MANAGER'S *message*

THE Southend match on Saturday was a good result – but, more importantly, it was a good performance.

You couldn't have blamed the lads for getting a bit nervous after three draws on the run – but they went out and played with confidence, even after we went a goal behind.

I've always been sure of our ability to win at home, but teams will be looking to make life difficult for us – as Wolves did – at the BBG from now on in.

That's why we have to take advantage of the additional space we're given away from home.

I'd had a chat with Steve McClaren in the week and decided that if we were drawing away it would be worth the gamble of taking a couple of defenders off and throwing everything into attack.

Substitutions don't always work as spectacularly as the Southend example, but we were so much on top I decided to take the risk.

Actually we should have been ahead by then anyway. Had Dean Sturridge not had a goal ruled out for offside early on – and it was a good decision – I'm sure he would have gone on and hit a hat-trick.

As it was he had four or five chances and players of his calibre should put away at least one of them.

But this is a growing up period for Dean and now he has to show the quality of a top striker by not letting

those misses affect his game. And let's remember that he was instrumental in creating the winner on Saturday, because it was his shot which came off the 'keeper for Ronnie Willems to score.

Ronnie was outstanding against Southend. I've heard criticism of his performance against Wolves when he was marked very tightly by young Simon Osborn – but there were still three or four occasions when he broke free and took up great positions without receiving the final ball.

Igor has been stirring up some passion among opposition centre forwards of late – probably because he's been dominating them so completely. As you've seen for yourselves, their response has been a little less than fair.

We welcome Lennie Lawrence and his Luton team to the Baseball Ground tonight. Lennie is an experienced and wily manager and it was no surprise to me when the Hatters started to pull away from the bottom of the table with a great sequence of results.

I've told the lads they will have to be absolutely spot on tonight and put Saturday's win behind them, because maximum points at home this week would put us in a great position.

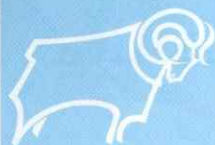

"Chris Kamara offered me that at Bradford and the deal went through very quickly."

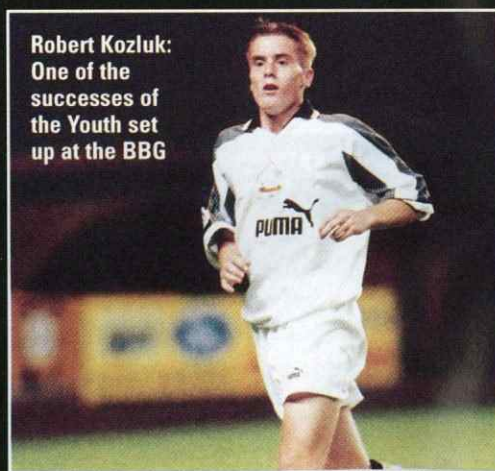
Youngsters sign on

THE pessimists came out of the woodwork saying the bubble had burst because we'd drawn three games in a row.

But just look at the opposition. Port Vale – conquerors of Everton in the FA Cup; Grimsby, easy cup victors over Premiership West Ham; and Wolves, who quite clearly came to the BBG for a draw and got what they wanted.

What concerned us more than anything was the lack of goals and goal chances in those three games – so we spent last week putting in a lot of crosses and shots to get the boys back on song.

We must appreciate that teams are going to come here and pack their defence because they know how we play. So we must be patient.

More than that, the fans must be patient and appreciate that we might have to settle for draws at home and go away to nick wins.

That's what happened last Saturday at Southend – and because other teams didn't really capitalise during that run of three draws, the win strengthened our position at the top of the table.

FULL marks to Russell Hoult for holding his concentration to make some vital saves in recent weeks.

I recall a couple of seasons at Forest when we were really flying and I had to make only a couple of serious saves a game.

The temptation when your team is playing good football is to stand there and enjoy it. But it's easy to get lulled into a false sense of security.

Because our defence has been playing so well Russ has had little to do in most matches – but he's made some fantastic saves when it really mattered.

STILL on the goalkeeping front, it's good to see Martin Taylor training properly again.

The specialists have given him the go ahead to work hard – and although he's understandably tentative at the moment, he's kicking well and running properly.

He's looking towards the back end of this season

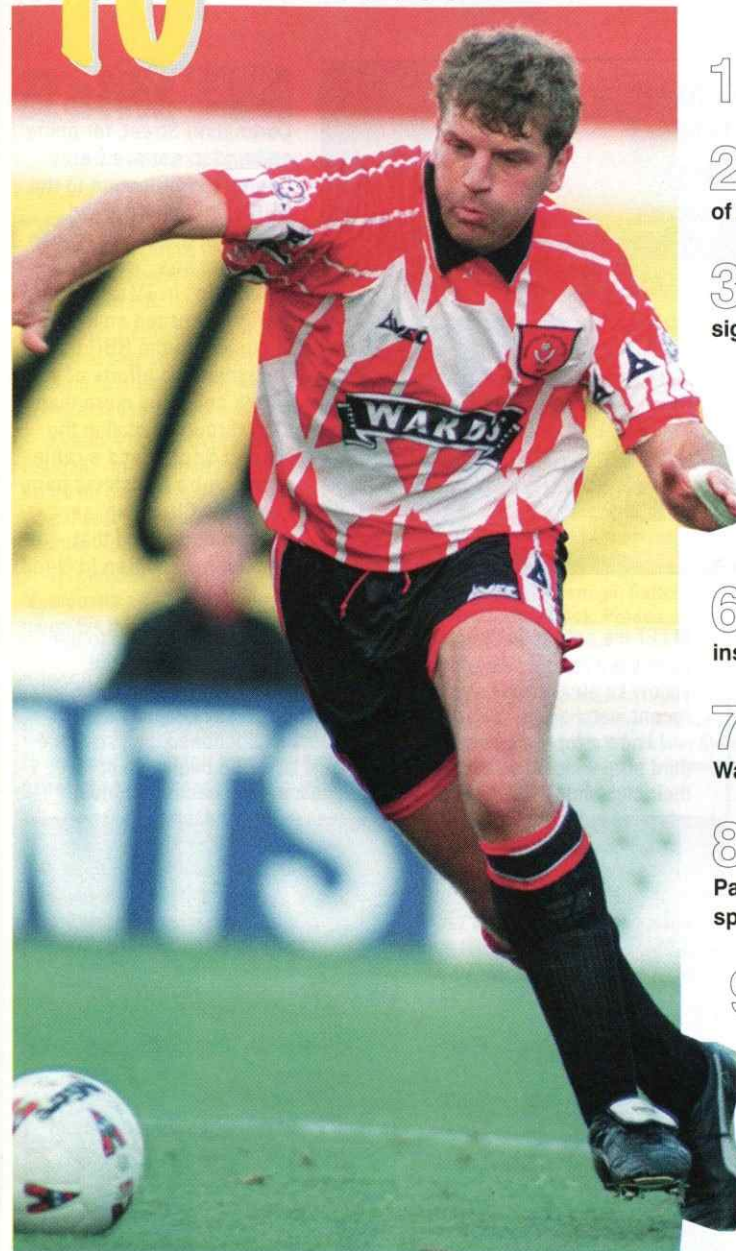

THINGS YOU DIDN'T KNOW ABOUT GLYN HODGES



- 1 Glyn Hodges had trials with the Rams as a 15-year-old schoolboy.
- 2 His mentor at that time was Dario Gradi – now manager of Crewe but part of Derby's management team at that time.
- 3 Glyn rubbed shoulders with Steve Spooner and Frank Sheridan, who later signed on as pros for the Rams.
- 4 Glyn opted to follow Dario Gradi – one of the country's top coaches – to Wimbledon.
- 5 He made 232 appearances for Wimbledon, scoring 49 goals.
- 6 Jim Smith tried to sign him as manager of QPR, but Glyn opted instead to join Newcastle.
- 7 His career with the Magpies lasted only seven games and he moved on to Watford.
- 8 Glyn played 86 times for Watford, scoring 15 goals before moving on to Palace, where he had another seven-game spell.
- 9 Although born in Streatham, Glyn has been capped at every level by Wales, making his full debut against Norway in 1984. His 17th and 18th caps came late last year against Germany and Italy.
- 10 Scored on his home debut for Sheffield United – against the Rams!

JIM SMITH'S tenth major signing since taking over as Rams manager last summer is Welsh international Glyn Hodges.

And the 32-year-old midfielder, renowned as a scorer of spectacular goals, said he was "delighted" to have made the leap from the bottom of the First Division to the top.

Snapped up on a free transfer from Sheffield United, Glyn said: "It's a

fantastic move for me and I'll be keeping my fingers crossed that I get a few games in before the end of the season.

"Derby certainly looked good doing the double over United this season – and I was especially impressed by the forwards. They caused major problems."

Glyn says he's happy to play anywhere in midfield or just behind

the strikers, but realises he will have to be patient.

"The manager is obviously looking to bring a bit of experience into the squad for the final promotion push and I'll help out wherever I can," said Glyn.

"I turned Jim Smith down when he was at QPR and I reckon that was a mistake. It's good to be able to retrieve the situation now!"

■ THANKS to Kevin Kennedy, Curly Watts in TV's Coronation Street, for being on hand to receive Derby County's contribution to the BBC's Children In Need Appeal at the Wolves game. I know he's "from the other side" in TV terms, but Kevin expressed an interest in coming to the BBG to recognise the efforts of staff. We collected more than £750 through a stall in the Market Square and a raffle at the club's Christmas party – and the Chairman, as promised, doubled that amount for Children In Need.

■ WE are continually monitoring the Club Shop, and because of the soon-to-arrive range of summer items, we decided it was time for a sale.

The Ramtique bargains will continue through until the end of February.

I got in touch with Puma and they agreed to reduce the price of some of their items to us – and I've passed on that saving to the supporters.

To say the sale has been popular so far is an understatement – the response has been phenomenal.

■ LET me put you in the picture as to why we've been wearing that yellow kit away from home in recent matches.

I know a lot of clubs have a third strip which they then sell in their club shops – that is not our intention in this case and it is certainly not the colour we would choose.

A problem arose with our dark blue away kit which, we were informed by the Football League after the Tranmere game back in

November, was too close to the colour of the referee's outfit, especially when they got wet.

The Football League had, of course, sanctioned the use of the blue kit at the beginning of the season – but because concern was expressed we took action – hence the yellow kit.

With the possible exception of our last away match of the season – against West Bromwich Albion – we should have seen the last of it from now on in.

■ HAVE you bought a season ticket yet?

We've been publicising the fact that it's still not too late to buy one for the rest of the current season.

There are no discounts – but a season ticket will ensure your

seat at the BBG for the rest of the season.

It also guarantees you priority for a season ticket next season – and if things go well a lot of people could be disappointed in the clamour for tickets.

■ WE'RE working hard to keep the BBG pitch in as good condition as possible – but we're stuck with a situation we inherited last summer and there's only so much we can do before an end-of-season overhaul.

The main problems are a thick layer of black soil three inches down caused, we are told, by seepage from a local foundry many years ago, and also the fact that our undersoil heating is just eight inches from the surface, making it difficult for us to use heavy machinery to remedy drainage problems.

■ IT was great to attend a packed Alfreton Supporters' Club branch dinner with Dean Yates and the branch's own BBG liaison officer O'Neil Francis.

All the branches now have good lines of communication and a new overall chairman in Justin Ratcliffe.

Rams see off Kitson's gang

RAMS RESERVES 1, NEWCASTLE 0

TWO names from the past got nothing out of a return to the BBG last week as the Rams Reserves beat mighty Newcastle 1-0.

Former Rams manager Arthur Cox and one-time star striker Paul Kitson could do nothing to prevent Billy McEwan's side doing a season double over the Magpies.

Kitson – booed every time he touched the ball – had a good chance to put his name on the scoresheet late on, but he was thwarted by a fine save from Rams' keeper Andy Quy.

To complete a dismal night for Cox & Co, Newcastle centre-half Stuart Elliott was given his marching orders with a quarter-of-an-hour to play for his second bookable offence.

The Rams set off in fine style, Lee Carsley – having a run out in the Reserves to improve his match fitness – delivering a great right wing cross on four minutes

which Paul Trollope headed home with aplomb, easily beating Shaka Hislop in the Newcastle goal.

Paul Simpson touched the bar with an overhead kick and then saw Hislop touch a superb 'bender' over the top.

The Rams always looked on top but were again indebted to Quy when he pulled off a superb reaction save from Chris Holland after a good ball through from the impressive Darren Huckerby.

A crowd of 2,192 cheered the Rams back into second spot in the Pontin's League Division One, still five points adrift of top-placed Manchester United.

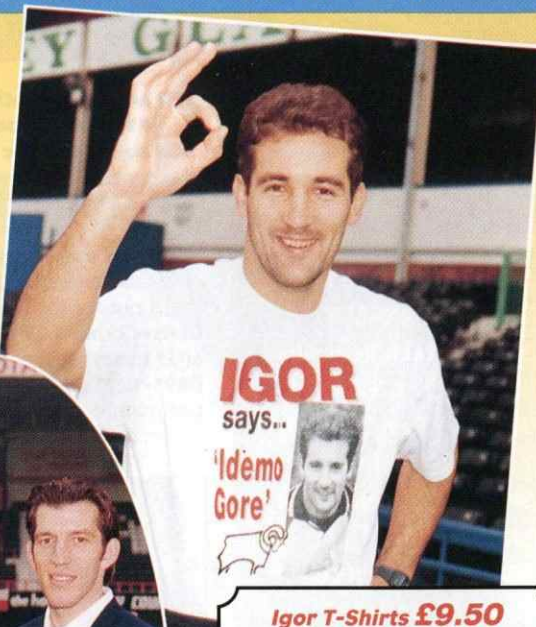

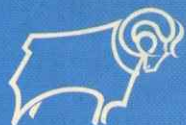

● Congratulations to Lee Ralski and Robert Kozluk, two members of this season's Youth Team squad, who have recently signed professional forms with Derby County.

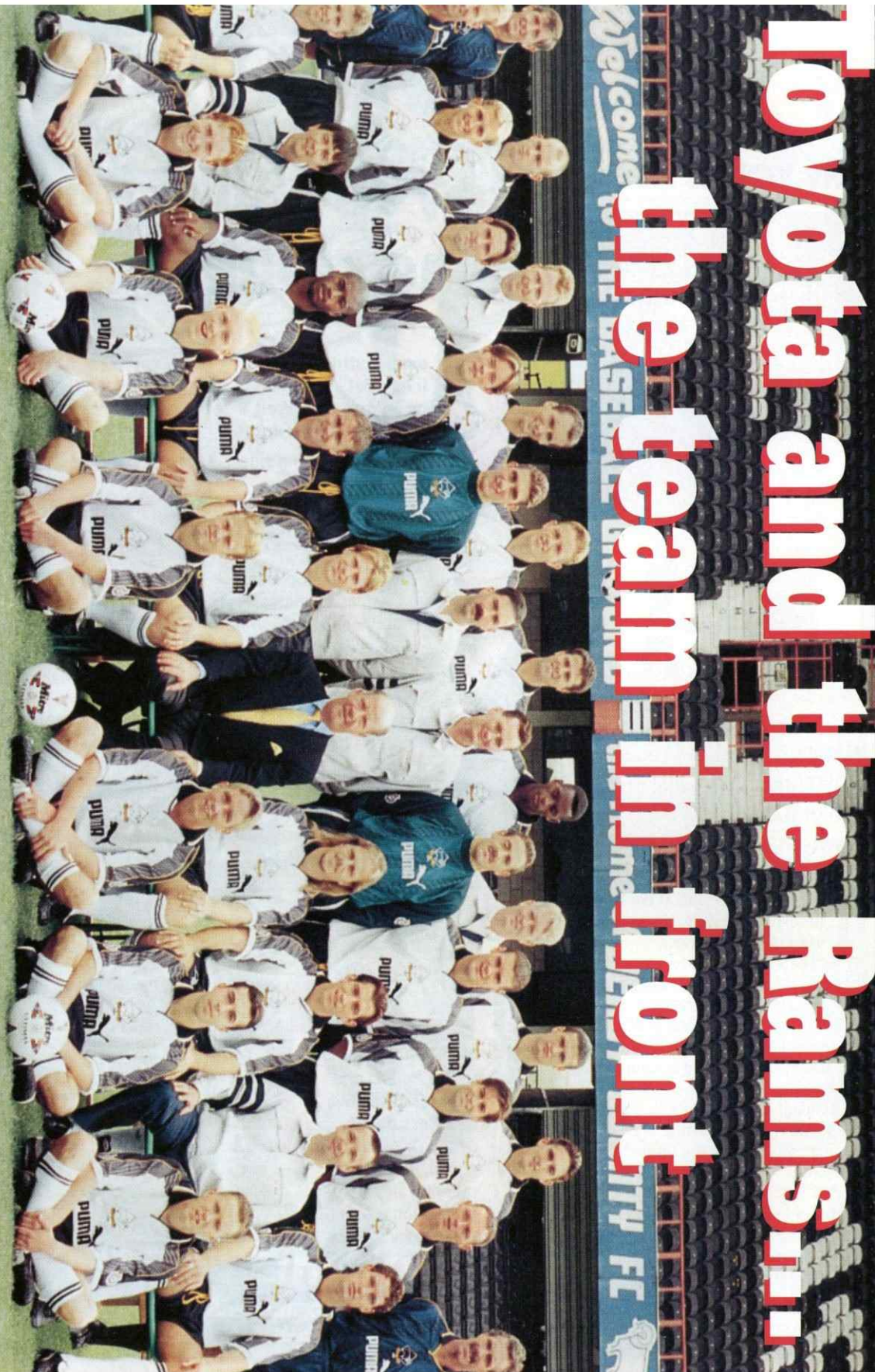

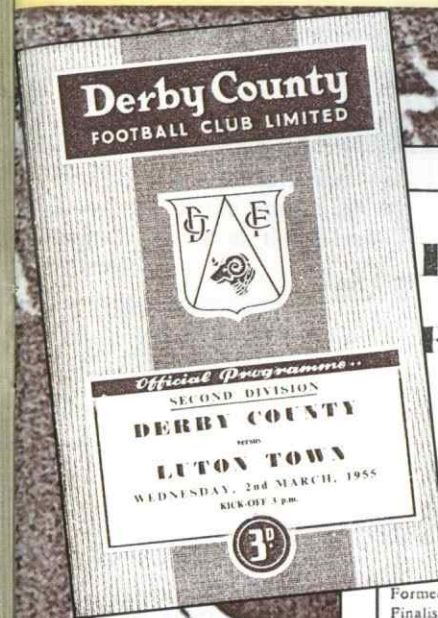

OUR VISITORS

This afternoon we entertain most attractive opposition in Luton Town, and to all our visitors we extend a very sincere and hearty welcome.

Judging from their present record, Luton must be rated as just about the best side in the League, being a mere three points behind the leaders, Blackburn, with three games in hand, and now that they have no further interest in the F.A. Cup they are certainly firm favourites for promotion. Should they succeed it will be just reward for their consistency during the past few seasons.

Luton's visit to Derby always has an added interest for they are managed by a great Rams favourite of yesteryear—Mr. 'Dally' Duncan. Numerous Rams supporters will need little or no reminder of the many wonderful displays he gave at outside-left which were suitably rewarded with several Scottish International Caps. As a fitting climax to his career with the Rams he was a member of our Cup-winning side in 1946 when we beat Charlton 4-1. Since taking over the managership of Luton his shrewd team-building has brought about a tremendous improvement and this can best be illustrated by looking at their League placings in the past four seasons. In

1950-51 they narrowly avoided relegation, finishing in 19th position. In 1951-52 they went up to 8th position; in 1952-53 to 3rd place, and last season, after always being in the running, they eventually finished 6th. Now this season everything seems to be set fair for them to claim one of the spots that really mean something—1st or 2nd. Last season, incidentally, the 'Hatters' did the double over us, winning by the same margin 2-1 home and away.

Unless any of their players are injured it is not expected that any change will be made in their usual full strength side which lines up as follows: Baynham, Dunne, Aherne, Pemberton, Owen, Shanks, Davies, Turner, Morton, Cummins, Cullen.

Goalkeeper Baynham has been keeping International Streten out of the side since he made the team last November which indicates that he is playing remarkably well.

CLUB NOTES

These comments on our match with Leeds at Elland Road last Saturday must follow the all-too-familiar theme that we could once again claim to be the better side on the day and yet lose, this time by one goal to nil. Whatever the pros and cons may be regarding the disallowed goal, missed chances and the like, the Rams have every reason to wonder, particularly in view of their present position, why the luck of the game has apparently deserted them completely. When it looked odds on that they would at least share the spoils—and many Leeds followers freely admitted that our general performance was worthy of both points—a penalty was conceded for what looked to be an accidental case of hands against Patrick from which Charles gratefully scored. This was bad enough, but two minutes from the end, with the Rams still fighting desperately for an equaliser, Keith Savin was carried off injured, a subsequent X-ray examination showing that his leg is broken just above the ankle. Add to this Plymouth's win at Hull, which makes our position infinitely worse, just about capped everything.

In the first half the Rams were far and away the better side, their only failing being that they seemed loth to press home many dangerous attacks. Many times they worked the ball skilfully through to the penalty box line but then either shot from too far out or dallied sufficiently long to give the Leeds defenders chance to regain position. During this first half the Leeds rearguard looked anything but steady and they were somewhat fortunate to leave the field at the interval with their goal intact.

After the breather Leeds came more into

the picture, mainly through the influence of Charles who, as we had seen at Derby earlier this season, was a commanding figure and barred the path down the middle with great skill. The Leeds attack, however, were also rather goal-shy, but on a few occasions did get through to test Webster who proved equal to everything fired at him—one or two saves being first-rate.

Ken Oliver, who came into the side for Ray Young, played a major part in keeping the Leeds inside-forwards at bay during their period of ascendancy, he and Webster being the pick of a sound and capable defence which never looked like being beaten until the unfortunate penalty.

Tommy Powell was the pick of our forwards, with Nightingale claiming the same honour for Leeds.

To sum up, this was one of those days when the luck was against them even more than usual, and if they should have made better use of their first half opportunities, they certainly did not deserve to lose.

This latest set-back means that points from our future games are a vital necessity, and as our next opponents—Luton—need them just as badly in their bid for promotion, we should see an exciting struggle next Wednesday.

RAMS PROFILE

DEAN Sturridge's transformation from occasional stand-in to top class striker has been one of the stories of the season so far at the Baseball Ground.

Presented with his chance early in the season when injuries hit Jim Smith's new-look side, Studger burst onto the scene with poise and confidence.

That electrifying pace had always been there of course—but this new finesse was something the Rams faithful had not seen before. In short, this was a new Dean Sturridge.

To discover what brought about the change you have to go back to the day Studger arrived at the BBG as a young trainee. At that time the management believed in a lot of work and very little play.

"Arthur Cox was the manager then and he was a hard taskmaster—everything was very serious all the time," says Studger.

"In fact the last two managers here had a sergeant major approach. I'd find myself being put down if I had a joke on the training pitch or on the team coach. I didn't feel I was respected as a person or as a player.

"I was even told before games that if I didn't score I would be dropped—that didn't do an awful lot for my confidence. Obviously I don't want to blame other people all the way down the line, because it all comes down to Dean Sturridge and my ability to impress. But I've always been the sort of person who responds to an arm around the shoulder and a bit of encouragement.

"Jim Smith commands respect and demands discipline—but he'll have a laugh with you too and that has created great team spirit and



the right time and that's what happened to me," he says.

And he believes he learned a lot as a trainee simply from watching Dean Saunders.

"He was the big star in the first team and his attitude was brilliant. I was immensely impressed with his approach to training and the way he worked off the ball. I suppose he was a role model for me."

Although he refuses to set goal targets, Studger admits to being frustrated at not getting on the scoresheet in the two draws against Grimsby and Wolves. It's made him work even harder in training—he's often to be found working himself into the ground long after everyone else has been told to take a shower.

"The manager tells me to relax about scoring goals but if I come off the pitch and I haven't at least laid on a goal for someone else I feel frustrated.

"I am very confident in my ability and I can honestly say I'm not scared of anyone but I haven't been totally happy with my performances over the past few weeks and I'm determined to put that right.

"As for targets, my first one this season was to get into the first team. The next was to become a regular and now it's to be a Derby County player in the Premier League, taking on the likes of Newcastle and Manchester United.

"Whether or not I keep scoring goals, if we get promoted I'll be happy."

I watched Studger the other day, training alone on the Baseball Ground pitch long after everyone else had gone, running until he cried out from the self-inflicted pain.

Dean Sturridge might play football with a smile on his face—but he certainly earns that right the hard way.

Studger isn't totally dismissive of those early days at the BBG and knows he is fortunate to have been singled out as one of the few young players likely to succeed.

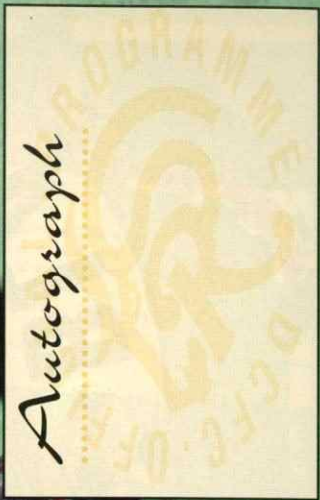

half Shanks was originally a winger but has been converted into a grand wing-half. Right-winger Davies is a South African who went to Luton via Clyde and his inside partner Turner is one of the most prolific goal-getters this season having scored 28 Cup and League goals to date. 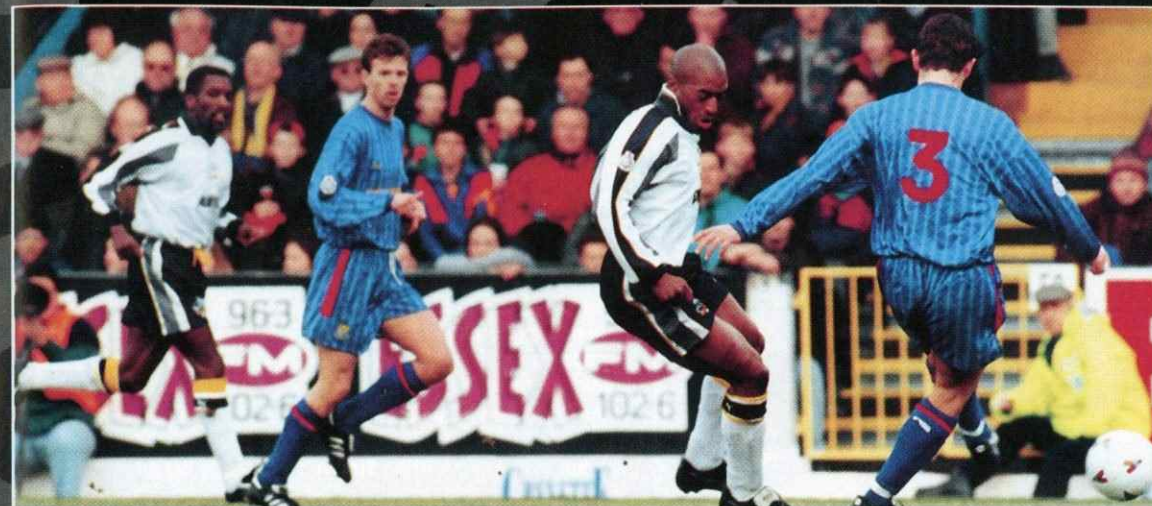

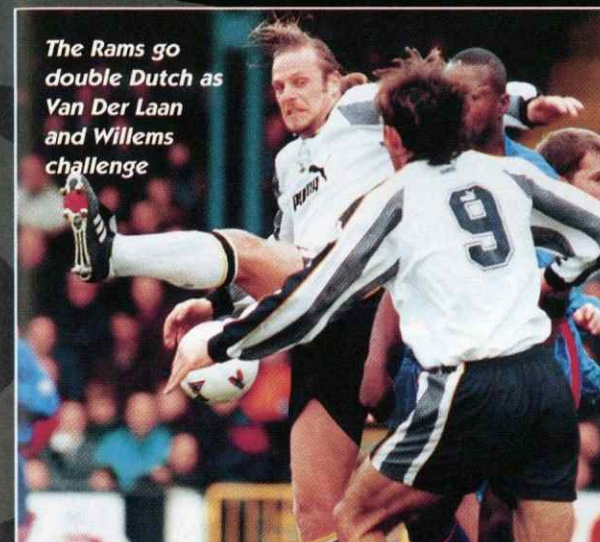

The Rams go double Dutch as Van Der Laan and Willems challenge

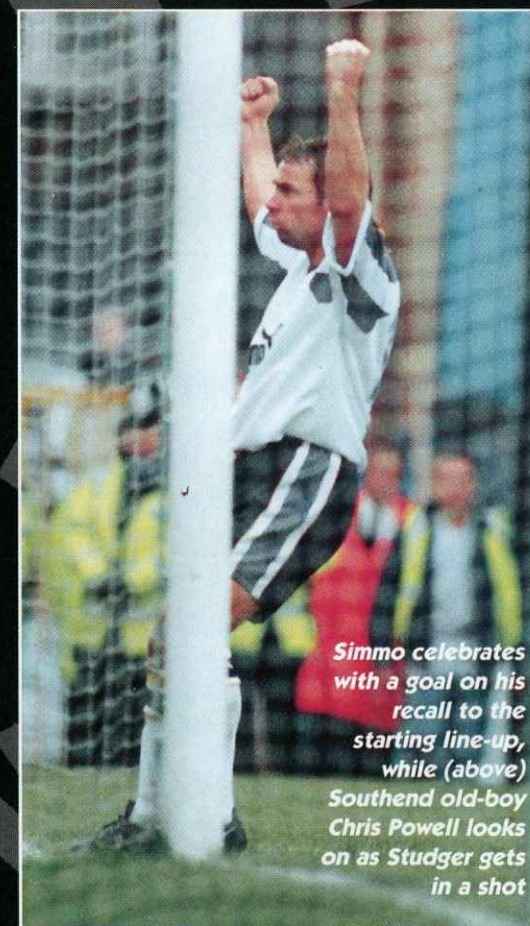


THIS was a game which not only saw the Rams break that drawing habit – they also performed as a slick unit for the first time in weeks.

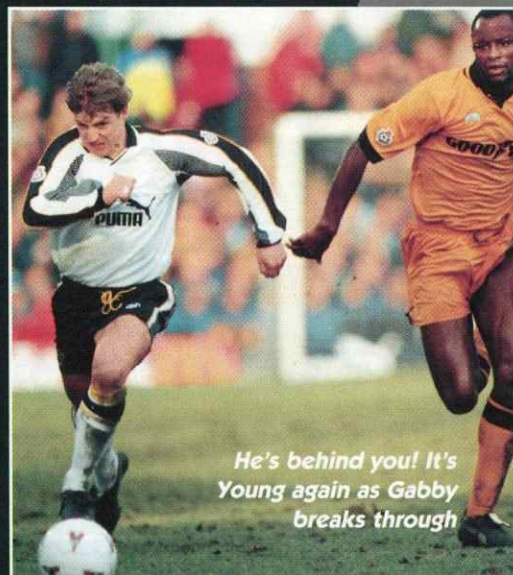

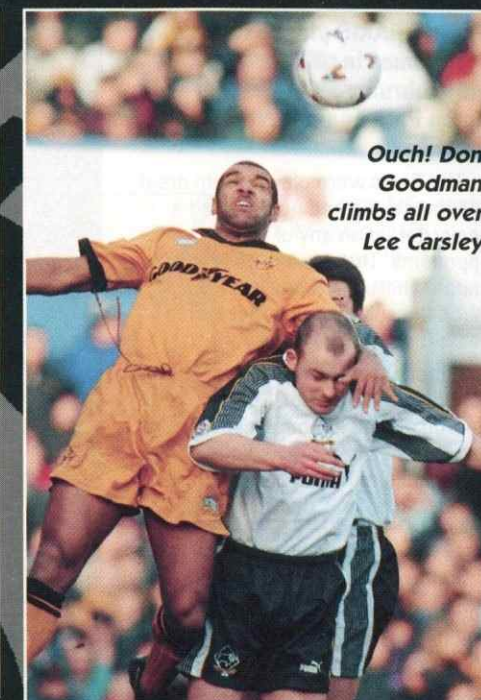

THE RAMS played two away games in the last week of February 1976, the first at Upton Park against West Ham United.

The Rams were playing with great assurance, but had not inflicted a heavy defeat on any of their opponents. The same applied in this match where the Rams were very much the superior side, but had to settle for a narrow victory.

It took Derby an hour to turn their superiority into a goal. Charlie George did the honours, clipping the ball in from a pass by Kevin Hector. The Hammers rallied but could not conjure up a goal, the Rams making the game safe with seven minutes remaining. Archie Gemmill's pass found Leighton James, whose shot appeared to be going in before Bruce Rioch made sure.

In midweek the fourth-placed Rams went to Old Trafford to take on third-placed Manchester United. In the first half the Rams could not find an answer to the young United team which brimmed full of speed and mobility. In the second period Archie Gemmill and Bruce Rioch turned things round in midfield with a masterly display.

The quality of the Rams was there for all to see as they came back into a game which seemed to be lost. The point which the Rams earned kept

their Championship hopes alive, keeping them just one point behind leaders Liverpool, with 11 games to play.

United took the lead in the first half following a free kick for a foul, Gordon Hill's cracker from 25 yards coming back off the bar for Stuart Pearson to beat Graham Moseley.

conceded compared with Liverpool who had conceded only 24 goals, scoring 48.

Charlie George was the only player to have reached double figures with 14 goals. Lee and Hector, had netted eight, and six respectively, while Rioch and James had scored four goals each.

The Rams' reply came in a second half which they dominated. David Nish pushed a ball down the touchline for Charlie George to flick on to Kevin Hector. He appeared to be surrounded but took the ball on before playing it in for Rioch to crash into the far corner.

The Rams had won 17 of their 31 League games, which was more than their rivals, and they had also scored more goals with 51 to their credit. The one factor against them at this stage was their defensive record which stood at 40 goals

Milestone for Simmo

PAUL Simpson, the perennial substitute this season, reached a club milestone in the League fixture at Cleethorpes against Grimsby Town. His appearance from the bench, as a substitute for Marco Gabbiadini, represented his 150th League appearance for the Rams.

He made his debut in the away game against Leicester City on February 22 1992 and celebrated with a goal in a Rams 2-1 victory.

Paul scored seven goals in his 17 League appearances, but did not score in either of the Play Off games against Blackburn Rovers.

He made his 300th League appearance against West Ham United, a game which was the Rams' eighth defeat in 11 home League fixtures. That was Paul's 35th League appearance, in which he had scored 16 goals.

His 50th League appearance for the Rams came in the penultimate game of the season, a 2-0 home win over Notts

County. By that time he had scored 19 goals and made three appearances as a substitute.

It was against Notts County that Paul made his 100th competitive appearance for the Rams. The disappointing game ended in a 1-1 draw though Paul did not add to the 31 goals he had scored in

87+13 appearances.

In the League he had made 81 appearances, 10 of which were as a substitute, scoring 26 goals. The 19 appearances to take him to 100 League appearances for the Rams took until November 19 1994, when Derby defeated Port Vale at the BBG 2-0 with goals from Tommy Johnson. Paul had added a further three goals in the 19 games, five of which were as a substitute to take his total to 29.

Paul completed 150 competitive appearances for the Rams in the 0-1 home defeat by Sunderland in April last

year and ended the season with 42 goals in 156 appearances, 19 as a substitute. In the League he had scored 36 goals in 127 appearances, 15 of which came from the bench.

This season although starting in the team Paul has recently been making most of his appearances from the bench, doubling his total appearances from 15 to 30 as a substitute.

He was recalled to the team for the victory at Southend on Saturday and duly obliged with his second League goal in 9 +15 appearances, his 151st League appearance for the Rams.

NAMES FROM A CENTURY AGO

James Methven

JAMES METHVEN had a dual career at Derby, first as a player and then as a manager. 100 years ago he was very much a player.

It was his fifth season with the Rams after joining from Edinburgh St. Bernards in May 1981. He remained the Rams' regular right full back until 1906, playing for a short while after becoming manager in 1906.

Season 1895-96 saw Methven make 27 League appearances out of the 30 fixtures. In the previous four seasons he had missed only one League fixture to give him the formidable record of 142 appearances in 146 League matches. He played in 458 League games and 52 F.A. Cup games including the finals of 1898, 1899 and 1903.

Methven was the second manager of the club, following on from Harry Newbould. He was the first sole manager as Newbould also performed the duties of club secretary. In his first season – after the departure of Steve Bloomer to Middlesbrough – the Rams suffered their first ever relegation. In 1910 Bloomer was persuaded to return and helped the Rams under Methven to regain First Division status in 1911-12. After suffering another relegation in 1914 the Rams regained their status at the first attempt, only to be interrupted by the First World War. By the time that ended Methven, who also worked at Rolls-Royce, tried in vain to find new blood for an ailing club which was again relegated in 1921. A year later, suffering from glaucoma, he relinquished the post.

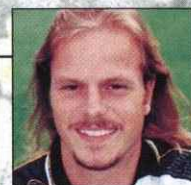
■ **LUTON TOWN** were playing in the Southern League 100 years ago. The club was formed in 1885 by the amalgamation of two clubs, Luton Wanderers, who had included the name Town in their title just three months earlier, and Luton Excelsior. They were the first club in the south to employ professional players. They played in the Southern League from 1894-1896 and were elected to Division Two of the Football League in 1897. Now known as 'The Hatters', they also carried the nickname of "The Straw-plaiters" in the early days.

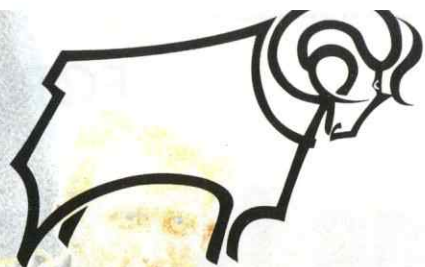

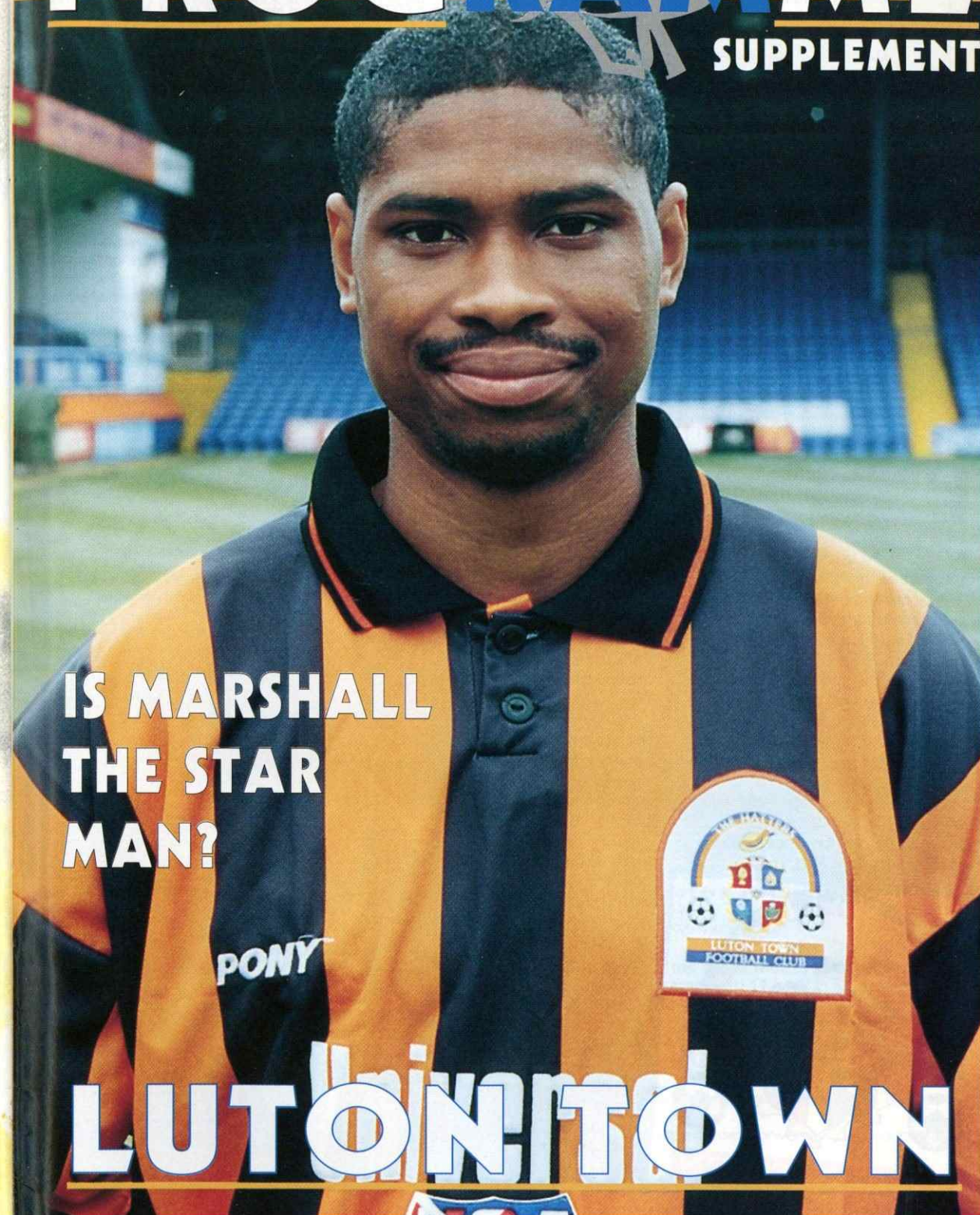

STEVE DAVIS, who was signed from Burnley for £750,000 last summer, began his career with Southampton but he was limited to only seven League outings with the Saints. He spent loan periods with Burnley and Notts County before making a full transfer to Burnley in 1991. He was a regular in the Clarets side

in each of his four seasons with the club.

DARREN PATTERSON, who arrived from Crystal Palace in a £230,000 deal in November, is a N. Ireland international with eight caps. He remained in the reserve teams with his first club W.B.A., getting his League chance after moving to Wigan in 1989. He was transferred to Palace in the summer of 1992.

MITCHELL THOMAS returned for his second spell with the Hatters in November 1993. He started as an apprentice at Kenilworth Road, making his League debut in 1983. He did well enough to earn three England under-21 caps before transferring to Tottenham for £250,000 in 1986. He moved on to West Ham in 1991, remaining at Upton Park until his return to Luton.

MARVIN JOHNSON rose from the youth team to make his League debut during the 1987/88 campaign and he is now fast approaching his 200th League appearance for the Hatters.

Lennie Lawrence took over as Luton's manager shortly before Christmas, a few weeks after leaving Bradford City where he had been in charge since the summer of 1994.

Mr Lawrence started his managerial career with Charlton, where he spent nine eventful years. In 1986 he led the club back into the old First Division after an absence of 29 years.

But life at the top was always a struggle and in 1990 Charlton were relegated.

He took over at Middlesbrough in July 1991 and enjoyed a remarkable first season. He quickly knocked the team into shape and, in addition

to winning promotion to the Premier League, he helped them equal a club record by surviving to the semi-finals of the League Cup.

Middlesbrough were later relegated but he remained at Ayresome Park until 1994 when he moved on to Bradford City.

Mr Lawrence spent his playing days in top amateur football with Crowdon, Carshalton Athletic and Sutton United but, when his playing days came to an end, he decided to break into the professional game.

He took up coaching and eventually became assistant-manager at Plymouth. He later took a similar post with Lincoln before initially joining Charlton as reserve team coach. He took over as manager in December 1982.



MIDFIELDERS

RICHARD HARVEY played for the England youth team during his years as an apprentice at Kenilworth Road. He made his League debut in 1986 and has since made more than 150 League appearances for the Hatters. At one point he spent a loan period with Blackpool.

GRAHAM ALEXANDER started as a trainee with Scunthorpe. After making his League debut in 1991, he made more than 150 League appearances for them before joining Luton for £100,000 last summer.

GARY WADDOCK joined Luton from Bristol Rovers last season. He kicked-off with Q.P.R. and soon won a place in the Republic of Ireland side, going on to win 21 caps. He returned to Q.P.R. in 1991, then had a short loan period with Swindon before joining Bristol Rovers in 1992.

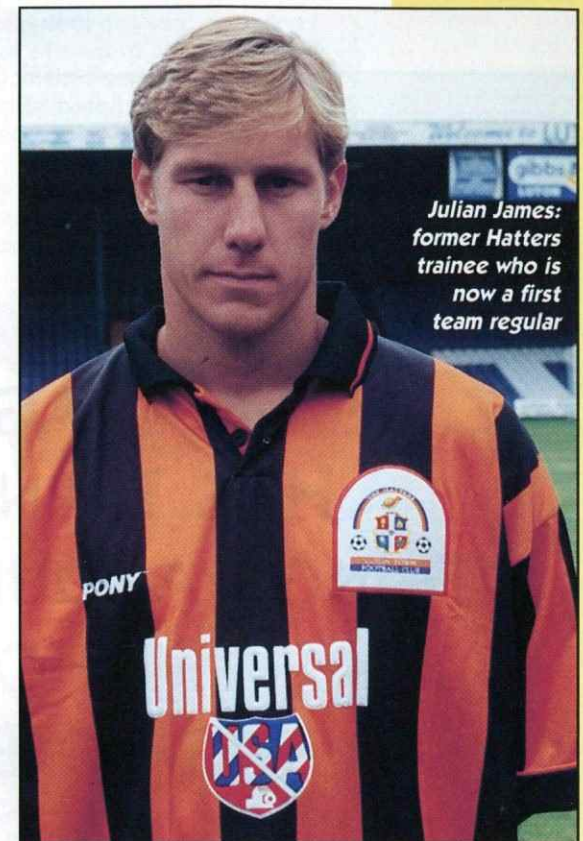
