Danny Talks



Welcome to Millmoor this afternoon for a game against a team who are battling for promotion. If someone had said to me after the recent super two away games - especially the one at Bristol City - that we would come home and give up as we did against Gillingham in the later periods of the game.

That was the first hint of giving up that I have seen during the time I have been at the club, it obviously gave me a lot of concern but I was looking forward to the game against Walsall.

Although we dominated most of the game, there was no passion or fight apart from a handful of players and that simply is not good enough. To cap that, there was still a mathematical possibility that we could still do something but then we went to Blackpool and after what I consider to be a very even first half which I thought we won by points as we have done so many times this season, we could not stop them scoring.

What's worse we couldn't take our own chances even though we had four or five excellent opportunities in the first half.

Once we conceded the third goal and after I had made some changes with Richard Landon obviously not fully match fit, I changed the system which unfortunately didn't quite work.

It caused me much concern and I am now viewing the situation in a different way, now we obviously have a number of players who want to go onto the pitch and perform with dignity and pride but we also have some who don't. You will soon find out who I mean because they will not be part and parcel of our changing room.

In all fairness, it's been an experience for me that no one would relish but it's now up to me and my

staff to take the positive signs on board until all negative points - and there are quite a few of them - are eliminated and then we can look forward to the future.

I am pretty convinced that with the effort, it's quite clear in our minds that we will do everything we can to bring players to this club who can play with a lot more pride, passion, brains and physical contact than what we have had in these past weeks.

I just hope that until the end of the season, we have the bottle and character to show that we have got what it takes to face the bull when we are at the receiving end.

It's very easy to perform when you are on top of the league or in a comfortable position - one of the reasons we are not in such a position is that we haven't got the right heart and mind.

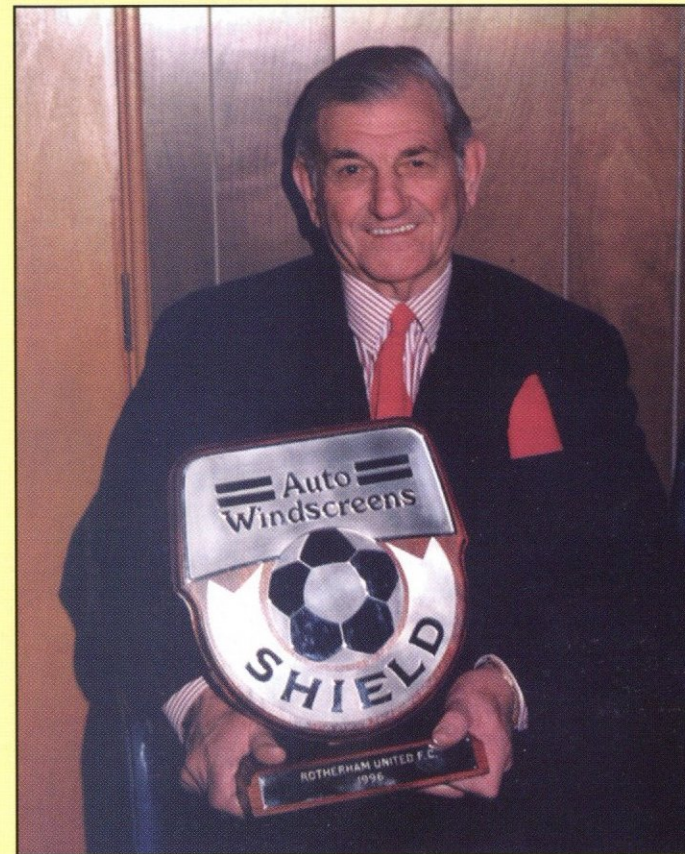
I am one of the managers who has the most regard for players - they are number one priority as far as I am concerned - but they must perform with endeavour and hate to lose. That has been the case with some of the lads but most of them have not reached these standards.

I fail to see how we can play the way we did against Bristol City and then against Walsall and Blackpool and I keep looking at myself and the staff wondering if we are doing enough.

However, I can assure you there is not a lot more that we could have done to help these players to overcome all the hurdles.

I would like to thank the supporters who went to Blackpool and apologise to them on behalf of the players for such a poor performance in the second half - we didn't fight, we didn't show big hearts and strong minds apart from a few of them. I just hope that from now until the end of the season we can see some signs of the requirements I have mentioned and then we can look forward to new season with optimism and hope.

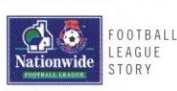

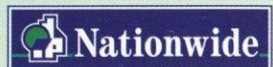

On The Horizon

After today's game against promotion-chasing Luton Town, the Millers face two more sides with aspirations of going up in their next two encounters - Wrexham and Brentford.

The game against Wrexham takes place at the Racecourse Ground on Tuesday in a fixture which was originally scheduled for last November and the Millers will be looking for their first win against the Welshmen in recent seasons.

In February of this season, the teams were involved in a goalless draw at Millmoor but before that Wrexham have recorded five successive victories.

Last season closed at Millmoor with Brian Flynn's team winning 1-0 to make it a double after that humiliating 7-0 thrashing at the Racecourse in November 1995.

Season 1994/5 saw Wrexham beat the Millers three times in one campaign starting with a 5-2 scoreline in the FA

Cup in December 1994 although it was a highly entertaining game.

Then came a 3-1 home win for Wrexham the following March and a month later they completed the hat-trick at Millmoor, this time winning 1-0 so it's time their successful sequence was brought to an end.

Wrexham have been on the fringe of the promotion race for most of the season but they have had a lot of games to catch up on due to being involved in a lot of cup games which led to the postponement of several league matches.

A team who surely will be involved in the battle to go up either in an automatic place or via the play-offs visit Millmoor next Friday night - Brentford.

The fixture was switched to Friday at the beginning of the season when the fixture computer threw up home games for the Millers, Sheffield Wednesday, Sheffield United and Barnsley all on the same day so it was sensible for Rotherham to move

the game.

Brentford have been the division's front runners for most of the season in marked contrast to the season before that when they had to battle hard to keep out of the relegation frame just a year after narrowly missing out on promotion to underline how varied the fortunes of football can become.

When Rotherham visited Griffin Park last October, the Bees were 4-2 winners in a game which saw Steve Farrelly make his debut and I hear recently he has been playing at Barrow.

At the time Brentford were unbeaten - it was their 11th game - and they have continued to be one of the division's major forces ever since.

A repeat, though, of last year's scoreline would give their promotion hopes a knock for on that occasion a Trevor Berry goal on his Rotherham debut gave the Millers a 1-0 home win but the season 1994/5 had seen Brentford win both games by the same 2-0 scoreline.

That was the Year that was...

1981/82

Delight at winning promotion the previous season was dampened somewhat with the news that manager Ian Porterfield had left the club to take over at neighbouring Sheffield United who ironically had also got out of Division Three the previous season but for them it had been relegation to the Fourth.

Former Liverpool and England skipper Emlyn Hughes took over as boss and he got off to a flying start with a convincing 4-1 home win against Norwich City who had just been relegated.

A comfortable win was recorded at Darlington in the first round first leg of the Coca Cola Cup but two successive league defeats followed at Cambridge United and Sheffield Wednesday before a Ronnie Moore goal was enough to beat visitors Cardiff City.

The second win against Darlington followed and after losing at Watford and drawing at home with Leicester City, Hughes made his playing debut in a 2-0 home win against Bolton Wanderers.

But then came a run of six league and cup games without a win including an exit from the Coca Cola Cup against Sunderland although the home leg was a 3-3 draw.

Another of those games was a 1-1 draw at Newcastle United while the poor sequence was ended with a 6-0 thumping of Chelsea with Rodney Fern grabbing a hat-trick.

The attractive looking fixture list continued with a 1-1 draw on the artificial pitch at Queens Park Rangers but local neighbours Barnsley emerged 4-2 winners in a game in front of over 18,000 spectators at Millmoor.

Charlton Athletic were beaten at Millmoor but a 3-1 defeat at Luton Town left the Millers floundering near the bottom of the table although matters improved slightly with a single goal win against Orient at the beginning of December.

That game saw Rotherham go into an enforced lay-off with snow and ice leading to a string of postponements and play wasn't resumed until an FA Cup tie in early January, a 1-1 home draw against Sunderland but the replay ended in a 1-0 defeat.

The poor league form continued with three successive defeats - at Norwich City, Blackburn Rovers and at home to Watford with the latter

marking the debut of new £40,000 signing midfielder Gerry Gow.

Rotherham were looking for prime candidates to make a quick return to Division Three as they stood third from the bottom at the dawn of February but what a memorable month that was to be.

Re-arranged games gave them eight matches and incredibly they were all won to establish a League record for the most number of wins in a calendar month.

The superb run started with a 2-1 home win against Derby County but that was very much against the odds for the Millers were reduced to ten men when Gow was sent off after just two minutes and five seconds. County took the lead and Moore missed a penalty.

But an own goal and a Moore winner gave Rotherham an unlikely win and that set them up for that memorable month with successive 2-1 wins at Cardiff City and Grimsby Town next on the agenda. Home wins against Cambridge United and Shrewsbury Town followed before a 1-0 win at Bolton Wanderers and two 2-0 wins against Wrexham and Crystal Palace.

What's more, March continued in the same vein with a 3-0 win at Oldham Athletic to give the Millers nine

wins on the trot - a club record - and they shot up to fifth in the table.

It was almost ten wins, though, for the game against Newcastle United at Millmoor ended in a goalless draw and Tony Towner missed a penalty in injury time.

A 1-0 defeat at Leicester City broke the run but promotion was still in people's minds with a 4-0 win against Chelsea at Stamford Bridge and a home win against Queens Park Rangers.

But Barnsley completed the double with a 3-0 win at Oakwell and a 2-2 home draw against Grimsby and a defeat at Derby County showed that another promotion was too much to ask.

But good form was found again with a five match unbeaten run during which John Seaman scored in five successive games and the season came to an end with a 3-2 defeat at Wrexham to leave Rotherham in seventh position.

Average attendances reflected the good season with a remarkable 58% increase, the highest being over 20,000 for the game against Sheffield Wednesday and the lowest - 6,346 - against Orient in early December.

■ Another televised game raised a talking point which went on for days after the event with Liverpool's clash with Arsenal grabbing the headlines.

You must have been marooned away on a desert island not to have seen or read about Robbie Fowler's comments that David Seaman shouldn't have given away a vital penalty in the match at Highbury.

Yet again it was an incident which has been scrutinised in minute detail from every conceivable angle and with the aid of slow motion and frozen pictures.

Studio "experts" on the night of the game said that their immediate reaction was that the incident was a penalty but they were quick to amend their thoughts after they had had the benefit of watching again and again unlike the poor referee.

I must admit that my instant reaction was that Fowler had jumped over Seaman but was his protestation really intended to tell the referee it wasn't a penalty?

Or was he merely trying to prevent an England colleague from being sent off? That raises another intriguing point of discussion.

If Kevin Pilkington had been judged to

have given away a penalty in similar circumstances, I'd like to stake my next month's salary that he would have been shown the red card - was it another case of one rule for the top clubs and another for the non-descripts?

But if Fowler was really objecting to the award of a spot kick what did his colleagues and manager truthfully say to him?

If he was really genuine in his thoughts, then he deserves the big pat on the back he has received from many quarters, but I doubt if he will be encouraged to do the same again - especially if it were to happen in a game which could decide the Premiership title.

■ Transfer deadline saw the usual stampede as clubs looked to strengthen their squads for the last push for honours or to avoid relegation but it's not very often that dealings in the transfer market on that day lead to a manager losing his job.

In these days of high finance at the top

Everton's precarious position and their impending stock market floatation played a major role in his dismissal or leaving by mutual consent whatever you like to call it.

His chairman wasn't prepared to back his judgement in the players Royle wanted to bring in and that left him in an untenable situation.

The same day saw former Millers skipper Chris Wilder move from Notts County to Bradford City and he must be the first player ever to have such an action packed first day with his new club.

That's because the city was celebrating its centenary and a host of special activities were arranged with one at Valley Parade topping the list. The new stand was officially opened by the Queen who was introduced to all the Bradford players, including Chris.

He must have thought it was the welcome to beat all welcomes.

LUTON TOWN F.C.



Welcome to Millmoor this afternoon to everyone
concerned with Luton Town and it's a long time
since they last played here in a league game.

It was in fact way back in April 1982 in a Division
Two game which ended in a 2-2 draw with Gerry
Gow missing an injury time penalty for the Millers.
It was Rotherham's first season back in that division
but the teams haven't met here in the league since
then because Town went on to win the Division Two
title that season and they haven't been in the same
section ever since.

The last Town visit here, though, was in the League
Cup in October 1983 when they won 3-2 to make
them clear favourites to go through to round three
only for the Millers to pull off a shock 2-0 win after
extra time in the second leg to give them an
aggregate victory.

Last season Town were relegated from Division One
and they didn't start very well and actually were
rooted to the bottom without a win when Rotherham
visited Kenilworth Road at the end of August. Town
had opened the season with a home defeat against
Burnley and after beating Bristol Rovers 3-0 in the
Coca Cola Cup, they lost 3-2 at Brentford and
suffered a 5-0 beating at Bristol City. But they
grabbed the only goal of the game against
Rotherham to give them their first points and climb
off the bottom and stage a revival which has
rocketed them to the other end of the table and
make them clear cut contenders for a quick return to
a higher grade of football.

The win against the Millers was the first of three on
the trot in the league - the others came at Wycombe

Wanderers and at home to Gillingham - but
Chesterfield stopped the sequence with a single goal
win at Kenilworth Road.

Victory had been completed against Bristol Rovers in
the Cup and that lead to a tie against Premiership
Derby County who were disposed of on a 3-2
aggregate thanks to a 1-0 win in the home leg.
That encouraged Town to reproduce the same form
in the league and they went on a ten match unbeaten
run which started with a goalless draw at Bury
towards the end of September and ended in late
November at Preston.

A 1-0 win against visitors Blackpool followed the Bury
game and successive wins against Walsall at home
(3-1) and at Shrewsbury Town (3-0) gave them a hat-
trick of three pointers and a climb up to eighth place.
A good point was taken from a 1-1 draw at Stockport
County and further progress was made with
Peterborough United being beaten 3-0 and after
drawing at Wimbledon in the Coca Cola Cup - a fine
performance - a 2-0 home win against Bournemouth
took Town into fifth position.

Successive draws at Watford and Plymouth Argyle
saw them slip three places although exit was made
from the cup in the replay against Wimbledon.
Notts County were beaten 2-0 at home while one
goal was enough to give Town a win in a potentially
difficult looking FA Cup first round tie at Torquay
United.

The long unbeaten run came to an end with a 3-2
setback at Deepdale but it was up to fourth spot for
Town thanks to a 2-1 home win against Bristol
Rovers.

Another 3-2 defeat - this time at Bournemouth -
was soon forgotten with another run of unbeaten
league matches, this time extending to seven
matches.

It started with a 2-0 home win against York City
and after a couple of cup games - beating
Borehamwood 2-1 in the FA Cup and disposing of
Leyton Orient 2-1 in the Auto Windscreens Shield
- Crewe Alexandra were thrashed 6-0 at
Kenilworth Road to move Town to third. A 1-0 win
at Millwall just before Christmas gave Town top
spot, but they had dropped down a place despite
beating Gillingham 2-1 on Boxing Day.

A goalless home draw against Wrexham took them
into an FA Cup tie at Bolton Wanderers where
Town recorded an excellent 1-1 draw but they
were well beaten 6-2 in the replay.

Notts County were beaten 2-1 before a surprise
exit was made from the Auto Windscreens Shield
with a single goal defeat at Northampton Town.
One point from a draw at Plymouth was followed
by none from a defeat at Bristol Rovers but Town
remained in an automatic promotion place by
thumping Preston North End 5-1 and then drawing
1-1 in successive games at York City and
Chesterfield but successive defeats at home to
Millwall and at Wrexham were a setback.

They gained a point from a midweek 2-2 draw
against Bristol City after being 2 down, one of
City's goals coming from Shaun Goater.

That leaves Town in third place, two points behind
Brentford but with a game in hand.

IAN FEUER

Goalkeeper

Ian signed for the Hatters from West Ham in December 1995, for a fee which could rise to £580,000 depending on appearances.

The 6ft 7ins American arrived at Luton in September, and spent three months on loan. Was Luton's Player of the Year for the 1995/96 season.

At West Ham he was understudy to Ludek Miklosko, but never played a first team game, and due to restrictions on overseas players was kept off the bench by Les Sealy. His Luton debut wasn't his league debut though, as he was on loan at Peterborough in 1994/95, playing 16 games in Division Two.

Spotted by West Ham playing in Belgium, although he actually signed from Los Angeles Salsa.

CERI HUGHES

Midfield

Ceri was a regular in the Town midfield in the 1993/94 season, and his performances earned a call up to the full Welsh side.

He made his Luton debut at Aston Villa in 1990, and has also represented his country at youth and U21 levels.

Scored seven goals in the 1993/94 season, but damaged knee ligaments against Grimsby in November 1994 and was ruled out for the rest of the campaign after just eight league starts. Made his comeback against Norwich on the opening day of the 1995/96 season, but suspension and injury plagued his 95/96 campaign.

Played for Wales in Albania in November 1995. Had a trial period at Crystal Palace in summer 96, but they decided against a deal.

JULIAN JAMES

Defender

Julian joined Luton as a trainee, and was introduced to First Division football in 1988, but was sent off on his full debut in a Littlewoods Cup win at Leeds in November of that year.

A former England under 21 international, he was a regular at left back in the 1993/94 season, but made the right back position his own in 1994/95 with a string of consistent displays which earned him the Player of the Year award from the Loyal Luton Supporters Club.

Was in and out of the side at the start of the 95/96 campaign, before an extended run at right back after Christmas. He was granted a benefit match in 1996.

MARVIN JOHNSON

Defender

Marvin made his Football League debut against Wimbledon in 1988, and quickly established himself as a versatile defender. Started the 94/95 season at Left Back, but then switched to the centre of defence to form a reliable partnership with Trevor Peake.

Marvin was one of only three players to play in every first team match in 94/95 season, and was awarded the Players' Player of the Year trophy.

He was again a consistent performer in 95/96 at centre-back, alongside Steve Davis for the most part, and Darren Patterson.

MITCHELL THOMAS

Defender

The former England U21 international made over 100 appearances for Luton before moving to Spurs, shortly after David Pleat, in 1986.

He played in the 1987 FA Cup final, and later moved to West Ham. He was on loan at Luton in the 1993/94 season before a permanent free transfer move, and after missing the start of the season through suspension was a regular at left-back in the 1994/95 campaign.

Recalled by new manager Lennie Lawrence in December 1995, and responded with an ever present record until the end of the season.

PAUL McLAREN

Midfield

Paul made his debut in the Town first-team on the final day of the 1993/94 season, coming on as substitute at Stoke City. He joined the Hatters from school, and is an England youth international. Started as a centre half, but spent much of the 1994/95 season in the reserves in centre midfield.

He made his full debut at Tranmere in October 1995, and then played in the Anglo-Italian Cup game at Genoa.

KIM GRANT

Forward

Signed from Charlton, where he had made his debut under Lennie Lawrence, for £250,000 in March 1996, and scored on his debut against Ipswich.

Was selected for the Ghanaian national squad in the summer of 1996, playing against Egypt and Denmark. Also represented his country against South Africa in September, and is a regular member of their squad in the African Nations Cup and World Cup qualifying matches.

TONY THORPE

Midfield

Tony made an immediate impact in the Town side when he scored for the Hatters on his full debut at Newcastle United, in the fourth round of the FA Cup in January 1994. He joined the club at the start of the 1992/93 season, following a spell at Leicester.

He was restricted to just five substitute appearances during the 1994/95 campaign. Scored Luton's winning goal at Southend in August 1995 - the Hatters' first win of the season, and their first under Terry Westley. Signed a new contract in the summer of 1996.

GARY WADDOCK

Midfield

Gary completed a free transfer move from Bristol Rovers in December 1994, after a 3 month loan spell at Kenilworth Road.

Started his career with QPR making over 200 appearances, including an FA Cup Final against Spurs in 1982, and the subsequent replay. That was followed by a spell in Belgium with Charleroi as Gary recovered from a serious knee injury, and he also had spells at Millwall, QPR again and Swindon before moving to Bristol.

Gary missed only one game, through suspension, after joining the Hatters in 1994/95, and scored his first goal for the club on the final day of the season. His consistent displays in 95/96 were rewarded with the Players' Player of the Year Trophy.

DWIGHT MARSHALL

Forward

Dwight signed in the summer of 1994 from Plymouth for £150,000, after scoring 14 goals for Peter Shilton's side the previous season - his third campaign at Home Park after playing non-league football with Grays Athletic.

Started well for Luton, with 2 goals in the 5-1 win over Middlesbrough in October, and despite being troubled by a shin injury late in the season he finished the Hatters' leading scorer with 13 goals in league and cup.

Scored 13 goals in 95/96, but suffered a broken leg in February, ruling him out for the rest of the season.

GRAHAM ALEXANDER

Defender/Midfield

Graham joined the Hatters in July 1995, and was Terry Westley's first signing after being confirmed as Luton's new manager.

The Town coaching staff had been watching him for two seasons before deciding to make their move, with the fee in the region of £100,000, with further payments depending on appearances.

STEVE DAVIS

Defender

Steve joined the Hatters in the summer of 1995 after making over 160 appearances for Burnley, scoring 22 goals.

He joined the Turf Moor side in August 1991 for £60,000 from Southampton, after loan spells at Burnley and Notts County. He captained Burnley during their rise up the league into Division One, and played in both their victories over Luton in the 1994/95 season.

Was a commanding figure for the Hatters in 95/96, but again suffered the agony of relegation as Luton, like Burnley the previous season, dropped out of Division One.

DAVID OLDFIELD

Midfield

David returned to Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1995, six years after leaving Luton Town.

He started his career with the Hatters, progressing through the junior ranks to a two goal senior debut in a 2-1 Simod Cup win at Everton in February 1988. He also scored on his full league debut in a 2-1 home win over Watford in May 1988, and went on to make 29 league appearances for the Hatters, scoring four goals.

Australian born Oldfield, who played for England U21s joined Manchester City for £600,000, before moving on to Leicester City.

MANAGER PROFILE LENNIE LAWRENCE

Lennie was appointed manager of Luton Town in December 1995, following the departure of Terry Westley.



A player with non-league Croydon, Carshalton Athletic and Sutton United, he was an assistant manager at Plymouth and Lincoln, before becoming manager of Charlton Athletic in 1982, where he was originally their reserve team

coach.

After nine exciting years, Lennie left in 1991 and headed north to Middlesbrough which he took into the FA Premier League in 1992. His departure after their relegation to the new Division One was followed by joining Bradford in May 1994 and has since joined Luton Town, where he is the 21st manager in its history.

DANGER MAN STEVE DAVIS

A kingpin of the Luton Town defence, Steve started his career as a trainee at Southampton but he had made just five appearances and another as substitute when he moved to Burnley for a £60,000 transfer fee in August 1991.

Burnley were fully aware of his capabilities as he had had a loan spell at Turf Moor in November 1989, turning out in nine matches altogether and he came on as substitute twice in a temporary spell at Notts County.

When he moved to Burnley on a permanent basis, Steve very quickly became a firmly established player and he went on to make a total of 203 league and cup appearances while scoring 25 valuable goals.

He moved to Luton Town in July 1995 with the £750,000 transfer fee fixed by a tribunal and although the fee was more than Town had expected, he has proved to be worth every penny, taking over as skipper and proving to be a



colossus at the heart of the defence.

His value to the club was illustrated last season when Town were relegated for the team's best performances invariably came when he was in the side while they frequently lost when he was missing.



Programme Collecting for non-anoraks!

Part 22 - The first League Cup Competition

We have mentioned earlier in this series that League Cup (now Coca Cola Cup) programmes are an attractive set to collect, as they stretch back "only" 37 years, since the competition was launched as comparatively recently as the 1960/61 season. A most intriguing sub-set to collect are programmes from the first ever League Cup competition, but be warned - many of these are very much sought after by collectors, and fetch inordinately high prices in offers.

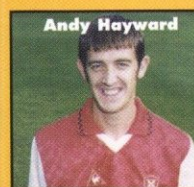
The reason for this is that the competition was not taken terribly seriously in its early years, and many clubs adopted a half-hearted attitude in the first season. Upsets, according to league position, were numerous, and many of the larger clubs anticipated the lower attendances the struggling competition attracted and programmes to suit. There are therefore many single sheet and folded sheet programmes, as clubs thought the competition unworthy of a full programme, and while the limited print runs probably satisfied those who attended the match, it meant that fewer have survived for collectors almost four decades later. Even if a collector's ambitions do not

run to a full set of these programmes, it is worth keeping an eye open for them turning up, as most of them are now quite valuable. Take for instance the Exeter v. Manchester United match. City issued a full programme, but it is now very much sought after, particularly by the army of United collectors. The replay at Old Trafford, a 12 page effort, is not particularly scarce, but will still fetch four or five times the price of a 1960/61 League programme. Coventry issued a four page programme for the visit of Barrow in the first round, and this is now extremely scarce, as is the four page Everton programme for the visit of Accrington Stanley. 18,246 attended the match, compared with Everton's average of 43,450. Accrington played just two League Cup games before they resigned from the League, the other being at Lincoln in 1961/62. The programme from that game is an even rarer single sheet!

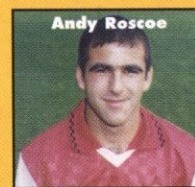
The first year of the Football League Cup has particular significance for Rotherham United, as the Millers programme to the final, where they were beaten 3-0 in the second leg by Aston Villa, having won the Millmoor

leg by 2-0. Both final programmes - standard 12 page issues similar to those issued for league matches - now fetch offers up to £100. The semi-final programmes, home and away to Shrewsbury, are just as hard to obtain, but attract less attention from final-only collectors, and are therefore a little less expensive. Among many other programmes from that season's competition to look out for are Burnley v Nottingham Forest, 19th December (postponed) and 10th January, both of which see bids starting at £20; Portsmouth v Chelsea in the fourth round, an extremely rare single sheet; Southampton v Leeds in the same round, and one of the rarest in the entire competition, Chesterfield v Leeds from the third round. The match kicked off at 2.15pm and attracted only 2,021 spectators - the four page folded sheet will now fetch offers in excess of £100.

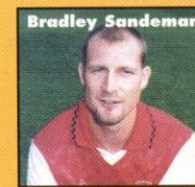

Spotlight on...



...KEVIN BAIN

A few weeks ago Kevin came to Millmoor and returned home at the end of it without anything being agreed by either party but it wasn't long before he returned and signed until the end of the season.

Having come from north of the border it's more than likely that not many Millers' fans will know much about his background, so now's the time to start and fill in all the details. Kevin was born in Kirkcaldy and he went to school just outside the town and he said, *"I played for the school team at the tender age of eight and nine, but organised football at school had started before then."*

"Football was the most popular sport so when I moved up the high school, that was still the game for me and I managed to keep in the team."

In those days Kevin played at the back and in midfield, although he has never played up front and success came his way when he was selected to play for Scotland at U16s level, an honour he was to repeat at U17, U18 and U21, so he was obviously highly rated.

How did he get into professional football? *"I went straight to Dundee where I had been signed on schoolboy forms since I was fourteen and I served the usual two years as a junior with them before becoming a full time professional."*

His first team debut came at the tender age of seventeen and Kevin recalled, *"It was at home to Motherwell in the Premier League*

although unfortunately we lost. We had already been relegated at the time so youngsters were given their chance to get some experience."

The following season Kevin was in and out of the team with a couple of games at a time with the team's main priority being to get promotion again. That was pretty much the case for the rest of Kevin's time at Dens Park where last season he made seven league appearances plus another three as substitute as the team finished in mid-table in Division One. Kevin played four games for the U21s against Portugal twice, Italy and Switzerland with just one of the Portugal games being away, the rest of them at home.

The fact that Kevin had not been getting a regular place led him to think about moving and he explained, *"I think I had been there too long as this was my eighth season and I wasn't enjoying it any more so it was time to look for a change. I hadn't really looked for another club in Scotland so when Danny Begara came in for me, I was quite eager to come and give it a try in England."*

"It had been in my mind before to come south for in England you play the same teams so many times that it seems to get a bit boring and it has been very refreshing to come down here and play against some new teams."

He obviously joined the Millers at a difficult time but that hasn't stopped him from enjoying his football and he said, *"We had a couple of great*

results at Bristol City and Shrewsbury Town but unfortunately we followed that by two relatively poor games but I am still enjoying it nevertheless."

Kevin's debut was in midfield but he soon dropped into the back line and he observed, *"I don't really mind where I play to be honest, although you seem to get more time on the ball at the back."*

Facility-wise, Kevin is well pleased at Rotherham and he said, *"The training ground is excellent but it's difficult to compare it with Scottish clubs, although the type of football down here tends to see more of the long ball used with big physical strikers."*

At times life can get a bit lonely for Kevin for he is living at Hooton Lodge but with so many games going on, his time has been occupied although he has not been able to return home to his wife and young son in Fife.

At the moment Kevin does not know whether he will be spending next season here at Millmoor or not, that will no doubt be resolved in the course of the next few weeks but he is quite sure the experience of regular first team football has done him good.

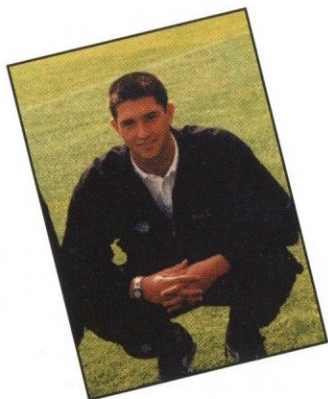

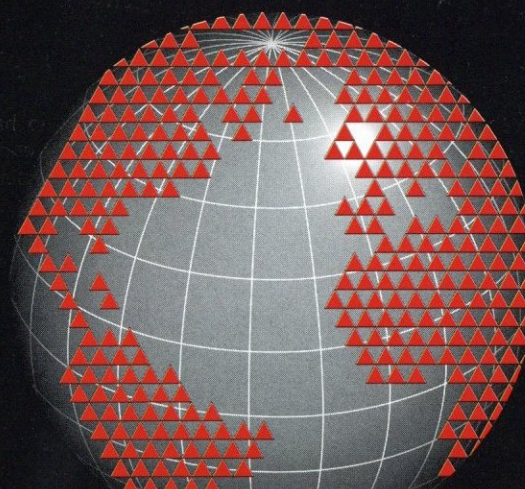

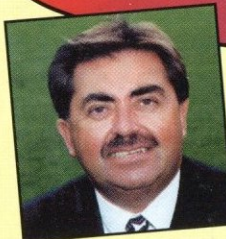

Rotherham United's bandwagon rolled on as they extended their unbeaten sequence to eight games but they had to twice come from behind to earn a point against a strong Middlesbro' side littered with Premiership experience.

The Millers were first to show and Roger Levers closed down the keeper forcing him to slice his clearance. The Boro steadied their ship and quickly established supremacy making excellent use of their speedy direct wingers who stretched the Millers' defence repeatedly. Rotherham almost paid for a poor clearance when Boro hit a shot just wide. However on 5 mins Boro took the lead when the Millers conceded a free kick which was taken so quickly it embarrassed the home side allowing the attacker time and space to beat Davis.

Hall tried to forge through but was Dispossessed before Bagshaw's diligence averted a Boro raid. More Boro invention caused the home defence anxious moments but collectively they stuck to the task and demonstrated their ability to defend when it mattered. The Millers had limited opportunities early on but when they did they didn't capitalise.

On 20 mins Otter got round the back to pick out Levers in a poaching position but his extra touch cost him dearly and gave the keeper enough time to rob him. On 24 mins Otter was again involved winning a free kick 30 yards out. Hudson stepped up to drive it over the bar. A minute later the Millers levelled things up with a stunning Spiby strike. Hall threw in to Levers who passed to Spiby and suddenly exploded a half volley into the net from 20 yards to give the keeper no chance. Levers again almost

On 36 mins the Millers were close to an equaliser when Spiby found Hudson 6 yards out but credit the keeper who made a fine smothering save to deny him.

Two minutes after the interval the Millers successfully defended two dangerous Boro corners and they were a shade fortunate when the winger cut in and fired his shot against the post and it cannoned off Davis before Hudson completed the clearance. The Millers were undaunted and started to put together some good moves to pose Boro problems.

First Spiby had a shot charged down and it spun out for a corner which he delivered into the box to find the towering Bagshaw whose header was goalbound until a defender cleared off the line to prevent the equaliser. Spiby again got the loose ball and linked with Levers who loaded the gun for Hudson to fire and his drive shook the crossbar. Boro hacked it away for a corner; their respite was momentary before Otter tied things up on 85 mins.

Hudson swung the corner in, a flick on flat footed the defenders allowing Otter to climb and bullet his header into the net from close range to give his side a deserved equaliser.

The premiership outfit were stunned as the Millers showed a greater appetite to win it but they couldn't generate a finish to match their endeavour and the Boro were clearly content to escape with a point.
