



PLEAT'S PERSPECTIVE

STADIUM & NO TEAM IS NOT CLEVER BUSINESS!

A WARM welcome to our friends from Notts County; their supporters, officials and players. They have endured a tough season but there are still games to play, and they will be hopeful that they can get a result here today.

It is interesting to parallel the records of the two clubs since that catastrophic afternoon when Rob Matthews scored two goals, whilst Villa beat Coventry, to ensure our demotion.

It is very difficult, when one is relegated, to halt a slide. There are so many factors which come into play.

Usually the best players are sold off, 'ordinaries' are gathered, management changes, and a net income greatly below what had been required to pay out top league wages exists.

The problems are massive. Years ago Carlisle and Northampton slipped from Division One to Division Four, but fortunately in 74-75 we did

not slide through, and maintained our second division status after a year in the top flight.

Once again despite nearly falling through the trap door we have held our own since relegation in 1992. It has been a traumatic time for us but two factors stand out.

We have reduced the wage bill and whereas when I took back the reins at the club we had 35 professionals, we now only have 27, and other than those splendid veterans Peake, Preece and Waddock we now are in the under-25 bracket.

Also as an example, the total cost of our team that played in that remarkable Tuesday game against the Wolverhampton millionaires was £685,000 - a fraction of the total monies received for our last sell-off, John Hartson.

Notts County too have done their selling; Yates, Johnson, Draper and Short bringing in around £5 million.

Their chairman Mr Derek Pavis has built the most splendid testimony to his successful youth policy - a purpose-built stadium.

We hope his team can pull out of trouble this season. If they don't it begs the question, "what price good management?" For there is no way a good stadium without a relatively successful team is clever business. The successful equation has to marry the two.

If Mr Kohler's plans are successful we will have an ideal and a future prosperity to be proud of. But it must be 100 per cent sure.


Looking at the parallels, the utmost time investment and energy must always be put into ensuring the product on the field doesn't lose status, attracts the crowds, and has a better than fair chance of regaining the highest possible status. We shall be working to that end.

A supporter suggested after the Wolves game that I will soon be able to put my feet up and relax, and that our safety points target can accelerate that misplaced thought.

Far from it. Although we may not have the problems of West Brom for example, who have 17 contracts to sort out, we also have contractual terminations.

As usual we will make fair and reasonable

our supporters on Tuesday evening that we can give latent ability a platform.

I was so delighted that he got on the end of the free-kick routine to score, after months of frustration when we have got the ball into the right area but failed to complete the move. At 6ft 3ins John has some good close control and clever movement with the ball. I feel confident that he and Dwight Marshall should forge a partnership.

It is vital that we have the confidence that we can score goals. No-one was more pleased than I when Paul Telfer followed up his splendid Watford goal with two further efforts to rock Wolves on Tuesday.

Paul over a period has shown some erratic form but he is a player of immense promise. His determination and unselfish play is an example to all professionals.

In time he will be a prolific scorer from midfield with his aerial power and good shot. With a little composure at the vital time he will prove to be a player who will play at the highest level.

It was his goal at Notts County that puts us in the position today of achieving a double.

With four away games to play and only two at Luton it is essential that we go for the points in a determined manner, and make every attempt to maintain the marvellous exhibition of early passing that was shown against Wolverhampton in the first period.

There were signs in that game that the team understanding was of one. Now is the test - are we good enough to take it on?

Previous results suggest a clear inconsistency. But in the last six games of the season, which we can approach in a relaxed but confident manner I will expect to get positive results, whilst giving one or two younger players an opportunity.

Enjoy the game, and thank you for the marvellous support, despite that last-second disappointment, against the Wolves.

THE Football League held its second National Family Day on the weekend of March 25 and 26, and once again the fans voted with their feet, giving the initiative a big thumbs up with attendances showing a 7% increase on the figures for the corresponding Saturday last season.

- Wolverhampton Wanderers' goalkeeper Mike Stowell has been confirmed as the 'Wilkinson Sword Protector Award' winner for March.



ON THE OTHER SIDE

COUNTY DISMISS KENDALL AFTER 10 WEEKS IN CHARGE

HOWARD Kendall's return to English management ended on Saturday evening when he was dismissed by Notts County.

Just 10 weeks after his arrival at Meadow Lane from the Greek club Xanthi, Kendall was relieved of his duties after the First Division's side 3-1 home defeat by Barnsley.

Former Town skipper, and now Barnsley player-manager, Danny Wilson, scored one and had a hand in the other two.

Kendall's assistant, Russell Slade, the man he replaced as team manager in January, was also sacked. Slade had stepped in for Mick Walker when he was dismissed in the autumn.

County have won only four of 14 League games since Kendall's appointment, but won the Anglo-Italian Cup with a Wembley victory over Ascoli.

In a statement from the club, vice-chairman John Mounteney, said: "The decision to part company was made before the Barnsley game.

"The result had no bearing on our decision, and the same action would have been taken if we had won.

"While the board realises Howard was handed a very difficult task, results apart we were not happy with the way the club was being run by the manager and his assistant."

At the time of going to press, youth team manager Wayne Jones has been placed in charge of first-team affairs on a temporary basis, with former Liverpool and Scotland defender Steve Nicol as his assistant.

MUCH like his style of play, Neil Warnock took a direct approach to County that brought first division football to Meadow Lane.

Two successive play-off finals at Wembley lifted Notts from the third division to the first, but since Warnock's departure, County have yet to weigh anchor in a secure position.

Last season's excellent home form led to a dramatic, but unsuccessful, dash for the play-offs




MARVIN Johnson battles for possession during December's match at Meadow Lane, which the Hatters won 1-0.

under Mick Walker, but that fine form has been mirrored by County's inability this season to climb out of the relegation zone at the foot of the table.

Howard Kendall's trumpeted arrival at Meadow Lane prompted a 3-0 home win over Burnley in his first game at the helm, and that was followed in the league by an excellent 2-1 win at Roker Park, Sunderland.




Left: County's league form this term


ACTION from the match at Meadow Lane on New Year's Eve, which Luton won 1-0 courtesy of Paul Telfer's second half goal.

Left: County goalkeeper Steve Cherry, and defender Michael Johnson, under pressure from Telfer.




RIGHT: Cherry marshalls the County defence, including Rob Matthews (14), now with Luton, as former Town striker John Hartson looks on.

Since then, Hearts midfielder Graeme Hogg, once with Manchester United, has arrived to add some steel to the side and he has settled into a team that's gone through an awful lot of changes.

Australian keeper Jason Kearton, on loan from Everton, kept Steve Cherry, the veteran of over 250 league appearances for County, out of the side, but Notts have let points slip - notably at home to Southend, when United had two players sent off and still hit back to draw.

Despite the changes in other areas of the team, County's defence has remained much the same since the turn of the year.

Across the back are former County trainee Michael Johnson, ex-Swansea defender Andy Legg, and Shaun Murphy, who County discovered playing for Australia in the 1992 Barcelona Olympics.

The experienced Gary Mills, formerly of Leicester, Derby and Forest fills in on the right side of defence.

Centre-half Dean Yates, the former Meadow Lane apprentice, has joined Derby County for a tribunal-fixed sum of £300,000, which could increase to £800,000. Yates, who made over 300 appearances for County despite lengthy injury problems, will bring Notts 25% of any transfer fee should Derby sell him on.

It's in midfield where successive County managers have been endeavouring to find the right ingredients this season.

County stalwart Phil Turner, now 33, has missed few games this season; West Ham's Peter Butler and Wolves' Chris Marsden were both bought for around the quarter million mark to try and instill the necessary guile, and Kendall also turned to another experienced name who has seen it all.

Joining Hogg, was fellow Scot Steve Nicol, the former Liverpool star who won domestic and European honours during a glittering career at Anfield.


County's surge up the table last season, which so nearly pinched them a play-off place, was due in part to the much-admired skills of former Stafford Rangers winger Paul Devlin who is starring this time around.

But Notts have missed former Rangers striker Gary McSwegan, who has been injured for much of the season - he and Gary Lund bagged over 40 goals between them last term.


There's experience aplenty elsewhere, with the County squad including the likes of Tony Agana, formerly with Sheffield United and Leeds, and Nigel Jemson, ex-Sheffield Wednesday and Forest, as options up front.

Currently leading the line is giant striker Devon White, who joined Notts from QPR after spells in the lower divisions with Cambridge and Bristol Rovers.




Average Goals per Match



Average Shots and Corners per Match




Gates at Meadow Lane





The former England youth international missed the entire 1993/94 season after a cruciate knee ligament operation, and made his first appearance of the current campaign at Barnsley in January.


Richard, who is 26 on Easter Monday, completes 10 years with the Town in the summer, and manag-





Dixie - the world's smallest keeper!

IN the summer of 1976 Luton Town manager Harry Haslam took an imaginative trip into the transfer market and presented John 'Dixie' Deans to the Kenilworth Road faithful. Deans, who was an ex-Scotland international, was signed from Glasgow Celtic for what appeared to be a bargain £20,000.

The first game of the season was against newly-relegated Sheffield United at Kenilworth Road and an interested crowd of 10,687 turned up to look at the new boy.

Our first impression was that he did not look like a footballer. Small and dumpy with long hair and seemingly unfit, he was an unlikely hero but our prayers were answered when he scored two goals with his head to sink the Blades.

Considering that the Town were without Alan West, Ron Futcher and Jimmy Ryan, who were

all still playing summer football in the USA, it was a good performance against one of the bookies' favourites for promotion. But it was soon back to the drawing board for Harry Haslam as inconsistent performances failed to live up to the bright start.

Fine away wins at Burnley and Wolves, with Deans scoring in both, had to be compared with defeats at home to Fulham and Southampton by 2-0 and 4-1 respectively.

Frustrating certainly, but for a neutral supporter the football was quite often of the highest order even if the defending sometimes left a little bit to be desired.

Although Deans scored five goals in his first seven games, it became fairly obvious that both he and the now returned Ron Futcher could not lead the attack together, and it was also obvious that Haslam favoured the latter.

After being injured in an away game at Plymouth, Deans found it difficult to force his way back in the side wearing the number nine shirt, and turned out in a variety of forward positions where he was not so effective.

He had one last appearance in that particular shirt however, which proved to be his most memorable performance.

The Town travelled to Notts County on November 27, 1976, in 13th position to take on a team who were four places higher and fresh from a 5-1 win at Fulham the previous week.

The first half gave little clue to the fireworks ahead, and the only incidents of note were the loss to County of their skipper Dave Needham after only seven minutes, due to a groin strain, and the Town taking the lead shortly before the interval - Alan West hit a fierce 25-yard drive that Notts goalkeeper Eric McManus could not hold and was first to the ball to hammer in the rebound.

The Town increased the lead soon after the break when Ron Futcher and John Aston combined in a defence-splitting move which Aston finished off with an accurate left-foot shot.

With the Town apparently coasting to a well-earned victory, disaster struck with 20 minutes to go when Luton goalkeeper Keith Barber was stretchered off with broken ribs after a clash with County's Mick Vinter.

To the great surprise of everyone in the ground the unlikely volunteer for the goalkeeping position was the diminutive Deans, who cut a brilliant picture wearing a shirt several sizes too big for him.

Unorthodox was a word invented for Deans as he threw himself around the box, and the situation so bemused the County players that the Town broke away twice in the final minutes to score through substitute Jimmy Husband and fullback Steve Buckley.

Harry Haslam was obviously pleased after the game, and commented: "At last I have found a position for Dixie! I told him that I had been trying to get Keith Barber to fist out corners like that all season!"

Unfortunately Haslam's pleasure disappeared a fortnight later when Deans was sent off at Bolton and effectively lost us the game.

Dixie did not turn out for the Town again after that and, after a spell at Carlisle, returned to



LUTON Town have launched revolutionary plans for an indoor stadium.

On Thursday, the Kohlerdome Corporation Ltd and Whitbread Plc announced the launch of a £30 million scheme to relocate Luton Town Football Club from its home at Kenilworth Road Stadium to an out-of-town multi-purpose leisure facility for the 21st century.

And a planning application has been lodged with Luton Borough Council.

The new indoor facility, designed for the future benefit of the club, the people of Luton and surrounding region, will be equipped with a removeable grass pitch.

This will make Luton Town the first club in Britain to adapt modern technology to the national sport. The scheme has received, in principle, support from the Football Association, the FA Premier League, and the Football League.

Its creation will provide Luton with a first-class community, cultural and leisure facility which can be used throughout the year in all conditions, and will endorse the club's reputation as one of the most innovative in British football.

Its planned location is close to junction 10 of the M1 motorway and is within easy reach of the people of Luton. The site has excellent com-


munications potential, and will be landscaped and enhanced to provide an attractive and modern gateway to the modern business parkway of the town.

In addition to the 20,000 seat stadium, there will be a major non-sporting leisure element, providing hotel, restaurants and leisure facilities. Whitbread Plc, one of the country's leading food and drink leisure operators is working closely with The Kohlerdome Corporation on this aspect of the new facility.

Both The Kohlerdome Corporation Ltd and Whitbread Plc hope the scheme will receive the full support of Luton Borough Council, recognising that the proposed development will provide Luton with a wonderful facility for the future and, at the same time, ensure the future viability of the football club.

The club's lease at its cramped Kenilworth Road Stadium expires in 1996, and they have been anxious to relocate for many years, particularly to a new home where spectators can enjoy their entertainment in complete comfort and safety.

Luton Town has sought a move from Kenilworth Road Stadium several times since 1945, but without success. The current stadium has a severely limited capacity (10,017) and is only used for home football matches played by the club. It has a limited potential which has

made it very difficult for the football club to remain viable.

In recent years, particularly following the legislation included in the Taylor Report, which followed the tragedies at Heysel and Hillsborough, it has been necessary for all football clubs to review their stadia and to upgrade them. Several have successfully relocated to modern stadia.

These purpose-built football stadia have been expensive to build and furnish, and have only a limited potential for commercial success. This means they cannot properly ensure the future viability of the clubs.

David Kohler, Chairman and Managing Director of Luton Town Football Club, has a vision of a more progressive and rewarding stadium for his club, and formed Kohlerdome Corporation Ltd in order to realise this vision.

"I wanted to ensure the viability of the club,

which has struggled for many years, and I felt this was best done by creating a stadium which could be used seven days a week throughout the year for various different events," said Mr Kohler.

"I also wanted it to be user-friendly, modern, safe and a benefit to the town, the community of Luton, and to the region around us. I wanted to create something of which we could all be proud.


"But my first priority was that it should be a commercially viable project and that the club's future would be secured.

"Ordinary, conventional football stadia are used for 20 to 30 home matches each season, but no more," he added. "That is not enough. We need something else, something that would help the club, the sport - by ensuring safety and proper behaviour - the town and the region.



"I knew from my research, including a close study of the BC Place Stadium in Vancouver and the Pontiac Silverdome in Chicago, that it could be done."


"These stadia permitted many different events to be held on different days, ensuring income from outside sport. All this was brought home when the Silverdome, with its removable pitch and fixed roof, was used in the World Cup."

"The problem with the Silverdome was that it had a system which needed three days to move the pitch, and three days to move it out.... so, I invented one which required only six or seven hours."

"This means the facility can be used far more often - for concerts, exhibitions, shows, all forms of entertainment and commerce. In short, it is a creation which will be a truly great symbol of progress and achievement for Luton."

Luton Town manager David Pleat welcomed the

announcement of the launch of the club's plan to relocate to an indoor stadium of the future, as "an innovative step for our club, our town and our sport."

Mr Pleat said: "It is an exciting step, a bold one, and one which will ensure we at Luton Town have every chance of regaining our position among the elite clubs in the Premier League in this country.

"To achieve any success, we need the best facilities and the best organisation.

"This project also keeps our club in our town, keeps our team in our town, and once again proves that size is not everything if you have vision, heart, courage, the ability to see what is needed, and the support to achieve it.

"It will be a wonderful opportunity for our players and our supporters, and I hope we will see it succeed in helping attract more and more families from Luton, Bedfordshire and beyond to take pride

in their football club and its achievements."

The Sports Turf Research Institute, based in Bingley, say they are impressed with the scheme for a moveable grass pitch.

"The plans are ambitious and futuristic in concept, but in our opinion entirely justified in terms of it allowing the stadium to have multi-purpose use," said the STRI's assistant director J Perris.

"Perhaps the greatest challenge is not the growing of grass in trays but the ability for you to move these trays and place them in such a way that you can end up with an absolutely perfect surface."

"It appears you have overcome this problem, and the concept of trays being moved in and out so the grass can be grown in suitable open conditions is very exciting."

"Currently, pitches in new stadiums are suffering from the large surrounding structures and in particular the effect of shade."
