For many periods in the game from box to box we coped, matched, and even at times dominated small parts of the game, but in the end the game revolves around play inside the two 18-yard boxes.



We must carry these emotions and determination on to the pitch and things will change for the better in a very short period of time. Be patient, keep cheering and the smile will return to everyone's face.

AROUND THE TOWN

IN an attempt to assist opponents, spectators and the media, the Football League have announced a new procedure to be used by all 72 Endsleigh League clubs from this season concerning the introduction of a substitute during the half-time interval.

Prior to the start of the second half, the number of the substituted player is to be shown with the usual numbered board and the substitute will then enter the field of play at the half-way line. Clubs will still be able to name and use three substitutes, although there is now no stipulation that a goalkeeper has to be one of those nominated.

All clubs in the Endsleigh League will have the shirt numbering of 1 to 14, and goalkeepers are no longer required to wear shorts and stockings of the same colour as other members of their team.

Steve Baines from Chesterfield, who played for Nottingham Forest, Huddersfield Town, Bradford City, Walsall, Scunthorpe United and Bury during his 13-year playing career, joins 10 other new referees.

League designates new season as 'School Year'

FOLLOWING quickly on the heels of the Government initiative aimed at raising the provisions for sport in schools, the Football League has moved speedily with its own response by officially designating the new 1995/96 season as 'School Year'.

Designed to strengthen the already extensive links between the League's 72 member clubs and their local schools, this latest move is intended to put into practice many of the principles outlined in Prime Minister John Major's Sport Policy Statement entitled 'Sport: Raising The Game', which was unveiled only last month.







ROB MURRAY - Born in London, and is a former Bournemouth trainee. Made his league debut in 1992, with 12 league appearances in 1993/94. But last season he made 30 league appearances and six cup appearances.

STEPHEN ROBINSON - Centre-forward born in Northern Ireland, who has played for the Irish Under 15, 16, 18 and 21 teams. Played for Tottenham, and was signed by Bournemouth in 1994, scoring five goals in 35 league and cup appearances last season.

STEVE JONES - Started his playing career with Billericay before being spotted by ex-Bournemouth manager Harry Redknapp in November 1992 who promptly signed him for West Ham. Made his West Ham debut in 1993, and signed for the Cherries in October 1994 finishing the season as leading scorer with nine goals.

MATTHEW HOLLAND - Another ex-Hammer who signed for Bournemouth, after a loan spell, in April 1995.

SCOTT MEAN - Midfielder who joined Bournemouth as a trainee in September 1990, turning professional almost two years later. Made his debut in 1992, and last season made 40 league appearances.

RUSSELL BEARDMORE - Born in Wigan, and a product of Manchester United's youth system, winning five England Under 21 caps during 1988/89. After losing his United place he went on loan to Blackburn, and then joined the Cherries in 1993. Made 50 league and cup appearances last season.

JASON BRISSETT - Played for Arsenal and Peterborough before signing for Bournemouth in December 1994, going on to make 24 appearances last season.

MARK RAWLINSON - Midfielder who is another newcomer to the Bournemouth squad this season. Formerly with Manchester United, and played in the United A team which won the Lancashire League. Was a substitute in the 1993 FA Youth Cup Final, and turned pro that year.

MARCUS OLDBURY - Local lad and another of this season's new signings. Played for Bournemouth as a schoolboy and professionally for Norwich before returning to the Cherries.

JOHN BAILEY - Midfielder who has signed for the new season from non-league Enfield. Previously with Dagenham before they merged with Redbridge.

NEIL YOUNG - Right-back who developed in the junior team at Tottenham, during which time he enjoyed a loan spell in Sweden. Signed for Bournemouth in 1994, and last season made 32 league and four cup appearances.

Meet the Manager

MEL MACHIN became manager of AFC Bournemouth in September 1994 when the club was bottom of Division Two and facing relegation.

However, under his leadership the club achieved an amazing turnaround and succeeded in ending the 1994/95 season above the relegation zone.


During his playing days, Mel Machin was a fullback, making his league debut with Port Vale in 1963 and later playing for Gillingham, Bournemouth and Norwich.

After retiring as a player, he turned to coaching and joined the Norwich staff. He remained in that post until taking his first managerial position with Manchester City.

He joined Manchester City in May 1987, leading the club back into a mid-table position in the first division two years later.

After leaving Maine Road in November 1989 he was back in the game two months later as manager of Barnsley, resigning at Oakwell in 1993.

Assistant manager JOHN WILLIAMS was born in Liverpool and started his playing career in 1978 with Tranmere Rovers. He moved to Port Vale in 1985 and then to Bournemouth where he was a member of the 1986/87 team which won the third division championship. He returned to Bournemouth as youth coach in 1994, and was appointed Machin's assistant at the start of this season.

A Hatter and ...a Cherry

Son of a pre-war Derby star, JOHN GROVES was destined to become a professional footballer and despite the attentions of a few sides in the Midlands, Luton manager Dally Duncan jumped into sign the young inside forward just before his 16th birthday.

The fact that Duncan and Arthur Groves were old friends and team-mates at the Baseball Ground in the 1930s probably helped in the negotiations!

After signing professional forms at 17 and then entering National Service, John finally made his league debut in a 2-1 win at Leeds in April 1954.

Reverting to wing-half, undoubtedly his best position, he went on to make over 250 appearances for the Town with the FA Cup Final appearance in 1959 the highlight.

"Although I enjoyed the experience I took the defeat hard," recalled John. "After the first 20 minutes of the game we seemed to have all the play. It was ridiculous as we went on, to imagine we could be beaten. But it was not Luton's day and no doubt many other players have felt the same way I did."

At the end of the 1961/62 season he was offered to Brighton by manager Sam Bartram




in exchange for Ken Nicholas but the deal fell through, although it was only a further 12 months before he made his way to the south coast signing for Bournemouth in a £2,750 transfer.


John enjoyed two seasons at Dean Court under Reg Flewin, making 54 league appearances before a back injury forced him to give up the professional game.

Now back in his native Derby, John still pays the occasional visit to Kenilworth Road especially when Derby County are the visitors. - Roger Wash.







Cup clashes with the Cherries

WE have only met tonight's visitors Bournemouth once before in cup competition with, coincidentally, their last appearance at Kenilworth Road coming in an FA Cup replay in 1969 when both sides were in Division Three.

The sides had already met each other twice in the 1969/70 season when they were drawn out of the hat together in an FA Cup first round tie at Dean Court.

The Town enjoyed the upper hand in league clashes with Malcolm MacDonald scoring his first goal for the Hatters in a 1-0 win on the south coast in August, followed by a dour 0-0 draw at Kenilworth Road in front of a best-of-the-season crowd of 18,065 two months later.

The Town had only been defeated once in the league by the time of the cup clash, but had been knocked off top spot following a string of three 1-1 draws on the trot. Bournemouth meanwhile were struggling at the wrong end of

the table, and a Luton victory at the first time of asking was heavily predicted.

As is so often the case however, the Town failed to live up to their top billing and were very grateful to have a second bite at the Cherries following a drab 1-1 draw watched by a crowd of 7,362 including two train loads from Luton.

The Cherries took the lead after 10 minutes through Trevor Hartley, later to become a coach at Kenilworth Road, and for the remainder of the first half the Town defence backpedalled and looked very fragile in the face of a Bournemouth forward line, ably led by Ted MacDougal.

Whenever the Luton forwards attacked, the ball invariably fell to the feet of Graham French who was given some rough treatment by Cherries full-back Terry Gulliver, who eventually achieved his aim when French was led off suffering from concussion.

It was therefore a surprise when John Collins equalised for the Town just before the interval, being in the right place to head home a long

cross.

The second period was best forgotten as the Town fought for a replay, but it was only good goalkeeping from Sandy Davie, and the woodwork, that kept the Bournemouth forwards at bay and it was a relieved squad that returned to Kenilworth Road for the return game the following Tuesday.

The club was fully expecting a crowd of 20,000 for the replay, but when 'only' 13,384 turned up the recriminations went on for days afterwards in the local press! The 7,000 that stayed away missed a treat however, as the Town players put on a much more dominant show to end the dismal run of draws.

Before the game had properly warmed up though, Bournemouth took the lead when Jim White, taking advantage of the only Cherries raid before the break, hit an opportunist shot past Davie in the third minute.

The Town roared back and forced several corners with Matt Tees and MacDonald going close before the pressure paid off and Collins levelled on the half hour. The same player put the Town ahead six minutes later turning in a hard cross from Keith Allen.

The game was put beyond doubt with the second half only two minutes old, when MacDonald headed home a teasing cross from French. And with Gulliver booked by a less lenient referee for being over zealous in his pursuit of French once again, the Luton winger then went on to enjoy a lot more of the ball, and his clever promptings should have led to more goals as the Town dominated the remainder of the game.

The reward for this victory was a trip to non-league Hillingdon Borough and a sure-fire place with the 'big boys' in round three. Unfortunately most of us know what happened next!




