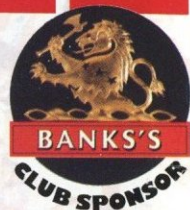

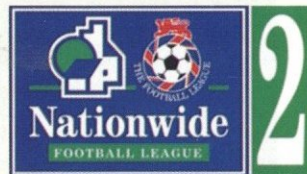

Any spectator acting in contravention of these conditions is liable to arrest or ejection.

Close Circuit Television is in use and any spectator seen acting in a disorderly manner is likely to be arrested or ejected from the ground. In the event of an emergency, instructions will be given over the Public Address system. Spectators must follow the instructions given, in a calm manner. You will be assisted by Stewards/Police Officers.

The Banks's Stand and an area of the H.L. Fellows Stand have been designated as NO SMOKING areas. Compliance with the NO SMOKING area signs is requested.

The conditions mentioned above are intended to improve your enjoyment of the game in a safe and secure environment.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL SUPPORTERS

Spectators are reminded that it is a criminal offence to run on the pitch, to use abusive language or threatening behaviour.

Bescot Stadium is covered by Close Circuit Television. Offenders will be identified and prosecuted. In addition, the Club will impose a life ban on anyone misbehaving, from attending matches at Bescot Stadium.

The vast majority of Saddlers fans are decent, well behaved people. They come along to Bescot Stadium, and travel to away matches, to support their team, to enjoy the atmosphere, and to socialise with fellow supporters.

It is through the tolerance, good humour, and fairmindedness of these fans that we are blessed with a lovely family matchday atmosphere at Bescot Stadium.

Like everything else that is valuable in life you always have to remain watchful and work hard to ensure that everything that has been achieved is not allowed to be undermined.

There are a few people who come to Bescot Stadium to cause trouble. They are not interested in supporting the team. In fact such people are happier when we lose because it gives them an excuse to behave badly.

It is this mindless minority who make life unpleasant for fellow supporters by abusive chanting, bad language, and racist comments often aimed at our own players.

They will not be tolerated and will be rooted out.

Through the use of CCTV cameras located inside and outside the stadium, an undercover operation in sensitive areas of the stadium, and information received from supporters, we shall

identify, arrest, eject, and where appropriate charge, those supporters whose behaviour is unacceptable to all decent people.

Walsall Football Club and West Midlands Police will work closely together to rid the Club of all those people whose behaviour spoils the enjoyment of

LIFE BAN FOR SOCCER OFFENDER

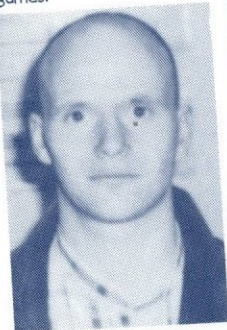
We again report that Walsall Football Club have received notification from West Midlands Police that Martin Harrison from Bloxwich was convicted at Shrewsbury Magistrates Court for two soccer related offences.

The incidents took place at The Gay Meadow during the Shrewsbury Town versus Walsall match on Friday 20th December 1996.

The Board of Directors have repeatedly emphasised their determination not to tolerate unacceptable behaviour by spectators attending Walsall F.C. games.

Following Mr. Harrison's conviction a life ban has been imposed on him from attending matches at Bescot Stadium. Moreover all Second Division clubs have been informed of this ban, and asked to enforce it at all Walsall F.C. away games. A photograph has been sent to all Clubs.

Mr Harrison has been notified in writing of the ban imposed on him.

Already, a life ban has been imposed on Martin Harrison from Bloxwich. His photograph appears on this page. Two other supporters have also been given life bans, and their identity will be revealed at a later stage.

We expect decent behaviour from supporters at Bescot Stadium, and that also applies at away matches.

Supporters have been offered a great deal by the Walsall F.C. Away Travel Service this season. Low prices, free prize draw, and vouchers which offer a free journey on every fourth trip.

Again we will not let the poor behaviour of a few spoil it for others. That is why, Mr Taylor from Valley Road, Blakenall has been banned from travelling on our coaches. He was warned about not taking alcohol on the coach, and his general behaviour, but chose to ignore these warnings, so now he is banned.

We feel certain that the action the Club is taking, and will continue to take, has the backing of the vast majority of Walsall supporters, and will create a situation where anyone wishing to attend a match at Bescot Stadium will do so in the knowledge that they will be amongst civilised people whose sole aim is to support their team and to enjoy a game of football.

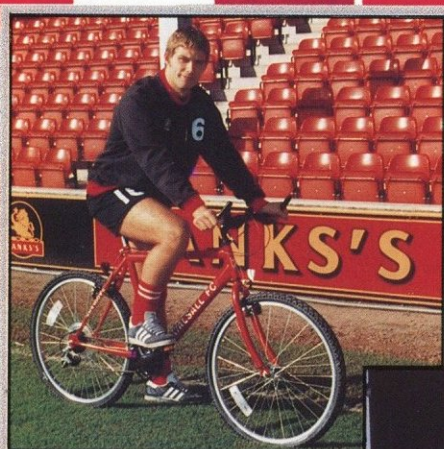

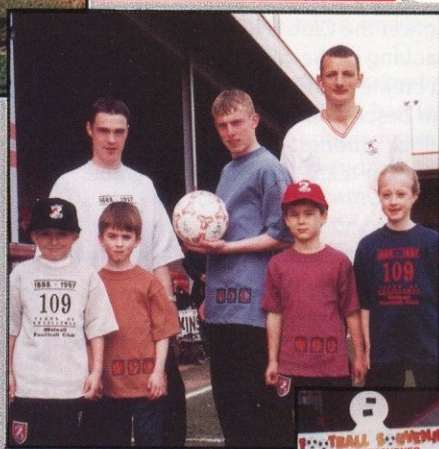

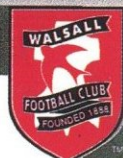

The two away matches this week against Wrexham and Bury were always going to be tough fixtures, and they were not made any easier by some unusual refereeing decisions in both games.

We were certainly made to suffer, firstly at Wrexham, when two rather obscure penalty decisions were given against us, and then at Bury, when Kevin Wilson was sent off for the first time in his career which has seen him play over 600 League games.

These decisions were enough to test the character of any team, but to our credit in both games we displayed a tremendous team spirit and will to win.

At Wrexham we achieved a fully deserved victory, whilst at Bury we suffered a 1-2 reverse, but emerged from that game with a lot of credit for a fighting display, which contained lots of good football, and despite having only 10 men, finished the game much the stronger team, leaving 'table topping' Bury hanging desperately on to their lead.

In fact it has been noticeable in recent matches how we always seem to finish the stronger team. The last 15 minutes of a game are the ultimate test of fitness, and our goal record during this period in recent matches has been very good, and something for the players to take pride.

I am pleased to report that all our long term injured players are now moving back towards full fitness. By now Charlie Ntamark and Darren Bradley will have played at least part of a match, and they can be expected to be pushing for a First Team recall.

Also, Paul Mountford and Ray Daniel should now be back in full training. This is crucial. If we are to finish the season with a really big push for a promotion 'play-off' place then it is vital that all our players are fit and able to make a contribution to the overall team effort.

If all our players are fit and available for selection this is a good omen. The task then is for me to make sure that I pick the right one's!

A warm welcome to Lenny Lawrence and his Luton Town team. This is another very tough game against a good team. They defeated us at Luton too easily for my liking, after we had opened the game in fine style. We are a much better team now, and will prove more formidable opponents today.

Lenny Lawrence has always been a keen student of the game, and you can bet that his team today will play with style and be interesting to watch.

This is a very big game for us. Make sure that you give the lads your full support. Enjoy the game.

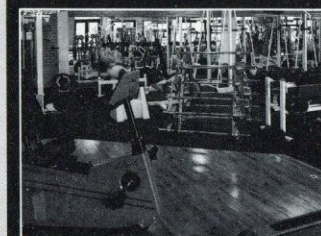

PHIL CHAPMAN

It was with sadness that we heard of the death of Phil
Chapman on 3rd April 1997.

Phil joined Walsall from Cannock Chase Colliery in
September 1948 as a replacement for another pro-
lific goalscorer Dave Massart., and was still on ama-
teur forms when he made his debut against Reading
that September and scored in our 2-0 win, which was
the first of his 28 goals in the 1948-49 Season in his
33 games. He did in fact score in 8 successive games
and in the following February and March got hat-tricks
in successive games against Crystal Palace and Ex-
eter City. His all action style made him a great
favourite with Saddlers supporters.

Phil spent two and a half seasons with Walsall
scoring 38 goals in 68 appearances. He was later
released and moved to play for Weymouth in the then
Southern League but after two seasons with them
returned to Walsall and joined the Police Force and
stared for them in the Walsall Police soccer team for
several years before a broken ankle ended his career.

He retained his interest in the Saddlers for the rest
of his life, and many times he has been 'on duty' at
our games. That interest has been passed on to mem-
bers of his family.

Phil is fondly remembered by Saddlers supporters of
the post-war era, and we would like to extend our
deepest sympathy to his widow and family.

The funeral service will be held in Yoxall Parish
Church, Near Lichfield, at 11.00am, on Monday 14th
April.

A DAY TO REMEMBER FOR LUTON FANS

Already a member of the '92' Club he has already visited us at Bescot, but he is here today, like, we are sure a lot of 'Hatters' fans visiting Bescot Stadium with their team for the first time, as of course this is Luton Town's first-ever visit here.

It is in fact David's 100th different League ground he has visited following the 'Hatters' since 1965 when he first started following Luton Town's away games.....Enjoy the day, but we of course hope the Saddlers win!

Paul Marston of the Birmingham Post, Evening Mail & Sports Argus looks at DIVISION TWO'S HIT MEN

Two of the best strikers in the Nationwide Second Division are on opposing sides at Bescot Stadium today, and they are the cheapest men on the hit parade.

Walsall's popular front man, Kyle Lightbourne, joined the club after being given a free transfer by Scarborough and he is again the team's leading scorer with 22 goals.

Luton Town's super striker, Tony Thorpe, was snapped up by the Hatters when he was surprisingly released by Leicester City, and what a remarkable impact he has made at Kenil-

worth Road. Since then Tony has gone all one way, grabbing no fewer than three hat-tricks and if you have seen some of his goals on TV you will agree that he has the razor-sharp reactions of a modern Jimmy Greaves in and around the box.

His most recent trio was in the 3-0 win at Rotherham United a week after Walsall won 2-1 at Millmoor. So Walsall defenders will have to keep a

close watch on him this afternoon. Kyle, of course, has been Walsall's top marksman for three successive seasons, and his big pal and fellow Bermudan International, Shaun Goater, has hit 21 goals for Bristol City.

Shaun was bought from Rotherham for about £150,000, and it is an amazing coincidence that the two likely lads from sunny Bermuda should be so successful at the same level.

Second in the Division 2 sharpshooters' table is Burnley's Paul Barnes, a man Walsall tried to buy when he was with Stoke City. After spells at York City

and Birmingham City "Barnesy" is playing a big part in the Claret's promotion drive with 24 goals.

If Brentford arrest their slide and win promotion, they will owe a debt of gratitude to Londoner Carl Asaba who sharpened the Bees' sting with 23 goals.

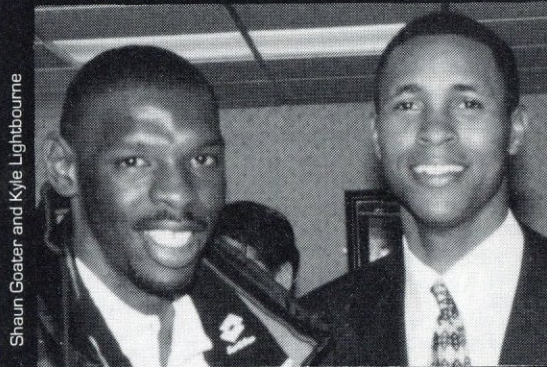
Nothing "lffy" about Gillingham's top-scorer. Iffy Onuora cost only £15,000 when signed from Mansfield, but he has had an excellent season with the promoted Gills, notching 21 goals.

Two forwards in the leaders' chart started the season with other clubs - Phil Clarkson of Blackpool and David Reeves of Preston North End. Clarkson scored 16 for Scunthorpe United before moving to his present club for whom he has four goals, including one against Walsall.

Reeves had hit the target four times for Carlisle United, and he has now added 13 for Preston.

Blackpool actually have three men in the charts, the other two being Tony Ellis, 17, and James Quinn, 16. Big Dele Adebola has bagged 15 for Crewe Alexandra and would have had more but for missing games through injury, and our other "neighbours", Shrewsbury Town, may well thank their survival in Division 2 to the 19 goals Ian Stevens has collected so far.

Ian almost moved to Plymouth Argyle just before the deadline, but the deal fell through, much to the delight of the anxious Shrewsbury fans.

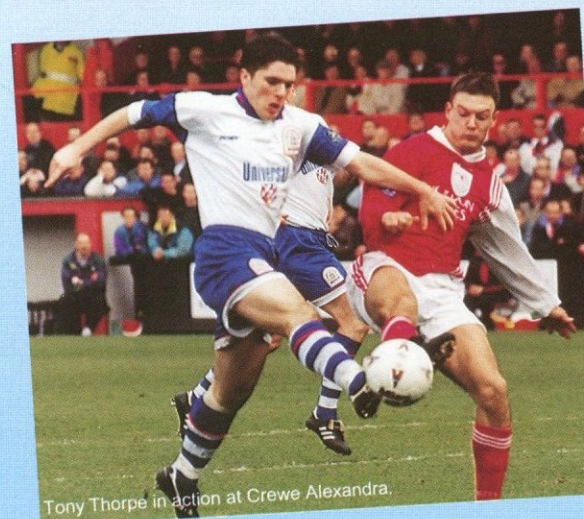

We also recall an unhappy 4-0 F.A. Cup defeat at Luton Town in 1949 but Luton Town also brings us happier memories of players such as Bernard Streten, who played both in goal and in the forward line for us during the war and in goal for Luton Town after the war when he was capped for England.

Before the First

ODD FACT

We lost all three of our Second Division games at Kenilworth Road in the 1890's, conceding 13 goals in the process but won all three of the corresponding games at Hillary Street scoring no fewer than 18 goals.

In more recent times that busy little midfielder David Preece has played for us in the early 1980's before moving for a longer spell with Luton Town while our present day player Ray Daniel began his career with Luton Town in 1982/83.

Luton Town are of course one of the sides who have played in all four divisions of the Football League. They played in the top division from 1955-60, in 1964/65 and more recently from 1982 to 1992. Last season a four-season spell in what is now Division One ended in relegation.

LAST SEASON

After finishing in sixteenth place in

1994/95 Luton Town lost the services of David Pleat when he moved to Sheffield Wednesday during the summer and Terry Westley the former club coach took over.

The season began badly, however, with only one win (against



Manager Lennie Lawrence

Southend United) in their first nine games, a League Cup defeat by Bournemouth and an

Anglo-Italian Cup defeat by Perugia 4-1 at Kenilworth Road. By the end of September Luton Town were bottom of Division One and with only four wins by the beginning of December Lennie Lawrence was brought in as manager.

After three Anglo-Italian defeats Luton Town pulled off a shock 5-0 win over Ancona at the end of December, but only 2,091 were there to see it happen and a 7-1 F.A. Cup defeat at Grimsby Town on January 6th did nothing to suggest a happy new year for all at Kenilworth Road.

Then suddenly things changed and six wins and two draws in eight games lifted them to 17th place by the end of February. Just as suddenly a wheel came off the 'Hatters' cart however and seven games without a win put them in trouble again.

At the beginning of April they won 2-0 at West Bromwich Albion and there were still eight games to go. Sadly only one of these was won and the season ended with the 'Hatters' seven points short of safety and three points behind Watford, the club next above them.

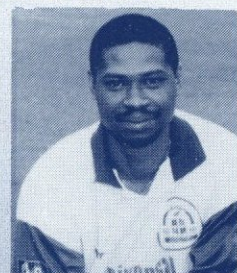
Dwight Marshall topscored with 13 goals while Bontcho Guentchev got 11. In an unsettled side only goalkeeper Ian Fever, defender Graham Alexander and fellow defender Steve Davis were the only players to appear in 35 games or more.

THIS SEASON

In Division Two this season started badly

with three successive League defeats, but then came three successive wins over Rotherham United, Wycombe Wanderers and Gillingham and a fine Coca Cola Cup win over Premier League Derby County followed by a narrow 3-2 aggregate defeat by Gillingham. Meanwhile they had beaten us 3-1 at Kenilworth Road early in October as they got going on a 10 game unbeaten run that carried them into the top six by late November.

Defeats at Preston North End and Bournemouth were quickly put behind them as they put Torquay United and Boreham Wood out of the F.A. Cup before crashing out 6-2 at Bolton Wanderers in a third round replay.

Five League wins in a row in December put them in second place in the table and they have stayed there or thereabouts since with just three defeats (at Bristol Rovers and Wrexham and home to Millwall) since the turn of the year though they did go out of the Auto Windscreens Shield to Third Division Northampton Town early in February.

Since losing at Wrexham a month ago they have drawn at

Crewe Alexandra and won at Burnley and Rotherham United and have beaten Brentford and drawn with Bristol City at Kenilworth Road. Tony Thorpe's hat-trick at Rotherham United last week took his season's tally to 32, a magnificent tally for someone who graduated from the Youth ranks and did not win a regular place until midway through last season.

THE PLAYERS

GOALKEEPERS

KELVIN DAVIS

Kelvin made his League debut for the Hatters on the final day of the 1993/94 season in a 2-2 draw at Stoke. He spent a month on loan at Torquay United in September/October 1994, before winning a place in the Luton Town starting line-up in March. With Juergen Sommer on international duty. He kept his place until the end of the season, and also won two England youth caps. He was selected for the England Under-21 squad for the Toulon Tournament in June 1995. Signed new four year contract in June 1995, and was again in England Under-21 squad throughout the 1995/96 season. Prior to this season Kelvin made 16 league + 4 cup appearances for Luton Town, but has been unable to break into the side this term.

IAN FEUER

Ian signed for the Hatters from West Ham United in December 1995, for a fee which could rise to £580,000 depending on appearances. The 6ft 7 inches American arrived at Luton Town in September, and spent three months on loan. Was Luton's Player of the Year for the 1995/96 season. At West Ham United he was understudy to Ludek Miklosko, but never played a first team game, and due to restrictions on overseas players was kept off the bench by Les Sealey. His Luton Town debut wasn't his league debut though, as he was on loan at Peterborough United in 1994/95, playing 16 games in

Division Two. Spotted by West Ham United playing in Belgium, although he actually signed from Los Angeles Salsa. An ever-present to date this term.

DEFENDERS

RICHARD HARVEY

Richard resurrected his Town career in 1994/95 after two years plagued by injury. The former England youth international missed the entire 1993/94 season after a cruciate knee ligament operation, and it was January the following season before he made an appearance. He held the left back position for the remainder of the season. A regular on the left side of defence/midfield for the first half of the season, he lost his place to Mitchell Thomas after the arrival of Lennie Lawrence as manager. Prior to this season Richard made 153 League and 26 cup appearances scoring 4 league + 1 cup goal for Luton Town.

JULIAN JAMES

Julian joined Luton Town as a trainee, and was introduced to First Division football in 1988, but was sent off on his full debut in a Littlewoods Cup win at Leeds United in November of that year. A former England Under-21 international, he was a regular at left-back in the 1993/94 season, but made the right back position his own in 1994/95 with a string of consistent displays which earned him the Player of the Year award. The 1995/96 campaign, he had an extended run at right back after Christmas. Granted a benefit match in 1996. This season he has missed just one game to date.

MARVIN JOHNSON

Marvin made his Football



League debut against Wimbledon in 1988. Then in

BEST EVER APPEARANCE TALLY

Bob Morton played in 550 League and cup games for Luton Town between 1948 and 1964.

Luton Town reached the F.A. Cup finals in 1958/59, beating Leeds United, Leicester City, Ipswich Town, Blackpool and Norwich City before losing 2-1 at Nottingham Forest at Wembley.

BEST EVER LEAGUE CUP SEASON

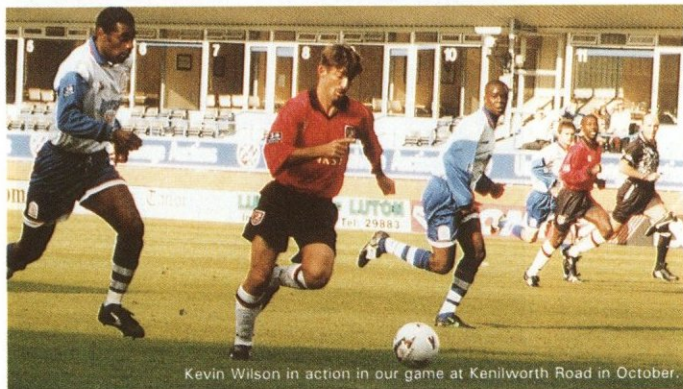

his Luton Town debut aged just 16 in the Anglo-Italian Cup match in Cesena. This season he has made just 1 substitute appearance

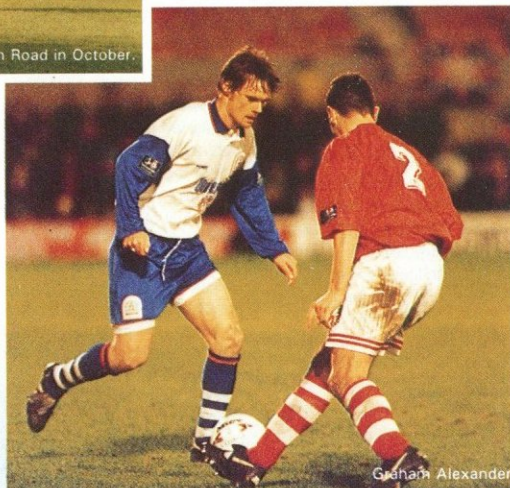
and netted 7 more goals.

GARY WADDOCK

Gary completed a free transfer move from Bristol Rovers in December 1994,



after a three month loan spell at Kenilworth Road. Started his career with QPR making over 200 appearances, including an F.A. Cup Final against Spurs in 1982, and the subsequent replay. That was followed by a spell in Belgium with Charleroi and he also had spells at Millwall, QPR again, and Swindon Town, before moving to Bristol. Gary missed only one game, through suspension, after joining the Hatters in 1994/95, and scored his first goal for the Luton Town on the final day of the season. KIM GRANT

Signed from Charlton Athletic, where he had made his debut under Lennie Lawrence, for £250,000 in March 1996, and scored on his debut against Ipswich Town. Was selected for the Ghanaian national squad in the summer



of 1996, playing against Egypt and Denmark. Prior to this season Kim made 10 League appearances and scored 3 goals and this season 14+15 appearances and scored 5 goals.

DWIGHT MARSHALL

Dwight signed in the summer of 1994 from Plymouth Argyle for £150,000, after scoring 14 goals the previous season - his third campaign at Home Park after playing non-league football with Grays Athletic. Started well for Luton Town, with two goals in the 5-1 win over Middlesbrough in October, and despite being troubled by a shin injury late in the season he finished as the Hatters' leading scorer with 13 goals in League and cup. He suffered a broken leg in February, ruling him out for the rest of the season. 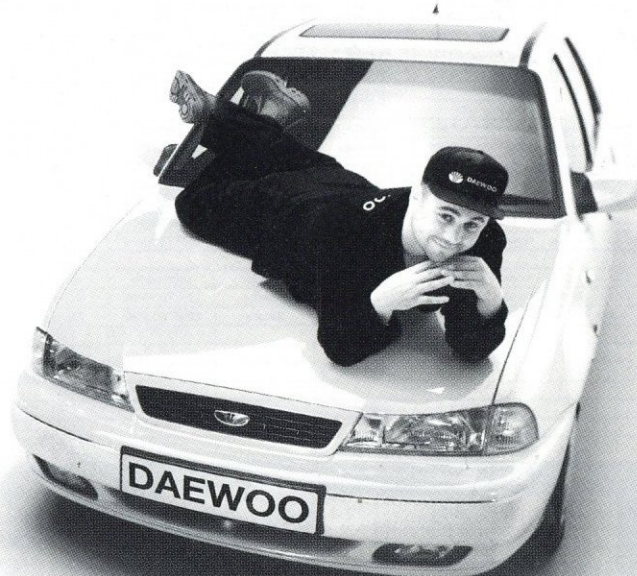

Today we catch upon the news from the Easter period around the Continent. I must say I was pleased to see no other countries followed the UK's example of playing games on Good Friday, which as a Christian I consider inappropriate for football. Am I the only one to feel this way?

In the Bundesliga a 63,000 sell-out crowd saw Bayern Munich maintain their title challenge with a 1-0 win against Werder Bremen. The home side scored after just 15 seconds (the quickest ever Bundesliga goal) through Alexander Zickler. Fellow hopefuls Bayer Leverkusen defeated Schalke 2-0 at home - 24,000 saw Kirsten and Meizer hit the net in this game.

Meanwhile Leverkusen have pulled out of a deal to sell Brazilian midfielder Paulo Sergio to AS Roma following FIFA's decision to allow all out of contract foreign players to move between E.U. clubs without transfer fees. The clubs have agreed a fee of around \$4 million but under the new ruling no payment would be required. Instead Roma have made an offer for another Brazilian midfielder - Sao Paulo's Denilson. They have offered \$7 million and according to President, Francesco Senoi, are prepared to increase it. Sensi also stated that with great players it didn't matter who coached the team, a statement that was seen to the President distancing himself from his Argentine coach Carlos Bianchi.

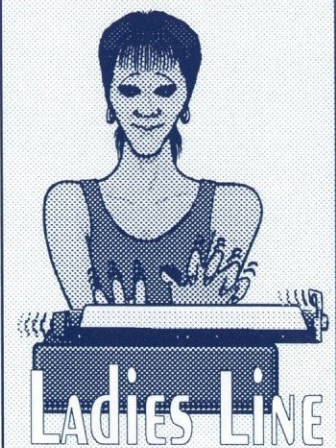
Giantkillers Creteil and Clermont-Ferrand both fell at the Quarter Final stage of the French Cup. Creteil were beaten 3-1 at home by Guingamp while Clermont went down 2-1 at home to Nice. In the other games Montpellier won 2-1 at Bordeaux in the only all First Division clash while Second Division Laval beat Troyes 1-0 at home.

A Swiss referee had to have medical treatment after being hit on the head by a chair at the end of a cup tie. Home fans at the ground of Second Division Wil were annoyed when FIFA referee Serge Muhmenthaler denied their side a penalty during a 3-2 defeat against First Division Lausanne. The unfortunate official had to leave the field with police protection, but at least he didn't have Danny Baker to contend with as well!

German national coach Berti Vogts has blasted big salaries being paid to average players. He also said that senior players were not doing enough to help their younger team mates.

Finally, Barcelona's ace Renaldo has said that he will talk to any club making an offer for his services. He has been linked to Manchester United but Lazio remain favourite for his signature. Renaldo is upset by Barca's failure to agree a new contract but he has stated that if they match other offers he receives he will stay in Catalonia.

In their Easter game Barcelona drew 1-1 at Valencia, their equaliser coming from a mistake by goalkeeper Zubizarreta which allowed Renaldo the chance to score.

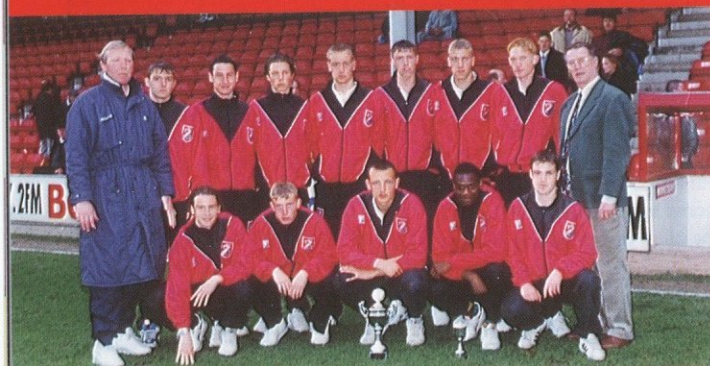

BACK IN TIME EARLIER DAYS

SEASON 1976/77

We kicked off the new season with one newcomer, Mick Bates from Leeds United, in midfield and he helped us to 1-0 wins over Shrewsbury Town in both legs of our first round League Cup tie and a goalless draw at Sheffield Wednesday in our opening League game.

We then went out of the League Cup 4-2 to Nottingham Forest in front of an 8,431 Fellows Park gate and none of our opening six League games were won. Wins over Northampton Town and Port Vale were then followed by a 7-0 hammering at Brighton & Hove Albion, but despite indifferent League form we proved ourselves a different team when it came to F.A. Cup ties.

A goalless draw at home to Bradford City was followed by a 2-0 replay win at Valley Parade and then after two draws against Chesterfield we won through in a second round second replay at Derby County with Bernie Wright getting the winner and Mick Kearns playing the game of his life in goal just four days before Christmas.

This earned us a third round tie at Old Trafford for the second time in three seasons. This time we lost 1-0 but our share in the gate of 48,870 (over 5,000 more than two years earlier) came in handy. A fortnight later we gained our biggest win of the season up to then, 5-1 against Sheffield Wednesday with Bernie Wright getting two of the goals. Sadly these were the last goals scored for us by Bernie, who was sold to Bradford City a fortnight later. Doug Fraser had done some good things during his time as our manager but this wasn't one of them. Bernie had been a most popular and wholehearted player, a great battler and a great crowdpleaser and at 24 there was still lots of good football in him. Fraser himself left a few weeks later and Dave Mackay took charge.

A 6-1 win over Reading with a hat-trick from Miah Dennehy eased our concern, but soon we were in the midst of a lean spell with just four wins in 14 games. Happily we ended the season on a high note, however, with a 2-2 draw at Grimsby Town, a 5-3 win at Peterborough United with Alan Birch getting a hat-trick and a 3-3 draw against Bury.

Even so we finished no higher than 15th in Division Three, our lowest position for three seasons. Alan Buckley was again topscorer with 23 goals (compared with 35 in the previous season), but no-one else scored more than eight. Mick Kearns played in every game.

On the same day Scotland beat England 3-2 at Wembley with Denis Law, Bobby Lennox and Jim McCalliog getting their goals and Jack Charlton and Geoff Hurst replying.

20 years ago

We struggled in the early stages of our home game against Third Division leaders Brighton & Hove Albion on April 16th, 1977 with Mick Bates and Brian Taylor both injured in the first quarter of an hour and Nick Atthey booked. We had several narrow escapes as we strove to extend our unbeaten run under Dave Mackay to nine games and on one occasion Dave Serella appeared to handle in the

penalty area, but we rode our luck and with just two minutes to go Gary Shelton had a shot blocked and the ball rebounded to Nick Atthey, who banged home the winner.

At The Hawthorns West Bromwich Albion, who were seventh in the old Division One, lost 2-0 to Manchester City after having Bryan Robson carried off with a broken leg for the third time in his career.

10 years ago

April 18th, 1987 saw us beating promotion-chasing Gillingham 1-0 at Fellows Park. We kept visiting goalkeeper Phil Kite busy in a goalless first half when Tony Cascarino at times posed threats to our defence, then in the 56th minute Nicky Cross, who hadn't scored in nine games was sent away on the right by Trevor Christie. With everyone waiting for a centre to David Kelly, Nicky let fly and the ball skidded into the far corner of the net as Kite came out.

CHARLIE BAMFORTH around & about HEROES & VILLAINS

Bobby Moore was born 56 years ago today. There was a man who was a symbol for the better things in the game. Even an over-exaggerated late night drink in Blackpool failed to tarnish the image of a man who, rightly, became a national institution. If only the game today had ambassadors of Moore's eminence. There are a few, but sadly so many more 'heroes' are pedastalised on a platform of angst. And that goes for their clubs, too.

Is it a coincidence that the two clubs with which Bobby Moore was associated as a player fall into the category of 'loved and respected'? Most of us have our personal *bete noir* football clubs, the sides that it gives us enormous pleasure to see suffer. I wouldn't think that West Ham United and Fulham feature very highly on most people's lists.

As a kid it was always an enormous delight for me when West Ham United visited my club. On the one hand we had the thrill of seeing three World Cup stars playing, in the shape of Moore, Geoff Hurst and Martin Peters. Alongside them would be other talented and, sometimes, 'fun' people, such as Harry Redknapp, John Sissons, Brian Dear, Trevor Brooking, Clyde Best, Ronnie Boyce and, my special favourite, Billy Bonds. And behind them would be fallible folk, such as Bobby Ferguson, Alan Stephenson, John Cushley and Tommy Taylor, players who would confirm our pleasure in West Ham's visit by guaranteeing us a win.

It wasn't only West Ham that we relished for these reasons. Chelsea were always good for flair, but a

good stuffing, too.

We didn't see a lot of Fulham, who had fallen on hard times by the late sixties. But the Cottagers will always be the music hall team. Visions of Tommy Trinder and Tosh Chamberlain will forever mean Fulham. It's good to see them at the right end of Division Three.

Similar sentiments drive me to declare the fervent wish that The Hammers stay in the Premiership again. Sure, they are perennial strugglers and, yes, I recognise that, in 1977, there isn't terribly much Anglo-Saxon about them. But they remain a club established on proper principles and they deserve to survive.

The laws of neutrality should dictate that I don't declare a preference for those I would like to see 'fall by the Premiership wayside'. Why, my colleagues might even send me to Coventry were I to list the club that has long since overstayed its welcome in the top division! Suffice it to say, though, that it might do some of the high and mighty good to 'rough it' for a period amongst the proletariat. Might not an Everton, for example, come back a better-adjusted outfit if they were to hike around unfamiliar pastures for a bit?

Personally I do have an affinity for The Toffees, and it would give me far greater satisfaction to see some of the other long-standing big boys taken down a peg. No names, no pack drill. But Arsenal, for instance, though not this year, I guess.

Your're right, I'm just getting bitter and twisted, driven to spite and envy. But that's not the only

reason I'd like to see a certain red-shirted Northern side downgraded. I just don't like them. Most other people don't either.

Is that because they have been successful, monotonously and self-centredly so, whereas we love West Ham because they are plucky strugglers who have, over the years, played football beautifully, with a smile, but with a defence like a sieve? And, for that reason, they have enjoyed little sustained glory?

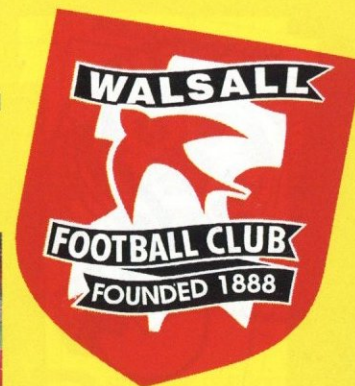

As far as I am concerned these clubs represent a grey area in my sentiment reflexes. I have no particular feeling for either of them, one way or the other. What emotion, then, led me to find especial delight in the final outcome? Very little was keeping me awake at the wheel other than my contempt for the style of Alan Green. And then Middlesbrough scored. I had visions of Ravanelli with his jersey wrapped round his head charging in front of a succession of hideously expensive colleagues, who until recently thought that Teesside was a cut of beef. I pictured the ecstasy of the fans in red and the desperate misery of those in blue. And suddenly I felt passionate hatred for the northern club. So when Leicester equalised I shrieked with joy.

It was totally irrational. Bobby Moore would have been disgusted with me.

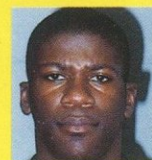

Our first April 12th game was in 1895 when we crashed 6-1 in a Second Division game at Arsenal's Manor Road ground. Wilf Devey getting our goal. There was then a 14 year gap before Sid Francis got the only goal of a Birmingham League game against Stourbridge at Hillary Street.

Stourbridge were the opposition again at Hillary Street on April 12th, 1913 but this time we lost the Birmingham League game 2-1 with George James getting our goal. A heavier defeat awaited us at Birmingham on April 12th, 1915 when we crashed 6-0 again in the Birmingham

front of a 45,234 gate as they romped towards promotion.

And so to April 12th, 1952 and an Easter Saturday 3-0 win over Port Vale in Division Three (South) with two goals from Bill O'Neill and the other from Hugh Evans. Still in Division Three (South) Tony Richards got both goals in a 2-1 win over Norwich City on April 12th, 1955, which was Easter Tuesday, but just a year later we lost 3-2 to the same opposition at Norwich City with Jack Love and Ken Hodgkisson on the mark on April 12th, 1956.

In the last season of Division Three (South) we were held to a goalless draw by Aldershot at Fellows Park on

getting our goal in front of 17,233 at Leeds Road as the top two teams in the division battled it out.

April 12th, 1986 saw Richard O'Kelly, Nicky Cross, Phil Hawker and Steve Elliott on the mark in our 4-1 win over Gillingham at Fellows Park in Division Three and just a year later David Kelly and Trevor Christie were on the mark as we again won at Fellows Park in Division Three, this time against Chesterfield. Then on our last April 12th game before today we forced a goalless draw at Northampton Town on Easter Monday 1993 as we battled for a place in the renamed Division Three playoffs. One of our former

League.

We suffered another heavy defeat, 4-0 at home to Tranmere Rovers in Division Three (North) on April 12th, 1924, but then after moving into Division Three (South) three years earlier we beat Brighton & Hove Albion 2-0 at Hillary Street on April 12th, 1930 with goals from Albert Walters and Johnny Eyres.

We didn't play on April 12th in any of the wartime seasons, but in the first season of 'normal' football we went down 3-0 at Cardiff City's Ninian Park on April 12th, 1947. This was just four days after we had won 8-0 at Northampton Town, but the Bluebirds beat us 3-0 in

April 12th, 1958, but two years later we romped home 4-2 at Oldham Athletic en route to the Fourth Division Championship with Colin Askey. Roy Faulkner and Colin Taylor (2) getting our goals. We then had to wait another 15 years before we played on April 12th again, being held to a goalless draw by Plymouth Argyle at Fellows Park in Division Three on April 12th, 1975 in front of a healthy late season gate of 7,404. Two years later another Third Division game ended goalless at Oxford United and in our Fourth Division promotion season we forced a 1-1 draw at Huddersfield Town on April 12th, 1980 Don Penn

players Ally Brown celebrated his 46th birthday today. After distinguished service with Leicester City, West Bromwich Albion and Crystal Palace he had a very useful 1983/84 season with us, scoring 15 goals in 47 games, netting the matchwinner in our 2-1 Milk Cup win at Highbury. After just one season he moved to Port Vale and more recently he has been an Aldridge publican.

In the wider world former World Cup skipper Bobby Moore was born on April 12th, 1941. American President Franklin D. Roosevelt died on April 12th, 1945 and Russia's Yuri Gagarin became the first man in space on April 12th,

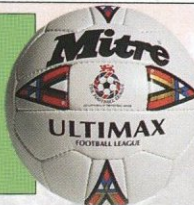

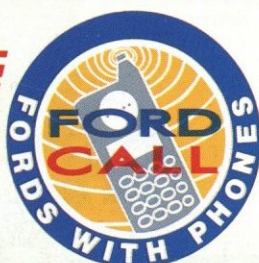
