



BIRMINGHAM HAVE POWER AND DEPTH FOR PREMIERSHIP CHALLENGE

I HAVE often spoken about taking opportunities when they are created. It is difficult enough creating opportunities in the modern game so it becomes even more essential that you take those opportunities when presented.

I felt in last Saturday's match against Oldham, and after consulting the video my thoughts were re-confirmed, that in our first half performance we created enough opportunities to put the game out of Oldham's reach.

We stressed at half-time to the players how important it was to remain positive and to continue to attack rather than allowing Oldham to gain any initiative.

That is the belief and the confidence to go out and search for more goal opportunities rather than sit back and hope the one goal is enough.

I believe I am right in saying this is the sixth time we have taken the lead in a match and not gone on to win it.

If only a small portion of these six games had been converted into wins the picture would be oh so different.

Confidence and belief pay a major part in anything we try to do.

Confidence is only restored when you win matches. The players have belief, now we must turn that belief into match winning performances - not just 45 or 60 minutes, but for the entire game.

The morning of a match is normally the calm before the storm but last Saturday morning my home telephone number was a real hot-line as we suffered one problem after another.

We currently have a virus going through the club and Saturday morning saw the late call-offs of Johnny Vilstrup and Dwight Marshall (Oakes was already confined to his bed and was due to play no part).

Gary Waddock then called and to everyone's delight his wife was admitted to hospital where she gave birth to a baby girl, which followed Fred Barber's new arrival, a

baby boy. To both these players we send our warmest congratulations - although it did not help our preparations!

On the upside of losing players someone else has to be given an opportunity - enter Stuart Douglas, another product of the youth system.

A marvellous debut capped by the tremendous goal. He made us all proud and with continued hard work he may well have a future in the game.

Let me know turn our attention to today's opponents. We welcome Birmingham City their players, supporters, directors and officials.

They are a club with huge crowd potential, the finance to back the team, and a manager with high enthusiasm and a good track record in achieving promotions.

They all seem to me the ingredients for Birmingham to achieve that ultimate goal of the Premiership.

This is a marvellous opportunity for us all to put our wits, our abilities, courage and determination against the table toppers.

We must try to dictate games rather than the opposition dictate to us.

If the opposition want to push people forward (eg West Bromwich Albion late on, Oldham second half and maybe Birmingham

from the kick-off) we must have the courage to get the ball down, work hard to make angles and manouvre the ball quickly.

We must attempt to keep the ball for longer periods, enabling us to put teams under pressure for sustained attacks rather than isolated efforts.

Midfield players have to make powerful runs into the opponent's penalty area, therefore giving us more options when crosses do arrive.

The majority of goals are scored in the 18-yard box so we must get more bodies in that area of the pitch.

All of us today will be put under a stern test.

I would like to think that we can come through this test and look forward to the local derby which means so much to everyone connected with Luton Town Football Club against Watford on Tuesday evening.

Supporters play your part. There is a test for you also. Can you generate more noise than the Birmingham supporters?

A good run has to start somewhere and with the point picked up against Oldham followed by two massive games let's hope this is the start of a successful run.



Inquiry delay for Hatters' junction 10 stadium plans

LUTON Town's plans to move to a multi-purpose indoor stadium on land by junction 10 of the M1 have been further delayed by the decision not to hold a public inquiry into the scheme until July 1996.

Luton Town chairman David Kohler says he then does not expect any decision until January 1997, and added that the club may be forced to look elsewhere.

The proposals for the 'Kohlerdome' were supported by Luton Borough Council, but the Department of Environment ordered a public inquiry.

"I can't say I'm surprised because the planning process in this country is not noted for its speed, either in delivering public inquiries or the results from them," said Mr Kohler.

"This leaves us in limbo on the planning side until probably January 1997 which to me is too far away to even contemplate."

Mr Kohler stressed that other alternatives will

continue to be considered, and pointed out:

"Obviously I have an obligation and duty to this football club to make sure that we are not homeless, and to that end I will continue, as I have been doing for the last few years, to explore every opportunity to move the club from Kenilworth Road, and as such no stone will be left unturned."

"Junction 10 is still a possibility but it is getting more and more remote."

"I believe that the public inquiry will find in our favour, but we still have to acquire the land and, as I have stated before, neither the Luton Hoo executors or their chosen developers Wyncote have made a serious attempt to reach agreement with the club."

"I have also stated that I am ready to sell if someone else comes in who can deal with them, but there is no-one interested in buying."

"The club has tried its best, and so has the Borough Council, but obviously all our eggs are not in one basket, and there are other options."

New record for match watching!

OFFICIALS at the Guinness Book of Records have confirmed that a new record has been included in the Association Football section of their latest publication which went on sale around the country last week.

Ken Ferris, of Redbridge in Essex, has entered the 1996 Guinness Book of Records for watching a league match at all 93 professional league grounds in England and Wales, including Berwick Rangers' Shieldfield stadium, in a record 237 days.

Mr Ferris began his extraordinary odyssey at Brunton Park for Carlisle United's Division Three fixture with Exeter City on September 10, 1994, and completed his mammoth achievement at Goodison Park on May 6, 1995.

He visited Kenilworth Road for our 0-0 draw with Derby County last December.



They continually built their game from the back by playing the early and simple pass, and indeed kept the ball on the ground as often as possible.

You so often see and hear total nonsense shouted to young footballers from the touchline with the effect that the coaching is negative. I must add that your Under 13 coach continually encouraged the Luton boys to play the passing game and support each other, a delight to hear in youth football!

May I take this opportunity to wish you all the success in your efforts to develop techniques and skills within the youth players at your club.

"It is always a nice boost to receive a letter like this, and it provides us with an opportunity to give supporters a small insight into the workings of the youth set-up. The priority is to give the youngsters an opportunity to play without the pressure of competition, but the games are competitive and are refereed by qualified officials.

IAN BENNETT - Goalkeeper who was one of Barry Fry's first signings at St Andrew's for £350,000 in December of last year from Peterborough. Highly-rated young keeper who started his career at QPR before moving onto Newcastle and then Peterborough.

GARY POOLE - Signed from Southend in September 1994 following a swap deal that took Roger Willis to Roots Hall. Full back who started his career at Tottenham, and had spells at Cambridge, Barnet, Plymouth and then Southend.

CHRIS WHYTE - Centre-half who enjoyed Premiership success at Leeds United, after starting his career with Arsenal.

DAVE BARNETT - Former Barnet centre-back who formed a key partnership at the centre of the Blues defence with Liam Daish.

LIAM DAISH - Irish international who joined the Blues midway through the 93/94 season for £50,000 from Cambridge United, and is now rated in the million-pound category. Made 139 appearances for Cambridge, after starting his career at Portsmouth.

ANDY EDWARDS - Centre-half who joined the Blues from Southend in the summer, for a £400,000 fee decided by a league tribunal. Made over 150 appearances for the Roots Hall side.

SCOTT HILEY - Former Exeter City fullback who was ruled out for most of last season with a cruciate ligament injury.

JOHN FRAIN - Blues stalwart who has been at the club almost 10 years after coming through the club's youth system.


GARY COOPER - Tough tackling left-back who joined Birmingham from Peterborough last year on a free transfer.




LEFT: Striker Ken Charlery who scored the Blues' winner at Reading last week.


When Birmingham have Scored and Conceded




When Players have been Booked




Average Goals per Match

MARK WARD - Joined the Blues just before the beginning of the 94/95 season after a three-month loan spell at the end of 93/94. Is player-coach at St Andrews in the latter stages of a career that has included spells with Oldham, West Ham, Manchester City and Everton.

RICKY OTTO - Arrived at St Andrews last December from Southend, for £800,000. Played under Fry at Roots Hall, and scored for Southend in a 2-2 draw on his last visit to Kenilworth Road last season.

LOUIE DONOWA - Former England Under 21 international who started his career with Norwich City, before moving to Ipswich and Bristol City and then on to Birmingham.

KEVIN FRANCIS - Giant 6ft 7ins striker who is currently sidelined through injury. Birmingham born, he started his career at Derby, moving to Stockport, and then joined the Blues for £800,000 last season.

PAUL TAIT - A product of the Blues youth policy, and a highly-rated midfielder.

PETER SHEARER - Joined the Blues from Bournemouth for £75,000 just over a year ago, to begin his second spell at the club after beginning his career at the club as an apprentice.

STEVE CLARIDGE - Birmingham's top scorer last season with 25, after a £350,000 move from Cambridge. That was his second spell at the Abbey Stadium, which sandwiched a brief 16-game stay at Kenilworth Road in 1992.

KEN CHARLERY - Striker who has become something of a super-sub in recent weeks. Joined Birmingham from Peterborough where he played two spells either side of a move to Watford.

JONATHAN HUNT - Highly-rated midfielder who has followed manager Barry Fry from Barnet, to Southend, and on to St Andrews.

MICHAEL JOHNSON - Defender who has recently joined Birmingham from Notts County.


STEVE CASTLE - Midfielder who started his career at Orient, before moving to Plymouth.

IAN MUIR - Joined Birmingham after playing over 300 games for Tranmere Rovers.

BARRY FRY began his career in football management at Dunstable Town where he performed probably his most famous coup by signing George Best and Jeff Astle.

He later had spells with Hillingdon Borough, Bedford and Maidstone before linking up with Barnet in 1986, and in 1991 guided them into the Football League.

His success carried on into the next season with Barnet winning promotion to Division Three, but after a much reported rift with Barnet owner Stan Flashman he joined Southend in 1993.

He saved the club from relegation with a last-day-of-the-season win over Luton, and the following season had taken the Shrimpers to third place in Division One before leaving for Birmingham.

His first two games at St Andrews saw a combined attendance of 40,000, but despite a spirited 10-match unbeaten run, the Blues went down to Division Two.

But they bounced straight back last season, winning the championship and lifting the Auto Windscreens Shield at Wembley. With the buying and selling still going strong, Fry now aims for the Premiership. At the last count it was 25 in and 20 out in his first 18 months at the club!

A Hatter and a Blue.....


Limerick-born **DON GIVENS** was one of the many boys who travelled across the Irish Sea to join Manchester United, but despite making his Eire debut before reaching the United first team it soon became clear that the sheer size of the squad at Old Trafford would make a regular place difficult.

Luton scout, and later manager, Harry Haslam had a knack of spotting the older players who were stuck in a rut at their present clubs and would benefit from a change of scene.

He approached both Givens and Jim Ryan to see if they would like to come to Luton from Old Trafford for regular first team football at the end of the 1969/70 season, and both willingly accepted.

Don Givens acted as the perfect foil to Malcolm MacDonald and was perhaps never given the praise he deserved by the media, but he was appreciated by the supporters at Kenilworth Road for his unselfish play as well as some valuable goals.


After two seasons at Luton a £40,000 cheque took him to QPR where he enjoyed considerable success in Division One, followed by spells at Birmingham, Bournemouth and Sheffield United where he




joined up again with Harry Haslam, who was General Manager at Bramall Lane.

DEBUT DIARY OF STUART DOUGLAS - AGED 17½

Saturday, November 11, 1995


9am: The youth team have gone to Reading for a South East Counties League game, but I'm preparing for what could be my Football League debut.

I trained with the first team yesterday, having played in the second half of the Anglo-Italian Cup game in Cesena, and the manager said I might be on the bench against Oldham. I spend the morning watching football on the television, and then we have to report to the ground at 1.45pm.

1.45pm: Arrived at the ground, and saw virus-victim Dwight Marshall coming out of the physio's room. He says, "See you later boys, have a good game," and I wondered where he was going.

2pm: Now I know he's gone home, as the manager asks me if I'm ready to play from the start, and I have no hesitation in saying yes.

2.15pm: Go out to warm up on the pitch, and the crowd building up

doesn't really worry me, but when we get back into the dressing room the tension starts to mount. Everyone keeps wishing me well, but I just want to get out there and start the game.

3pm: The game kicks-off and I'm in the action straightaway. Chasing a through ball I collide with the Oldham keeper, and I don't think he liked it much! We collide again a few moments later, and that leaves me winded and having difficulty catching my breath. I go off, but don't want to stay off too long in case I'm substituted.

3.41pm: Scott Oakes' cross is headed back by Marvin Johnson, and the ball is at my feet. I just strike it, and it's amazing to see it go in. There's no time to celebrate though, as before I know where I am, all the rest of the players jump on me. Jogging back for the restart I pick out Mum and Dad, and the rest of the youth team players, and give them a salute.

3.45pm: Half-time, and I'm feeling quite tired. I

get my second wind during the break, and the manager tells me to just keep working.

4.15pm: A pass from Steve Davis puts me in behind the Oldham defence, and I am in two minds whether to shoot or take another touch, and am tackled. Soon after I'm close to a Ceri Hughes cross to the near post, but then Oldham equalise. I feel tired during the final 10 minutes, and we are close to a winner, but Ceri's shot is saved.

4.45pm: The final whistle, and back to the dressing room. I'm in the bath when the message comes through that I have won the man-of-the-match award. First though it's a TV interview on the pitch, and then up to the Sponsors' Lounge to collect the bottle of champagne (which Mum and Dad have later on).

6pm: Leave the club still trying to take everything in. Go for a meal with my family, and then back home where the answerphone is full of messages from family and friends which is nice.




Hatters' fightback halts Blues' revival

AFTER three-and-a-half seasons of success the Town's tilt at promotion from Division Four to Division One in record time seemed to be coming off the rails as winter turned to spring in 1971, and a succession of draws and single goal defeats pushed the team down the table.

At Christmas we were occupying a place in the top three, but the stuffing seemed to be knocked out of us following a 4-3 home defeat by Nottingham Forest in a FA Cup third round replay, and we did not seem to be the same side again.

A miserable 1-0 reversal at bottom of the table Blackburn was followed by a flattering 2-1 defeat at fellow promotion hopefuls Sheffield United, where a crowd of 30,986 saw a rampant Blades side somehow fail to get the hatful of goals their play deserved.

After a narrow 1-0 home win over old enemies Watford we picked up three useful away points in a 1-0 win at Portsmouth and a 0-0 draw at Sunderland, but those of us that travelled to both games knew that the pre-Christmas Luton team would have won both games with ease and style.

We could only manage a point in a 1-1 home draw with Charlton and then contrived to lose 1-0 against another promotion hopeful, Carlisle, at Brunton Park.

The normally surefooted Malcolm MacDonald missed a penalty and hit the woodwork on at least three occasions, while we conceded a soft goal at the other end to send us home pointless from our longest away trip of the season.

We bucked up a little with a 3-1 home win over Hull City in front of the 'Match of the Day' cameras, but then threw away all the good work by losing 2-1 at Middlesbrough the following week after taking the lead and seeming to be comfortably in the driving seat.

Our next two games were at home, to mid-table Millwall and a resurgent Birmingham City, and it was reckoned that failure in either of these clashes would mean we could kiss our promotion hopes goodbye.

The Millwall game was desperate and the crowd of 17,578 was treated to a long-ball competition which played into the hands of the Lions defenders who steadied the ship and made sure that their side returned to London with a point.

Birmingham City then came to Kenilworth Road on the crest of a wave. From a position near the bottom of the table at Christmas, they had gone 14 games without defeat and had picked up 25 points in the process (in the days of two points for a win), and were now only a single point behind the Town.

Leading this resurgence of fortune was a 16-

year-old forward from Plymouth, Trevor Francis, who had taken the game by storm by scoring 15 goals in only 16 appearances. In their previous home game, against Cardiff City, almost 50,000 had crammed into St Andrews to see the Blues win 2-0 and it was, therefore, not surprising to hear that the Town were expecting their biggest home gate of the season with over 8,000 coming from the Midlands.

I arrived at the ground at 12.30 and joined a queue of Birmingham supporters stretching the length of Oak Road and by kick-off the crowd in the ground had swelled to 25,172 which has not been bettered in the league since.

The game got off to a tremendous start with Birmingham, starting where they had left off the previous week, taking a two-goal lead inside the first 20 minutes.

Firstly half-fit Luton centre-half Chris Nicholl failed to clear a soft through ball leaving Bob Latchford with an easy chance, and when Phil Summerill was left unmarked with a free header soon afterwards the Town's season seemed over.

The fact that the Town were playing the better football and did not deserve to be trailing counted for little, but after 36 minutes they were handed a lifeline when Viv Busby, who had been in and out of the side all season, headed a MacDonald pass between two defenders before coolly slotting the ball home.

It was now time for the Birmingham defence to come under some pressure, and just before half-time came the deserved equaliser when Busby managed to deflect a MacDonald shot, that was going wide, past Mike Kelly in the Blues goal.

The fightback was completed shortly after the break when Alan Slough hammered in a 30-yard free kick with the Birmingham defenders still setting up a wall.

From then on the game was end to end but the Town managed to hang on and dent the progress of the Blues, while at the same time ensuring that their own promotion hopes were re-awakened.

"What a magnificent show that was," said Luton manager Alec Stock afterwards. "When we were two down I wanted to look away, but when we went in front I wanted the powers of Merlin.

"All I wanted to do was wave a magic wand and turn this team of 21-year-olds into a team full of mature 28-year-olds.

"But they hung on for me," he added, "and I can't say enough."

Excitement, but when is a "Back Pass" not a pass back?

WHEN changes are made to the Laws of the Game there is a tendency to focus all attention on the new modifications and neglect earlier alterations.

Many spectators will recall the apparent culture shock which reverberated through much of football when, just a few years ago, it became an offence for a goalkeeper inside his own penalty area to touch the ball with his hands after it had been deliberately kicked to him by a team-mate.

Immediately, the wrongly-named "Back Pass Rule" became the centre of attention and the supposed cause of massive changes having to be made in defensive skills.

It was, of course, wrongly-named because the deliberate kicking of the ball by a player to his goalkeeper may be directed in any direction, forward, backwards or even side-ways!

The International FA Board decision in this respect was introduced three years ago to help reduce the annoying practice of wasting time by passing the ball between defenders and thence to the goalkeeper so that he would eventually pick it up and kick upfield.

Irish lose out to Euro group winners

In the fourth of a series of articles, the FA's Director of Refereeing, KEN RIDDEN, looks at topical issues, this week dealing with the "Back Pass" rule.

The amendment has generally proved to be immensely popular. Exciting goalmouth tussles, more goals and the encouragement of defenders to become more adept at playing themselves out of trouble have all been healthy bi-products of the modification.

Initially, of course, the most affected people were probably goalkeepers and referees, but each has adapted extremely well to the changed demands.

Defenders under pressure near their own goal need to remember that while they may deliberately kick the ball to the goalkeeper, he may not collect the ball with his hands, but has to rely alone on his skills with feet and body, like any outfield player in the same circumstances.

If the goalkeeper handles the ball in these circumstances, the opposing team are awarded an indirect free-kick.

Referees were, and continue to be, required to show extra vigilance in respect of this new area of possible offence.

They had to learn to quickly decide whether the ball had been deliberately kicked to the goalkeeper because only such an intentional action, followed by the goalkeeper handling the ball, resulted in an offence.

Involuntary deflections caused by defenders mis-kicking the ball do not, of course, lead to an indirect free kick if the goalkeeper handles the ball.

Discussions involving the pros and cons of that change in the Laws of the Game, naturally, continue. Defenders have to concentrate even more fully and referees too, but the introduction of the "Back Pass Rule" that really wasn't just for back passes has certainly added to the excitement of the game.






