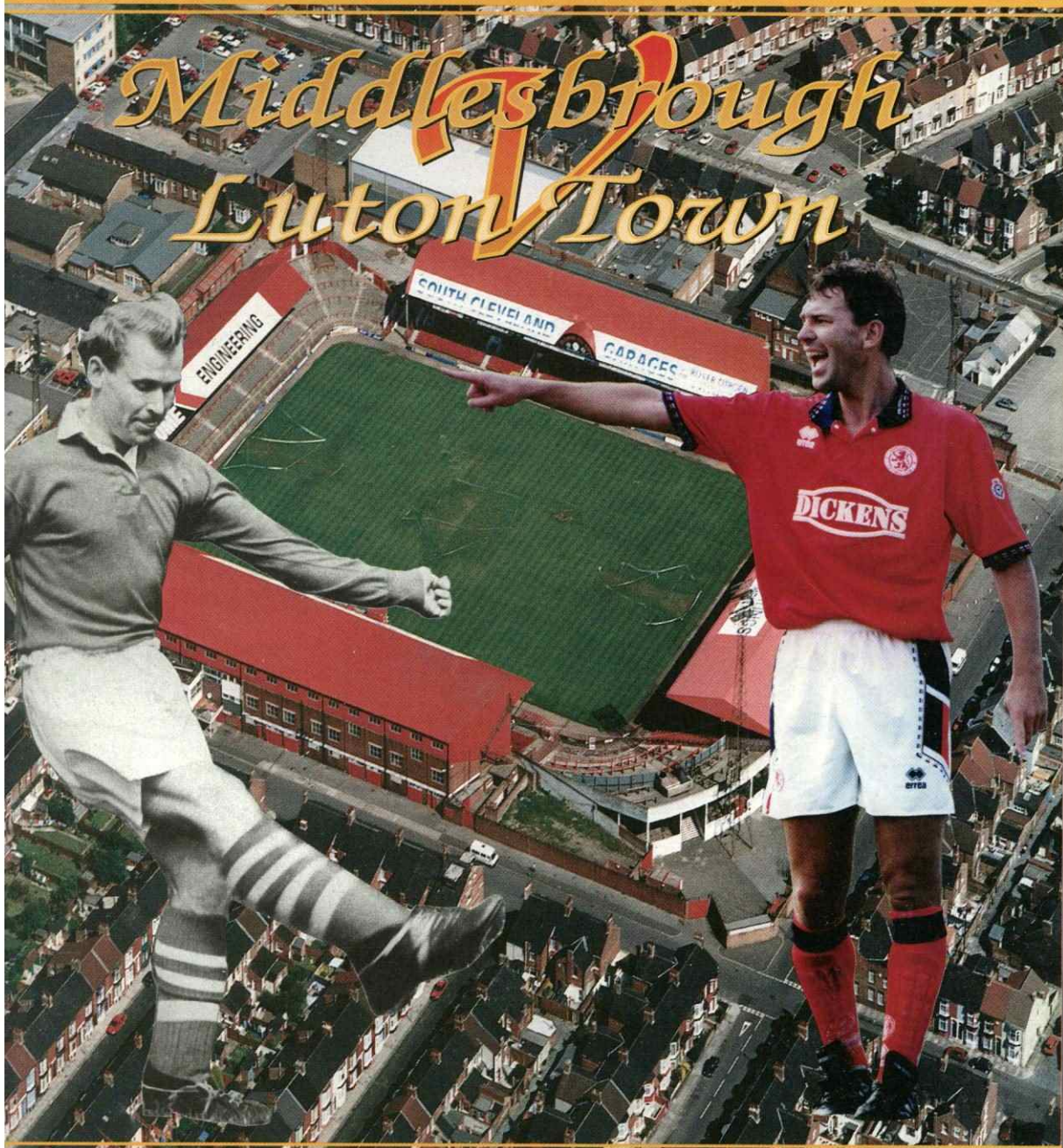

# A DAY TO REMEMBER

**W**EEKS of planning by the club will ensure Boro's last ever league game at Ayresome Park will be an occasion to remember.

While the real action gets under way at five to three with kick-off of the crucial promotion match against Luton Town, activities will get underway as early as 1pm.

The Teesside Pipe Band will get the on-the-pitch entertainment underway at about 1pm, and young fans will have plenty of opportunity to join in the fun.

Young supporters will have the chance to get their faces painted in Boro's red and white colours, while Roary and his helpers will be handing out free sweets and balloons.

Another big feature of the day will be a giant-sized piece of rock, sporting through its centre the words 'Ayresome Park, 1903-95'. Small replica bars of the mega-rock will be handed out to young fans.

Tyne-Tees Television cameras will be on hand to film a once-in-a-lifetime occasion shortly after 2pm when Boro legends of the last 60 years take to the pitch for an emotional farewell to Ayresome

The ex-players will be introduced to the crowd before taking a lap of honour around the pitch and gathering around the centre spot.

Local singer Suzannah Clarke will then lead the chorus in an emotional rendition of 'You'll Never Walk Alone' and one or two other songs for which it is hoped the fans will join in.

It is hoped that the fans in a capacity crowd will create a tremendous atmosphere before Robbo's boys take to the pitch for this historic and crucial game.

A hotline telephone number has been opened on which volunteers can contact social workers during office hours. The number is 463755.







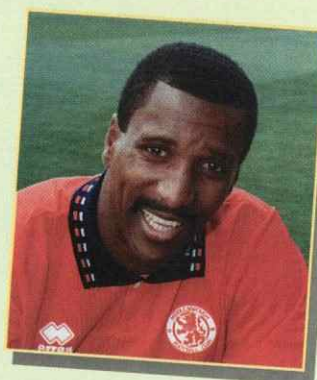

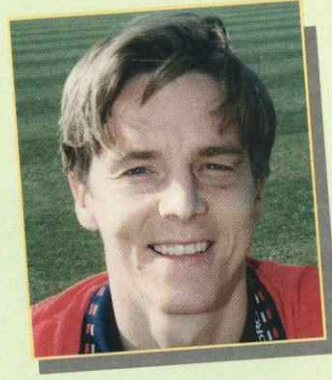

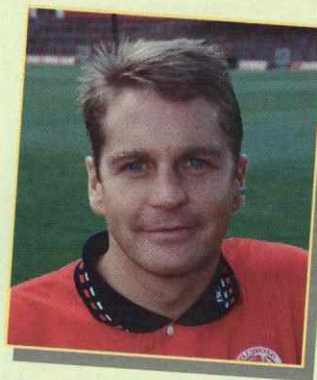

● Viv Anderson: second game for Boro last Saturday.



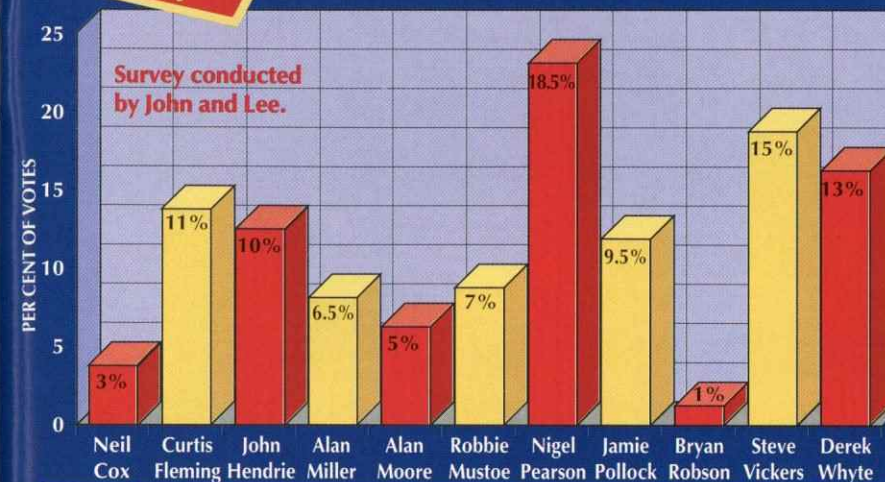

## Nigel's the fans' choice

■ CAPTAIN Fantastic! That's what the fans think of Boro skipper Nigel Pearson who won our survey to vote for the club's Player of the Season.

■ In a special poll conducted among almost 500 supporters outside Ayresome Park before a recent home game, the towering defender was the clear winner as Boro's top player.

■ Pearson won 18.5 per cent of all votes cast in the survey, pushing central defensive partner Steve Vickers (15 per cent) into the runner-up spot.

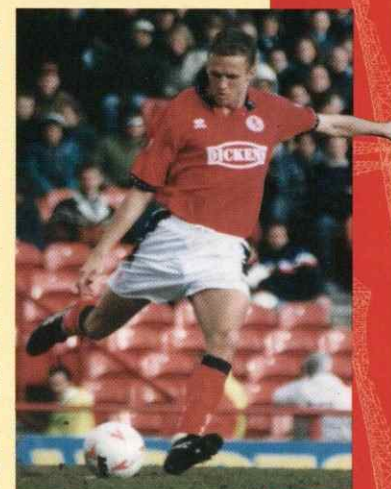
■ It is testimony to the team's superb defensive displays this season that the top four places went to defenders, with Pearson

and Vickers followed closely by centre-back turned left-back Derek Whyte and injury-hit right-back turned left-back Curtis Fleming.

■ A total of 13 per cent of those asked picked Whyte as their winner, while Fleming was just two per cent adrift.

■ Pearson's success goes hand-in-hand with his Player-of-the-Season award as voted by the local press, for which he received the David Graham Memorial Trophy before Boro's home game against Sheffield United.

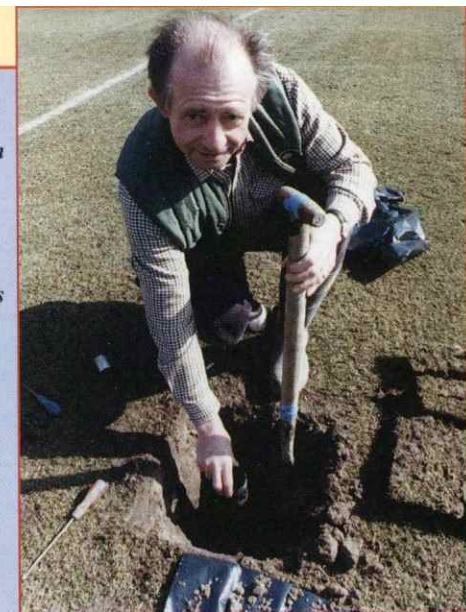

## The RESERVES in Action

In a game played on a pitch left in a terrible condition after a long season, Boro fell 2-0 behind on 20 minutes but fought their way back into the game.

Reserve team coach Gordon McQueen admitted after the game: "We really needed to win all of our remaining games to have a chance of promotion so it's out of our hands now."

A Boro side that again included fit-again Curtis Fleming along with £300,000 centre back Phil Whelan struggled in the early part of the game and fell two goals behind.

However, Jaime Moreno put Boro back in the game from the penalty spot on the half hour and McQueen's boys went in search of the equaliser.

Instead, Boro lost a freak goal on half-time when the ball hit a divet and bounced over the head of goalkeeper Steve Pears to give Vale a 3-1 lead.

The Ayresome boys kept their shape well in the second half and pulled a goal back

with 20 minutes left when striker Chris Freestone netted his seventh reserve team goal of the season.

They then piled forward in search of an equaliser but missed several gilt-edged chances, failing to capitalise on their superiority.

Boro are left with three Pontins League games to play, all at Ayresome Park, with the first tomorrow (Monday) on May 1 with a 7pm kick-off.

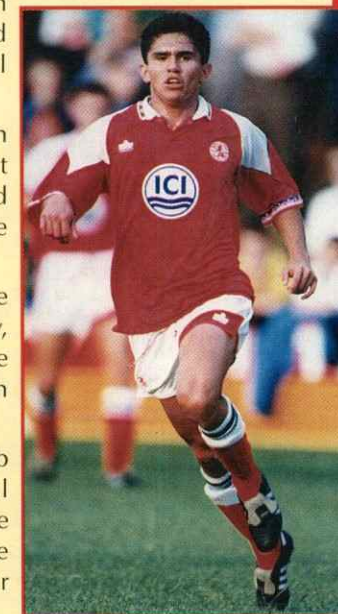

# Evening Gazette



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**I**t is fitting, on this historic occasion, to look back upon the career of Stephen Pears, the club's longest serving player.

Pears has been in the background this season, after battling to overcome an injury, but over the past decade he has been a model of consistency.

Three years ago former Manchester City and England goalkeeper Joe Corrigan, in his role of specialist coach, rated Stephen one of the top five goalkeepers in the country.

Life at Ayresome Park has never been dull for the former Durham District Schoolboys' player. He has shared in promotion glory, relegation agony, and the most traumatic time in the club's history.

Stephen was among the players locked out of the ground by the Official Receiver in the summer of 1986, when the club crashed with £1.8 million debts.

The players faced an uncertain future as they wandered around like football gypsies to train on local non-league grounds.

Pears was in distinguished company. The following have all figured in seven-figure transfer deals...Gary Pallister (£2.3 million), Tony Mowbray (£1m), Alan Kernaghan (£1.6m), Stuart Ripley (£1.3m), Peter Beagrie (£1.3m) and

Pears warns the starry-eyed youngsters there is no easy way to the top.

"Many people believe football is a glamour job. It is not, though I appreciate people will find that hard to understand," he says.

"People only see players on match days. They don't see the training slog through the week. Talent is not enough. Without dedication, youngsters have no chance."

While these players moved to fresh surroundings, Pears has stayed at Ayresome Park. His loyalty has been rewarded with a Testimonial, though - for various reasons - a match has not yet been arranged.

Stephen joined Manchester United as a youngster and benefited from the knowledge of former Old Trafford goalkeeper Harry Gregg. "He virtually taught me everything I know," he explains.

Pears had only a brief flirtation with first team football at Old Trafford. So he jumped at a loan deal with Middlesbrough and, later, an £80,000 move.

Malcolm Allison signed Stephen on loan and Willie Maddren clinched the permanent transfer in one of the quickest deals on record.

Maddren interrupted the holiday of United manager Ron Atkinson in Marbella. When Big Ron rang back from a call box, Maddren offered £75,000. "Call it £80,000 and you've got a deal," replied Atkinson.

Out of 400-plus first team games for Middlesbrough, Pears ranks his loan debut, against Cardiff City, his best ever display. I go along with that view. Pears was absolutely magnificent in

a 2-0 win.

Luton Town manager David Pleat will recall another Pears' blinder. Pleat was with Leicester City when Stephen denied on-loan Arsenal striker Kevin Campbell a first half hat-trick.

Pleat said in tribute: "Middlesbrough should buy Pears a video of the match for Christmas."

It was a remarkable comeback for Pears after a hernia operation, illness, and the death of his father.

England manager Graham Taylor chose him for a 'B' friendly international against Czechoslovakia in 1992. "He has kept goal exceptionally well for two or three years and it would be unwise not to look at him," he said.

Unfortunately, Pears missed his international call-up through injury.

I hope you have a bumper testimonial match turn-out, Stephen. You deserve it.

## Boro end season on High-field

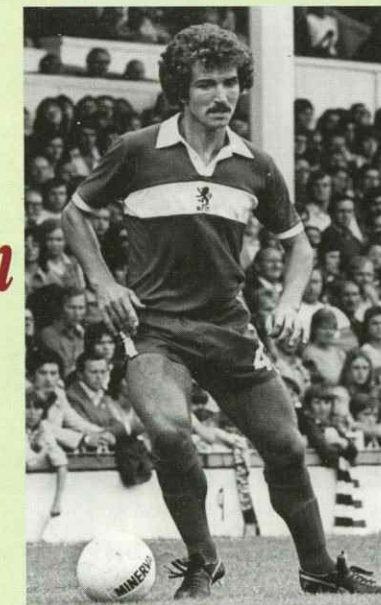
BORO'S 1974-75 home programme ended with a 1-0 home win over Liverpool on April 19, 1975 with Alan Foggon scoring the winner.

Defender Willie Maddren, tipped by many for a full England cap, received the Player of the Year trophy before the game.

Two days later Boro flew to Norway to play Brann FC of Bergen in a friendly - goals from John Hickton, Malcolm Smith and Alan Foggon gave us a 3-1 win.

The next day came an announcement that four players were to be freed by the club. Northern Ireland international Eric McMordie and Jimmy Cochrane, both with first team experience, and reserve players Ian Greener and Alan McFall were all released.

Boro's final game was at Highfield Road against Gordon Milne's Coventry City. Boro went ahead from



a corner kick on 41 minutes, when Graeme Souness returned the ball into the goalmouth for Alan Foggon to head past 'keeper Neil Ramsbottom.

Twenty minutes into the second half Boro's last goal of the season was scored by John Hickton, who had, coincidentally, scored our first goal of the campaign at Birmingham City.

Alan Foggon broke away and pushed the ball back to Bobby Murdoch, who centred to the far post for Hickton to head home. Stoke City drew 0-0 at Burnley ending any hopes we had of qualifying for European football the following season.

## Heine shoots down Seagulls

A CONTROVERSIAL goal by Heine Otto and a second half winner from David Currie left Brighton boss Chris Cattlin fuming in his post-match press conference.

Cattlin, whose side were enjoying an 11-match unbeaten run before the game in April 1985, was particularly detrimental in his comments about the match officials. The furore surrounded a sixth minute strike from Dutch midfielder Otto who tried a long distance shot which caught Seagulls keeper Graham Moseley offguard.

He stepped back over the line but insisted that he had held the ball well in front of him. An eagle-eyed linesman

flagged that the ball had crossed the line and referee Norman Glover awarded Boro the goal.

Hans Kraay equalised for the visitors four minutes before the break but further drama was to unfold in first half injury time when the same linesman spotted Eric Young's foul on David Currie.

After consultation with the referee, Boro were awarded a penalty. Currie, who had missed the last Boro spot kick refused to take the kick so Brian Laws stepped up but Moseley saved.

Striker Currie scored our second half winner, his 11th goal of the season, to give us only our third win in 18 games.

## Bernie and Baird save Boro

A COMBINED two-goal blast from strikers partners Bernie Slaven and Ian Baird saved Boro at the death from a second successive relegation five years ago.

Boro destroyed North East rival Newcastle United 4-1 on the final day of the 1989-90 season, enabling Colin Todd's side to leapfrog over Bournemouth and deny the Geordies the chance of automatic promotion into the bargain!

Boro started the match in a relegation position and knew they were relying on victory while, at the same time, hoping that Bournemouth would slip up against Leeds.

A crowd of 18,484 turned out for the nail-biting climax to the season and witnessed a game that was to go down in the history books as one of the best remembered of recent times.

Having won only one of their previous nine games, Boro were expected to struggle against a United side, unbeaten in nine games and boasting the goals scoring prowess of Mick Quinn and Mark McGhee.

Boro got the breakthrough they needed on the hour when Slaven turned in Paul Kerr's cross with the help of the right hand post. And six minutes later, John Anderson's poor back pass let Slaven through again and he squared the ball for Baird to tap in an easy goal.

But United were back in it when Kevin Brock's header was deflected into his own net by youngster Owen McGee and Boro fans feared the worst.

Instead, Boro found an extra gear and Baird struck a superb goal to make it 3-1 and then in the last minute, Mark Proctor's shot hit a post and Slaven was on hand to net his 32nd goal of a prolific season that had seen him win his first caps for the Republic of Ireland.

The win was enough to keep Boro up - and United down - because Leeds had won 1-0 at Dean Court to condemn Bournemouth to relegation to Division Three.

Salif Bagayoko, Paul Richardson and Ross Skingsley were all awarded one-year contracts by the club after completing their training schemes, while midfielder Mark Summerbell was given a two-year contract.

But Geddis warned: "They will be making a big mistake if they feel a professional contract means they have made it. Now, more than ever, they must learn the skills of their trade in a very short space of time."

The four teenagers had played a major role in the youth team's challenge for a second consecutive Northern Intermediate League title which ultimately ended in failure.

Boro failed to win any of their final five games of a long season, ending in a goalless draw at York City, leaving Newcastle as favourites to clinch the championship.

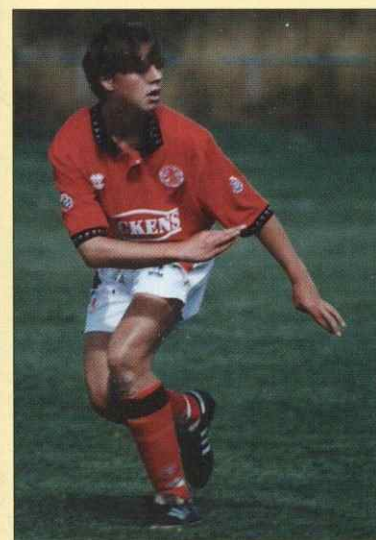
"It's amazing just how many ups and downs can occur in the learning process of young players," reflected Geddis. "It was a disappointing end for the lads after having had their noses in front for so long."

"But, as I've said before, this level of football is about producing good young players, it's not about winning championships."

An experienced youth team drew at York in their final game. For much of the game Boro struggled to create chances and 17-year-old goalkeeper Ben Cole came to the rescue several times as the home side's direct style enabled York to hit back.

Returning to the four given professional contracts by the club, Geddis added: "Things can change so quickly for young footballers, so I hope the lads look carefully at the way several players signed on last summer have since been released by the club."

"They must look to mature and find the commitment that a professional needs. They must be aiming to gain a regular reserve team spot in a very large and competitive squad."

## They Played for Both Clubs

There have been many players associated with both Boro and Luton Town. Club historian HARRY GLASPER pulled together this list: Joe Blackett, Alex Brown, James Brown, John Brown, John Dow, Jack Eckford, Joe Frail, Bob Gray, John Hogg, George Martin, Billy Pease, Phil Boersma, Andy Dibble, Chris Kamara, Mick Kennedy, Bert Mitchell, John O'Rourke, Mike Saxby and Joe Scott. Below, Harry recalls some of those names...

### George Martin

George Scott Martin was a footballer who enjoyed as much success, if not more, as a Football League manager. Hull City manager Harry Lewis saw the potential of the Lanarkshire born player when he was with Bo'ness and promptly took the 23-year-old to Huddersfield in 1922.

Immediately, Hamilton Academicals lodged a complaint contesting that the player was still registered with them. Accies' complaint was upheld by the League and the Tigers were fined £50 for an illegal approach but the transfer was allowed to stand.

Four seasons later George hit the big time with a transfer to champions-elect Everton in March 1928.

Boro manager Peter McWilliam raised a few eyebrows when he travelled to Merseyside to sign Everton left wing - Arthur Rigby and George Martin - in a double deal in 1932, with George's fee an estimated £900.

Like Rigby, George spent only one brief season at the club, making only six appearances, before moving to Luton in 1933.

He retired from the game in 1938, becoming coach and then manager at Kenilworth Road. He then guided Newcastle back to the First Division in his first season in charge at St James' Park. Martin then moved on to Aston Villa.

George was an accomplished sculptor and his life-sized bust of Julius Caesar won him a diploma of excellence from an Edinburgh college. He was also a fine singer and made several gramophone recordings during the early 1940s.

### John O'Rourke

Will we hear the strains of "Give us a goal, John O'Rourke" here at Ayresome Park this afternoon?

Northampton-born England under-23 star John O'Rourke was a big favourite in his two years here on Teesside in the mid-1960s.

As an amateur, he was taken on at Arsenal but was allowed to leave for Chelsea in April 1962. He made only one League Cup appearance at Stamford Bridge despite topping the Football Combination scoring list.

A move to Kenilworth Road in December 1963 saw his promotion to the Hatters' first team, and a most impressive goalscoring record of 64 in 84 League games prompted Boro manager Stan Anderson to part with a modest £20,000 in July 1966. O'Rourke scored two debut goals at Colchester in a 3-2 win in what was the club's first ever Division Three game making him an instant hit with the fans.

He ended the season as leading 27-goal scorer as the club clawed its way back to Division Two, winning promotion in the final game at Ayresome Park against Oxford United.

After winning an England under-23 cap against Turkey, he was surprisingly transferred to Ipswich Town in February 1968. After spells with Coventry, QPR and Bournemouth he ended his career with Johannesburg Rangers in South Africa.

**T**HERE should be no need for any warnings today - this Luton team can beat anyone in the division on their day. Among several eye-catching results for the Hatters this season, their 5-1 mauling of Boro stands head and shoulders above the rest.

Today is the chance for revenge and to leave Ayresome Park with a memorable victory on the road to promotion.

David Pleat's men occupy a mid-table position despite one of the

division's best records

on their travels. But patchy home form must make the Kenilworth Road outfit one of the most frustrating sides to watch.

With a ground capacity of just over 10,000, Luton's three spells in the top flight have been achieved without a huge following and somewhat against the odds. After five years in the First Division in the Fifties, during which time they lost an FA Cup final to Nottingham Forest, the Bedfordshire side slid slowly into the Fourth Division.

Their next bite at the big time was not to come until manager Harry Haslam led them to promotion in 1973-4, as runners-up a record 15 points behind that year's champions.

The guests of honour will include Boro captains of different eras, such as George Hardwick (1940s), Gordon Jones (1960s), Stuart

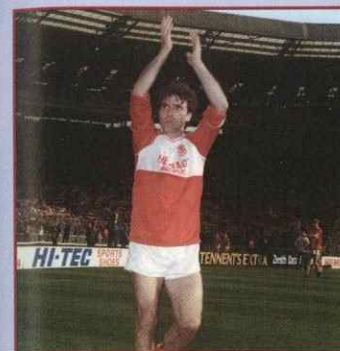

"Although I've not been back to Middlesbrough for 25 years, it still holds many great memories for me. After all, I even met my wife there!

"Good luck to all of the fans and my old friends, I hope everyone has a great day. See you in the new stadium."

**M**ORE post-war appearances in a Boro shirt than any other player. That's the proud distinction of former club captain Gordon Jones.

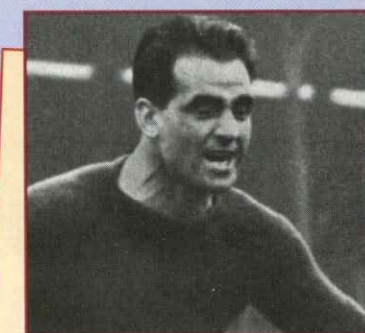

**I**T'S my life! So says famous goalkeeper Rolando Ugolini of the Boro, four decades after he stopped playing at Ayresome Park.

■ A veteran of over 300 games in a Boro shirt, Ugolini says: "As a player, I thought of nothing else but the club. It was great to be associated with the ground.

■ "Ayresome Park always had a terrific atmosphere and I'll never forget one old stager who used to shout all the players' names.

■ "One particular memory that stands out was my first game against Blackpool. We were a goal ahead with about five minutes to go when Blackpool won a corner.

■ "Stanley Matthews and I both rushed for the ball behind the goal and I got there first and walked away. Stan turned to me and said: 'If that's what you call sport, then I'd rather not bother.'

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## JOHN O'ROURKE

- "Give us a goal, John O'Rourke," is one of the best loved anthems ever heard on the Holgate, and the memory of it still sends a tingle down the spine of the former Sixties Boro striker.
- An early Stan Anderson signing, he arrived as a youngster from Luton in 1966, and netted 30 goals as Boro stormed to promotion from Division Three in 1967, including the famous hat-trick against Oxford in the final game of that season.
- Spurred on by his ambition, he moved on to Ipswich Town, Coventry, QPR and Bournemouth before finally retiring from the game after a spell in South Africa in the mid-70s without ever reaching his real goal - a full England cap!
- Still renowned among Boro fans and synonymous with that Sixties side, John now runs a newsagents on the South Coast, near Bournemouth where he spoke to ADRIAN BEVINGTON...

### John, it must be nice to hear that your name lives on in Teesside?

Yes, marvellous, as are the memories of my career with Middlesbrough. They were most certainly the happiest of my playing days. Looking back, it was just my drive and ambition to get to the top immediately that took me away from Ayresome.

### What do you mean by that?

Well, first of all I was on a mission to prove my former Chelsea manager Tommy Docherty wrong for releasing me from Stamford Bridge to Chelsea, and although Middlesbrough had a fine team, I didn't think they had the finances and the players lacked the drive to get to the top in the way I wanted to. So I moved on to Ipswich, who despite being in the same division as Boro showed a determined outlook to reach the top, and I think I was proved correct, looking back. It was nearly seven years before Boro reached the top division.

### What of the season you got promoted with Boro?

The game against Oxford will live with me for the rest of my life - the atmosphere and a 4-1 win. We had a great bunch of lads - Derek Downing, Big John Hickton, the under-rated Arthur Horsfield, while

Dave Chadwick on the wing was a marvellous crosser yet only weighed about seven stone wringing wet.

### You picked up your only England under-23 cap while with Boro, and left soon after. Was there a problem with Stan Anderson?

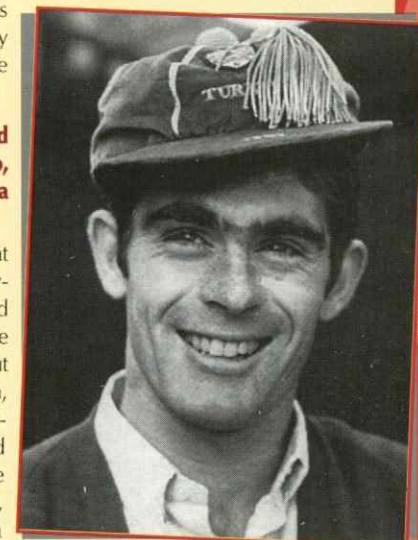
Well, something did happen that set the ball rolling. It was following a 3-0 defeat. I didn't think I'd played any worse than anyone else, I'd missed a few chances but at least I was there to miss them, but Stan dropped me the following week. When I questioned him he said: "If I'd picked the side 10 minutes after the game, you'd have been in, but after a week I've decided to drop you. You have set yourself your own standards, and you must keep aiming to reach them."

I was young and didn't like it, so when the offer from Bill McGarry at Ipswich came along I accepted it.

### What was the problem with Tommy Docherty?

I'd been with Tommy at Arsenal and Chelsea, and he released me to Luton Town. Tommy was a loveable rogue who has probably mellowed with his years, but what he and a lot of managers don't seem to realise is that they are playing with people's lives and careers. They don't realise what they are doing to people - basically a personality clash can end a career.

### So have you returned to Ayresome since moving

### to Ipswich?

I've only been back once to play in Gordon Jones' testimonial game over 20 years ago, but regrettably never to play in a "competitive match", although I did face Boro in a 2-2 draw at Loftus Road while I was with QPR.

### You say your goal was an England cap. Was it a major blow not to achieve it?

Obviously a disappointment, after all I'd got the under-21 cap while with Boro and even played in European football during my first season with Coventry. But considering the competition for the forward positions, it was understandable though I had managed opportunist goals for whoever I had played for.

# Ayresome

Boro fan, magazine contributor and Red Roar columnist Mike McGeary ends our series for the season...but there's more to follow next year...

I CAN still see it now when I close my eyes. The greenest green I've ever seen.

I stood at the top of the steps in the North Terrace, a wide-eyed seven-year-old startled at the beauty of my first fix.

It wasn't my Ayresome debut, just my first night match. The combination of the crisp floodlighting on the flattest, lushest, most perfectly and lovingly tendered grass in the whole world was overpowering. There's no doubt about it, for me, that was it.

The understanding, the bonding, the love of the game itself were all yet to come. But I was hooked.

I can't remember the opponents or the result, just the greenness. At the end I began the walk homewards, my innocence a thing of the recent past. The unique smell of Ayresome Park smoke filled my nostrils and the strains of the music that would infuriate me after a defeat for years to come whisked me away from the field of dreams.

### Mastered

A couple of years past by and the names could be rolled off the tongue with ease, though times tables were still beyond me. I was at that in-between stage in my football development. I still hadn't mastered the offside rule, but I knew what I thought of Billy Ashcroft.

My sister had taken me into the Boys' End for cup victories over Coventry and Everton, but here we were for the Bolton game in the fifth round, locked out. She turned to take me home, but saw the look on my face and decided to give it just one more try.

We ended up in the Bolton end, with our flask. We won, of course, and I first learned the value of diplomacy, when it's just not clever to jump up and down. At the end of the game, as the ground emptied, a Boro fan who got found out got his jaw

broken for his trouble.

But que sera sera, Boro were Wembley bound. In the next round against Orient I sat on my dad's shoulders in the family enclosure behind the goal as I learned another lesson in life.

I roved for years, the East End, Boys' End, occasional visits to the South and North Stands, until I finally admitted it was time to grow up and settle down.

I got myself a little place on The Holgate, nothing to write home about, but big enough for me and close to my friends.

The rent went up from time to time, but it was my place, somewhere I could call home. Neighbours came and went - it's funny, some of them I never even asked their names.

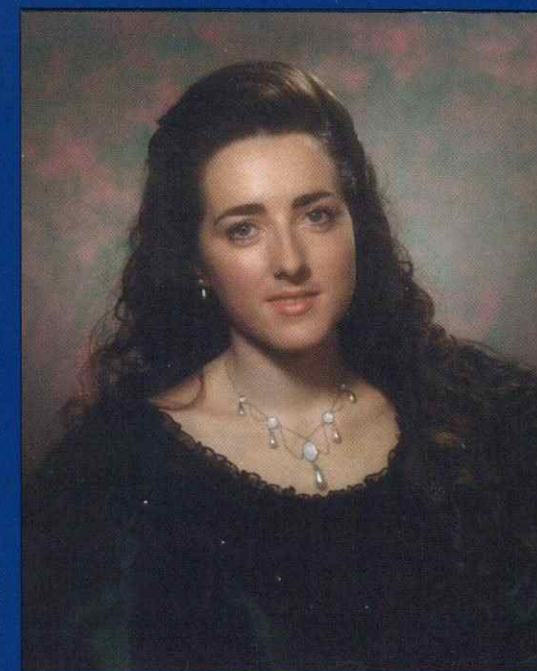

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# The Changing Face of the Boro

**C**OUNTLESS changes have taken place since Ayresome Park first became home to the Boro.

And undoubtedly one of the biggest changes has been the transformation over the past 92 years of the monotone Key Card to the glossy Matchday Magazine.

Although programmes were produced for early games at Ayresome, they were flimsy black and white affairs. The Key Card from the 1926-27 promotion season comprised eight pages, usually featuring a head and shoulders shot of a Boro star. Two-and-a-half of those pages were reserved for advertising.



● A 1950 programme for a Football League versus Scottish League match at Ayresome

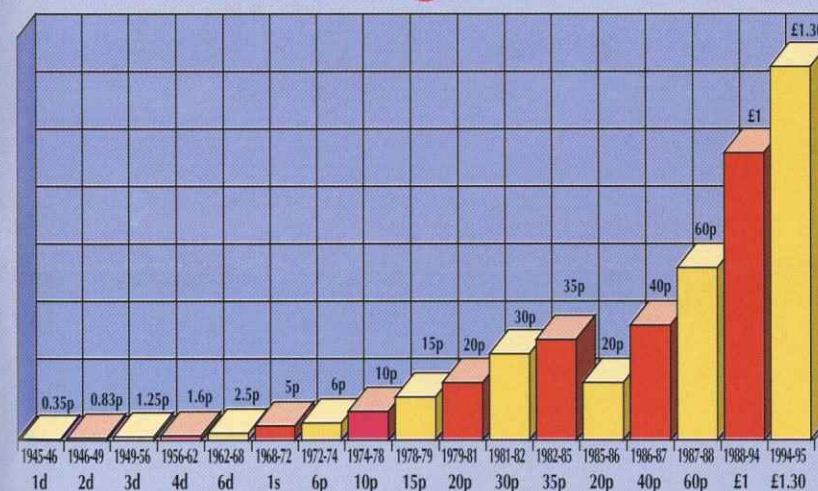
Gradually, the Key Card was transformed into the Official Programme but, by 1968-69, was more than ever dominated by advertisements with only a general football article, Club Notes, a single action photograph and results and fixtures to catch the reader's eye.

Only in the early Seventies did the programme begin to offer details, in the form of pen-pictures, on the visiting team, though even in the 1974-75 season it was still normal to have just one action photograph among the 20 page offering.

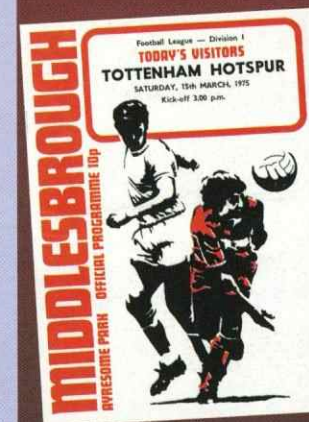
Colour photographs first began to appear in the late 1970s, though when the club's fortunes waned over the next decade only the cover was reserved for such glossiness - and that usually the same photograph for every match!

Since 1989, dramatic improvements have been introduced to the point where this season the Official Matchday Magazine won the Programme of the Year award for the First Division.

# The Ayresome Story

## 1903 - 1995

Club historian Harry Glasper, author of 'Middlesbrough - a Complete Record, 1876-1903', tells the story of Boro's famous old ground...

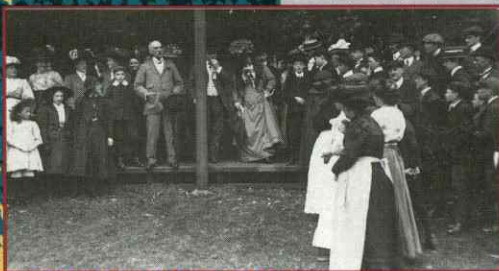
MIDDLESBROUGH'S first home as a Football League club was the Linthorpe Road Ground situated on the grounds of Middlesbrough Cricket Club.

In 1899, the cricket club was situated opposite the Empire Hotel (now the Hog's Head) in Linthorpe Road, in what is now the Kwiksavé car park.

At the initial Annual General Meetings at the turn of the century the board of directors reported healthy working profits to the shareholders and it was felt that the ambitious club should seek a ground more in keeping with the club's growing Football League status.

In January 1901 much of the Ayresome Grange Estate, which contained part of Middlesbrough Ironopolis' old Paradise Ground, was drained with the intention of moving to the new venue some time in 1904.

Part of the new land was to be used as a training pitch and also as a playing surface for the reserve side. The pitch intended for Football League games was carefully rolled flat and grassed in readiness for the

club's projected move in 1904.

After careful consideration the name of the new ground was decided upon as Ayresome Park because the ground was situated in the Ayresome electoral ward of the town.

The architect of Ayresome Park was Archibald Leitch of Glasgow, who had successfully built many similar football stadia throughout the length and breadth of Britain.

However, the board had pre-arranged an attractive friendly against Glasgow Celtic at Ayresome Park on September 7, to defray part of the cost of the new ground.

The cost of the ground was £10,436.16. The cost to erect a new North Stand and its fittings was an estimated £1,521 and the total expenditure, approaching £12,000 would prove to be a costly venture for the club for almost a decade.

In January 1903 First Division Boro's board of directors failed to extend the tenancy of the Linthorpe Road Ground from the owners of the Middlesbrough Estate for another year and the intended move to Ayresome Park was hastily brought forward to coincide with the start of the 1903/04 season.

Fortunately, the club's opening fixture of the season was away to Sheffield Wednesday, which gave the workmen another week's grace to get Ayresome Park ready for League football.

**Wilfie, the Golden Boy**  
SIMPLY the greatest of them all. Wilf Mannion was the Golden Boy in the golden era of English football, the perfect all-round player.

Born at South Bank in 1918, Mannion went on to embody the pride of all Teesside with his bewitching style. In a career interrupted by war, he scored more than a century of goals for Boro in 368 League and cup appearances.

Old men still talk like enchanted children when they recall the genius with which Mannion lit up their Saturday afternoons. Deceptively slight, Mannion was a wonderful header of the ball and displayed remarkable poise and balance.

He signed for Boro in 1936 and by the outbreak of hostilities was firmly established in one of the club's greatest ever sides. In the last full season before the league was suspended, the young Mannion scored 14 goals in a forward line that often included Micky Fenton and George Cammell.

No wonder Ayresome Park was one of the most feared grounds in the country. Mannion hit four goals in a 9-2 victory over Blackpool and another hat-trick as Portsmouth were crushed 8-2.

Mannion's career resumed after the war and he won 26 England caps, many alongside Boro teammate George Hardwick, before signing for Hull in 1954.

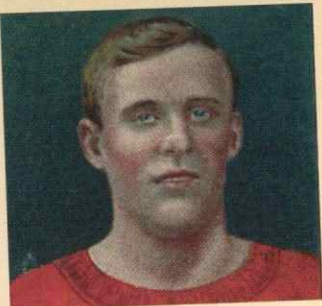

## A Common transfer - but it caused shockwaves!

THE transfer of Alf Common from Sunderland to Boro in February 1905 was so controversial that it sparked a transfer fee limit.

Boro had been at their new Ayresome Park ground less than two years when they paid out an enormous £1,000 for the striker's services.

The club were denounced for trying to buy their way out of trouble, but when his penalty at Sheffield United brought Boro's first away victory in two years, the fans were not complaining.

Common was an aggressive, 13-stone forward with a deceptive turn of pace who scored 65 goals in 178 Boro games.

He was capped by England before being fined £10 and stripped of the Boro captaincy in 1907 for 'drunkenness and violent behaviour'.

In 1910, he was transferred to Woolwich Arsenal for one tenth of Boro's huge investment.

first ever goal at Ayresome Park with Middlesbrough beating Celtic 1-0 before an inquisitive 7,000 crowd. Boro played that afternoon in its new club colours of red shirts and white shorts with red socks (the club had previously played in white shirts and black shorts).

Five days later on September 12 1903 James Clifton Robinson, managing director and chief engineer of the Electric Tram Company, officially opened the gates at the front of the club with a huge golden key.

Neighbours and rivals Sunderland won

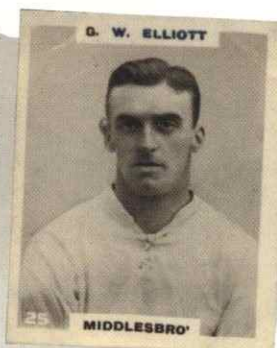
the game 3-2 before a huge crowd, estimated at 30,000. Boro's scorers that day were Cassidy and Brown. The ground had a capacity of 33,000 but part of the main North Stand was partitioned off from the public, for the workmen were still frantically working behind the scenes to complete the project.

Opposite the sparkling, brand new North Stand, which ran the full length of the pitch, was the diminutive 50-foot long old slated stand that had been the main stand at the Linthorpe Road Ground for nearly 20 years.

The stand itself had been carefully disassembled, nail by nail, plank by plank and transported the half mile up Linthorpe Road to be painstakingly reassembled at the new ground. Almost like David and Goliath the two vastly contrasting stands silently kept each other company for another 32 years.

Having finished a respectable 10th in Division One in their first Ayresome season, and reached the FA Cup quarter-final, they struggled the following season and made Alf Common the first 'four-figure footballer'.

The following season England legend Steve Bloomer joined and

helped Boro finish sixth in 1908.

Immediately before the 'Great War' stars like Tim Williamson, George Elliott and Jackie Carr inspired Boro to third spot.

During the Great War (1914-1918) League football was suspended with only a few clubs playing infrequent regional football in the period. Like the majority of clubs, Middlesbrough wound down and most of its players enlisted and went to fight for King and country.

Ayresome Park itself was requisitioned by the Army and used as an assembly and training centre for the troops.

Despite two relegations in the 1920s, Ayresome fans now had such heroes as George Camsell, Billy Burrell, Billy Pease and Bobby Baxter.

The club announced on June 15, 1936 that Dorman, Long and Co. would erect the new South Stand which was to be 250 feet long, 58 feet deep and 25 feet above ground level and a roof was to be put over the West End terracing.

The new Stand, which would accommodate 9,000 fans, was built to replace the faithful "little slated roof" stand which had been brought to Ayresome Park from the old Linthorpe Road Ground in 1903. The work on the new South Stand took a full year and was completed in 1937, officially opening with the visit of Stoke City on September 4.

Europe was plunged into World War II two years later, one season after Boro had finished third in Division One, thanks to a combination of players like Mannion, Fenton, Hardwick, Forrest and Baxter.

## Keeper Tim the record breaker

BORN at North Ormesby in 1884, Reginald Garnet Williamson was always known as Tim.

He played his early football in the Redcar area and only signed for Boro on the condition he could complete his training as a draughtsman.

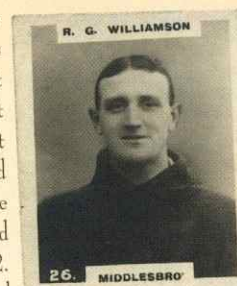
If Tim was concerned about a footballer's career being a short one, he need not have been. His league debut came against Bristol City at the old Linthorpe Road ground in April 1902.

His total of 602 league and cup appearances in his 20-year career remains a club record to this day.

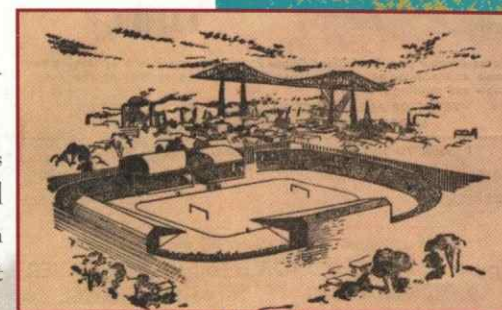
Tim was capped seven times for England, his debut against Ireland in the first full international to be played at Ayresome Park in 1905.

He was only prevented from adding further to his caps by the brilliance of England's Sam Hardy.

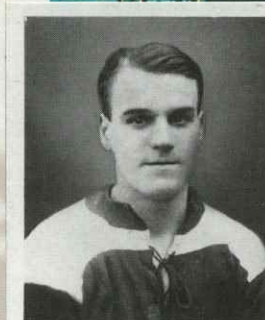
Williamson retired after the 1922-23 season and died in 1943. The only player to have come close to his record since the war is Gordon Jones, with 528 appearances for Boro.

## Boro's true goals king

THE greatest Boro striker of them all, George Camsell's career record of 345 goals in 453 League and FA Cup appearances is truly outstanding.

From his record in internationals, he could also have been one of England's finest as well - if he had only been given the chance more often.

A tally of 18 goals in just nine games should surely have been enough to bring greater recognition.

Camsell's Ayresome career got off to a slow start after signing from Durham City as an outside left for £600 in 1925. A move to Barnsley almost followed before Camsell switched to centre forward, with explosive results.

The team had picked up only one point from the first four games of the 1926-27 season when Camsell was drafted in as centre forward.

His haul of 59 goals that season has only once been bettered, Dixie Dean's 60 goals for Everton the following year.

He went on to be Boro's top scorer for 10 successive seasons (1927-36), narrowly outshooting, in 1935-36, 22-goal winger Ralph Birkett, one of our special guests at Ayresome Park today.

As war enveloped Europe the government decided that, for public morale, it would be beneficial to continue football on a regional basis. Middlesbrough played during the Second World War but the new South Stand, however, was closed from 1939 to September 1945.

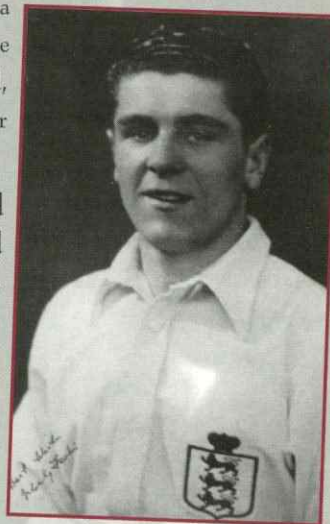
The immediate post-war period saw record crowds flood into British football grounds and Middlesbrough was no exception to this. It was on December 29, 1949 that Middlesbrough's record ground attendance of 53,802 was set at Ayresome Park, the opposition was Newcastle United and Boro won 1-0, with McKennan the scorer.

In 1954 a new roof on the South Stand coincided with the club's relegation to Division Two after a quarter of a century of First Division football. New floodlights, costing £20,119, were installed in the summer of 1957 and a series of floodlit friendlies were played during the season to defray the cost of the floodlights, some of the games attracting crowds well in excess of 30,000.

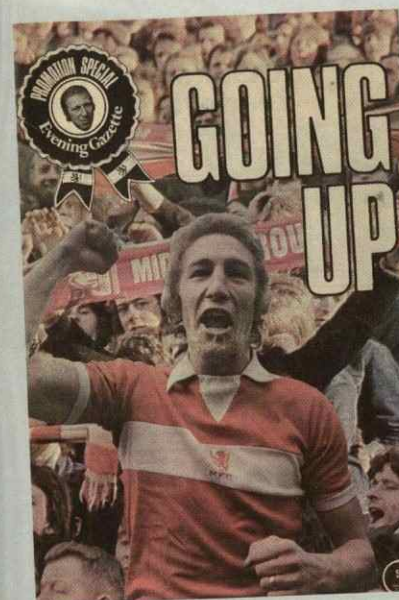
The next great name to excite the fans was goalscoring star Brian Clough, whose strike partnership with Alan Peacock should have brought a return to the top flight, especially with Eddie Holliday, Billy Day, Bill Harris and Mick McNeil in support.

On August 11, 1964 the club announced that Ayresome Park had been chosen as one of the two North-East World Cup venues in July, 1966, after Newcastle United had been forced to pull out following problems with Newcastle City Council.

The Government allocated a grant of £49,200 towards the overall cost of

£125,000 with the club receiving a £30,500 loan repayable over five years for the remainder. The pitch was to be lengthened by one yard to 115 yards (in fact, the current dimensions are 115 yards by 75 yards) to fall in line with World Cup requirements.

Middlesbrough was allocated three matches - USSR v. North Korea, Chile v. North Korea and Italy v. North Korea in the Group Four games.

In May 1966 the East End was covered for the three World Cup games and 4,000 seats were installed in the "Bob

End" reducing the ground capacity to some 42,000 but, by then, the club had been relegated to Division Three. Alas, the extra capacity was not needed, though the USSR's opening 3-0 win over North Korea did attract 22,568 fans, a bigger crowd that had seen any Boro game in the previous year. Almost 19,000 locals witnessed one of the biggest World Cup shocks of all-time when Pak Doo Ik hit the Koreans' winner in a 1-0 success over Italy.

The crowds began to flock back to Ayresome as Boro won immediate promotion back to the Second Division, with 39,683 filling the ground for the last day win over Oxford - an attendance that has never been bettered for a league game since. However, the crowds had faded to a post-war low of just 10,000 in Stan Anderson's final season in charge.

## Gentleman George, the classy captain

WITH his tough-tackling style and film star looks, George Hardwick was one of the best known faces in the game when football resumed after the World War II.

Captain of club and country, the classy left-back - nicknamed Gentleman George - remains today one of the fans' favourite ever stars.

Capped 31 times by England, though many of his appearances were during the war, he usually accompanied Boro teammate Wilf Mannion on his international sojourns.

Hardwick was skipper of a star-studded Boro side that regularly attracted Ayresome crowds of around 40,000. Among the big names of the era were Mannion, Alex McCrae, Micky Fenton, Johnny Spuhler and Harry Bell.

He left Boro in 1950 to join Oldham as player-manager, and later coached the US Seventh Army, PSV Eindhoven, the Dutch FA, Sunderland and Boro juniors.

## The Promotion Years

IF Robbo's boys achieve promotion this season, over half of Boro's seven promotions at Ayresome Park will have occurred in an amazing decade of ups and downs.

Despite the club's long history, the club has never prospered in the cup competitions or won a league title so promotion seasons are the most fondly remembered.

The club was first promoted, to the old First Division, in 1902, a year before the move to Ayresome Park.

A 22-year stay in the top flight ended in 1924 but it took just two years for Boro to bounce back under the management of Herbert Bamlett.

George Camsell propelled Boro to the championship, his 59 league goals the inspiration behind many big wins.

Incredibly, however, relegation came at the end of their first year back in the top flight but Boro - by then under Peter McWilliam's leadership - bounced back for another championship success.

After many years in the top flight, a slide began that hit a low when the club was relegated to the Third Division for the first time in its history in 1966, but the goals of O'Rourke, Hickton and Horsfield powered them back up at the first attempt.

Under Jack Charlton seven years later, the club clinched a long awaited return to the top flight in record-breaking style, thanks to an outstanding defensive record.

Put perhaps the promotions that were most satisfying to Boro fans were the successive elevations of 1987 and 1988 when the club went from the Third to First division in two years with Bruce Rioch at the helm.

Slaven, Pears, Mowbray, Pallister and Ripley were the stars of those campaigns but the club again lost its way until Lennie Lawrence guided them back to the top in 1992 when the likes of Wilkinson and Hendrie had joined many of the old-timers.

Who knows? In years to come the fans may talk about the inspired promotion displays of Steve Vickers, Uwe Fuchs, Alan Moore and Jamie Pollock...

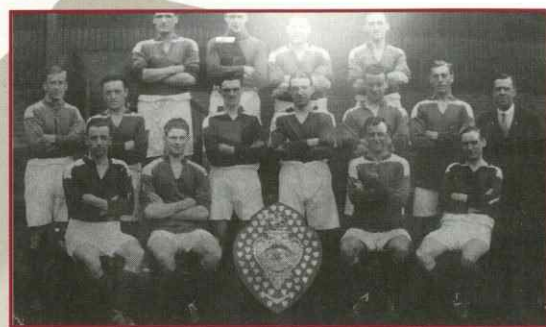

However, the success of Jack Charlton's side in winning promotion with a record points haul in 1973-74 saw big attendances back once again at Ayresome

Park, with over 37,000 turning out for the Tees-Wear derby against Sunderland.

The club continued to prosper with regular crowds of over 20,000 throughout an eight year stay in the top flight, but bad times quickly worsened in the early to mid-1980s, culminating in an average crowd of fractionally over 5,000 during the 1984-85 campaign. When the fans did not return the following season, and with Boro relegated to the Third Division for only the second time in their history, the club looked to be finished.

With the club heavily in debt and in its final death throes the ground was padlocked by the Official Receiver's agent on August 1, 1986. It looked as though Ayresome Park would not

stage any more Football League games.

## Ayresome's top games

SINCE its opening in 1903, Ayresome Park has played host to many top games - including top internationals.

Perhaps the most famous game was North Korea's shock 1-0 World Cup success over Italy in the 1966 World Cup tournament when Boro were a Third Division club.

Two years later, a crowd of over 34,000 packed out Ayresome as a Football League side - including the likes of Hurst, Hunt, Moore and Peters - defeated the Scottish League 2-0.

Previously, three England games had been played at Ayresome Park. The first, a 1-1 draw against Ireland in 1905, saw Boro goalkeeper Tim Williamson scored an unfortunate own goal, while George Elliott was in the England forward line surprisingly beaten 3-0 by the Irish in 1914.

The final England game at Ayresome in 1937 saw the great Stanley Matthews net one of the goals in a 2-1 victory over Wales watched by more than 30,000 supporters.

Nine years earlier, an England trial game saw Boro stars Jackie Carr and George Camsell opposing each other as the first choice team beat 'the rest' 8-3 thanks to five goals from Dixie Dean.

The biggest ever Ayresome attendance for a non-Boro game occurred in 1950 when Wilf Mannion inspired the Football League to a 3-1 success over the Scottish League. The crowd that day was almost 40,000.

The chief groundsmen at Ayresome Park have been Charlie Flintoff, Wilf Atkinson and the current groundsman David Rigg. Under the supervision of the late Wilf Atkinson, who served the club for more than 30 years, the playing surface received and deserved many accolades from visiting teams and officials and was for many years rated the best playing surface in the country, second only to Wembley.

"Rotting girders" in the North Stand were reported in the summer of 1993 which must have hastily pre-empted the club's decision to look for pastures new and here we are, less than two years later, about to leave the "Old Lady of Middlesbrough", our beloved Ayresome Park.

What will become of it in the months to come is not yet clear but there can be little doubt that going to watch the Boro will never be quite the same again.
