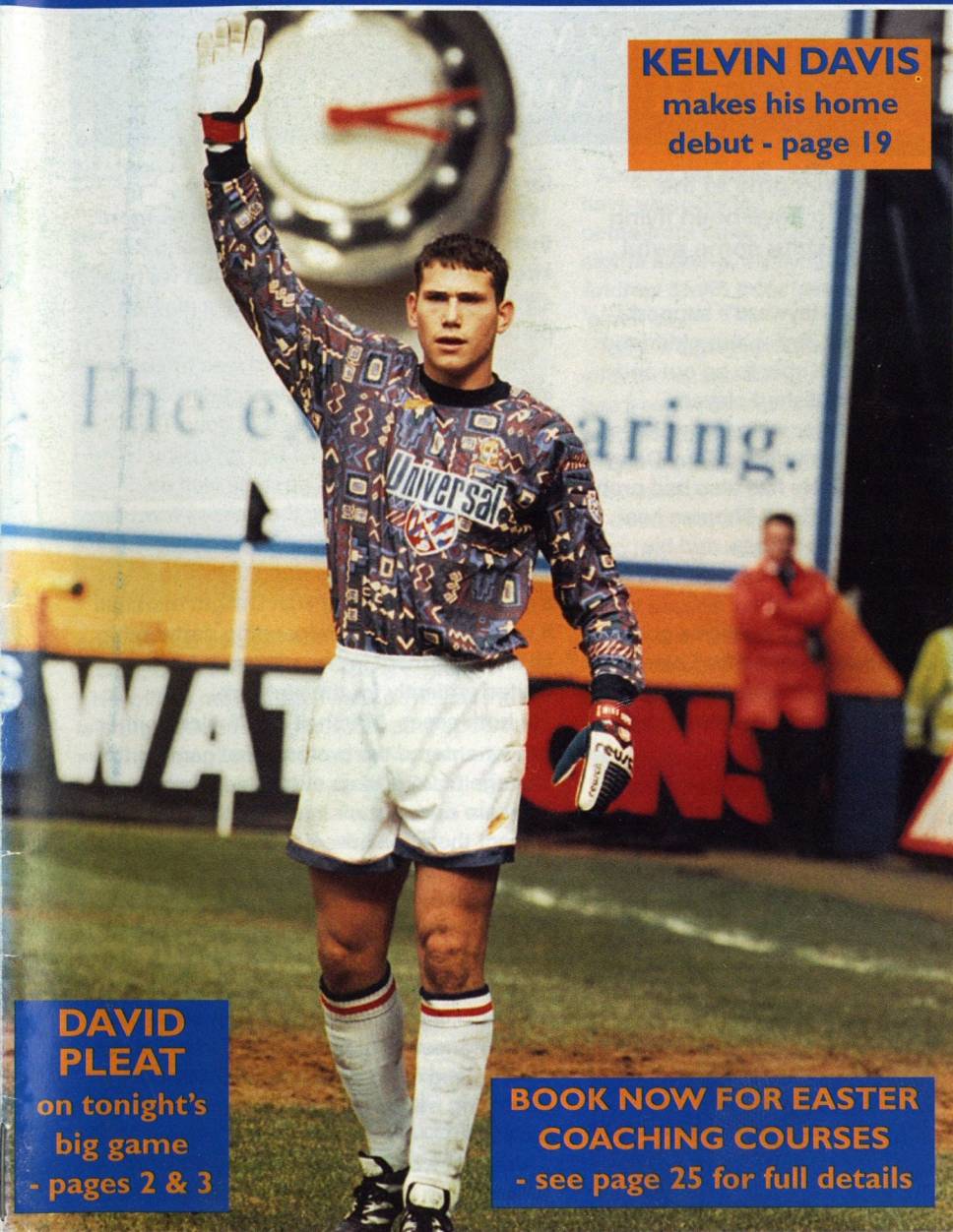

PLEAT'S PERSPECTIVE

A WARM WELCOME TO THE FAMOUS WOLVES

A WARM evening welcome to the famous Wolves, who have been flying high this season despite some awful injury problems.

Boosted by Sir Jack Hayward's support their manager Graham Taylor, our old friend from Watford, has been able to go out and purchase several established players.

Unfortunately, his major wing hopes have been dashed with the injuries to Tony Daley and Stephen Froggatt. He has also had problems in midfield where Geoff Thomas has been unable to return to fitness, and his inspirational Dutch signing John de Wolf is now also sidelined.

Despite these problems the league goals of David Kelly (10) whom I signed for Leicester City from West Ham, and Steve Bull (11) have ensured that they are making a strong bid

for the championship.

We know that tonight's game will be more than tough, but we would hope to show a strong resolve despite the fact that we have slipped in our efforts to achieve a play-off place.

The last game with Watford was more than interesting from our long term point of view. I was pleased with the debut of John Taylor up front, who showed he has an ability to be dangerous at the back post, as well as showing well to receive the passes from the middle third.

If he can score some vital goals and make a good understanding with Dwight Marshall it could prove a very interesting partnership as an investment in two players who have waited patiently for the platform.

In both cases, Marshall and Taylor, neither player entered the professional game until the age of 24, and as such, even though they are now in their late twenties, I would expect them to show a real improvement with practices to maximise their strengths.

It would be amiss not to say 'well done' to Kelvin Davis on his first home game in a Luton jersey.

None of our staff doubts that he has fine potential, and this was further shown when last Wednesday night he kept a clean sheet for England in an important UEFA youth qualifying match in Hungary where England won 1-0.

Also last week, Danny Power was in the Welsh youth squad, David Greene proved a more than capable centre-half for the Republic of Ireland Under-21s in Dublin against the threat of Gallen and Shipperley, and Juergen Sommer had the strange experience of being involved in a game which was abandoned after a tornado in Dallas.

The result of that game was a 2-2 draw, and we are delighted that Juergen's hard work and conscientious goalkeeping in this

country has pushed him ahead of Tony Meola, Brad Freidel and Kasey Keller.

He will be more than aware now that there is competition for the goalkeeping spot, but we should not forget the man bought as a cover at the start of the season is still struggling to recover from two operations after sadly dislocating his shoulder.

We are looking forward to seeing Fred, without the mask, shortly.

The Watford game was once again an exciting contest and stirred memories of outstanding games in the 1980s.

Naturally we feel Watford were somewhat fortunate only to be losing by the odd goal at half-time, and their efforts in the second half may have deserved some reward.

Even so, although Kelvin Davis achieved some praise, I thought that Kevin Miller in the Watford goal made the more crucial and some outstanding saves.

Once again Watford have proved that they are unable to beat us, and our marvellous record against them over the years continues.

However, they have for sure achieved a super looking stadium, and that is a testimony to the efforts of their board.

Now they have to fill the stadium. We hope-

fully will be faced with the same conundrum, and all our efforts must now be channeled towards getting a suitable site with an adequate, safe, well facilitated ground where we can begin to emerge again as a club to challenge the best in the country.

Already we have invited eight boys who have all accepted YTS agreements. They come from quite far afield, and last week our eighth signing, a young forward named Andrew Smith from Darwen, Lancashire, joined us.

Terry Westley is looking forward to working with them, and being as successful as he has been in the last couple of years with the progress of the likes of Kelvin Davis, Paul McLaren, Aaron Skelton and Jamie Woodsford.

I do not think there is a club in the country who have given a debut this season to four boys of YTS age.

This season we had high hopes of doing well in the FA Youth Cup. A bad night at Wycombe put paid to those hopes, but the progress of the youth players has been good enough to move to the fringe of first team selection.

The injury list is clearing up. We have had our share this season, but at the moment, of senior status, only Ceri Hughes is still sidelined.

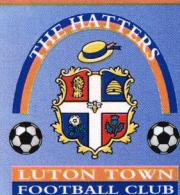
Des Linton has now played four reserve games, and Tony Adcock likewise.

Tonight's game is as important for Luton as it is for Wolverhampton.

We must not forget that in every game judgements are being made and it is vital that we keep our professionalism, and continue to give 100 per cent plus right until the final ball has been kicked this season.

Pitch pressures are
under discussion

THE 1995 seminar for Football League and Premier League groundsmen was held at Wembley Hilton Hotel last week to give the unsung heroes a forum to discuss their problems and share their tricks of the trade.

The seminar was organised by The Football League under the auspices of their Playing Surfaces Committee and included representatives from the Sports Turf Research Institute and the Institute of Groundsmanship.

The vast majority of the clubs were represented at the seminar which highlighted two important issues which were giving cause for concern amongst ground staff.

Firstly, the pressures placed upon them by team managers relating to their pitch requirements and the shade problems which are being encountered by the extensive ground developments being undertaken throughout the country.

Steve Sutherland, The Football League's Marketing Manager, commented: "We were delighted with the seminar and with the positive reaction from the delegates and the exhibitors, whose support was vital to the success of the venture."

"We very much hope to build on this success in an effort to increase the awareness and to stress the importance of the work of the groundsmen."

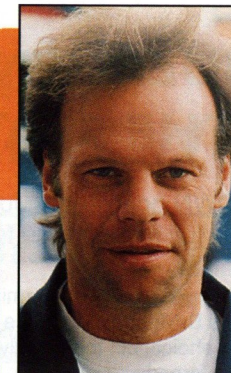

JUERGEN'S STORMY TRIP TO THE STATES..... plus fixture news

TOWN goalkeeper Juergen Sommer endured a stormy first full appearance for the USA against Uruguay in Dallas.

Juergen was given permission to miss the Watford match by Town boss David Pleat, after the USA indicated he would be their number one choice, but the friendly international was cut short by five minutes by a tornado.

Uruguay, England's opponents at Wembley on Wednesday, scored two second-half goals to earn a 2-2 draw in Dallas, with an 84th minute equaliser from their captain Gustavo Poyet. But seconds later

a storm swept over the Cotton Bowl stadium. The rain and 40mph wind forced the game to be halted as signboards were ripped down and the spectators ran for cover.

Omar Otero had scored Uruguay's first goal in the 76th minute, after the United States had taken the lead in the ninth minute with a goal from Coventry's Cobi Jones. Ernie Stewart made it 2-0 in the 67th minute.

Juergen was pleased to make his full debut, after substitute appearances against England and Saudi Arabia, and is likely to share the number one billing with Brad Freidel as the USA prepare for a friendly in Belgium in April, and for the Copa America, against the likes of Argentina, in the summer.

"It was nice to get a first full cap, and we were quite pleased with the performance," he said.

"We were 2-0 in front and should have made it 3-0, but felt that their first goal was offside.

"The storm at the end though eventually made playing impossible, and the forecast of a tornado had kept the crowd figure down as well."

"There were advertising hoardings wrapped around the goals - it was quite a sight!"

It will be the last Football League fixture to be played at Ayresome Park (subject to play-offs), and the game has been switched to Sunday, April 30, from Saturday, April 29.

The game is to be televised live in the North-East on Tyne-Tees, while the local police were also keen for the high-profile fixture to be switched to Sunday.

Middlesbrough are moving to a new ground in the summer and are aiming to christen it in the Premiership.

Against the Hatters they will also be keen to avenge October's 5-1 hammering at Kenilworth Road.

Sunday switch for Stoke finale

LUTON'S final game of the league season, at home to Stoke City, has been switched from Saturday, May 6, to Sunday, May 7, kick-off 3pm.

The entire Division One programme has been put back 24 hours so that all clubs kick-off at the same time, regardless of television requirements.

The Hatters played at Stoke on the final day of last season, also a Sunday, drawing 2-2.

(Clubs have been given permission to apply to switch back to Saturday, if neither side is involved in promotion or relegation. But with Stoke currently just above the relegation zone the game stays on Sunday).

ON THE OTHER SIDE

INJURY-HIT WOLVES BIDDING FOR PREMIERSHIP PLACE

EXPECTATIONS are high, but after the pressures at Lancaster Gate, Graham Taylor is well able to shoulder more such burdens, *writes Simon Oxley.*

Taylor signed a three-year deal at Wolves last April, following the departure of Graham Turner, and having just failed to reach the play-offs last term is now expected to achieve at least that this time around.

With sound financial backing, and the income from average attendances of over 26,000, Taylor has been able to strengthen his squad at regular intervals. Luton's 3-2 win at Molineux in November started some alarm bells ringing, and with injuries also hitting the squad Taylor acquired two more major signings in early December.

Striker Don Goodman, well known in the Black Country from his days at West Brom, signed from Sunderland for a £1 million fee, while Dutch defender John de Wolf was added to the defence for £600,000.

De Wolf had done Taylor few favours previously in his career, as a member of the Holland team which ended the World Cup hopes of Taylor's England, but the Dutchman opened his goal account for Wolves with a penalty against Sheffield United as the Wanderers hit back to salvage a vital draw.

However, after settling in to the English game, De Wolf joined the long injury list, damaging medial and cruciate knee ligaments in the 1-0 win over Sunderland, and is ruled out for the rest of the season.

Wolves have also enjoyed cup success, recovering from a 2-0 half-time deficit at Mansfield to win 3-2 in the third round of the FA Cup, and went on to beat Premiership sides Leicester and Sheffield Wednesday, before going out in the sixth round to Crystal Palace after a replay.

Injuries have certainly not helped their cause, with a lengthy list of top players ruled out.

Defender Peter Shirliff has suffered with an achilles problem; Tony Daley, who scored a memorable solo goal against Luton in his Aston Villa days, has played just 10 minutes for Wolves; Neil Emblen



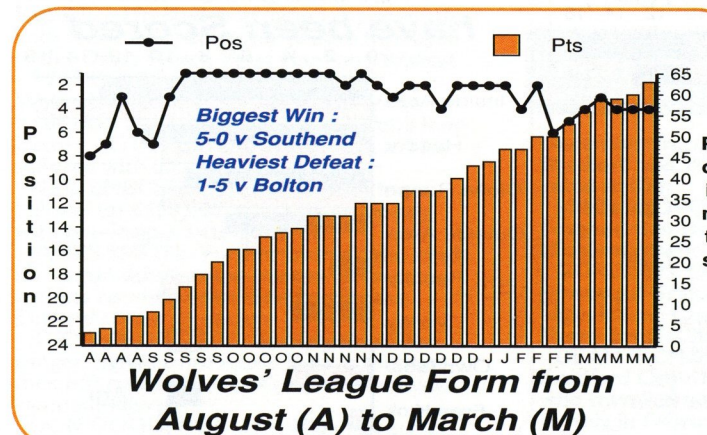
ABOVE: Wolves keeper Mike Stowell denies Dwight Marshall and Kerry Dixon during November's meeting at Molineux.

missed seven games with an ankle injury; Steve Froggatt suffered strained ankle ligaments at Reading just before Christmas; while the fans' hero Steve Bull was ruled out with a tendon problem in his heel which required surgery.

Taylor has turned to Gordon Cowans to add some experience to his depleted squad, snapping up the former England man for £50,000 from Derby.

No doubt the manager would settle for a repeat of last season's scoreline here when his side won 2-0, on a ground where he enjoyed many memorable 'derby' clashes between Luton and Watford.

Taylor moved to Watford in 1977, after five years in charge at Lincoln, and he masterminded the Hornets' rise from fourth to first division, before taking Aston Villa from the second to the first, and going on to manage England.

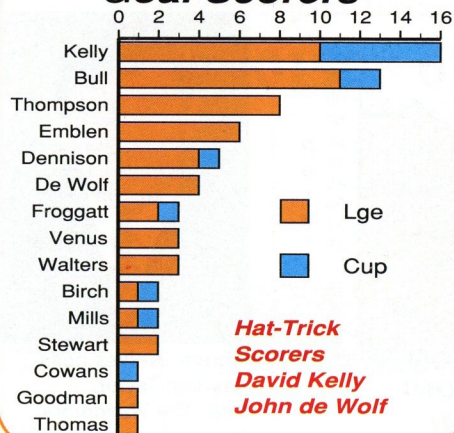

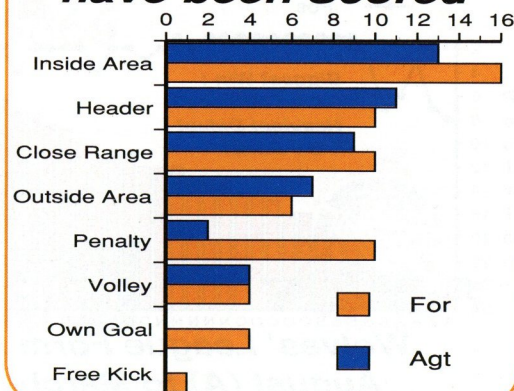

DARREN FERGUSON - Son of the Manchester United manager Alex Ferguson, has recently completed a year at Molineux after joining the club from Old Trafford for £250,000.

DAVID KELLY - Leading scorer and Republic of Ireland international, previously with Newcastle, Leicester (where he played under David Pleat), West Ham and Walsall.

STEVE BULL - A legend in Wolverhampton, Bull has scored more goals than any other player in the club's long history - 231 by the end of last season. Has suffered with injuries this season.

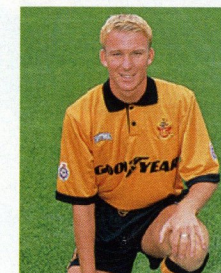
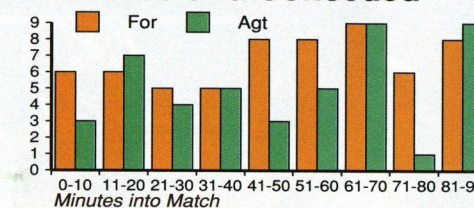
NEIL EMBLEN - Summer signing from Millwall for £600,000, who was previously with non-league Sittingbourne.

JAMES SMITH - Former trainee who made his league debut at the start of the season, and has recently been called up for the England Under 21 squad.

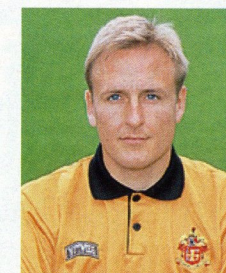

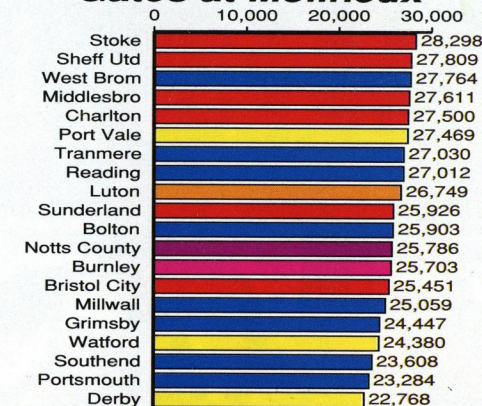

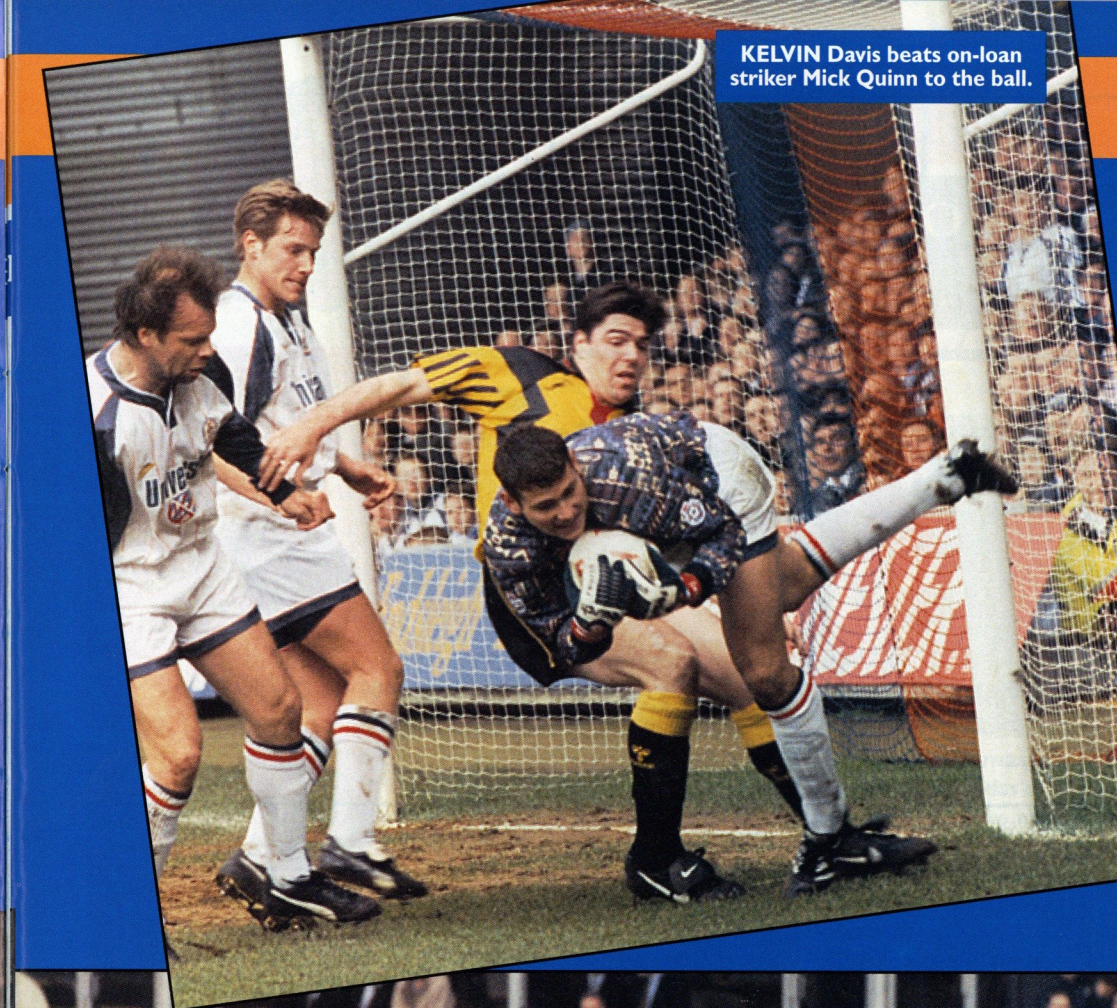

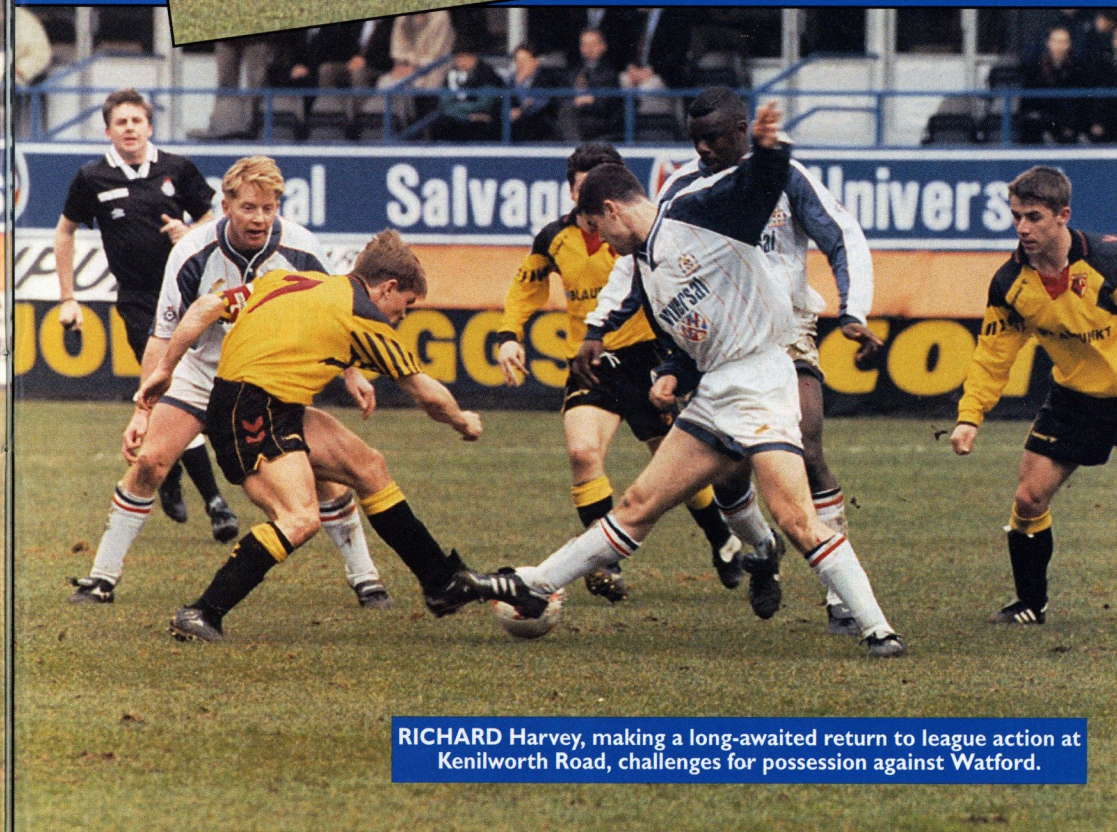

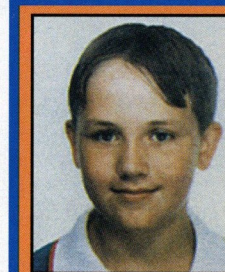

DAVIS DEBUT IS SPOT ON!

TEENAGE goalkeeper Kelvin Davis admitted he thought he was going to be sent off midway through the second-half of a memorable home debut last Sunday.

Minutes earlier Watford's Kevin Phillips had equalised, and then substitute Peter Beadle broke through only to be sent tumbling as he attempted to round the Town keeper.

Referee Kevin Breen only showed a yellow card though, and Kelvin stayed on to first save Gary Porter's penalty, and then deny Phillips a second.

Town fans voted him the clear Player-of-the-Match (see page 34), but there wasn't too much time to celebrate as Kelvin headed off to Hungary where he kept a clean sheet for the England

Under-18 side.

"The way the referee was looking at me, I did think I was going to be sent off," said Kelvin afterwards, "but he only pulled out the yellow one and I went on to save the spot-kick.

"I usually wait and see on penalties, rather than make my mind up which way to dive, but I felt I knew which way Gary Porter was going to place his kick, and as soon as he struck the ball I went to my right."

It was the 18-year-old's home debut, and his first appearance of this season after a debut at Stoke in the finale of the 1993/94 campaign.

On that occasion he was thrust into the team just hours before kick-off, but had several days to prepare for the 'derby'.

"I did have longer to prepare," he reflected, "but there was still a lot of pressure, because we all know how much playing Watford means to the supporters.

"I certainly enjoyed the day, and although I would obviously have preferred a clean sheet I was very happy with the way it went."

The clean sheet came in Wednesday's 1-0 win for England in Budapest; Kelvin's debut for the youth side.

They play the second leg against Hungary at Walsall on April 25, looking well set for a place in July's European Under-18 championship finals in Greece.

Two-goal Town savage the Wolves!

FOLLOWING a defeat at Orient, to a Laurie Cunningham goal, on Boxing Day 1976, the Town dropped down to fourteenth position in Division Two and looked set for a season of mediocrity or perhaps even worse. It is difficult to see now what transformed the team into promotion possibilities over the next three months, but it was certainly one of those golden periods when you were more than proud to call yourself a Luton Town supporter.

After a convincing 4-0 win over Chelsea at a snow-covered Kenilworth Road on December 29 it was back to normality three days later when we went down 1-0 at Bristol Rovers in a game that should have been easily won. It came as a surprise therefore, when in our next game a 3-0 win was recorded at Sheffield United in front of the 'Match Of The Day' cameras.

From then on we never looked back as win after win piled up with the team seemingly growing in stature with each match. Hull proved tough opponents at Kenilworth Road as they sat on an early lead, but last-gasp efforts from John Aston and Jim Husband secured the points and sent the frozen

crowd of 8,455 home happy.

Burnley were the next visitors and the 2-0 victory does not adequately sum up the ease of a win which set the Town up for the toughest test so far in this mini-run, Nottingham Forest away. The home side had not been beaten at the City Ground since the early part of the season, but a superb Luton performance saw the points come our way in a 2-1 win, which included a wonder goal from Aston who ran half the length of the pitch, as the Forest players tried in vain to force him out wide.

We were now up to sixth position with two home games to come which were both won. Blackburn were beaten 2-0 and then a highly-rated Charlton side was seen off by the same score as the crowd rose to 11,645 to see Ron Futchner score the all-important goals.

A trip to Fulham was next on the agenda to take on a side that had won at Kenilworth Road in the autumn when George Best and Rodney Marsh were enjoying a 'purple period' for the Cottagers. Unfortunately Best did not play in the return, and Marsh turned out for the last time in Fulham colours, as the Town won yet again with goals from Aston and Husband.

After seven straight wins it was starting to become serious and a crowd of 19,200 gathered at Kenilworth Road to see a Wolves side that had gone 12 games undefeated and who were sitting in one of the promotion positions.

Wolves, relegated the previous season, were anxious for a quick return to Division One and overwhelmed the Town in the opening minutes, carving out five good opportunities before the crowd had settled into position.

Gradually the Luton defence took control with Paul Futchner and John Faulkner snuffing out the dangerous Wolves strikeforce of John Richards and Alan Sunderland, while Brian Chambers and Lil Fuccillo cut out the threat posed by Willie Carr and Kenny Hibbitt. This left Alan West free to carry out his own probing with the result that Husband, Aston and Ron Futchner, constantly interchanging positions, started to cause problems in the Wolverhampton rearguard.

The breakthrough came after 35 minutes when Ron Futchner rose to head on a free kick from full-back Steve Buckley, with Husband the first to react with a crisp half-volley past Gary Pierce in the Wolves goal.

Incredibly, the Town went 2-0 up 90 seconds later when Fuccillo, in a seemingly harmless position out on the wing, drifted inside with the ball and casually floated the ball over the head of Pierce from an impossible angle.

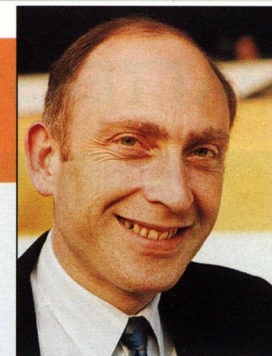
The crowd went wild, and although Wolves stepped up the pressure after the break it was the Town who came nearest to scoring, when Geoff Palmer threw himself full length to turn a shot from Ron Futchner round the post with his hand, which went unnoticed by the referee.

Despite this, and with some fine saves by Miliija Aleksic in the Luton goal, the scoreline remained unchanged and the Town found themselves up to fourth, and bringing extreme pressure to bear on the leaders.

Luton manager Harry Haslam, who had received a deserved 'Manager of the Month' award before the game, put the Town's rise up the table down to: "Our team work and our attitude to the game, as well as our front line looking a lot better than our opponents."

TRANSFER deadline day, Thursday, March 23, was a hive of activity at Kenilworth Road with two new arrivals and one departure for manager David Pleat to look after.

Heading the list was the signing of John Taylor, for £200,000, from Bradford City, a proven goalscorer in a career that has taken him from Colchester to Cambridge, via non-league Sudbury, and then onto Bristol Rovers and Bradford.

John, 30, made his debut in the derby with Watford, after a move which had been on the cards for some weeks, but only became known to him when City manager Lennie Lawrence called him in on the Wednesday afternoon.

David Pleat and his staff had been tracking Taylor for some time, and the 6ft 2ins striker

was delighted at the prospect of a move up a division.

"It was a bolt out of the blue for me," admitted John. "We had a game on the Tuesday, lost to Swansea, and I went in on Wednesday morning for some light training, and then had a call back in the afternoon to go back in and see the manager."

"I have played at Luton a few times, and it's certainly a step forward for me, up a division to a better grade of football. I haven't had the best of times at Bradford this year for one reason or another, and I'm looking forward to this challenge."

The centre-forward first came to the fore with four years under the John Beck regime at Cambridge, and scored against the Hatters when he was at Bristol Rovers - past his old friend from Colchester days Alec Chamberlain.

(Chamberlain ironically joined Liverpool on loan last Thursday).

"That game was near deadline day," recalled John, "and I was supposed to be going to Portsmouth, but that fell through and I was on the bench and came on to score the equaliser in a 1-1 draw."

His goals tally is impressive, with 46 goals in 160 appearances for Cambridge, 44 in 95 games for Bristol, and 14 for Bradford so far this term, but he is also a provider.

"I do pride myself on creating chances for other people, and enjoy scoring myself as much as anyone," he said.

"We have had our eye on John for some time," admitted Town manager David Pleat, "and it

was debatable whether we would do anything before the end of the season, but I felt it was time for a change up front, to bring another player in to partner Dwight who has done well since his arrival here.

"John Taylor was late coming into the game, and comes here with every incentive to do well."

Taylor's arrival heralded the departure of Kerry Dixon, who returned to London to join Millwall for a nominal fee. The former England centre-forward scored on his Lions debut, and Mr Pleat was quick to praise his efforts at Kenilworth Road.

"Kerry had an opportunity, and it wasn't for me to stand in his way because the probability was that at the end of the season we might have freed him anyway."

"He has had two years here, scored goals, and has helped Dwight progress, and certainly helped to take the strain off John Hartson at times."

And the third piece of business was the arrival of goalkeeper Martyn Margetson from Manchester City, providing cover for Juergen Sommer and Kelvin Davis, who were both heading off on international duty for the USA and England Under-18s respectively.

"There is no provision after the deadline day for any goalkeeper loans," pointed out Mr Pleat, "and should either Juergen or Kelvin get injured or sent off we would have been in trouble, with poor Fred Barber still injured. Brian Horton is helping us out, and it means that we are protected."

While all the transfer activity was taking place

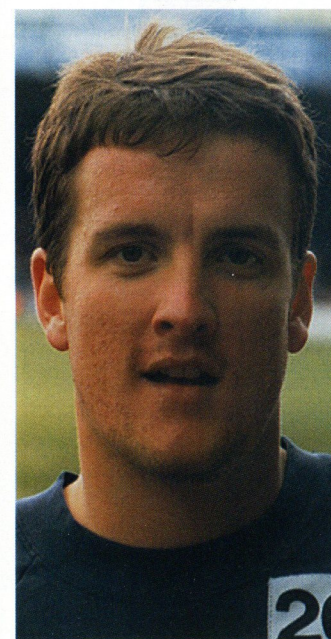

VIEWSRound Sport - LISTENING TO YOU LUTON TOWN FC... FANS SURVEY RESULTS

PRIOR to England's 0-0 draw with Uruguay, Luton Town fans backed Alan Shearer and Andy Cole as the strikeforce to lead Terry Venables' side into the European Championships.

Shearer (81%) and Cole (39%) were the top two choices, followed by Le Tissier (16), Sutton (10) and Sheringham (10).

That was one of the results from the latest telephone poll, with 125 supporters questioned after last Sunday's game against Watford.

The Cantona Affair

Overall 41% of fans felt that Eric Cantona had been punished too much for the incident at Crystal Palace, with one in ten feeling the punishment was "much too much".

But 42% felt that the punishments imposed were "about right".

Fitness v Skills

We asked fans if they felt that, in English football, there was more emphasis nowadays on fitness rather than skills.

Overall almost 80% thought this was the case, with one in three believing that this was 'definitely' so.

Luton v Watford

We asked supporters to score the game in terms of excitement, performance and value for money.

For excitement the game scored 7.33 out of 10, and 7.73 for overall value for money.

Luton's performance was given 6.93, with Watford gaining 6.68.

68% of the supporters questioned mentioned the penalty save by Kelvin Davis as their highlight of the game, with 35% highlighting Paul Telfer's fourth minute goal.

In addition, Richard Harvey's shot (6%) and Telfer's last minute effort were also mentioned.

The overwhelming supporters' choice for Luton player-of-the-match was Kelvin Davis (72%), followed by Richard Harvey (12%) and



Paul Telfer (7%).

Watford keeper Kevin Miller (32%) narrowly outpointed skipper Andy Hessentahler (30%) as the Hornets' top player, with Kevin Phillips (11%) third.

The performance of the referee was judged to be generally good, with seven out of 10 fans satisfied with him and his linesmen.

Almost six out of 10 fans (57%) claimed to buy a programme, and at a cover price of £1.50 94% of them thought it was good value for money.

Two thirds of supporters quizzed used the toilets at the ground, and about half (46%) spent money at the refreshment stalls or in the shop - spending on average £2.23 each.

In general, satisfaction within the ground is good, with three quarters of fans (74%) claiming to be satisfied.

The survey continues to throw up a number of interesting points and observations, and whenever possible these are acted upon.

The survey certainly seems to have been appreciated by you the supporters. Of the 125 people contacted after the Watford game, 98% said they would be happy to be questioned again.

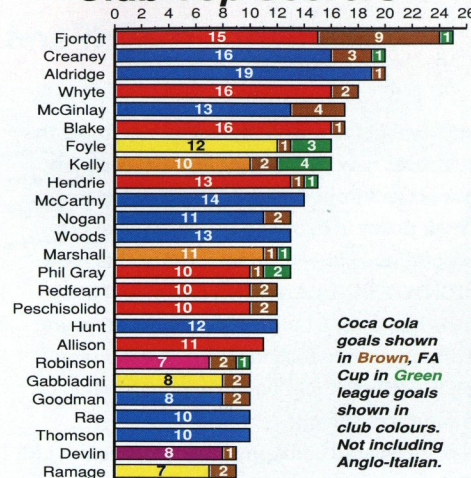

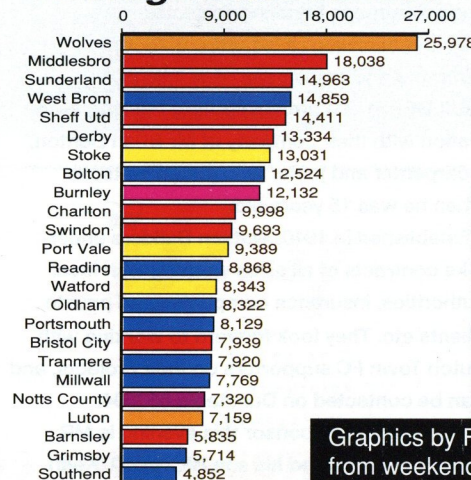
