



Welcome to LUTON



HAT a difference five months has made in the fortunes of Luton Town. When they came to the Memorial Ground for the Coca-Cola Cup tie in September they had a healthy lead from the first leg but were otherwise in turmoil.



They had won just one of their four league games played and had just suffered a 5-0 defeat at Bristol City. When they went 2-0 down in the game here it seemed their season was set to go from bad to worse.

But just as they recovered to go through 4-2 on aggregate in that cup tie, their season has turned round so much they are many people's new favourites for the second division title.


Prior to last weekend's games, they were in a position where they would go top by winning their matches in hand on leaders Brentford.

They followed up the win over Rovers with a fine second round win over Premiership Derby Coun-

ty and then held Wimbledon to a draw away from home in the third round before losing the replay. Their FA Cup run ended in more dramatic fashion – a 6-2 third round replay defeat at first division high-flyers Bolton Wanderers – but they got there by winning tricky ties against Torquay United and non-league Boreham Wood.

Recent league victories have included the away games at Notts County and Gillingham, which followed a sensational 6-0 home win over promotion rivals Crewe Alexandra.

One reason for the turnaround has clearly been the form of the division's top scorer Tony Thorpe, whose goals made him the obvious choice for today's Star Man column.



But otherwise, Lennie Lawrence seems to have benefitted from having a settled side whose results have got steadily better the more they have played together.

The side has not included two old Rovers favourites, Gary Waddock and John Taylor, with the latter recently departing on a free transfer to Cambridge United, the club which he left to join the Gas.

Thorpe's main partner up front has been Dwight Marshall, the former Plymouth Argyle striker. He was still recovering from a broken leg for September's cup tie but was fit again by the time Rovers played at Luton in the league and scored the first goal in Town's 2-1 win.

Jamaican-born Marshall has returned to the team at the expense of Ghanaian Kim Grant. He signed from Charlton, for whom he made well over 100 league appearances, just before last season's transfer deadline and scored three goals in ten games as Luton lost their battle against relegation from division one.

Also waiting in the wings for a striker's role is a

player who played in Euro 96, Bulgarian Bontcho Guentchev. He entered British football with Ipswich Town after signing from Sporting Lisbon and left Suffolk for Kenilworth Road on a free transfer in the summer of 1995.

Town's mainline midfielders are Graham Alexander, Ceri Hughes, Paul Showler and David Oldfield.

Alexander, like Showler and Oldfield, scored in the victory against Crewe and is renowned for his shooting. He was signed for Luton by Terry Westley, who had a short spell in charge before Lennie Lawrence took over last season, but has remained a regular under the new manager. He played more than 150 league games for his only previous league club, Scunthorpe United.

Hughes is a one-club man who has won full international honours for Wales. He will shortly celebrate his 26th birthday and has played more than

150 league games for the Hatters, after being linked with bigger clubs several times during his career.

Showler was manager Lawrence's main summer signing. He stayed in the second division as his previous club Bradford City were promoted to the first division. Doncaster-born Showler started his career in the south with Barnet.

Australian Oldfield is in his second spell with Luton, the club with whom he was an apprentice. He left to join Manchester City for £600,000 in 1989, was sold to Leicester City for £150,000 within a year, and also had a loan spell at Millwall before returning to Luton.

The regular full backs are Julian James and Mitchell Thomas and centre backs Steve Davis and Marvin Johnson, although Des Linton has also featured in recent matches.

Both full backs are Luton apprentices, although Thomas fitted in 157 league games for Tottenham Hotspur and 38 for West Ham between his two spells with the club. Both have played well over 200 games for Luton.

Davis established his League career at Burnley after an apprenticeship at Southampton, for whom he played seven full league games at the top level. He won the old fourth division championship during his time with Burnley.

Johnson is another home-grown player who seems to have been turning out for Town for longer than even the 200-plus games he has played for them since making his debut in 1988.

Linton is another former Leicester City player and signed for Luton in 1991. Other defenders on the fringes of the first team are Northern Ireland international Darren Patterson, formerly of West Brom, Wigan Athletic and Crystal Palace, and Paul McLaren, a former trainee.

In goal is 6ft 6in Tony Feuer, who followed fellow American Juergen Sommer in becoming Town's first-choice keeper. His English career started with West Ham United, for whom he failed to play a league game, but he turned out 16 times for Peterborough United while on loan. His understudy is former trainee Kelvin Davis, an England under-21 international.

Star Man **TONY THORPE**

Tony Thorpe has finally been handed a regular place in Luton Town's starting line-up and has stormed to the top of the second division scoring charts.

The former Leicester City trainee has often been used as a substitute in previous seasons and often on the left-hand side of midfield.

But the opening day of the season may have set the seal for what followed. Thorpe scored from 20 yards against Burnley in a 2-1 home defeat. And as he has continued to score, so his team's fortunes have drastically improved.

He has already made his mark against Rovers this season, scoring in the Coca-Cola Cup tie and then from the penalty spot in the final minute of the league game at Kenilworth Road to seal the three points.


He is also enjoying the experience of hat-tricks this season. He scored all his team's goals in a 3-3 draw at Plymouth Argyle and then grabbed three again during that 6-0 home victory against Crewe.

Even on the few unsuccessful days Luton have had recently, Thorpe's name has appeared on the score sheet. He scored both goals in the 6-2 FA Cup defeat at Bolton.

Prior to last weekend's games he had scored 16 league goals, plus another four in the cup competitions to overhaul Brentford's Carl Asaba and become the divisions top scorer.

The future is now looking very bright for the 5ft 9in player who does not celebrate his 23rd birthday until April.

He is likely to have completed more than 100 games for Town by the end of the season and their supporters will be hoping there are many more to come.

WE ARE HERE TO HELP!

BACK in time

NEW Years Day 1921 was the date of our first league meeting with Luton, a game which had me delving back into the archives. So, given that I was not at the game, even though one of my ancestors appears to have played on Luton's left wing. I'll let you read snippets from the original match report which appeared in the local press.

"If Rovers had been offered a draw as the result of the match at Luton before a ball had been kicked off, they would have been well content to accept it, for Luton had not been beaten at home this season and Rovers had only won once away - at Newport.

Leigh had been dropped from Rovers team since the Christmas Day match at Swansea, but came back owing to a shortage through injuries and signalled his gratitude by getting both goals by which the Rovers led at the interval. His first was after half an hour's play when Bailey and Tirrell in the Luton's defence, were both at fault. The second came soon after and was the climax of a wonderful dribble during which he beat several opponents and wound up with a shot which gave Bailey no chance. The

only goal for Luton was scored by Tirrell from a free kick. Whatley having no chance with a really great drive.

The Luton players and spectators, once in the second half vigorously claimed that Whatley was beaten by Molyneux

and that the ball went over the line before Panes headed it out, but the point was not allowed. Rovers conceded a penalty for handball, but Whatley saved the kick taken by Sims.

Apparently, Rovers star man was Jesse Whatley, Rovers goalkeeper and our reporter had this to say about his performance. "Apart from the penalty save, he found it impossible to make a mistake, though the ball was slippery and the ground was greasy to a degree. It was the best display of goalkeeping seen at Luton this season".

Rovers went on to finish in 10th position with 43 points at the end of their first season in the Football League whilst the Hatters finished 1 point and 1 place better off on their return to League football since losing their place in 1900.



The match at Kenilworth Road on the 20th of March 1993 was not only the 64th meeting between the sides, it was Rovers first match under new manager John Ward. Tony Pounder and Lee Maddison were recalled to the side and Brian Parkin returned in goal in place of the injured Gavin Kelly. Both sides were fighting against relegation, though Rovers plight was becoming desperate, anchored as they were to the bottom of the table with 31 points from 35 games.

The first half was described as a grim spectacle in the Evening Post both teams appeared nervous and afraid to make mistakes on the hard surface. Although selected to play out wide, Pounder and David Mehew often found themselves drawn into midfield. The second half was only 13 minutes old when Maddison, playing his first game since October, swung out his boot to clear a cross from Marvin Johnson, but



only succeeded in hitting a spectacular volley past Parkin to put the home side ahead. However, Rovers scored a deserved equaliser in the 72nd minute, when good work from Carl Saunders set Pounder free and his cross was met by substitute John Taylor whose looping header went over goalkeeper Alec Chamberlain and into the net. Luton tried to get another goal and David Pearce crashed a shot against the crossbar with 15 minutes remaining, although Rovers could have nicked the three points in the closing stages, as Saunders first of all just failed to get on the end of a cross from Mehew and then shot narrowly wide from the edge of the box.

After the game, John Taylor said he thought he had played his last game for the club, as he hoped to complete a £300,000 move to Portsmouth. As we know that move didn't materialise and he has now rejoined his first club Cambridge, following spells at Bradford City and Luton.




JESSE WHATLEY - Rovers star man in 1921

15th February 1930

ROVERS played out a dramatic and exciting Third Division (South) game against Watford at Vicarage Road on this day. Bert Densley replaced Jesse Whatley in Rovers' goal, while Wally Gillespie and Mick Cosgrove played in defence and Tom Roberts was recalled at inside-right. Rovers trailed 3-2 at half-time and eventually lost 4-3. Jack Phillips, Ronnie Dix and Watford's left back Joe Davison (own goal) scored for Rovers, Harry Lowe (two), Neil McBain and Billy Chapman for the Hornets. A crowd of 5,000 saw the match. Neil McBain, a Scottish international wing half, was to enter the record books in 1947 as the oldest player to appear in league football, as a stand-in emergency goalkeeper for New Brighton at Hartlepool. Not surprisingly, he is the only player born in the nineteenth century to have appeared in league football since World War Two. On the same day, Bill Birch's goal earned today's visitors Luton Town a 1-1 draw at Fulham, whose scorer was Ralph Allen, a brother of the Rovers centre forward Jack Allen.

15th February 1958

The second and most recent occasion that Rovers reached the FA Cup quarter finals came as a result of an epic fifth round game against Bristol City at Ashton Gate. Alfie Biggs who had flu, was replaced at inside right

by Barrie Meyer in Rovers side. Rovers were a goal down in four minutes, but goals from Dai Ward, Norman Sykes and Barrie Meyer put the Pirates 3-1 ahead on 42 minutes. Before half time City were awarded a penalty but John Watkins, who joined Rovers two years later, and who had scored City's goal, missed the spot kick. Undaunted, City scored through Bobby Etheridge and captain Tommy Burden. Rovers winner, after 83 minutes, was a controversial one from Geoff Bradford but it was enough to earn a 4-3 victory and an ultimately unsuccessful quarter final clash with Fulham. Luton won 2-1 at Burnley in a First Division game.


15th February 1964

A crowd of 9486 at Eastville saw Rovers and Millwall fight out a 2-2 draw in Division Three. Rovers were unchanged after a win at Colchester, while the Lions recalled Tom Wilson and Harry Obeney in place of John Leadham and Elton John's uncle Roy Dwight. Alfie Biggs put Rovers ahead at half

time, but a draw was all Rovers could manage. Harold Jarman was the Pirates' other goalscorer, while David Jones and Joe Haverty, a mercurial Irishman who was to join Rovers ten months later, scored for the visitors. In the same division, Luton Town won 2-0 at home to Shrewsbury Town.

15th February 1985

Les Berry, who played in goal for Rovers in 34 league games, died in Leicestershire on this




NORMAN SYKES - also scored on this day in 1958

day, at the age of 78. Berry had joined Rovers from Sheffield Wednesday in June 1930 and later experienced league football with Swindon Town. However, he was much better known as a cricketer, captaining his adopted county of Leicestershire and achieving great success as a stylish batsman. Between 1924 and 1951 he scored over 30,000 runs in first-class cricket, top scoring with 232 against Sussex at Leicester in 1930.


Jamie Cureton heads for goal, but Shrewsbury keeper Gall eventually pushed the ball onto the bar







Grandstand Finish

THIS afternoon should see the opening of the new West Stand here at The Memorial Ground.

The stand is a culmination of many years of concerted effort by Bristol Rugby Club who deserve great credit for improving the facilities at the ground. Planning permission for the stand was granted well before Rovers were contemplated as ground sharers and restrictions were placed on the height of the structure. The original building lines from the previous stand

had to be followed and could not, unfortunately, be extended to cover the full width of the west side of the ground. The £2m contract for building the stand and associated terracing was awarded to Ernest Ireland Construction of Bath. The stand includes 18 executive boxes, each of which can accommodate up to 15 people and offers excellent views of the pitch. Bar facilities are avail-

able in each box and supporters will be able to enjoy the excellent catering facilities on offer. Below the boxes there is seating accommodation for over 400 and two bars. The terraced area in front of the seats has a capacity of approximately 1,000 and the area underneath the stand houses the dressing rooms, a Physio room and a room for match officials.

The clubs Directors, who will now view matches from the West Stand will use a room on the same level as the executive boxes to entertain visiting Directors on matchdays.

At the top of the stand, there is a television gantry and room for the video crew. Current Centenary Stand and Terrace season ticket holders have had the opportunity to swap seats or terrace places for the new facilities over the past two weeks and the stand was officially opened on Thursday when a Bristol Rugby XV played Auckland Blues. I'm certain that the new stand will provide an improved atmosphere at future matches and be a valuable asset for both the rugby and football clubs.

Many older Rovers supporters will, I'm sure, recall the opening of the North Stand, at Eastville, back in 1958. As far as I can tell, that structure cost just £76,000, with £10,000 of that figure being donated by the Supporters Club and it was described as "a well appointed stand with the accent on comfort throughout, fronted by a spacious covered-in enclosure of extra deep terracing, which will give the club's headquarters an impressive new look".

The North Stand had a capacity of 3,000 (no executive boxes!) and was, apparently, constructed in "100 days and nights, thanks to the skills of the British workforce". It was in use for the

first home game of the 1958/59 season, when Rovers beat Scunthorpe 4-0, and it would be nice to think we could mark the use of the West Stand for the first time with a similarly emphatic victory.

MIKE JAY

In Conversation with ... Billy Clark

Come October, Billy Clark will have been with the club 10 years, a time during which he has experienced many highs and lows. "That's right", says Bill "and to be honest, I didn't know what to expect when I first arrived. I had been a reserve team player at Bournemouth and was surprised to get into Rovers first team so soon after I came here. The 1989/90 season, though, was the lowest point in my career. We won the Third Division title and reached Wembley in the Leyland Daf Cup, yet I didn't play at all that season and whilst everyone around me were enjoying themselves, I was wondering if I would ever play again, as it took so long to diagnose exactly what was wrong with my injured knee, so it's not difficult naming the 1995 play off final against Huddersfield as the highlight of my Rovers career, as it more than made up for missing out in 1990." He's also been on the transfer list a couple of times. "Yes, the first time was when Martin Dobson was manager and the second time was when Dennis Rofe brought Kevin Moore into the side and made it clear I wasn't part of his plans. Times like that can be worrying, as all through the week, training is geared towards Saturdays game and when you know that you're unlikely to be playing, it's difficult to motivate yourself."

It was under John Ward that Bill's career blossomed, as he developed a fine understanding with Andy Tillson at the heart of Rovers defence, a partnership that has, until recently, continued to flourish under Ian Holloway. "I played more games under John Ward than I had for any other manager and he showed faith and belief in my ability which, in turn, made me feel more relaxed and enabled me to play well. As for my partnership with Andy, its no different to having a good striking partnership. We developed a good understanding right from the start and things improved from there".

Until he received a red card at Chesterfield, in the first game of 1997, Bill had missed only one game this season. That sending off, though, paved the way for Tom White to take his place alongside Tillson. "It was disappointing to be sent off that day. The pitch was icy and although I caught my opponents heel, there was no deliberate intent, on my part, to

bring him down and I thought the referee could have made allowances for the conditions. However, match officials have a difficult job to do. As a result, though, Tom is now in the side in my place and I want him and the team to do well. Its frustrating being out of the side, though. I don't enjoy watching games and I know I'll have to battle to get back in the side. Still, I've had to do it before, so I know exactly what's expected of me."

Having been a team mate of Ian Holloway not so long ago, I wondered if Bill had found it difficult getting used to playing under Ian Holloway the manager. It's been a little bit strange, I must admit, not just for me, but for many of the players.

You're always taught to look up to and listen to your manager, but when he's playing alongside you as just another player, its difficult to forget he's also the manager and it has been a little bit confusing. Still, I think all the problems have now been ironed out and we have all adjusted to the situation. There have been many other changes that we have had to get used to, this season. We've had to adjust our style of play and get used to new surroundings. Twerton Park was a compact ground and there was always a good atmosphere there, whereas The Memorial Ground pitch is heavier and with the crowd on only two sides, the atmosphere has been different. There have been changes in personnel, too, with many young players coming into the side, which means that as well as concentrating on your own game, the onus has been on the more experienced members of the side to help the youngsters as much as possible."

So, what of the future? "Making your league debut is a big step. Its happened for a number of our players this season and they will continue to make progress with every game they play, so I think the future of the club is in safe hands. As for myself, thinking about what I do after I finish playing can be a worrying scenario at times. I hope to play on for another 4/5 years and would eventually like to remain in the game as a coach, though I think its a case of being in the right place at the right time for that to happen."


It's good to have competition for places in the side and I wouldn't bet against Bill returning to the side and going on to become a member of the elite group of players who have made 300 + appearances for Rovers.



Phil Bater, who, in two separate spells as a player with Rovers chalked up over 300 league appearances, has recently returned to the club for a third time, as manager of the U-16 youngsters who attend the Centre of Excellence. So what, I wondered had he been up to since leaving the club back in 1986. "My first move was to Brentford, where I teamed up again with Ian Holloway. He had a nightmare time at Griffin Park and I always remind him about it. After a year in London, I played for my hometown club Cardiff for two years and had an enjoyable time with them. At the end of my first season, we won promotion to the Third Division and also won the Welsh Cup, which meant we qualified for the 1988/89 European Cup Winners Cup. We played, and beat Derry in the First Round and, because of the security situation in Ireland, we had to have members of the Special Branch as part of our group, for the away leg. The people over there were marvellous and we didn't experience any trouble. In the Second Round, we lost to Danish side Aarhus."

That season, though, was Phil's last in league football. "Yes, it was. I went on holiday at the end of that campaign and that's when I decided to quit. I was offered a new two year deal, but I had lost my enthusiasm and enjoyment for the game. Steve Millard and Brian Godfrey persuaded me to play a few pre-season friendlies at Gloucester, but I honestly couldn't face the prospect of playing competitive football again at that time."

So, are there any regrets? "No, not really. I didn't miss playing, though I did miss training and keeping fit. I had always had an interest in gardening though, and had taken a degree in horticulture whilst I was playing. Even in the early days at Rovers, I trained in the mornings and undertook gardening jobs in the afternoon. Anyone who had a lift to training with me would find themselves surrounded by gardening implements. When I left Cardiff, I secured a contract for undertaking maintenance work for one of the country's leading landscape garden companies and after 2 1/2 years I set up my own landscape gardening business. We are now based at Bitton and formed a limited company in 1992".





There are special memories of Eastville, though. "It's sad that it's going to be demolished, as I have so many memories of playing there. The big crowds we drew created a unique atmosphere. I always got on well with the crowd and there were so many great games." Strangely, though, it's an FA Cup Tie at Ashton Gate that Phil remembers particularly well. "We won 3-1. I think it was in 1984/85 and Paul Randall scored twice with Mark O'Connor getting the other. Earlier in my career, I had played in five Gloucestershire Cup Finals against City and ended up with five losers medals, so it was a very satisfying win that day. I remember Ollie being the last player off the pitch that day, which typifies his attitude to the game. I used to give him a lift to training and we learned all about the game from Don Megson, Bill Dodgin and Bobby Campbell, who instilled the will to win in us. Ollie hates losing and during his last two years at QPR, I felt he improved as a player beyond all recognition. We always kept in touch and I was delighted when he asked me back to the club. Over the last few years, I have been involved in local football and obtained my Preliminary Coaching Badge. I think my time out of the game helped me recharge my batteries and I hope to stay involved with the Centre of Excellence. I'm working closely with Tony Gill, as next years YTS intake will come from the U-16 group and I'm thoroughly enjoying it."

In closing, I asked Phil about this season's first game at The Memorial Ground. "It was a brilliant day, and to see so many ex-players return for the occasion demonstrates the affection they still have for the club.

I've been to a number of games since that day and I'm sure that Ollie will be successful as the club's manager. The crowd deserve a mention as well. Their attitude hasn't changed at all. As long as they can see that the players are giving everything, they will remain loyal and patient. There's no doubt that Rovers are a great club and I'm so pleased they are back in Bristol."

Good to have you back, as well Phil – keep up the good work at The Centre of Excellence.

Dear Sir,



THE latest addition to the Schoolboy ranks at the club is David Gilroy, a 14-year-old striker who hails from Langport, in Somerset. It's only a few months since David was invited along to the Centre of Excellence, so the fact that he has signed schoolboy forms so quickly is an indication of how highly he is rated by Roy Dolling, Tony Gill and Chief Youth Scout Richard Everson.

"Yes," says David, "it's true that I only recently joined Rovers. Richard Everson saw me playing for the Yeovil and District Schools side at Preston School and he asked my parents if I would be interested in joining the club's Centre of Excellence. They wanted me to sign schoolboy forms straight away, but it was eventually agreed that I would travel to Bristol for a trial spell. I had previously attended the Southampton Centre of Excellence in Bath for a short time, but I didn't feel comfortable when I was there. Although I didn't know anyone at Rovers when I first went there, it seemed very relaxed and I seem to have settled in well, thanks to the other lads there and my coach, Tony Gill. I scored 4 goals in my first three games and feel very comfortable at the club."

Enter Mum and Dad, John and Sue. "David had previously played for Ilminster, but when the team folded, we contacted Southampton, who invited David up to Bath. As he says, he didn't play well when he was there. He then began playing for Yeovil Town's U-14 side and this season he has represented the Yeovil and District U-15 side and played for them at Home Park, Plymouth and in a Fuji Cup competition in Cornwall." Naturally enough, David's ambition is to be a professional footballer. "Yes I've always wanted to play professionally, but I realise that I have to keep up my education, something that Roy Dolling has made very clear, both to myself and my parents."

The commitment, both to his football and his schoolwork are not lost on John and Sue. "We were not certain that David should sign schoolboy forms, as it is quite a commitment for ourselves as well as David, as he has to travel to Bristol for

training on Mondays and Fridays, as well as travel to play a match on Sundays, although we recognised that, in order to improve his game, he needed to receive the coaching that a professional club can offer. The club put no pressure on us for David to sign and Richard Everson talked to us and explained all of the pitfalls whilst Roy Dolling emphasised the need for David to concentrate on his education, pointing out that very few youngsters actually achieve their ambition of making it as a professional footballer. Roy has seen David's headmaster, at Huish Episcopie School and the school has been very supportive. We are pleased for David, but his plans are to remain at school until he is 18 and we are keen that his schoolwork should not suffer because of his footballing ambitions. The club have been very good, in that they have agreed that David does not attend the Centre of Excellence every Friday, as it's quite a way to travel."

Meanwhile David has noticed quite a difference in the standard of football since attending the Centre of Excellence. "Yes, I think that the game is a little bit quicker, in terms of pace and thought and my parents noticed a difference in my game even after my first training sessions in Bristol." It should be added that David enjoys many other sports and, unlike many other youngsters, doesn't mind his parents watching him play. "I've played basketball and rugby for my school and also enjoy swimming, crosscountry and tennis. My parents are very supportive and have always encouraged me to do well at football and I think they enjoy watching me play."

I know that Mum and Dad are pleased for David and will be happy if he can play football at the highest level and having travelled down to Langport on a cold, winter's evening, I admire their commitment to furthering David's career and don't envy them the thousands of miles they will travel over the next few years. I was more than grateful for the refreshments provided by David's sister Laura, but can't help wondering where the team at the Centre of Excellence will send me for my next interview!

From The Boardroom


In any aspect today, whether it be on the amateur or the professional scene, a participant may at some time suffer from loss of form.



Division Two Round - Up



The two league fixtures played during the week commencing the 27th January both finished in goalless draws. Watford extended their unbeaten run to 21 as they gained a point on their short journey to Luton. Burnley were held at home by Chesterfield. Stockport lined themselves up with a League Cup semi final meeting with Middlesbrough after a surprise 2-1 win at Southampton in a quarter final replay. Andy Mutch, with his first touch after coming on as substitute, grabbing the winner after Brett Angell had levelled a Matthew Le Tissier opener. Troubled Bournemouth are given the go ahead to play their weekend fixture against Blackpool. Leaders Brentford sell Nicky Forster to Birmingham.

The league fixtures the Saturday before last saw Brentford maintain their four point lead at the top with a 2-1 win at Stockport. David McGhee and Robert Taylor were both on the mark after Luis Cavaco had put the home side in the lead. Luton in second place also recovered a goal deficit on their visit to troubled Notts County. Ceri Hughes and Graham Alexander scoring to give the Hatters their third consecutive victory at Meadow Lane. Shaun Goater scored twice as Bristol City reclaimed third place with a 2-0 win at Millwall. The south London club could well be in trouble with the FA after a pitch invasion near the end. Crewe dropped to fourth after being held to a 1-1 draw at home by Burnley. Steve MacAuley gave the Railways the lead only for Paul Barnes to snatched a late equaliser. Bury kept in touch after a 2-0 win at York. Michael Jackson and Ronnie Jepson both on target. At the bottom Rotherham fell deeper into trouble after suffering a 2-0 reverse at Watford. Darren Bazeley and Stuart Slater on target as the Hornets kept up play-off ambitions. Wycombe gained a useful point in a goalless affair at Plymouth. Peterborough remained in the bottom four after going down by the only goal at home to Walsall after a last minute strike from Andy Watson. The Saddlers are now unbeaten on their last nine visits to London Road.

Substitute Andy Morris gave Chesterfield the points at Preston with the only goal two minutes after entering the fray. Ade Akinbiyi cancelled out an earlier Karl Connelly goal as Gillingham gained their first point at the Racecourse since January 1978. In other games 8200 turn out to see Bournemouth play out a goalless affair with Blackpool at Dean Court while here at the Memorial Ground Marcus Browning and Peter Beadle find the net as Rovers beat Shrewsbury 2-0, our first win since November.

In midweek the week before last, in the delayed fourth round FA Cup ties, two of the four division's survivors reached the fifth round. Chesterfield took pride of place with a 3-2 win at Bolton, the runaway First Division leaders. Teenage striker Kevin Davies was the hero, notching a hat trick as the Derbyshire club reach the last 16 for the first time since 1938. Kevin Russell scored twice as Wrexham twice came from behind to beat Peterborough 4-2 at London Road. Watford who had Steve Palmer sent off went down 3-1 at Manchester City. In the only league game, Ian Cox and David Town were both on target as Bournemouth put Notts County further in trouble with a 2-0 win at Meadow Lane, their first there since October 1972. Plymouth dispensed with the services of manager Neil Warnock, assistant Mick Jones taking over team affairs.

Last weekend saw Brentford keep their four point advantage over the chasing pack after being held to a 1-1 home draw by Watford. Carl Asaba putting the Bees ahead only for debutant Keith Scott on loan from Norwich to grab a point for the Hornets. Luton were also held to a draw at home after Tony Thorpe twice put them ahead only for Adrian Littlejohn and Mike Evans to salvage a point for Plymouth. Third placed Bristol City were also held at home but recovered after Alan Armstrong had put Stockport ahead. Shaun Goater struck to claim a point. City have not been beaten by the Cheshire club since


March 1915. Bury moved to fourth after a 2-1 home win over Bournemouth, Rob Matthews scoring the winner. Crewe dropped to fifth place after a 2-0 defeat at Wycombe, Paul Read and Miguel DeSouza grabbing the goals to lift the Buckinghamshire club to fourth from bottom.

The three clubs below them all suffered defeats. Millwall took the lead at Walsall but their wretched form continued as the home side hit back with strikes from Andy Watson and Adrian Viveash. Andy Hessenthaler with this first goal for Gillingham was enough to beat the Rovers at Priestfield, while the division's last two survivors in the FA Cup Chesterfield and Wrexham played out a goalless affair at Saltergate where the Welshmen have been beaten on their last five visits.


