

From the manager's chair

TUESDAY'S performance against West Brom was a big boost for the confidence of the team, as we played as well in the first half hour as we have done this season, especially in terms of passing the ball.

Although West Brom came back into the game in the last 10 or 15 minutes of the first half, I felt we were unfortunate not to go in with a lead at half-time.

Early in the second-half West Brom had their most dangerous spell, but we battled well defensively, and this period also included a great strike from Gary Waddock which hit the post.

On any other day that would have gone in.... or over the stand!

The last 20 minutes saw us struggling to re-adjust after the loss of Marvin Johnson, and some young legs were getting tired, although West Brom were happy to see the game out at 1-1.

All-in-all, against a team that has started very well in the first division, it was a commendable performance, and a result that keeps us alive for the second leg at the Hawthorns on Tuesday.

Now we turn our attentions to today's game against Wrexham.

Obviously this is a game that we badly need to win, and after their unfortunate defeat against Wigan in their last away game, I'm sure Wrexham will be equally determined to gain a good result.

We failed to beat Wrexham in either encounter last

season, in spite of plenty of possession, and hopefully we can redress the balance this time around.

The home game, a 0-0 draw, was our first for nearly four weeks after the weather-enforced break in January, whilst the away game that followed resulted in a 2-1 defeat.

Wrexham are a cultured, footballing side, with some talented players and a manager in Brian Flynn who is now one of the longest serving at one club in the league.

He has done an excellent job with limited resources at his disposal.

I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Brian and his team to Kenilworth Road, along with the Wrexham officials and supporters.

It is also my first opportunity to formally welcome Phil Gray back to Kenilworth Road,

after his departure to Sunderland in 1993, followed by brief stays in France and Holland.

Hopefully his experience and goalscoring record can help us climb the table.

People are well aware of our injury situation, and that has been compounded by the loss of Marvin Johnson on Tuesday with a knee ligament injury - which fortunately does not look as bad as first feared.

On the plus side, Gavin McGowan and Bryan Small are able to return today having not been permitted to play in the cup competition by their respective clubs on Tuesday. Bryan has been with us for some time, but this will be his home debut.

Hopefully we will be able to cope with this frequent change of personnel, and maintain the level of performance shown against West Brom and also in the first-half against Bournemouth last week.

As I stated in Tuesday's programme notes, we created more chances in the first-half last Saturday than in any other 45 minutes this season, but only scored one and Bournemouth came back strongly in the second period.

We failed to get a grip on the midfield, but just as though it looked we would weather the storm with some excellent defending in our own penalty area, and some good saves by Kelvin Davis, we conceded an equaliser.

Recent circumstances have given many young players an opportunity to stake a claim



in the first team, and it's pleasing to see that an opportunity that perhaps did not occur last year has been grasped by the likes of Kelvin Davis, Stuart Douglas and Sean Evers, who have shown that they can come in to the team and do a job - and more in

some cases. Hopefully that trend will continue, but not to the detriment of their long term development.

The last few weeks have been difficult for everyone, but please get behind the team as we bid to turn our league fortunes around.

All square with Ray's Baggies

LUTON and West Brom go into Tuesday's second leg at the Hawthorns all-square, after the first leg at Kenilworth Road ended 1-1.

Stuart Douglas put the Town in front, with Bob Taylor equalising before the break, with both sides hitting the post in a lively second period.

With on-loan duo Gavin McGowan and Bryan Small not being released by their respective clubs, Luton recalled Graham Alexander and Richard Harvey to the fullback positions, with Andy Dibble replacing the cup-tied Kelvin Davis in goal.

Dibble, Luton's hero in the 1988 League Cup Final, was up against an Albion side managed by the man who selected him for that final - former Luton boss Ray Harford - but had a quiet opening as the Hatters had the best of the first half hour.

Douglas had a goal disallowed for a foul on Paul Raven on 12 minutes, and David Oldfield went close after good work by Harvey and Dwight Marshall.

But Douglas did put his side in front on 24 minutes, with a neat turn and shot after Albion had failed to clear a corner.

Marshall had a close range effort cleared off the line soon after, but the Division One side hit back on 36 minutes when Taylor headed home a David Smith cross.

In the second half, Gary Waddock hit

the post and saw one shot go just over, but Albion shaded it on chances created, with £1.5 million winger Kevin Kilbane an influential figure.

He set up headers for Stacey Coldicott and Taylor, and was himself denied by Dibble's tackle, with Taylor also hitting the post late on.

On the down side for Luton, Marvin Johnson was stretchered off with a knee injury, with Paul McLaren dropping back to centre-half.

But on a more positive note there was a senior debut for another of the Town's up-and-coming youngsters, with Liam George a second-half substitute for Sean Evers. George now fully recovered from the knee injury that kept him out of the latter stages of the youth team's cup exploits last term. - *Simon Oxley*







The centre of defence seemed to be the one area to avoid disruption, but now there will be a change there as well, although at the time of writing the full extent of Marvin's injury isn't known.





After 0.7 miles exit M5 at junction 1 (s/p A41 West Bromwich, Sandwell, Birmingham NW). Turn left at roundabout at top of slip road (s/p Birmingham A41, football ground) into Birmingham Road. The ground is on the RHS after 0.3 miles.



JONATHAN CROSS - Forward who burst onto the scene as a YTS trainee, and earned an early pro contract. Went on loan to Cliftonville, for a run in the first team at left-back.

PHIL HARDY - Wrexham's regular left-back for the last seven seasons, since he was 17, when he dislodged former European Cup winner Alan Kennedy. Has captained the Republic of Ireland at Under21 level, and has already made over 200 appearances for Wrexham. Recently signed a new contract, but has been absent through injury.

TONY HUMES - A bargain £40,000 buy from Ipswich in 1992, Tony is the club captain. Although a native of the north-east, he started in football as an apprentice at Portman Road spending nearly 10 years there. Since arriving at Wrexham he has played in the centre of defence, but can switch to midfield if required. Only recently returned to full fitness, after missing the start of the season through injury.

BARRY JONES - Defender who arrived at Wrexham in 1992 after four years playing in Liverpool's Pontins League side. Made the right-back spot his own at the Racecourse, but more recently has switched to centre-half, playing in place of Tony Humes.

DERYN BRACE - Full-back who is a native of West Wales, but who began his career at Norwich. Moved to Wrexham in 1994 and made his league debut, and is now a regular in the Wales Under-21 side. Injuries have restricted his appearances, and he faced a hernia operation at the start of this season.

DAVE BRAMMER - Midfielder who is the product of Wrexham's youth policy and hails from the Wirral.

BRIAN CAREY - It was a case of third time lucky for Wrexham, as the Eire international defender finally joined the Reds on a permanent transfer in 1996. He had twice been on loan at the Racecourse Ground, but on both occasions Wrexham could not raise the cash to buy him from Manchester United. He joined Leicester in 1993, but following Barry Hunter's move to Reading, Wrexham had the money to get their man.

MARK CARTWRIGHT - Goalkeeper who started his career at York, but an injury as a YTS seemed to finish his career. After a spell studying in the USA he was offered a trial at Wrexham, and is deputy to Andy Marriott.

MARTYN CHALK - Signed from Stockport County as part of a deal which saw Keiron Durkan move in the opposite direction in March 1996. Came out of non-league football with Louth United to join Derby County, and then switched to Stockport in a £40,000 deal during 1994.

KARL CONNOLLY - Since the sale of top scorer Gary Bennett in 1995, the responsibility of filling the gap went to this Liverpool-born forward. Responded with over 40 goals in the past two

ANDY MARRIOTT - After a career which began with Arsenal and Nottingham Forest, and included various loan spells around the divisions, Wrexham solved their goalkeeping worries with the £200,000 capture of this former England Under 21 player. After appearing in the 1991 Littlewoods Cup Final, he found his chances limited at the City Ground and headed for Wrexham and first team football. He has since gained further international recognition, this time for Wales, with two full caps so far, and is deputy to Neville Southall for Bobby Gould's side.

MARK McGREGOR - Defender who captained the Wrexham youth team before moving up to the full-time ranks in 1995. Was a centre-half, but made nearly all his senior appearances in the right-back role. Supporters Young Player of the Year in 1996/97.

STEVE MORRIS - Forward who is the product of Liverpool's youth policy. Currently on loan at Rochdale.

GARETH OWEN - Midfielder who is still only 25, but is now entering his ninth season of first team football at the Racecourse and nearly 300 appearances for the club. Joined the club as a schoolboy, making his debut in 1989, and has gained caps for Wales at Under 21 and B level. Was recently called into the senior international squad.

WAYNE PHILLIPS - Midfielder who is Wrexham's longest serving player, but missed most of last season with a serious knee injury. Was included in the Welsh squad for the World Cup qualifier with Turkey, and having played in a number of roles for Wrexham, is now back in his preferred midfield role.

DAVE RIDLER - Centre-half who came to the club last season on the recommendation of Karl Connolly, who had seen him play local football in Liverpool. A chef by trade who was offered a contract by Brian Flynn.

NEIL ROBERTS - A second year pro who is on the verge of a first-team spot after a prolific scoring record in the reserves.

PAUL ROBERTS - Signed from League of Wales side Porthmadog last season for £10,000, and made his debut in the FA Cup tie with West Ham.

KEVIN RUSSELL - Free scoring forward who nearly carried the Reds to promotion in 1989, before leaving to continue a career that has seen him turn out for Portsmouth, Leicester, Stoke, Burnley, Peterborough, Cardiff, Hereford, Bournemouth and Notts County, before returning to the Racecourse in 1995.

CRAIG SKINNER - Came through the junior ranks at Blackburn Rovers as the wing partner to Jason Wilcox, making 20 appearances from 1989 to 1992. Moved on to Plymouth, and then signed for Wrexham for £50,000 in the summer of 1995.

DEAN SPINK - Signed in the summer from Shrewsbury for £70,000. Signed by Aston Villa from non-league Halesowen as a 22-year-old, with loan spells at Scarborough and Bury following. Joined Shrewsbury in 1990, and played at centre-half and centre-forward.

STEVE THOMAS - Former YTS trainee now in his first season as a professional. Has played for Wales at youth level.

NEIL WAINWRIGHT - In his second season as a professional, but still waiting for first-team opportunity.

PETER WARD - Joined Wrexham from Stockport in 1995, having captained County to several Wembley appearances. Formerly with Huddersfield and Rochdale.

STEVE WATKIN - Long-serving forward who netted a famous FA Cup winner against Arsenal. Wales B international who was sent off in the opening game of the season at Fulham.

MEET THE MANAGER

BRIAN FLYNN was appointed manager of Wrexham in November 1989, succeeding former player Dixie McNeil who had held the post for four years.

Former Middlesbrough boss John Neal was Wrexham's longest serving manager of recent times, in charge from 1968 to 1977, a period when Flynn was making his name as a player with Burnley.

The midfielder was a member of the successful Turf Moor side of the mid-1970s, and won his first Welsh cap in 1975. He went on to make 66 appearances for the Welsh, his final appearance coming in 1984 by which time he was back at Burnley.


Inbetween these two spells in Lancashire, he had moved across the Pennines to Leeds, in the post-Revie era, linking up with former Burnley manager Jimmy Adamson who had taken charge at Elland Road.

Now firmly established at the

Racecourse Ground, Flynn has former Norwich and Manchester City striker KEVIN REEVES as his assistant, with JOEY JONES, who won European Cup honours with Liverpool, also on the coaching staff.

The Hatters and The Robins

OUR first ever League meeting with today's visitors took place as recently as the 1963/64 season. In the clash at the Racecourse on November 30th 1963, a crowd of 6,281 watched the Robins win 2-0 to end a run of gathering only one point from the previous twelve matches. We were also having a torrid time with only one win recorded from the previous eight starts!

When the return game was played in the following April our new goalscoring sensation John O'Rourke was on the scoresheet along with Mark Lownds and the old master Gordon Turner in a 3-1 victory as we attempted to pull ourselves out of the bottom four in the old Division Three.

Wrexham were relegated at the end of that season but only twelve months elapsed before we were renewing acquaintances, this time in Division Four.

Both games in 1965/66 were early season affairs with the clash at the Racecourse showing that we were a long way short of having a side equipped for a quick promotion, going down to a youthful Wrexham who won easily 2-0. In truth the Robins should have won the return three weeks later but after squandering many chances a solitary Ray Whittaker strike earned us both points.

We suffered our, by now, normal defeat at the Racecourse in the following season but ran out 3-1 home winners in the return with ex-England forward, Derek Kevan, bagging two.

During our promotion winning season of 1967/68 we

kicked off the campaign at Wrexham and in a game which saw a player from each side sent off we earned a point with a goal from Rodney Green, making his debut, two minutes from the end.

We won the return but then had to wait eleven years before our paths crossed again, this time in the old Division Two. At the start of the 1978/79 season we scored a hatful of goals at Kenilworth Road but were brought back to earth when Wrexham managed to hold us to 'only' a 2-1 win. The return game was played at the very end of that campaign and, with Wayne Turner making his Town debut, we went down 2-0 in a lacklustre display.

We finally broke our duck at the Racecourse Ground when goals from Mal Donaghy and Steve White secured a valuable 2-0 victory on our way to promotion from the old Division Two in 1981/82.

To rub salt in the wound we went back to North Wales four days later for a League Cup tie second leg and won again, this time 1-0.

We had to wait until last season before meeting up again and a 0-0 home draw was a disappointment but probably understandable after a long lay-off caused by the bad weather. Despite taking the lead from Steve Davis in the return, we eventually went down 2-1 to two Gary Bennett goals, one of which was from the spot.

Transfer latest..... Hatters re-sign Gray to boost goals tally

PHIL YER BOOTS!

LUTON Town have re-signed Northern Ireland international Phil Gray in a £400,000 transfer from Dutch first division side Fortuna Sittard.

The striker, who first joined the Hatters in 1991, is set to start this afternoon's match against Wrexham - subject to the club receiving the necessary international clearance after Gray put pen to paper on Wednesday.

Now 28, Gray has spent just over a season on the continent, after three years at Sunderland following his £800,000 departure from Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1993.

Town manager Lennie Lawrence has made no secret of his wish to sign a new striker, and one who is, in his words, "the finished article".

Gray would appear to fit that bill - a proven goalscorer in the top two divisions with both Luton and Sunderland, he is relishing the prospect of rejoining the Hatters.

Northern Ireland striker returns from continent

"I am very pleased to come back, and I have great memories of my first time here," he told BBC Three Counties Radio.

"When Lennie Lawrence and David Kohler spoke to me about the prospect of signing, I said yes straightaway. I always look out for the Luton results, and I still know a lot of people at the club."

He still keeps in regular contact with Mitchell Thomas - a teammate from Tottenham days - and indeed it was Thomas who alerted the Hatters that Gray could be their man in the search or a striker.

Now Town fans have the mouthwatering prospect of a strike partnership of Gray - 20 goals in his last season here - and Tony Thorpe - 31 goals last term.

"Hopefully I can strike up a good understanding with whoever I play alongside up front," said Gray. "It may take a couple of games, and although I've never played in the second division I'm really looking forward to giving it a go."

International prospects are also still very much in his thoughts, and a move back to England is seen as beneficial in terms of keeping him in the Northern Ireland spotlight.

"Playing for my country means a lot to me, and at 28 I feel I still have several years of international football ahead of me," he added. "To do that means I have to keep playing well and scoring goals at club level, and although it will be a team effort I hope I can play my

Wanderer Bryan set for home debut

FORMER England Under-21 defender Bryan Small arrived at Kenilworth Road on loan last week from Bolton, following a string of injuries in the Hatters squad, and could end up making a permanent move.

Small, 25, was capped 12 times by England at Under-21 level in 1993 and 1994 when he was at Aston Villa. He later moved on to Bolton Wanderers, and played against Luton in last season's FA Cup. But following Bolton's return to the Premiership he hasn't been able to secure a first-team place, and so Lennie Lawrence contacted the Wanderers' boss Colin Todd.

He is set for his home debut this afternoon, after missing Tuesday's cup game against West Brom, as Bolton decided not to release him.

Small became Luton's second permitted loan signing, after Gavin McGowan, and following the injuries to Mitchell Thomas, Julian James and Richard Harvey, went straight into the team at Northampton.

"Among the welter of problems we have got at the moment, the left-back situation became the number one priority because we literally had no-one in the squad who could play there," pointed out Lennie Lawrence.

"Bryan is quick and can defend, as well as charge up and down the line, and the loan is a good move for him because he hasn't been able to force his way in at Bolton, where there seem to be a number of players ahead of him.


"How we take it from here depends on a number of things," added the Town manager.

"It depends how long Mitchell is out, it depends how well Bryan does, and it depends on how much he will cost."

"But certainly this month he's got to look at us and we've got to look at him."

"Fate has intervened with all these injuries, and we can't wait for everybody to be fit so we must look to bring in some new bodies."

Birmingham-born Small started his career at Aston Villa, making 36 league appearances for the Villa Park side, and also had a brief loan spell at Birmingham before his move to Bolton in March 1996.



Doubtless Pleat envisaged a Harford/Gray partnership along the lines of Harford/Stein in years gone by. But a succession of injuries to the Northern Ireland man meant that it was Harford/Stein for much of the season, with Gray a frustrated on-looker from the sidelines.


Gray netted six goals that season - three in the league, and three in the league cup - but played alongside Harford just three times. At the end of the season, Luton were relegated.

The 'new' Division One was a much happier hunting ground, for Gray at least, although the Town flirted with relegation. He was a virtual ever-present and scored 20 goals, including a purple-patch of nine in nine games around November 1992 - which included a brace in the 3-2 win at Peterborough, and both in the 2-1 win at Wolves.

He later scored in six successive matches in February/March, and for him the Hatters would surely have suffered a second successive relegation.

Harford had departed at the start of the season to Chelsea, so Gray this time had his fair share of partners,

with Steve Claridge, Ian Benjamin (briefly) and Kerry Dixon playing alongside him up front. But 20 goals obviously attracted much attention from outside Kenilworth Road, and £800,000 meant his departure to Sunderland. In three seasons on Wearside he scored 34 league goals in 115 league appearances, including one against Luton on his last appearance at

Kenilworth Road in September 1995. Ironically, Lennie Lawrence enquired about a possible loan deal later that season, after the Hatters lost Dwight Marshall with a broken leg - at Roker Park - at a time when Gray was out of favour with the Sunderland boss Peter Reid. But Reid was only interested in a permanent deal, and that was that.

Gray though did leave Roker Park in the summer of 1996, and much to Sunderland's disappointment he went for nothing, under the Bosman ruling, to French side Nancy.

From there he went to Dutch first division side Fortuna Sittard, and just three games into their new season - last Wednesday in fact - there were two very interested spectators in Rotterdam. David Kohler and Lennie Lawrence.

"It all started with a conversation with Mitchell Thomas, who still speaks with Phil regularly, and he indicated that Phil might be interested in coming back to this country," explained Mr Kohler.

"Having spoken with the manager we went through all the proper channels, asking the club if they would be willing to sell, and they said yes, if the price was right.

"We held discussions with Phil, his club and his agent in Rotterdam, and after full consultation with our board, agreed a deal.

"We have committed Luton Town to a lot of money, but you have to go with the flow in football if you are to succeed.

"The manager said we needed to do something, and rather than gamble on someone nobody had heard of, we have signed a known quantity in Phil Gray."

So this afternoon against Wrexham, Phil Gray is set for his second home debut for the Hatters. Not quite Liverpool admittedly, but Gray is looking forward.

Trevor Peake played alongside him in that first spell, and says today's Town players are encouraged by the signing.

"There aren't many still here from Phil's time, but those of us who remember him have good memories," said Trevor.

"Having also played against him, I know he is a very strong player, and despite being only 5ft 10 or 11, can still be a target man, who has a good leap, and can hold the ball up well."

As mentioned earlier, Lennie Lawrence has made no secret of his wish for a tried and tested front man, and whilst he acknowledges the efforts of the younger players, he will doubtless look to Gray to lift the Hatters back into the promotion race.

Stuart Douglas for one responded to the news of Gray's arrival with a man-of-the-match winning display on Tuesday against West Brom, but as Mr Lawrence pointed out:

"He did very well, all the youngsters have, and I feel sure that the likes of Stuart, Liam George, Gary Doherty and Andrew Fotiadis will all be players.... but not yet, and we can't wait. At this point in time we need experience." Over to you, Phil. - SIMON OXLEY.

Chief destroyer Arwel Thomas, who led the way with two tries and 23 points in all, was also unstinting in his praise for the way Wrexham FC and the people of the area responded.






ANDREW FOTIADIS has also undergone a similar operation, and will be out for about six weeks as well.


PAUL SHOWLER has been suffering with a toe infection, and has had an operation to remove the toenail.





For the first time in the club's history we reached the F.A.Cup final in 1959.

Before all this Daily Duncan resigned in October 1958 and for the remainder of the season the team was picked by a consortium which included Owen, trainer Frank King and the Board.

The loss of Duncan affected the side for a while and by the time of the Third Round F.A.Cup clash with Leeds at Kenilworth Road performances were at a low ebb and so changes were made to the side including the dropping of record goalscorer Gordon Turner.

On an icy pitch the Town went goal crazy and thrashed their Yorkshire opponents 5-1 to set up a Fourth Round tie at Leicester.

On another icy pitch we managed to scrape a draw but in the replay, played under our new floodlights, a crowd of over 27000 saw us go through with Turner's replacement Allan Brown scoring a hat trick.

"I honestly cannot remember whose idea it was to effectively keep the same side going through the Cup competition, despite the call of the fans to include Turner, but it was certainly not myself," recalled Syd.

"After we had beaten Ipswich away 5-2 and then managed to scrape through against Blackpool after a replay in Round Six perhaps we thought our name was on the trophy."

"Reaching Wembley was my proudest distinction. But the hurdle we cleared to get there brought me one of the most satisfying moments of my life when we beat Norwich with Billy Bingham's replay winner in the

semi-final at St Andrews, Birmingham."

"That day I was to take Luton, as captain, to the Cup Final, the complete fulfilment of an ambition in every footballer's heart. "But to win such an honour on a ground from which I had been effectively sacked 12 years earlier put that little extra spice into the achievement."

Unfortunately Syd's last appearance in a white shirt was not a happy one. Although he had been named 'Footballer of the Year' the previous evening and he had the proud honour to be the first Luton player to skipper a Town side at Wembley the team did not perform on the day and it was a sad Syd who picked up a losers medal from the Queen rather than the Cup.

It had been common knowledge that

Syd was to assume the managers job at Kenilworth Road after the Cup Final but the new season opened badly and got steadily worse.

The team had grown old together and new blood was badly needed but, as has been well chronicled in the past, there seemed to be a reluctance on the part of the Board to spend the money that had been accumulated during the Cup run.

"The directors believed we had some very talented youngsters on the books whom we could develop and play in place of the older players in the First Division," said Syd.

"The jump from local youth football was too much to be made in a short space of time and we left it too late to find top quality replacements.

"The directors did not give me any power to conduct transfers and, instead, went against my advice and signed Joe McBride from Wolves for £12,500 when it was too late anyway."

Syd resigned a week before the end of the season with the club already relegated for the first time in its history. The official explanation for his departure was "a fundamental disagreement on policy."

Syd considered the offers open to him and decided to accept a coaching post at Leeds United taking with him trainer Les Cocker from Kenilworth Road.

A year later Don Revie was handed the player-manager's position at Elland Road and the stage was set for the growth of the great Leeds side through the 1960's and 1970's.

"I had played against Don during his days at Leicester and had attended F.A.coaching courses with him," said Syd.

"We shared the same beliefs and spoke the same language and I was therefore more than pleased to see him get the managers job.

"We had a brilliant side at Leeds and it must be remembered that most of the players came up through the youth side that I was responsible for."

That side won League Championships in 1969 and 1974, the FA Cup in 1972, the League Cup in 1968, and the Fairs Cup in 1971. But many remember them for what they could have won. So many times Leeds came second in the race for the championship, and in the 1965, 70 and 73 FA Cup Finals.

Following Revie's departure from Elland Road to manage England, Syd also left and took on the assistant manager's job at Birmingham City under Willie Bell, one of his old players at Leeds, before taking up coaching positions at Hull and Manchester United leading up to eventual retirement in 1982.

Despite his traumatic last twelve months at Kenilworth Road, Syd looks back on his days here with affection and still keeps in touch with Wally Shanks and several other of his old team mates.

He unfortunately lost his wife two years ago (he had known her since junior school) and has recently undergone two stomach operations but his daughter lives close by and is able to visit regularly along with, no doubt, many of his pupils from his Elland Road days.

ALL 72 clubs in the Nationwide Football League have thrown their full support behind the forthcoming worldwide FIFA Fair Play Day which is to be held on Saturday, September 20, 1997.

Football leagues and clubs all around the globe have been asked by FIFA, world football's governing body, to participate in this very special event and promote 'Fair Play'.

At every Nationwide Football League game over the weekend of September 19 to 21 spectators will see the match referee hand both team captains a 'Fair Play' pennant immediately prior to the kick-off.

This will symbolise the acceptance of both teams of FIFA's Fair Play ethos. Explanatory information will be conveyed to the quarter of a million supporters attending matches in the Nationwide Football League over that weekend by way of tannoy announcements and an article in the 'Nationwide Review' which accompanies match programmes.

The weekend will also see two Nationwide Football League matches

televised live on Sky Television. At these two particular games, as well as the standard exchange of pennants, the FIFA Fair Play banner will be paraded around the pitch by local schoolchildren prior to the kick-off.

The promotion of 'Fair Play' in the Nationwide Football League is of course not just restricted to this one weekend in the football calendar. Each season, the three divisions, in conjunction with the Football Association, compete for a Fair Play Award.

Merit tables are produced throughout the season based on goals scored and disciplinary penalties incurred by the two clubs. The team in each division with the highest credit balance at the end of the season wins the Fair Play Award and a cheque for £10,000 which goes towards a community-based project at the club.

Last season's winners of the Fair Play Awards in Divisions One, Two and Three of the Nationwide Football League were Bolton Wanderers, Luton Town and Wigan Athletic.




LTFC EVACUATION PROCEDURE
