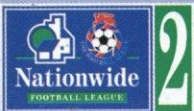

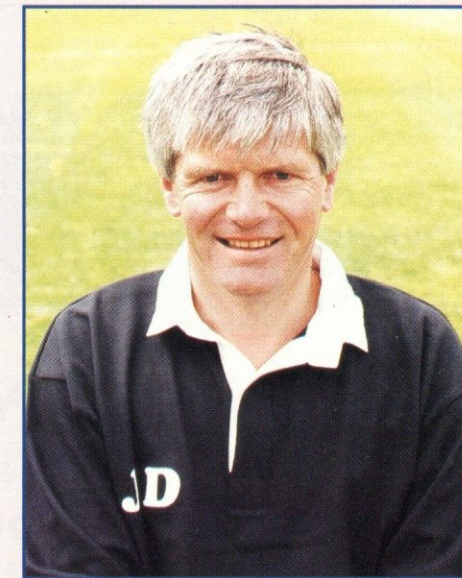

DIVISION 2 UPDATE

Ollie Pardo looks at life in Division Two

The Spireites have set the records crashing on two successive Saturdays and for completely different reasons. The famous victory over Nottingham Forest took Chesterfield to the sixth round for the first time in 131 years and then against Plymouth established the unwanted tag of being involved in a game with the highest number of sendings off in the 108 year history of the Football league - now sponsored by the Nationwide Building Society. Prior to the Plymouth game there have been four instances of four players dismissed in one game, which were on 8 January 1955 - Crewe Alexandra v Bradford P.A. Division Three North. 13 January 1986 - Sheffield United v Portsmouth Division Two. 12 December 1987 - Brentford v Mansfield

Division Three. 12 August 1987 Port Vale v Northampton Littlewoods Cup. Whilst the Chesterfield v Plymouth match will go down in the record books it won't exactly be an entry to be proud of. Our friends from the Nationwide League Press Release had this to say about the match against the Pilgrims, "Argyle has scored two goals in each of the last four games at Chesterfield" - so that record is now level with the number of red cards seen at Saltergate. Let's have a look at the more light hearted side of the game - here's a nice quote from the Guardian's Soccer Diary, "What is the difference between Forest's defeat by Anderlecht 13 years ago and the defeat at Chesterfield last Saturday? Only the Spire was crooked last Saturday!"

If you saw Tom Curtis' appearance on the Frank Skinner Show a couple of weeks ago, you will probably have cringed at Skinner's remarks about footballers lack of intelligence; not an accusation that could be levelled against our studying Spireites but the following is an amusing tale, though not from the Nationwide League. On a recent visit to play Merthyr Tydfil in the Dr Martens League Ashford Town's Tom Parks was asked by the team mates if he had his passport as they reached the Severn Bridge. The 17 year old asked if he needed one. When his colleagues said, "Oh yes", Tom decided there was only one thing to do. As the coach trundled over the bridge and past "passport control" into Wales, he hid in the toilet and again on the way back!

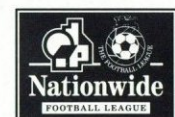

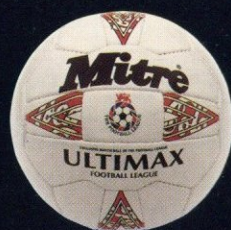

MEET THE BOSS

Lennie Lawrence was appointed manager of Luton Town in December 1995, following the departure of Terry Westley.

A player with non-league Croydon, Carshalton Athletic and Sutton United, Mr Lawrence was an assistant manager at Plymouth, where he was also caretaker manager, and at Lincoln, before becoming manager of Charlton Athletic in 1982, having initially joined the Addicks as reserve team coach.

Charlton finished as runners-up in Division Two in 1985/86 earning promotion to the top flight after an absence of 29 years. In the following season they were involved in the first promotion/relegation play-offs, overcoming second division Leeds Utd

in extra-time in a dramatic play-off final replay, but were relegated in 1990.

Mr Lawrence left Charlton in 1991, after nine years with the club which at the time made him the third-longest serving manager in the country behind Nottingham Forest's Brian Clough and Oldham's Joe Royale.

He headed north to Middlesbrough, where he took the Teesside club into the FA Premier League in 1992 in his first season with them. They returned to Division One in 1993, Mr Lawrence left in 1994, when Bryan Robson took over at Ayresome Park.

He then joined Bradford in May 1994 leaving Valley Parade in November this year. He is the 21st manager in the history of Luton Town.

LUTON TOWN

Luton Town are Tonight's visitors to Saltergate for the first time in thirty years, and we meet for only the twenty second time in our history. The Hatters currently occupy a promotion spot lying second in Division Two, nine points ahead of the Spireites.

Lennie Lawrence's side has had a tremendous run recently, which has seen them climb the table; indeed, when the Spireites visited Kenilworth Road in September, Luton was languishing in the bottom half of

the Division. That afternoon, Chesterfield came out on top, thanks to a Tom Curtis penalty. Luton will be keen to regain their First Division status following last season's relegation. In fact, it is only four years ago that Luton was playing in the Premier League.

Many of the players from that era have been sold on, including John Hartson, Scott Oakes, Mark Pembridge and Juergen Sommer.

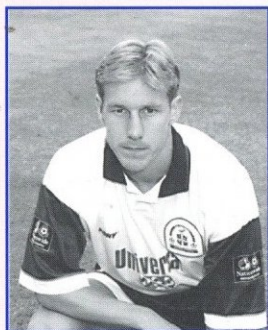

FACING THE SPIREITES

Giant American goalkeeper **IAN FEUER** joined the Hatters from West Ham in December 1995 for a fee which could rise to £580,000 depending on appearances. The 25 year old who stands 6ft 7 ins, was born in Las Vegas and was spotted by West Ham playing in Belgium, although he actually signed from Los Angeles Salsa. As understudy to Ludek Miklosko at Upton Park, he never made the first team and due to restrictions on overseas players was kept off the bench by Les Sealey. Ian originally joined the Hatters on loan and was named Player Of The Year for 1995-96. The outstanding form of Feuer has kept highly rated 20 year old **KELVIN DAVIS** on the sidelines. An England Under 21 International, he was on the bench for the recent Football League representative clash with Italy. Right back **JULIAN JAMES** has also represented England at Under 21 level. The 26 year

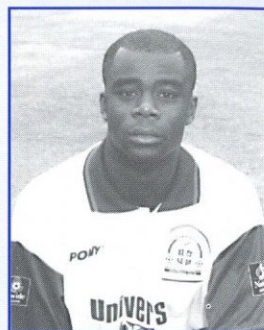
old joined the Hatters as a trainee and was introduced to First Division football in 1988. He was a regular at left back during the 1993-95 season but made the right back position his own in the following campaign winning the Player of the Year Award. A fee of £750,000 brought

STEVE DAVIS to Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1995 from Burnley. The 28 year old joined the Claret in August 1991 from Southampton after loan spells at Burnley and Notts County, and went on to captain them during their rise up the League to Division One. He is now club captain of the Hatters. Harry spent most of his career in the higher divisions, **MITCHELL THOMAS** came 'home' to Luton in November 1993 on a free transfer. The 32 year old, born in the Bedfordshire town, joined the Hatters for the first time as an apprentice and made over 100 appearances before moving on to Spurs, shortly after David Pleat in 1986. Mitchell played in the 1987 F.A. Cup Final and moved to West Ham in 1991 for a £500,000 fee. While his somewhat awkward style can lead to free kicks and penalties, he offsets that with his strength in the air. Primarily a central defender, but also able to operate at left-back or in midfield, **MARVIN JOHNSON** graduated from the apprentice ranks at Kenilworth Road to sign professional in 1986. The Wembley born 28 year old was Players' Player of the Year for 1994-95 and was again a consistent performer last season at centre back. **RICHARD HARVEY** is now back in training following a serious knee ligament injury sustained during the summer. The 27 year old also missed the entire 1993-94 season with a similar injury. Birmingham born **DES LINTON** also suffered knee injury earlier this season. The 25 year old full back was signed from Leicester City in 1991 along with Scott Oakes. Northern Ireland International **DARREN PATTERSON** signed for the Hatters in August 1995 from Crystal Palace for

£150,000. Born in Belfast 27 years ago, he started his league career at Wigan after an apprenticeship at West Brom, and moved to Palace for £250,000 in 1992. The 6ft 2ins tall defender had a loan spell at Preston earlier this season. Young defenders **BEN CHENERY** and **MATTHEW UPSON** are both looking to forge successful professional careers after progressing through the Hatters Youth Scheme.

An aggressive midfielder, who can use both feet, **CERI HUGHES** will celebrate ten years with Luton his only club, this summer. A Welsh International, the 26 year old had a trial spell at Crystal Palace last summer. At 34 years of age, **GARY WADDOCK** brings a wealth of experience to the Hatters midfield. Signed on a free transfer from Bristol Rovers in December 1994 after a three month loan spell, his consistent displays led to him carrying away the Players' Player Of The Year trophy last season. He made his name at QPR, for whom he appeared in the 1982 F.A. Cup Final and that was followed by a spell in Belgium as he recovered from a serious knee injury. Gary has also had spells at Millwall, QPR (again) and Swindon. **TONY THORPE** made an immediate impact in the Town back when he scored for the Hatters on his full debut at Newcastle United in the F.A. Cup Fourth Round in January 1994. The 22 year old joined the club in 1992 following a spell with his home town side Leicester City. A central or left sided attacking midfielder, he packs a firm shot. After two years of careful monitoring, Luton paid Scunthorpe United £100,000 for **GRAHAM ALEXANDER** in July 1995. The Coventry born 25 year old has

a good turn of speed, enjoys taking on defenders and packs an explosive shot in both feet. Twenty year old **PAUL McLAREN** joined the Hatters from school and has represented England at Youth Level. He started as a centre-

half but moved to midfield in the reserves during 1994-95. Looking to force their way into Lennie Lawrence's first team thoughts are **AARON SKELTON** a 22 year old who has had terrible injury problems and **SEAN EVERS** a 19 year old who made two first team appearances last season. Australian **DAVID OLDFIELD** smashed in a hat trick on February 22nd against lowly Preston and will certainly require close attention this evening. The 28 year returned to Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1995, six years after leaving for Manchester City in a £600,000 deal. He moved on to Leicester a year later and has a loan spell at Millwall in February 1995. Bulgarian International **BONTCHO GUENTCHEV** signed for the Hatters on a free transfer in the summer of 1995 from Ipswich Town. The 32 year old helped the Bulgarians to the World Cup Semi Finals in the USA in 1994 and spent three seasons at Ipswich. He also appeared for his country

during Euro '96. **KIM GRANT** made his name under Lennie Lawrence at Charlton Athletic and moved to Luton for £250,000 last March. The 24 year old Ghanian was selected for his national side during the summer of 1996 and is a regular member of the squad in the African Nations Cup and World Cup. A broken leg brought **DWIGHT MARSHALL's** 1995-96 campaign to an early conclusion. The 31 year old Jamaican joined the Hatters in 1994 from Plymouth for £150,000 and had netted 26 goals for the club upto his injury. Nineteen year old **ANDREW FOTIADIS** joined the Hatters on a full time basis last summer after staying on at school to complete his A-Levels. He gained International recognition with Under 15 and Under 18 caps for England, made his first team debut this season and celebrated his first goal in the 3-1 win over Walsall. Fellow teenager **STUART DOUGLAS** has an impressive scoring record in youth and reserve football and scored on his first team debut against Oldham in November 1995.

A BRIEF HISTORY

Luton Town Football Club was formed in 1885 as a fusion of local sides Wanderers and Excelsior. After a brief spell in the Southern League, twice runners-up, Luton were put up for election to the Football League. At their second attempt they were successful in 1897.

In 1921, Luton became founder members of the Third Division South. The Hatters first League Honours came in 1937 by gaining the Championship. After the war, the team achieved mid-table respectability and in 1955 promotion to Division One for the first time. After spending five seasons in the top flight, Luton were playing Fourth Division football with three demotions in the next five years.

With the fear of an application for re-election in 1966/67, the fight-back began with the Championship of Division Four being won in 1967/68 with a record points total. With a cash injection to the Club, Luton achieved promotion, as runners-up to Leyton Orient. Promotion back to the top sphere eventually came in 1974 but a poor season saw Luton lose their Division One status.

During manager David Pleat's reign, concerted efforts were made to bring top football back to Kenilworth Road. The Second

Division Championship was won in 1981/82. After some memorable escape acts, Luton were demoted in the 1991/92 season. Luton have reached the FA Cup Final once, losing out to Nottingham Forest 2-1. Success however was achieved in the League Cup in 1988 with a thrilling last minute 3-2 win over Arsenal at Wembley

Doncaster born Paul came back from injury to set up David Oldfield's first two goals against Preston last week. The 30 year old winger was signed from Bradford City last summer for £50,000, where he had played under Lennie Lawrence. A former police constable, Paul was on the books of Sheffield Wednesday, Sunderland, Colne Dynamos and Altrincham before bursting on to the League scene with Barry Fry's Barnet in 1991.

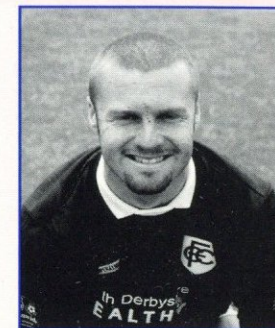
DRESSING ROOM TALK

TALKING POINT

IT'S ALL FOREIGN TO ME!! by Howard Borrell

It's so common now to see foreign players on show that I really don't think it will be long before a British team fields an all foreign first eleven - no bets taken on West Ham being the first club to reach such a milestone.

Fine, but what are the benefits? Are there any? To start with it was a novelty to see a slightly different approach to the game displayed in our own backyard - clubs in all four divisions decided to grab a slice of the action and go all continental. Some were college lads looking to complete their education, some were out of favour at home and they just fancied a change but they all had one thing in common - they were cheaper to buy (or obtain) than the British equivalent.

In my job we use contractors that have specific skills for a specific period of time and try to get them to impart their knowledge before they leave. Surely a similar approach in football would be useful or maybe the public would be quite happy to turn up at their local ground and watch a team of talented nomads perform. Possibly so if they're successful - if not, I doubt it!

I'd love to see youngsters come through the nursery sides and progress to the first team. I'd feel a greater sense of satisfaction if a side containing several home-grown players brought success to Chesterfield than if a team containing mainly foreign imports did the same.

Euro 96 made everyone happy in the summer but where will the national side be if all Premier League clubs adopt a West Ham type approach?

There are many schools of thought. Those who would close English Football's open door policy reckon a proliferation of foreigners will squeeze out domestic talent, and thereby damage the long term prospects of the England team. Glenn Hoddle is said to share the view.

Those with different views think such an argument does not stand up. They believe that history shows that if you take the

route, eventually the dam bursts and when it does the protectionists are usually the first to drown - I tend to agree.

Anyone who suggests England's international performances will be jeopardised by the arrival of South American and continental talent must have forgotten the "make-up" of England's greatest post-war sides. The Spurs double winners in the early 1960's Manchester United in the late 1960's the; Arsenal and Leeds team of the 1970's and the Liverpool sides of the early 1980's all had one thing in common: a backbone of at least 5 non English players.

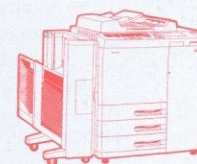
There is also a myth that most fans care more about England winning International honours than their own teams winning domestic trophies. What nonsense! How many Geordies would have given up England's limited Euro 96 success in exchange for a league title? I suspect all of them.

Gate receipts show where most fans' priorities are. Manchester United sell out a 55,000 stadium every week. Middlesbrough, who in their pre-Brazilian import days, were lucky to attract 15,000 fans now attract a full house of 29,000 every week. Yet for England's four 1995 home games (before the Euro 96 hype) the attendance didn't reach 30,000.

On the playing front probably the best use of foreign talent has been made by Chelsea, who for so many years has done well but not well enough. In the last few months they've not only beaten the likes of Manchester United, Newcastle and Liverpool but also won in the more 'bread and butter' games. All teams can raise their game and win the occasional big match - it's doing it consistently and picking up points expected that wins titles.

There's little doubt that the foreign talent has created a steelier, better blended side that is now well placed to win honours. Of course, it may not happen but why don't we just enjoy the new skills that Chelsea and other clubs have acquired and let's learn from them as they'll learn from us.

This evening the spotlight falls on Assistant Manager, Kevin Randall.

Kevin is now in his third spell at Saltergate having originally joined the club as a player from Bury in July 1966 and I asked him for his opinions on the three promotion sides with which he has been involved in his days here at Chesterfield.

Kevin says, "During my playing days the squad of players, which the late manager, Jim McGuigan, put together was a very successful mixture of youth and experience. McGuigan taught me a great deal and was an excellent manager who made everything simple. We all knew what our job was and also what those around us were required to do. He also showed himself to be a

brave man when he released the crowd favourite Ivan Hollett in favour of a raw young lad by the name of Ernie Moss and we all know what he went on to achieve. I am convinced that the team which won promotion in 1970 could have gone on even further to the Second Division but, sadly, the side was broken up and we never made it. When John Duncan and I were appointed as the management team in the summer of 1983 few players remained at the club and with no money available for quality players we hastily assembled a squad for the start of the season. We discussed the prospects and were agreed that if we finished in the top twelve at the end of that 1983-84 season we would have done well. To achieve that the following May we felt, was a reasonable success. Having put together the foundation of a good

squad, the addition of one or two experienced players plus youngsters ones, such as Phil Brown, coming to the fore, saw us riding high the next season and finishing as champions of the Fourth Division. In my opinion that team was at its peak when promoted and the next two or three years saw it ageing with no money available to strengthen the squad and almost inevitably the club dropped back into the basement in 1989.

This time around it is very different, with a squad of players containing more youth than experience. When John and I were successful in leading a Chesterfield team to promotion in 1995 for the second time there were many doubters who

thought we would struggle in a higher division. But we have proved them wrong with our younger players such as Davies, Curtis, Jules, Perkins and Howard doing us proud, and we gained added experience with the arrival of Billy Mercer and Paul Holland who is actually younger than Tom Curtis.

These are exciting times for us all and, no doubt, the best thing to have happened to Chesterfield Football Club. It's very rewarding to see your team give performances like those against Bolton Wanderers and Nottingham Forest but even so we are always looking to strengthen the squad which is of prime importance if we are to gain further success for the club in the heavy programme of games remaining to the end of this season."

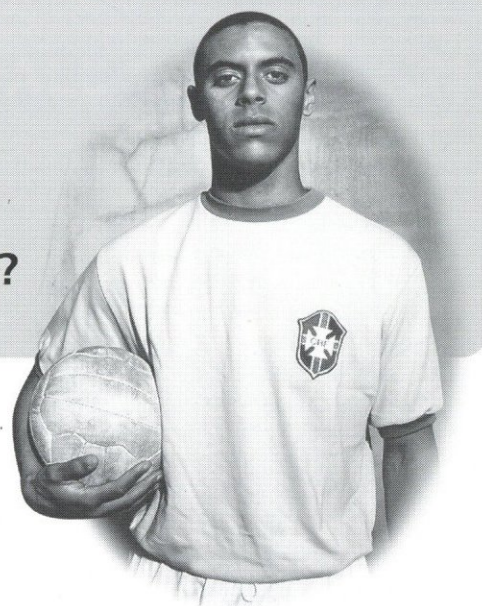

THE FINAL WHISTLE

A previous article highlighted the number of yellow cards being issued. I have been asked how cautions vary within the points system which eventually add up to and lead to that dreaded suspension. A yellow card is not just a caution and that is it. Different offences carry different point values - and, as soon as the player reaches twenty one points he receives an automatic suspension. Unlike the pools where if you receive twenty four

points you receive an automatic jackpot - just three points make such a difference!

The points system works something like this. Four points are given when the caution is for a foul, dangerous play, shirt pulling, tripping and showing dissent. Three points are for obstruction, being within ten yards for a free-kick, and persistent infringement of the laws of the game. Two points are for encroachment at a penalty, intentional handball and time wasting. One point is for entering or re-entering the pitch without the referees permission.

If the referee sees an ungentlemanly conduct it carries a two point burden. The length of the ban on reaching twenty one points varies from one to three games, depending on how quickly the points tally was reached. Now you know why you hear the magic statement, "We

will have to wait to see a copy of the referee's report before deciding what action to take." The wording of the referee's report when sending the caution to the F.A. is vital. Picture the scene - A referee sends in his report saying, "I gave a free kick for obstruction against O'Brien who complained about my decision, I therefore cautioned O'Brien." How would you interpret that. Is it a four point offence for dissent or three points for obstruction? Red cards also carry either one, two or three match bans depending on the seriousness of the offence.

Being banned for games is relatively a new idea, Not so long ago it was done by being banned for a period of weeks - players received bans ranging from seven days to six months - and if it was December when games are generally postponed

due to bad weather players may not miss any games at all - but later in the season when midweek games are in abundance players could miss a great deal more. I wonder what Sky TV would make of that, I bet no Premier League games would be played if "star-men" were missing.

The only real time I feel sorry for players is when a caution means they miss out on a major final. Finals should always be played with the best players - injury excepted. The Cup Final is the pinnacle of every professional players career, and to miss it because of a suspension in my opinion, is very sad. Surely suspensions should be carried over to the following season and perhaps replaced by a fine - Mind you, it gives a new meaning to the catchphrase - what do points make? - Suspensions!!

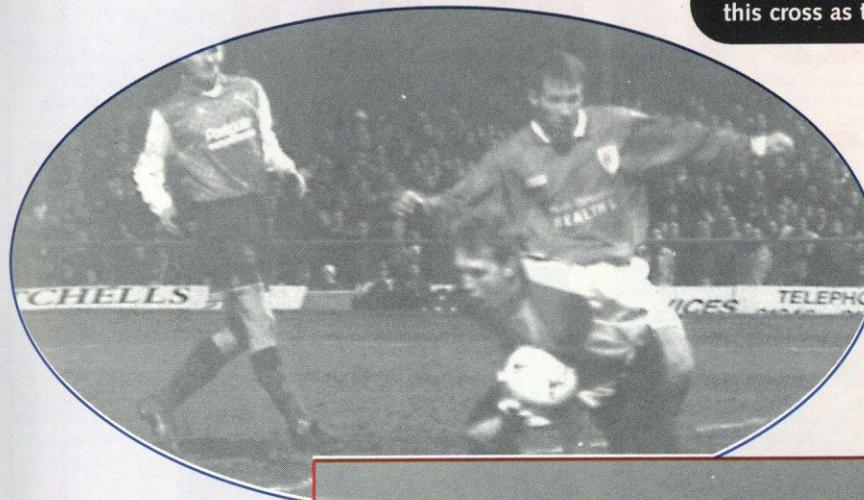
