



WELCOME TO 'THE HATTERS'

It's been a disappointing start to the season under new manager Terry Westley, who took over from David Pleat. The opening game was lost 3-1 at home to Norwich and then, of course, the Hatters struggled to gain a draw against Bournemouth last Tuesday.

Fortunately for the Hatters, they had amassed plenty of points by April last season as they suffered a poor run-in. They lost their last four games to finish 16th in Division 1.

LUTON TOWN FOOTBALL CLUB WAS FORMED IN 1885
It took until September 3 to record their first victory, a Dwight Marshall goal being enough to beat Port Vale away.

A series of good results got them into a play-off position by the end of November. A 2-1 victory at Swindon lifted them to fifth. That was the only time they occupied a play-off place, though, as in the next game, they crashed 6-3 at home to Sheffield

United. The Hatters did enough to hover around the top ten for the rest of the season, until that terrible finish.

At the end of the season, David Pleat left to take over at Sheffield Wednesday, Terry Westley replacing him at Kenilworth Road with Mick McGiven as his assistant. They inherited a good side who play attractive football and who could well mount a serious assault on the play-offs this season once the new players settle in.



THE MANAGER

TERRY WESTLEY

Terry Westley was appointed manager of Luton Town in July 1995, following the departure of David Pleat to Sheffield Wednesday. Mr Westley stepped up from his role of youth team coach, a position he held at Kenilworth Road since 1991, to become the club's 20th manager. On Ipswich Town's books as a youth team player, Terry Westley played non-league football at Bury St Edmunds and Diss Town, and was player-manager at the latter. He returned to Ipswich in 1988 to take over their A school of Excellence, before David Pleat brought him to Luton in 1991. Since then he has been responsible for the Luton Town youth side, in a period which has seen the likes of John Hartson and Kelvin Davis

ASSISTANT

Mick McGIVEN Newcastle-born Mick McGiven joined the Hatters as assistant to Terry Westley in July 1995. He started his playing career with Sunderland and made 113 league appearances for them, and also played for England Under-23s.

He moved to West Ham, but after four years and 48 league games, injury ended his playing career in 1977 and he became John Lyall's assistant.

McGiven and Lyall moved to Ipswich five years ago and within two years the partnership had steered Ipswich back into the Premiership, and McGiven then took over as team manager from Lyall.

Under his guidance Ipswich reached two quarter-finals of both the FA and Littlewoods Cups, and only after he left were the Portman Road side relegated from the top flight.

THE PLAYERS

Kelvin DAVIS Kelvin is a highly-rated keeper who made his league debut for the Hatters on the final day of the 1993/94 season in a 2-2 draw at Stoke.

He spent a month on loan at Torquay in September/October 1994, playing in Division Three and in the Coca-Cola Cup against Wimbledon, before winning a place in the Luton starting line-up in March.

With Juergen Sommer on international duty, Kelvin made his home debut in the televised 'derby' with Watford, saving a penalty in the 1-1 draw. He kept his place until the end of the season, and also won two England youth caps.

Kelvin was selected for the England Under-21 squad for the Toulon Tournament in June 1995. Signed new four-year contract in June 1995.

Richard HARVEY Richard resurrected his Town career in 1994/95 after two years plagued by injury.

The former England youth international missed the entire 1993/94 season after a cruciate knee ligament operation, and made his first appearance of the following campaign at Barnsley in January.

His appearance at home to Watford in March 1995 was his first at Kenilworth Road for three years, and he held the left-back position for the remainder of the season.

Agreed a new contract in the summer of 1995.

Marvin JOHNSON

Marvin made his Football League debut against Wimbledon in 1988, and quickly established himself as a versatile defender.

Started the 1994/95 season at left-back, but then switched to the centre of defence to form a reliable partnership with Trevor Peake.

Marvin was one of only three players to play in every first-team match last season, and was awarded the Players' Player of the Year trophy.

TODAY'S VISITORS

THE PLAYERS

Mitchell THOMAS The former England Under-21 international made over 100 appearances for Luton before moving to Spurs, shortly after David Pleat, in 1986. He played in the 1987 FA Cup Final, and later moved to West Ham. He was on loan at Luton in the 1993/94 season before a permanent free transfer move, and after missing the start of the season through suspension was a regular at left-back in the 1994/95 campaign.

Ceri HUGHES Ceri was a regular in the Town midfield in the 1993/94 season, and his performances earned a call-up to the full Welsh side. He made his Luton debut at Aston Villa in 1990, and has also represented his country at youth and Under-21 levels.

Scored seven goals in the 1993/94 season, but damaged ligaments against Grimsby in November 1994 and was ruled out for the rest of the campaign after just eight league starts.

Dwight MARSHALL Dwight signed in the summer of 1994 from Plymouth for £150,000, after scoring 14 goals for Peter Shilton's side the previous season-his third campaign at Home Park after playing non league football with Grays Athletic.

Started well for Luton, with two goals in the 5-1 win over Middlesbrough in October, and despite being troubled by a shin injury late in the season he finished at the Hatters' leading scorer with 13 goals in league and cup.

John TAYLOR John joined Luton on deadline day in March 1995, for £200,000 from Bradford City. He started his career at Colchester, but was later snapped up by Cambridge from non-league Sudbury. He scored 46 goals in 160 appearances for Cambridge before a move to Bristol Rovers, where he netted 44 goals in 95 appearances. The centre-forward had scored 13 goals for Bradford before his move to Luton, and he added three goals for the Hatters before the end of the season after making his debut on March 26 against Watford.

Graham ALEXANDER Graham joined the Hatters in July 1995, and was Terry Westley's first signing after being confirmed as Luton's new manager.

The Town coaching staff had been watching him for two seasons before deciding to make their move, with the fee in the region of £100,000, with further payments depending on appearances.

Steve DAVIS Steve joined the Hatters in the summer of 1995 after making over 160 league appearances for Burnley, scoring 22 goals.

He joined the Turf Moor side in August 1991 for £60,000 from Southampton, after loan spells at Burnley and Notts County.

He captained Burnley during their rise up the league into Division One, and played in both their victories over Luton in the 1994/95 season.

David OLDFIELD David returned to Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1995, six years after leaving Luton Town. He started his career with the Hatters, progressing through the junior ranks to a two-goal senior debut in a 2-1 Simod Cup win at Everton in February 1988. He also scored on his full league debut in a 2-1 home win over Watford in May 1988, and went on to make 29 league appearances for the Hatters, scoring four goals.

Australian-born Oldfield, who played for England Under-21s, joined Manchester City for £600,000 in March 1989, before moving on to Leicester City.

Bontcho GUENTCHEV The Bulgarian international signed for the Hatters after being released by Ipswich. The 31-year-old striker, who played in the 1994 World Cup Finals in the USA when Bulgaria reached the semi-finals, had been at Ipswich for three seasons playing 58 games in the Premier League. He arrived on a free transfer after being released by the Portman Road club, but his wife's employment at the Bulgarian Embassy now means he is free to continue playing in the UK.

Scott OAKES Scott joined Luton in October 1991, along with Des Linton, and made his debut for the Hatters at Norwich later that month. His performances for the Hatters in the 1994 FA Cup run attracted much interest from Premiership clubs, but he has since signed a new contract for the Town. The England Under-21 international was Luton's leading scorer that season with 13 goals, including a hat-trick in the FA Cup sixth round replay win over West Ham. He scored ten goals in the 1994/95 season.



TODAY'S VISITORS

A warm welcome to tonight's visitors, Luton Town, who are playing their first competitive game here at Dean Court since 1969.

A crowd of 9,735 turned up at Dean Court on August 16 1969 for a third division game, Luton winning by the only goal of the game. It certainly marked the start of a good season for our visitors as they went on to finish second behind Orient to gain promotion. Bournemouth meanwhile finished fourth from bottom and were relegated for the first time ever to Division Four.

Since then, Luton have visited Dean Court for friendlies, the last time on August 15, 1990 when the score finished up 1-1. During a friendly against the Hatters in 1985 here, we were able to witness the power of Colin Clarke who scored twice in an exciting victory for the Cherries.

Luton have spent most of their Football League life in the Second Division, and now the First Division, though they have tasted life in every Division except the Premier League. Their last taste of life at the top ended in 1992 just before the reorganisation of the League. That ended a spell that stretched from 1982 after they won the second division championship, eight points clear of local rivals Watford. During their first season back in the First Division, they signed Trevor Aylott from Millwall for £65,000. Trevor stayed at Kenilworth Road for 16 months, making a total of 35 appearances for Luton, scoring 11 goals before moving on to Crystal Palace.

This was not Luton's first taste of Division 1 football, they had previously been there from 1955 to 1960 and for the 74-75 season, but this was by far their best period in the top flight. At the end of the 86-87 season, they finished in their highest ever position, seventh under manager John Moore, and then for the 87-88 season, led by the now Blackburn team manager, Ray Harford, they won their first major trophy. This success came in the League Cup. After beating Wigan, Coventry, Ipswich, Bradford and Oxford they defeated Arsenal 3-2 in a memorable final. The following season, they made it back to Wembley in the same competition but couldn't repeat the success, going down 3-1 to Nottingham Forest.

In the FA cup, they've been to Wembley twice, losing both times. Again, Nottingham Forest were the opponents, this time in the 1959 final where Luton lost 2-1. They were back at Wembley as recently as 1994 for an FA Cup semi-final tie against Chelsea. Ex Bournemouth player, Gavin Peacock, scored twice for Chelsea to end Luton's dreams. The season almost ended in total disaster for Luton as their league form slumped and they just managed to avoid relegation by two points.

The links between the two clubs are few and far between. The last player to play for both clubs was Richard Cooke. After over two years at Dean Court, he signed for Luton in March 1989 after catching many clubs' eyes with his performances for the Cherries against Manchester United. He stayed at Kenilworth Road for two years but made just three full league appearances plus 14 on the bench, scoring once. He rejoined Bournemouth on a free transfer in March 1991.

The future is looking bright for Luton Town, they have ambitious plans for a revolutionary new stadium, and despite the loss of manager David Pleat, have a squad that could see them challenge for a play off place this season. They certainly gained rave reviews last season for their exciting, entertaining style of play, so we should be in for a good game tonight.



CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE


Much of my post over the last few weeks has been letters from supporters expressing concern over the new stewarding arrangements at the ground.

Firstly, we have moved to an external company, as we are a football club, and not in the business of security. the administration necessary to arrange in-house stewarding caused considerable strain to our staff, at periods when they needed to be busy on other matchday matters.

It has always been the aim of the local Police Authority, that stewards replace policemen at the ground with the exception of high risk games. Policemen are expensive and are better employed on other duties. To achieve this, everyone must be satisfied that stewards are (a) adequate (b) fully-trained and most importantly (c) are performing the duties specified under the law relating to football grounds.

I admit that there are still teething problems, but these are addressed as your letters are received. The major problem at the moment is the lack of local stewards, particularly those who last year were stewards, but have decided not to come forward this year. Each match has a specified number of required stewards, and with the lack of local volunteers, our security company are bound to draft in personnel from other parts of their organisation, none of whom are familiar with our ground, and some who are unused to stewarding at football grounds.

We will continue to work at this issue, but it would be helpful if the 'missing' stewards from last year were to re-appear

NOSTALGIA

AFCB - League Cup 1st Round - The Last 20 years

75-76: Bournemouth lost in both legs to Plymouth. The first, at Home Park, ended 2-0 to Plymouth while at Dean Court, an early Derek Rickard goal gave the Cherries hope, but the Pilgrims hit back with two goals.

76-77: Out of the Cup at the first stage to another Devon side. After a goalless draw at Dean Court, Torquay knocked out Bournemouth 1-0 at Plainmoor.

77-78: Bournemouth were paired with Third Division Hereford and lost 2-0 at Edgar Street. Only 2,198 turned up at Dean Court for the return leg and many people missed a classic game. Derek Showers had already put Bournemouth ahead when the United keeper was sent off. Goals from Frank Barton, Peter Johnson and Jack Howarth were replied with by two from Hereford. No away goals rule so a third game was played at Edgar Street where a last-minute goal from Frank Barton gave the Cherries a 2-1 victory and set up a game with QPR.

78-79: A 1-0 home defeat by Exeter was followed by a fighting 1-1 draw at St James Park, Alan Weeks scoring for Bournemouth. Despite a good all-round performance, Bournemouth bowed out.

79-80: Bournemouth faced the daunting task of a trip to Swansea who were on their way to the top. The task proved to be too big as the Welsh side crushed Bournemouth 4-1. Our consolation goal came from Brian Chambers. Bournemouth gained a respectable 0-0 draw at Dean Court in the second leg.

80-81: Bournemouth were paired with Swindon and the sides fight out an entertaining 1-1 draw at Dean Court, Steve Massey scoring for the Cherries. At the County Ground, the score was 0-0 at full-time, but the Cherries were finally beaten 2-0 after extra time.

81-82: In our promotion season, Third Division Fulham provided the opposition and won 1-0 at Dean Court. Two late goals at Craven Cottage gave Fulham a 3-0 aggregate victory.

82-83: Bournemouth were beaten 2-0 at Plymouth in the first leg and were given a mountain to climb. A brilliant performance in the second leg, though, gave the Cherries a tie against Manchester United. Goals from Phil Brignull, Trevor Morgan and Tony Funnell made it a memorable night for the 3,352 crowd.

83-84: Bournemouth crashed out again in the first round, but not without a good show. Bristol Rovers were the opposition and the Pirates gained a 2-1 victory at Dean Court, Trevor Morgan scoring for the Cherries. At Eastville a seesaw game ended up 2-2, Phil Brignull and Milton Graham scoring for Bournemouth.

84-85: Bournemouth travelled to the Recreation Ground at Aldershot full of confidence after the opening victory over Derby. Fourth Division Aldershot, though, turned the form book upside down with a 4-0 victory and then sealed the tie with a 1-0 victory at Dean Court.

85-86: A quite fantastic first round by the Cherries. Reading were the opponents and they broke all records for consecutive victories at the start of the season on their way to the championship. This didn't deter Bournemouth, though, as we travelled to Elm Park and witnessed a brilliant 3-1 win. A superb individual performance by Colin Clarke saw him grab two goals, his second a 30-yard screamer and Ian Thompson hit the other. At Dean Court, goals from Colin Russell and Thompson rounded off a remarkable 5-1 aggregate win and set up a tie against champions Everton.

86-87: No such excitement the following season. Bristol City won 1-0 at Dean Court and at Ashton Gate, Bournemouth were heading for victory by the same score courtesy of a Trevor Aylott goal until a late City goal ended Bournemouth's interest in the competition.

87-88: Fourth Division Exeter surprised everyone by gaining a deserved draw at Dean Court thanks to a late penalty. David Armstrong had given Second Division Cherries the lead. At St James Park, there was to be no upset, though, as goals from Mark Newson, Trevor Aylott and Richard Cooke gave Bournemouth a 3-1 win and set up a never-to-be-forgotten tie with Southampton.

88-89: Two dour games against Bristol Rovers. The only goal of either tie came in the very last minute at Dean Court when Trevor Aylott netted to set up a tie against Coventry.

89-90: A bit of history this year. Due to our high standard in Division 2 the previous season, for the only time, Bournemouth went straight through to the next round to play Crewe.

90-91: A superb 1-0 victory at St Andrews, courtesy of a Luther Blissett goal, put Bournemouth firmly in the driving seat against Birmingham. They also kept the upper hand at Dean Court with another Blissett goal. A late penalty from the Blues late on couldn't stop Bournemouth progressing to the next round and a date with Millwall.

91-92: More early round success for Bournemouth. Cardiff were the opponents and by the time Bournemouth played them at Dean Court, we were a goal behind. In an exciting match at Ninian Park, the Welsh side won 3-2, Paul Morell scoring from 25 yards and Richard Cooke grabbing the second. City were no match for the Cherries at Dean Court as they lost 4-1. Alex Watson, Jimmy Quinn and Andy Jones (2) scoring to set up a game with Middlesbrough.

92-93: A disappointing exit at the hands of Walsall. Mark Morris scored at the Bescot Stadium to gain a 1-1 draw, but a last-minute goal from the Saddlers at Dean Court ended Bournemouth's interest in the Cup.

93-94: Cardiff again were the opponents and again they were soundly beaten at Dean Court. Goals from Neil Masters, Russell Beardmore and Steve Fletcher set Bournemouth up with a 3-1 win. At Ninian Park, an early own goal from Mark Morris was cancelled out by a great strike from Joe Parkinson. From then on, there was only one team in it and Bournemouth dominated the game without adding to the score. Blackburn were our opponents in the next round.

94-95: The only bit of good news during the opening stages of last season was the League Cup. Two victories over Northampton set up a tie with Chelsea. Kevin Russell and Steve Cotterill scoring in the 2-0 home victory, and Cotterill getting the only goal at the County Ground.

95-96: A good performance earned Bournemouth a 1-1 draw at Luton and set up tonight's second leg. Steve Jones put the Cherries in front.





IN MY OPINION

If we are to believe what we read, all is not well at the Goldstone Ground. Brighton have put their ground up for sale in an attempt to clear debts approaching £4 million. If this wasn't bad enough, the Seagulls lost their first two matches of the season.

Their Coca-Cola Cup defeat by third division Fulham last Tuesday was too much for many of their travelling supporters to take. After the match, Liam Brady required a police escort while leaving the pitch as the Albion fans turned on their manager.

Does this sound familiar? Not at this club it doesn't. No Bournemouth manager has ever required police protection from his own supporters and, let's face it, our patience has been severely tested in recent times.

Even early last season, when the team were conceding three goals a game and generally being outplayed, the fans rallied around the players.

When we lost 3-0 at home to Peterborough a year ago, the club were without a chairman or a manager. Yet the supporters gave the players a standing ovation at full-time. What we would have given to be in the situation Brighton are in now.

Having travelled to watch Bournemouth at Luton last week, all I can say is that with a little luck, we are in for a very good season. For most of the game, Luton were second best.

No club can always be successful. Even the very best struggle from time to time. When this happens, loyalty is needed more than ever. As was the case at Dean Court last season, if everybody pulls in the right direction, nothing is impossible.

The Brighton 'supporters' would do well to remember this.



PHYSIO'S REPORT



Just one problem from the first leg at Luton. Steve Fletcher twisted his left knee and possibly "pinched" a cartilage. This injury is not serious and won't affect him long term. He wasn't able to train last week and after a course of treatment, he's resting.

Neil Young stretched his groin, but he's fine now. He's still receiving treatment, but has no real problems.

With the new rules that have come in this season, when Steve went off at Luton, I had to do a quick assessment off the field and I put him on ice. Then I had to keep an eye on the game and Steve got changed. He came to the treatment room next morning and I've been treating him from there.

In the case of Mark Morris, who went off hurt at Bradford, I went out to assess the problem and because it was a head injury, he was taken off to see the doctor as the rules at the moment mean that I can't treat that sort of injury. There are moves now where we can go on a course so that we can treat head injuries.

In the case of a serious injury, like Steve Cotterill last season, I will go with the player to the treatment room and the doctor takes over from there. Obviously, my place during a game is on the bench, so I have to get back as soon as possible. But if I am away, or the other physio is away, then we cover for each other.

As a physio, I enjoy the game, but always have one eye on what is going on all over the pitch. You have to keep your eye on everything, not just where the ball is. I'm certainly on edge all the time.





