## THAT SCORING RATE MUST IMPROVE

**I**t was a bit of the old Chinese water torture on Saturday, after conceding a goal through bad defending in the second minute, to then have to watch as a succession of chances came and went. We certainly had enough of the play and enough opportunities not to have been beaten. But again there wasn't the quality on the final pass, the final cross or on the finish when the chances did arrive that we need to break teams down when they come here to defend in depth.

Apart from the result, however, there were some pleasing things to come out of the game because we did play quite well and as I've said we did create chances which wasn't the case against Southend. But six goals scored in six games isn't enough and we've got to work to put that right. When you're not scoring many it does put extra pressure on the defence, which in spite of that early lapse on Saturday has been outstanding. Clearly we can't rely on winning games 1-0 every week, the scoring rate has to improve.

Having said all that, my message to the lads before tonight's game will be to remember the good things we did on Saturday, concentrate from the kick-off so we don't concede a stupid goal and then if we play like we did for the rest of the game we should be OK.


Alex Rae starts his suspension tonight, so Maurice Doyle will come back into midfield for him. Whilst we've got a strong squad in terms of the overall quality, we haven't got the numbers we once had so we can't afford too many injuries and suspensions at once. Ricky Newman has done a great job a right-back in the absence of Mickey Bennett, but Benno will be training again later this week and I'm looking forward to getting him back.

We've had a few draws in recent games against Luton and I'm certainly hoping that we can do better than that tonight. They've not made the best of starts and got beaten 3-1 on Saturday, but then Barnsley came here on the back of a 5-0 home defeat so we'll not read anything into that. As I've said before every team that comes to The Den sets out to make life very difficult for us, just as we do to opponents when we go to their grounds. It goes without saying that if we have ambitions to reach the Premiership, which we do, we have to start winning our home games. The away victories have given us a great start but we're desperate to entertain our fans here and the best way to start would be with a convincing win against Luton tonight.



### David has a point to prove

There are two players in the current Luton set-up who will be keen to prove a point or two to Lions boss Mick McCarthy. The first is former Leicester City midfielder David Oldfield. Oldfield rejoined the Hatters - where he started his career - this summer for £150,000 after returning to Filbert Street having spent the last two months of last season on loan at the New Den.

The 27-year-old Aussie born player was brought in by McCarthy as a makeshift striker, and his record of 6 goals in 17 games could well have earned him a permanent move.

But Oldfield's efforts were not enough to prevent the Lions season finishing on a low note, and McCarthy decided against taking him onto the staff as he radically re-shaped his squad. The second is ex-Crystal Palace full-back Darren Patterson, who is hoping to be fit enough to figure in tonight's game following his £150,000 switch to Kenilworth Road last month. At the beginning of last season Patterson, then unable to command a regular first team spot at Selhurst Park, had a trial with the Lions which eventually came to nothing.

But having returned to the Eagles Patterson finally got his first team chance, and became a regular in the Palace side which reached the FA Cup semi-finals last season.

Elsewhere the Hatters have World Cup pedigree up front. Bulgarian international Bontcho Guentchev played in USA 94 as his country proved the dark horses of the tournament, knocking out West Germany on their way to the semi-finals.

After 58 Premiership appearances for Ipswich Guentchev was given a free transfer by the Portman Road club following relegation at the end of last season.

That could have meant the 31-year-old striker would have to go and ply his trade outside the UK, but fortunately Guentchev's wife's job at the Bulgarian embassy allowed him to stay and Luton were happy to give him a chance to continue in English football.

Following the departure of Kasey Keller's American international rival keeper Juergen Sommer to QPR for £450,000 a fortnight ago, youngster Kelvin Davis now has a real chance to make his mark in the First Division.

Davis broke into the side in March, saving a penalty against Watford in his televised debut, and was then called into the England U21 squad for this summer's Toulon tournament.

Elsewhere evergreen club captain Trevor Peake is still going strong at the centre of defence in his 16th year as a senior professional.

Alongside him Hatters manager Terry Westley has Republic of Ireland U21 defender Scott Greene and £750,000 buy from Burnley Steve Davis to choose from.

Ex-West Ham and Spurs man Mitchell Thomas and Richard Harvey fight it out for the left-back slot and Fans Player of the Year Julian James and Des Linton fight it out on the left.

Welsh international Ceri Hughes and England U21 Scott Oakes, who will unfortunately miss

tonight's game through suspension and injury, are the driving forces in the middle of the park, hoping to supply the ammunition for last season's leading scorer, former Plymouth striker Dwight Marshall.

### New recruits

As at the New Den, there has been no shortage of transfer activity at Kenilworth Road as the new season got under way. Former boss David Pleat had already recruited former Ipswich midfielder Gavin Johnson on a free transfer and signed Steve Davis from Burnley, pending a tribunal, before departing. New boss Terry Westley was only just installed when tribunal ordered Luton to pay £750,000 for Davis rather than the original offer of £300,000, but that shock hasn't put him off wielding the cheque book.

His first signing in July was midfielder Graham Alexander from Scunthorpe for £100,000, and then Bontcho Guentchev joined former Portman Road colleague Johnson, again on a free. Since then the club have splashed out £150,000 on Darren Patterson from Crystal Palace, and following the £450,000 sale of Juergen Sommer to QPR Westley is believed to be in the market for another goalkeeper.

And the wheeling and dealing may not stop there. After the acrimonious departure of former midfield favourite David Preece to Derby - chairman David Keohler is threatening legal action over a tribunal ruling that the player should be given a free transfer - Westley has travelled to Denmark in search of a new midfield play-maker.

### Bye bye Kenilworth Road

There are clubs up and down the country hoping to move to purpose built stadiums, but Luton's plans for a new home must rank among the most ambitious.

The club have already received outline planning permission for a new super stadium just off Junction 10 of the M1, on the outskirts of the town.

But Luton aren't just looking to build a football ground for the 1990's.

Under the current proposals the stadium will be covered by a giant roof and feature removable grass, just like that used by some venues during World Cup USA 94.

### Terry takes control

If you asked anyone outside Luton who Terry Westley was last season chances are you would have drawn a blank.

Until his rapid promotion to the Kenilworth Road hotseat this summer Westley was in charge of the Luton youth team, nurturing the likes of Arsenal's John Hartson and Hatters keeper Kelvin Davis.

But when David Pleat quit the Hatters to take over at Sheffield Wednesday chairman David Keohler decided against joining in the managerial merry-go-round and plumped for a Luton insider.

After a playing career with non-League Bury St Edmunds and Diss Town, whom he later managed, Westley headed Ipswich Town's School of Excellence before Pleat brought him to Luton in 1991. And although Luton have made a mediocre start to the new campaign, the new boss believes he will enjoy the sweet smell of success by the end of the season.

"We see ourselves as a top six side," he insisted.

"We have missed key players and haven't defended too well but I'm confident we can get things sorted out."

### DID YOU KNOW?

\* Luton were the first professional team in the south of England, paying the whole team, plus an allowance for working time lost travelling to away games, from 1891.

\* Having lost the 1959 Cup Final 2-1 to Nottingham Forest as a First Division team, the Hatters found themselves relegated to the old Fourth Division within six years.

\* When Luton notched up their 8-2 win over Sunderland at Kenilworth Road in 1955, the Wearsiders were First Division leaders. There first four goals came within nine minutes of the start, Bob Morton hitting a hat-trick.

\* Post war hero Joe Payne was not the only prolific goalscorer to make the journey from Luton to Chelsea. Local boy Hugh Billington had registered four hat-tricks in the 1938 season before war intervened, and added another three trebles for the Hatters before moving to Stamford Bridge in 1948.

\* In February 1993 Luton equalled a 70 year club record by completing seven games without conceding a goal after beating Charlton 1-0 in Division One.




## How 61 Goals were Scored

## That extra mile



Have you ever been 'to hell and back' for the purpose of seeing the Lions play. If you have a story similar to the one below in which you really have made the ultimate sacrifice of time and effort (and indeed money!) just to watch Millwall play in some remote part of this green and pleasant land write to:- 'THAT EXTRA MILE', MILLWALL PROGRAMME, THE DEN, ZAMPA ROAD, LONDON SE16 3LH.

"The rain poured down. The night was closing in. It had been raining all day. It was 6.00pm on a Monday night, the 5th October 1964 at Ellesmere Port where I had been sent to do a week's work at an oil terminal.

I had left Mile End at 5.00am, and covered the 150 miles by car to start work at 9.00am. The day's work over, it was now time to "knock off" and my two work mates knew the best pubs. 'What do you mean, you're not coming', they said! I have got to go to Southport I stuttered - it's my gran, she lives there and I have to see her urgently.

'What in this weather they chorussed. You're mad!' I couldn't reveal just how mad by telling them I was going to see a football match between Southport and Millwall kicking off in just one hours time. But you all know the feeling. When our team is playing, the urge gets you and nothing, just nothing is going to stand in the way. At times it is madness, just like on that occasion, sheer madness, but that's why football makes people take leave of their senses. It brooks no logic or reason. The rain was still pouring down and time was getting on.

After being relegated back to Div 4 we had started well and were lying 6th after 11 games. There was a great spirit about the club generated mainly by that most charismatic of managers, Billy Gray, whom supporters really believed could work wonders. All being well promotion was on.

As the crow flies I had 30 miles to go but I am no crow and I knew that I had to get to Birkenhead, go through the Mersey Tunnel and my way in and out of Liverpool and Bootle. This I managed with some little geographical difficulty, but that was easy compare to what was to follow. With the wiper blades going full blast and in very poor visibility I left the Coast Road at Formby and after several very hazardous twists and turns along some rough terrain on the eastern side of Royal Birkdale Golf Course I came to a sudden halt in pitch darkness some 6ft from a sea wall with waves lapping over the bonnet. A harrowing moment.

At a time like this you begin to ask yourself questions. I sat momentarily and suddenly for the first time in my life I began to doubt my Millwall lunacy, to seriously ask myself what is it all about. But instantly rejecting all such treachery I ploughed on and finally made the game just before half-time. I managed to persuade the lone stile man to let me join the other 2,146 people but he wouldn't entertain my story about being from Millwall.

It was still 0-0 but we were under the cosh. Billy Gray had played himself for the first time that season and defender John Gilchrist was leading the line in an attempt for more fire power. Billy Neil hit the post, with a rasper, but it was all Southport in torrential rain. In the 56th minute their No. 9 fell over Tommy Wilken and the ref pointed to the spot. At that moment I wondered if there were any other Millwall souls in the ground and I prayed and closed my eyes. Groans from the crowd, the kick had been sliced wide. All Stepney that greatest of all Millwall keepers kept us in the game with some superb stops and the game finished goalless. A trumphant, mindbending and exhausting day but the point was worth it all. Any normal person would certainly consider my journey, much more than a mile too far, but the journey back to Ellesmere was a doddle.

Millwall finished the season runners-up and won promotion back to Division 3.

## A Kase to prove

**KASEY KELLER** reckons £1million strikers Uwe Fuchs and Chris Malkin have got to start justifying their transfer fees if Millwall are going to stay top of the First Division.

Malkin has managed just one goal since his £350,000 move from Tranmere while record signing Fuchs has yet to break his duck.

Despite keeping Barnsley penned into their own half for virtually the entire game, Millwall huffed and puffed without ever finding a way past goal-keeper Dave Watson.

Keller warned: "The boss has spent a lot of money on strikers in the summer and now they have got to start re-

paying it. We've only managed six goals in six games so far and that's just not good enough.

"We had all game to equalise after conceding a first-minute goal yet despite all our pressure we didn't take our chances."

Skipper Neil Redfearn's strike ended Millwall's unbeaten record, but he backed both sides to be in the promotion frame.

"We both play the right way to win promotion, because possession football is the only way to do it these days.

Otherwise you end up like Oldham or Palace. You boot your way up to the Premiership, but just come straight back down again."

Expectations were high going into the new season, particularly with all the money that has been spent in the transfer market during the summer. I must confess that I'm surprised at some of the fees, but that just shows what happens when there is such a demand for success.

At this early stage there have already been far too many sendings off and I'm afraid referees have to take their share of the blame.

The days when they could laugh and joke with the players seems to have gone. Perhaps it's as a result of the demands on them but man management skills seem to have gone out of the

window and been replaced by a strict adherence to the rule book producing 'robot referees' as I call them.

As far as the First Division is concerned, my pre-season predictions for Promotion were Wolves, Stoke and Norwich. However, the three outstanding players I've seen at this level so far all come from Millwall. Ben Thatcher for me is the new Kenny Sansom, Tony Witter has looked amazingly cool and Kerry Dixon has been rolling back the years.

Maurice Setters' side went down by the only goal of the game — but home 'keeper Mario Krassnitzer performed heroes to deny the Irish a point in their UEFA under-21 championship qualifier in Amstetten.

He pulled off a series of stunning saves from Declan Perkins, David Greene and Willie Boland — twice — to make the Republic's youngsters pay for giving away a sloppy goal from a corner in the ninth minute.

They it was the tiny Jürgen Kaus who was left unmarked to head home from a Mario Haas cross.

### Stubborn

Even though Austria were reduced to 10 men for the last 26 minutes, when centre back Gunter Schiesswald was sent off for a professional foul on Andy Turner, Ireland could not break through Krassnitzer's stubborn last line of resistance.

The result means revenge for Austria after their 3-0 defeat in Dublin in June, which was only the seventh win for Ireland in 47 matches at under-21 level.



# Down Memory Lane

## 30 years ago -

(September 1965-66) (DIV 3)

The Lions went the whole of September avoiding defeat, playing five League matches and two League Cup ties.

First there was a 1-0 home win over Oldham Athletic, Watford were then defeated by the same margin at Vicarage Road. Exeter City were seen off 3-0 at The Den on a Monday night. Att. 12,228.

Millwall were then held to a 2-2 draw at home to Scunthorpe United, and by the same score at Brighton.

In the League Cup, Millwall won 1-0 at Oxford United in the 1st round, and then had a good win against York City at the Den in the 2nd round. Although it was 0-0 at half-time, the Lions went on to win the tie 4-1, thanks to goals from Billy Neil (2), Curran and Jacks.

## 40 years ago -

(September 1955-56) (DIV 3(S))

Millwall started September with a 1-1 draw against Crystal Palace at the Den. Att. 16,454. Two days later a low crowd of 6,874 watched Millwall trounce Brentford 4-0 at The Den. Next was an exciting game at Gillingham which was won by the home side 4-3. The return match with Brentford (A) resulted in a 2-2 draw. Bournemouth were then beaten 4-0 at New Cross, but the Lions ended the month with defeats

## Past Masters

### No 4 - GEORGE FISHER

- George is one of seven brothers and four sisters. Two of his brothers also played for Millwall.
- The New Den is built over Erlam Road where George was brought up.
- George made 316 appearances and only a fall out with the manager prevented him from being the longest serving player.
- His brother Ted was a steward in the directors lounge until last year when he passed away. Ted played for the reserves in his younger days.
- George moved to Fulham in 1954, then to Colchester United. He played 164 games for the Essex club.

Q. Who did you room with on away trips with Millwall?

A. Roomed with! You mean who did I sit with on the coach. Reg Dudley, then later Alex Jardine. In those days Hotels were unaffordable. When we played Torquay we caught the coach at 5 o'clock in the morning. Also we were known to change on the coach if we were held up in traffic. Our manager Charlie Hewitt thought nothing of a 300 mile coach trip with sandwiches on board. We had some good fun on the

journeys, but at Fulham with Hayne and Jezzard before my first away game against Notts Forest they said "Don't forget your overnight bag". I thought it was a wind up as Nottingham is only down the road.

Q. How did you get on with the Managers?

A. Bill Voisey signed me from the ATC during the 2nd World War 42-43. I had a trial on the Tuesday and played for Millwall on the Thursday. Jack Cock my next manager was a great character. He owned the White Hart pub, and when he was drunk we would throw him in the bath. My last manager Charlie Hewitt was ruthless. I was earning £4 a week, married and living at Grove Park. I had to get a 94 bus to Lewisham, then the 21 to New Cross Gate and walk to the ground from there and I had to keep both bus tickets to show him to get paid.

When I hurt my right ankle and couldn't stand properly he said "I think you're a malingerer". I'd played over 300 games for the Lions. I saw red and gave him a right hander, knocking him up in the air. He said to Bill Voisey who was the trainer and a gentleman "Did you see that Bill?", Bill replied "No I'm sorry, someone called me and I was looking out the window". I was soon transferred to Fulham.

1-1 draw.

The following Saturday, a long trip up to Nottingham to play Forest produced another point (2-2), Millwall were leading 2-0 at half-time.

The second home game of the season saw Millwall crush visitors Swansea Town 5-1. Jimmy Jinks helped himself to a hat-trick.

Millwall then had wins over Nottingham Forest (H) 2-1, Newport County (H) 4-0, before losing their first game of the season 1-3 at Newport.

Ted Wilding

Q. How did you get on at Millwall?

A. I loved it. I was Millwall through and through, I lived there and all my family followed them. We had the Fisher rail, my dad and brothers always stood in the same place at the Old Den. As a boy I would wait till they opened the gates so I could see the last quarter of an hour. I would have beaten Crippsy's record if I could have stayed.

Q. Do you remember any funny moments at Millwall?

A. My twin brother Jack played inside forward. We both played against Torquay in 1948 and one of their players said "Jesus that man's fit, one minute he's defending next he's attacking, he's all over the pitch". His mate said "You silly sod they're twins."

Q. What was your most memorable match?

A. Probably Notts County in 1948. Record crowd with Tommy Lawton playing for them and me scoring the winner, (3-2). Also playing at Wembley in the 1945 War Cup Final against Chelsea. I was coming up to twenty years old and the week before the final the papers were saying Stanley Matthews was playing and I couldn't wait. But in the end Matthews didn't play. Ted Smith our captain that day gives me fond memories as a boy at the

club, he took me under his wing. In one match a winger clattered me, Ted told me to swap positions, Ted then gave him a tackle and put him straight into touch and then said to the winger if I see you kick him again you'll answer to me. Senior players were looked up to and respected then and in return they looked after you.

Q. Do you keep in touch with any players?

A. Yes. Jimmy Constantine and Johnnie Johnson and I came last season to the New Den and we met up and visited the Executive boxes together.

Coincidentally George met his wife whilst playing against Luton. He saw her in the crowd, then bumped into her at the railway station after the game in 1945, exactly 50 years ago. Her family were also Millwall supporters, 9 brothers and 2 sisters.

## BACK TRACK

27th December 1926 saw the Lions maul Luton Town 7-0 at The Den. The *Daily Express* match report starts off as follows: "The tables were turned with a vengeance at New Cross yesterday, for Millwall, after being beaten at Luton on Christmas Day by six clear goals, won the return match by a margin of seven goals to none". At this time the Christmas Day rout was Millwall's worst reverse since entering the Football League in 1920. For the return game Bob Hunter made two changes, both in the forward line! The Lions tore into attack from the outset

registering two quick goals by Amos and Phillips and further strikes by Gomm and Parker made the half-time score 4-0 with revenge in sight. Parker and Gomm increased the lead to six. "In the closing minute Phillips sent the Lions supporters into seventh heaven of delight by scoring number seven. It was the easiest journey that Millwall have had at the Den this season". Incidentally Millwall won the corresponding fixture the previous season by exactly the same score.

## Millwall Marksmen

Millwall secured the services Twigg from Second Division League side Gainsborough Trinity in 1905.

In his first season at the club was limited to only seven South League appearances, due to form of Sid Heaton.

Twigg staked his claim for number nine shirt the following campaign (1906-07).

Although short for a centre-forward, Twigg had clever footwork and possessed a high shot. He ended the season top scorer with twenty seven goals from thirty eight League appearances. He was also lead scorer in 1907-08 with eight goals.


On January 5th 1907 Twigg scored five goals when Millwall thrashed Watford 10-1 at Greenwich.

Twigg won a Western League Championship medal with Millwall in 1907-08, and in the Final of the London Challenge Cup in 1908 he scored both goals in Millwall's triumph over Leyton (2-0) at W Ham United's ground. He spent five seasons at the club before moving on in 1910.

## PREVIEW

### *The Wembley Trail Begins*

For our next home match, we welcome FA Cup holders Everton to The Den for the first leg of our Coca Cola Cup tie. Yet again, the draw has paired us with opposition from the top flight, and it will be a great opportunity to test our Premiership ambitions. This is a competition in which traditionally clubs from the First Division have done rather well. Last season, Bolton went all the way to Wembley, after an all-First Division semi-final with Swindon. Wanderers were the third club in the 1990s to reach the final from outside top flight, following Oldham in 1990 and Sheffield Wednesday in 1991.

This is the stage when most of the clubs from the top two divisions enter the Coca Cola Cup. A few First Division sides had, however, to compete in the First Round, and three did not make it any further. Luton, who went out to Bournemouth, Portsmouth were beaten by Third Division Cardiff, whilst Port Vale lost the all-First Division tie with Huddersfield.

is due to the 1971 League Cup which provided Stoke, one of the four oldest League clubs, with its only domestic trophy. Neither side has made a sparkling start in the League and both will be looking for a good Cup run to get their season off to a good start.

The final Premiership v First clash pits and present tenants of Selhurst Park together. Charlton and Wimbledon have started a new campaign in encouraging style and local derby should be nothing less than a bloodbath. It is, however, a brave man who stands against the Dons in any circumstances.

### **First v First**

Whatever else happens in the Second Round, another five First Division clubs will go on to the competition at this stage, the losers in the ties between divisional colleagues from Yorkshire, the tie of the round will be a meeting of Barnsley and newly promoted Huddersfield. A guide as to what to expect came last night when the teams met in a League fixture at the Terriers' A. McAlpine Stadium, with the Tykes looking to overhaul us at the top of the table.

Crystal Palace, who have managed just goals in their last four games, meet an equally goal-shy Southend, whilst promoted favourites Reading face the only side to do double over them in the League last season, West Brom. Although they struggled for form of the year, Albion twice beat high-flying Reading, 2-0, a repeat of which will suit them very nicely this time. A few days after the completed, the sides meet again in the League at the Hawthorns. The division's highest lowest scorers, Birmingham and Grimsby, are in a tie where The Blues must stay favourites, whilst in the Liverpool-Manchester clash, Trammere probably have the edge over Oldham, as they did in the League last year.

### **Best of The Rest**

Amongst the other 23 ties between teams from the Premiership and First and the surviving from the Second and Third there are bound to be some surprises, impossible to predict some interesting coincidences. Struggling Oxford take on Oxford from the Second, reviving memories of the 1986 League Cup Final where Oxford won comfortably 3-0. Leeds' potential for falling to lower division opponents should never be underestimated. Mansfield put out at this stage 12 months ago. If the same thing happens this year at Notts County, it will be the added twist for Howard Wilkinson, who did his managerial apprenticeship at Meadow Lane.

For the second time in 12 months Hartlepool have drawn Arsenal in the Second Round. Coca-Cola and doubtless the prospect of a bumper financial return will ease the pain of almost certain cup exit. Last year, the aggregate score was 7-0 to the Gunners. Arsenal fans, however, probably be aware that Hartlepool, now managed by Keith Houchen, the whose last minute penalty for York a few years ago sent the North London club tumbling sensationally out of the FA Cup. Middlesbrough will be similarly wary when they face Wycombe Wanderers. In charge of the Second Division club is Alan Smith who as Crystal Palace boss last year, plotted City's downfall in the quarter-finals at Selhurst Park.





# Summer Soccer Schools '95


