highest individual total at the club since 1931.

Peter McKay was not a big man and not a traditional "old fashioned" centre forward. He was a goal-

poacher, in the team for just one purpose and never straying too far from the middle. He was skilled at tiding the crudest of tackles as he darted between defenders. He was also very awkward for centre halves to handle, with a habit of flicking his heels in the air as he jumped, with his marker keeping his distance or getting a nasty crack on the shins for his pains. The following season, McKay continued to notch his share of goals, but Burnley manager Alan Brown had decided that it was time for a change of system. Every player was expected to work harder for the team, but as McKay's strength was in the middle rather than foraging out on the flanks, his effectiveness began to suffer.

He lost his place in the side just before Christmas 1956 and, a month later, returned to Scotland to sign for St Mirren. He insisted that he had been perfectly happy at Burnley but was not getting any younger and needed first team football.

Peter McKay's time at Burnley was relatively brief but he made a lasting impression. Shrewd judges maintained that he was one of the best goal poachers seen at Turf Moor with the ability to have gone to the very top if only he had been "discovered" and tempted south years earlier.

ASK THE EXPERT

Q How does Manchester United's recent 9-0 victory against Ipswich compare with the Clarets' biggest ever league win?

A Burnley's record victory is also 9-0, a score the club has achieved on four occasions, three times in the FA Cup and just once in the Football League.

On January 9th 1892, Darwen came to Turf Moor and were thrashed 9-0 thanks to goals from McLardie (3), Nicol (3), Hill (2) and Espie. Burnley ended the season in seventh place (of 14) and Darwen finished at the bottom, going on to become founder members of the Football League Second Division in 1892/93.

Later that season Burnley won 6-2 at Darwen and so scored 15 goals against them altogether out of only 49 in total that season.

In the FA Cup, Crystal Palace were defeated 9-0 at Turf Moor in a Second Round Replay in 1908/09, and New Brighton were crushed 9-0 also at Turf Moor in a Fourth Round tie in 1956/57. More recently, in the First Round of 1984/85, Burnley travelled to play Penrith and came back with their biggest ever away victory in a competitive match, again winning 9-0.

Hello... LUTON

Luton Town have had a fine season in Division One to date, and are still eyeing a play-off spot. Lying in 11th at the time of going to press, the Hatters were nine points outside the cut-off point, with all to play for.

This all comes after finishing two points from relegation in the past two years, and the loss of star prospect John Hartson to Arsenal for £2.5m, making him Britain's most expensive teenager. Of course, Luton showed they have good players during their run to the FA Cup semi-finals last season when the likes of Scott Oakes, who struck a hat-trick against West Ham, and experienced David Preece and Trevor Peake drove the side on to wins over the likes of Newcastle.

One player who played in the Wembley semi-final defeat against Chelsea for Luton is Alan Harper, now wearing the Claret and Blue jersey.

Voted player-of-the-year last season after excelling in the "holding role", Harper wanted a return to his native North West and will be hoping Burnley can complete the double over his old club.

Back in September, Burnley earned their first win of the season at Kenilworth Road thanks to a first half strike from Liam Robinson, but Luton have moved away from the bottom half of the table, and results such as the 5-1

home win over Middlesbrough have raised eyebrows across the country.

But it is Town's away form which has been the secret of their success, and their seven wins on their travels cannot be topped in the Division.

However, their 3-0 defeat at struggling Southend recently was a blow to their faint hopes of a return to the top flight after a three year absence.

But the Roots Hall result aside, Luton are in good form, with two wins, two draws and two defeats in their last six games and will pose a real threat to Burnley's hopes of three points tonight.

THE MANAGER

It was at Kenilworth Road that David Pleat made a name for himself both as a player and manager.

He began his playing career at Nottingham Forest but played only half a dozen games before joining Luton in 1964.


After an injury-plagued spell, he moved to Shrewsbury Town in 1967, and later played for Exeter and Peterborough before retiring in 1971.

In 1974 he returned to Luton as reserve team coach after a spell in charge at non-league Nuneaton Borough, and was appointed to first team coaching duties three years later, becoming manager the following year.

Four years later he guided Town into the top flight, before joining Tottenham Hotspur in 1986, leading them to the FA Cup Final in 1987 before becoming Leicester City boss in December that year. He remained at Filbert Street until

January 1991 when he returned for his third spell at Luton, taking them to the FA Cup semi-finals last season.

The Luton board allowed him to discuss a possible return to Spurs in November 1994, but he turned down a General Manager's role, preferring the day-to-day involvement with the team at Kenilworth Road.

WHO ARE YOU?

Juergen Sommer (goalkeeper) - signed in 1991, had to wait two years for his debut. Made USA debut against England at Wembley in September.

Kelvin Davis (goalkeeper) - highly-rated young keeper who made his debut last season. On loan at Torquay at the end of last year.

Richard Harvey (defender) - looking to resurrect his career after two years out with injury. Former England Youth.

Julian James (defender) - introduced to the old First Division five years ago, a former England Under 21 international.

Marvin Johnson (defender) - versatile defender who started season at left back, but has played at centre half of late.

Trevor Peake (defender) - club captain, started career with Lincoln. Won FA Cup winners' medal with Coventry in 1987.

Mitchell Thomas (defender) - former England Under 21 man in second spell with Luton. Played for Spurs and West Ham.

Ceri Hughes (midfielder) - Welsh squad member recently back from injury. Regular in Town midfield last season.

Paul Telfer (midfielder) - former Luton trainee, Scottish Under 21 and B international. Made his debut in 1991.

Gary Waddock (midfielder) - free transfer from Bristol Rovers in December last year after three month loan spell. Made Luton debut v Burnley.

Scott Oakes (forward) - signed in the deal that took Steve Thompson to Leicester in 1991. Highly-rated England Under 21.

Kerry Dixon (forward) - signed in October 1993 from Southampton and was top scorer last season. England international.

Dwight Marshall (forward) - no stranger to Clarets fans - he scored three goals in the four games between Burnley and Plymouth last season.

Wayne Biggins (forward) - ex-Claret on loan from Stoke City. Career has taken in spells at Norwich, Manchester City and Celtic.

Rob Matthews (forward) - recently signed by David Pleat from Notts County. 24-year-old tormented Burnley in January for County.

A

A is for American, the nationality of the Hatters' goalkeeper Jurgen Sommer. The 31-year-old was born in New York and came on as a substitute in the USA's 2-0 defeat at Wembley against England last summer.

B is for Black (Kingsley), Northern Irish international who played 127 league games for Luton, his home-town club, scoring 26 times, before a £1.5m move to Nottingham Forest in 1991.

C is for Chelsea, conquerors of Luton in the FA Cup semi-final at Wembley last season. The Hatters saw off Southend United, Newcastle United, Cardiff City and West Ham United in an epic run before going down to a Gavin Peacock double strike.

D is for Donaghy (Mal), Luton's most capped player, who earned 58 Northern Ireland caps while at Kenilworth Road.

E is for Elstrup (Lars), Luton's record transfer buy, paying Danish club Odense £850,000 in 1989.

F is for foundation. Luton were formed by an amalgamation of two leading local clubs, Wanderers and Excelsior — a works team — at a meeting in Luton Town Hall in April 1885. Wanderers had already played in the FA Cup and the new club entered in its inaugural season.

G is for Greash (Tony), midfielder who played for Luton between 1979/81, playing in 78 league games, scoring twice, during a career that also took in spells at Orient, Brighton, West Brom, Manchester City, Rotherham and Walsall.

H is for Hartson (John), who became the most expensive

teenager in the country when Arsenal paid £2.5m for the 19-year-old striker in January of this year. The fee shattered Town's outgoing transfer record, which was the £1.5m

Nottingham Forest paid for Kingsley Black in 1991.

I is for internationals. During Luton's top-flight stint between 1982-92, many of the club's players enjoyed call-ups for international duty, including Paul Walsh, Brian Stein and Ricky Hill (England), Mal Donaghy and Kingsley Black (Northern Ireland), and Andy Dibble (Wales).

J is for James (Julian), 24-year-old midfielder who celebrates his 25th birthday tomorrow. Has made over 150 league appearances for Luton.

K is for killer instinct, which Joe Payne certainly showed on April 13th, 1936, when he netted a league record 10 goals in the 12-0 win over Bristol Rovers in Division Three South. The following season he went on to hammer 55 league goals — a club record in a single campaign.

L is for Littlewoods Cup, which the Hatters won in 1988, beating Arsenal 3-2 in the final. Their defence of the trophy saw a return to Wembley, but Nottingham Forest triumphed 3-1.

M is for Morton (Bob), who holds the Hatters' appearances record, playing 550 times 1948-64.

N is for Nogan (Kurt), Burnley's record signing who scored three goals in 33 league games for Luton between 1989 and 1992. Another

former Hatter in the Burnley side is Alan Harper, who played 41 times for Town last season and earned the player of the season accolade.

O is for oldest player, who is Dally Duncan, aged 39 years 11 days when he played on October 25th, 1947 in Division Two.

P is for Peake (Trevor), former FA Cup winner with Coventry, now playing at centre half for the Hatters. Had made 114 league appearances for the club before the start of the season, without scoring. Club captain.

Q is for quick. Anyone who has seen Town's flying forward Dwight Marshall will certainly vouch that he is jet-heeled. Of course, the 29-year-old netted Plymouth Argyle's goal in the Clarets' 3-1 play-off semi-final second leg win last season before earning a £150,000 move to Kenilworth Road in the summer.

R is for record attendance. The 30,069 spectators that crammed into Kenilworth Road in March 1959 for an FA Cup 6th round replay has yet to be topped at the club. Luton went on to reach the final where they lost 2-1 against Nottingham Forest.

S is for Stein (Brian and Mark), the brothers who played together for Luton during the mid-80s. Brian started out at Kenilworth Road in 1977 and stayed 11 years, scoring 128 goals in 388 league appearances before a move to Caen in France. He returned to Luton in 1991. Mark played his first

Y is for youngest player, who is Mike O'Hara, aged 16 years 32 days when he played on October 1st, 1960 in Division Two.

Z is for Zelem (Peter). The former Claret featured in a League Cup tie between Burnley and Luton at Turf Moor in October 1988.

Marlon Beresford (goalkeeper) - highly-rated keeper who recently turned down a move to Arsenal.

Wayne Russell (goalkeeper) - signed from Ebbs Vale last season, has done very well when called upon.

Gary Parkinson (defender) - talented former Middlesbrough right back who seems to bring promotion to every club he plays for.

Chris Vinnicombe (defender) - back after a four-month absence, he announced his return with the winner against Oldham recently.

Chris Brass (defender) - promising young full back who enjoyed a loan spell at Torquay earlier in the season.

Mark Winstanley (defender) - his partnership with Steve Davis has been a huge plus-point this season. Renowned for his pace and tackling.

Steve Davis (defender) - the club captain is earning rave reviews as he continues to stop goals and score them.

Gerry Harrison (midfielder) - skilful and versatile player signed after impressing early in the season.

Jamie Hoyland (midfielder) - has proved equally adept at centre half or in the holding role in midfield.

Alan Harper (midfielder) - experienced former Everton, Manchester City, Sheffield Wednesday and Luton man.

Steve Thompson (midfielder) - recent acquisition from Leicester City, played in their 4-4 draw at Aston Villa before Burnley debut at Tranmere.

Adrian Randall (midfielder) - talented midfielder noted for his surging runs. Has played with a competitive edge to his game this season.

David Eyres (forward) - top scorer last term, always a tricky customer with his twists and turns. Recently filling in at left back.

Nathan Peel (forward) - signed last season from Sheffield United, the 22-year-old has never let Burnley down when called upon.

Liam Robinson (forward) - top scorer so far this season, always gives 100% effort.

Kurt Nogan (forward) - record signing who netted his first Clarets' goal against Oldham after a £300,000 move from Brighton.

Barnsley 2, Burnley 0
March 7th, 1995

A highly-controversial clash dealt Burnley a bitter blow as the better side lost after a series of baffling refereeing decisions. The Clarets, again employing a back five, were boosted by the welcome return of Chris Vinnicombe after four months out with injury, and Mark Winstanley after suspension, and started brightly.

With Adrian Randall and Steve Thompson excelling in a two-man midfield, Burnley created a couple of clear cut chances in the first half. Kurt Nogan and Paul Stewart both squandered the opportunities, and the latter then covered himself in disgrace moments after Barnsley's opener. Danny Wilson swung in a corner which Gerry Taggart got his head to. Steve Thompson cleared the ball at the back post, but the referee indicated it had gone over the line.

Marlon Beresford and Jamie Hoyland were booked in the protests, but Stewart went a step further and earned a red card.

After the break the Clarets again threatened, even with 10 men, and David Eyres looked to have scored, only to see the goal disallowed with Kurt Nogan offside.

But then inconsistency stepped in as first Eyres and then Steve Davis were denied goalscoring opportunities by Barnsley's Steve Davis and goalkeeper David Watson, who only received yellow cards.

To add insult to injury Gary Parkinson received an instant red card after appearing to push Brendan O'Connell in trying to get the ball to take a quick free kick, and then in the final minute Andy Payton made it 2-0 again from a corner.

Burnley 2,
Oldham Athletic 1
March 11th, 1995

Burnley won their first league game in 1995 courtesy of comeback king Chris Vinnicombe's superb 20 yard strike 15 minutes from time.

After having gone 10 league games without a win since New Year's Eve, the Clarets won started this local derby with a bang after seven minutes.

Record signing Kurt Nogan latched on to a ball out of defence and calmly rounded goalkeeper Paul Gerrard before slotting the ball home past two defenders on the line to open his Burnley account.

Tackles were flying thick and fast, but the Clarets broke with intent on many occasions. Shortly after the goal, Paul Stewart - in his last game on loan from Liverpool - hit the post from a tight angle and Burnley deserved their interval lead after surviving a twice-taken free kick five yards from goal after Marlon Beresford handled a back pass.

Oldham brought on substitute Sean McCarthy for the second half, and within two minutes he put Oldham level, lobbing Beresford after

looking suspiciously off-side. But the Clarets kept plugging away, with both Vinnicombe and Gary Parkinson raiding the flanks and Adrian Randall and Steve Thompson again superb in midfield.

Vinnicombe settled the issue with a first-time 25 yard strike after a lay-off from David Eyres, and from then on Burnley could have hit four or five as Nogan missed two great chances to add to his tally, and Stewart played the ball into Gerrard's hands when straight through on goal.

But Burnley settled for 2-1 and the relief was evident all around Turf Moor.

YEARS AGO

Jimmy Adamson shuffled the pack for Arsenal's visit to Turf Moor on 22nd March 1975. An injury to Paul Fletcher, which was to keep him out for the rest of the season, resulted in Billy Rodaway's recall in what appeared a more defensive line-up.

The match was hardly a defenders' dream though against a Gunners side not yet free of relegation worries. The Clarets always faced an uphill struggle and finally drew 3-3 with Peter Noble, Ray Hankin and Leighton James hitting the net. James' goal came from a penalty which some regarded as "compensation" for the lack of an earlier award when Keith Newton was blatantly fouled in the area by Pat Rice.

Winger Paul Bradshaw made his First Division debut in that game, coming on as sub in place of Brian Flynn and the draw saw Burnley slip from second to sixth in the table although still only

three points behind leaders Everton. Promoted to the First Division in 1974, Luton had struggled all season. Successive wins against Carlisle, Leeds and Arsenal in March raised their hopes and they carried the fight all the way to the end of the season before succumbing to the drop. Joint leading scorer for the Hatters was Ron Fletcher, a regular in the side along with his twin brother Paul.

YEARS AGO


Burnley faced promotion candidates for the third week in succession when Leicester came to Turf Moor for a Second Division clash on 22nd March 1980. The game was the last of Martyn Busby's loan spell, and Brian Miller recalled Derek Scott and Peter Robinson in place of Malcolm Smith

and Phil Cavener. Scott, playing in an unaccustomed midfield role (prior to then he had almost invariably appeared at right-back) scored the goal which the Clarets' performance merited, but Leicester proved too strong and won 2-1.

Their win took Leicester up to second place behind Chelsea, while the Clarets with only one point from the last eight matches, were looking increasingly desperate lying third from bottom.

David Pleat's first spell as Luton's manager was well under way, and he had some fine players in his squad including Ricky Hill, Brian Stein (brother of Chelsea's Mark) and Mal Donaghy. Luton, for whom ex Claret Alan West was also a long established regular, led the Second Division in February, but only three wins from their last fourteen games saw them slip to a final position of 6th.

YEARS AGO

Four consecutive defeats no doubt contributed to the attendance of 2,655, the lowest at Turf Moor since the war, when Bournemouth were the Third Division visitors on 23rd March 1985. At least they saw an end to the losing run, as a Wayne Biggins equaliser gave Burnley a welcome point.

In the circumstances of the time, it would be safe to assume that not many Claret supporters travelled to Plymouth on the following Tuesday evening. Goal machine Tommy Tynan (31 in the League that season) struck twice in the first-half for Argyle but the old firm of Biggins and Kevin Hird were on target to earn Burnley a point. It wasn't enough, however, to keep the Clarets out of the bottom four, as they slipped into the relegation zone for the first time.

David Pleat was still in charge at Kenilworth Road, and his Luton side, for whom Hill, Stein and Donaghy were still automatic choices, had made steady progress since their promotion to the First Division in 1982. It took good late season run for them to ensure the safety of 13th place. Their best of 84/85 though, was reserved for the F.A. Cup, in which they reached the semi-final, unfortunately, their quarter-final victory against Millwall was ruined by crowd troubles which led to the banning of away supporters from Kenilworth Road for several years ahead.

YEARS AGO

Burnley travelled to Hartlepool for a Fourth Division game on Tuesday 20th March 1990. Roger Eli moved back into defence to accommodate the return of Ron Fletcher, while Barry Siddall was in goal for the home side. The steady decline of Burnley's season continued as they went down 0-3 at a ground that seldom brought joy for the Clarets.

The same was certainly true of London Road, Peterborough, the venue on the following Saturday. Ian Measham was back after injury against a side that Burnley had failed to beat in ten previous attempts, and the jinx continued, Fletcher's penalty being a mere consolation as "Posh" romped home 4-1. Burnley remained in 15th place.

Between those games, Brendan O'Connell, whose performances since his return from loan had been encouraging, was surprisingly sold to Barnsley, where of course he has remained ever since. Transfer deadline day brought one new arrival to Turf Moor.... defender Neil Buckley, on loan from Hull, who made his debut at Peterborough.

Relegation favourites for much of the season, Luton sealed their First Division survival with victories in their final three games, a dramatic 3-2 win at Derby on the final day condemning Sheffield Wednesday to the drop instead.


ON THIS DATE

One of the most crucial results of Burnley's Fourth Division championship campaign was the 1-0 win at Mansfield in windy conditions on 21st March 1992. Mike Conroy was the scorer as the Clarets overtook the Stags to move second in the table, Blackpool being the leaders at that stage. The game marked the last appearance of Nicky Walker, Burnley's third loan keeper of the season.

Paul Fletcher was the scorer in a 1-0 win at Wrexham on this date in 1979. It was the last of Fletcher's 71 goals for the club in a Turf Moor career spanning nine years and nearly 300 League games.

With the close season becoming ever shorter these days, it is interesting to note that Burnley's 0-1 defeat at Bolton on 21st March 1891 was the final game of that season. It was nearly six months before League action was resumed, the following season beginning with a local derby at Accrington!

Therefore, the maximum points for any individual on the result sheet is 200.


The winner of the Programme of the Year will be announced at the Commercial Manager's seminar in May together with the full list of final placings.
