

BOOK REVIEW

Up for the Cup!

British Football Clubs in Europe since 1955 by Jon Ladd, Dial House £7.99. What have football clubs Afan Lido, Aidrieonians, Cwmbran, Derry City, Glenavon, Inter Cardiff, Linfield, Portadown, Watford and Manchester United all got in common? The answer is that since 1955 they have all played in major European competitions from the old Inter-Cities Fairs Cup through to the modern European Champions League.

This excellent 144 page large size paperback book charts the history of every British team in Europe with a summary of its achievements and a complete record of all its results, and of the latter there are a few which are surprising. For instance, Manchester United might have had their problems with Galatasaray but West Bromwich Albion didn't when they met them in the UEFA Cup in 1978/79, winning both legs 3-1, with future Blackpool player Tony Cunningham scoring one of the goals. Plucky Dundee actually defeated the mighty AC Milan 1-0 in the second leg of the semi-final of the European Cup in 1962/63; what a pity Milan had won the first leg 5-1!

Sadly the Anglo-Italian competition is not included so Blackpool cannot enjoy the moment of their European glory through the book's pages. But ex and future Blackpool players have featured strongly in European competition throughout the past 41 years with goals being scored by no less than 13 players who have had connections with the Seasiders. Ernie Taylor who scored a penalty for Manchester United in the 1957/58 European Cup semi-final against AC Milan was the first such player to score and then scorers included Alan Skilton, Arsenal, Fred Pickering, Everton, Les Lea, Cardiff and even Emlyn Hughes, Liverpool, who scored in five separate ties for his club.

Alan Ball with three goals for Everton against Keflavik in the 1970/71 European Cup is the only player connected with Blackpool to score a hat-trick in Europe and one of the subjects of our questions is the only player to score for his club in a European Final.



Welcome to Luton Town for their first visit to Bloomfield Road for nearly 20 years. Last season they finished bottom of Division One but this season their fortunes have changed. With 4 straight wins in December they are in second spot hot on the heels of leaders Brentford with striker Tony Thorpe outstanding.

Paul Showler (Midfield/Forward)

Born: Doncaster 10.10.66
 Signed in August 1996, from Bradford City where he played under current Luton boss Lennie Lawrence. Played non-league football for Altrincham and Barnet, with league appearances for the latter following their promotion from the Conference. Scored his first goal for the Hatters in the 3-1 win over Walsall in October 1996.

Ian Feuer (Goalkeeper)

Born: Las Vegas 20.5.71
 Ian signed for the Hatters from West Ham in December 1995, for a fee which could rise to £580,000 depending on appearances.

The 6ft 7ins American arrived at Luton in September, and spent three months on loan. Was Luton's Player of the Year for the 95/96 season.

At West Ham he was understudy to Ludek Miklosko, but never played a first team game, and due to restrictions on overseas players was kept off the bench by Les Sealey. His Luton debut wasn't his league debut though as he was on loan at

Peterborough in 1994/95, playing 16 games in Division Two. Spotted by West Ham playing in Belgium, although he actually signed from Los Angeles Salsa.

Ceri Hughes (Midfield)

Born: Rhonda Valley 26.2.71
 Ceri was a regular in the Town midfield in the 1993/94 season, and his performances earned a call-up to the full Welsh side. He made his Luton debut at Aston Villa in 1990, and has also represented his country at youth and under 21 levels.

Scored seven goals in the 1993/94 season, but damaged knee ligaments against Grimsby in November 1994 and was ruled out for the rest of the campaign after just eight league starts. Made his comeback against Norwich on the opening day of the 95/96 season, but suspension and injury plagued his 95/96 campaign.

Played for Wales in Albania in November 1995. Had a trial period at Crystal Palace in summer 96, but they decided against a deal.

quickly established himself as a versatile defender.

Started the 1994/95 season as left-back, but then switched to the centre of defence to form a reliable partnership with Trevor

Julian James (Defender)

Born: Tring 22.3.70
 Julian joined Luton as a trainee, and was introduced to First Division football in 1988, but was sent off on his full debut in a Littlewoods Cup win at Leeds in November of that year.

A former England Under-21 international, he was a regular at left-back in the 1993/94 season, but made the right-back position his own in 1994/95 with a string of consistent displays which earned him the Player of the Year award from the Loyal Luton Supporters Club. Was in and out of the side at the start of the 95/96 campaign, before an extended run at right-back after Christmas. Granted a benefit match in 1996.

Marvin Johnson (Defender)

Born: Wembley 29.10.68
 Marvin made his Football League debut against Wimbledon in 1988, and

quickly established himself as a versatile defender.

Started the 1994/95 season as left-back, but then switched to the centre of defence to form a reliable partnership with Trevor

Peake. Marvin was one of only three players to play in every first team match in 94/95 season, and was awarded the Player of the Year trophy. He was again a consistent performer in 95/96 at centre-back, alongside Steve Davis for the most part, and Darren Patterson.

Graham Alexander (Defender/Midfield)

Born: Coventry 10.10.71
 Graham joined the Hatters in July 1995, and was Terry Westley's first signing after being confirmed as Luton's new manager.

The Town coaching staff had been watching him for two seasons before deciding to make their move, with the fee in the region of £100,000 with further payments depending on appearances.

Steve Davis (Defender)

Born: Hexham 30.10.68
 Steve joined the Hatters in the summer of 1995 after making over 160 league appearances for Burnley, scoring 22 goals.

He joined the Turf Moor side in August 1991 for £60,000 from Southampton, after loan spells at Burnley and Notts County. He captained Burnley during their rise up the league into Division One, and played in both their victories over Luton in the 1994/95 season.

Was a commanding figure for the Hatters in 95/96, but again suffered the agony of relegation as Luton, like Burnley the previous season, dropped out of Division One.

David Oldfield (Midfielder)

Born: Perth, Australia 30.5.68
 David returned to Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1995, six years after leaving Luton Town.

He started his career with the Hatters, progressing through the junior ranks to a two-goal senior debut in a 2-1 Simod Cup win at Everton in February 1988. He also scored on his full league debut in a 2-1 home win over Watford in May 1988, and went on to make 29 league appearances for the Hatters, scoring four goals. Australian-born Oldfield, who played for England Under 21's, joined Manchester City for £600,000 in March 1989, before moving on to Leicester City.

Bontcho Guentchev (Forward)

Born: Bulgaria 7.7.64
 The Bulgarian international signed for the Hatters after being released by Ipswich.

The 31 year old striker, who played in the 1994 World Cup Finals in the USA when Bulgaria reached the semi-finals, had been at Ipswich for three seasons playing 58 games in the Premier League.

He arrived on a free transfer after being released by the Portman Road club, but his wife's employment at the Bulgarian embassy now

means he is free to continue playing in the UK.

Scored vital goals for the Hatters in 95/96 and played for Bulgaria in the 1996 European Championships.

Kim Grant (Forward)

Born: Ghana 25.9.72
 Signed from Charlton, where he had made his debut under Lennie Lawrence, for £250,000 in March 1996, and scored on his debut against Ipswich. Was selected for the Ghanaian national squad in the summer of 1996, playing against Egypt and Denmark. Also represented his country against South Africa in September, and is a regular member of their squad in the African Nations Cup and World Cup qualifying matches.

Tony Thorpe (Midfield)

Born: Leicestershire 10.4.74
 Tony made an immediate impact in the Town side when he scored for the Hatters on his full debut at Newcastle United, in the fourth round of the FA Cup in January 1994. He joined the club at the start of the 1992/93 season, following a spell at Leicester. He was restricted to just five substitute appearances during the 1994/95 campaign.

Scored Luton's winning goal at Southend in August 1995 - the Hatters' first win of the season, and their first under Terry Westley.

Signed a new contract in the summer of 1996.

Dwight Marshall (Forward)

Born: Jamaica 3.10.65

Dwight signed in the summer of 1994 from

Plymouth for £150,000, after scoring 14 goals for Peter Shilton's side the previous season - his third campaign at Home Park after playing non-league football with Grays Athletic. Started well for Luton, with two goals in the 5-1 win over Middlesbrough in October, and despite being troubled by a shin injury late in the season he finished as the Hatters' leading scorer with 13 goals in league and cup.

Scored 13 goals in 95/96, but suffered a broken leg in February, ruling him out for the rest of the season. **Gary Waddock (Midfield)**

Born: Alperton 17.3.62

Gary completed a free transfer move from Bristol Rovers in December 1994, after a three-month loan spell at Kenilworth Road. Started his career with QPR making over 200 appearances, including an

FA Cup Final against Spurs in 1982, and the subsequent replay.

That was followed by a spell in Belgium with Charleroi as Gary recovered from a serious knee injury, and he also had spells at Millwall, QPR again, and Swindon, before moving on to Bristol. Gary only missed one game, through suspension, after joining the Hatters in 1994/95, and scored his first goal for the club on the final day of the season. His consistent displays in 95/96 were rewarded with the Players' Player of the Year trophy.

Trevor Peake (Defender)

Born: Nuneaton 10.2.57
 Trevor started his career at Lincoln City in 1979, before moving on to Coventry City in 1983. He enjoyed eight full seasons at Highfield Road, winning an FA Cup winners' medal in 1987 as the Sky Blues beat David Pleat's Tottenham 3-2 at Wembley. Trevor joined Luton for £100,000 in August 1991, and signed a new one-year contract in the summer of 1994.

For the first time in his career he maintained an ever-present and ever-present record throughout the season, being voted the Supporters' Club Player of the Year and signed a further one-year deal in the summer of 1995, and was appointed reserve team coach during the 95/96 season.

Mitchell Thomas (Defender)

Born: Luton 2.10.64
 The former England Under-21 international made over 100 appearances for Luton before moving to Spurs, shortly after David Pleat, in 1986. He played in the 1987 FA Cup Final, and later moved to West Ham. He was on loan at Luton in the 1993/94 season before a permanent free transfer

move, and after missing the start of the season through suspension was a regular at left-back in the 1994/95 campaign. Recalled by new manager Lennie Lawrence in December 1995, and responded with an ever-present record until the end of the season.

Darren Patterson (Defender)

Born: Belfast 15.10.69
 Darren signed for the Hatters in August 1995 from Crystal Palace for £150,000, a fee which could rise to over £200,000 based on appearances. The Northern Ireland international started his league career with Wigan, and joined Palace for £250,000 in 1992.

An achilles injury ruled him out of the first two months of the season, and kept him out of Northern Ireland's final European Championship qualifying matches.

Made his first Luton appearance in the Anglo-Italian Cup defeat in Cesena in November, and returned to the Northern Ireland squad at the end of the season. Went on loan to Preston in October 1996.

IN THE HOT SEAT



LENNIE LAWRENCE - MANAGER

Lennie Lawrence was appointed manager of Luton Town in December 1995, following the departure of Terry Westley.

A player with non-league Croydon, Carshalton Athletic and Sutton United, Mr Lawrence was an assistant manager at Plymouth, where he was also caretaker manager, and at Lincoln, before becoming manager of Charlton Athletic in 1982, having initially joined the Addicks as reserve team coach.

Charlton finished as runners up in Division Two in 1985-86 earning promotion to the top flight after an absence of 29 years. In the following season they were involved in the first promotion/relegation play-offs, overcoming second division Leeds United in extra time

in a dramatic play-off final replay, but were relegated in 1990.

Mr Lawrence left Charlton in 1991, after nine years with the club which at the time made him the third longest serving manager in the country behind Nottingham Forest's Brian Clough and Oldham's Joe Royle. He headed north to Middlesbrough, where he took the Teeside club into the FA Premier League in 1992 in his first season with them. They returned to Division One in 1993, and Mr Lawrence left in 1994, when Bryan Robson took over at Ayresome Park.

He then joined Bradford in May 1994, leaving Valley Parade in November of this year. He is the 21st manager in the history of Luton Town.



WHAT THE PAPERS SAY

The **Telegraph's** Brian Oliver reports that the B.B.C. made a goodwill gesture by sending the Hungarian state television network a tape of the famous 1953 match at Wembley which the visitors won 6-3. They had been waiting 43 years for the chance of seeing Matthews, Mortenson, Taylor, and Johnston playing for England. Well, okay, perhaps it was to see Puskas playing for Hungary!

Regular Radio 5 Live listeners will have enjoyed last week's programme **Vital Statistics** about football statistician Ray Spiller. Used as a source by the F.A., The Football League,

Coca-Cola, and Carling. Ray is obsessed with statistics. In fact there is no room for his car in either of his two garages because they are jammed to the rafters with newspapers, magazines, books and ledgers. Anything he doesn't actually know about football can be found out from his voluminous files almost instantly. When was the last time QPR played Bury? QPR v Bury, 1937, 3rd round F.A. Cup, Bury 1 QPR 0 came the answer in seconds.

Such devotion struck **The Observer's** Sue Arnold as bizarre. Well, wouldn't we all (no, I don't really want your answers to that one)!

Leeds United manager George Graham has upset one or two people with his sarcastic remarks about Chelsea about their foreign legion. After Leeds had beaten the Blues at Elland Road last month Graham said he had been surprised that Chelsea had turned up on such a cold day. This, needless to say, was to do with combining so many delicate foreigners with southern softies. At the same time he suggested limiting the number of foreign players in English sides to three.

"It was round about then," writes Giles Smith in the **Telegraph**, "that I began to hope, more fervently than

usual, that Leeds go down." Smith wonders how anyone can so completely misunderstand the effect foreign players are having on the Premiership.

Most importantly, he argues, homegrown players who were at the club before the arrival of Gullit, Vialli, Di Matteo, and Zola, have come alive, particularly Mark Hughes. And more tellingly, six members of the sides which recently beat West Ham, Aston Villa and Liverpool, were graduates of Chelsea's youth scheme. How can they fail to benefit from playing alongside internationals of such stature.

Perhaps George Graham's real problem, as Smith suggests, is that he himself didn't inherit very many top-class foreign players when he took over at Leeds. A case of jealousy and sour grapes in other words. Enjoy the game.

AT A GLANCE

Blackpool Res 0 v Coventry City Res 0
18 December 1996

In the last Reserve game of the year Blackpool drew 0-0 at home to Coventry City despite dominating most of the game and creating numerous openings.

With goalkeeper problems Blackpool had to borrow Simon Miotto from local side Blackpool Rovers and also included Tony Butler and James Quinn free from suspension, both played the first half. If the white carpet was a motivator for such a convincing display, we were really up for it, can we carry it about with us along with the second match ball which was a dazzling Tangerine colour. We should be very thankful not only for the hard-working efforts of the Shrewsbury groundstaff, but mainly referee Bob Harris' judgement in passing the surface suitable for such a good match to take place, many officials would have denied us our entertainment. 'Pool adapted to the conditions very quickly which Andy Preece capitalised on skating

in from the left and he fired his shot across keeper Edwards into the far corner of the net. The second goal even was better after superb combination between the golfing twins Ellis and Preece. Andy's face lit up a Winter's day even before he smashed the ball past a helpless keeper such was the accuracy of the Ellis cross. The first half display, best away performance for many a day, good passing with full commitment and a real pleasure to watch. We went to sleep for a while second half which led us to conceding a goal from an unnecessary free kick. Our response was good and never gave the home side another sniff, (good quote on a cold day) Preece nearly clinched his hat-trick while James Quinn went awfully close to

adding a fourth goal. It was an imposing team display, but two goal Andy Preece and Tony Ellis earned their plaudits, while the call of 'good header' from 'Pool' fans, it became monotonous such was the dominance of Tony Butler and David Linighan at the heart of our defence. What a difference we are now in mid table above North End and looking for a play off place. More confidence can be gained from the knowledge that we have played all the top nine sides away, plus the fact we have not lost at home since the first game of the season against recent bogey team Chesterfield. Points gained from the away battles with top sides have been few, just one victory with nine men at Bristol City

and good draws at Brentford and Watford respectively which leaves us with 6 defeats. How on earth did we lose at Stockport? very unlucky at Crewe and blatantly robbed at Millwall by the referee. Making a realistic appraisal of overall situation, today's visitors Luton Town and Brentford look strong favourites for the automatic places. Bury are doing better than expected, have Stan Ternent in charge, he was manager of 'Pool' for a short period and was sacrificed to lure Alan Ball to the North West, the least said of Bally's reign the better. What of the others, we still haven't lost to Wrexham. Chesterfield might present a problem, Barry Fry is starting to get his Peterborough lot moving, perhaps it will be third arrangement lucky when we go to Walsall.



club is based on historical fact.







The year started with a 2-1 away victory at Brunton Park, Carlisle. A last minute Dave Linighan header providing a rare success in what may loosely be termed a derby, and lifting us to third in the Division Two table.

One defeat in the first three months did not prepare anyone for the heartache that was to follow. Four losses and two draws in April caused the automatic promotion slot that had seemed destined for Pool to be denied.

The play-off heartache against Bradford City proved what many fans had feared, that we had blown our promotion chances during that poor run of form in April.

In the second half of the year the disappointing league form continued with the current position in the table giving cause for concern as 1997 approaches.

In all, our league statistics for 1996 were as follows: Played 49, Won 19, Drawn 17, Lost 13.

With regards to personnel, a total of 31 players turned out for Pool under two managers, in league, FA and Coca Cola Cup ties. Some such as Bryan, Barlow, Linighan, Mellon, Bonner, Quinn, and

Ellis have been regular names on the team sheet. Others such as Pascoe, Orie and Charnock may test the memory of even our most committed supporters. Notable departures over the last 12 months include Andy Morrison, Phil Brown, Andy Watson, Andy Gouck and Chris Beech. Whilst new recruits including Tony Butler, Gary Brabin and Chris Malkin will take time to settle into their new surroundings.

Of the field the well documented problems for our chairman and his family have dominated matters. 1996 will also be remembered for the plans to move away from Bloomfield Road after nearly one hundred years of football there.

There have been some moments to savour. The award of the Manager of the Month to Sam Allardyce in both February and March was particularly noteworthy. In addition the Coca Cola tie against Chelsea and specifically our 3-1 victory at Stamford Bridge will be long remembered.

In the FA Cup we were knocked out twice in 1996,

firstly heroically by Huddersfield Town and then ignominiously by Hednesford Town.

One positive aspect may be seen in the possible ending of our recent hoodoo with York City. Two victories over the Minstermen, in May at Bootham Crescent on the final Saturday of the season and last month at home in what proved to be our final game of 1996, were most welcome after results in previous years.

On this first home game of the year, let us hope that the form and scoreline of that last game against York can carry us up the table and allow 1997 to be a better 12 months than its predecessor.





DID YOU KNOW?

Stan Mortensen's 23 goals in 25 games puts him 11th in the all time list of England leading goalscorers. His strike rate of 0.92 places him sixth behind the leader George Camsell who scored 18 goals in nine games.

Alan Ball played in goal for Blackpool, but not the World Cup hero Alan Ball. North East born Allan Ball was an amateur who was drafted into the Reserve side on 4 October 1963 at Bury after Bryan Harvey made a sudden move to Northampton Town. He only played three Central League games before joining George Farm's Queen of the South and eventually taking over from the former Blackpool goalkeeper in late 1963.

In their first season in League football Blackpool completed the double over only one side, Darwen but they did take three points from both Grimsby Town and Burton Swifts.

Jack Parkinson, who played centre forward and centre half for Blackpool up to 1910, was a lifeboatman and attended the wreck of the Rosaleen of St Annes just a few weeks before he was tragically killed in an accident at the Cocker Street swimming baths.

John Burridge came to Blackpool for a three match trial period when Neil Ramsbottom broke a bone in his arm at Easter 1971. But after three games in which he conceded only two goals and Blackpool were undefeated he was signed for £10,000.

After Jimmy Armfield made his final appearance for Blackpool against Manchester United, Blackburn Rovers, then newly relegated

the Third Division said that they would catch any offer made to the player so that he could play for them the next season.

hen Billy Parr made his amateur international debut for England, he was the fourth Blackpool amateur to have represented his country. He followed in the steps of S J Brad, Harold Hardman and Walter Grundy, the last two named making their international debut after they had left the club.

hen Tony Waiters made his international debut in a 3-1 win over Eire on 24 May 1964, Blackpool became the first club since the war to provide a player for all eleven positions in the England side.

Bob Wittingham made one England appearance as a 'Victory' international in 1919, 10 years after the free-scoring centre forward had left Blackpool.

Ivan Mortensen had his first taste of international football for Wales. On 25 September 1943 Welsh left half Ivor Powell of PR was injured in the game against England at Wembley and Mortensen, the England reserve, was allowed to come on for Wales for the remainder of the game. He played inside left with Ron Burgess of Spurs reverting to wing half, England were winning 4-1 when the substitution took place and although Wales pulled back to 4-3, England added four more to win convincingly 8-3. Mortensen did not score for Wales.

glimpses from the past

By the time Blackpool came to take on Luton Town on 22 December 1973, the club had scored only 28 goals in 21 League games that season and the cry from the local press was **Front Three Must Score Goals**. Five of the 28 goals had come in a November rout of Portsmouth and five had come in the previous two games, a 3-2 win at Carlisle and a 2-2 draw at Oxford which left Blackpool in sixth place in the Division Two table. In contrast, Luton were sitting second and had scored 33 goals in 20 games.

In support of the call for more goals from the forwards was the fact that 16 of Blackpool's goals had come from defenders and midfield players with the front three from the most recent games only managing eight goals between them; Micky Burns led the way with five goals in 20 appearances, Keith Dyson had one in eight and Micky Walsh had two in 13. Midfielder Terry Alcock was the leading scorer with eight goals in 20 games and in three games he had proved to be the matchwinner.

In the long term it was no use relying on goals from midfield and defence and the forwards just had to start scoring but Micky Burns was being given little room for manoeuvre, Keith Dyson was playing well in place of the suspended Wyn Davies but not finding the net and Alan Suddick was having difficulty in moving off the 99 League goal mark. It was, therefore, no wonder that the Blackpool management were concerned.

Blackpool made one change to the

side that drew at Oxford with Alan Ainscow returning from a cartilage operation making his first appearance of the season and Micky Walsh dropping down to substitute; Luton, having spent a considerable amount of money in team-building, named their strongest side. A crowd of only 7,796 turned up at Bloomfield Road to see the top-of-the-table clash and they saw a most disappointing opening 45 minutes. Blackpool rarely got their shooting boots on but Luton, although concentrating on defence, did manage to look dangerous on the break.

Blackpool did have the ball in the net in the 16th minute when Dyson slipped the ball past the advancing Horn but the linesman's flag was already up for off-side; other Blackpool efforts came from defenders Dave Hatton, Bill Bentley and John Curtis. On the other hand Luton had plenty of opportunities with West, Jim Ryan, Husband and particularly Butlin with a header which only needed a touch from the onrushing forwards to have put the visitors in front. John Burridge and his defence, with captain Glyn James outstanding, somehow managed to cope and the goalkeeper regularly plucked the many inswinging corners from Ryan and Aston safely out of the air.

The second half opened explosively and within 39 seconds Blackpool were in front. Bentley put a long clearance in the path of Micky Burns and the little winger raced into the area and, despite being tripped, managed to poke

the ball into the corner of the net past a stranded Horn. Luton replied strongly and Butlin forced a double reflex save from Burridge before in the 55th minute Blackpool went two goals in front. Glyn James took the ball forward, found Burns on the left and the winger cut inside past two defenders and unleashed a splendid shot into the top corner of the net.

Burns was now rampant; Ainscow found him with a great pass down the right, Burns moved outside Faulkner and put in a cross which Shanks was grateful to put behind for a corner. And in the 71st minute he completed his hat-trick. There seemed little danger when he received the ball just inside the penalty area with all the Luton defenders between him and the goal but he wormed himself free and placed a shot well out of Horn's reach into the top corner and it was 3-0. Luton were finished and they played out the remaining 19 minutes with resignation.

Blackpool's win moved them up to fourth place in the table whilst Luton remained second as other results went their way. Micky Burns' hat-trick was the first by a Blackpool player for just over a year and he finished the season as Blackpool's leading scorer with 14 goals from his ever-present 42 game season. Midfielder Terry Alcock with 12 was the only other Blackpool player to reach double figures so, despite one Saturday hat-trick, it continued to be a case of *Front Three Must Score Goals* throughout the season!

Back here, it's about time the marketing and TV men, who have changed so much in our beloved game, kicking off games at 8pm on Mondays etc, etc, accepted there is one thing they can't manipulate - the weather.

And if anyone mentions summer football, direct them towards the nearest snowdrift.





MEMORABILIA

Today's memorabilia "window" features the match programme from the Anglo Italian Cup Final of 1971 a game in which Blackpool beat Bologna 2-1 aet with goals from Craven and Burns. In reaching the final Blackpool played 4 group matches playing Roma and Verona both home and away.

Blackpool lost at home to Roma 1-3 but won the game in Rome 2-1. In the games versus Verona Blackpool drew at home 3-3 and won away 4-1. These results were enough for Pool to finish top of their group and so went on to meet the team who finished top of the Italian group, Bologna, in the final on Saturday 12th June 1971.

I have illustrated the programme covers from the



2 home games v Roma and Verona. I am not aware of any programmes being produced for the away games, if anybody can confirm whether programmes exist or not then I would be delighted to hear from them. I do know that no programme was produced for the Anglo Italian Cup Final of 1972, a game that saw Roma defeat Blackpool 3-1.

OBITUARY

H Ellis Tomlinson (1915-1996)

It was with a great deal of sadness that we learnt of the death on 19 December of H Ellis Tomlinson. He had been watching Blackpool as long as any supporter and probably longer than most. Born in Cheshire, Ellis moved to Blackpool in 1928 and he started watching the 'Pool immediately, this was to continue until his final game at Bloomfield Road, the FA Cup tie against Huddersfield Town a span of 68 years.

On arrival in the Fylde, Ellis attended Baines Grammar School and later taught there with much success. It was his teaching that brought about, much later, my first contact with 'Toss' as he was affectionately known. When he was asking for recitations of French verbs we youngsters were afraid of him with his chair spindle carefully secreted in the sleeve of his gown and with which he would give you a quick cuff if you failed to get as far as ils sont in conjugating the French verb to be or if you were unable to quickly run through amo, amas, amat!

But he was a superb teacher and in between times he was one of the most friendly of men. He was a top

heraldic expert and always when it came to school holidays he would regale the class with tales of his designing of the football badges of the home countries and with stories of Blackpool FC long ago, in particular the great Jimmy Hampson. They were always moments to savour.

He took the school team for football and his shout of boot that ball could regularly be heard on school touchlines around the Fylde. He built the Baines football team into one feared throughout schools' football and devoted many hours to training, refereeing and watching his protégés. In his spare time, he followed Blackpool all over the country and it was no surprise when, in 1987, he was asked to write the Centenary History of the club entitled *Seasiders: The First 100 Years*. At a centenary exhibition at the Grundy Art Gallery he signed copies of his book in his unmistakable purple ink and mixed equally well with players and supporters alike, always with a kindly word. He passed away peacefully at Blackpool's Victoria Hospital and everyone will miss him greatly. Happy Memories Ellis, Rest in Peace or should I say, Requiescat in Pace, your teaching has not been forgotten!

BOOK REVIEW AND COMPETITION
